

The present ballpoint pen is part of a series of such pens made by Caran d'Ache for Patek Philippe and given as presents to important clients of the firm

The celebrated house Caran d'Ache, Switzerland's only manufacturer of writing instruments, was founded in Geneva in 1924.

The present dishes are from the private collection of the renowned jeweller and case maker Jean-Pierre Hagmann of Geneva who had received them through the years as presents from Patek Philippe. Preciously kept the dishes are in like new condition.

Born in Geneva in 1940, Jean-Pierre Hagmann began his professional career as a goldsmith working for renowned companies such as Ponti Gennari, Gay Frères and J.-P. Ecoffey. In 1984 he founded his own company, specializing in the manufacture of custom-made high quality watch cases. He worked for several of the world's most famous watch manufactures, notably Patek Philippe, to whom he supplied amongst others cases for references 3974, 3979 and 5029, all models of the firm's "Grand Complication" series.

Without a doubt the most skilled artisan and the point of reference for case making, Jean-Pierre Hagmann's extraordinary production included around 1500 cases for minute repeating watches of which approximately a third was supplied to Patek Philippe.

According to the Archives of *Tag Heuer* the present watch was made in 1969.

The Autavia, the true representative of Heuer's sporting heritage, was released in 1962. It was the first new model launched under the guidance of the firm's new CEO Jack Heuer, the name a combination of its target markets, the manufacture of timekeeping devices for motorsports and the production of cockpit instruments for military and civil aviation: AUTomotive and AVIAtion. Its solid construction, excellent legibility and the rotating bezel made it the perfect chronograph for pilots, divers and other military personnel – including the Israel Defense Forces. The present reference 113.603 is from the very last vintage Autavia series launched in 1985.

Other models of reference 113.603 are illustrated and described in *Heuer Autavia Chronographs* by Richard Crosthwaite & Paul Gavin, pp. 142 & 143, 146 & 147 and 150 & 151.

The present Heuer Autavia is one of the exceedingly rare military versions of the model to appear in public, supplied in the 1980s to the Israeli Defense Forces (IDF) or "Tzahal" in Hebrew, as confirmed by the Archives of *TAG Heuer*.

The case back bears IDF's military issue number "M-2008", the absence of a serial number confirms that the watch was not part of the firm's regular production.

Obviously hardly used, this military Autavia impresses with its extremely well-preserved overall condition, the presence of the original bracelet and the protective sticker to the case back – a highlight for the collector of rare timepieces.

The present watch is part of the second series of the exceedingly rare "White Orange Boy" Autavia. It features longer indexes painted lengthwise. With what appears to be a slightly warmer white base than found on the "Jo Siffert" Autavia counterparts, the "White Orange Boy" further has signal orange accents rather than blue accents. The orange renders the overall aesthetic of the look to be very modern, and one can imagine that it would be the perfect complement to a vintage Porsche Carrera in signal orange.

According to the Archives of $\it Tag\ Heuer$ the present watch was made in circa 1971.

The Heuer "Monaco" was designed by Jack Heuer and named after the celebrated Formula One race track. It was introduced simultaneously in Geneva and New York in 1969. The very first series was fitted with a calibre 11 self-winding movement and a metallic blue dial with white registers. The Monaco was the first square-cased and water resistant chronograph.

Very soon after its launch, a version with the improved calibre 12 was released, as rare as its predecessor. Also nick-named "McQueen Monaco", it became synonymous with Steve McQueen when he wore it in his 1971 film, Le Mans.

According to the *Omega* Archives, the present watch was shipped to Hong Kong on 23rd October 1958.

Launched in 1957, the celebrated Omega "Speedmaster" was the creation



of Pierre Moinat, head of Omega's "creative" department, with the case designed by Claude Baillod and the prototype made by George Hartmann. The watch was originally destined for "men who reckon time in seconds", i.e. automobile racers, athletes, engineers and scientists, the tachymetre scale engraved on the bezel allowing the calculation of speed at a glimpse, hence the name "Speedmaster". As the thought of men on the moon was still in the realm of science fiction at the time, it was only later that it became the "Moon Watch".

Even before its conquest of space, the "Speedmaster" was and still is one of the most iconic watches in production. Introduced into the market in 1957, it can be considered the originator of the water-resistant sports chronograph watches. The most important improvement is unquestionably the tachymetre scale on the bezel as opposed to printed on the dial, hence rendering the dial more legible while simplifying the calculation of speed. In the years to come, this revolutionary feature was incorporated by most of the other watch manufacturers, notably by Rolex when introducing the famous "Daytona" model in the 1960s.

The original "Speedmaster Broad Arrow" ref. CK 2915 such as the present watch had a 39 mm. water-resistant case with engraved steel bezel graduated to 300 km/h, its principle characteristics, the "Broad Arrow" shaped hands, and the calibre 321 movement protected by an antimagnetic soft iron cap. Its dial showed some very distinctive features such as the applied metal "Omega" logo as opposed to the common printed version, the "Omega" signature in a different font, appearing smaller and thinner, the letters "O" and "G" almost oval in shape, and the simple "Swiss Made" below 6 o'clock, omitting the "T" designation.

In 1959, the model became ref. 2998, the "Broad Arrow" hands were replaced with "Alpha" hands and the engraved steel bezel by the version with black insert graduated to 500 km/h.

The "Speedmaster Broad Arrow" is described and illustrated in Marco Richon's *Omega - A Journey Through Time*, pp. 596 - 597, *Omega Saga*, pp. 372 - 374 as well as in *Omega Sportswatches* by John Goldberger, pp. 95 - 107, where it is in addition prominently featured on the cover.

According to the *Omega* Archives, the present watch was shipped to Hong Kong on 28th January 1963.

Further to its very appealing dial, the present watch offered for sale here bears a special inscription on its case back: M.051- DEPORA. The information about this personalization is rather vague, but it has been confirmed that the few examples recorded had been sold in 1963. The word DEPORA seems to be an abbreviation of Department Olah Raga, the Indonesian Ministry of Sports and M.051 stands for a three-figure number.

A similar DEPORA example is illustrated in *Moonwatch Only, The Ultimate Speedmaster Guide* by Grégoire Rossier & Anthony Marquié pp. 160-161.

According to the *Omega* Archives, the present watch was delivered to Japan on 30th April 1962.

This excellent example is from the second generation of OMEGA "pre-professional" Speedmasters, ref. 2998, successor of the reference 2915. It began its production in 1959, eight case references (-1, -2, -3, -4, -5, -6, -61, and -62) were successively introduced during only four years. Notably, this reference was the first OMEGA to ever travel to space, as worn by astronaut Walter "Wally" Schirra as his personal watch on the Mercury-Atlas 8 mission of NASA's Mercury program in 1962. A rare find, this watch is made particularly desirable as it is preserved in good condition and maintains a handsome aesthetic with original unrestored dial and tropicalized bezel faded to a silvery grey.

It is sometimes called the "Ed White" by collectors after the astronaut of the Gemini IV mission. With sub-references -63, -64 (1964-1966) and -65 (1966-1969) the reference remained unchanged until the end of production in 1969.

A limited and numbered edition of 28 examples was given during a gala dinner in Houston to the astronauts having participated at this and earlier space missions, the case backs engraved with the relevant name and inscription To Mark Man's Conquest of Space with Time, Through Time, on Time. The present watch is number 145 of the standard edition of 1,014 examples of this model, produced until 1972, the backs engraved Omega Speedmaster - Apollo XI 1969, the first watch worn on the moon and number.

Reference 2508 is one of the first chronographs by Rolex. It was introduced to the market in the mid 1930s and reflects the militaristic climate of this period through its design: the case construction is a no-frills sturdy three-piece design; the chronographic dial presents the typical two subsidiary counters and tachymetre and telemetre scale. The first generation, such as the present watch, featured oval chronograph buttons, whereas the second series were fitted with rectangular pushers.

This remarkable chronograph is an incredibly rare Rolex model. It is only the sixth reference 2508 to be sold at Christies over the past 20 years and the second one with the exact same dial display featuring silvered scales and steel numerals.

More than rare, the present watch is in outstanding condition. Considering the watch is nearly a century old, this stunning vintage chronograph is a thrilling surprise for any erudite collector.

This is one such occasion. After detailed examination, it would appear that no part of the timepiece was subjected to any kind of intervention or restoration. The case is impressive, showcasing full lugs, perfect proportions and razor-sharp edges, unspoiled satin finish, and outstandingly crisp crown and numbers engraved to the case back. The dial allows us to admire unadulterated its manufacturing process: the numerals were applied to the dial which was then sprayed with black paint. The numerals were then polished, thus removing the black coating from their top, but not from their sides. Indeed, a close examination of the piece allows us to notice how the black paint runs up the side of the numerals.

Reference 4467 is a landmark model for Rolex collectors, as it is the first version of the Datejust, which in turn is the earliest released of the "modern" - still in production - models. The first 100 pieces were numbered and sold through an advertisement on the local newspaper "Tribune de Genève". In production only from 1945 to 1949, its design is directly and obviously derived from the Big Bubble Back, from which it differs, of course, for the presence of the date window. This model was predominantly made in yellow gold. Pink gold versions are very rare, but finding a pink gold 4467 with a black dial, furthermore unrestored, is one of the Holy Grails for the connoisseur of Rolex timepieces. Its rarity and collectability are only matched by its condition: the dial is indeed absolutely untouched, and it aged with the characteristic clouding typical of black Rolex dials. The case as well is in very good condition for a watch 80 years old, with its proportions absolutely intact. Aesthetically, the pink gold/black dial combination is among the most striking one can find in a wristwatch, and indeed it is even nowadays often found on modern timepieces. Without a doubt, no matter what point of view the collector looks at this piece from - aesthetics, historical importance, rarity - it can be considered a pinnacle of Rolex Daydate, and Rolex in general, collecting, and a probably once-in-alifetime opportunity.

During research it was interesting to note that other examples of the reference 6105 dating from 1951 where the original gold bracelet survives, the bracelets were also stamped with the date code 4/53 for the fourth quarter of 1953 and thus showing the likelyhood that these bracelets were original to the watches when sold new from Rolex.



The present chronograph is an exceedingly rare example of the legendary Daytona model. Although Rolex were indeed producing chronographs since the 1930s, it wasn't until 1963 that this collection was grouped and named from its racing inspiration. The initial name, "Rolex Le Mans", was not popular and following Rolex's arrival in the American market in 1964 it was decided to use "Daytona" instead, after the famous race held at Daytona Beach, Florida.

"Born" in 1963, these rare watches are also known as Mark 1. They launched the entire Daytona line, but noticeably do not have the "Daytona" designation on the dial which was only introduced the following year. Instead, we notice a small silver line below the signature "Cosmograph". The meaning of this underline is not known but according to scholarship it could be to mark the new use of Tritium rather than Radium on the dials. Furthermore, the dial displays the designation "Swiss" twice, once in its usual placement below 6 o'clock, and again on the edge of the dial, (not fully visible while in the case). Hence, the nickname of this early model, "Underline Double Swiss". The counters on the dial also hold a particular variance. The running seconds hand is thinner with a flat head, whereas the hand for the chronograph are thicker with a pointed head.

In addition to the dial details, these early models display an unusual tachymeter scale on the bezel. The scale is calibrated to 300 units, instead of the more common 200 (which occurred later in approximately 1967), and in addition, the hash marks extend all the way round as opposed to only a portion of the way round the bezel. Finally, another highly notable quality of this example is the true sign of a Mark 1 Daytona, that the inside case back is stamped 6328, not 6239.

The present example is part of only a handful of such first series 6239 to appear in public to date. Preserved in very good, original overall condition it cannot but attract enormous interest among collectors.



Reference 5514 is one of the very few "bespoken" references: references which designate a model made exclusively for an organization. Another example is reference 5517, a submariner made for the Bristish Navy. Reference 5514 was instead made for the marine exploration agency "Comex". However, it would appear that an extremely restricted number of 5514 were actually publicly commercialized. Whether this was a mistake on Rolex part, a way of depleting a stock they were left with, or maybe a different situation altogether, is impossible to know with certainty.

The civilian 5514 is currently believed to occur only on watches bearing serial number circa between 5'200'000 and 5'350'000. The present watch bearing serial number 5'287'315 perfectly fits in the ascertained timeframe.

The Beta-21 electroquartz movement was developed by a consortium of twenty watch companies at the Swiss Electronic Research Centre or CEH (Centre Electronique Horloger) in Neuchâtel. It was the first quartz movement for wristwatches with analogue display and introduced at the Basel Fair in April 1970. The Beta-21 movement was accurate to 5 seconds per month, which was far superior to any automatic and manual-winding watch at the time.


Minute repeating wristwatches harken back to an era long gone, when a practical reason was at the root of every advance and innovation in watchmaking. The repeater, for example, was developed to answer the need of knowing time in the dark, a more than common occurrence in a time when electrical illumination was first nonexistent, and later only present in major cities. In more recent times this practical need has faded, but the technical complexity and undeniable poetry of this complication render it one of the most admired and sought-after. Its complexity is twofold: on the one hand, the actual mechanism is extremely intricate, on the other hand, enormous research efforts have to be made in order to find the best geometry for the resonating coils and the overall case design which yields the purest possible sound. This still today – and even more so in the past – means important research and development costs beyond the actual production complexity, and it is especially true for a company with historically extremely limited output and equally high quality standards such as Audemars Piguet.

As a matter of fact, between 1892 and 1992 the total output of Audemars Piguet minute repeating wristwatches has been astoundingly limited: 35 examples in total, the vast majority of them cased in gold. Furthermore, if one considers more recent times, the number drops down to an incredibly low amount. Since 1945 and until 1992, only 7 minute repeating timepieces left Audemars Piguet workshop: one in 1945, and 6 between 1951 and 1960. Only 2 of them were cased in platinum, ironically the first one, sold in 1945, and the last one, sold in 1960 – the present piece. Thus, this watch reunites a number of incommensurably rare traits under the same case: not only it is one of 7 post-war Audemars Piguet repeaters, but it also is one of only 2 post-war pieces made in platinum, the last minute repeater realized by the company before its modernization in the nineties, and the only chiming Audemars Piguet timepiece from the post-war era to feature a bracelet. Actually, a total

of only three minute repeating wristwatches are documented to have left Audemars Piguet workshop with a bracelet: the present piece, a rectangular wristwatch made in 1924, and a lady's bracelet watch from the early twentieth century. It is possible that a bracelet piece left the factory without the bracelet being documented in the archives, but quite unlikely.

All this considered, it is safe to say that a platinum vintage minute repeating Audemars Piguet timepiece with bracelet is among of the rarest combinations in the entire field of vintage watchmaking.

Until recently known only by its mention in Audemars Piguet archive, its very survival to this day was a matter of speculation until spring of 2016, when it was consigned for sale by the descendants of the original owner. A pièce unique made under special order, it was delivered in 1960. At the time, Audemars Piguet was not producing miniature chiming movements any longer, and they were lacking some necessary components. Vacheron Constantin was contacted and from them Audemars Piguet acquired a Lecoultre & Cie. ébauche dating back to half a century earlier. This ébauche has the particularity of having a "secret" number engraved on the mainplate and hidden by a bridge: 3185. It is extremely unusual for an ébauche to bear a serial number, furthermore hidden. Its presence is probably due to the "vintage" nature of the ébauche: a relic from the semi-industrial process watchmaking was at the beginning of the past century.

The ébauche was finished at Audemars Piguet, and the final result is a technological masterpiece featuring straight bridges and hammers close together. It was numbered 64804 and cased in a platinum case, No 3207, with diamond-set bezel and bracelet. The unique reference number 5538 was used for this chef-d'oeuvre, and it was delivered in Spain to Union Relojera Suiza Madrid, for the famous retailer Grassy. However, the story does not end here. In 1983 the owner brought the watch back to the manufacture and demanded for it to be made more understated and masculine. The diamond-set bezel and bracelet were changed for the ones currently found on the piece: a very elegant polished sloped bezel which emphasizes the size of the watch, and a new platinum bracelet - reference 573 - realized by Jean-Pierre Ecoffey, one of the leading case and bracelet makers of the time. At the same time, the piece was serviced and restored by Francisco Pasadin, one of the historical and most skilled Audemars Piquet watchmakers. Today, Mr. Pasadin still works at Audemars Piquet and is in charge of the most important heritage timepieces sent to the manufacture for servicing.

Since then, the piece remained in the same family, and it has hardly ever been used. Indeed, its condition is absolutely stunning, practically newold-stock.

The importance and rarity of this wristwatch cannot be overstated; in fact, when submitting the piece to Audemars Piguet in order to acquire the Extract from the Archives, the heritage department kindly requested to prominently include it in "Audemars Piguet Miniature Chiming Watches 1882-2002", a book coming out this fall dedicated to the history of Audemars Piguet repeating watches. More than fittingly, a copy of it is offered together with this lot.

This useful feature, inspired by the digital clock in Dresden's Semper Opera, improves the legibility of the date by about three times in comparison with conventional displays. The silvered dial features the characteristic off-centre hour, minute, second and power reserve indications.

