of archaistic fanghu form, the hexagonal body rising from a splayed foot to a waisted neck, flanked by a pair of tubular lug handles, the exterior finely painted in rich cobalt-blue with composite lotus and peony scrolls wreathed by feathery foliage, similarly decorated around the angled shoulders and handles, the neck encircled with a band of crested waves, all between a keyfret band at the rim and stylised florets at the foot, the base with a seal mark in underglaze blue 46.5 cm. 18¼ in.

This large vase, densely decorated with Ming-style composite flower scrolls, belongs to a group of vessels that is inspired by celebrated traditions while being firmly rooted in the modernity of the eighteenth century. Compare a closely related example in the National Palace Museum, Taipei, included in the Museum's Special Exhibition of K'ang-Hsi, Yung-Cheng and Ch'ien-Lung Porcelain Ware From The Ch'ing Dynasty, 1986, cat. no. 68; one in the Capital Museum, Beijing, illustrated in Gems of the Official Kilns, Taipei, 1993, pl. 84; and a third example in the Nanjing Museum, Nanjing, published in Treasures In The Royalty. The Official Kiln Porcelain of The Chinese Qing Dynasty, Shanghai, 2003, pl. 238. Further vases include two sold in our Hong Kong rooms, the first, from the T. Y. Chao collection, 24th November 1987, lot 75 and again, 1st November 1999, lot 386, and the other, 8th October 2008, lot 2567: one sold in these rooms, 10th June 1986, lot 277: and another sold at Christie's New York, 30th May 1991, lot 324.

the inverted bell-shaped body rising from a ribbed spreading foot to an everted rim, finely enamelled around the exterior with Shoulao offering a peach to a young boy held aloft by Fu Xing, with Lu Xing looking on, all divided by a two-column poem, all between iron-red bat bands at the rim and foot 10.5 cm, $4\frac{1}{4}$ in.

The poem may be translated as follows: In the heavens, the Three Terraces, On Earth, a first quality vessel.

A similar cup from the Bernat collection, was sold in our Hong Kong rooms, 15th November 1988, lot 37.

It is unusual to find *famille-rose* wares with these borders of red bats, which are more often found on 'birthday' plates, sometimes with Kangxi reign marks, decorated in white slip or gilding with *shou* characters or auspicious inscriptions and dragons.

the baluster body rising from a short straight foot to a tall waisted neck with flaring rim, brightly and finely enamelled around the exterior with the Dragon Festival, the river landscape with numerous boys both watching and sailing on dragon boats, all between *ruyi*, keyfret and gilt bands at the shoulder and foot, the neck with lotus strapwork between stiff leaf and *ruyi* bands and reserved on a lime-green ground, the interior of the neck glazed turquoise, the base with the iron-red seal mark reserved on a turquoise ground 35.5 cm. 14 in.

Exquisitely decorated with a delightful scene of boys playacting dragon boat racing, the style of the present vase was pioneered during the Qianlong period to resemble paintings mounted between textile borders. Such vases are considered to have been produced at the imperial kilns in Jingdezhen during the early years of the Jiaqing Emperor's reign. The excitement and joyfulness of the boys is skilfully captured in their animated expressions and poses, which are heightened by the restrained depiction of the rippling water. It successfully combines several decorative elements, from the luxurious green-ground borders to the continuous narrative that is revealed with every turn of the vase, akin to unravelling a textile-mounted handscroll.

The depiction of 'a hundred boys at play', representing the wish for many sons, was a popular theme in the decorative arts of the Ming and Qing dynasties. The 'hundred boys' refers to King Wen of the Zhou dynasty who had ninety-nine sons and adopted one more to make one hundred. As the link between classical education and a prosperous family grew in the Ming period, luxury goods made for the literati increasingly portrayed boys and fertility symbols. The image of children imitating adults, by engaging in activities connected with scholarly pursuits or auspiciousness, reveals an intense ambition among the educated elite for their sons to achieve high intellectual status and preserve the literary prestige of the family.

The boys on the present vase merrily re-enact the Duanwu Festival, also popularly known as Dragon Boat Festival and Zhongxiao Festival, which occurs annually on the fifth day of the fifth month. Dragon boat racing is said to originate from the legend of people paddling out on boats to recover the body of the poet Qu Yuan (343-278 BC), a patriotic poet and exiled official during the Warring States period. He drowned himself in the Miluo River on the fifth day of the fifth month, when his

beloved Chu State fell to the State of Qin. Dragon boat races were held annually at the Yuanming yuan, a day that was filled with excitement as crowds eagerly anticipated the arrival of huge wooden boats, elaborately decorated with dragons or sea birds at the prow and stern, and flying flags. Powered by forty to eighty experienced rowers and a drummer who set the rhythm for the oarsmen, crews also contained acrobats or exhorters thus increasing the spectacle of the event.

Compare a smaller vase of related form, but with a slightly broader body and flanked with loop handles, decorated with a similar scene of boys engaged in playful dragon boat racing between blue borders, also with an iron-red Jiaging mark and of the period, in the National Palace Museum, Taipei, included in the Museum's exhibition Lord Jiaqing and the Journey to Taiwan: A Special Exhibition on Cultural Artifacts of the Oing Emperor Renzong, 2016, cat. no. III-33; and a ruby-red ground pair, in the Huaihaitang collection, included in the exhibition Ethereal Elegance. Porcelain Vases of the Imperial Qing. The Huaihaitang Collection, Art Museum, The Chinese University of Hong Kong, Hong Kong, 2007, cat. no. 138, together with a yellow-ground Daoguang version, painted with boys cheering adult dragon boat racers with a four-character Shengdetang mark, cat. no. 140. The pair to the Daoguang vase was sold in our Hong Kong rooms, 28th April 1992, lot 185, again in these rooms, 8th December 1992, lot 296, and a third time at Christie's Hong Kong, 30th May 2006, lot 1460.

Vases decorated with the theme of boys at play, painted between coloured borders, were produced in numerous variations during the Jiaqing reign; for example see a bottle vase depicting a lively 'hundred boys' scene against a limegreen ground, sold at Christie's South Kensington, 17th May 2013, lot 1504; another, but between turquoise bands, sold at Bonhams Hong Kong, 27th November 2014, lot 187; and another, but decorated with nine boys at play, also against lime-green borders, sold in our New York rooms, 13th September 2017, lot 32. The motif of boys at play is also seen on earlier Qianlong period wares; compare a lantern-shape vase with the bajixiang painted on green enamel bands, illustrated in Qing Imperial Porcelain of the Kangxi, Yongzheng and Qianlong Reigns, Nanjing, 1995, pl. 87; and ruby-red ground version, sold at Christie's Hong Kong, 29th/30th October, 1995, lot 756, and again in our New York rooms, 17th March 2009. lot 123.

An Appreciation of A Qianlong-Era Monumental Spinach-Green Jade Washer

Dr. Xu Lin, The Palace Museum, Beijing

This monumental spinach-green jade washer measures 50 cm in width at its widest point and 12.8 cm in height. Its mouth is 34.8 cm in diameter, and its base is 25.2 cm in diameter. Generously proportioned, the washer is carved from Khotan jade of a relatively dark colour. It has a reflective polished surface and a round base. Its bottom is plain and without decorative patterns. It has a relatively deep base, and is carved with two large beast-head handles with freely-moving rings. Protruding above the washer's body, each beast head has a single horn, a pair of ears, round eyes, a large nose, a large mouth, and eyebrows and cheeks that extend sideward onto the rim of the washer's mouth as curled cloud patterns. The rings of the handles were carved in openwork from the same piece of raw jade as the washer's body. Beneath the rim, on the other sides, are four additional smaller beast-head handles of the same design, also with freely-moving rings carved in openwork. The small and large beasthead handles echo one another in this rare work of art.

This washer was exhibited in the *International Exhibition of Chinese Art*, held at the Royal Academy of Arts in London from November 1935 to March 1936, and was included in the accompanying exhibition catalogue (fig. 1)¹. This exhibition included not only works sent by the Chinese government from the Palace Museum, but also works from many public and private organisations and collections around the world. A total of 3080 works were shown. Impressive in scale, the exhibition was the most extensive international presentation of Chinese art and provided Europeans a rare opportunity to gain a comprehensive understanding of Chinese art. The jade expert Oscar Raphael was responsible for curating the jade exhibits². The present jade washer was selected from a British private collection.

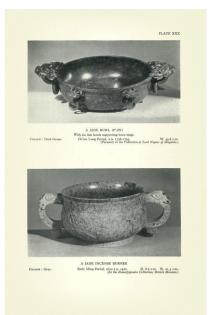


Fig. 2 Stanley Charles Nott, *Chinese Jade Throughout the Ages*, London, 1936.

The washer was included by the British author and major jade collector, Stanley Charles Nott (1902-1969) in his 1936 book *Chinese Jade Throughout the Ages* (fig. 2)³. Equally dedicated to research and collecting, Nott can be regarded as one of the first Western scholars to study the culture of Chinese jades and to develop a profound passion for them. Already in 1927, he began publishing books about Chinese jades, including both academic studies and illustrated catalogues. These publications documented works that had left China and were also testaments to Nott's research on the historical development and craft of Chinese jades.

Compared to similar works currently in the Palace Museum collection, the present washer, which measures 50 cm at its widest point, is exceptionally large. Jade washers of such monumental proportions are very rare, and necessitated the use of a large amount of raw jade. Although relatively dark-coloured, the jade has an extremely rich and "fatty" lustre, one of the distinctive characteristics of spinach-green jade harvested from the Khotan region by the imperial court during the mid-Qing period.

