

[WALDSEEMÜLLER, Martin (c.1470-c.1522).] Orbis Typus Universalis luxta Hydrographorum Traditionem. [Strasbourg: 1513].

Finely coloured example of the extremely rare 'Admiral's Map,' by 'the most important cartographer of the early sixteenth century' (Karrow). In 1505, the cartographer Martin Waldseemüller was invited to join an ecclesiastical college at Saint-Dié-des-Vosges, a small town some 50 miles south-west of Strasbourg. Known as the Gymnasium Vosagense, this group of scholars was under the protection of René II (1451-1508), Duke of Lorraine. Here, Waldseemüller was tasked with creating a new globe, a large world map, and a new edition of Ptolemy's *Geographia*. This latter was quite delayed - the introduction to the 1966 reprint of the *Geographia* by Skelton gives an excellent overview of the circumstances - and must have been printed at Strasbourg rather than at Saint-Dié. Nevertheless, 'If the publishing history of the 1513 Ptolemy is uncertain, its importance cannot be doubted' (Karrow), and the present lot is one of two maps including portions of the New World

that introduce the modern map section of the book. The text suggests that Waldseemüller used material from 'a former Admiral of the most serene King of Portugal Ferdinand' as his source, hence the nomenclature 'Admiral's Map.' Karrow suggests that 1504/1505 Caveri (Canerio) portolan chart (now in the Bibliothèque nationale de France) was then in the possession of René, and is the source for the present map. 

PTOLEMAEUS, Claudius (c.100-c.178). Geographicae enarrationis, Edited by Michael Servetus (1509/11-1553). Vienne: Gaspar Trechsel for Hugues de La Porte at Lyons, 1541.

The second of two Lyons editions by the Spanish theologian and scientist, Servetus, also known as Villanovanus. The text comprises the Latin translation by Willibald Pirckheimer (1470-1530) and an index. In his first edition of 1535 Servetus exposed numerous errors in the translation, consulting some eighty works of reference to do so, but his second edition required only minor changes. The 50 maps derive from the Waldseemüller series and are printed from the blocks used in Lorenz Fries's edition printed by Gruninger in 1522. They were used again in Gruninger's 1525 Strasbourg edition, as well as the first Trechsel/Servetus edition of 1535. Of the 50 maps, 27 depict the ancient and 22 the modern world, with a further map of Lotharingia. Maps no. 28, 34, 49 and 50 concern America; the text on no. 28 verso is about the discoveries of Columbus. The final map 50 is dated 1522 and initialed L.F. (Lorenz Fries). The remarks about the barren state of the Holy Land, used against Servetus in his trial for heresy in 1553, are omitted in this edition, as are the ornamental borders to the descriptive texts on map \mathbb{R}^{3}



PTOLEMAEUS, Claudius (c.100-c.178). *Geographia universalis*. Translated from Greek into Latin by Willibald Pirckheimer (1470-1530), edited by Sebastian Münster (1488-1552). Basel: Heinrich Petri, 1546.


Third edition, the rare issue dated 1546 in title and colophon (instead of 1545, but dedicatory epistle dated 1545, and setting otherwise identical to the issue dated 1545) of Münster's Ptolemy. 'It includes all of the Ptolemaic maps, all the modern double-page maps from the 1544 Cosmographia, and five completely new maps' (Karrow). At the same time as bringing Ptolemy up to date by adding text (here printed in the last section of the book) and new maps to the ancient recension, Münster was working on his own Cosmographia, which he entrusted to the same publisher (1544 with 24 maps, 1545 with 28 maps).

This copy has the distinction of an illustrious provenance. First owned by the poet Pontus de Tyard, whom Ronsard invited to become a member of La Pléiade and who, beside poetry, in his maturity cultivated scientific and philosophical prose which has been described as superior to his verse, it then passed by gift to Pontus de Tyard's protégé and friend Étienne Tabourot, seigneur des Accords (1549-1590, who devised the motto also inscribed in the book). Étienne was the main contributor to his family's remarkable book collection, which included books on science and cosmography as well as the more obvious works of literature and philosophy: a testament to the man's polymathic talents and endeavours. Ortelius refers to Tabourot's specific interest in geography in the Catalogus auctorum included in the *Theatrum orbis terrarum* (1584) by crediting him with devising a map of Burgundy which Ortelius used. Folio (303 x 203 mm). 54 double-page woodcut maps, half of which are Ptolemaean, the rest modern (world, the American continent, the East Indies and regions in Europe, Asia and Africa), letterpress within woodcut borders on recto of the first leaf of each bifolium, printed in Roman and italic types, double column, woodcut of Ptolemy observing the stars, woodcut diagrams (some full-page) and initials (title a little soiled, several plates discreetly strengthened at inner margin, minor tear affecting 2 letters (no loss) in plate Africa 2, minute hole (2mm) in plate Asia 3, one or two tears and a small wormhole to the lower margin far from text, some marginal waterstaining to the first 3 and last 3 quires (not affecting the plates). Contemporary mottled calf, sides panelled in blind with gilt fleurons corner-pieces and gilt centrepiece, panelled spine with gilt floral tools (foot of spine, upper joint and a portion of the upper side restored, corners bumped and worn, some surface abrasions). Provenance: Pontus de Tyard (or Thyard, Thiard) (c.1521-1605), French poet and priest (inscription on title; contemporary marginalia, particularly around the Münster addition; a distich from Virgil on the front free-endpaper, and a verse from Ovid on the rear free end-paper both extolling knowledge as a source of happiness) - 'Tabourot', i.e. Étienne Tabourot, seigneur des Accords (1549-1590) (inscription at foot of titlepage describing this book as a gift from Pontus de Tyard, and family motto inscribed under the title) -? Guillet 1625 (inscription on title partly written over, and thus obscuring, the previous one) - Tremet, canon at the Church of St Urbain, Troyes, 1793 (inscription on title).


BORDONE, Benedetto (?1445-1460 - 1539). Isolario ... Ricorretto et di nuovo ristampato con la gionta del Monte del Oro novamente ritrovato. Venice: Francesco di Leno, [1547?].

Early edition of one of the most popular illustrated guides to the 'islands and peninsulas' of the Atlantic, the Mediterranean, the Indian Ocean and the Far East. The three double-page maps depict the Mediterranean Sea and Europe, the Aegean Sea, and a world map (Shirley World 59), the double-page bird's-eye view depicts Venice. The work is particularly notable for its wide scope, with the inclusion of recent discoveries in the Americas, for its well-known plan of the city of Mexico ('Temistitan') before its destruction by Cortez, for its world map on an oval projection, cited as the first of its kind, although perhaps attributable to Francesco Rosselli, and for the earliest printed individual European map of Japan. First Moleto edition, based on the translation by Pirckheimer, the maps being restrikes from the Ruscelli Venice (Italian) edition of 1561. Notably, **this edition includes Ruscelli's double hemisphere world map, the rare world sea chart 'Carta Marina Nuova', and a version of the 1558 Zeno map of the Arctic (which quickly became established as the standard map of the Arctic and Greenland for many years).** In all, our edition contains 3 world maps, 27 maps of Europe, 9 of Africa, 19 of Asia, and 6 of the Americas. Moleto's juxtaposition of traditional Ptolemaic maps with contemporary ones offers an iconic insight into the early-modern dialectics in the representation of the world. Second edition, enlarged with 17 new maps. Porcacchi's 'isolario', originally published in 1572, is renowned for the beauty of its etched plates. The third and final part (p.154 onwards) relates to the New World. It includes a reduced version of Forlani's important map of North America, as well as Temistitan (Mexico), Cuba, Spagnuola, the Moluccas and two new maps of Jamaica and San Giovanni. Two world maps, one a sea chart, bring the resplendent series to an end. Adams P-1905; Nordenskiold II, 187; Phillips Atlases 167; Sabin 64149.

Extremely rare first French edition of the first printed pilot book to incorporate sea charts. 'This work holds a unique place among the printed rutters of the sea in the 16th century because it is the first printed rutter with charts... Thanks to the unparalleled skill of the engravers ... the original ms. charts by Waghenaer were transformed into the most beautiful maps of the period' (Koeman). The first printing began in Plantin's workshop in Leiden in 1583. Cornelis Claesz took over the publication in 1589, producing a German edition, and in the same year Jean Bellère of Antwerp obtained the privilege to print the work in Dutch, Latin, French and Spanish. This French edition was a joint endeavour between Bellère (letterpress) and Claesz (copper-plate printing). A new plate (10B) replaced the previous version 10A. 'There is no evidence that Waghenaer copied his charts from existing sources. Some of them must have been based on his personal observations and for the whole of the work he must have relied on his own rich experience in practical navigation' (Koeman). The Van Doetecum double-page chart of Europe is extremely interesting, being in the rare first state with Iceland shown almost as a circular shape (New Hollstein 794/II). Koeman IV, p. 496 and 490-91 (Wag 8A).