This beautifully pierced and engraved clockwatch is a very rare example of a 17th century timepiece made by an Italian watchmaker. Furthermore as a clockwatch – fitted with a striking train and striking the passing hours exactly like a clock - it is a particularly rare survival.

The present watch was made in a period before the invention of the balance spring which did not appear until after 1675, the balance still works in the same way but its arc is unregulated by a spring. In the 17th century there was no necessity to know the time more exactly than to the nearest hour and therefore a single hand was perfectly adequate for the purpose, watches with both hour and minute hands were gradually phased in from about 1690. This impressive early Italian watch would be a fascinating addition to any serious horological collection and at the same time makes a great display as a piece of historic mechanical art.

The present watch is fitted with the rare barillet-type movement with a rotating pinned cylinder as opposed to the more often used "sur plateau" movement with a flat rotating disc. Although requiring more space and hence a more voluminous case, the pinned cylinder movement is more robust and generates a richer tone.

The barillet-type movement with pinned cylinder was invented by the watchmaker Antoine Favre-Salomon in Geneva in 1796. He replaced the stack of bells in use at the time by a comb with multiple pre-tuned notes. Together with a horizontally placed pinned barrel this system generates more varied and complex sounds.

This watch has an identical musical movement to those made by *Perrin Frères* of Geneva in the early 19th century and can therefore be possibly attributed to that workshop.

This fine and very attractive watch by the celebrated French maker Ferdinand Berthoud is preserved in excellent condition, the enamel remains undamaged and unrestored even after 220 years. In addition, lavish use of pearls enhances the richness of the gold case.

The construction of the movement unsurprisingly for Berthoud as such an eminent maker, is constructed in a special way so that the watch could be made as thin and elegant as possible. The third wheel, contrate wheel, crown wheel and potence adjustment of the train and verge escapement are set within a cut-out in the frontplate, the wheels being secured by a separate bridge, the backplate is cut out level with the top of the mainspring barrel and fusée, these also being secured by a separate plate. The overall effect is that the thickness of the movement is reduced substantially from that of a standard verge movement thereby giving the watch a total thickness of only 17 mm.

The present watch and its combination of a lavishly decorated case and a high quality movement is the perfect example for a timepiece made for a Chinese dignitary.

The superb enamel decoration illustrates the celebrated art of enamel miniatures originating from Geneva in the 19th century. It was unusual during that period that an artist would sign his work, the enamel on the present watch however can be attributed to Jean-François-Victor Dupont (1785-1863), a celebrated enamel painter working in Geneva. He was famous for his portraits of eminent personalities (King George IV, Henry VI among others), as well as decoration of watches and boxes for the Chinese market. He worked frequently with Ilbery, Piguet & Meylan, Rochat Frères and others. Examples of his work can be found in the world's most renowned museums, notably Geneva's Patek Philippe Museum.

William Ilbery or Ilbury (c1760-1851) was a celebrated watchmaker from London, renowned for his exceptional timepieces made for the Chinese market. In 1836 Ilbery settled in Fleurier, left to Macao in 1839 and then to Canton. There he was known to have become friendly with Bovet and they met regularly, even though they were rivals not only in business but also in their private lives. Both were courting Anna Vaucher, daughter of Charles-Henry Vaucher of Fleurier, one of Bovet's competitors in Canton. Ilbery was in fact engaged to Anna Vaucher and even though he was constantly on travels Anna remained faithful to him and resisted the proposals of Bovet who hoped one day to win her over. Sadly no marriage ever took place since Anna became ill and died in 1845.

Ilbery's early watches were very much in the English style, fitted with full plate movements and duplex escapements. His later movements showed the influence of the free standing barrels of the Lepine calibre as used in Jaquet Droz's Swiss production signed in London and that of William Anthony, who worked in London. William Anthony (1764 - 1844), another celebrated watchmaker of his day, was sixteen years senior to Ilbery. He influenced greatly the latter's work and contributed substantially to the development of Chinese watches, however it is still William Ilbery who is known as the "father" of the Chinese watches. The cases Ilbery used for his timepieces were always of highest quality, lavishly decorated by the best Genevan enamellists of the time, notably Jean-François-Victor Dupont.

The present watch immediately impresses by its incredible, almost unused condition, the plain classic heavy gold case complementing the beautiful perfect white enamel dial with its bold Breguet numerals. What makes this watch very special indeed is however the delightful Westminster chime minute repeating performed by four hammers on four tuned gongs. The Westminster carillon repeating mechanism is far more complicated to construct than the better known quarter or minute repeating on two gongs and is very rarely found at all except in some of the world's most complicated watches. It appears from our research that the Paul Buhré Company made a small series of these watches with Westminster minute repeating only especially for the English market, the sound of the repeating of course replicates the peal of bells that rings out from the clock tower of the Houses of Parliament in London including the large bell known as "Big Ben".

The Buhré dynasty of watch makers, starting with Paul-Léopold Buhré around 1815, specialized in the manufacture of high quality watches for the Russian market until the revolution of 1917 when new markets had to be found. In 1930 the firm was listed as PAUL BUHRE & HENRI BARBEZAT-BOLE SA.

To the best of our knowledge the present watch has never before been offered in public. It is fully signed and furthermore preserved in superb condition with wonderfully crisp case and, most importantly for a collector, a perfect enamel dial.

This watch, no. 15'172, is the last example of a series of three minute repeating split seconds hunter case watches, numbered 15'170-15'172, all made to the same specifications as detailed on the worksheet for no. 15'170. The copies of the worksheets confirm that the production of no. 15'172 was finished in 1906, total cost 1,548.30 Francs, an impressive amount for the period and underlining the high quality. It was sold to Veill & Cie. on 6 September 1906.

The ingenious hand-setting system is Jürgensen's own patent, to operate it the bow is pushed forward towards the dial as far as possible, turning the crown will now set the hands. When the bow is returned to its normal position the winding function can be resumed.

An almost identical watch is illustrated in *The Jurgensen Dynasty*, John Knudsen, p. 281.

The present is an extremely rare and highly complicated large watch made by the founders of Omega, Louis Brandt & Frère. Very few watches by the Brandt Company of this quality and complication are known publically. The present example is furthermore preserved in excellent overall condition. The substantial 57 millimeter gold case encloses the highly finished minute repeating movement with perpetual calendar, chronograph and moon phases. It is also fitted with the unusual feature of a central minute register hand instead of the more commonly found subsidiary type register. The beautiful original and untouched silvered dial contrasts perfectly with the yellow gold indexes and hands.

Louis Brandt & Frère

In 1848, in La Chaux-de-Fonds, Louis Brandt, watchmaker, started his own manufacture. I 1880 a new manufacture was established in Bienne called Louis Brandt & Fils when eldest son Louis-Paul joined the business. Within ten years, the manufacture had become the largest in Switzerland. From 1891 the company was renamed Louis Brandt & Frère when both Louis-Paul and younger brother César joined the business. At that time, the Brandt brothers introduced new production techniques, mechanization and automation, transforming the small-series manufacture of watches into industrial-scale production. In 1894 they changed their name to Omega, named after their first watch. This name also conveyed quality because Omega is the last letter of the Greek alphabet and means "perfection".

Distinguished by its exceptionally good condition, this Chronometro Gondolo appears almost as new. A more perfect and untouched example would be hard to find. To the best of our knowledge it has furthermore never been offered in public before.

Chronometro Gondolo

On 12 November 1872, Patek Philippe sold its first watch to the Rio de Janiero based retailer Gondolo & Labouriau. Until 1927, when the relationship ended, approximately one third of Patek Philippe's entire production was sold through this Brazilian retailer. Thousands of watches were made that are now known as Gondolo watches and wristwatches and they represent some of the most coveted Patek Philippe watches ever made. The reasons are simple: the quality of these timepieces is impressive in their unique technical requirements and is the way they were originally sold to exclusive member's of the ultimate watch collecting club, the Gondolo Gang. Four basic requirements were requested by Gondolo & Labouriau to distinguish the watches made for them from the watches made for Patek Philippe's regular production. First, the watches needed to be made with gilded brass plates and feature the elegant S-shaped fourth wheel patented by Patek Philippe on 13 January 1893. The S-shaped minute train bridge is now considered one the company's hallmark designs. Secondly, a Swiss moustache lever escapement with bimetallic compensation balance was needed on each of the watches to meet high precision standards. Thirdly, the fourth, intermediate, and minute wheels of the watch were made in 9k rose gold. Lastly, a square socket was necessary in each of the mainspring barrels.

The present watch represents the state of the art in watch manufacturing from the heydays of complicated and ultra complicated timepieces. Uniting two of the main complications established at that time, being the perpetual calendar for the astronomical functions and the distinct minute repeating for the acoustic pleasure, it is furthermore enhanced by one of the best degree movements available at Patek Philippe and a high quality case.

The dial consists of seven parts and features the most desirable Breguet numerals and hands, the case is very high grade with a hidden hinge, becoming almost invisible following the curve of the case when the cover is closed. Naturally the movement incorporates all the characteristics the collector expects to find in a complicated timepiece made by Patek Philippe: wolf's tooth winding wheels, calibrated escapement, swan-neck micrometer regulator, furthermore adjusted to five positions including heat, cold and isochronism.

Patek Philippe's earliest known minute repeating perpetual calendar watch was made in 1874, no. 47'572. To date, only some 85 watches with these complications are known from the market or from publications, out of which around 60 were made before WW2, rendering them exceedingly rare.

Reference 5040 was launched in 1992 and discontinued in 2007. It was available in all gold colours as well as in platinum and is distinguished by its tonneau tortue case, a style typical of the 1920s and 1930s, but much less common in modern times. Tonneau indicates a "barrel" shape (indeed tonneau means barrel in French) with narrow ends and wide center. Tortue (turtle, in French) describes a case with short lugs and rounded corners, resembling the legs of a turtle protruding from the shell. As this term defines a case detail, rather than a case shape, It is normally used in conjunction of the case shape, one can have tonneau tortue, like the present watch, or also carre tortue, cushion tortue, etc.

Purchased by the father of the present owner in 2014 and offered complete with all of its accessories, the appeal of the this "World Time" reference 5131 is further enhanced by its excellent, close to new overall condition.

The yellow gold version of reference 5131 was launched in 2008, followed by white gold in 2009 and pink gold in 2014. The dial of the present yellow gold example represents the Americas, Europe and Africa, the white gold version shows Europe, Africa, Asia, and Oceania, the dial of the pink gold version Asia, Oceania and the Americas.

Reference 5131 is the successor of reference 5130 and shows three notable differences: use of a distinguishable cloisonné enamel dial, the names of the 24 cities are displayed in Italic type and the signature Patek Philippe and company location Genève are engraved on the bezel. Only two or three enameller artists are able to produce these rare dials and together they are able to deliver 30-40 dials of each color every year. Reference 5131 is equipped with the ultra-thin automatic calibre 240 HU (HU for Heure Universelle, French for World Time). It features an eccentric 22K gold micro-rotor recessed in the back plate.

A modern world time wristwatch, the mechanism dates back to the 1930s when talented Geneva watchmaker Louis Cottier devised it and offered his invention to Patek Philippe. Cottier's ingenuity resulted in the company's now classic references 1415 HU and 2523 (see lots 113 and 117 in this auction). In 1959, Patek Philippe obtained a patent for Cottier's device (Swiss Patent No. 340 191). The company further developed the movement, introducing calibre 240 HU in 1999.

The third (out of five, at present) member of the Patek Philippe perpetual chronograph wristwatch family, one of the most revered lineages among the company's historical and contemporary production, the model is a mesmerizing "trait d'union" between modern watchmaking and historical heritage. The dial is obviously inspired by the firm's 1940s production, with the distinctive railway minute divisions combined with Arabic five minute divisions, and the outer tachymetre scale.

The case design is more modern, with a generous 40 mm. diameter and sculpted lugs, the more than worthy successors of the iconic fluted lugs of previous reference 3970, and of course incepted with the even earlier reference 2499. The movement is based on a Lemania ébauche, heavily modified and finished by Patek Philippe. The reference 5101P is the first timepiece that combines two complications which are very difficult to accommodate in the confined space of a rectangular movement: two tandem mainspring barrels with 240 hours of energy storage capacity and a tourbillon precision regulator composed of 72 individual parts.

According to the Archives of *Montres Breguet*, the present marine chronometer No. 5001 "horloge marine à un barillet, petit modèle" was sold on 10 April 1835 to Torcapel for the sum of 1,100 Francs.

Little is known of Torcapel although his name appears in the Breguet archives at least once before when only eight months earlier he purchased an almost identical chronometer, No. 4980, also for 1,100 Francs. The present chronometer was subject to a complete overhaul in September 1989, from 29 September 1989 until 16 February 1990 it was regulated and the results recorded in the accompanying register.

Breguet's chronometers with a single going barrel were in fact developed by Abraham-Louis's grandson Louis Clément François Breguet after his return from Switzerland. These chronometers were intended for Merchant marine or private use instead of the regular double barrel type made by the firm for the Marine.

The easily removable platform escapement is another example of Breguet's ingenuity. The whole platform can be removed from the main assembly due to a small device locking the going train automatically, even when fully wound. This means that if damaged, the delicate escapement can be temporarily replaced and sent separately for repair to a specialist chronometer maker whilst the main part of the movement could be repaired by any competent clockmaker.

This "Xa. FLOTMAS No. 038" Radiomir Panerai is one of the extremely rare survivors of a reference 3646 type B model supplied to the celebrated Decima Flottiglia Mezzi d'Assalto or Decima Flottiglia MAS, an Italian commando frogman unit of the Royal Italian Navy. The first Italian frogman group originated in 1938, and became known as the 1a Flottiglia Mezzi d'Assalto, or 1st Flotilla Assault group. The tenth (or decima) group was formed around 1940.

Type B models are characterized by the case signature "Oyster Watch Co.", the serial numbers ranging from 1009925 to 1010037.

The present watch is distinguished by its very good, original overall condition, still retaining the original "Brevet +" crown, full case proportions, the engraved "Xa. FLOTMAS No. 038" clearly visible.

Reference 6204, the very first Submariner, was introduced at the 1954 Basel Fair, production had however already begun in 1953, year of production of the present example. Perhaps the rarest variant of the early Submariner ref. 6204 distinguished by the designation "Sub-Aqua" to the lower half of the dial. To date, less than five examples of this ultra-rare variant are believed to have appeared at public auction.

Although the origin of the name "Sub-Aqua" is unknown it is generally thought that the model was made by special order for the British Sub-Aqua Club or BSAC, one of the most famous recreational diving clubs of the period. The club was founded in 1953, the year of the development of the very early Submariners for this particular use.



The present "Sub-Aqua" still features the slim "pencil" hands and the distinctive sweep centre seconds hand known as "lollipop hand", easily recognizable by its large luminous dot at the tip without the pointed extension. The present watch is a fine example of the rare Rolex reference 6204, the firm's first Submariner, in production only for one year from 1953 until 1954. The presence of the original guarantee stamped by Joyeros Alberth SA, located in Lima, Peru, and the other period accessories further enhance its appeal.

In very attractive overall condition it features the for the model typical elongated "pencil hands", the sweep centre seconds hand is easily recognizable by its characteristic luminous dot at the tip without pointed extension, the so-called "lollipop hand". A further characteristic of reference 6204 is the word "BREVET", patented, just above the reference number found between the lugs at 12 o'clock.

Reference 6536/1 and its brethren 6536 were in production for a short time between 1955 and 1959. No certainty exists on why two such similar models have been sold at the same time. It is speculated that the more robust reference 6536 was targeted to a more professional market, while the more slender 6536/1 to the public at large.

Few sports watches have such iconic status amongst collectors like a beautifully aged reference 6200. This example is one of the best and most original specimens ever offered at auction. It impresses with the original and unrestored "Explorer-type" dial, defined by its bold 3, 6, 9 numerals, furthermore confirming scholarship stating that the original version of reference 6200 did neither feature the Submariner designation nor the depth rating. Of great importance is the fact that the original hands are still preserved, easily identifiable by their extended length

Less than twenty reference 6200 with "Explorer" dials are known publically with only five examples being sold at Christie's in the past decade. Unsurprisingly all have serial numbers with a very close proximity to each other, in fact the present watch no. 32'145 is only six numbers away from the other exceptional reference 6200 sold by Christie's Geneva in May 2016, no. 32'139

Reference 6200 is one of the rarest and most desirable Rolex Submariner models ever made. Its large case featuring the rounded case back and generously proportioned "Brevet" crown of 8 mm. lend it a very masculine and sporty look. The dials used were the same type as those of the 1953 Explorer models ref. 6298 and 6150: the triangle at the 12 o'clock position is equilateral, hence of different shape than those on ref. 6204 and 6205. Reference 6200 was the first Submariner model with so-called "Mercedes" hands as opposed to the straight "pencil" hands of its peers. Compared to later Submariner generations, these were however longer.