Such a large jade washer would have been nearly impossible during the Kangxi and early Qianlong periods, during which the jade-producing areas of Khotan and Yarkent were occupied by the Dzungars and could not be easily accessed. The imperial court resorted to repurposing jades from past dynasties or using raw jade sent as tribute or smuggled. Thus these early periods produced almost no large works. The Yongzheng Emperor even ordered his ministers in the 10^{th} year of his reign (1732) to "find some good raw jade and bring it here". In the 15^{th} year of the Qianlong reign (1750), the court was still refashioning jade belts of the Ming dynasty, indicating a severe material shortage. In the 24^{th} year

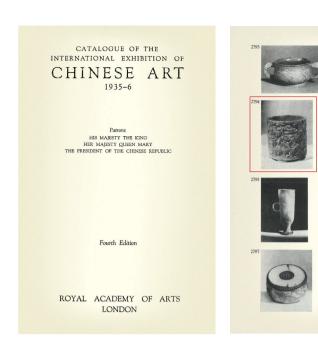
此件玉洗,曾於1935年11月至1936年3月在倫敦皇家藝術學院舉辦的「中國藝術國際展覽會」上展出,並發表在展覽出版的圖錄中(圖一)」。這次展覽,不僅有中國政府送來的故宮博物院等單位的參展文物,還彙集了世界各地公私收藏機構和個人的藏品,共3080件展品。這是中國藝術品顯有的全面在國際上亮相,規模空前,也使歐洲人有機會瞭解中國藝術品的全貌。其中世界各地玉器的選定主要由玉器專家拉斐爾(Oscar Raphael)先生負責。2這件玉洗,就是選擇英國本地私人藏家的家族藏品。

玉洗也曾被英國作家、玉器收藏大家史坦萊諾·樂提 (Stanley Charles Nott) 先生收錄于其1936年出版的關於中國玉器研究的書籍《中國玉器源流考》一書中(圖二)。3 樂提先生出生于1902年,1957年去世,是一位十分重視中國玉器研究與收藏的學者,早至1927年,他就開始出版關於玉器的書籍,有研究專著也有圖錄,這些書籍的出版一 方面收錄了不少流失海外的中國玉器,另一方面也記錄了 史坦萊諾對中國玉器的研究成果,包括玉器的發展及製作 工藝,可以說史坦萊諾先生是西方世界中較早接觸並研究 中國玉文化的學者,也是對中國玉器抱有深切喜好的學者 之一。

與現藏北京故宮博物院的同類帶活環玉洗相比,這件玉洗 最寬達到50公分,器型十分碩大,非常少見。由此可見原 材料更巨。另外玉洗雖然顏色較深,但油性極好,十分接 近清代中期宮廷新疆和田地區所產碧玉的特徵。

製作如此大的玉洗,在康熙到乾隆朝前期是不太可能的,因為此時出產美玉的和田、葉爾羌地區被準噶爾部佔領,西北交通不暢,玉路不通,宮廷用玉或為改製前朝舊玉,或靠進貢與走私玉料,大器型玉基本不見。雍正十年還命大臣:「將好玉材料尋些送來」,乾隆十五年,還在改製明代的玉帶板製玉,說明宮廷玉料嚴重不足。乾隆二十四年,清軍徹底擊潰了準噶爾部,鞏固了西北邊疆的統治,設置官府,將新疆地區納入中央政府的統一管轄。

從乾隆二十五年開始第一批玉料進京,形成了正式的貢玉制度。出產美玉的和田、葉爾羌地區年例貢玉分春秋兩季向清廷進貢,每年四千斤,其實最盛時清廷每年收進30萬斤玉料,越到乾隆後期,進貢的玉料越多,塊度也越大。如乾隆五十六年,一次進京就有五千五百八十五塊玉料。加上歷年積攢下來的玉料,到乾隆末期,宮廷的玉料已多的用不完,甚至會挑次等玉和帶有綹道多的子玉拿到北京崇文門外變賣,以補貼內廷開支。



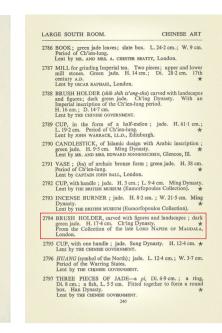

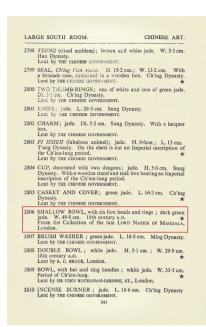

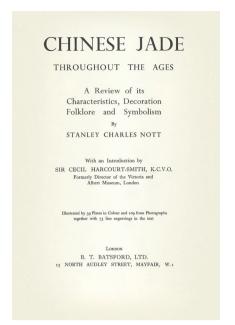
of the Qianlong reign (1759), the Qing army defeated the Dzungars decisively and cemented its control in the northwestern border region of Xinjiang, which came under the rule of the central government.

The jade tribute system was formalized in the 25th year of the Qianlong reign (1760). From then onwards, raw jade from Khotan and Yarkent would be sent every spring and autumn to the court, amounting to 4000 *jin* every year. In fact, at the height of this tributary traffic, the Qing court received some 300,000 *jin* of raw jade every year. The raw jade supplied increased in both quantity and size throughout the Qianlong reign. In the 56th year (1791), for example, 5585 pieces of jade were sent to the court. By the latter part of his reign, the court had accumulated so much raw jade that it would sell samples of inferior quality or with too many blemishes at Chongwenmen to supplement its income.

This influx of raw jade provided the material foundation for the Golden Age of Chinese jade during the Qianlong reign. Famous monumental jade sculptures produced during the middle and late Qianlong period include Jade Mountain with Great Yu Controlling the Waters and Jade Mountain with the Nine Elders of Huichang, as well as several monumental jade weng pots carved with dragons and clouds. During the same period, ordinary works meant for display also increased in size, including archaistic jade ding tripods and bi discs, large-scale hu vases carved with birds and fishes, and incense tubes. All these works were made possible by the ample and stable supply of raw jade.

Comparing the Qianlong Emperor's jades and the poems he wrote about them, I find that he often referred to both spinachgreen (biyu) and Khotan-green (qingyu) jade as "green jade" (lüyu), suggesting that he could not distinguish between them. Khotangreen jade that had a darker shade was referred to as green jade, but historically the category encompassed greyish and whitish green shades. In modern geological terms, Khotan-green jade and spinach-green jade are in fact very easy to distinguish. The former is formed through the corrosion of magnesium-rich marble and consists primarily of tremolite. The latter is formed through the corrosion of ultramafic and, while consisting primarily also of tremolite, it includes ferroactinolite. It tends to be green and often contains black dots. The category of "spinach-green jade" includes not only jade from Khotan, but also stones harvested in Manas in northern Xinjiang, Russia, Canada, and Pakistan. The rich colour of spinach-green jade is due to the small amount of chromium that it contains. Most of the Qing court's spinach-green jade was sourced from Xinjiang, particularly the Khotan area but also partly from Manas. However, Manas jade only began to be sent to Beijing during the latter part of the Qianlong reign, and was not favoured by the Emperor because it tended to be marked by large white spots and to lack "fattiness". Consequently, the finer examples of Qianlong-period spinach-green jade, those on which the Emperor composed original poems, were virtually all created from raw spinach-green jade from the Khotan region.

大批玉料進宮,為乾隆朝玉器的繁盛局面提供了堅實的原料基礎,而且越到乾隆後期,大型玉雕件越多,且不說幾件著名的大型玉雕山子「大禹治水圖玉山」、「會昌九老圖玉山」,還有幾件大型雲龍紋玉甕都出現在乾隆中後期。一些普通的陳設用玉也是越做越大,如大的仿古玉鼎,玉璧和超過四十公分以上的大型鳧魚壺、玉香筒等都出現在這一時期。這一切,皆因充足的玉料來源保障。

對照乾隆所寫的御題詩和玉器實物,筆者發現乾隆時期常常把碧玉和青玉都稱之為綠玉,可見乾隆帝是分不清色綠的青玉和碧玉的。當然被稱之為綠玉的青玉一般都是那些顏色偏綠的青玉,青灰色和青白色的玉依然屬於當時人認知的青玉範疇。根據現在地礦學的發展,青玉和碧玉其實非常容易區分,青玉主要由鎂質大理岩蝕變而成,主要成分為透閃石。碧玉主要由超基性岩蝕變而成,多由透閃石組成,但也有一部分為陽起石,顏色均為綠色,常常帶有黑點。如和田碧玉、新疆北部的瑪納斯碧玉、俄羅斯碧玉、加拿大碧玉、巴基斯坦碧玉等。碧玉之所以有比較鮮點的綠色,是因為玉礦中含有少量的鉻(Cr)元素。清代碧玉原材料主要來自新疆,以和田碧玉子料為主,也有部分新疆北部瑪納斯所產的碧玉製品,但瑪納斯碧玉在乾隆後期才有部分進入宮廷,且因大多玉料有大片白色斑塊且

油性不足,乾隆帝並不喜歡,製作精美或常常帶有乾隆御 題詩的碧玉器基本以和田碧玉為主。

和田碧玉目前看來主要是子料,在和田地區有玉龍喀什河和喀拉喀什河兩條河產子料,前者又稱之為白玉河,後者稱之為墨玉河。據上世紀五十年代以後在和田專門替國家收購玉石的工作人員回憶,白玉河和墨玉河均產碧玉,相比起來產自白玉河的碧玉品質最好,顏色鮮豔,油性足。墨玉河的碧玉塊度大,顏色相對偏深,發黑,但油性也很足。以筆者目前的認識,這件玉洗的原料可能來自於墨玉河。

玉洗造型優美,規整,雖器身光素,但獸耳銜環的雕琢工藝難度較大,尤其是六個活環,完全是在一塊完整的玉料上掏雕而來。玉雕工藝是減法的藝術,稍有不慎就會前功盡棄。 在沒有現代機械電動工具,而是用鐵砣桌式砣機(又稱水凳)為主要工具的手工治玉時期,要想將一塊大料原石雕成一件完美的帶活環的器皿,必須要經過審料、畫稿、去料、粗坯、打鑽、掏環、細繪、雕花、打磨、拋光等十餘道工序才得以完成。大件玉雕因原石巨大,還需用吊秤將其吊起,慢慢琢磨製成,所費之工較小件玉雕遠甚。

清代玉雕最盛之時當為乾隆時期,查閱此時檔案文獻,發現無論是清宮造辦處製作、蘇州織造、揚州的兩淮鹽政製作, 還是地方進貢的玉器中,帶活環的洗一般分為雙環洗、四

Raw spinach-green jade mostly originated in the White Jade (Yurungkash) River and the Black Jade (Karakash) River. According to the recollections of the officials who purchased jade for the government from the 1950s onwards, both rivers produced spinach-green jade, but raw jade from the White Jade River was superior because of its rich colour and "fattiness". Jade from the Black Jade River tends to be larger, darker and closer to black in colour, and is still sufficiently "fatty". Based on my current understanding, I believe that the present washer was carved from raw jade harvested from Black Jade River.