Second, enlarged and corrected edition of the first atlas of the Americas, containing the first printed map of present-day central Canada - the first to use 'Canada' in its title; the most accurate map of the North American east coast up to 1620 - the second to use Virginia in the title; the first cartographic engraving devoted exclusively to Brazil, and the first map devoted to California and the southwest USA (cf. Burden). Derived from a variety of sources, the maps represent cartographic knowledge from the voyages of Frobisher and Davis, De Soto and others, and the text gives a history of the voyages of Columbus, Cabot, Verrazzano and others, as well as a description of the natural history and ethnography of these lands. Two editions were printed in 1597 easily distinguished by the number of leaves. The first edition was printed in a smaller type on 51 leaves and the present edition in a larger type on 100 leaves, with some additional text, including a dedication to Philip III of Spain and a leaf of epigrams on the author by Sicamber. The maps are identical in both (and immediately succeeding) editions. Four maps are known in variant states; in the present copy Burden 100 is in the 3rd state and

Burden 102, 103 and 107 are in the first state. The sheets of the second edition were re-issued in 1598 with the same engraved title-page updated to 1598. 
First Latin edition, and the first to include Barentsz' map of his voyage and the regions adjacent to the North Pole. Linschoten, a Dutchman born in Delft, was in Goa between 1583 and 1589, and with Willem Barentsz on his second voyage to the Kara Sea in 1594-1595. These experiences were recorded in the present work, which was first published in Dutch (Amsterdam: 1595-1596), and contains the most comprehensive account of the East and West Indies available at the end of the sixteenth century. In this 1599 edition, Jan van Doetecum the younger's engraving of Petrus Plancius's 1594 map (Shirley World 187) has been replaced with Arnold and Hendrik Florentsz. van Langren's version published by Jan Baptist Vrients (Shirley World 192: see front endpapers for illustration). This double-hemisphere map is notable for several reasons. Firstly, as Shirley notes, 'there are differences affecting the northern seas, and the pictorial scenes forming the outer border have been regrouped with even greater stylistic effect.' Secondly, it is the second-known map to definitely show Korea as a peninsula. Thirdly, the watermark, that of crossed arrows 90mm in length, is different to the other watermarks found on the other van Langren and van Doetecum maps and plates in the book (bunch of grapes terminating in initials I.S.). However, rather intriguingly, the crossed arrows watermark is also shared with the van Doetecum Arctic map of Barentsz' voyage, present in this edition for the first time, which suggests that both the van Langren and van Doetecum families had a close association with Vrients in Antwerp, as well as Plancius in Amsterdam, and that Linschoten was sourcing engravings from different publishers in different cities.

As well as including important travel accounts taken from contemporary Portuguese, Dutch and Spanish sources, it is the first work to include precise sailing instructions for the Indies, and also includes an account of America. It thus aided the development and establishment of an overseas Dutch trading empire. It yielded secrets about Portuguese sea routes to the east and about how their territories were governed; it was also of special value for its description of spice trees and spice growing areas. Very rare: we have only been able to trace 5 copies selling at auction over the past 40 years, two of which have been incomplete (ABPC/RBH). 'The most important map of the far northern regions ... [and] the first to show Spitzbergen' (Ginsberg). Willem Barentsz made three voyages to the Arctic Ocean. During the first voyage of 1594, he reached the western shores of Novaya Zemlya, and his co-explorer, Jan Huygen van Linschoten, actually managed to enter the Kara Sea at the beginning of August, which was unusually free of ice that year. The second voyage of 1595 was launched on a much grander scale, with the vision of completing the North-East passage, and included 7 ships loaded with merchandise destined for China. However, this time the approach to was impassable due to ice, and the fleet turned south, landing at Pechora Bay (Pechorskaya Guba). In 1596 Barentsz undertook a third voyage, the outbound track of which is shown on this map. Barentsz discovered Spitzbergen, and decided to try to enter the Kara Sea by sailing north of Novaya Zemlya. This fateful decision led to the expedition being trapped in the ice and forcing the party to overwinter in a dwelling constructed of salvaged ship's timbers that they named 'Het Behouden Huys' (the safe house), which is shown on the map. In mid-June 1597, the weather

permitted the 15 survivors to make their return in open boats along the shores of Novaya Zemlya. Barentsz, already ill, died during the return journey on 20 June. The remains of the hut were discovered in 1871, further relics recovered in 1876, and excavations undertaken in 1993 and 1995; Barentsz' grave remains undiscovered. The detail of the expedition is in the main derived from the journal kept by the ship's carpenter, Gerrit de Veer. Published by Cornelis Claesz in 1598 under the title Waerachtige beschryvinghe van drie seylagien, it was accompanied by 30 copperplate illustrations; this map was published separately. 

METELLUS, Johannes (also Jean MATAL, c.1517-1597). Speculum orbis terrae. Oberursel: Sutor, 1602.

First edition of one of the rarest early world atlases by one of the modern masters of cosmography, read by Walter Ralegh and his contemporaries along with the works of Mercator, Ortelius, Muenster and Merula. Minute details of a vast array of provinces are displayed, in the wider context of continents and the globe itself, in a conscious display of fine geographic knowledge. Metellus, a French jurist and geographer who, forty years earlier, had met Abraham Ortelius and the publisher Christophe Plantijn, and had begun contributing to the key cartographic works of the time, including an improved edition of Ortelius' Theatrum Orbis Terrarum, Michael Eitzinger's Leo Belgicus, and Braun and Hogenburg's Civitatis Orbis Terrarum. Metellus was at the centre of the formation of contemporary cosmographic and geographical knowledge, amongst other things acting as Mercator's information source on Mexico. Indeed, this copy includes several extremely rare North American maps, including Americae sive Novi Orbis proximarumque. regionum orae descriptio known in only other 3 other examples, all in Germany (Dresden, Mainz and Munich; Burden I, 146). There is also only the second printed map devoted to the Pacific, Maris Pacifici vulgo Mar del zur Terra Australis sive Magelanica (Burden I, 122).

There is evidence that this atlas was used by a contemporary reader who was aware of advances in cartographic knowledge. The map *Chinae Regnum* has the Korean peninsula sketched in red crayon, which is consistent with other red underlinings throughout the books. Western knowledge of Korea was in its infancy at this time: the Rughesi 2-sheet map of Asia of 1597 is the first printed map to definitively show Korea as a peninsula, while the Vrients world map in Linschoten's *Navigatio ac itinerarium* (Shirley *World* 192; see lot 9) dating from 1599, is a close second. One of these two maps is probably the source of this annotation.

This posthumously-published atlas gathers the map collections pertaining to individual continents and islands which Metellus had published in the previous few years, beginning with Europe and ending with the *Insularium*. Each of the parts is exceptionally rare its own; to have the complete atlas is almost unheard of. We are aware of portions of the atlas, such as the Islands, Africa and an incomplete America on the market, but we have been unable to trace another complete atlas at auction or in the trade. 
Extremely rare French-language edition of the first pilot atlas of the Mediterranean with printed charts. Waghenaer's Thresoor der Zeevaert (Leiden, 1592) was the first printed description of the Mediterranean, but was published without charts. The present lot first appeared in print in 1595, and was heavily influenced by the Italian tradition of portolans, both charts and written sailing directions; at the end of the present work appears a translation of Paolo Gerardo's II Portolano del Mare, published in 1584. However, as Koeman notes, the text and coastal profiles are almost certainly original to the present work. Barentsz's chart book of the Mediterranean and his explorations in the Arctic were to make him one of the best-known pilots of the Low Countries in the latter part of the sixteenth-century. It formed a follow-up to Waghenaer's description of the western and northern coasts of Europe (see lot 7) and according to Koeman 'set the standard for all future pilot guides published in Amsterdam (Blaeu, Colom, Lootsman etc)'. Barentsz's chartbook would continue to be the only pilot of the Mediterranean until Blaeu published the third part of his Licht der Zeevaert in 1618. Although the

French title-overslip is not present here, the collation appears to conform most closely to Koeman IV, Bar 4C, recording one institutional copy only at Yale, which lacks the general chart of the Mediterranean; we have only been able to trace one other similar copy, at the Erfgoedbibliotheek Hendrik Conscience, Antwerp. Worldcat records another at the Bibliothèque Mazarine, Paris, but this is in fact the 1626 edition.



Rare French edition of the Atlas Minor, in unusually well-preserved state as complete with all maps and preliminaries and in a sound contemporary binding. Appearing first in 1607, the Hondius-Mercator 'smaller' atlas was a Europe-wide success, with editions published both in Latin and in several vernaculars. The first map shows a fine double hemisphere world map, further maps include (besides Europe in detail), the Middle-East, Persia, India, Ceylon, Indonesia, China, Japan and 8 representations of parts of the Americas. Koeman II Me 191; see Phillips 426.



Third French translation of Schouten's popular account of his circumnavigation with Jacob Le Maire in search of the unknown southern continent. Among the expedition's cartographic contributions were the discovery of a new strait off Tierra del Fuego, named after Le Maire, and charting parts of the coastline of New Guinea. This Paris edition follows the French translation printed at Amsterdam the same year, but 'with alterations and improvements in the text' (Sabin) and the plates in slightly smaller versions. Schouten's landmark voyage was only the third circumnavigation, 'during which Cape Horn [named after Schouten's hometown of Hoorn] was discovered and rounded for the first time' (Hill). Sabin 77952 (recording the dedication as signed 'M.G.', whereas here it is signed 'M. Tavernier'); Shirley World 299.




First French edition of Blaeu's important pilot book, Het licht der zee-vaert, published by his competitor Jansson, this copy acquired in 1636 expressly for the renowned astronomer Peiresc, and subsequently owned by the celebrated circumnavigator Freycinet. Astronomer, naturalist and patron of science, who counted Galileo, Gassendi and Pinelli among his circle, Peiresc was the first (with Gaultier) in France to observe Jupiter and its moons in 1610, only months after Galileo's own discovery of them. He continued his planetary observations to calculate terrestrial longitudes. Most significantly, he correctly measured the Mediterranean for the first time in the summer of 1636, showing that previous cartographers had it c. 300 leagues larger than it is. He continued to immerse himself in navigational literature and in August of that year wrote to Jacques Dupuy at Paris, asking him to find and send him the 1620 edition of Blaeu's Flambeau, this very book (Lettres de Peiresc, 3; 543; and cf. P. Miller, Peiresc's Mediterranean World, 2015). Peiresc's extensive library, mostly uniformly bound by his in-house binder Simon Corberon, was inherited by Peiresc's brother, whose son began dispersals as early as 1645/46. Peiresc's books are notable for being amongst the first to have the volume's date stamped on the spine (cf. G. Pollard, 'Changes in the Style of Bookbinding 1550-1830', in *The Library*, 5th, series, XI, 2, June 1956, p. 90). The volume later joined the extensive cartographic library and archive formed by French circumnavigator Freycinet, the first to map the full Australian coastline.