Reference 6538 was in production from 1955 to around 1959. It is the successor of the Submariner reference 6200. Both models are Submariner references targeted to a more professional audience than their contemporary peers. Some design details betray this destination, such as the thicker case design and, especially, the legendary 8 mm. crown: the so-called "Coroncione" (Italian for "big Crown") which is now the nickname for the models in Italy. Among the most recognizable Submariner models, reference 6538 is also known as "James Bond", as it was present on the wrist of the most elegant spy in the world in two different features: "Dr. No" (on a leather strap) and "Goldfinger" (on a Nato nylon strap).

Reference 6538 is characterized by a gloss dial with gilt designations, 8 mm. Brevet crown, and a slighter thinner case design than its forefather ref. 6200, thanks to the new thinner calibre 1030. Early models, such as the present watch, are distinguished by a closed minute ring, lollipop seconds hand (with big luminous dot), and bezel with red triangle. The present reference 5512 is an attractive example of this rare Submariner model. It features the black dial with "gilt printing" and depth rating in silver and the correct case back stamped III.59.

For half of a decade, Rolex's sports watches did not have any crown guards. In 1959, Rolex introduced a new generation of Submariner, reference 5512. For the first time, a Rolex enjoyed the benefits of crown guards with square ends in profile.



During the first years, these crown guards have seen numerous changes and developments until, eventually, finding the definitive shape in a rounded form. Prior to that, the crown guards were pointed, only made during a very short time and today very sought after by collectors. Submariners with pointed crown guards are also nicknamed "cornino".

The rarest version however are examples with the square crown guards, the very first batch from 1959. According to research, until today only a handful of these ultra-rare variants have been offered at public auction. Interestingly, all of them feature serial numbers in the very low 478'0xx range; the examples we were able to locate are all within a sequence of 20 numbers. One probably mustn't go any further to conclude the extreme rarity of these historical specimen - such as the present example, serial no. 478'007.

The present example of reference 1655 features a MKII bezel, characterized by bold graphics centered between outer and inner rim, and MKII dial, recognizable by the not-so-well-defined spikes of the crown. One of the most iconic vintage Rolex references, the so-called Freccione (Italian for "big arrow") or Steve McQueen was in production from 1971 to 1985. Reference 6240 was the first "Ovster Cosmograph" model produced by Rolex. This novelty was predominantly characterized by the screw down push buttons. In production only during the second half of the 1960s, it was replaced by the better known references 6263 and 6265.

The present watch is distinguished by its early non-Oyster dial, not yet making reference to the screw down pushers. In fact, this example still features a dial version better known on reference 6239, for example, with the sought-after small, shifted Daytona designation. Only for a second generation of reference 6240, Rolex designed a dial with the Oyster denomination.

Another noteworthy fact is the designation "ROW" stamped on its movement, indicating that the original destination for the piece was the American market - and it is offered with two dials: its original silvered "non-Oyster" dial, and an additional later black ref. 6263 dial, at present mounted on the watch.

The present "Milsub" is a highly attractive representative of the rare and much sought after model. Recently serviced by Rolex it is delivered with the relevant Service Card dated September 2015 and is still under guarantee.


This "Milsub" reference 5513 impresses with an untouched dial, the different shades of ivory of the highly attractive discoloration of the luminous material to numerals and hands rendering it a very unique appearance. The case is likewise preserved in very good overall condition, it has never been exposed to careless polishing, underlined by its full body and well defined angles to the facets of the lugs. Both the reference and serial numbers finely engraved between the lugs are clearly legible and repeated to the inside of the back cover, as the connoisseur would expect. The bezel is the correct version featuring minute markings, unique for the military Submariner series.

The Military version of the Submariner ref. 5513 was adapted following the specifications requested by the British Ministry of Defence. The watches had to be fitted with fixed bar lugs with a diameter of at least 2 mm. The dials had to be easily readable and were therefore equipped with the larger "sword" hands. They also had to show the international symbol for Tritium, the encircled "T". The hack feature allowing the precise setting of the time was another specific request. The models furthermore had a unique bezel with sixty minute marks rather than only the first fifteen minutes. The outside of the case backs were marked with the military broad arrow sign, Ministry of Defence issue numbers and unit number. Furthermore the inside of the case backs repeated the serial number which is commonly only found between the lugs

The outside of the case back of the present watch is engraved with the following markings:

0552 for British Ministry of Defence, 923-7697 for the NATO code, the Broad Arrow characterizing all watches owned by the British Army, the issue number 552 and issue year 76.



Over a period of 35 years, reference 2499 was made in four series in a total production of only 349 pieces, the majority cased in yellow gold. The rarity of this model becomes evident when considering that an annual average of only 9 watches left Patek Philippe's workshops.

Reference 3940, the quintessential perpetual calendar distinguished by its timeless elegance, is undeniably amongst Patek Philippe's greatest classics. Launched in 1984 as replacement for reference 3450, it was at the time the slimmest automatic perpetual calendar wristwatch.

An initial series of around 100 pieces were manufactured between 1984 and 1985, the first 25 were especially made for the 225nd anniversary of Patek Philippe's retailer Chronometrie Beyer in Zurich, numbered and personalized. Starting in 1985, reference 3940 went into standard production. Until the model's discontinuation in 2007 when it was replaced by reference 5140 three further series were produced.

The main design variants between earlier and later series include sunken subsidiary dials as opposed to the rather beveled version and a plain leap year dial rather than the one with the quarter separations. Earlier models featured a smaller signature, the designation "Swiss" was printed underneath the beady minute divisions. This was changed in later series with the "Swiss" printing within the ring.

In 1986, Patek Philippe launched a new generation of the perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch, designated reference 3970, replacing the hugely successful reference 2499 (see lot 128 in this auction) in production in four different series from 1951 to 1985. The main difference in the movement was the arrival of the new Lemania base ébauche which replaced the Valjoux movement used for the previous 50 years.

Starting with movement number 875'000, the first series of reference 3970 was produced with a solid snap on back, comprising approximately 100 examples. The second series introduced a solid screw back, designated reference 3970E (E for étanche, French for waterproof). A small number of watches from both series were also available with a sapphire crystal back, designated reference 3971E.

In 1986, Patek Philippe launched a new generation of the perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch, designated reference 3970, replacing the hugely successful reference 2499 (see lot 128 in this auction) in production in four different series from 1951 to 1985. The main difference in the movement was the arrival of the new Lemania base ébauche which replaced the Valjoux movement used for the previous 50 years.

Starting with movement number 875'000, the first series of reference 3970 were produced with a solid snap on back, comprising approximately 100 examples. The second series introduced a solid screw back, designated reference 3970E (E for étanche, French for waterproof). A small number of watches from both series were also available with a sapphire crystal back, designated reference 3971E.

In 1989, a third series of ref. 3970 was launched, fitted with a solid screw back as well as an additional sapphire crystal display screw back.

Reference 3970 was discontinued in 2004 and replaced by reference 5970 (see lots 92 - 95 in this auction).

The present Dome clock is distinguished by its excellent overall condition.

Patek Philippe opened its Electronic Division in 1948 with the goal of exploring photoelectric, electronic, and nuclear timekeeping. The department produced the groundbreaking solar clock, the first of its kind. In 1955, the solar-powered photoelectric clocks were exhibited at the 1955 World Symposium, and displayed at the Museum of Science in Boston, Massachusetts. In the 1960s, Patek Philippe began using quartz technology in its clock production, phasing out the use of solar versions.

Since their launch in 1955, few examples of these clocks are produced every year, each unique by its individually decorated case featuring engravings of varying pattern, cloisonné enamel scenes or leather-covered with applied ornaments. The small production is a result of the few artisans skilled enough to decorate the clock's challenging curved surfaces, works of art in their own right highly appreciated in today's collector market.

Towards the end of the 1940s, the Swiss watchmaking industry revived the technique of cloisonné enamel, initially in pocket and wristwatches such as the celebrated World Time models, as of the late 1950s also for the decoration of clocks, mainly Dome clocks. This elaborate and rather complicated method uses fine bands (filaments) of gold or copper to outline the design subject, which are then soldered to the surface of a plate. The empty spaces are filled with ground enamel and fired multiple times so that the surface becomes perfectly leveled. Even the most talented enamellers may need up to one year to complete such work on a clock, consequently only a handful of these decorative timepieces leave the workshops of Patek Philippe every year.

The present reference 5002P is fresh to the market. Consigned by an important private collector and in like new overall condition it represents the rare opportunity for the aficionado of rare timepieces to become the proud owner of one of the most iconic and ground-breaking landmark models of Patek Philippe's modern production.

Reference 5002 Sky Moon Tourbillon

Produced from 2001 to 2011 with an extremely rarefied output of only around 10 watches per year, reference 5002 is doubtlessly one of the most important wristwatches of our time.

At its launch in 2001, it was Patek Philippe's most complicated wristwatch ever and the firm's first model incorporating a double dial. Inspired by the "Star Calibre 2000" which features a complex sky-chart, Patek Philippe succeeded in miniaturizing the model to wristwatch size. Its 686 components add up to a unique combination of high complications, including a tourbillon adjusted to run within a high precision rate of -2/+1 seconds maximum daily variation.

This double-dialed mechanical wonder incorporates on one side a retrograde perpetual calendar with moon phase indication, on the other a celestial chart of the northern hemisphere; a horizon ellipse for a particular location, indications for the meridian passage of Sirius (chosen because it is the brightest star in the night sky, at magnitude -1.46 –nearly twice as bright as Canopus, the next brightest star), age and angular motion of the moon and sidereal time. Sidereal, or "star" time, is based on the amount of time it takes for a given star to return to a given point in the sky. This is in turn determined by the amount of time it takes for the Earth to make one full rotation on its axis.



The transparent crystal disk on the back of the Sky Moon Tourbillon rotates once per sidereal day, also the amount of time which is the basis for the sidereal time display. The meridian passage of Sirius is shown as well, the disk is driven by means of teeth on its circumference, concealed from view by the bezel, comparable to the mechanism of "mystery" clocks.

Its "cathedral" minute repeating mechanism, another premiere, was developed by Patek Philippe in collaboration with the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology. The new steel alloy and the extended lengths of the gongs generate a long and harmonious repeating sound.

The case is finely engraved with the "Calatrava cross" pattern, and so is the main dial: this is the first appearance in Patek Philippe's catalogue of a timepiece with finely engraved case and dial, a trend which the manufacturer now applies to a number of its high end wristwatches, most notably the recent celebratory Grand Master Chime.

This timepiece is a rare example of military timepiece, furthermore preserved in impressive and fully original condition.

It was produced for the Pakistani Air Force in 1960, as made abundantly clear by the inscription to the case back, which is furthermore confirmed by Omega Archives, as is its original Pakistani elected destination. Not only it bears the P.A.F. engraving to the back, but the movement as well is stamped P.A.F. (a detail found also on Omega timepieces made for other armies).

With a 38 mm. diameter, this timepiece is without a doubt classifiable as oversize for vintage standards. Large diameters are typical of military watches and are an effort to maximize readability. Other typical military traits are the dust cap, providing enhanced protection from atmospheric factors and from shocks as well, wide fully luminous hands, and the black luminous dial. It is interesting to note that this military dial is somewhat unusual, in the sense that instead

of Arabic luminous numerals - a defining feature of military dials -, it bears luminous dagger numerals, placed on the outer rim together with the minute divisions, and four non-luminous Arabic numerals. In order to increase readability in the dark, the dagger numerals at 3, 6, 9 and 12 are different than the others. The rest of the dial is left absolutely unobstructed, save for the "Omega" and "Seamaster" designations. The design results in an incredibly martial-looking dial: utilitarian, masculine and supremely clear.

The Extract furthermore states that the watch is part of a set of jewels, including earrings, necklace and ring, 160 diamonds approximate 2.35 ct.

The present set was made by upon special order by the father of the present owner and sold to him in the Salons of Patek Philippe Geneva in 1978. This unique set has remained in the same family ever since and is preserved in like new overall condition. It is one of the exceedingly rare complete Joaillerie sets to appear in public.

The necklace, earrings and ring are stamped JPE for Jean-Pierre Ecoffey, a jeweller located in Geneva, specialized in the manufacture of high quality gold bracelets, chains and jewellery, and one of Patek Philippe's suppliers.

As confirmed by the Extract, one of the hardstones used for this set is chrysocolla, also called gem silica, a bluish green to greenish blue variety of chalcedony that receives its vivid color from the presence of copper. It is the most valuable variety of chalcedony, the best specimens having a pleasing blue color with strong saturation, a uniform translucence, and a lack of inclusions.

Reference 4427

Reference 4427, the Jewellery or Joaillerie Ellipse, was in production around 1976 to 1978, made individually piece by piece, each slightly differing from the others, those with important differences with their own reference number, for example 4427-1. The bracelets of the watches and accessories such as earrings, rings and necklaces bear the same decoration, hardstone and diamond settings. At the 1976 Basel Fair a collection of these watches with matching earrings and rings was presented.

Baume & Mercier is originally a family manufacture founded in 1830 as "Les frères Baume" in Les Bois, a small village in the Swiss Jura. At the beginning of the 1920s Paul Mercier joined the company which consequently became Baume & Mercier, Genève.

During the "Roaring Twenties", the brand realized the importance of women's emancipation and came to regard their desires as an unquenchable source of inspiration. In the 1940s, building on this profound understanding of femininity, Baume & Mercier launched one of its most successful models: the Marquise. Impelled by this creative momentum, the brand launched a number of exquisitely creative and amazingly modern ladies' watches. It thereby proved that timepieces for women are not merely miniaturized and simplistic interpretations of masculine models. Femininity was already an integral part of the firm's values - revealing a resolutely modern attitude.

The very first reference in the revered line of Rolex Daytona chronographs is the present model, reference 6239. Launched in 1963 in the USA, and the following year in Europe, this reference is the beginning of what is arguably the most recognized line of chronographs ever produced. Adding to its already remarkable appeal, the present specimen furthermore comes with a wonderfully tropicalized dial: the three subsidiary counters shifted toward an absolutely even chocolate hue. Such discoloration is the result of atmospheric agents (UV light, humidity, oxygen) reacting with the black paint. Not only this effect occurs just on a minority of watches, but it is furthermore highly unpredictable: only a small fraction of tropical dials achieves such a perfectly even and warm tone as the one of the present watch.

The present piece, with a case number around 1.5 million, is a very early example, as it was manufactured just 4 years after the introduction of the model. Indeed, the bezel is correctly a Mark II, characterized by the hash mark for 275 UPH.

This reference was fitted with three different calibres: early examples (1963-1965) have cal. 72B, then from '65 to '67 circa cal. 722 was used, and from '67 on cal. 722-1, such as the one found on this piece.

Interestingly, Mark II bezels were discontinued around the same time cal. 722-1 started to be used. It is a reasonable assumption that only an extremely small number of 6239 was born with a Mark II bezel and 722-1 calibre.

The Daytona reference 6239 offered here for sale features a very rare an unusual Paul Newman dial without luminous dots. Further to our researches to authenticate the dial we noticed that a few similar pieces, without luminous dots, were delivered to Japan at the beginning of the 70's. As a result, we could assume that a special batch of the reference 6239 was ordered without the luminous material especially for the country of the rising sun, probably to minimize the tritium incidence on the watch's wearer. However the luminous indication remained on hands to allow the owner to see the time, slightly less precisely, in the dark.

After a close and meticulous microscope inspection of the watch there are absolutely no traces of any previous luminous indexes on this dial as clearly noticeable on the below detailed images. This dial configuration is very rare and so far only a handful of similar piece are known on the collector market.

This timepiece is not only a representative of the highly attractive and collectible family of bespoken Middle Eastern watches, but furthermore it belongs to the "royal" subgenre of this family.

It was – and is – customary in Middle Eastern countries such as Qatar, Saudi Arabia, and indeed UAE, to order series of personalized timepieces - with either national crests or royal signatures - both for the ruling family to enjoy, and also to be given as gifts to dignitaries or particularly honor-worthy subjects.

It is known that Emir of Dubai Mohammed bin Rashid Al Makhtoum ordered such a series of 6263, comprising a few dozen watches, in the mid-seventies. These watches were made with a personalized dial, made in two similar variations differing for the signature above the 6 o' clock subsidiary dial. One version displays the mark of the Wazarah Ad Difa'A department, and it was probably offered to high ranking officials. The other version however, exemplified by this superlative timepiece, bears the royal signature of the Emir himself. It is more than plausible that such "royal" pieces were reserved either for a more private use - by the Emir and members of his family - or given to extraordinarily worthy individuals or dignitaries. The custom of different tiers of watch personalization - corresponding to different tiers of honor to be bestowed on the recipient of the gift - is also quite customary in the Middle East. Another example of this behavior comes from Omani timepieces: it is well known that those bearing the signature of the Sultan on the dial were gifted only on the most extraordinary circumstances.

Of particular technical and aesthetic interest is the UAE crest. It was crafted in different 'padded layers': each color was applied with a pad, then the dial would be put to dry on a warm plate, and then the process would be repeated for all the colors present in the logo. This operation is extremely delicate, and the multiple passages were rigorously hand made by the most skilled artisans. Aesthetically, the immediate impact is absolutely amazing, first and foremost because the substitution of the Rolex signature (only the applied crown is left, and suitably so, considered the royal destination of the piece) with the emblem dramatically modifies the entire balance and looks of the dial, but also because this methodology creates a peculiar tri-dimensional effect noticeable at close examination.