The washer has an elegant and regular form, and its surface is polished to a fine gloss. The beast-head handles and especially the six freely moving rings were difficult to carve from a single piece of jade. Jade carving is a subtractive process that does not allow for any error. At a time before modern electric tools, jade was cut primarily by hand on a standalone iron mill. The creation of a monumental work of such perfection required the careful execution of a dozen procedures, including the examination and selection of raw jade, drafting of the design, rough carving, hole-boring, articulation of the rings, fine carving, detailing, and polishing. In this case, the monumental size of this washer even required that it be suspended on a crane during some of these procedures, making it much more labour-intensive than smaller works.

The Qianlong reign was the Golden Age of Qing dynasty jade. According to palace documents of the period, jade washers with freely-moving rings, whether created at the palace workshop (*Zaobanchu*), at the Suzhou Manufactory, or under the Lianghuai Salt Administration, typically came with two, four, or six rings (fig 3 and 4). For example, a *qingbai* ('greenish white') jade

washer with two rings received from Suzhou was recorded on the 26th day of the second month of the 57th year of the Qianlong reign (1792)⁴; a *beibai* ('black and white') jade washer with two rings received from Suzhou was recorded on the 26th day of the first month of the 58th year (1793)⁵; and a spinach-green washer with six rings sent as a tribute by the Governor of Guangxi was recorded on the 25th day of the seventh month of the 59th year (1794)⁶. Furthermore, an entry dated to the 18th year of the Daoguang reign (1838) in *Qinggong chenshe dang* records a Khotan-green washer with six rings displayed in Chengsudian (Hall of Sincere Solemnity) (fig. 5)⁷.

Court records suggest that jade washers with two rings were by far the most common. Entries dated to the middle and later Qianlong period record the creations of such works almost every month and at different locations. Because of the difficulty to make them and the amounts of resources they required, jade washers with four rings were less common, and those with six rings were even rarer. Moreover, Khotan-green jade washers with six rings were more common than spinach-green ones, due to the preponderance of raw Khotan-green jade over raw spinach-green jade. Spinach-green jade washers with six rings are thus extremely rare.

The present jade washer has an archaistic form. The Qianlong Emperor admired and was deeply influenced by classical Han Chinese culture, and was very fond of antiques. Many court paintings picture him wearing Han-style clothing and surrounded by antiques, among them ancient bronzes and jades imitating them (fig. 6). The Qianlong court also collected many bronzes it had inherited from the Ming. Driven by

另外,道光十八年的《清宮陳設檔》中記載有一件在誠肅 殿的青玉六環洗(圖五)⁷。

從檔案文獻看,玉雙環洗數量最多,幾乎在乾隆中後期每個年份都有雙環洗的記載,且不止一處。四環洗相對就少一些,六環洗更少,且多是青玉六環洗,少見碧玉六環洗,這和此時青玉的數量遠遠多於碧玉有關。加之六個獸首銜活環的工藝比一般的雙環、四環難度要大,所費玉料也多。故而真正的碧玉六環洗數量還是極少的。

從造型看,這件獸耳銜環玉洗亦是仿古器。乾隆帝深受漢 文化的薰陶,尤好古物,故宫舊藏中有多件乾隆帝身著漢 服,身旁擺著各類古物,品古鑒古的繪畫作品。其中就有 許多青銅古器以及仿青銅器之玉器(圖六)。乾隆宮中 也收藏有大量前朝遺留及其收羅的各類青銅器。愛古之 情深,乾隆帝於十四(1749年)開始,命梁詩正等奉敕纂 修《西清古鑒》,乾隆二十年(1755年)完書。其仿北宋 《宣和博古圖》,收錄了內府所藏商周至唐代的銅器一千 五百餘件,而以商周古鼎彝器為多,書中因圖系說,詳盡 尺寸,輕重,並鉤勒款識,摹繪精審,毫釐不失,非以往 圖譜所能及,代表了當時國家成書的最高水準。《西清古 鑒》共四十卷,附《錢錄》十六卷。後沿用此書體例,乾 隆五十八年,王傑等又奉敕編成《西清續鑒甲編》二十 卷,收錄清宮藏商周至唐宋以後銅器、璽印,總計九百七 十五件。同年,王傑等還奉敕編成《西清續鑒乙編》,亦 二十卷,收錄盛京(瀋陽)清宮藏商周至唐代銅器九百 件。乾隆年間,《甯壽古鑒》成書,共十六卷,收錄甯壽 宮藏商周至唐代銅器七百零一件。

以上四部乾隆時期宮廷收藏銅器的大型著作,被稱之為

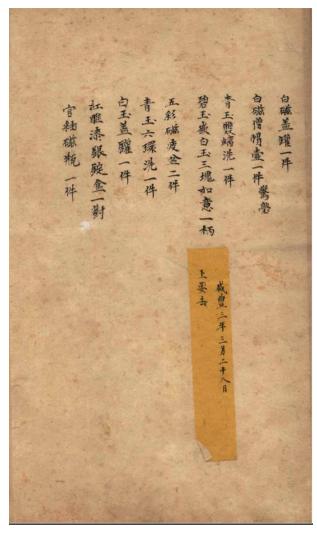

《西清四鑒》,其中的許多青銅器,成為乾隆仿古玉器的 常用樣稿。

筆者查閱《西清四鑒》,並沒有發現與此玉洗一模一樣的青銅器,在考古發掘及各博物館收藏的青銅器中,亦沒有發現一模一樣的六環洗。但是,雙環盤及四環盤倒是多見(圖七),這說明以玉器製作的雙環洗及四環洗的造型來源是模仿青銅盤而來,六環洗只是在製作時工匠在雙環、四環基礎上的創新之作,這種創新或有玉料原料較大,可做器型較大,增加兩環更加美觀、更為平衡的因素在內。但因畢竟費工費料,縱觀乾隆時期的玉器,六環洗並不多見。

既然這種獸耳銜環洗的造型來源於青銅盤,為何我們不稱 其為盤而稱為洗呢?

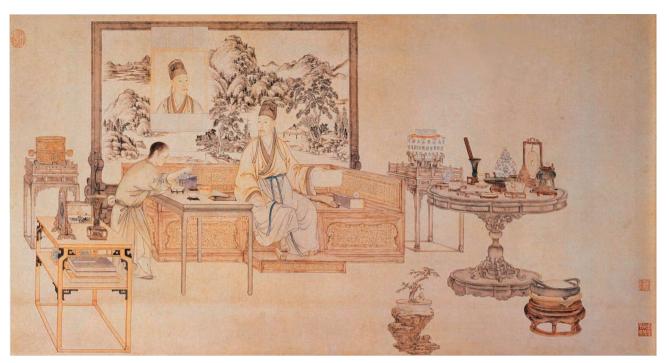

his love of the past, the Emperor ordered Liang Shizheng and others to begin the compilation of Xi Qing gujian, an illustrated catalogue of the bronzes in the imperial collection. Completed in the 20th year of the Qianlong reign (1755), the catalogue was modelled on the Xuanhe bogu tu of the Northern Song dynasty, an illustrated catalogue of bronzes in the Song imperial collection, and included some 1500 bronzes in the imperial collection dating from the Shang and Zhou through the Tang dynasties, with Shang and Zhou ritual bronzes predominating. Xi Qing gujian accurately illustrates each work and details its dimensions, weight, and inscription, far surpassing similar catalogues of the past and setting a new standard for Chinese publications at the time. It consists of forty volumes and an appendix of sixteen volumes. In the 58th year of the Qianlong reign (1793), Wang Jie and others were ordered to compile Xi Qing xujian jiabian, a twenty-volume supplement of Xiqing gujian in the same format that records 975 bronzes and seals in the Qing imperial collection dating from Shang and Zhou through Tang, Song, and subsequent periods. In the same year, Wang Jie and his colleagues compiled also Xi Qing xujian yibian, a twenty-volume catalogue of the bronzes in the Shengjing (present-day Shenyang) Palace dating from the Shang and

Zhou through the Tang periods. Also produced during the Qianlong reign, the sixteen-volume *Ningshou gujian*, another supplement, catalogues 701 bronzes dating from the Shang and Zhou through the Tang, housed in Ningshougong 'Palace of Tranquil Longevity' in the Forbidden City.

The four large-scale catalogues of bronzes in the Qianlong imperial collection are known collectively as *Xi Qing sijian* ('four *Xi Qing* catalogues'). The many bronzes documented therein often served as models for archaistic jades created by the Qianlong court.

I have not found a single bronze that has the form of the present washer in *Xiqing sijian* or among extant excavated bronzes and bronzes in museum collections. However, *pan* dishes with two or four rings are relatively common (fig. 7). This suggests that jade washers with two or four rings were based on bronze *pan* dishes, and craftsmen sometimes chose to create jade washers with six rings. This innovation may have been because the additional rings improved the aesthetic appeal and visual harmony of jade washers as they increased in size during the Qianlong period. However, such jade washers with six rings were still very rare because of the amount of human and material resources they required.