The original Dutch version, *Het licht der zee-vaert*, was published by Willem Janszoon Blaeu in 1608. A French translation followed in 1619, and in 1620 the present edition by Jansson appeared, with the Blaeu's text and the plates re-engraved with some minor alterations. The three parts consist of an Introduction, an instruction in the art of navigation, the first Book on Western navigation and the second Book on Eastern and Northern navigation. 

Fine visualisation of the western hemisphere centred on the American continents, with an illustration of Brazilian native peoples engaged in communal drinking, and various scenes appropriated from De Bry's Grand Voyages including galleons, kayaks and Indian canoes, as well as birds perched on the lower cartouche. The stereographic projection shows New Guinea touching a proposed southern continent 'Terra Australis,' which runs the width of the map and is contiguous with Tierra del Fuego. Second edition in French, the first to include two parts. The earlier edition of this translation by F. de Louvencourt, Sieur de Vauchelles, was issued in 1613, with only the first part. The earliest published account of Drake's circumnavigation, 1577-1580, was on 6 unnumbered supplementary leaves following p.643 of Hakluyt's *Principall Navigations* (1589). This was probably compiled by Hakluyt from several briefer eyewitness accounts, one being Francis Fletcher's original narrative. Translations in several languages followed 'but the best of these versions was the one in French' (Hans P. Kraus, *Sir Francis Drake: A Pictorial Biography*, website). The Golden Hind was the only ship to return three years and 36,000 miles after a fleet of five had set sail from Plymouth in 1577. Drake discovered the insular nature of Tierra del Fuego, and found upper California. Most importantly for Queen Elisabeth, the enormous treasure brought back yielded a profit to the voyage of 4600 per cent (£47 for each pound invested). According to J.M. Keynes's *Treatise on Money*, this enabled the English foreign debt to be paid off, and enough was left over (£42,000) to capitalize a new venture, the Levant Company. The bibliography in D. B. Quinn's *Sir Francis Drake as seen by His Contemporaries* shows that no map was issued with either French edition of the voyage. 

The North Pole is illustrated as a landmass surrounding a sea from which four rivers radiate, and there is a well-depicted northwest passage. A huge southern continent and the bulge in the south west coast of South America indicate the influence of Gerard Mercator. 

First edition with French text of an exceptionally rare maritime atlas covering the coasts of Scandinavia, Britain and Ireland, France, Spain, Portugal and North Africa. The 43 charts in the present lot are the same as those in the first edition with Dutch text (De Vyerighe Colom, 1632), with a few minor changes, and include the large folding chart 'Nieuwe Pascaarte op hare rechte Distantie...' (chart no.1), which is often missing. The publication of this Pilot guide brought Colom into unfriendly competition with Willem Blaeu, who hastily published a response to Colom's atlas, including a preface in which he attempts to list its mistakes. De Vyerighe Colom, however, continued to be published for over thirty years. Bound in the section covering the East Coast of England is a 17th-century manuscript chart in French, which appears to show one of the harbours described in the facing printed text. WorldCat lists only 3 copies in institutions, at Yale (lacking general title, one part-title, chart nos.1 and 24), Harvard (lacking the general title and chart no.1), and the BnF; Koeman records one further copy at the University Library, Leiden. Important sea-atlas designed to assist with French coastal defence. As a military engineer, Tassin understood the importance of using original first-hand observational drawings by other military engineers, and combined these with material from other cartographers to create the 29 maps found here. The first part charts the Atlantic coastline from Calais to San Sebastian; the second the Mediterranean coast between the Spanish border and Villefranche. Two variant imprints appeared in the same year, but no priority has been established. The present example corresponds with other copies seen by Pastoreau, and is bound without a general title. Pastoureau *Tassin* V; see Nordenskiöld 292; Tooley p. 42.




Hondius' important map of the polar region is one of the most decorative maps of the North Pole. It incorporates much English knowledge of the Northwest Passage, drawing upon the cartography of Henry Briggs of Hudson Bay, with that of its western coast from Thomas James. The increasing accuracy of the cartography is demonstrated by the omission of the former imaginary islands of the north Atlantic. The present lot is Burden's third state (Kershaw's second state), which has for the first time Dutch whaling ships in the surrounding borders. First and only edition of 'the first naval history..., a veritable naval encyclopedia' (Borba de Moraes). First issue, with the dedication to Louis XIII, and from the library of the noted Dijon collector, E.F. De la Cuisine, President of chamber in the cour impériale [appeals court] of Dijon, President of the Academy of Arts and Sciences there, and author of a history of parliament of Burgundy, published in 1864. The first part of the work covers ancient times, and includes an impressive folding engraving of a Roman sea-battle in a flooded amphitheatre. The second describes recent voyages of discovery, including Gerard de Veer in the Arctic, Sir Walter Raleigh in the Americas, and Magellan's southerly explorations. 

A unique Jansson issue; not known to Koeman. WorldCat only lists two copies dated 1654, both with Pieter Goos's imprint. The revival of maritime cartography in Amsterdam was signalled by publication of a new pilot guide, De Lichtende Columne ofte Zee-Spiegel, in 1643-1644. Despite the copying habits of Dutch cartographers, its charts after Anthoni Jacobsz bore no resemblance to those of Colom or Blaeu. In 1650 Pieter Goos brought out an edition under his own imprint, presumably after becoming the owner of Jacobsz's plates (Jacobsz, or his sons, had to order new plates after this date). In about 1662, Goos changed the title of the work to De Nieuwe Groote Zeespiegel, though adding only one new chart and improving a minority of old ones. He continued to print from the same 60 plates for 28 years. Jansson brought out the Zee-Spiegel under his own imprint in 1651, with charts printed from the original plates. However, his involvement was fleeting and copies with his imprint are extremely rare. Koeman lists only the one 1651/1652 edition in Dutch 'which is in fact Goos's Zeespiegel with Janssonius's imprint on a slip of paper'; he also records a 1654 English edition, known from one

copy at Greenwich, which makes the same use of the printed title slip. The Wardington copy of the 1652-1653 Jansson edition utilises the overslip while also containing 'two secondary titles', not found in the present copy of the 1654 edition. 



Hand-coloured copy of Doncker's constantly evolving sea-atlas. 'Doncker's charts were the most up-to-date in the second half of the 17th century' (Koeman). Between 1659 and 1669, he increased the number of charts in his atlas from 19 to 30, and in 1669 he even produced an edition with 50 charts. This edition includes all but one of the charts of the Dutch edition of 1661, four from the Spanish edition of 1665 and three new charts, all signed by Doncker. There are 5 maps of North American interest: Greenland (Burden I, 337, state 2), Caribbean (339, state 1), Brazil (338, state 1), California (340, state 1'It depicts California as an island on a larger scale than any earlier sea chart') and the New Netherlands (I, 348, state 1). A sumptuous copy, beautifully hand-coloured and heightened with gold by a contemporary artist. Hendrik Doncker was the originator of this form of sea-atlas and most of Goos's charts were copied from him. Koeman observes (IV, p.193) that the publisher hardly varied the content of the many editions which appeared between 1666 and 1683. Our copy may be one of those sold by the Amsterdam bookbinder Albertus Magnus, following Goos's death in 1675, as Koeman notes that 'These copies are famous for their outstanding colour'. In fact, the very effective use of colouring led Koeman to conjecture that Goos's sea-atlas was 'more intended for the book-lover than for the seaman'. There are some very striking maps, including an interesting depiction of Hudson's Bay just prior to the formation of the Hudson's Bay Company (Burden I, 386). Also included are 2 maps of the New Netherlands. One is of the eastern seaboard from Boston Harbor to Cape Hatteras (Burden I, 387).


The other, 'Paskaerte van de Zuyd en Noordt Revier in Nieu Nederlandt,' of the Dutch and Swedish colonies, 'is the rarest of the Goos charts of North America' (Burden I, 388), and was most probably issued separately, and only added to the atlas as a supplementary chart. 

A rare maritime atlas and pilot guide, from the noble French library of the comte de Mailly, who rose through army ranks to become marshal of France in 1783 and was beheaded in the revolution. Lootsman succeeded Blaeu and Colom in importance and his maps were reprinted or copied by Goos, Janssonius and Doncker. Lootsman 'set the example for the classical type of the Zeespiegel in folio format' (Koeman). Extra-illustrated with three maps of the Caribbean which had previously appeared in Lootsman's Zee-Atlas of 1666 (Koeman IV, Jac 1, maps 23, 26, 27) and which his advertisement of 1679 makes clear were available separately. On the death of Theunis Jacobsz in 1650, his heirs sold the plates for the Zeespiegel to Goos; subsequent editions beginning in 1662 are printed with new maps, similar but different. Koeman does not record a 1669 edition, but it agrees with his description of the 1671 edition, including the almanac for 1670-77 and all catchwords, mis-signings and mis-paginations. 

Sumptuous, extravagantly extra-illustrated eighteenth-century compilation made from five of Pierre Duval's atlases, all skilfully and tastefully coloured. The volumes include maps, tables and blazons from Duval's Traité de géographie, Le Monde terrestre, La Géographie Françoise, Les XII provinces, Les Cartes des provinces eschues a la Reine, Les acquisitions de la France, and the Cartes...pur bien entendre les historiens, headed by a copy of La Feuille's Mappe-Monde, Planisphere ou Carte Generale du Monde (c.1700). The French geographer, cartographer and publisher Pierre Duval learned the art of mapmaking from his uncle, the famous cartographer Nicolas Sanson, and like his uncle worked at the royal court as Geographer to the King. Among the notable maps it is worth mentioning that of Virginia, which offers an early view of the Chesapeake area, the mythical Lake May, Jamestown, an early reference to Manhattan and New Amsterdam and an inset depiction of Bermuda. This map, first published in 1659, appears here for the first time with the added caption 'al-Manhate'. The manuscript can be dated from examples of lunar calculations on ff.1v-3v which use dates in 1673 and 1674. The contents of the manuscript closely follow the syllabus taught by Georges Boissaye du Bocage (1626-1696), maître d'hydrographie at Le Havre from c.1660 (see Anthiaume, vol.1, pp.240-1).