Part of an exceedingly rare series made especially for His Majesty Qaboos Bin Said Al Said, Sultan of Oman, the present Rolex Day-Date reference 18078 with light green lacquer or "stella" dial is amongst the rarest and most exclusive examples of the so-called "Qaboos" Day-Dates ever offered at auction. Crowned Khanjar

Stability came to Oman only after the end of the Dhofar rebellion in 1976 with the help of Iranian, Jordanian and British forces. It was leading up to and during this period that Sultan Qaboos was ordering watches from Patek Philippe, Rolex and Audemars Piguet via Asprey in London who, having direct access to him, coordinated the commissions and supplied the final purchases. Naturally these special watches were personalized with Oman's "Khanjar" emblem making them very special and highly prized gifts for those lucky enough to receive them. Prior to 1976 the "Khanjar" emblem was used without a crown above, after this date the crowned emblem, as seen on the present watch, was displayed.

One of the world's great horological curiosities, the present miniature watch case is billed as "the world's smallest". Certainly it is smaller than the complete watch made during more than five years by one Edward Funnell, a jeweller of Brighton in England who presented the then "smallest watch in the world" at 11.2 mm in diameter and 3.2 mm thickness at the Great Exhibition in London in 1851.

The present watch case appears to be of Swiss manufacture and although of indeterminate date is most likely to be from the second half of the 19th century. It is a work of remarkable dexterity with hinged sprung front cover and sprung catch release from a button in the pendant. It is unknown whether a suitably small movement was ever constructed, it is however highly unlikely that a movement of only 2.8 lignes would be achievable.

This delightful case is simply a tour-de-force of miniaturization, demonstrating amply the skill of the master casemaker's art.

This watch is the work of the exceptional Genevan watchmaker Henry Capt and is one of the few known watches by him to be fully signed. It exhibits several unusual features; the musical movement is enclosed between the plates with a pinned barrel instead of the more usual sur-plateau type. This technically challenging arrangement allows the automaton to operate unhindered and gives a more pleasing musical sound. The automaton is of higher specification than most with four animations on the dial. The arm of the musician moves to play the lyre and most unusually both the cherubs arms move to play the drums, a charming scene of two billing doves in an arbor, one dove appears when the music starts and disappears at the end of the tune. The vari-coloured gold scene impresses by the delicately chased details, enhanced by the finely painted enamel background landscape view, demonstrating the celebrated art of enamel miniatures originating from Geneva in the early 19th century.

Henry-Daniel Capt (1773 - ?)

Henry-Daniel or Henri Capt, together with Isaac Piguet and Philippe Meylan, was one of the leading manufacturers of musical automata at the end of the 18th and beginning of the 19th century. Most of his work is not signed, although he sometimes scratched his name on his movements they are rarely fully signed. He specialized in the production of complicated watches, musical and automaton timepieces also for the Chinese market. Around 1789 Capt settled in Geneva and worked for several renowned companies such as Jaquet-Droz, Godet, Leschot and his brother-in-law Isaac Daniel Piguet. When Piguet left to enter a partnership with Philippe-Samuel Meylan in 1811, Henry Capt continued to work first on his own, later with his son Charles Henry, until around 1830, when he joined forces with Aubert and son, Place Bel-Air in Geneva.

Objects destined for the export to China were often made in pairs, the decoration identical but mirror-imaged so that they would face each other when displayed. According to tradition, this unusual habit had two reasons, one symbolic and one practical: the Chinese love for symmetry represented also by the lucky number "2", suggesting harmonious coexistence and,

to some extent, reproduction, and the popular Chinese proverb stating "good things come in pairs". The practical aspect was the availability of a substitute - should one of the items need to be returned to Europe for repair for example, a process likely to take several months at the time, there was still its "twin" left to embellish ones' home. Often used as offering from a European dignitary to a Chinese dignitary, absolutely no effort was spared in the manufacture of these unprecedented, veritable marvels made to please the Chinese mandarins.

The present pair of mirror-image duplex watches made by the celebrated manufacturer Bovet of Fleurier is a very fine and rare example of such object. Of highest quality and with perfectly mirror-imaged floral decoration, another most noteworthy particularity is the fact that the two watches are identically numbered, 522 in the case backs and on the movements.

The identical numbering of pairs of watches, sometimes with the addition of a dot after the number of the second piece of the pair, is a characteristic of watches made in the Val-de-Travers, notably Bovet. For a description of this system and illustration of a pair of Bovet "Chinese" watches with flower decoration and identical numbering see *The Mirror of Seduction - Prestigious pairs of "Chinese" Watches*, Patek Philippe Museum, edition 2010, pp. 128 & 129.

It is however extremely rare that such pairs have survived the tumultuous times of the last two centuries and appear in public.

Another pair of Bovet's flower decorated "Chinese" watches is illustrated in *La Montre Chinoise* by Alfred Chappuis, p. 199.

According to the Archives of Breguet, the present watch, a "petite répétition à quantième", small repeating watch with date, was finished February 1786. It was returned to Breguet's workshops for repair in 1794, noted as belonging to the "Citoyenne Nolan", citizien Nolan, the French word "Citoyenne" indicting that it was a lady.

This charming and exceedingly rare timepiece is one of Breguet's earliest datable watchesthe fractional number 2/86 indicating that it was finished in February 1786. As the records did not begin until 1787 it was therefore not recorded at the time, but is listed in the registers as being returned to Breguet's workshop for repair in 1794 at which time it was the property of a "Citoyenne Nolan" who would almost certainly have been the original purchaser, further confirmed by the engraved letter "N" on the back of the case. It has the rare feature of a Republican calendar of 30 days, a system in use during the French revolution from 1792 until 1805. It is therefore reasonable to assume that when the watch was sent to Breguet's workshop in 1794 the present dial was fitted to accord with the new regime.

The movements of these early quarter repeating watches were based upon commercially available movements then fitted by Breguet with cylinder escapements. The ébauches came from Neuchâtel or Geneva and were finished in Breguet's workshop where the escapements and repeating mechanisms were made before being encased. In the 1780s, it was by selling these watches that the firm survived day to day whilst Breguet worked on the construction and perfection of his *perpetuelle* watches.

The present watch gives collectors the very rare opportunity to acquire an early and documented watch, a fascinating part of Breguet's history.

An almost identical movement is illustrated in *The Art of Bregue* by George Daniels, 1974, p. 118.

According to the Archives of Breguet, the present quarter repeating watch with case no. 19 by Amy Gros was sold on 12 June 1809 to "Mademoiselle de Vienne", damsel from Vienna, for the amount of 1,080 francs.

This watch is a fine example of a Breguet "dumb" quarter repeating watch with his famous overhanging ruby cylinder escapement.

"Dumb" quarter repeating or repeating "à toc" is the term given to a repeating watch without gongs or bells whereby the hammers strike small metal blocks inside the band of the case during repeating. This system was probably used for reasons of discretion for the wearer.

Breguet used the cylinder escapement throughout his life, it is a frictional rest escapement but of a far superior kind. The first cylinder escapements made by the English makers were not much more accurate in operation than the verge. This was because the diameter of the cylinder was too great in relation to the diameter of the balance, causing a loss of energy through friction. To reduce the friction, the English makers, who were very skilled in the art of jeweling, made the cylinder half-section ruby. The ruby was fitted into a steel frame - it was this form of cylinder escapement first used by Breguet. By about 1795 Breguet had developed it to the very familiar "overhanging" ruby cylinder, these escapements performed so well and with such increased consistency of rate that temperature errors previously swamped by general bad performance now needed correction. For this reason, Breguet's ruby cylinder escapements often have a compensation curb fitted to the balance.

Jean-Gabriel Moynier (1772-1840) was a member of the Moynier dynasty of watchmakers and enamellers working in Geneva from the mid-18th to mid-19th centuries.

Only very few watches with retrograde flyback seconds are known before the 20th century. The present watch is a particularly attractive example taking inspiration from Breguet in the design of the fine engine-turned silver dial and gold case. It is furthermore preserved in extremely good condition.

The flyback seconds function is a great visual delight, it is operated from a steel pinion geared to the third wheel and a further sprung wheel on the dial plate causes the hand to fly back to zero after 60 seconds.

Professor Thomas Engel (b. 1927 in Germany, d. 2015 in Switzerland), inventor, author and watch aficionado, collector and maker, was an international coryphée in the field of researching polymers. He held around 120 patents in organic chemistry and was awarded numerous honours and prices in this field, including the 1972 "Diesel Prize" which he jointly won with Dr. Wernher von Braun, one of the most important rocket developers and specialist of space exploration.

Professor Engel was not only a famous watch collector but also a passionate "self-made" maker of technically outstanding timepieces. From the moment he first held a pocket watch in his hands, incidentally a Breguet, he knew he had found a passion that would take his life in another direction. Within the horological community, he is acknowledged for his understanding of the life and works of Abraham Louis Breguet, on whom he also published a biography.

His interest spanned beyond the average collector, applying his knowledge and skills to watchmaking, producing watches made in the style and technique of Breguet. Of outstanding quality and finesse, these so-called "Engel Breguets", such as the present example, have become highly soughtafter collector's pieces.

The present watch represents the state of the art in watch manufacturing from the heydays of complicated and ultra complicated timepieces. Uniting two main complications established at that time, the split second chronograph for timing purposes and the distinct minute repeating for the acoustic pleasure, it is furthermore enhanced by the superior quality case with hidden hinges, the highly jewelled movement and its excellent overall condition.

Patek Philippe launched the production of minute repeating split seconds chronograph in the late 1870s. The combination of these two complications became one of the firm's specialities, a large number of the production was sold to the North American market.

Patek Philippe's 1902 Patent for a split seconds chronograph feature is published in *Patek Philippe Pocket Watches* by Martin Huber & Alan Banbery, first edition, page 58, fig. 51.

This exquisite and very elegant jewelled pendant watch is a wonderful example of Belle Epoque style from the golden period of luxury at the beginning of the 20th century, still as wearable and glamourous today as it was over a hundred years ago. Fine enamel work was particularly in vogue at the time, all the great jewellery and watch houses producing pieces inspired by the Russian jeweller Fabergé. The use of platinum was a very modern idea introduced by Cartier and Boucheron which soon caught on, platinum when combined with diamonds and enamel creates a scintillating effect, add the name of Patek Philippe and the piece becomes truly special and of course highly desirable.

To the best of our knowledge the present watch has never before been offered in public.

To the best of our knowledge, this watch is the so far only example of a Patek Philippe Louis XV style repoussé case with "Hercules" decoration and chronograph function, a highly unusual combination, known to have appeared in public to date.

According to the Extract it was sold with a half open-face bassine case, silver dial and a back cover without embossed ornaments. The firm's workbooks however record a "rhabillage" or "repair/servicing" to the case in 1899 without stating any details; it can therefore safely be assumed that this intervention refers to the exchange of the back cover against the present one as well as the dial which had to match the renaissance style of the case.

Such Renaissance style cases were often designed by Georges Hantz, director of the Decorative Arts Museum in Geneva and renowned for his chased and engraved watch cases and moulds for embossing cases and stamping coins or medals.

Consigned by the grandson of the original owner and fresh to the market, this watch stands out by its excellent overall condition and the presence of the original certificate, presentation box and spare parts.

It is believed to be to date only known example of a Patek Philippe timepiece featuring the very unusual use of a chain fusée transmission, one of the most effective complications for an increased rate accuracy of a mechanical watch. The three quarter plate construction of the movement with the chain fusée lever escapement and diamond endstone is in the style of English pocket chronometers. Certainly made to special order, the watch impresses with a number of other characteristics, notably the "cabriolet" case and the retailer signature Peña Madrid found on the dial and the movement and the English import marks in the case.

This so-called "Cabriolet" watch is distinguished by its inner case revolving within the outer case conceived for it to be used either "open" and showing the dial or "closed" showing the back of the inner case. The cases are of such outstandingly high quality, allowing the inner case to fit so perfectly into the outer case, that the two sides show virtually no difference, neither visible nor tangible, when used as hunter case. Research has revealed that only nine other "Cabriolet" watches by Patek Philippe have appeared in public to date, the present example being the only one with chain fusée transmission.

The term "Vermicelli" engraving stands for a surface covered completely with small cuts in form of scrolls, curves and others. The decoration on this watch is of outstanding quality and crispness.

According to the Archives of Montres Breguet, the present marine chronometer No. 4858 "horloge marine à deux barillets, petit modèle" was sold on 5 September 1834 by M. Ducom, Brequet's agent in Bordeaux, for the sum of 2.000 francs.

As in all other fields of horology, Abraham-Louis Breguet contributed significantly to the development of marine chronometers, a category on which he had begun working already around 1796. In 1814 he became a member of the Board of Longitude in Paris, a body set up by the National Convention in 1795 with the aim of perfecting the various fields of astronomy and their application in geography, navigation and physics. The prestigious Board comprised some twenty members, including mathematicians, astronomers, former navigators and associated craftsmen - Breguet being the sole representative of the clockmaking profession, crucial for physicists and navigators. The second recognition followed on 27 October 1815 when he was bestowed "Horloger de la Marine", Horloger to the Royal Navy, by the King, a nomination confirming highest scientific ability and unquestionably the most prestigious title a clockmaker could aspire to. He consequently became the accredited (however not exclusive) supplier to the navy and by 1818, the production of marine chronometers was well under way. Supply of these pieces was not limited to the French Navy and Breguet sold his chronometers also to retailers in the principal French ports, such as Ducom in Bordeaux, and to private individuals, including naval officers, scientists and foreign clients, notably the London Board of Longitude. Taking is position as Horloger de la Marine extremely seriously, he published in 1817 the 23-page booklet "Instructions on the Use of Marine Watches made by M. Breguet", an informative manual full of advice on the use of marine timepieces and the verification of their accuracy (see Breguet - Watchmakers since 1766 by Emmanuel Breguet, pp. 244 - 246).

The high prices paid by the French Marine resulted in luxurious chronometers of finest finishing in sumptuous mahogany boxes with handfinished brass fittings, beautifully combining esthetical appeal and finest precision timekeeping.

Brequet's marine chronometers are described and illustrated in Emmanuel Breguet's Breguet, Watchmakers since 1775, pp. 244-249, and Breguet, an Apogee of European Watchmaking, pp. 176-187, and in George Daniel's The Art of Breguet, pp. 84-87 and 285, pl. 359a-b (twin barrel chronometer no. 4841, also sold in 1834).

The present watch is distinguished by its very attractive overall condition, most notably the luminous material of the dial which over time has taken an extremely appealing caramel tone. The case is likewise very well preserved, still retaining the original "Brevet +" crown.

The watch is from the "Type C" series of the celebrated model, made between 1942 and 1943, serial numbers ranging from 1'010'091 to 1'010'374. Type C watches were initially used by Italian combat swimmers, as of the second half of 1943 also by German combat swimmers trained in Italy. The watches are distinguished by the length of the wire lugs, exceeding those of the other series of reference 3646. The inside case backs feature the signature Rolex S.A. in the centre, below the signature the reference number followed by the seven digit serial number.

THE PROPERTY OF AN IMPORTANT GERMAN PRIVATE COLLECTOR

The following three lots, 210 and 212, are extremely rare examples of military chronograph wristwatches made in Germany between the early/late 1940s and early 1950s. These survivors of tumultuous times are today highly sought after by collectors.

The present chroograph is one of the exceedingly rare survivors of Hanhart's early "TachyTele" model, distinguished by the black dial with outer red telemetre and inner spiral tachymetre scales - from which it also derived its name.

According to Mr. Schwer, director of the firm's museum, it can be attributed to the post-WW2 series made in the late 1940s/early 1950s, featuring the in-house calibre 41 movement with flyback function, unequal distance between the chronograph pushers and the crown, fixed bars between the lugs and the three-pronged screw back, like its predecessor. The only difference between the two variants is the bezel - whereas the first examples featured a ribbed revolving bezel, the later such as this watch were fitted with a blank non-revolving version.

The "Tachytele" pilot's chronograph, using the legendary calibre 41, was introduced in 1939, the lower chronograph button coloured in red to mark the flyback function. Early examples featured a ribbed bidirectional revolving bezel with red index. The model served as inspiration for Hanhart's "Pioneer TachyTele" chronograph, launched in 2001.

We are indebted to Mr. Manfred Schwer, director of the Hanhart Museum, and Mr. Konrad Knirim, author of Military Timepieces, for their valuable help in researching the present chronograph.

A similar watch, movement no. 123'883, also with unsigned case back, is illustrated in Military Wristwatches by Michele Galizia, p. 101.



The following two watches, lots 211 and 212, are rare flyback chronographs made by Tutima, the name derived from the Latin adjective "tutus", meaning "safe" or "protected". The firm was a brand of Glashütte's Uhrenfabrik AG (UFAG) and launched the first German two pusher chronograph wristwatch with flyback function in 1941, the movements used the UROFA (Uhren-Rohwerke-Fabrik Glashütte AG) calibre 59.