先說盤,盤流行於商代至春秋戰國之時,為盛水器。商周時期宴饗之時,宴前飯後要行沃盥之禮。《禮記·內則》中雲:「進盥,少者奉盤,長者奉水,請沃盥,盥卒授巾。」。 "沃是澆水的意思,古人盥手,是需要有人舀水從上面澆下洗的,故曰沃盥。西周晚期到春秋戰國,盤與匜常常相伴出土,且匜置盤中。故盤是盛水和接水的容器,匜則是盛水澆手之器。

盤的特徵是口大而敞,腹淺而平,圈足便於放置,雙耳便於端捧。先秦時期盤的耳有多種,但多為兩側的折耳。西周中期到戰國有活環耳,其中有普通的圓環耳,雙環、四環者均有,故宮博物院有一件清宮舊藏戰國時期的三足雙環青銅盤(圖八)。另外也有獸耳銜環耳,如著名的虢季子白盤就有八個獸耳銜環耳。而前述那件被乾隆認為是漢代的魚藻四環青銅盤,現在看來是戰國時期的,限於古時非如今考古之發達,先秦文物有著清晰的脈絡可尋,乾隆帝對古物的認識常常言必稱漢,斷代錯誤也是情有可原。先秦僅有盤,不見洗。戰國以後,沃盥之禮漸廢,盤逐漸被「洗」替代。不過漢時,洗還是個動詞,非器皿的名稱之詞。如《說文解字》:「洗,灑足也,從水先聲。」。說明洗本意是用水洗腳的動作。以後逐漸演變成名詞,成為器皿之名。

考古出土品中,目前所見最早的玉質洗為浙江省衢州市南宋史繩祖墓中出土的一件青玉荷葉形洗,器型如一張開的荷葉,捲曲的莖部為柄,以自然植物取材,構思巧妙,當開明清植物類玉洗之先河¹⁰。此後,玉質洗漸多,但多為文房用具中的筆洗,造型均小巧實用。清代玉洗在繼承明代玉洗的造型基礎上又有了極大的發展,尤其是乾隆時期。不僅有大量各式玉筆洗,還有各類陳設用洗。

翻閱《清宮造辦處各作成做活計清檔》,發現一個有趣的 現象,如果是帶環的洗,常常在名稱前面直接冠之以雙 環、四環甚至六環的修飾詞,讓人一眼而知是什麼器型。 但獨獨不見玉盤前面加雙環、四環、六環的首碼,甚至連 個「環」字都找不見。可見,清代是將這類器物稱之為洗 的,並不認為是盤。而盤在檔案中也比比皆是,如:

「乾隆四十一年二月十八日,接得員外郎六格押帖一件, 內開,二月初七日,將做杯盤山料玉拉開,畫得杯一件、 盤一件、壺蓋一件,交太監胡世傑呈覽,奉旨:此玉不必 做杯盤,改畫宴盤、宴碗,欽此」¹¹。 因此類記載很多,可知清宮裡的盤指的多是大宴桌上所用 的餐具玉盤以及盃盤、果盤之物,多為實用之物。而這種 大型的六環洗則是乾隆的仿古創新之物,更多的功能是陳 設,而非實用。

總之,無論從玉料、工藝、造型、紋飾上看,這件六環洗 都體現了清代中期皇家用玉的特色。

If the form of these jade washers with beast-head handles and rings originated in bronze *pan* dishes, why do we refer to them as washers and not *pan*?

Let us first consider *pan* dishes. They originated in the Shang, Spring and Autumn, and Warring States periods as water vessels. During the Shang and Zhou periods, a hand-washing ritual known as *woguan* was performed before and after banquets, as recorded in the *Book of Rites*⁸. In this ritual, water would be poured on someone's hands by another person from the top. *Pan* dating from the late Western Zhou through the Spring and Autumn and Warring States periods tend to be excavated with *yi* ewers placed inside them. This indicates that *pan* were used to collect and contain water, and *yi* were used to pour it.

The pan dish is characterised by a large and flat opening, a shallow and flat body, a circular base that enables stable placement, and two handles that facilitate lifting. Pan from the pre-Qin era came with various kinds of handles, but generally featured fixed handles on opposite sides. From the Western Zhou through the Warring States periods, pan began to feature one, two, or four loose ring-shaped handles. In the Palace Museum is a three-footed, two-ringed bronze pan from the Warring States period and formerly in the Qing imperial collection (fig. 8). Pan also came with beast-head handles with

rings in the mouths, including the famous Guoji Zibai pan, which has eight handles and rings. Mentioned above, the bronze pan with four rings featuring aquatic scenes that the Qianlong Emperor thought to date from the Han dynasty is now believed to date from the Warring States period instead. It is understandable that, without the knowledge of pre-Qin artefacts furnished by modern archaeology, the Emperor often mistakenly attributed antiques to the Han dynasty.

During the pre-Qin period, only *pan* existed and not washers. After the Warring States period, the *woguan* washing ritual became defunct, and *pan* gradually came to be replaced by washers. However, during the Han dynasty, *xi* remained a verb ('to wash') and did not refer to a vessel type, as evidenced by the corresponding entry in the Han dynasty dictionary *Shuowen jiezi* ('Explaining graphs and analysing characters'): "The character *xi* refers to the washing of feet." In other words, the original meaning of *xi* is the action of washing one's feet⁹. Only later did the word gradually come to be used as a noun referring to a vessel type.

The oldest known and extant jade washer is a spinach-green washer. It was excavated from the mausoleum of Shi Sheng in Quzhou, Zhejiang, dating from the Southern Song dynasty¹⁰. The washer ingeniously takes the natural form of a lotus leaf, with its curled stem serving as the handle, and anticipated Ming- and Qing-

period jade washers based on plant forms. After the Song dynasty, jade washers became more common, but initially they were used primarily for washing brushes and thus limited in size. During the Qing dynasty and especially the Qianlong period, jade washers underwent a significant evolution; they retained the basic Mingdynasty form but came to serve various display purposes as well.

Reading through the records of the Qing Palace Workshop (*Zaobanchu*), one notices an interesting phenomenon: the titles of washers often directly mention the existence of two, four, or even six rings, allowing the reader immediately to understand the vessel types. By contrast, the titles of jade *pan* dishes never mention the existence of such rings or feature even the character for 'ring'. It is evident that the Qing court did not regard such washers as the same vessel type as *pan*, which are frequently mentioned in its records.

These records indicate that *pan* at the Qing court referred mostly to dining utensils and other food containers serving practical purposes. By contrast, the present monumental jade washer with six rings is a work of innovative archaism created under the auspices of the Emperor himself, its primary purpose being display and aesthetic appreciation.

In its material quality, craftsmanship, form, and decorative programme, the present washer embodies the distinctive qualities of mid-Qing imperial jade.

This majestic spinach-green basin ranks among the most impressive jade vessels remaining in a private collection, and appears to be the largest jade basin recorded. Jade boulders of the immense size and intense, even colour as would have been required to create this piece are extremely rare and were rarely cut down to manufacture vessels, but would rather have been left more or less intact and turned, with minimal surface carving, into scenic miniature mountains. Jade vessels of any form, of the size of this piece, are therefore otherwise virtually unknown from this or any earlier period, and the present piece is further remarkable and exceedingly rare because of its six freely moveable rings suspended from animal masks.

The Qianlong Emperor (r. 1736-1795), who was particularly enamoured with jade, secured access to the region, where the raw material was mined, the Tianshan region around Hetian, or Khotan, in modern Xinjiang province in China's far West, in 1759 through military campaigns. While his predecessor, the Yongzheng Emperor (r. 1723-1735), had still been faced with a severe shortage of good nephrite material and had to fall back on ordering his craftsmen to rework earlier items, from the latter half of the Qianlong reign onwards, large quantities of fine jade became available to be fashioned into vessels or items of decoration.

Yet only two jade dishes of the Qianlong period larger than the present basin appear to be recorded, a pair of flat-rimmed spinach-green jade chargers (65.3 and 66.6 cm) in the Palace Museum, Beijing, without handles or any decoration except for

此碧玉洗制式恢宏,實屬私人收藏玉器當中至臻珍品,更屬 現時記載所知最大型之玉洗。觀察本玉洗,可想像原玉必然 尺寸龐大而色澤鮮綠均匀,如此玉材極其鮮見,多隨玉形製 成山子,紋飾甚簡,如本品般製成器皿,無論器皿種類,均 屬極罕。而本玉洗帶六獸耳銜環,則更為珍稀。

眾所周知乾隆愛玉,1759年出兵西域和闐(現今新疆省), 平定該區,廣開玉路。其父雍正帝年間玉料匱乏,故命玉匠 取前人玉器加工雕琢,直至乾隆朝後半期間,佳玉方始源源 不絕,製成玉雕或為器皿、或作陳設。

雖然如此,乾隆年間較本洗更大之玉盤,僅只兩品,一對 碧玉盤(65.3及66.6公分)現存北京故宮博物院,無盤耳或 紋飾,僅沿邊環刻細紋一道,盤心刻長篇幅乾隆帝御制詩, 載於《故宮博物院藏文物珍品大系·清代玉器》,卷10,北 京,2011年,圖版,圖版184及185。除此之外,十八世紀或 之前玉器多數小於30公分,達40公分者則屬極罕,即如故宮 亦收藏極少,唯可比較北京故宮博物院收藏仿古玉瓶例,乾 隆年器並款,48公分高,出處同上,圖版6。

西方常稱此類器謂「marriage bowls」(意為婚慶之盤) ,唯尺寸遠較本品細小。而部份玉洗中心雕刻雙魚紋飾,意 祝連理之美。而中國則稱此類器曰洗,較小者或用於清洗毛 筆,亦有活環耳洗之稱,以洗耳之活環為名稱,玉材堅硬, 雕刻活環作耳,殊不輕易,足見藝匠造詣。此類洗多帶雙 耳,亦由四耳之例,而六耳之洗,則屬極罕。

再比一大型玉洗例,出自W. Williams, K.B. Kitson及S. Bulgari 收藏,闊41.2公分,尚比本品較小,僅帶兩活環耳,遍施紋 飾,三度易手拍賣場,先後為倫敦蘇富比1956年2月14日及 1961年2月21日,編號305,以及香港佳士得2008年5月27 日,編號1604。

a fine line around the rim, but each engraved in the centre with a long poem by the Oianlong Emperor, see Gugong Bowuyuan canggi daxi. Yuqi bian. 10: Qing/Compendium of Collections in the Palace Museum. Jade, vol. 10: Qing Dynasty, Beijing, 2011, pls 184 and 185. Otherwise, 18th century or earlier jades generally measure well below 30 cm; vessels of around 40 cm are already exceptional and rare even in the Palace collections: but the Palace Museum, Beijing, holds one archaistic vase of Qianlong mark and period that is 48 cm tall, see ibid., pl. 6.