Exceedingly rare second edition of a maritime atlas based on Pieter Goos's pilot guide of the Mediterranean, *Nieuwe Groote Zee-Spiegel* (1662). The first edition, with the title *Prima parte dello specchio del mare*, was published in 1664 with the same 25 plates as the present lot, and was later re-issued with 28 plates by Coronelli in Venice in 1698. The present edition is unrecorded by the major bibliographies and has not appeared at auction according to RBH/ABPC. 



'Most complete edition' (Howgego) of the dramatic account of Pyrard de Laval, a French merchant seaman, of his voyage to India. Upon being shipwrecked on the Maldives in 1602, he remained there for five years, when he learned the local language and studied the culture and natural history. Following his eventual escape, he proceeded to Brazil, Goa, Hindustan and Cochin. His book included practical advice for French traders travelling to Asia and was an immediate success. This is the first edition edited by Pierre **Duval**, Geographer to the King, corrected and enlarged, and with a map showing the route of the voyage drawn by Duval himself, but with the vocabulary of the first edition of 1611 suppressed. 

'This decorative map combines the primitive concepts of "Frisland", "Frobisher Strait" as bisecting southern Greenland; and the three-island concept of Arctic Canada introduced by Sanson' (Kershaw). This, the only map prepared by Pitt for The English Atlas, 'is one of the most evocative of the region ever published' (Burden). Pitt, a London bookseller, had an ambitious plan to produce a 12-volume atlas in the Blaeu-Jansson tradition: however, only four volumes were published. Burden II, 525; Kershaw 120.

The present lot is a later variant published by Hendrik and Jacob Keur for their Dutch Bible, and although it is surrounded by the same allegorical representations of the four continents as the earlier Visscher map, the cartography is quite different. In the present lot, the previous peninsular California, attached to an extensive and speculative American north west coastline, is replaced by an insular California with a flat northern coast labelled Nova Albion; a small island at about where Alaska is located is labelled Anian. New Guinea no longer appears in the western hemisphere, its place taken by an extension of Australia's northern coastline. Australia now also has a much more complete western coast, even if the southern coastline no longer extends as far east as it once did. South America, which once had remnants of a 'Brazilian bulge' divided by the hemisphere boundary, is now corrected and shown complete in the western hemisphere. 




A hand-coloured maritime atlas of unprecedented scope and splendour. The charts after Claes Janszoon Voght combine baroque artistry with a technical ability that resulted in a half century of steady publication for the atlas from 1680 to 1734. Voght also wrote the short text. As Koeman stresses, the atlas was different to its predecessors in going through a process of continual enlargement and in having a content that was so variable. Whereas earlier Dutch maritime atlases had a stable content with scarcely any alteration or additions to the plates, however great their longevity, the Zee-Atlas was selective with fluctuations in the number of plates (a fact which would explain the absence of a register or index in the issues after 1681).


This copy has an extraordinarily large complement of maps. The 1680 first edition contained only 36 charts; the Wardington copy of 1682 contained 41. As work on van Keulen's pilot book, the Zee-Fakel, proceeded, so more charts became available; obsolete charts were also replaced by new engraved plates with different numbers. Koeman records two copies of a Dutch language issue of 1688 with 72 charts [Keu 16]; yet he also refers to another issue of the same date with the much bigger total of 151 charts [Keu 17]. Our copy contains 135 charts, beginning with the celestial chart after Ludovico Vlasbom, and the world map by Carel Allard [Shirley 517]. The plate total includes 65 of the 72 charts listed under Keu 16. The additional 70 charts give this copy of the atlas a truly global coverage, starting with the coastlines of the Mediterranean, then moving to the West Indies and the Americas - with individual charts of Florida, Carolina, New England, New Netherlands, New Foundland, the north east coast of America and Greenland [Burden 515]. There are 11 maps of Brazilian and 15 of African coasts. The atlas ends with van Keulen's famous chart of the 'Oost Indien', then Ceylon, his magnificent map of the South Pacific [Burden 518], and finally Asia. Arguably the greatest 17th-century Dutch sea-atlas, handsomelyengraved and beautifully hand-coloured. Cf. Koeman IV, pp.280-281, Keu 16 & 17.



First edition of a geographical guide known for its wealth of accurately delineated maps and views, most after the author, a skilled draughtsman with a background in mathematics and military engineering. In 1668, after serving Alfonso VI in Portugal, Mallet became mathematics master at the French court. His earlier *Travaux de Mars* (two editions, 1671 and 1684) was a treatise on fortification. Vol. I of the *Description* outlines the planetary system, vol. II is on Asia, III Africa, IV and first part of V Europe. The last vol. is more of a catch-all, also having the 'terres Australes' and 'L'Amérique' as its subject. Plate 125 is a map of Virginia, and 129 an attractive view of the settlement at Saint Augustine, Florida. There is a brief text 'De l'Isle de Californie' (p. 334), and plates 133 and 146 both depict California as an island, as do plates 79 and 86 in vol. I. A triumph of Dutch 17th-century map publishing [and piracy]. The Neptune françois was counterfeited by Pieter Mortier of Amsterdam who had all the plates from the French first edition very precisely re-engraved. The second part was not based on a French prototype but on manuscript charts engraved by Romein de Hooghe, at that time in the service of William III of England. Although it only contains nine large charts, 'this small number represents the most spectacular type of maritime cartography ever produced in 17th century Amsterdam' [Koeman IV, Mor 5]. Together the two parts constituted a most luxurious sea-atlas. 'Its charts are larger and more lavishly decorated than those of any preceding book of this kind ... This magnificent work was intended more as a show-piece than something to be used by the pilots at sea' (Koeman IV, p.424). The following six lots are maps from other copies of the *Neptune françois* (see previous two lots). Lots 62-65 are four maps by Romein de Hooghe, the famous Dutch artist who was at that time in the service of William III of England. They were commissioned by Pieter Mortier for the second part of his Amsterdam-published *Neptune françois*, which is complete with only nine de Hooghe charts. Although deriving from British charts, de Hooghe's artistic flair, decorative flourishes and the excellence of the engraving led Koeman to declare: 'this small number represents the most spectacular type of maritime cartography ever produced in 17th century Amsterdam.'

Lots 66 and 67 are maps from the first part of Mortier's Neptune françois, and are piracies made in collaboration with Hubert Jaillot. As Koeman discovered in his research, Mortier re-engraved the plates after the original French prototype Neptune françois by Charles Pène and others in a richly coloured version and added to the titles the words 'Levée et Gravée par Ordre du Roy à Paris 1693', though they were in fact engraved, coloured and published in Amsterdam by Mortier. All bar lot 65 are lavishly hand-coloured, almost in the style of paintings, with extravagant use of thick body colour, and details heightened in gold.




BLONDEL, Jacques-François (1705-1774). [Composite Atlas]. Paris: maps dated 1695-1769.

A unique, magnificent geographic artefact of the Enlightenment: the impressive hand-coloured atlas factice crafted by the great architect and mathematician Jacques-François Blondel, author of the 'Architecture' entry in the Encyclopédie, and hailed in Diderot and d'Alembert's preliminary discourse as the generous and talented polymath whom noone could have surpassed as a contributor to the summa of contemporary knowledge.

The title-page, in manuscript surrounded by an engraved border and a vignette rich with allusions to engineering disciplines, describes this endeavour as the carefully deliberate selection of the most detailed and precise maps available at the time: the first volume covering Europe with maps by Delisle, Jaillot, Robert among others, all 'enluminée proprement et à la manière d'Hollande'; the second exploring the coasts of Europe, Asia, Africa and America through maps by Bellin, based 'on the most recent discoveries', complemented by maps of the ancient world - all to achieve a work which, 'without multiplying its objects, contains all that is necessary to acquire in a short time a knowledge of all the parts of the earth and the sea'. Around 140 important maps fruit of the best of French 18th-century cartography make up this atlas, hand-picked amongst the best contemporary work to include celestial planispheres and Arctic and Antarctic hemispheres, as well as continental and more close-up national and regional maps: a veritable geographic Encyclopédie, therefore, compiled with the same esprit, method, motives and ambition as the eponymous publication to which Blondel was so committedly contributing.

This copy correlates with that in the Library of Congress (call no. G3312.S5P5 1715.D41), even down to the fact that both have inking errors in the lower central inset. LoC give a date of 1715, but theirs is without the lengthy letterpress description found at the bottom dated 1715 on other copies. Tooley's *Dictionary* in the Deshayes entry ascribes a date of c.1695, which seems about right: the copy in the BnF dated c.1685 has a strong impression with less plate wear than is evident in the present lot. **Very rare - the last copy we can trace selling at auction was in 2004.**



CORONELLI, Vicenzo Maria (1650-1718). An album containing a full suite of 25 engraved charts from the *Prima parte dello Specchio del Mare* [Venice: 1698].

One of the earliest Italian printed nautical atlases, no other part ever appearing. The charts were printed from plates obtained from Francesco Maria Levanto, who first published the work in Genoa, 1664. They follow the north coast of the Mediterranean from Gibraltar eastward to the Levant (the descriptive text is lacking); Coronelli's contribution amounted only to the 4? introductory plates and the portrait usually bound at the end. This album has 6 plates bound in, a frontispiece showing a naval battle with the manuscript title 'Stato Ecclesiastico' filling a blank cartouche, two portraits of Coronelli, one with the arms of Innocent XII at the head, the other including three putti and books by him, an allegorical plate of 'Gli Argonauti' (the Academy of the Argonauts), a doublepage plate of Venice triumphant, and a plate allegorizing Britannia with the royal arms. Confusingly the charts are also preceded by the cut-down letterpress title to Corso geografico [universale], published at Venice in 1692-93. This is not the source of the charts, though it suggests that some preliminary plates in the album may derive from this work rather than the Specchio. 