At the end of 1945 production ceased when the manufacture was transferred to Moscow in order to produce chronographs for the Soviet Air Force.



The present chronograph watch is a very late Tutima version most likely assembled in Moscow after the transfer of the manufacture in 1945. The different shape of the case and the lack of the bezel suggest that it was made by the First Moscow Watch Factory where production started with existing parts from Glashütte – in this instance movement and dial. It is important to note that the bezel was in fact not missing but could not be fitted, problably as the necessary coupling part was not available at the time.

Production of the Mark XI, one of the most legendary navigator's watches, was launched in 1948. The model was always fitted with an IWC calibre 89, with or without the hacking feature, and cased in stainless steel, some early versions in chrome-plated brass.

It was issued to the British Ministry of Defence and used by the RAF as well as Commonwealth forces, including South Africa, New Zealand and Australia. The engraved numbers on the back differ depending on service. Dials and military markings also vary but those for military use show a broad arrow, some also the Ministry of Defence specification for tritium, the encircled T.

The present watch is engraved with Mark XI reference number 6B/346, the "6B" signifying "Flying", the combination of "6B/346" was the watch specification. Number 158 is the serial number and 50 the year of production.

One of the earliest interpretation of the acclaimed, and still in use today, Louis Cottier's world time system, the present watch is offered in extremely honest condition. Interestingly, this watch bears a striking resemblance with Patek Philippe's first serially produced world time wristwatch, ref. 1415. Both models share a similar case, dial and even the design of the "compass" hands

While the present watch does not feature a quick setting system for the city ring (in case of travel to another time zone), the ring can be very easily adjusted by opening the case, a simple and convenient solution to the problem.

The present watch is a superb example of one of Universal's exceedingly rare wristwatches featuring a cloisonné enamel dial, as confirmed by the Extract from the Archives. It furthermore impresses with its excellent, close to new overall condition.

In the late 1940s and early 1950s, the use of cloisonné enamel dials on wristwatches became very popular. The production of these dials was extremely costly as they had to be individually made by a skilled craftsman and not on a production line. The artist created the outline of the desired motif by arranging thin gold wires on a dial. These partitions, called "cloisonné" in French, were filled with small quantities of enamel powder in the desired colour. The dial was then fired in an oven at around 1000 degrees Celsius causing the powder to melt. Finally it was hand-polished until a perfectly flat surface was obtained.

These dials were mainly made by Carlo or Charles Poluzzi (1899-1978) one of Geneva's most renowned enamellers. Poluzzi specialized in the production of dials decorated with cloisonné enamel scenes which he supplied to important watch manufacturers such as Universal, Vacheron Constantin, Patek Philippe, Rolex and Omega.

Cloisonné enamel dial watches were and still are considered the most unusual and attractive watches ever made and thus highly looked after by collectors.

According to the Archives of *Universal* the present watch was made in 1955.

The Universal Polenrouter first came out in 1954 as Polarouter with calibre 138 featuring a bumper self-winding movement. Only one year later, Universal replaced the original movement with a radically new automatic winding system: the Microtor with its incorporated rotor mass. The first movement, such as the present watch, were signed "patent rights pending" as Universal was facing legal issues to patent the technical design. On top of that, it is essential to mention that the Polerouter was actually designed by Gerald Genta almost 2 decades before he conceived the legendary Nautilus and Royal Oak.

The present Compax chronograph is a rare example of Universal's "Climate-proof" model, as confirmed in the accompanying certificate. The "Climateproof" system was developed by Universal in the aim of creating a watch resisting to different weather conditions. The case construction consists of water-resistant-type round chronograph pusher and a metal dust cap underneath the snap on back made of a special alloy to withstand weather changes. Consigned by a private collector the watch is in extremely well preserved condition. With its large 37.5 mm. diameter and the attractive multi-scale dial, it is a very attractive, wearable and collectible example of Universal's mid-century production. Another pink gold example of the 'Climate-proof" Compax ref. 123113 model is prominently illustrated and described in *Universal* Watch Genève by Pietro Giuliano Sala, p. 278.

FERO is not the « usual » horological publication: it is not a reference manual, not a technical or photographic compendium. FERO is a different animal altogether.

It is a collection of emotions, of passion, of love toward the most technical of all the timepieces: the steel chronograph.

The "object of desire" for at least two, possibly three generations of collectors, steel chronos manage to transcend the importance of the brand and reveal themselves in their pure aesthetic and functional essence.

To the true vintage chronograph connoisseur, the high- or ultra-high-end collector, brands are of secondary importance. What truly matters is the emotions a watch conveys and, under this point of view, steel chronographs convey many unusual feelings.

Having a steel chronograph on one's wrist is an unmistakable declaration of independence. It is pure freedom interpreted as a responsibility to oneself, a statement of appreciation for what is both beautiful and at the same time utilitarian. Wearing a steel chrono manufactured between 1930 and 1950 is a time travel to an age when finishing was rare and hand-executed; when, first and foremost, dials needed to be readable, their innate beauty a consequence of this need; when movements needed to be reliable, not to be a canvas on which to show the manufacturer's proficiency for show's sake.

This is why this book is called FERO (Roman dialect for "iron"): because it tells a story of strength, independence, maybe at times even a hint of healthy arrogance. But not only this. We called it FERO, the Roman way instead of the Italian "ferro", because in Rome this word is full of suggestions and unsual sensations. In Rome a "fero" is a gun, but also many other though, uncompromising items. A fist can be "de fero", an expression can be "de fero", a motorcycle can become a "fero" if used in competitions. The emotions, sensations and feelings which we find in vintage steel chronographs are the true heart and reason behind FERO.

Let other people wear their watches. We wear our "fero".

The beauty and desirability of this early Universal Compur chronograph is simply arresting, a watch lovers' dream piece by any standards. Only in production for a very short time and with so many rare attributes the present watch is certainly one of the most stunning vintage steel Universal wristwatches ever to be offered at auction. The large 38 mm. diameter "Staybrite" steel case with concave bezel which catches the light to great effect is stamped inside with the early Universal Geneve logo - "Universal Genève" in a circle with "UW" in the center only in use until 1937. Beautifully preserved and completely original, the superb dial is not only the most desirable colour - black, but it is also a sector dial, extremely rare on any watch and the most sought after dial type. Usually featuring either a tachometer or a telemeter scale, this watch is further enhanced by the presence of both scales. However what makes this watch an even greater rarity is the unusual form of chronograph mechanism equipped with two column wheels. The mechanism can be considered a transitional system between the single-button chronograph and the fully developed two-button chronograph. Of course visually this watch appears to have a standard two-button chronograph, however, in fact the button at 2 o'clock performs the start, stop and return-to-zero functions in the same manner as a singlebutton chronograph. The button at 4 o'clock allows the chronograph hand to be stopped and restarted during operation without it having to return to zero. This is achieved by a second column wheel mounted on the frontplate beneath the dial.

The Compur model was registered on 9th June 1934 and launched the same year at the Basel Fair. It followed the first Universal chronographs starting in 1927 and helped to establish the company as being famous for their chronographs.

The presence of a Black dial with Breguet numerals on any vintage steel Patek Philippe watch is considered legendary by collectors, uniting two of the rarest and most sought-after traits to be found in any Patek Philippe model.

Black dials were almost never offered as a standard option, usually reserved only for special orders, they are consequently exceedingly rare. From our research, most of the very few known pieces with black dial and steel cases, both pocket and wristwatches, were made and sold between 1938 and 1943 – the early to middle years of World War II. This includes wristwatch references 530 and 1503 both existing with black Breguet dials on a very small number of watches. The reason for the production of this small cluster of steel watches with black dials in the late 30s and early 40s is interesting to contemplate, was it perhaps that some clients wanted to appear less ostentatious and more discreet during wartime whilst at the same time enjoying the ultimate luxury of a Patek Philippe watch? Furthermore, in relationship to the price of the watch, the difference in cost between a steel and a gold case was negligible and therefore the choice of a steel case was certainly no cost saving exercise. Whatever the reason, the legacy is a small and rarefied group of watches, including the present watch, that are amongst the most desirable of all Patek Philippe timepieces.

This watch is one of the exceedingly rare sports timing watches made by Patek Philippe. It is interesting to note that this highly exclusive niche product features the well-known 13" chronograph movement, used in all chronograph wristwatches of the period. It is also fitted with a superb and beautifully ropicalized black lacquered dial on which all scales and the signature are in "negative". In fact, whereas traditional dials have a background colour with scales and signatures printed on top, the present technique features the dial colour as a layer above the silvered background, allowing the scales to shine through. This technique of dial making must be regarded as the ultimate state of the art in postwar dial manufacturing.

The dial's design is laid out to allow best readability of the elapsed time and the indications on the subsidiary dials. While timing an event with the watch in hand, the applied silvered hour markers appear black due to a mirror effect, thus becoming invisible against the black dial. Thanks to this elaborate system, the timekeeper can fully concentrate on the scales without being influenced by the hour indication.

The pendant to six o'clock is designed for the wearing of the watch suspended from a cord around the neck, the water-resistant two-body case with screw back protects it from weather while timing outdoor events. In fact, this model here must have been the only ever made reference of a pocket watch at Patek Philippe featuring a screw back case.

Reference 840 was in production from 1951 until the late 1960s and according to research, a small series of only around 30 examples was made. This watch is believed to be one of less than 10 examples of this reference to appear in public to date and the only example known with tropicalized dial.

This extremely rare and attractive *Patek Philippe* watch, the only example of a reference 687 in steel and with Breguet numerals confirmed by the Extract to appear in public to date, combines some highly sought after features. The rare stainless steel case, the classic tachometer dial with highly desirable Breguet numerals further enhanced by vertically set subsidiary dials and the excellent overall condition.

Launched in the late 1930s, reference 687 was made in an extremely small series only, comprising 12 examples in yellow gold and 12 examples in steel. So far only two examples in steel have appeared at auction, the present watch, the only one with Breguet numerals and another with movement and case numbers 862'448/621452, made in 1940.

The reference 687 pocket chronograph shares much more in common than might be imagined with the exceptional and enormously desirable wristwatches of the same period such as the reference 130 and 1463. In fact the movement, caliber 13"130 with 23 jewels is exactly the same as that used in both those wristwatch references. The present watch would therefore make a complementary and magnificent pairing for the fortunate owner of either a steel 130 or 1463 with Breguet dial.

The first series was launched in 1938 with calibre 12"120, the second with calibre 12"400, such as the present watch, in 1950. The centre seconds version featuring a calibre 12 SCi movement started in 1939, replaced by the new calibre 27 SC as of 1949.

This watch is an incredibly appealing example of one of the extremely rare references 130 in stainless steel fitted with a superb two-tone silvered sector dial featuring a scale calibrated to 15 pulsations as opposed to the more common 30 pulse beats. The combination of the grain-finished segment for the minute and hour section contrasting with the plain centre and outer ring featuring the pulsometre scale render the watch a unique and extremely smart look.

Given the date of sale of the watch it can safely be assumed that this dial was mounted shortly after its purchase upon special request of its first owner, a theory supported by the archival information stating that it left Patek Philippe's workshops with a tachometre dial.

According to our researches it would appear that in over 40 years of international watch auctions only one other example of this reference in steel featuring a pulsation scale calibrated to 15 pulse beats has appeared in public. The superb look of the ultra-rare dial combined with the incredible quality and crispness of the steel case render this chronograph a rare find for the collector of exceptional timepieces.

Pulsometer scale

The sector dial featuring a pulsometre scale instead of the traditional tachometre, were not a customary function. They are believed to be special orders and are much rarer to find. This function which is also known as "doctor dial" was created to allow physicians to calculate a patient's pulse in far less than one minute.

Reference 130

Reference 130, one of Patek Philippe's landmark models, was launched in 1934 and remained in production until the 1960s. Distinguished by its timeless "Calatrava" design, the model was available in different precious metals as well as in stainless steel.

It is interesting to note that the lugs of the stainless steel version are different from the yellow, pink or white gold ones. Their slightly thicker but shorter design gives the watch a rather tonneau-shaped design and a more sportive, robust and masculine look.

Truly a fresh to market horological treasure for the most discerning collector, this superb example of the reference 2508 is the sixteenth example to appear on the market and is offered in superlative condition with an early *Gay Frères* expandable bracelet. The dial, made by *Stern Frères* retains the original aesthetic from the day the watch first left *Patek Philippe's* workshops demonstrated by the rich, hard enamel and pronounced definition of all letters and accents in the signature and minute track. The dial itself retains a beautiful sheen without a solitary blemish to be seen, the faceted dart and square indexes catching the light as it plays across the surface. The overall appeal is further enhanced by the Gay Frères expandable bracelet. Possibly the most renowned and appreciated Genevois jeweler from the mid-20th century, Gay Frères watch bracelets are much appreciated and considered highly collectible items themselves.

Considered by many to be among the pinnacles of Patek Philippe's mid-20th century design, the reference 2508 distinguishes itself from its "time-only" brethren with a uniquely balanced case design. The 2508 was Patek Philippe's first foray into waterproof case designs for non-complicated wristwatches. Previously, the only waterproof wristwatch was the reference 1463 chronograph, from which the 2508 would borrow the entirety of its form. The downturned lugs, perfectly proportioned dial, and screw-back case profile produce a masculine and most pleasing wrist presence not found in other Calatravas. It is calculated that less than 10 percent of the total production was fitted into a steel case. The 2508 could be considered a successor to the legendary reference 570, though with a "sportier" feel, and forerunner to "Amagnetic" references due to its "double case-back" design. Inside the 2508 beats the 27SC, covered by a metal dust cap to keep moisture and magnetism at bay - a trait found predominantly in "tool" watches, making this reference a unique offering in Patek Philippe's lineage.

The present reference 1463 is a superb example of Patek Philippe's only vintage chronograph watch with screw back case and round pushers. Introduced in 1940, the model is unquestionably one of the renowned manufacturer's most iconic and popular sports watches. Over the years, its case has seen a number of improvements and changes.

Made in 1958, the "tasti tondi" (Italian for round pushers, as the model is affectionately called by collectors) offered here for sale is from the "second" series, made from the mid-1940s until around 1961. It is distinguished by the larger winding crown, more substantial lugs with curled ends and a more angular, stepped bezel design, as opposed to the rounded bezel and straighter lugs of the earlier generation.

Preserved in superb condition, highlighted by the beautifully raised hard enamel signature and scales and the attractive pearlescent patina, the dial is in perfect harmony with the crisp case. Free from any careless polishing it impresses with its full, sharp-edged proportions and an impeccable satin-finish.

The overall appeal of this beautiful timepiece is further enhanced by two extremely rare features, the signature of the prestigious Swiss watch and jewellery retailer Gübelin and the stainless steel Gübelin bracelet made by the renowned Gay Frères in Geneva, another rarity by itself.

Moreover believed to be one of only three examples of a reference 1463 in steel retailed by Gübelin to appear in public to date, however the only one with this particular dial layout and short signature, the present watch is doubtlessly one of the most attractive examples of this landmark model to appear in public in recent years.

Dating from 1950, the present watch with serial number 690'034 is one of the earliest examples to be offered at auction and according to research, excluding examples where the serial number is unknown, only two other star dial 6062's are known publically with serial numbers below 700'000, no. 690'028 and no. 690'047. The majority of recorded examples have serial numbers in the upper 700'000s up to the late 900'000s. The reference 6062 was in production for only three years at the beginning of the 1950s and is one of only two models ever to have a full triple calendar and moon phase indication. Together with the non-Oyster reference 8171, the 6062 combines the most desirable features together in one superb classic watch. Reference 6062 was available in yellow gold, pink gold and stainless steel, it is nicknamed "stelline" by collectors due to the eight five-pointed star hour markers.

The present Day-Date is a particularly rare example of the celebrated model, distinguished by the German printing "Superlativer Chronometer amtlich geprüft" instead of the "Superlative Chronometer Officially Certified" generally found on Rolex's COSC watches. Evidently made for the German market

the day indication is also in German and so is the wealth of documents accompanying the watch, in addition to the watch rating certificate, a rarity by itself.

Another noteworty detail is the original Rolex Uhren Köln "Echtheits-Bestätigung", confirmation of authenticity, dated 16 December 1999, stating that in the context of the servicing of the watch the firm confirms that it is an "Original-ROLEX-Uhr", original Rolex watch, with "Original-ROLEX-Zifferblatt", original Rolex dial.

The watch was serviced by Rolex in 1999 and 2001 and is preserved in excellent overall condition. The oxidation on the case is testimony to the fact that the watch has been unused and unpolished for a long time, the full proportions and crisp gold mark underneath the upper right lug further confirming this fact. The ivory-coloured dial displays a great shine, further enhancing the overall look of this rare timepiece.



The present "Double Red" Sea Dweller is distinguished by the unique serial number of the prestigious Buenos Aires jeweller Ricciardi stamped underneath its lower right lug. In 1969, Ricciardi had opened stores in Buenos Aires, Mar del Plata, and Paris. Ricciardi, a company so proud of its name they engraved their own serial number underneath the lugs, branded by a complex punching process. It represents a true mark of originality, whilst also a prestigious and successful customization system. "Joyeria Ricciardi" enjoyed remarkable success and became the benchmark of excellence for the Argentinian aristocracy, the international jet set and eventually that of crowned rovals.