In the West, basins of this type - but generally much smaller are generally called 'marriage bowls', and some related bowls indeed are carved with a pair of fish in the centre, symbols of conjugal unity. In China, such bowls are generally known as 'washers' - and the smaller ones may well have been used for washing brushes - or 'loose-ring basins', on account of their freely moveable rings, which represent a particular challenge to fashion from the hard stone. While such basins typically have two handles with loose rings, examples with four do exist, but six are hardly ever seen.

One other remarkably large 'marriage bowl', but smaller than the present piece, is a green jade example formerly in the W. Williams, K.B. Kitson, and S. Bulgari collections, 41.2 cm wide, with only two bat handles with loose rings and overall carved decoration, sold in our London rooms, 14th February 1956, lot 158 and 21st February 1961, lot 305, and at Christie's Hong Kong, 27th May 2008, lot 1604.









A Constant Friend: On the Spinach-Green Jade 'Wulao Tu' Brush Pot

When it comes to brush pots, I always think about the following line inscribed by the bamboo carver Pan Xifeng on one of his bamboo brush pots: 'Void is its heart, firm are its joints. It serves me in my study, accompanying me every day and night'.

The brush pot was an indispensable part of the scholar's study in classical China. Even in our increasingly computerised society, an elegant brush pot on a desk remains a loyal companion and a source of aesthetic pleasure.

The present spinach-green jade 'Five Immortals' brush pot is 16.5 cm in height. Its mouth and base both measure 17 cm in diameter, and its base measures 1.1 cm in height. Carved from spinach-green jade, the brush pot has a straight cylindrical form, with five geometric cloud motifs on its base. The body is carved in shallow relief with a continuous landscape scene of a tranquil forest with five elderly figures, each striking a different pose. One crosses a bridge holding a magical peach, trailed by a young servant holding a staff; in front of him is a high platform with a table, and on the table stands a vase holding blooming peonies, auspicious symbols of prosperity and good fortune. Two elderly figures are walking together, one holding lingzhi fungus and a staff and looking back, the other proceeding forward with a peach. The pair appear to be in conversation. Another two figures are holding a peach and lingzhi fungus respectively; behind them, a small pavilion with square double roofs stands in the shade of a wutong tree. In the distant background are rolling hills with pine trees and vines, as well as auspicious clouds. In the foreground, a river runs amidst pines and cypresses. The hills, river, vegetation, and pavilion together form an otherworldly paradise of peace, tranquillity, and comfortable enjoyment.

This complicated composition was created through a variety of techniques, including subtractive carving in high and low relief, incision, and drilling. The resultant scene, resembling a continuous scroll painting, is extremely illusionistic. In its material, craftsmanship, and composition, this brush pot is characteristic of the jade art of the mid-Qing imperial court.

The brush pot was exhibited in the International Exhibition of Chinese Art, held at the Royal Academy of Arts in London from November 1935 to March 1936, and was included in the accompanying exhibition catalogue (fig. 1)1. Initiated by Sir Percival David, the major British scholar and collector of Chinese art, the exhibition aimed at promoting "the global appreciation of Chinese art and sympathy between the peoples of China and United Kingdom" and received support from the government of the Republic of China. A total of 1022 fine exhibits were selected from the Palace Museum, Academica Sinica, Antiques Exhibition Bureau, Beijing Library, and other Chinese collections, encompassing virtually all areas of classical Chinese art—ceramics, paintings and calligraphy, bronzes, jades, enamels, kesi textiles, lacquer carving, furniture, and other media. Among them, 735 were works from the Palace Museum that had been brought to southern China due to Sino-Japanese conflicts. The International Exhibition of Chinese Art also received the enthusiastic support of public and private collections around the world and featured works loaned from the U.K., United States, Germany, France, Japan, the Netherlands, India, Russia, Sweden, and Turkey. In sum, the exhibition featured 3080 works from 240 collections and 15 countries. It was an unprecedented opportunity for Europeans to gain an overview of Chinese art. Jade expert

與共朝夕話筆筒一碧玉五老圖筆筒賞析

筆筒是中國古代不可或缺的文房用具,即使是智慧化辦公 日漸興盛的當今社會,一款優雅別致的筆筒也是中國人書 案上一道亮麗的風景,與共朝夕,相伴主人。

碧玉五老圖筆筒(拍品編號第19),高16.5公分、口徑17公分、底徑17公分、足高1.1公分。碧玉質,直圓筒形,五個幾何形卷雲垂足。器身減地浮雕山水人物通景畫。蔥郁靜謐的山林,五位老人姿態各異置身其中:或老人手捧鮮桃走在橋上,後有小童抱杖跟隨,前面聳立高高的平臺,臺上置几,几上置瓶,瓶中牡丹花開綻放,寓意平安富貴;或結伴而行,一人手持靈芝策杖回首,一人捧桃前行,兩人似在交談;或兩老人各自手捧鮮桃和靈芝,後有重簷四角小亭掩映在梧桐樹下。遠處山巒疊嶂,松蘿疊蔓,祥雲線繞。近處流水潺潺,蒼松翠柏。山石、溪水、藤蘿,亭台,呈現出一幅和諧安然、吉祥瑞意,曲徑通幽的世外桃源景色。

筆筒構圖複雜,採用減地高浮雕、淺浮雕、陰刻及大小管 鑽等多種工藝手法,使畫面極具立體感,似一幅卷起來的 山水畫卷。其玉料、雕工及構圖風格具有清代中期宮廷用 玉特徵。

此件玉洗,曾於1935年11月至1936年3月在倫敦皇家藝術學院舉辦的「中國藝術國際展覽會」上展出,並發表在展覽出版的圖錄中(圖一)」。這次展覽,是由英國資深的中國藝術品學者、收藏家大維德(Sir Percival David)爵士發起組織,為謀求「中國藝術品之國際欣賞,藉以增進中英感情」之名舉辦的。展覽得到了民國政府的支持,從故宮博物院及中央研究院、古物陳列所、北平圖書館等機構共選

定文物精品1022件,包括了瓷器、書畫、青銅、玉器、琺瑯、緙絲、摺扇、剔紅、家俱、雜件等文物,幾乎涵蓋了中國古代藝術品的各個方面,這其中有735件來自故宮博物院的南遷文物。除中國政府送來的參展文物外,這次展覽還獲得了世界各地公私收藏機構和個人的積極回應,英、美、德、法、日、荷蘭、印度、俄羅斯、瑞典、土耳其等公私收藏單位均借出他們收藏的中國藝術精品,最後共有15個國家和240個公私收藏單位和個人的藏品參展,一共3080件展品。這是中國藝術品罕有的全面在國際上亮相,規模空前,也使歐洲人有機會瞭解了中國藝術品的全貌。其中世界各地玉器的選定主要由玉器專家拉斐爾(Oscar Raphael)先生負責²。這件玉筆筒和一件六環玉洗均是來自英國本地同一私人藏家家族的藏品。

作為文房用具之一的筆筒,並不像筆的出現那麼早。筆筒一詞最早出現在三國吳人陸璣的《毛詩草木鳥獸蟲魚疏》中,其中「螟蛉有子:取桑蟲負之於木空中或書簡筆筒中,七日而化為其子」3。據揚之水先生考證,此處所說筆筒非我們常見之明清時期的筆筒,乃是「筆套也,為秦漢時期常見的兩根竹管連載一起而在其中置一對毛筆的雙筒套」,並認為宋代文獻《傳信適用方》所載:「治喉閉如聖散」一味藥,服藥時用筆筒灌在喉中。」此筆筒應也是筆套。同時,揚之水先生也認為宋代無名氏的《致虛雜俎》中提到的「(王)獻之有斑竹筆筒名裘鐘」,應也是筆套之屬4。

明以前的考古墓葬出土品中,目前確實還不見如明清以來 的桶形筆筒,但細長的筆套確實出土過。故而桶形筆筒最 Oscar Raphael was responsible for curating the jade exhibits, and he selected the present brush pot, along with the washer, lot 18, from a private British family collection².

As one of the Four Treasures of the Study, the brush pot appeared later than the brush. The term bitong was first used in Maoshi caomu niaoshou chongyu shu, a 3rd-century commentary on the Confucian Classic Shijing, by Lu Ji, who lived in the Wu Kingdom during the Three Kingdoms period³. According to research by Yang Zhishui, the bitong mentioned there was not the same as the brush pot familiar to us from the Ming and Qing periods, but rather "a brush case, common in the Qin and Han periods, consisting of two bamboo segments attached together and containing a pair of brushes". The Song-dynasty medical recipe book Chuanxin shiyong fang mentions the use of bitong as a tool to feed liquid medicine, and another Song text, Zhixu zazu, mentions that "[Wang] Xianzhi owned a bitong named qiuzhong ('fur cup') made from spotted bamboo". Yang believes that both were brush cases rather than brush pots⁴.

Indeed, excavated tombs predating the Ming dynasty have yielded no cylindrical brush pots, but they have yielded long and narrow brush cases. When cylindrical brush pots first appeared remains a question for further investigation.

After cylindrical brush pots became fashionable in the mid-Ming period, the form began to appear in different materials. During the Qing dynasty, the quantity and material variety of brush pots both increased. Although the majority were still made from bamboo or wood, there appeared also ceramic, lacquer, jade, ivory, glass, enamel, and bronze examples. The Palace Museum collection contains some 1500 Ming and Qing brush pots made from a dozen or so different materials, documenting the rich variety of brush pots used at the imperial court.

The popularity of the brush pot was in part due to the ritual significance invested in it by the literati. Consider, for example, the Ming literatus Zhu Yizun's *Inscription on the Brush Pot*:

A brush on a desk can tilt or lean. This is like a person behaving improperly. To contain a brush within a brush pot is like giving a traveller a home. It is to constrain its wandering heart, to return it to a state of moral purity.⁵.

This analogy between a brush in a brush pot and a person behaving with ritual propriety became an important theoretical justification for the use of the brush pot by the Ming and Qing literati.

Jade brush pots required raw jade that was not only relatively large but also free from too many blemishes, chips, and other imperfections. Consequently, jade brush pots were rarer and more valuable than bamboo, wood, or porcelain brush pots, and tended to be concentrated in the homes of the nobility and the wealthy.