MORTIER, Pieter (1661-1711) – Les Costes de France et d'Espagne sur l'ocean et sur la mer Méditerranée. Amsterdam: Pieter Mortier, [1700?].

A rare sea atlas complete in itself, but also forming parts 13-14 of Mortier's Les Forces de l'Europe, Asie, Afrique et Amerique, ou Description des principales villes avec leurs fortifications (Amsterdam, 1702; see lot 80). This work in its first incarnation was published in Paris by S. Cramoisy in 1634, under the title Cartes générales et particulières de toutes les côtes de France, with charts after Christophe Tassin. After the expiration of the ten year royal privilege, Tassin sold the plates to Nicolas Berey and Antoine de Fer. A first edition under Nicolas de Fer's editorship, with many modifications to the plates, appeared in Paris in 1690, and reedited again in 1695. Mortier proceeded to engrave exact copies of de Fer's plates, and published his piracy sometime around 1700. The 20 coastal charts in volume I of this piracy conform with those in the 1695 edition. However, those in volume II differ and Spain has a stronger representation (Spain is omitted from Fer's original title). There are inconsistencies in the reported number of plates. WorldCat calls for 38 lettered plates and 2 not lettered, as found in our copy, and agreeing with Van der Krogt. Some copies include two wind charts rather than one as here. Pastoureau Fer VIII C (calling for 20 charts - vol. I only?); Palau 87687; Phillips, Atlases 2781a; Shirley BL M.FER-1d (31 charts); Van der Krogt IV-1, 482:2.

ROBIJN, Jacobus (1649-c.1710) – DANCKERTS, Cornelis, the younger (1664-1717). *Nieuw Aerdsch Pleyn* [Amsterdam: c.1700].

Magnificent world map centred on the North Pole. It first appeared in Robijn's sea atlas published sometime after 1686; this is the second state with Robijn's imprint replaced with that of Cornelis Danckerts, into whose hands the plates came in about 1700. The map is presented in a circular form on the equidistant azimuthal projection, in which the latitudes appear as equidistant concentric circles. This type of projection was used much more commonly for celestial maps, and such a star chart was devised by Andreas van Luchtenburg to accompany this terrestrial map. Keuning misdates the map to c.1660, misled by the unchanged cartography of the Pacific north of Japan, and the Australian coastal outline. Similarly, in North America, only one Great Lake

is depicted, and the toponym 'Nieu Nederland' appears on the East Coast as opposed to New York, as it was renamed in 1644. California is shown as an island with a flat northern coastline. In South America, the two mythical lakes Parime Lacus and Xarayes are depicted. J. The most complete set of Mortier's edition to appear at auction for almost 30 years. This extremely comprehensive collection of maps, plans and views of fortifications of European cities in France, Germany, and the Netherlands also includes a number of other regions, including Malta, Constantinople, Tripoli and several of the New World, including a plan of Quebec (Kershaw 279; bound in part 7). Conceived by de Fer in response to the rise in interest and popularity of Vauban's systems of fortifications (one of his plans appears on the engraved 'Introduction a la Fortification' title), it was originally published between 1690-1695. In this edition, Mortier copied exactly de Fer's work, re-engraved the plates, and added a 13th and 14th part comprising a sea atlas of the coasts of France and Spain. Pastoureau Fer IX H; Shirley BL T.MORT-5b; Van der Krogt IV-1, 482:2. There is a discrepancy in the number of plates called for in the bibliographies, since the letterpress titles are sometimes counted as plates. In this copy, the plates are numbered either in manuscript or with engraved plate numbers, the numeration including but not numbering the titles. It seems that the 14 folding plates present here only appear in this edition.

First published in 1671 in 26 charts, the *Northern Navigation* was issued initially as the first book of the *English Pilot*, later updated and enlarged by Mount and Page, and made into the second book. The present lot contains 31 charts, including 'A New and Exact Map of the part of the Coast of Norway... printed for Benja. Crowe' which is not mentioned in the relevant bibliographies; *Tooley's Dictionary* entry for Crowe only credits him with this one map, and dates it 1740. 



The English Pilot: The Fourth Book describing the West Indies Navigation from Hudson's Bay to the River Amazones. Dublin: Boulter Grierson, 1767.

The rarest edition of the American portion of the English Pilot, and one of the most important, since over half the maps are new. The Fourth Book 'had the longest publication history ... the content of the volume was established between the editions of 1706 and 1721,' and it was 'sufficiently in demand to justify thirty-seven legitimate editions from 1689 to 1794' (Verner, Bibliographical Note to the Fourth Book). Originally composed by W. Fisher and J. Thornton, it may have been in preparation in the mid- to late-1670s. George Grierson (1680-1753) of Dublin published a pirated edition in 1749, with the plates engraved by James Barlow. The present edition is by George Grierson's son, Hugh Boulter Greierson (d.1771), who employed the same plates by Barlow, but with some significant re-engraving; in fact it seems likely that over half the maps in the present lot are entirely new. Sabin finds the maps 'have a clear, rough, old-fashioned appearance ... and differ materially from the London editions of the work, containing generally more minute particulars'. Because the Griersons used the 1732 London edition of the English Pilot as a basis for their piracy, the present lot contains maps of Boston Harbor (see Burden II, 666, for 1689 and c.1691 eds only) not found in the London editions


of 1758 and 1767. 



The first authoritative Western atlas of China. Jean-Baptiste du Halde's 4-volume Description... de L'empire de la Chine et de la Tartarie Chinoise had appeared in 1735, with maps 'based on surveys made by Jesuit missionaries between 1708 and 1716, for the Emperor k'ang Hsi' (NMM). These maps, brilliantly executed by D'Anville, the royal geographer, were then re-engraved and issued in a separate atlas in Paris by Dezauche and in The Hague by Scheurleer (as above). 





CASSINI DE THURY, César François (1677-1756). Les Cartes de la France. Paris: 1744-1799(?).

Superbly hand-coloured copy of the first complete map of France surveyed by triangulation. 'The base of the triangulation was the verified meridian of Paris; along it, at intervals of 60,000 toises (rather more than 1° of latitude), perpendiculars were carried to east and west, from which the positions of towns and other landmarks were fixed. The project faced immense difficulties which were ultimately overcome. In 1756 the French Government withdrew its financial support, but Cassini formed a company which sought to recover its expenses from the sale of the maps. Later several provinces provided financial support. Cassini lived long enough to see the work practically completed before he died of smallpox on September 4, 1784. Publication was undertaken by his son, Jacques Dominique. The atlas appeared in 182 sheets in October 1789 ... It soon won universal acclaim and stands as model for all later map-making by triangulation' (NMM). The present lot includes the large folding map by Dupain-Triel, Carte de la généralité de





A fresh, very attractive copy of the first edition of the first general history of Canada by the great Jesuit travel writer and historian; the book was simultaneously issued under five imprints in 1744, with no priority. Charlevoix landed at Quebec, and surveyed the French settlements and trade routes along the St. Laurent and Mississippi valleys. His Nouvelle France is one of the best authorities concerning various Indian tribes, some of which no longer exist. The laborious accuracy with which the work was executed can be estimated by the fact that the maps, dated 1743, are marked with the latest discoveries, in 1742, in the extreme north of America' (Lande). The maps, including the important map of North America, are by Nicholas Bellin. Volume II includes a lengthy description of numerous plants, many native to Canada. Sixth edition of this 'landmark of British cartography'. In 1681 Collins was appointed by the Admiralty to undertake a complete survey of the coasts of Britain. 120 plans of harbours and stretches of coast were prepared, of which only 48 actually appeared in the atlas of 1693. 'The first complete pilot book in English of the entire British coast, including the Orkneys, Shetlands and Scillys', it went through at least fourteen later editions in a period of nearly a hundred years, undergoing remarkably little change of content. 


Rare French edition, the first to appear with the addition of the *History of the English pirates*, of Exquemelin's account of pirates' deeds and customs, including a thorough description of the Caribbean area. The French edition (it was first published in Dutch in Amsterdam in 1678), by Thomas de Frontigniers, was also directly based on the original manuscript. A ship's surgeon in the service of pirates, the chemist Exquemelin not only witnessed but also took part in several notorious pirate expeditions, such as that of the English buccaneer Henry Morgan ('John' in the book) including his raid on Maracaibo in 1669, and his 1670 attack on Panama. The additional text included in the fourth volume, the French version of an account of English pirates 'by Captain Charles Johnson', had appeared about twenty years earlier; it is the primary source of information on the piratesses Mary Read and Anne Bonny, and is believed by some to have been authored by Daniel Defoe. 



It is an important map because Bellin abandons the idea of Florida as an archipelago, although now Bellin depicts the Floridian peninsula with a very unusual, almost trapezoidal, shape. Bellin relied on the work of Valentin Devin and other French mapmakers for the depiction of the Gulf Coast, and the chart is very detailed, with numerous toponyms, soundings and directions of currents. 

In 1774, with the accession of her brother-in-law Louis XVI, she became the second woman of France after the queen to receive the appellation of 'Madame'. In 1791 she went into exile with her husband in England. When Louis XVII died on 8 June 1795, the comte de Provence was proclaimed Louis XVIII and Marie-Joséphine became 'de jure' queen consort of France. She died in 1810 in Hartwell House, Buckinghamshire, the English residence of the exiled French royal family. It was another four years before her husband finally succeeded as Louis XVIII

The earlier edition of 1749 by Arkstée and Merkus was the first edition in French of Anson's circumnavigation. Their second edition was more luxurious, being on a better quality of paper with 35 newly engraved plates, including an impressive folding world map by N. Bellin. The companion work on the wreck of the Wager, bound with it, is composed from journals kept by John Bulkeley and John Cummins, Alexander Campbell, Isaac Morris, and one anonymous author, published separately in London or Dublin between 1743 and 1751. 