The present watch is an example of the "Mark III" series of the Double Red Sea-Dweller dial, in production between around 1970 to 1973. A cornerstone of a serious *Rolex* collection, reference 6265 is distinguished by its metal bezel with tachymeter scale, screw down chronograph buttons and caliber 727 movement. The present example is the most lavish iteration of this model: in 18K gold with champagne dial and gold bracelet. The bracelet itself is the rare version with riveted links and endlinks stamped *71*, considered by the *Rolex* collecting community a collectible on its own. The alternation between the central polished link and outer brushed links adds flair and movement to the ensemble.

The layer of oxidation noticeable between the chronograph pushers and crown is the telltale mark of a watch which spent most of its life in a safety deposit box. Another testament to the care the present timepiece has seen throughout its life is the presence and crispness of all the three stamps under the lugs. As it often happens with Rolex, the case back bears a different reference number than the case: 6263. This is because the specifications of the case back for the two references are exactly the same, and thus the company was inclined to mount whatever case back was available during final assembly. The stamp *CRS* stands for the case maker Charles-René Spielmann. Manually wound Daytonas were discontinued in favor of the automatic versions in 1987.

This lot represents a rare opportunity to acquire a most appealing and exclusive manual gold Daytona.





Introduced into the market in 1952, reference 2526 was Patek Philippe's first self-winding or automatic watch ever made. The model features the legendary calibre 12-600 AT which was granted Swiss patent No. 289758 in 1953 for "a self-winding mechanism for a wristwatch movement using the energy supplied by a rotary mass causing an eccentric part to transmit a swinging movement to an organ of the mechanism". The first 500 examples of reference 2526, such as the present watch, were fitted with the earliest version of calibre 12"600 without ball bearing, rendering these watches particularly rare and collectable.

The dials for reference 2526 went through a simplification process over the years. At the very beginning, we find enamel dials with flared holes for the numerals, like the one mounted on the present timepiece. Such construction methodology is enormously complex, requiring 26 holes for the numerals (2 holes for each numeral, 4 holes for the double numeral at 12), plus two holes for the hands and subsidiary seconds. Given the highly complicated construction methodology, soon a new series was launched: the dial is still enamel, but with only two flared holes for the hands and the subsidiary seconds. The present timepiece is offered by its original owner in absolutely stunning condition. A proper example of new old stock watch, it comes of course with its full sale kit. A further layer of appeal is granted by the prestigious Orologeria Pisa signature on the Certificate, one of the most prominent Italian watch retailers. Patek Philippe themselves celebrated their collaboration with this revered house in 2007, with a special edition of the Calatrava reference 5296.

The third iteration of the celebrated perpetual chronograph line of timepieces by Patek Philippe, reference 3970 is the heir to legendary 2499, with which it shares the unmistakable case construction characterized by the sculpted lugs. It is however one millimeter smaller than its predecessor: its 36 mm. diameter places it in between reference 1518 (35 mm.) and indeed reference 2499 (37 mm.).

With reference 3970, the dial acquires to new indications: the 24 hours indication and the leap year indication. It is remarkable how these additions do not encumber the dial design: they are ingeniously placed inside the subsidiary dials at 6 and 9, thus keeping the overall look and feel of the dial very similar to that of reference 2499. If anything, they render the two subsidiary counters more balanced thanks to the small designations at 3, 6, 9 and 12.

Beyond being aesthetically pleasing, the new indicators are extremely practical: the 24 hours indication allows the wearer to avoid setting the calendar when the time is around midnight and the calendar gear train is working, which would damage the movement. The leap year indicator is invaluable when setting the perpetual calendar: with earlier models one had to manually proceed to February 28, and then pay attention if the next day would be February 29, in which case he or she would obviously know it is a leap year, or March 1st, in which case it could be any of the non-leap years. Another practical addition is the push-piece for setting the month, while previously one could only proceed one day at a time.

The Turn-O-Graph was presented at the Basel Fair in 1953, the year of production of the present watch. The model was always fitted with a rotating bezel with five minute divisions, referred to as a "time-recording-rim" by Rolex. The Turn-O-Graph was available with a black dial, the 'De Luxe Model' featured a "magnificent white 'honey-comb' dial". It was predominantly cased in stainless steel but existed also in a steel and gold version.

Despite its brilliant concept, the model was at the time not as successful as expected by Rolex, mainly due to the simultaneous in-house competition from the Submariner and the GMT-Master, but enjoys today great popularity amongst collectors.

The present watch is a rare representative of famed reference 5512, featuring not only the coveted pointed crown guards, but also a black lacquer "exclamation" dial with gold printing. These types of dial are very hard to come by and garner immediate attention from Rolex aficionados. Characterized by an additional luminous dot positioned underneath the 6 o'clock hour marker, the exclamation dial is highly coveted.

Exclamation dials were used by Rolex as a means to indicate that the radium used on the dial to make it luminous was within the norm approved by the Atomic Energy Commission in the U.S. These types of dials are found only on models from the late 1950s to early 1960s. The radioactive radium used on luminous watch dials in the first part of the 20th century was replaced in the middle of the century by less harmful tritium.

Both reference 5512 and reference 5513 come with two different types of protective crown guards: pointed ones or rounded ones. Examples with pointed crown guards are fewer and thus more attractive to collectors. Lovingly referred to as "cornino" by Italian watch enthusiasts, the ends of these crown guards are much thinner, almost tapering to a point, compared with the more rounded crown guards of later standard Rolex production.

Reference 5512 was introduced in 1959 and stayed in production until the late 1970s. Pointed crown guards can only be found in the first few years of production. The watch on offer dating from 1962 is, therefore, one of the last to feature them.

Reference 7928, the second series of Tudor's Submariner model, was launched in 1959 until 1967. Some rare example featuring military issue numbers such as the present watch, were most likely made for the Argentinia "Commando de la Infanteria de Marina".

The Reference 7928 used the celebrated "Auto-Prince" calibre 390, a FEF (Fabrique d'Ebauches de Fleurier) based 17 jewel movement. It was available with different types of crown guards. The dials always featured the Tudor rose symbol followed by "Oyster Prince" to the upper half, the lower half generally the depth rating 200m=660ft, Submariner, Rotor, Self-Winding on four lines.

The brand Tudor was introduced by Rolex around 1945 with the aim of supplying high quality watches at affordable prices. Although Rolex never advertised their connection to Tudor, they however supplied, amongst other parts, the Oyster cases. The symbol of the brand was the Tudor rose until around 1960 when it was replaced by the shield which is still in use to date. The line of models comprised also Submariner and Cosmograph watches considered as reliable and durable as their "big sisters". With their varied and colourful "exotic" dials, these watches have become extremely popular amongst collectors.

The present watch is one of the very first Daytona wristwatches ever made, as denoted by its 923'xxx serial number, considered the lowest one can find on this model. Furthermore, scholars agree that the first few batches of Daytona chronographs made in 1963 were sold in the USA, and only from 1964 Rolex started its commercialization in Europe.

The very first Daytonas were fitted with dials and case backs originally produced for the previous Rolex chronograph, reference 6238, the pre-Daytona: the dials were only marked "Swiss" below 6 o'clock, the case backs stamped 6238 to the inside. The movements used were calibre 72B, those on watches destined for the US market stamped "ROW".

The present reference 6239 is an interesting "hybrid" of this very early model. Sold in Barcelona in 1967, as documented both by the Union Suiza original guarantee and invoice, it features the "T-Swiss-T" dials found on later series of reference 6239, matching its year of sale. The movement is the correct calibre 72B, however without the mention "ROW". The case back is the early version stamped 6238.

The reason for above is left to speculation but in any case, this reference 6239 might be the only documented 923xxx serial Daytona sold outside of the USA.

The watch was purchased by the uncle of the present owner at Barcelona's prestigious retailer Union Suiza in 1967 and has remained in the same family ever since, the original documents, the second dial, hands and box preciously kept, adding to its desirability. It is furthermore preserved in very good original overall condition, a fine trophy for the collector of rare timepieces.

To the best of our knowledge the present watch has never before been offered in public.

The Explorer II was launched in 1971 with reference 1655 as an alternative to the Explorer. It is marketed toward professionals, and the 24 hour hand was originally not meant to indicate a second time zone, but rather truly the nocturnal/diurnal cycle, a function useful for professionals such as speleologists, who could spend days underground, oblivious to the sun presence in the sky. In 1985 reference 16550 was launched – with completely updated looks and movement (now allowing for independent regulation of the hour hand, thus allowing it to be used as a dual time wristwatch), and in 1988 reference 15570.

Soon, it became apparent that some dial variations are rarer than others, and as a matter of fact this lot represents a compendium of the rare traits one can find on an Explorer II, making this the hardest-to-find dial variation for the entire Explorer II line. It features three rare details:

Rail dial: characterized by the vertical alignment of the two spaces in the lines of the COSC certification

Black rimmed numerals: this finish can be found only on the earliest versions of 16570

Cream dial: a kind of tropicalization. Certain batches of the paint used for the white finish turned out to be defective and shift toward a warm cream/ivory hue

A rail dial with black rimmed indexes is already considered by Rolex purists a highly rare wristwatch – so far only a handful are known, with serial numbers ranging from R to N - but finding such a combination with the addition of the cream color is truly momentous.

Considered that, on top of the impossibly rare dial variation, the present watch comes with the original Guarantee and in extremely well preserved condition, it can without a doubt be counted among the most attractive and collectible 16570s to ever appear on the market.







The blue "Command Bezel," as named by Rolex, can be turned to set the countdown timer and the re-set button allows the seconds hand to fly back to zero and the minute hand to fly to the nearest minute, allowing for incredible precision.

With a strong nautical feel, the present watch stands out because of its bright blue bezel, red countdown hand and large white dial. Furthermore, this special limited edition timepiece celebrates 100 years of The Panama Canal, a 77 kilometer ship canal which connects the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, first used in 1914.

The Rolex Centregraph, together with its sister model Zerograph, is believed to be the very first "Oyster" chronograph wristwatch. Its standard 10 ½ lines movement was upgraded with a return-to-zero or fly-back mechanism. The timing of a single event was possible by rotating the bezel to match the minute hand and returning the seconds hand to zero by means of the pusher. The elapsed time could then be measured on the bezel.

Sold to the Canadian market, the Centregraph model is believed to have been supplied to Canadian soldiers departing for active service in Europe during WWII. The inside case back of the present watch is stamped with a parachute and the letters RM, probably relating to the Royal Marines.

To the best of our knowledge, no more than 50 examples of the Centregraph were produced, and available exclusively in stainless steel.

The breveted calibre 12.68 Z stop second features the flyback system which works as a reset function without the need to first stop the chronograph. The central minute register is replacing the usual small subsidiary chronograph counter, the red hand lighting up the dial by its bright and flamboyant colour.

The combination of the unusual and legendary calibre 12.68 Z stop second movement, the exceptionally beautiful original black dial and the excellent overall condition of the case render this watch an exceedingly rare trophy.

According to the Archives of *Montres Breguet*, the present watch was sold on 2 May 1957 to the Centre d'Essais en Vol (CEV), Brétigny, France, for the sum of 28,500 French Francs.

In the 1950s and 1960s several manufacturers supplied chronograph wristwatches to the French armed forces, originally designated "Type 20". One of the requirements of the French Defence Ministry was the "retour en vol" or "flyback" function, allowing to instantly stop, reset and restart the chronograph function with a single press of the lower button. The other basic mechanical specifications for the Type 20 included an accuracy to within 8 seconds per day, a power reserve of at least 35 hours and the aptitude to handle the start-stop-reset operation 300 times without any problems.

Breguet's Type 20 is the most renowned and most desirable of these French military chronographs. It was produced in small quantities until it obtained the official approval of the French services in 1950. As of 1954, the French government commissioned Breguet with the supply of the Type 20 to the Air Force, the Naval Aviation Forces and to the CEV, such as the present watch.

Around 2000, the owner of the present watch, founder of an important shipping company, approached Patek Philippe in Geneva with a very special request: he asked for a hunter case dress watch depicting the painting of one of his vessels to the front and engraved nautical symbols on the reverse. After some correspondence Mr. Philippe Stern granted the request, the image of the vessel was sent to the manufacture and production started.

The enamel miniature of the "bateau commercial", after a painting by Diedrich A. Kniffka, was commissioned to one of the firm's longstanding and talented enamellists, J.L. Péter, who signed and dated the work once finished in 2003. An especially decorated back cover chased with nautical symbols completed the watch and it was collected by the proud new owner at Patek Philippe's German retailer G.D. Wempe on 31 August 2003.

This superb and extremely rare example of a Patek Philippe's dress watch made to special order, embellished with an enamel miniature painting, a small work of art in its own rights, is now consigned for auction by his wife.

40 YEARS OF THE PATEK PHILIPPE NAUTILUS: **1976–2016**

Forty years ago Patek Philippe launched a steel sports wristwatch that was to become pivotal to the company's ongoing image and success. The Nautilus is now one of the most desired and sought-after collectors watches and Christie's is very pleased to celebrate this important milestone in the history of an undisputed legend by offering a selection of 40 examples of the Nautilus over four auctions in four international locations.

In a world where large steel sports watches are commonplace it is hard for us today to comprehend quite how groundbreaking and startlingly different the Nautilus 3700/1 was launched at the Basel Fair on 3rd March 1976. The use of stainless steel as the prime metal for most of the production of the reference was then very daring, as was the sleek, unusually large 42 millimeter case which quickly gained the nickname "Jumbo". Water resistant to 120 meters it given the reference 3700/1 and christened "Nautilus" in honour of Captain Nemo's submersible craft from Jules Verne's novel Twenty Thousand Leagues under the Sea. In advertising literature of the time the new model was billed "one of the world's costliest watches is made of steel", a radical statement that questioned the very nature of what constituted the value of a watch, no longer did it have to be made of precious metal, its value could be judged by other factors such as workmanship, style, fitness for purpose and brand association.

The Nautilus was designed by perhaps the greatest wristwatch designer of the 20th century - Gérald Genta. Very few designers in any field are fortunate enough to create an enduring global product even once in their careers that captures not only the zeitgeist of its own time but perpetuates through the decades almost unchanged, transcending the passage of time and the vagaries of fashion. However, Genta, who in a career spanning more than 50 years designed among his many credits, not one, but two watches that can be said without exaggeration to have changed the world of wristwatches forever. Designs with a clarity of form and function so breathtakingly bold and deceptively simple that they became enduring successes, paving the way for sports watch design as we know it today. Indeed, both the Nautilus and the equally iconic Audemars Piguet Royal Oak designed in 1970 embody so intrinsically the DNA of their respective manufacturers that they continue to be instantly recognizable even to the layman. Stemming from a single moment of inspired genius by Gérald Genta, the original design of Patek Philippe's Nautilus was notable for its immediacy. In 1974, galvanized by the eventual success of Audemars Piguet's Royal Oak, Patek Philippe had decided to develop a new and very exclusive sports watch in an attempt to revitalize the brand and compete

with both AP and to a lesser extent Rolex who had always dominated the tool watch market. Whilst attending the Basel watch fair of that year Gérald Genta was sitting alone in the restaurant of a hotel at the same time as a group of people from Patek Philippe were also dining. Later Gérald recalled that he asked the waiter to "bring me a piece of paper and a pencil, I want to design something" he designed the Nautilus there and then in almost its final form, the sketch was completed in five minutes. The design was in fact based on the shape of a porthole of a transatlantic liner with wide bezel and "ears" at each side evoking the large hinges of those watertight windows. The new form of case led Patek Philippe to patent their ingenious new system of water-resistance whereby the more external pressure is exerted on the case the more watertight it becomes. The patent was submitted on 23rd April 1976 under the name of Philipp Stern, Genève. Patek Philippe's Nautilus is imbued with practicality, luxury, ruggedness, elegance, technical know-how but above all that indefinable quality - style. Subtle updating over the years and new models added to the range ensure that the Nautilus remains as fresh and contemporary today as it was forty years ago.

CHARLES GÉRALD GENTA (1931-2011)

Gérald Genta will be forever remembered as the greatest wristwatch designer, the face, often hidden, behind some of the world's most iconic wristwatches. His influence in watch design can be felt far and wide even today. Genta was born in Geneva and at the age of 20 gained a Swiss federal diploma in jewellery and goldsmithing.

He was initially recruited by Universal, Gèneve, who in the 1950s were one of the most recognized Swiss watch manufacturers. During his time with Universal he designed the famous Polerouter microtors and then in the mid-1960s the "Golden Shadow" and "White Shadow" models.