The earliest extant jade brush pot dates from the Ming dynasty, but overall the Ming and the early Qing periods produced relatively few of them. After the mid-Qianlong period, as the supply of raw jade from Khotan to the court became ample and reliable, jade brush pots increased in quantity. The Palace Museum collection contains approximately 200 jade brush pots dating from the mid-Qing and later, and most of these postdate the mid-Qianlong period. These were created by the *Zaobanchu* (Palace Workshop), the Suzhou Manufactory, and under the supervision of the Lianghuai Salt Administration, or sent as tributes by local officials. The production of jade brush pots accelerated during the Qianlong reign. According to *Zaobanchu* records, during the 59th and 60th years of the Qianlong reign alone (1794/5), the court created or received as tributes over ten jade brush pots⁶.

The ample supply of raw jade after the mid-Qianlong reign meant that the Emperor's need for jade desk items could be fully satisfied. The former Qing imperial collection contained many different kinds of brush pots, including those made from spinachgreen, qingbai ('greenish white'), white, Khotan-green, and yellow jade, as well as those made from crystal, agate, and other colourful stones. They encompassed also various different shapes, including cylindrical, rectangular, tree-branch, and bamboo forms, although the cylindrical type predominated. They came polished and undecorated, or carved with decorative designs featuring bamboo and plum, flowers and birds, or figures in landscapes. The Qianlong Emperor especially favoured brush pots carved with landscapes and human figures, composed poems about them and had them inscribed.

明代中期以後,隨著竹木刻筆筒的出現,常見的桶形筆筒 造型蔚然成風,筆筒材質開始多樣化。到了清代,筆筒製 作更多,材質則更為豐富,最多的當屬竹刻及木雕筆筒, 其次是瓷質筆筒,還有漆筆筒、玉質筆筒、牙骨雕筆筒、 玻璃筆筒、琺瑯筆筒、銅筆筒等等。故宮博物院收藏有明 清筆筒一千五百餘件,材質多達十餘種,體現了宮廷用器 的豐富多彩。

筆筒之流行和文人賦予其禮儀內涵有關。明代文人朱彝尊 《筆筒銘》曰:

筆之在案,或側或頗,猶人之無儀,筒以束之,如客得家,閑彼放心,歸無邪。⁵

將筆筒比作文房用具中的禮儀之器,筒以東之,如人之有 禮。此語道出了筆筒在文房用器中的儀禮內涵,也成為文 人使用筆筒的理論依據。

在各類筆筒中,材料價值最高的當是玉質筆筒。筆筒的製作不僅要求玉料要相對大、完整,且不能有大綹裂和太多雜質。材料的珍貴性使得玉質筆筒的數量比竹木筆筒、瓷筆筒等少的多,且大多集中在宮廷和富豪權貴之家。

目前看到最早的玉質筆筒是明代的,但整個明代及清代早期玉質筆筒均不太多。乾隆中期以後,隨著賈玉制度的形成,大量的和田玉源源不斷的輸入宮廷,玉質筆筒增多,故宮博物院收藏的清代中期的玉筆筒大約有200件左右,大多為乾隆中期以後的作品,其中有清宮造辦處製作,也有蘇州織造、兩淮鹽政等地方機構承做,亦有地方官員的進貢。而且越到乾隆晚期,數量越多。如造辦處檔案記載,僅乾隆五十九年和乾隆六十年兩年裡,各地做好和進貢的玉筆筒就達十件以上。如:

「乾隆五十九年三月二十五日,江蘇巡撫奇豐額差把總喬 宏駿進 貢:……玉筆筒一件……。

三月二十八日,長蘆鹽政征瑞進貢:……玉大筆筒一件…… 十二月二十六日,署兩淮鹽政全德差貢:……碧玉筆筒成件……6。 乾隆六十年廣木作,十二月十一日,員外郎大達塞,庫掌舒 與、祝林,催長恒善,筆帖式延祥來說:太監鄂魯裡交碧玉 筆筒一件(隨銅座)。傳旨:另配木座、銅座。欽此。」 乾隆中期以後的筆筒,因玉料的充足,可以充分滿足乾隆帝 對玉質文房用具的要求。清宮舊藏的玉質筆筒多種多樣。從 玉料看,有青玉、青白玉、白玉、碧玉、黄玉幾個大類,還 有水晶、瑪瑙等彩石類筆筒。從器型看,有圓筒形、方筒 形、樹椿形、竹節形等多種,但主要以圓筒形為多。從紋 飾看,有光素、竹梅、花鳥、山水人物圖等。其中山水人物 圖筆筒是乾隆帝最為看重,並最能體現其藝術欣賞品味的一 類,也是乾隆帝為之賦詩、刻款最多的一類。

乾隆中晚期極力宣導將繪畫入玉雕,他認為紙壽千年,但 作為天地精華的玉石則永不敗毀。所以,這一時期,許多 和繪畫、書法同題材的玉雕作品出現,這些玉雕作品要麼 是以繪畫為藍本畫樣而來,要麼就是書畫作品在玉器上 的完全再現,就如石刻碑帖一樣將書法,繪畫作品保留下 來,如玉雕的「三希堂法帖」、玉雕的「蘭亭集序」等, 均是完全按照書法作品摹勒刻在玉上。但是更多的則是以 同題材的繪畫作品做為玉雕樣稿製器。最著名的當屬 「大 禹治水圖玉山」,此玉山以清宮舊藏宋人所繪《大禹治水 圖》為粉本,乾隆四十六年書出紙樣四張,賈銓照圖在玉 上臨書,同年撥蠟樣,兩淮鹽政以此再刻成木樣琢製。乾 隆五十二年八月,歷經兩任兩淮鹽政圖明阿、徵瑞才得以 完成。送回京城後安放在樂壽堂內。乾隆五十三年,命朱 永泰刻字,所刻長篇文字即為乾隆帝所作《題密勒塔山玉 大禹治水圖》詩文。在詩中,乾隆帝明確表達「書圖歲久 或湮滅,重器千秋難敗毀」的觀點,這也是他將大量繪畫 作品變成玉雕作品的一個重要原因。

在這種思想的支配下,文房用具中的筆筒已然成為繪畫作品的重要載體。筒身似一幅圍起來的畫軸,面積較大,又 規矩周正,十分適合書畫題材的雕琢,在竹木雕的筆筒中 已經常見此類題材作品。清代乾隆時期,這一形式被借用 到玉質筆筒上。君子高士、山林隱逸等山水人物題材畫意

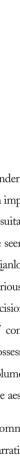

During the middle and later parts of his reign, he vigorously promoted the introduction of painting subjects into jade carving. He believed that while paper could last a thousand years, jade—the crystallized essence of heaven and earth-was indestructible. Consequently, many themes common in painting and calligraphy began to appear in jade carvings, which either were modelled on or inspired by pictorial prototypes or directly reproduced works of painting and calligraphy in the same way as stone stelae. For example, the Qianlong court workshop faithfully carved in jade calligraphies from the anthology Sanxitang fatie ('Model calligraphies from the Hall of Three Rarities') and the famous Lantingji xu ('Preface to the poems composed at the Orchid Pavilion'). More common, however, were jade works depicting themes of painting. Most famous among these was the Jade Mountain with Great Yu Controlling the Waters, which was initiated in the 46th year of the Qianlong reign (1781) and finished only in the 52nd year (1787), and required the translation and transfer of the Song-dynasty painting Great Yu Controlling the Waters to four large-scale sketches on paper, a wax model, a wood model, and a drawing on the raw jade. The finished work was sent to the Summer Palace and housed in the Leshoutang (Hall of Joyful Longevity). The following year, the Emperor ordered his long commemorative prose-poem to be inscribed on this jade mountain. In it, he articulates an important motivation behind his transference of many paintings into jade carvings: "a painted picture may disappear as time passes, but a solid [i.e. jade] work can hardly be destroyed even after a thousand years".

Under the Qianlong Emperor's auspices, the jade brush pot became an important medium for pictorial subjects. Its cylindrical form yields a suitably large, continuous, and regular pictorial surface, as could be seen already on many bamboo and wood brush pots. During the Qianlong reign, this format was transferred to jade. Through the various techniques of high- and low-relief carving, openwork carving, incision, and drilling, craftsmen realised an increasing quantity of compositions with figures in landscapes on jade brush pots. Possessing not only the continuity of a scroll painting but also the volumetric illusionism of sculpture, these brush pots fully embodied the aesthetic and moral values of the literati.

Common figure-in-landscape subjects include the historical narratives of the Four Sages of Shangshan, the Five Elders of Juyang, the Six Recluses of Zhuxi, the Seven Sages of the Bamboo Grove, the Eight Immortals of the Wine Cup, the Nine Elders of Huichang, the Elegant Gathering at the West Garden, Immortals on Mount Fantong, the Spring Evening Banquet in a Peach Blossom Garden (after a poem by Li Bai), and so on (figs 2 and 3), as well as such auspicious or didactic subjects as clouds and waterfalls, and the Three Friends of Winter⁷. Many of these brush pots faithfully illustrate historical stories or pictorial themes, but others, especially those dating from the late Qianlong reign, interpret their source materials innovatively. The present jade brush pot shows an innovative interpretation of the theme of the Five Elders of Juyang.