A mighty 12 volume set, containing probably the largest grouping in private hands of the official navigational charts available for use in France at the beginning of the 19th century. The printing history of these charts is, and remains, complex. Some of the charts, such as those of the Baltic and North Sea coasts found in volume 1, were published as early as 1693 when they were issued in the Jaillot and Mortier Le Neptune françois. The earliest maps in this collection are those of the islands of St Christopher, Antigua (vol. 9) and Barbados (vol. 10) in the Caribbean, all dated 1758. Vols 8-10 focus on the Americas, with a few other relevant charts scattered in vols 11 and 12. There is quite a large focus on the Canadian north-eastern seaboard with approximately 25 maps on Newfoundland and various islands and coasts at the mouth of the St Lawrence; many of these are French editions of English surveys, such as those of Cook and Lane. The USA is represented by plans of Boston, Rhode Island, the eastern seaboard from New Jersey south to Florida, Chesapeake Bay, the Carolinas and northern Florida. These continue in vol. 9 with maps of the Gulf of Mexico, Central America, the northern coast of South America and the Caribbean; vol. 10 is mainly dedicated to South America, with further South American maps in vol. 12. These latter are the latest in the collection, dated 1833. Asia, particularly French Indochina and Cochin China, is delineated in vol. 11, alongside a large three-sheet map of Arabia and the Red Sea dated 1798. Vol. 2 features maps of the British Isles, vols 3, 4 and 6 France, vol. 5 focuses on Spain and Portugal, while vol. 7 centres on the Mediterranean including some wonderful charts of the Greek archipelago. The collection is bound in a robust institutional style binding, with strong metal fixtures securing the maps. Evidently some of the charts have been removed from the volumes, but overall it retains its integrity, and reflects an institutional requirement of issuing updated charts to replace those either lost or bearing obsolete information. cf. The 'Instructions sur la navigation de la France aux Indes', placed at the head of the atlas, form an important text. 'The author gives directions for navigating to Brazil, and the position of Rio. It [the atlas] also contains a plan of Rio (plate 50) made by the author in 1757' (Borba de Moraes I, 43). In navigation to the east, careful consideration is given to China routes (see pp.146-179, 191-192); plate 52 is a chart of the China Sea. Cordier I, 134 calls the atlas 'ce superbe ouvrage' and for Lust 162 it is 'a vast, superb volume'. Four of the charts are by Alexander Dalrymple, a personal friend of the author's. 



Important sea chart showing the opening up of the Pacific Ocean and the discoveries of Australasia immediately prior to the great voyages of Bougainville and Cook. Originally issued in 1742, this fine chart, issued by the French Dépôt de la Marine, depicts a Pacific world with California correctly shown as a peninsula, a fairly accurate Far East Asia, and a view of Australasia showing the discoveries of various Dutch explorers, including Willem Janszoon and Abel Tasman. However, the discoveries of the explorers Samuel Wallis, Louis-Antoine de Bougainville and James Cook (whose voyages had been completed by this publication date) have yet to be added, so the depiction of the Australian continent is distorted, with imagined dotted coastlines joining Tasmania and New Guinea with the mainland. The west coast of New Zealand emerges unformed from a vast Pacific which is dotted with mostly imaginary islands, although the Marquesas Islands and Vanuatu are accurately shown. The aim of the voyage was firstly to return Mayoa, a Tahitian who had sailed with Bougainville in 1769 to France, to his native homeland; and secondly to endeavour to discover the great southern continent 'Terra Australis' with the aim of strategically frustrating the British. Setting sail in 1771, Mayoa unfortunately died early on the voyage near Madagascar. After putting into Mauritius in October 1771, the expedition sailed south, where they discovered the Crozet Islands in January 1772. The following month the expedition reached Tasmania, and then continued eastwards to explore the coast of New Zealand. Landing at the Bay of Natives, the French stayed for 6 weeks before being attacked by local Maoris. Marion-Dufresne and 21 of his men were killed. The junior officers Ambroise Le Jar Du Clesmeur and Julien-Marie Crozet avenged the death of their companions,


and continued the navigation towards the island of Guam and the Philippines, before returning to Mauritius in 1773. Crozet's narrative, published here for the first time, contains more than just a dramatic account of the massacre, being a long and important description of New Zealand, with careful observation of Maori habits and customs. 


The superb Bédoyère copy of 'one of the finest narratives of maritime exploration ever written' (Howell). Printed on large paper, and with an additional portrait, this copy is one of 12 examples with plates before letters, and one of 3 examples with plates in two states, engraved and etched (as stated in the 1837 sale catalogue entry). La Pérouse, a veteran of the American Revolution and the Seven Years' War, commanded the Astrolabe and the Boussole on a voyage of scientific discovery that took him and his men over many parts of the Pacific in the years 1786-88. The voyage is especially celebrated for its accurate mapping of the Alaskan and Californian coasts. When in Kamchatka (September 1887) La Pérouse despatched a messenger, De Lesseps, to travel overland across Russia with his journal to date. Thus, though he and his crew disappeared completely from view after sailing north from Botany Bay on 10 March 1788, the revolutionary government in France was able to publish the greater part of his records, 'mines of cartographic and scientific information about the Pacific' (Australian Dictionary of Biography).

The comte de la Bédoyère, early owner of this copy, was a colonel of cavalry, chevalier de la Légion d'honneur, and from 16 March 1829 a member of the Société des Bibliophiles français. His first library was sold in 1837; he formed a second library of equal renown, sold in 1862 following his death. His younger brother, Charles Angélique François Huchet, comte de l'Empire (1786-1815), was a French general under Napoleon, executed after Waterloo. 



After being exiled to Siberia by the Russians, Benyowsky led 70 prisoners on an escape mission out of Kamchatka, sailing to Japan, Formosa, and China, before being commissioned by the French government to found a colony on Madagascar. 



First edition, a superb set on large paper and bound by Bozerian, of this important account of the second French circumnavigation. This narrative of the first French commercial voyage to the Pacific Northwest is a 'very important and authorative work for the history of the northwest coast' (Lada-Mocarski). It was issued in two forms: 'Simultaneously with this quarto edition there appeared an octavo edition with a quarto atlas. The all-quarto edition... is to be preferred' (Lada-Mocarski). Marchand, commander of the voyage, had learned of the lucrative potential for the fur trade in that region from the British captain, Portlock. He sailed via Cape Horn, stopped at the Marguesas, and traded along the Northwest Coast in the summer of 1791. He gives detailed descriptions of Norfolk Sound and Sitka, followed by a particularly detailed account of the Queen Charlotte Islands, and further explorations as far as the southern end of Vancouver island. From North America, Marchand sailed to Hawaii and then on to Macao, where he failed

to sell his valuable cargo of furs. He then returned to France, where the Revolutionary government confiscated his cargo. The voyage was a loss for its investors, Marchand died in 1793, and Count Fleurieu, himself an experienced Pacific explorer, took over the editing and publication of the material from the voyage, as well as adding an authorative history of exploration en route. The detailed maps are of Alaska and the Northwest Coast, the Marquesas, and Hawaii. 
The search for La Pérouse, two years after his disappearance, was undertaken by Admiral Joseph-Antoine Bruni d'Entrecasteaux on aboard the Recherche, and Huon de Kermadec on the Espérance. The voyage, which took them on the first circumnavigation of Australia, was fortunate in having the eminent botanist Labillardière among its savants, and also the leading French hydrographer Charles-François Beautemps-Beaupré whose maps, particularly of Tasmania, 'set a new high standard' (D. Hill). However it suffered from a dual purpose. In addition to hunting for La Pérouse, d'Entrecasteaux was instructed to chart the still unknown south coast of Australia. A report of natives wearing French naval uniform, being seen near the Admiralty Islands north of New Guinea, made him head in that direction from the Cape of Good Hope. But contrary winds forced him to take the long route via Van Diemen's Land, where the expedition spent five weeks before sailing north along the east coast of Australia. Finding no evidence of a wreck, the ships then sailed on to the Dutch settlement at Amboina. After a four months refit in the tropics and an infestation of cockroaches, they returned to Cape Leeuwin to begin their survey of the south Australian coastline. Shortage of water preventing completion of this, they returned straight to Van Diemen's Land, staying thirty-eight days and making a first prolonged contact with the indigenous people for an estimated 10,000 years (Mulvaney p. 73). The social interchanges were carefully recorded by the expedition artist, Jean Piron (see plates 4-5). Resuming the search for La Pérouse, the French ships went north to New Zealand, the Friendly Islands (Tonga) and New Caledonia, passing within 60 kilometres of Recherche Island (later renamed Vanikoro in the



Solomon Islands), where he had been fatally wrecked. Scurvy, dysentery, and news of the war between republican France and Holland eventually brought the search and the survey work to an end; several of the expedition's mainly royalist officers died. Labilladière, a Republican, was able to retain his journal, but must have been unhappy when the English navy carried away ninety cases of documents and specimens; thanks to Joseph Banks, these were eventually returned. Labilladière's *Relation du Voyage*, the first statement by the d'Entrecasteaux expedition, was published simultaneously in quarto and octavo, to be followed by his description of the flora of Australia 1804-07, and the *Voyage de Dentrecasteaux* in 1807-08. 