His successful collaboration with several of the leading manufacturers in Switzerland and Europe means that the name of Gérald Genta is closely associated with a roll-call of brand leading wristwatches:

Omega Constellation (1959)

Patek Philippe Golden Ellipse (1968)

Audemars Piguet Royal Oak (1970)

IWC Ingenieur (1976)

Patek Philippe Nautilus (1976)

Cartier Pasha de Cartier (1985)





As an extremely accomplished and innovative watchmaker as well as an artist, Gérald Genta created a brand under his own name in 1969. Needless to say, his collections included some extraordinary and complicated watches such as the Octo Granda Sonnerie Tourbillion, which incorporated four gongs and played Westminster Quarters, it was priced at \$810,200. In 1994, he designed the Grande Sonnerie Retro, then world's most complicated wristwatch priced at approximately \$2 million dollars. He also specialized in bespoke commissions of unique pieces, some taking up to 5 years to complete. During the 1980s and after obtaining special licensing Genta produced his now famous range of Disney character watches featuring Mickey and Minnie mouse, Donald Duck, Scrooge McDuck and Goofy. Originally developed for one of his special clients the range became one of the company's best sellers of the 80s.

Once called "the Fabergé of watches", Gerald Genta's clients included movie stars, politicians and royalty, including Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother, Prince Rainier of Monaco, King Juan Carlos and Queen Sophia of Spain, King Fahd of Saudi Arabia and King Hassan of Morocco.

The present watch, never offered in public before, is a superb early and exceptional example of the classic reference 3700/1 "Jumbo" from the 1970s. The case patent design of original *Nautilus*, reference 3700/1 was registered on 23rd April 1976. Made for Patek Philippe by Favre-Perret SA, Le Crét du Locle, from 1976 until 1981 when production was transferred to Patek's own Ateliers Reunis workshops. It comprises two parts, the main body and the bezel, at each side is an "ear" which couples with a corresponding flange, the two parts are secured by lateral screws. A rubber seal sits between the bezel and case body and is thus compressed when subject to water pressure forming a perfect watertight seal. The last three digits of the case number are always stamped on the inside of the bezel. The reference 3700/1 was made in stainless steel, steel and gold, 18K yellow gold, 18K white gold and platinum.



The wonderful tropical dial of the present watch has aged so uniformly that it now has a most beautiful and subtle "cosmic" appearance. Furthermore, it features the Gübelin signature, of which only a total of five examples are known. This extraordinarily fortuitous combination elevates it to a much higher level, as such it could be considered to be a unique version of the iconic ref. 3700/1 "Jumbo" and a must-have for the serious Nautilus collector. The outstanding condition of the present lot is very rare to find in public auction.

Gübelin was founded in 1854 and has always been a family enterprise. Located in Lucerne, Switzerland, the renowned company has designed and retailed superior quality watches and clocks ever since. Today, Gübelin has branches throughout Europe.

The Dials of Nautilus reference 3700/1

Created by Stern Frères, the distinctive striped dials of the *Nautilus* were entirely hand-made – each line recess is engraved separately. To achieve the aptly named "gray depth of ocean" colour specified by Patek Philippe the dials were painted alternately black and blue several times and then covered with a protective "Zapon" varnish. Early examples often display a degradation of the varnish so that depending on how a watch has been stored over the years, an individual dial may have tropicalized more towards either blue, gray, chestnut or green.

The indexes and hands are made of gold (sometimes erroneously called "steel" on some Extracts from the archives) and filled with luminescent material. The Patek Philippe signature and the outer minute divisions were painted. The very first watches of reference 3700/1 starting in 1976 and up until approximately movement number 1303999 had a minute track with lines, not the more familiar dots. Below the 6 oʻclock index is the word "Swiss" flanked on each side by the "Aprior" mark of two sigma symbols. The Aprior mark was conferred by the "Association pour la Promotion Industrielle de l'Or" on dials made of solid gold or at least with solid gold indexes.

To the best of our knowledge, the present watch has never before been offered in public. Furthermore this is only the second time that a reference 3700/1 in yellow gold featuring the crest of Oman has been offered at auction. The other known example with movement no. 1'305'066 (seven numbers after the present watch), case no. 537'352 (four numbers after the present watch), was sold by Christie's Geneva, on 11th November 2013, lot 149. Significantly and importantly both known watches were sold on the same day, 27th September 1978, thus confirming their presence in the same batch of watches sold to the Sultan.

The present Patek Philippe reference 3700/1 is not only amongst the rarest and most exclusive examples of a gold Nautilus ever offered at auction but is one of the scarcest of all Khanjar watches in existence. As scholarship and the appeal of collecting these ultra-exclusive watches continues to increase, the greatest rarities amongst them particularly from the 1970s era such as the present watch become ever more desirable. This solid gold Nautilus "Jumbo" is in an excellent state of preservation overall with original "Swiss sigma" dial exhibiting the first signs of mellow tropicalization found on some early and untouched Nautilus dials.

His Majesty Sultan Qaboos bin Said al Said

When Qaboos acceded to the throne on 23 July 1970 he declared that the country would no longer be known as Muscat and Oman, but would change its name to "the Sultanate of Oman". The aim of which was to show political unity and use the country's oil revenue for modernization. There were few signs of the modern world when Qaboos took power and established an absolute monarchy, this means that all power is concentrated in the Sultan whose authority is unquestioned and who governs the country at every level of government.

Stability came to Oman only after the end of the Dhofar rebellion in 1976 with the help of Iranian, Jordanian and British forces. It was during this period that Sultan Qaboos was ordering watches from Patek Philippe, Rolex and Audemars Piguet via Asprey in London who, having direct access to him, coordinated the commissions and supplied the final purchases. Naturally these special watches were personalized with Oman's "Khanjar" emblem making them very special and highly prized gifts for those lucky enough to receive them.

Preserved in extremely good original condition with beautiful black sigma dial this rare example of the steel and gold 3700/1 "Jumbo" is further enhanced by the presence of the original iconic *Nautilus* cork box and original certificate of origin.

The steel and gold version of the *Nautilus* "Jumbo" is a rare and collectible watch, only approximately 600 examples were made with the larger size bracelet.

Patek Philippe automatic movement caliber 28-255

Another of the many attractions of the *Nautilus* Ref. 3700/1 for the watch aficionado is that from the very beginning it was fitted with what is generally agreed to be one of the great watch calibers – the 28-255. Based on the original Jaeger-LeCoultre caliber 920 of 1967 it is regarded as one of the most beautiful and refined automatic movements ever produced, crucially it is also very thin at only 3.15 mm., therefore highly appropriate for the slim and elegant *Nautilus*. The development of the caliber 920 was partly jointly financed by Patek Philippe, Audemars Piguet and Vacheron Constantin. Audemars Piguet fitted their version, now the revered caliber 2120 into the *Royal Oak*, a further shared familial link with the *Nautilus*. Vacheron Constantin's version became their caliber 1120.

The caliber is 12.5 lignes and has 36 jewels and 19,800 vibrations. It is supplied with the shock-protected free-sprung Gyromax balance with eight rotatable weights allowing rate adjustment without the need for a conventional regulator index. The winding rotor is formed from a beryllium ring with 21K gold rim, this clever design with four additional ruby rollers to support the rotor around its periphery allows the thinness of the movement to remain uncompromised.

In 1981 to coincide with the launch of a new *Nautilus* reference, the mid-size 3800/1A, Patek Philippe introduced its own new slim automatic caliber, the 335 SC with centre seconds feature.

The discovery of this stellar watch in 2015 has rewritten the previously accepted scholarship on the "über-rare" platinum version of the Nautilus. Only one other platinum Nautilus is known publically, reference 3700/1P, with diamond-set dial.

The Nautilus is possibly the most recognizable wristwatch made by Patek Philippe. Designed by Gérald Genta and inspired by the shape of a ship's portholes, it was available as of 1976. With its generous proportions, unusual case design striking the perfect balance between sporting, elegant and understated, and the very robust construction, the first foray of Patek Philippe into the world of sports watches quickly became a worldwide commercial success, and marked the beginning of the Nautilus legend.

The first incarnation of this landmark model is the legendary reference 3700. Scholars agree that normal production included versions in steel, steel and gold, yellow gold and a very limited production in white gold - with or without diamonds. In May 2013, Christie's sold the previously unknown reference 3700/1 (case number 552'214) in platinum for the impressive amount of 783'000 CHF. The discovery of that piece made the collectors' community wonder if Patek Philippe had produced a second platinum example, but no one ever dared to dream of a jewelled version of the timepiece: it would have been an impossible wish.

Luckily, in this case reality surpasses fiction: the second platinum Nautilus here for sale is not a standard reference 3700/1, but rather a 3700/031: indeed part of the echelon of jewelled timepieces, the most exclusive and rarified of Patek Philippe's productions. Most likely a special order, it is highly probable that no other watch left Patek Philippe with this same configuration, or even with the same reference. Adding to the overall appeal of the piece, and a testament to the highest standards this watch was manufactured under, the bracelet is made by legendary jeweller Gay Frères, as denoted by the stamping of their trademark on the clasp.

Following the discovery of this timepiece, in-depth research was conducted and it was discovered that, overall, Patek Philippe produced four 3700 watches cased in platinum. Most probably, the cases were all part of a single order commissioned between 1980 and 1981 to Neuchâtel-based case maker Favre-Perret (hallmark 115, inscribed into a hammer as it always is for the Canton of Neuchâtel), the elected case maker for the Nautilus since the inception of the model and until around 1981. Consequently, this order is one of the last batches of Nautilus cases made outside of Patek Philippe manufacture, as the company began production of these cases in their Ateliers Réunis workshop in 1981. It is highly probable that each one of these four watches was a special


order, finished on-demand and reserved for extremely special clients, a theory supported by the fact that seven years passed between the case order and the sale of the watch, in this instance. It is of course unknown how the remaining two unknown watches were finished, but it is a reasonable assumption that all platinum 3700 were finished differently according to the different clients' requests.

As incredible as it may sound, the historical importance of the first haute joaillerie platinum 3700 is matched by its condition. Never restored, most probably never polished, and worn a handful of times at most, the proportions and finish of this majestic timepiece shine in all their glory. The subtle beveling of the lugs, so often lost with the first polishing, is crisp and defined; the satin finish is untouched; the case back without the smallest mark. The watch presents only extremely minor surface markings noticeable on the polished details of bezel and bracelet after careful examination.

If historical importance and condition are not enough, even the most spoiled collector will be rendered speechless by the presence not only of the original Certificate d'Origine and box, but also of the original invoice issued by the Salon Patek Philippe in Geneve on 24 August 1988.



The additional very rare diamond-set dial with Gübelin signature could be fitted as an alternative if desired. According to the present owner, an esteemed client of Gübelin, the diamond-set dial was fitted at his request shortly after he bought the watch from the Basel store in 1982, the original certificate of origin being rubber-stamped by them at that time. Gübelin who are one of Patek Philippe's longest standing and respected agents had the dial co-signed for this important commission and thus created a great rarity.


The yellow gold Nautilus, reference 3700/011 was made in only small numbers and has naturally become one of the most sought after of the "Jumbo" watches. The new reference was introduced around 1981 when Patek started to make the cases for the Nautilus in their Ateliers Réunis workshops. With the launch of the reference 3700/011 a narrower "second generation" bracelet with a width of 14 mm. was introduced. It had 16 fixed links and 8 removable links. According to our research, a total of approximately 1'500 reference 3700 were produced in yellow gold between 1976 and 1998 which is less than 70 pieces per year.

Making its debut in 2006, the Patek Philippe Nautilus reference 5980 was introduced on the occasion of the Basel Fair during the 30th anniversary of the iconic reference 3700/1 designed by Gerald Genta. As a vital complication of a sports watch, the reference is equipped with a chronograph function and the renowned "bull's eye" subsidiary dial. First seen on reference 5960, this design has captivated the heart of collectors by showcasing the hours in the inner part of the dial and minutes on the outer ring. Reference 5980 is fitted with *Patek Philippe*'s entirely in-house made chronograph calibre 28-520 C.

The calibre 28-520 C was originally created for the reference 5960, Patek Philippe's first self-winding chronograph with annual calendar, it was later adjusted to the reference 5980 without the date display.

According to our research, out of the approximately 4'000 steel pieces produced by Patek Philippe, only 50 watches are known from public auctions today.

CONDITIONS OF SALE · BUYING AT CHRISTIE'S

CONDITIONS OF SALE

These Conditions of Sale and the Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice set out the terms on which we offer the <code>lots</code> listed in this catalogue for sale. By registering to bid and/or by bidding at auction you agree to these terms, so you should read them carefully before doing so. You will find a glossary at the end explaining the meaning of the words and expressions coloured in bold.

Unless we own a lot (Δ symbol), Christie's acts as agent for the seller.

A BEFORE THE SALE 1 DESCRIPTION OF LOTS

(a) Certain words used in the **catalogue description** have special meanings. You can find details of these on the page headed "Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice" which forms part of these terms. You can find a key to the Symbols found next to certain catalogue entries under the section of the catalogue called "Symbols Used in this Catalogue"."

(b) Our description of any lot in the catalogue, any condition report and any other statement made by us (whether orally or in writing) about any lot, including about its nature or condition, artist, period, materials, approximate dimensions or provenance are our opinion and not to be relied upon as a statement of fact. We do not carry out in-depth research of the sort carried out by professional historians and scholars. All dimensions and weights are approximate only.

2 OUR RESPONSIBILITY FOR OUR DESCRIPTION OF LOTS

We do not provide any guarantee in relation to the nature of a **lot** apart from our authenticity **warranty** contained in paragraph E2 and to the extent provided in paragraph I below.

3 CONDITION

(a) The **condition** of **lots** sold in our auctions can vary widely due to factors such as age, previous damage, restoration, repair and wear and tear. Their nature means that they will rarely be in perfect **condition**. **Lots** are sold "as is," in the **condition** they are in at the time of the sale, without any representation or **warranty** or assumption of liability of any kind as to **condition** by Christie's or by the seller.

(b) Any reference to condition in a catalogue entry or in a condition report will not amount to a full description of condition, and images may not show a lot clearly. Colours and shades may look different in print or on screen to how they look on physical inspection. Condition reports may be available to help you evaluate the condition of a lot. Condition reports are provided free of charge as a convenience to our buyers and are for guidance only. They offer our opinion but they may not refer to all faults, inherent defects, restoration, alteration or adaptation because our staff are not professional restorers or conservators. For that reason they are not an alternative to examining a lot in person or taking your own professional advice. It is your responsibility to ensure that you have requested, received and considered any condition report.

4 VIEWING LOTS PRE-AUCTION

(a) If you are planning to bid on a **lot**, you should inspect it personally or through a knowledgeable representative before you make a bid to make sure that you accept the description and its **condition**. We recommend you get your own advice from a restorer or other professional adviser.

(b) Pre-auction viewings are open to the public free of charge. Our specialists may be available to answer questions at pre-auction viewings or by appointment.

5 ESTIMATES

Estimates are based on the condition, rarity, quality and provenance of the lots and on prices recently paid at auction for similar property. Estimates can change. Neither you, nor anyone else, may rely on any estimates as a prediction or guarantee of the actual selling price of a lot or its value for any other purpose. Estimates do not include the buyer's premium or any applicable taxes.

6 WITHDRAWAL

Christie's may, at its option, withdraw any **lot** at any time prior to or during the sale of the **lot**. Christie's has no liability to you for any decision to withdraw.

7 JEWELLERY

(a) Coloured gemstones (such as rubies, sapphires and emeralds) may have been treated to improve their look, through methods such as heating and oiling. These methods are accepted by the international jewellery trade but may make the genstone less strong and/or require special care over time.

(b) All types of gemstones may have been improved by some method. You may request a gemmological report for any item which does not have a report if the request is made to us at least three weeks before the date of the auction and you pay the fee for the report.

(c) We do not obtain a gemmological report for every gemstone sold in our auctions. Where we do get gemmological reports from internationally accepted gemmological laboratories, such reports will be described in the catalogue. Reports from American gemmological laboratories will describe any improvement or treatment to the gemstone. Reports from European gemmological laboratories will describe any improvement or treatment only if we request that they do so, but will confirm when no improvement or treatment has been made. Because of differences in approach and technology, laboratories may not agree whether a particular gemstone has been treated, the amount of treatment or whether treatment is permanent. The gemmological laboratories will only report on the improvements or treatments known to the laboratories at the date of the report

(d) For jewellery sales, **estimates** are based on the information in any gemmological report or, if no report is available, assume that the gemstones may have been treated or enhanced.

8 WATCHES & CLOCKS

(a) Almost all clocks and watches are repaired in their lifetime and may include parts which are not original. We do not give a warranty that any individual component part of any watch is authentic. Watchbands described as "associated" are not part of the original watch and may not be authentic. Clocks may be sold without pendulums, weights or keys.

(b) As collectors' watches often have very fine and complex mechanisms, a general service, change of battery or further repair work may be necessary, for which you are responsible. We do not give a warranty that any watch is in good working order. Certificates are not available unless described in the catalogue.

(c) Most wristwatches have been opened to find out the type and quality of movement. For that reason, wristwatches with water resistant cases may not be waterproof and we recommend you have them checked by a competent watchmaker before use.

Important information about the sale, transport and shipping of watches and watchbands can be found in paragraph H2(g).