睢陽五老,乃是北宋時期的朝中重臣,有丞相祁國公杜衍、禮部侍郎王渙、司農卿畢世長、駕部郎中馮平、兵部郎中朱貫五人,辭官後即隱居在今河南省商丘市睢陽頤養天年。五人常常在一起聚會賦詩,時稱睢陽五老會。這五位均是長壽老人,年至耄耋。杜衍80歲、馮平87歲,朱貫88歲、王渙90歲,畢世長年紀最大,去世時已94歲。如此耆壽高年且德高位尊之人必然讓世人尊敬和豔羨。以此為題材的老人畫作也流行開來。乾隆晚期,對長壽的渴望,使得玉雕中出現了許多以老人為主題,且有福壽如意祥瑞內涵的作品。這件筆筒雖然描繪的是山林隱逸的故事,但每位老人手中捧著壽桃如意的道具明顯透露出使用者對長壽的嚮往。當然,製作筆筒者也可能特意為之以討上面歡喜。清中期的筆筒在材料顏色的選擇上,也會十分貼切山水人物的風景。在清宮舊藏的筆筒中,可以發現,凡是碧玉製作的筆筒,大多都是山水人物題材的,這使得玉質的顏色

和大自然樹林的顏色十分一致,雕琢出來的山水人物更 顯得山林靜謐,清幽。其實乾隆帝對玉色的解讀一向很 准,在其選擇玉雕山子原料時,常常會用青綠色的青玉和 碧玉,即使玉中有綹裂或者雜質也無所謂,乾隆帝認為, 這反而可以更好的表現自然景色。如故宮博物院所藏的丹 台春曉圖大玉山,原名叫「南山積翠圖」,乾隆四十六年 (1781年)製成後,乾隆帝曾賦詩一首《詠和闐玉丹台春曉 圖》,其中就有:「青質白章如設色,鏤峰刻樹自成形」 之語。玉雕巧妙的利用了玉料的青色和白色,雕琢自然界 的青山綠水,碧樹巒峰,將玉色和玉雕作品巧妙的結合在 一起,而不是一味的只崇尚白玉,對於今天的玉雕界,也 是有一定的指導意義的。

The Five Elders of Juyang were high ministers of the Northern Song court: Du Yan, Wang Huan, Bi Shichang, Feng Ping, and Zhu Guan. After retiring from office, they lived reclusively in Juyang (in present-day Shangqiu, Henan) and often gathered to compose poetry. They were all blessed with longevity: Du Yan lived to 80, Feng Ping 87, Zhu Guan 88, Wang Huan 90, and Bi Shichang 94. They garnered the respect and admiration of their contemporaries, and their story became a popular painting subject. In his old age, the Qianlong Emperor yearned for longevity, and this was reflected in the many longevity-themed works of jade carvings produced during his reign. Although the present jade brush pot depicts the Five Elders as recluses in nature, the peaches and lingzhi fungi they hold make explicit the Emperor's wish for a long life. Of course, it is also possible that the craftsmen wanted to curry the Emperor's favour by proactively emphasizing the theme of longevity.

The colour of this jade brush pot is well suited to the subject matter. Among extant Qing imperial brush pots, we find that those made from spinach-green jade generally depict landscape subjects with figures. The colour of the jade naturally evokes vegetation and infuses the composition with a feeling of peace and tranquillity. Always an astute connoisseur of jade, the Qianlong Emperor favoured spinach-green jade. He often purposefully chose raw jade with imperfections and blemishes because he believed that these could better represent

the colours of nature. For example, he extolled the *Jade Mountain Depicting a Spring Morning at Dantai* (originally called *Verdant Colours in the Southern Mountains*), created in the 46th year of his reign (1781), in the following poetic couplet: "The green base colour and the white patterns look as if painted; the carved peaks and trees take on a form of their own". In other words, the craftsmen exploited the colours of the raw jade to depict the mountains, water, trees, and peaks of the scene, ingeniously combining nature and artifice. They did not value white jade blindly and exclusively. This can serve as a lesson for collectors and connoisseurs of jade today.

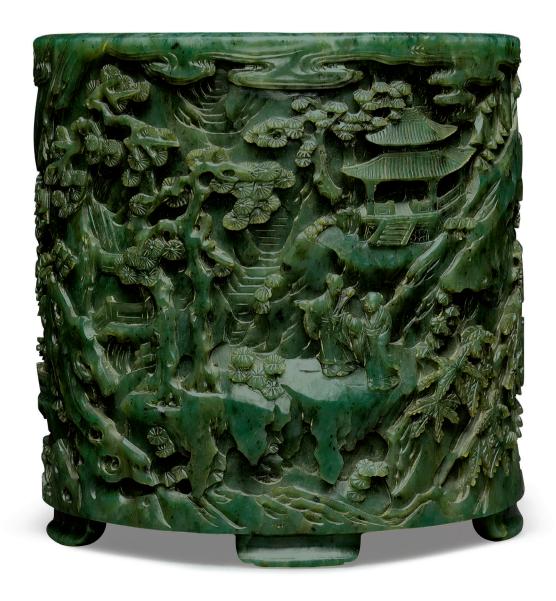

Green jade brush pots featuring immortals or sages in scenic mountainous landscapes belonged to the classic repertoire of the imperial jade workshops during the Qianlong period (1736-1795), and were occasionally inscribed with the Emperor's own poems. Jade, both white and spinach-green, would appear to have been the most valued medium for such vessels in the Qianlong reign, as contemporary examples in other valued materials, such as precious metals, porcelain, lacquer, cloisonné or bronze, are rare.

On the perfectly cylindrical form of brush pots such as this, the relief carving was treated like a continuous handscroll painting. To create such an even picture with a natural material, required the careful selection of a jade boulder of exceptional quality, the original shape of which can no longer be surmised. The superb composition of the landscapes carved around the sides of these brush pots becomes apparent when panoramic photographs are taken, which enable the full picture to be 'unrolled', as done, for example, with the brush pot in the Sir Joseph Hotung collection, illustrated by Jessica Rawson in the exhibition catalogue *Chinese Jade from the Neolithic to the Qing*, The British Museum, London, 1995, p. 99, fig. 95; p. 416, fig. 3; cat. no. 29: 18.

Green jade brush pots with similar scenes of immortals and sages in scenic landscape settings are preserved both in the National Palace Museum, Taipei, and the Palace Museum, Beijing; for an example from the former collection, but lacking the feet, see Gongting zhi ya. Qingdai fanggu ji huayi yuqi tezhan tulu/The Refined Taste of the Emperor: Special Exhibition of Archaic and Pictorial Jades of the Ch'ing Court, National Palace Museum, Taipei, 1997, cat. no. 58; for three related pieces from the latter collection, one of them of more narrow proportions, see The Complete Collection of Treasures of the Palace Museum. A spinach-green jade brush pot carved with a similar landscape was also included in the Oriental Ceramic Society exhibition *Chinese Jade Throughout the Ages*, Victoria and Albert Museum, London, 1975, cat. no. 415, together with one, from the collections of E.L. Paget, Sir J. Buchanan-Jardine, Sir Bernard Eckstein and Sir Jonathan Woolf, cat. no. 413, the latter also included in the exhibition *The Woolf Collection of Chinese Jade*, Sotheby's, London, 2013, cat. no. 45. A similar brush pot inscribed with an imperial poem, from the collection of P. Ayers and later the Thompson-Schwab collection, was sold in our London rooms, 31st January 1961, lot 177, and again, 9th November 2016, lot 17.

Compare also a similar spinach-green jade brushpot depicting 'The Five Old Men of Suiyang', from the collection of A. Knight, sold at Christie's London, 21st March 1966, lot 152, and again in our Paris rooms, 22nd June 2017, lot 9. Two slightly smaller examples, but without feet, include one with scholars and immortals in a landscape, inscribed with an imperial poem and dated Qianlong *yimao xia* (summer of 1795), from the collection of George H. Taber, sold in our New York rooms, 20th March 2012, lot 208; and another carved with figures and auspicious beasts, sold twice in these rooms, 3rd April 1951, lot 189, and 5th May 1959, lot 164, and a third time in our Hong Kong rooms, 5th October 2011, lot 1910A.

如本品飾仙人山水紋飾之碧玉筆簡屬乾隆年間清宮造辦處出品典型,部份作例帶清高宗御詩。乾隆年間,筆筒材質以白玉或碧玉最受推崇, 同期金銀、瓷、漆、掐絲或銅器作例則甚為罕見。筆筒,通用於宮廷各處,亦用於御賜高官重臣、或上奉皇帝,器型多樣,碧玉山水筆筒尤受歡迎。此類筆筒傳世作例甚少,而玉材每塊均屬唯一,故此製成之筆筒亦無完全相同者,每品紋飾設計獨一無二。

本筆筒圓柱渾圓無瑕,紋飾環繞筒身而繪,環筒觀賞,猶如捲軸徐徐展開。玉,乃天然材質,如此紋飾手法,必需精挑上乘玉材,紋飾方可如此絲絲入扣,而原玉形狀,則無從稽考。如若環繞筆筒拍攝全景照片,則可更仔細觀賞紋飾構圖之精美絕倫。比較一例,何東爵士收藏,該筆筒紋飾之全景照圖載於 Jessica Rawson,《 Chinese Jade from the Neolithic to the Qing》展覽圖錄,大英博物館,倫敦,1995年,百99,圖95;百416,圖3,編號29:18。

本品紋飾刻劃五位仙人手持壽桃,其中一位身伴童子,山巒 起伏,木林青蔥,並刻香椿、梧桐及壽松三樹,寓意祥瑞。

比較數例,仙人山水紋飾相近,現存於台北故宮博物院及北京故宮博物院;台北故宮收藏之例缺筒足,載於《宮廷之雅:清代仿古及畫意玉器特展圖錄》,台北,1997年,編號58:北京故宮收藏三例,其一筒型較細長,載於《故宮博物院藏品大系·玉器(三)》,香港,1995年,圖版168-170;再比一無筒足例,載於《中國玉器全集》,卷6:清:石家莊,1991年,圖版278。

This elaborately carved sceptre is impressive and rare for its large size and complex design. Its complex composition of a naturalistically carved *lingzhi* head, with further *lingzhi* emerging from the shaft above nandina berries and orchid leaves, exemplifies the craftsman's high level of artistic and technical skill in harmoniously weaving all the elements together. Such skill is further emphasised in the combination of high relief carving and openwork together with finely carved details, evident in the modelling of the plants where different textures have been captured. Furthermore, the natural inclusions of the boulder have been cleverly incorporated within the decoration to enhance the aesthetic of the piece.

Large jade boulders only became available in increased quantities after the Western campaigns of 1759, when the Manchu court gained control over areas of Khotan and Yarkand, in present day Xinjiang. A steady supply of high-quality jade from this jade-rich region was subsequently presented to the Qing court in spring and autumn of every year. The finest specimens were then transformed to aesthetically pleasing objects by artisans working in the Zaobanchu (Palace Workshops), as well as in the jade workshops in Suzhou and Yangzhou.