Bellin's nautical charts make up the best, most comprehensive and most accurate sea atlas of his time. This copy was in the personal library of Charles-Eugène-Gabriel, marquis de la Croix de Castries (1727-1801, binding) French Secretary of State of the Navy. Its success can be put down to more accurate and more detailed than any English atlas. The reason for this was the establishment of a central office for hydrography in France at the beginning of the 18th century, to which the naval officers had to provide accurate information

First French edition of Vancouver's voyage, 'printed in both a more attractive manner and on better paper than the English edition' (Forbes). Vancouver served on Captain Cook's second and third voyages, and was stationed in the West Indies for some years before being asked to undertake a hydrographic survey of the northwest coast of America. This followed the signing of the Nootka Sound Convention in 1790 which confirmed the rights of Britain in the region. Between leaving Falmouth in 1791 and returning home in 1795, Vancouver's two ships sailed about 55,000 miles. 'This voyage became one of the most important ever made in the interests of geographical knowledge' (Hill). Over three summer surveying seasons, Vancouver circumnavigated the island subsequently named after him, and disproved the existence of a passage between the Pacific and Hudson's Bay. His men covered more than 10,000 miles in small boats, and delineated more than 1700 miles of coastline



First edition in English of one of the most elegantly illustrated navigational books ever published. Bougard's *Le petit flambeau de la mer* was first published in 1684. Serres translated the work and added his magnificent views to this English edition. The plates are views of headlands, ports, lighthouses, landmarks and harbour entrances which served as visual guides for navigators. Serres turned these utilitarian subjects into art, depicting more than 50 vessels in the plates in all states of rigging and attitude, from a man of war to a 12-oared galley with lateen sails. Serres was Marine Painter to the King, as had been his equally famous father Dominique the elder. The plates include fine town views of Valletta, Palermo, Naples and La Spezia and the 24 harbour plans show soundings and approaches to Atlantic and Mediterranean ports from Dieppe to Corfu. 

We can only trace one copy of this enlarged edition in an institution (Library of Congress); the only similar auction record was for a copy with 12 charts only dated 1788-94, sold in these rooms 6 Nov 1980, lot 266, £1,000 hammer. Laurie and Whittle succeeded the business of Robert Sayer when he died in January 1794. They reissued Sayer's charts under their joint imprint, and amended and added to them. Their first issue of the *African Pilot*, with a title-page dated 1799, included 13 charts on 14 sheets (see Shirley *BL* M.LAU-1a), while our issue contains 14 maps, reconciling with Phillips *Atlases* 4082, which dates it to [1794]-1802. Several charts consist of two or three joint sections.


Prince Albert of Saxe-Teschen's copy of the first edition of Baudin's expedition to Australia, the great French voyage which rivalled Flinders's achievements. The expedition was commanded by Nicolas Baudin for the Institute of France in 1800 and was charged with making a full and minute examination of the Australian coasts, particularly the southern coast 'where there is supposed to be a strait communicating with the Gulf of Carpentaria and which consequently would divide New Holland into two large and almost equal islands.' Baudin discovered some two hundred miles of coast between Encounter Bay and Cape Banks, thus completing the discovery of the unknown south coast begun by Flinders and Grant, and also reported in detail on Tasmania, Western Australia, and Sydney. Of further importance was the very large zoological collection prepared by Peron, naturalist on the voyage, 'that was known for years for its excellence' (Hill). 





First separate edition of an important work on nautical surveying and the construction of sea charts, by the 'father of hydrography'. The author, in the role of *premier ingénieur hydrographe*, accompanied d'Entrecasteaux in his search for traces of La Perouse's ships, making detailed hydrographic surveys of islands in the Pacific. A monumental collection of French coastal charts by 'the father of hydrography' Beautemps-Beaupré, chief hydrographer and keeper of the Dépôt de la Marine (predecessor of the Naval Hydrographic and Oceanographic Service) from 1814. He took part in all the important hydrographic labours undertaken during the Empire and the Restoration.

Two volumes, large folio (675 x 513mm), gathering a total of 74 engraved charts, sometimes with small areas accented in contemporary yellow colouring (repair in the upper margin of one leaf, far from engraving, 5 charts uniformly and lightly browned, a few reinforced at gutter, generally very good). First edition. Beautemps-Beaupré was appointed chief hydrographer and keeper of the Dépôt de la Marine (predecessor of the Naval Hydrographic and Oceanographic Service) in 1814. He took part in all the important hydrographic labors undertaken during the Empire and the Restoration, and became known as 'the father of hydrography'. Polak 518.


Deluxe issue – large-paper, richly coloured, and extra-illustrated with an additional plate of Le Havre – of the first complete edition of a pictorial survey of northern France. Originally issued in parts, the first 3 under the title Voyage pittoresque dans les ports et sur les côtes de France, the work was available in five forms, plain; before letters; before letters on india paper; coloured; coloured, large paper, each correspondingly more expensive. The deluxe issue cost almost 4 times the plain one. The present copy, like that described in Abbey, has an additional plate of 'Havre, vue de la rade' which is not listed in the table and is not present in most copies. As Abbey notes, although the book was published in Paris for the French market, Osterwald

employed two English artists and four English engravers, reflecting the high reputation enjoyed by the English in this field at the time. Abbey *Travel* 92; Barbier II, 367; Brunet II, 1130.

Very rare, fully coloured copy of the first edition of Choris' splendid plates to illustrate Kotzebue's world voyage of 1815-1818. Lada Mocarski calls it: 'One of the very valuable and fundamental works on Alaska, California, and the Hawaiian islands', an assertion made on the strength that this work contains more plates relating to these American locations than any other work of the period. In addition, there are wonderful plates detailing Kamchatka, the Philippines, Chile and Easter Island.


It is arranged in 8 sections which were first sold in 22 livraisons, 1820-1822 (although both Brunet and Howes state that publication ended in 1823). Two title-pages were printed, dated 1820 to accompany the first *livraison*, and 1822 for the successive parts. According to Forbes, there was only one issue of the text and plates.

The text was written and edited by J.B. Eyries and the list of subscribers accounts for 188 copies. Two variant plates are noted by bibliographers, both present here: plate II for the Sandwich Islands shows Kamehameha in a black robe, and plate XVI has been re-worked to include a lush background with the artist seated in the foreground watching dancers. Choris' manuscript text of the voyage was never published but his album is highly prized for its beauty and its historical record. Forbes writes that it contains 'a final and very beautiful pictorial examination of the Hawaiian Islands and of Hawaiian culture as it existed prior to the death of Kamehameha I in 1819, and prior to the abolition of the "kapu" or feudal system following the king's death.' Altogether there are 19 plates relating to Hawaii, and a further 12 on California. FREYCINET, Louis-Claude de Saulces de (1779-1842). Voyage autour du Monde...éxécuté sur les corvettes de S. M. l'Uranie et la Phisicienne, pendant les années 1817, 1818, 1819 et 1820. Paris: Imprimerie Royale for Pillet aîné, 1824-1837.

Very rare complete set of the official account of Freycinet's voyage of scientific exploration: one of the most important French 19th-century circumnavigations of the globe. 'Complete sets are of the greatest rarity' (Wantrup, p.159). In 1800-1804, under Napoleon's sponsorship, Freycinet sailed to the Pacific in 1800-1804 with Captain Nicolas Baudin, and had explored the western seaboard of Australia, Tasmania and Timor. With the Bourbon dynasty now restored, Frecyinet was given the command of his own voyage of exploration in order show the French flag and undertake a major series of scientific observations. The Uranie entered the Pacific from the West, visiting western Australia, Timor, New Guinea, the Mariana Islands, Caroline Islands, Hawaii, New South Wales, New Zealand, and then back to the Atlantic via Tierra del Fuego, before becoming shipwrecked in the Falkland Islands. There, Freycinet purchased the American ship Mercury, renamed the Physicienne, and returned to Le Havre via Montevideo and Rio de Janeiro. Jacques Arago (see lot 194) served as the expedition's artist, while Louis Isidore Duperrey (see lot 178) was second-in-command. Extraordinarily, Freycinet's wife, Rose, could $not\,bear\,to\,separated\,from\,her\,husband, and\,was\,smuggled\,on\,board\,the\,\textit{Uranie}.\,Her\,presence\,was\,only$ revealed to the crew after the ship was well out of sight of the French coast, and although the crew were uncomfortable with her presence, she completed the voyage. Her journal of her time onboard was only published a century later, in 1927. DUPERREY, Louis-Isidore (1786-1865). Voyage autour du Monde, executé per ordre du Roi, sur la Corvette La Coquille de sa Majesté, pendant les annies 1822, 1823, 1824 et 1825. Paris: Firmin Didot for Arthus Bertrand, 1826-1830.

One of the rarest of the *Grands Voyages*, an exceptional copy set apart by its completeness. The complicated nature of its publication means that this book is rarely found complete: this set has the 'Physique' which is called for only by Hill; Ferguson is the only bibliography to call for a part entitled *Memoire*, which is not present here. The voyage, led by Duperrey, concentrated on the exploration of the Pacific. The *Coquille* 'called at Brazil, the Falkland islands, Concepcion, Callao, and Payta. The Pacific islands visited were the Tuamotu Archipelago, Tahiti and the Society Islands, Tonga, Rotuma, the Gilbert and Caroline Islands, and the Bismarck Archipelago. Australia was visited twice, and explorations made of New Zealand and of the Maoris were of particular significance. Vast quantities of ethnographic and scientific data were collected. Before returning to Marseilles, Java, Mauritius, and Ascension were visited' (Hill 517). 

First edition of 'This fine series of views ... issued separately nine years before the official account of H. Bougainville's voyage was published' (Hill), including fine views of Singapore, the Philippines, the Bourbon Islands in the Pacific, Australia, Brazil and Argentina. The son of Louis Antoine de Bougainville (1729-1811) who had circumnavigated the world in 1766-1779, French naval officer Hyacinthe de Bougainville set sail from France in March 1824 with the ships *Thétis* and L'Espérance on a diplomatic mission to Réunion, Cochin-China, Pondicherry in the Indian Ocean, Manila and Macao. He returned across the Pacific, retracing his father's previous circumnavigation and, after anchoring at Port Jackson for three months, returned to France via Rio de Janiero. DUMONT D'URVILLE, Jules Sébastien César, le Comte (1790-1842). Voyage de la Corvette l'Astrolabe exécuté par ordre du roi, pendant les années 1826-1827-1828-1829. Paris: J. Tastu, 1830-1833.