B REGISTERING TO BID 1 NEW BIDDERS

(a) If this is your first time bidding at Christie's or you are a returning bidder who has not bought anything from any of our salerooms within the last two years you must register at least 48 hours before an auction to give us enough time to process and approve your registration. We may, at our option, decline to permit you to register as a bidder. You will be asked for the followine:

(i) for individuals: Photo identification (driving licence, national identity card or passport) and, if not shown on the ID document, proof of your current address (for example, a current utility bill or bank statement):

(ii) for corporate clients: Your Certificate of Incorporation or equivalent document(s) showing your name and registered address together with documentary proof of directors and beneficial owners; and

(iii) for trusts, partnerships, offshore companies and other business structures, please contact us in advance to discuss our requirements. For help, please contact our Credit Department on +41 22 319 1740

(b) We may also ask you to give us a financial reference and/or a deposit as a **condition** of allowing you to bid. For help, please contact our Credit Department on +41 22 319 1740.

2 RETURNING BIDDERS

We may at our option ask you for current identification as described in paragraph B1(a) above, a financial reference or a deposit as a **condition** of allowing you to bid. If you have not bought anything from any of our salerooms in the last two years or if you want to spend more than on previous occasions, please contact our Credit Department on +41 22 319 1740.

3 IF YOU FAIL TO PROVIDE THE RIGHT DOCUMENTS

If in our opinion you do not satisfy our bidder identification and registration procedures including, but not limited to completing any anti-money laundering and/or anti-terrorism financing checks we may require to our satisfaction, we may refuse to register you to bid, and if you make a successful bid, we may cancel the contract for sale between you and the seller.

4 BIDDING ON BEHALF OF ANOTHER PERSON

(a) As authorised bidder: If you are bidding on behalf of another person, that person will need to complete the registration requirements above before you can bid, and supply a signed letter authorising you to bid for him/her.

(b) As agent for an undisclosed principal: If you are bidding as an agent for an undisclosed principal (the ultimate buyer(s)), you accept personal liability to pay the **purchase price** and all other sums due. Further, you warrant that:

(i) you have conducted appropriate customer due diligence on the ultimate buyer(s) of the lot(s) in accordance with any and all applicable anti-money laundering and sanctions laws, consent to us relying on this due diligence, and you will retain for a period of not less than 5 years the documentation and records (including originals) evidencing the due diligence;

(ii) you will make such documentation and records (including originals) evidencing your due diligence promptly available for immediate inspection by an independent third-party auditor upon our written request to do so. We will not disclose such documentation and records to any third-parties unless (1) it is already in the public domain, (2) it is required to be disclosed by law, or (3) it is in accordance with anti-money laundering laws;

(iii) the arrangements between you and the ultimate buyer(s) are not designed to facilitate tax crimes;

(iv) you do not know, and have no reason to suspect, that the funds used for settlement are connected with, the proceeds of any criminal activity including tax crimes, or that the ultimate buyer(s) are under investigation, charged with or convicted of money laundering, terrorist activities or other money laundering predicate crimes.

A bidder accepts personal liability to pay the purchase price and all other sums due unless it has been agreed in writing with Christie's before commencement of the auction that the bidder is acting as an agent on behalf of a named third party acceptable to Christie's and that Christie's will only seek payment from the named third party.

5 BIDDING IN PERSON

If you wish to bid in the saleroom you must register for a numbered bidding paddle at least 30 minutes before the auction. You may register online at www.christies.com or in person. For help, please contact the Credit Department on +41 22 319 1740.

6 BIDDING SERVICES

The bidding services described below are a free service offered as a convenience to our clients and Christie's is not responsible for any error (human or otherwise), omission or breakdown in providing these services.

(a) Phone Bids

Your request for this service must be made no later than 24 hours prior to the auction. We will accept bids by telephone for lots only if our staff are available to take the bids. If you need to bid in a language other than in English, you must arrange this well before the auction. We may record telephone bids. By bidding on the telephone, you are agreeing to us recording your conversations. You also agree that your telephone bids are governed by these Conditions of Sale.

(b) Internet Bids on Christie's Live™

For certain auctions we will accept bids over the Internet. Please visit www.christies.com/livebidding and click on the 'Bid Live' icon to see details of how to watch, hear and bid at the auction from your computer. As well as these Conditions of Sale, internet bids are governed by the Christie's LIVETM terms of use which are available on www.christies.com.

(c) Written Bids

You can find a Written Bid Form at the back of our catalogues, at any Christie's office or by choosing the sale and viewing the lots online at www.christies. com. We must receive your completed Written Bid Form at least 24 hours before the auction. Bids must be placed in the currency of the saleroom. The auctioneer will take reasonable steps to carry out written bids at the lowest possible price, taking into account the reserve. If you make a written bid on a lot which does not have a reserve and there is no higher bid than yours, we will bid on your behalf at around 50% of the low estimate or, if lower, the amount of your bid. If we receive written bids on a lot for identical amounts, and at the auction these are the highest bids on the lot, we will sell the lot to the bidder whose written bid we received first.

C AT THE SALE 1 WHO CAN ENTER THE AUCTION

We may, at our option, refuse admission to our premises or decline to permit participation in any auction or to reject any bid.

2 RESERVES

Unless otherwise indicated, all **lots** are subject to a **reserve**. We identify **lots** that are offered without **reserve** with the symbol • next to the **lot** number. The **reserve** cannot be more than the **lot's low estimate**.

AUCTIONEER'S DISCRETION

The auctioneer can at his sole option:

(a) refuse any bid;

(b) move the bidding backwards or forwards in any way he or she may decide, or change the order of the lots;

(c) withdraw any lot;

(d) divide any **lot** or combine any two or more **lots**:

(e) reopen or continue the bidding even after the hammer has fallen; and

(f) in the case of error or dispute and whether during or after the auction, to continue the bidding, determine the successful bidder, cancel the sale of the lot, or reoffer and resell any lot. If any dispute relating to bidding arises during or after the auction, the auctioneer's decision in exercise of this option is final.

4 BIDDING

The auctioneer accepts bids from:

(a) bidders in the saleroom;

(b) telephone bidders, and internet bidders through 'Christie's LIVETM (as shown above in Section B6); and

(c) written bids (also known as absentee bids or commission bids) left with us by a bidder before the auction.

5 BIDDING ON BEHALF OF THE SELLER

The auctioneer may, at his or her sole option, bid on behalf of the seller up to but not including the amount of the reserve either by making consecutive bids or by making bids in response to other bidders. The auctioneer will not identify these as bids made on behalf of the seller and will not make any bid on behalf of the seller at or above the reserve. If lots are offered without reserve, the auctioneer will generally decide to open the bidding at 50% of the low estimate for the lot. If no bid is made at that level, the auctioneer may decide to go backwards at his or her sole option until a bid is made, and then continue up from that amount. In the event that there are no bids on a lot, the auctioneer may deem such lot unsold.

6 BID INCREMENTS

Bidding generally starts below the **low estimate** and increases in steps (bid increments). The auctioneer will decide at his or her sole option where the bidding should start and the bid increments. The usual bid increments are shown for guidance only on the Written Bid Form at the back of this catalogue.

7 CURRENCY CONVERTER

The saleroom video screens (and Christies LIVETM) may show bids in some other major currencies as well as Swiss Francs. Any conversion is for guidance only and we cannot be bound by any rate of exchange used. Christie's is not responsible for any error (human or otherwise), omission or breakdown in providing these services.

8 SUCCESSFUL BIDS

Unless the auctioneer decides to use his or her discretion as set out in paragraph C3 above, when the auctioneer's hammer strikes, we have accepted the last bid. This means a contract for sale has been formed between the seller and the successful bidder. We will issue an invoice only to the registered bidder who made the successful bid. While we send out invoices by post and/or email after the auction, we do not accept responsibility for telling you whether or not your bid was successful. If you have bid by written bid, you should contact us by telephone or in person as soon as possible after the auction to get details of the outcome of your bid to avoid having to pay unnecessary storage charges.

9 LOCAL BIDDING LAWS

You agree that when bidding in any of our sales that you will strictly comply with all local laws and regulations in force at the time of the sale for the relevant sale site.

THE BUYER'S PREMIUM AND TAXES THE BUYER'S PREMIUM

In addition to the hammer price, the successful bidder agrees to pay us a buyer's premium on the hammer price of each lot sold. On all lots we charge 25% of the **hammer price** up to and including CHF 150,000, 20% on that part of the hammer price over CHF 150,000 and up to and including CHF 2,500,000, and 12% of that part of the hammer price above CHF 2,500,000.

The successful bidder is responsible for any applicable tax including any VAT, sales or compensating use tax or equivalent tax wherever they arise on the hammer price and/or the buyer's premium. It is the buyer's responsibility to ascertain and pay all taxes due. You can find details of how VAT and VAT refunds are dealt with in the section of the catalogue headed 'VAT Symbols and Explanation'. VAT charges and refunds depend on the particular circumstances of the buyer so this section, which is not exhaustive, should be used only as a general guide. WARRANTIES

SELLER'S WARRANTIES

For each lot, the seller gives a warranty that the

(a) is the owner of the lot or a joint owner of the lot acting with the permission of the other co-owners or, if the seller is not the owner or a joint owner of the lot, has the permission of the owner to sell the lot, or the right to do so in law; and

(b) has the right to transfer ownership of the lot to the buyer without any restrictions or claims by anyone else.

If either of the above warranties are incorrect, the seller shall not have to pay more than the purchase **price** (as defined in paragraph F1(a) below) paid by you to us. The seller will not be responsible to you for any reason for loss of profits or business, expected savings, loss of opportunity or interest, costs, damages, other damages or expenses. The seller gives no warranty in relation to any lot other than as set out above and, as far as the seller is allowed by law, all warranties from the seller to you, and all other obligations upon the seller which may be added to this agreement by law, are excluded.

2 OUR AUTHENTICITY WARRANTY

We warrant, subject to the terms below, that the lots in our sales are authentic (our "authenticity warranty"). If, within 5 years of the date of the auction, you satisfy us that your lot is not authentic, subject to the terms below, we will refund the purchase price paid by you. The meaning of authentic can be found in the glossary at the end of these Conditions of Sale. The terms of the authenticity warranty are as follows:

(a) It will be honoured for a period of 5 years from the date of the auction. After such time, we will not be obligated to honour the authenticity warranty.

(b) It is given only for information shown in (ii) Credit Card. UPPERCASE type in the first line of the **catalogue** We accept most description (the "Heading"). It does not apply to any information other than in the Heading even if shown in UPPERCASE type.

(c) The authenticity warranty does not apply to any Heading or part of a Heading which is qualified. Qualified means limited by a clarification in a lot's catalogue description or by the use in a Heading of one of the terms listed in the section titled Qualified Headings on the page of the catalogue headed "Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice". For example, use of the term ATTRIBUTED TO ... " in a Heading means that the lot is in Christie's opinion probably a work by the named artist but no warranty is provided that the lot is the work of the named artist. Please read the full list of Qualified Headings and a lot's full catalogue description before bidding.

(d) The authenticity warranty applies to the Heading as amended by any Saleroom Notice.

(e) The authenticity warranty does not apply where scholarship has developed since the auction leading to a change in generally accepted opinion. Further, it does not apply if the **Heading** either matched the generally accepted opinion of experts at the date of the sale or drew attention to any conflict of opinion.

(f) The authenticity warranty does not apply if the lot can only be shown not to be authentic by a scientific process which, on the date we published the catalogue, was not available or generally accepted for use, or which was unreasonably expensive or impractical, or which was likely to have damaged the lot.

(g) The benefit of the authenticity warranty is only available to the original buyer shown on the invoice for the lot issued at the time of the sale and only if the original buyer has owned the lot continuously between the date of the auction and the date of claim. It may not be transferred to anyone else.

(h) In order to claim under the authenticity warranty you must:

(i) give us written details, including full supporting evidence, of any claim within 5 years of the date of the auction:

(ii) at Christie's option, we may require you to provide the written opinions of two recognised experts in the field of the lot mutually agreed by you and us in advance confirming that the lot is not authentic. If we have any doubts, we reserve the right to obtain additional opinions at our expense; and

(iii) return the lot at your expense to the saleroom from which you bought it in the condition it was in at the time of sale.

(i) Your only right under this authenticity warranty is to cancel the sale and receive a refund of the purchase price paid by you to us. We will not, in any circumstances, be required to pay you more than the purchase price nor will we be liable for any loss of profits or business, loss of opportunity or value, expected savings or interest, costs, damages, other damages or expenses.

PAYMENT HOW TO PAY

(a) Immediately following the auction, you must

pay the purchase price being: the hammer price; and

(ii) the buyer's premium; and

(iii) any amounts due under section D2 above; and (iv) any duties, goods, sales, use, compensating or service tax or VAT.

Payment is due no later than by the end of the 7th calendar day following the date of the auction (the 'due date")

(b) We will only accept payment from the registered bidder. Once issued, we cannot change the buyer's name on an invoice or re-issue the invoice in a different name. You must pay immediately even if you want to export the lot and you need an export licence.

(c) You must pay for lots bought at Christie's in Switzerland in the currency stated on the invoice in one of the following ways:

We accept most major credit cards subject to certain conditions and fees. To make a 'cardholder not present' (CNP) payment, you must complete a CNP authorisation form which you can get from our Cashiers Department. You must send a completed CNP authorisation form by fax to +41 22 319 1767 or by post to the address set out in paragraph (d) below. If you want to make a CNP payment over the telephone, you must call +41 22 319 1740. CNP payments cannot be accepted by all salerooms and are subject to certain restrictions. Details of the conditions and restrictions applicable to credit card payments are available from our Cashiers Department, whose details are set out in paragraph (d) below.

We accept cash subject to a maximum of CHF. 12.500 per buyer per year at our Cashier's Department only (subject to conditions).

(iv) Banker's draft

We do not accept banker's drafts for sales in Switzerland

(v) Cheque

We do not accept personal or company cheques for sales in Switzerland.

TRANSFERRING OWNERSHIP TO YOU

If you make the highest bid accepted by the auctioneer, you will be the buyer of the lot. The striking of the auctioneer's hammer marks the conclusion of a contract of sale between the seller and you. However, ownership in the lot will only transfer from the seller to you once we have received full and clear payment of the purchase price. The lot will not be released until we have received full payment.

3 TRANSFERRING RISK TO YOU

The risk in and responsibility for the lot will transfer to you from whichever is the earlier of the following:

When you collect the lot; or

At the end of the 90th day following the date of the auction or, if earlier, the date the lot is taken into care by a third party warehouse as set out on the page headed 'Storage and Collection', unless we have agreed otherwise with you in writing.

WHAT HAPPENS IF YOU DO NOT PAY

(a) If you fail to pay us the **purchase price** in full by the due date, we will be entitled to do one or more of the following (as well as enforce our rights under paragraph F5 and any other rights or remedies we have by law):

to charge interest from the due date at a rate of 1% per month on the unpaid amount due;

(ii) we can cancel the sale of the lot. If we do this, we may sell the lot again, publically or privately on such terms we shall think necessary or appropriate, in which case you must pay us any shortfall between the purchase price and the proceeds from the resale. You must also pay all costs, expenses, losses, damages and legal fees we have to pay or may suffer and any shortfall in the seller's commission on the resale;

(iii) we can pay the seller an amount up to the net proceeds payable in respect of the amount bid by your default in which case you acknowledge and understand that Christie's will have all of the rights of the seller to pursue you for such amounts;

(iv) we can hold you legally responsible for the purchase price and may begin legal proceedings to recover it together with other losses, interest, legal fees and costs as far as we are allowed by law;

(v) we can take what you owe us from any amounts which we or any company in the **Christie's Group** may owe you (including any deposit or other partpayment which you have paid to us);

(vi) we can, at our option, reveal your identity and contact details to the seller:

(vii) we can reject at any future auction any bids made by or on behalf of the buyer or to obtain a deposit from the buyer before accepting any bids;

(viii) to exercise all the rights and remedies of a person holding security over any property in our possession owned by you, whether by way of pledge, security interest or in any other way as permitted by the law of the place where such property is located. You will be deemed to have granted such security to us and we may retain such property as collateral security for your obligations to us; and

(ix) we can take any other action we see necessary or appropriate.

(b) If you owe money to us or to another Christie's Group company, we can use any amount you do pay, including any deposit or other part-payment you have made to us, or which we owe you, to pay off any amount you owe to us or another Christie's Group company for any transaction.

(c) If you make payment in full after the due date. and we choose to accept such payment we may charge you storage and transport costs from the date that is 90 calendar days following the auction in accordance with paragraphs Gd(i) and (ii). In such circumstances paragraph Gd(iv) shall apply.

KEEPING YOUR PROPERTY

If you owe money to us or to another Christie's Group company, as well as the rights set out in F4 above, we can use or deal with any of your property we hold or which is held by another Christie's Group company in any way we are allowed to by law. We will only release your property to you after you pay us or the relevant Christie's Group company in full for what you owe. However, if we choose, we can also sell your property in any way we think appropriate. We will use the proceeds of the sale against any amounts you owe us and we will pay any amount left from that sale to you. 