Extremely rare and desirable set of the first edition of Dumont d'Urville's voyage in the Astrolabe. This important voyage was one in a great series undertaken by the French government in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries for scientific and political purposes. Led by Jules Dumont d'Urville, its intention 'was to gain additional information about the principal groups of islands in the Pacific and to augment the mass of scientific data acquired by Louis Duperrey [see lot 178]. The Astrolabe sailed south, around the Cape of Good Hope, and arrived at Port Jackson. Proceeding to New Zealand, its coast, especially the southern part of Cook Strait, was surveyed with great care. Tonga and parts of the Fiji Archipelago were explored, then New Britain, New Guinea, Amboina, Tasmania, Vanikoro, Guam and Java. The return home was by way of Mauritius and the Cape of Good Hope. Huge amounts of scientific materials were collected and published' (Hill). It is seldom found complete; this copy is without the plates to the Entomologie part. The majority of the plates are after de Sainson, the expedition's official artist or 'Dessinateur', and show ethnological artefacts and portraits, scenes from the daily life of indigenous peoples and views of ports and anchorages, including Sydney, Hobart, Cape Town and Saint Helena.

'In December 1829, Laplace was commissioned to take an expedition to India, the East Indies and South East Asia, and then, if he chose to do so, proceed through the South Pacific. His instructions were to provide protection for French merchant vessels and obtain at each port-of-call information which might be of value to French trade' (Hill). Departing from Toulon, La Favorite rounded the Cape of Good Hope in early March and arrived at Singapore in August, before crossing the South China Sea for Manila. Laplace then visited Macao, Canton and Indochina, making detailed nautical charts of the region. He proceeded to Sydney and New Zealand, from where he sailed westwards to South America, landing at Valparaiso and Rio de Janeiro, and ultimately returning to Toulon after 482 days at sea. 'From the scientific viewpoint, Laplace's voyage was one of the most successful. The maps made from surveys in the Pacific and the collections which were assembled became famous during that period' (Borba de Moraes). DU PETIT-THOUARS, Abel Aubert (1793-1864). Voyage autour du Monde sur la frégate la Vénus pendant les années 1836-1839. Paris: Gide, 1840-1864.

A fine, complete set of the official account of this important voyage. 'This voyage, ostensibly to report on the whale fisheries in the Pacific, was political in nature. The presence of the frigate Vénus in ports around the world would be of value to French commerce and diplomacy. After rounding Cape Horn, the expedition made calls up the coast of South America, to Hawaii, Kamchatka, and to California in order to assist French traders who had been clamouring for support for some time. **Dupetit-Thouars' account** of his stay in California, in 1837, is one of the most important and complete records of the Mexican period. In 1838, the Vénus made a run for Easter Island, further investigated the coast of South America, then sailed for the Galapagos and Marquesas Islands, Tahiti, and New Zealand. At Tahiti, the expedition forced Queen Pomaré to write to the King of France apologizing for mistreatment of French priests, to pay an indemnity, and to salute the French flag. He had also made a treaty with Kamehameha III of Hawaii. After visits to Sydney and Mauritius, the ship sailed home, arriving after a voyage of thirty months' (Hill). 

A fine set in contemporary morocco of the first edition of this important 'Grand Voyage': a 'sumptuous and impressive production' (Ellis/Mengel). 'The aims of this expedition were to explore the south polar regions and various island groups in the Pacific. The expedition reached the pack ice in January 1838 but failed to penetrate it or get south of the 64th parallel. Returning eastward they visited the South Orkney and South Shetland Islands and discovered Joinville Island and Louis Philippe Land. They then proceeded to Valparaiso and Juan Fernandez Island and landed at Mangareva, the Marquesas, Tahiti, Samoa, and Tonga. Proceeding to Fiji, Guam, and Palau, the ships afterwards coasted along New Guinea and circumnavigated Borneo. In 1840, from Tasmania, they returned to the Antarctic region where Adelie Land was discovered. An extensive visit was made to New Zealand. The return voyage took them through the Torres Strait to Timor, La Réunion, and St. Helena' (Hill). 



The second part of the voyage commenced from Denmark, and sailed to the Faroe Islands, before returning to mainland Europe, with visits to Hamburg and Lubeck, before exploring the Mecklenburg-Vorpommern coastline of the Baltic. The experiments conducted during the expedition led to discoveries in the fields of oceanography, atmospheric and glaciological studies, and zoology. Extensive observations were also made of the aurora borealis, leading to several beautiful lithographic illustrations of the phenomenon based on sketches by Louis Bevalet. There are an extensive number of views of Sweden and Finland, as well as of Poland - including a few spectacular plates of the subterranean passages in Polish mines - and Russia. 





A mid-19th-century compendium of South Pacific zoological watercolours charting the exploration and discovery of the flora and fauna of French Polynesia under the sailor and naturalist Captain Charles Noury (1809-1868): an important natural history work, recently rediscovered. For three years from 1847, Charles Noury captained the French frigate *La Sirene* stationed in Tahiti and the Marquesas, returning to France in 1850 with the extraordinary fruits of his labours in the South Pacific: a naturalist's treasure trove of watercolours depicting the fish, birds, reptiles, crustacea, molluscs, zoophytes, and plants of French Polynesia. Upon his return, Noury imposed taxonomic order on the collection, grouping the watercolours in albums and writing up his notes from Polynesia into a register of species, in which he gives a description and observations for each one, often including the names by which the Pacific islanders knew them. Noury produced only a handful of the plates himself – the painter, or painters, aboard *La Sirene* who captured



the likeness of hundreds of South Pacific animals and plants remains a mystery to us - but his close supervision is evident throughout, not least at the junctures in his text where he criticises the way his artist has rendered a certain species. Back in France, with full bibliographic resources now at his disposal, the significance of the watercolours for the contemporary study of the animals and plants of the South Pacific was clear; of the 184 species of fish that he describes, 28 were unknown to science at that time. Yet, in spite of their importance for natural history and undeniable aesthetic appeal, the present volumes were not designed for publication; the only record of Noury's three years in French Polynesia that he did bequeath to the French academic community was his Album polynésien of 1861, a collection of images of objects from Tahiti and Nuku Hiva of ethnographic, rather than zoological, interest. Although the botanist Édélestan Jardin (1822-1896) made intriguing reference in 1858 to the fact that 'Monsieur le capitaine de vaisseau Noury [...] possède un album de dessins accompagnés de notes dont la publication serait fort désirable', the albums remained unpublished and unknown to science for over 160 years: it is only now that the importance of these volumes can be recognised and they can assume their place in the canon of 19th-century natural history.

Charles Noury was born in Nantes in 1809, joining the naval academy at Angoulême as a young man in 1823. He first set sail as an apprentice in 1824; by the time he left France for Tahiti in 1846, he was an experienced naval veteran of 37 years old, who had logged over 180 months of service. He was without academic training as a natural historian, but French Polynesia was ripe for scientific enquiry at that time and Noury would have welcomed an occupation during the 20 months he spent in Papeete, capital of Tahiti, along with the nine spent in the Marquesas. The relative paucity of information on the South Pacific in the 19th century was both a blessing and a curse for an amateur: scientific researchers often accompanied voyages such as Noury's, sharing cabins with the captain and officers, and working on cataloguing rare or unknown species together.





GARNIER, Francis (1839-1873) and Ernest DOUDART DE LAGRÉE (1823-1868). Voyage d'exploration en Indo-Chine effectué pendant les années 1866, 1867 et 1868 par une Commission Française. Paris: Hachette, 1873 [-1875].

First edition of one of the most beautifully illustrated books on Indo-China. Garnier served with the French navy in the Far East in 1859, as part of Admiral Charner's forces fighting the Vietnamese in the Mekong delta. There, he formed the idea of exploring the Mekong as a way of opening up French colonisation of the area, with the prospect of commercial access from French territory to China and its fabled markets, in direct challenge to British imperial ambition in southeast Asia. Garnier sought, and received, the support in this endeavour of the Minister of the Marine and Colonies, Marquis de Chasseloup-Laubat, as well as the Governor General and commander of the Cochinchina naval station, Admiral Pierre-Paul de La Grandière. However, La Grandière thought Garnier too young and inexperienced to be in command, and the chief authority was given to Captain Doudart de Lagrée.

The expedition left Saigon on 5 June 1866, but, with the discovery on 18 August of the 20 metre-high Khone Falls, the prospect of using the Mekong as a navigable trade route evaporated. Undeterred, the expedition split into different parties, exploring to the east and west (including Angkor Wat) throughout the following months, before reuniting and heading northwards, reaching Vientiane on 4 April 1867, and then Luang Prabang, capital of Laos, on 29 April. Lagrée at this point wanted to abandon the expedition due to political uncertainty in the region, but Garnier persisted, and they headed further up the river, before leaving the Mekong to seek the Red River overland. The expedition reached Yuan-chiang on the river on 17 November. Again, Lagrée wanted to take the expedition back to the South China Sea down the Red River, but once more the junior Garnier won him over, and the expedition again turned north, entering China, and reaching Kunming on 23 December


At the suggestion of French missionaries, the expedition continued north to Huitse, where Lagrée fell ill. Leaving the senior officer there, Garnier led a detachment to Talifu, the capital of Sultan Suleiman, leader of the Yunnan rebels. Upon his return to Huitse, Garnier found that Lagrée had died. Having exumed his body, Garnier led the party down the Yangtze River to the Chinese coast, and thence, by way of Ipin, Hankow and Shanghai, back to Saigon where Lagrée was buried.

The expedition covered over 6000 kilometres of previously unmapped terrain, and traced the course of the Mekong as far as Keng Hung. Although it had shown the Mekong was not a viable trading route, it now offered the Red River as a new prospect, and French imperial efforts concentrated extending colonial rule northwards from Cochin China. 





The Hyacinth saw action during a minor incident of the Somaliland campaign, which involved the recapture of the port of Ilig in Somaliland on 21 April 1904 from a Dervish force: Openshaw's log adds a narrative of the operation and its aftermath, including a brutally indifferent reference to the destruction of Ilig village ('The Marines had meanwhile descended to Illig Village &, having shot everybody in it, burnt it to the ground'). Where Christie's has provided a Minimum Price Guarantee it is at risk of making a loss, which can be significant, if the lot fails to sell. 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
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
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
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