It is rare to find sceptres of these proportions; related smaller naturalistically carved examples include two sold in our Hong Kong rooms, the first carved from white jade, decorated with two smaller *lingzhi* and a bat on the *lingzhi*-form terminal and additional lingzhi fungus and leaves on the shaft, attributed to the Qianlong period, sold 19th May 1982, lot 388, and the other carved from celadon and russet jade, rendered with a stylised dragon on the head and two chi-dragons on the elongated handle, 17th May 1977, lot 312; a yellow jade version carved with entwined branches of lingzhi fungus on the curved shaft, sold at Christie's Hong Kong, 2nd October 1991, lot 1459; and a celadon jade example, carved with a cluster of lingzhi fungus on the shaft, attributed to the 19th century, in the Avery Brundage collection and now in the Asian Art Museum of San Francisco, San Francisco, illustrated in René-Yvon Lefebvre d'Argencé, Chinese Jades in the Avery Brundage Collection, Tokyo, 1977, pl. LXXIX.

While the *ruyi* (meaning 'as you wish') sceptre is already a highly auspicious object favoured for its form, the carefully chosen motifs on the present piece further emphasise its propitiousness. The bats, together with peaches and *lingzhi* fungus collectively form the rebus 'May your heart be filled with intelligence when blessings arrive' (*fuzhi xinling*).

This exquisitely enamelled vase is an extremely rare example of Jiaqing marked painted enamel. It is likely to have been produced in the early years of his reign, during the years of the Qianlong Emperor's abdication in 1796 and his death in 1799 when he still retained authority over the imperial workshops in the Forbidden City. The small proportions of the vase and complex yet harmonious design and intricate details of the flower petals, all rendered in vibrant colours against a pink ground, reflect the mastery of the craftsmen in producing unique pieces according to the Emperor's taste.

The fine enamelling and exceptional quality of the vase attests to it being the product of the Enamel Workshop that was in charge of producing cloisonné, champlevé and painted enamel wares on metal, glass and porcelain for the emperor and his family. Located in the Forbidden City, the workshops employed artists of the highest skills who manufactured daily wares as well as one-off, often unconventional, pieces that were frequently commissioned by the emperor himself. The technique of enamelling on metal was originally introduced to the Chinese craftsmen in the Guangzhou area by Jesuit missionaries around 1684. Being a port city, these artisans were the first to be exposed to wares from Europe and had mastered the technical skills necessary.

In style this vase epitomises the fusion of the West with East. The subject of a foliate peony and lotus scroll between stiff leaves and lappets is typically Chinese; however in their rendering they are inspired by the Western *rococo* style. Leaves take on the form of acanthus leaves and the innovative colour palette mirrors the sumptuous taste of French decorative arts of the late eighteenth century.

The small proportions of this vase suggest it was made as a miniature for a curio box. Boxes made to house small carefully collected antiquities were greatly favoured by the Qianlong Emperor. According to the catalogue to the exhibition Lord Jiaqing and the Journey to Taiwan: A Special Exhibition on Cultural Artifacts of the Qing Emperor Renzong, National Palace Museum, Taipei, 2016, p. 242, curios from Qianlong boxes appear to have been reorganised and continued to be appreciated in the Jiaqing reign.

During his reign, the palette was expanded to more than twenty opaque colours, enabling craftsmen to compose lavish and visually appealing designs, as seen on the present vessel. The clever use of the gilt bronze cloisons in depicting the waters and clouds endows a further sense of lavishness while emphasising the lively movements of the brightly enamelled fish.

Compare a closely related example in the Pierre Uldry collection, included in the exhibition Chinesisches Cloisonné. Die Sammlung Pierre Uldry, Rietberg Museum, Zurich, 1985, cat. no. 322; two sold at Christie's Paris, one from the Juan Jose Amezaga et Maria Dolores Feijoo collection, 7th December 2007, lot 38, and the other, 9th June 2015, lot 58; another sold at Christie's Hong Kong, 30th May 2018, lot 3039; and a fifth example, sold at Christie's London, 5th December 1994, lot 258. See also a related basin, but the exterior predominantly decorated in white, from the Avery Brundage collection and now in the Asian Art Museum of San Francisco, San Francisco, included in the exhibition Cloisonné. Chinese Enamels from the Yuan, Ming, and Qing Dynasties, the Bard Graduate Center: Decorative Arts, Design History, Material Culture, New York, 2011, cat. no. 113; and another from the C. Ruxton and Audrey B. Love collection, sold at Christie's New York, 20th October 2004, lot 611.

The dazzling scenes on the present vessel are rich in auspicious symbolism. The idyllic landscapes on the exterior depicting cranes (*lu*), deer (*he*), and gnarled pine trees, all popular emblems of long life, create the phrase *helu tongchun* (May husband and wife enjoy longevity together); while the interior scene of boldly coloured fish (*yu*), a symbol of abundance, swimming in water (*shui*) form the rebus *yushui hexie* (May you be as harmonious as fish and water).

The present piece belongs to a rare group of stands produced during the early Ming period, likely used to support various Buddhist ritual implements on an altar. With its legs cast as the mythological sea creature, *makara*, this stand was probably part of a *chug tor-chos* (water offering set), where a small flat bowl would rest upon the central platform, employed to propitiate the *nagas*, who are divine serpents believed to dwell in any body of water, as well as various classes of deities.

This pair of vases is impressive for their large size and lavish decoration of dragons writhing amongst scrolling clouds, and embodies the grandeur and power of the Qianlong reign (r. 1735-1796). They are a successful marriage of archaism, as seen in the ritual bronze *hu* form, with contemporary design. A closely related vase, from the F. Gordon Morrill Collection, was sold at Christie's Hong Kong, 28th November 2012, lot 2254; two were sold in these rooms, one, 9th November 2016, lot 142, the other, 8th November 2017, lot 46; and a larger pair was sold at Christie's London, 15th May 2012, lot 188. See also a pair of vases cast with phoenixes instead of dragons, which indicates that the pair may have been commissioned as a tribute to the Qianlong Emperor's mother, from the Alfred Morrison collection, sold at Christie's London, 9th November 2004. lot 17.

Such vases would have formed part of a five-piece altar garniture made for specific temples in the Imperial Palace and were generally commissioned as tribute to the emperor. The imposing size would have created a dramatic scene during ritual ceremonies, thus emphasising the importance and solemnity of such events. A set of altar garnitures comprised of two larger vases of this type, two candlesticks and a censer, was sold in these rooms, 11th April 2008, lot 2826; and an undecorated set of similar large size, in the Xianruo Temple, located in the garden of Cining Gong (Palace of Compassion and Tranquillity) within the Forbidden City, where the empress and consorts conducted Buddhist religious ceremonies, is illustrated *in situ* in *Qingdai gongting shenghuo*, Hong Kong, 1985, pl. 467.

Compare also a pair of imperial bronze vases of square section cast with dragons and phoenixes, made for one of the buildings of the Yuanming Yuan (Old Summer Palace), sold three times in our Hong Kong rooms, 29/30th April 1997, lot 730, again, 10th April 2006, lot 1537, and 9th October 2007, lot 1322.

The present ewer is unusual for its elongated ovoid shape and densely carved decoration. Its form appears to have derived from *kundika* ('pure-water bottle'), a metal vessel that was known to have used in Buddhist ceremonies since the Tang dynasty (618-907); see a bronze example in the Idemitsu Museum of Arts, Tokyo, illustrated in *Ancient Chinese Arts in the Idemitsu Collection*, Tokyo, 1989, pl. 328.

White-glazed ewers of this type were known to have been produced at the kilns at the Ding prefecture, modern day Hebei province, from as early as the Five Dynasties period. Early white-glazed wares from these kilns are characterised by the boldly carved design, its depth accentuated by the creamyivory colour glaze. Ewers of various forms attributed to the early Northern Song period, were excavated in 1969 from the foundation of Jingzhong Yuan, Dingzhou, Hebei province and preserved in the Dingzhou City Museum, Dingzhou City, including one with a dragon-head spout carved with a band of lappets on the body, and another rendered with stylised scrolls panelled by two bands of lotus petals, illustrated in *Zhongguo dingyao/Ding Kiln of China*, Beijing, 2012, pls 112 and 114 respectively.

The single character inscribed on the base of the present bowl may be intended to read wu (five) or zheng (regular); several Jian ware bowls and fragments with similar inscriptions are illustrated in James Marshal Plumer, Tenmoku: A Study of the Ware of Chien, Tokyo, 1972, pls 44-50 and 52.

Grand in stature and naturalistically modelled, this horse exemplifies the thriving ceramic sculptural tradition of the Tang dynasty (618-907). It was during this period when equine sculpture reached a new artistic peak, when craftsmen were able to capture the confidence and vigour of the horse. Through its bulging eyes, flaring nostrils, pricked ears and pronounced cheek bones, both the spirit and individuality of the animal is meticulously portrayed. Together with the simplicity of the unadorned body and imposing size, the physical appearance of the present figure exudes a sense of tamed power and strength.

One of the 'Six Livestock' in ancient China, the horse was the embodiment of the highest honours as well as transferable markers of wealth. During the Tang dynasty, ownership of horse statues was asserted as an aristocratic privilege in an edict forbidding artisans and tradesmen this right. The representation of a large sculpture of distinctive quality, such as the present example, reflects the high rank and importance of the owner and his family.

Compare a horse of similar size, covered in a yellowish-brown glaze, from the collection of George Eumofopoulos and now in the British Museum, London, illustrated in William Watson, Tang and Liao Ceramic, London, 1984, pl. 220; another, covered in a rich dark-brown glaze, with patches of cream glaze diffused with splashes of green and ochre on the head, neck and haunches, sold in these rooms, 2nd March 1971, lot 92; and a horse excavated in 1965 from Qinan county. Gansu province, illustrated in 'Gansu qinan xian tangmu qingli jianbao', Wenwu [Cultural Relics], 1975, no. 4, pl. 4, fig 3. Smaller horses of this type include one covered in a pale yellowish-green glaze, from the collection of Mr and Mrs William Dieterle, exhibited in The Arts of the T'ang Dynasty, Los Angeles County Museum, Los Angeles, 1957, cat. no. 164; and a smaller brown-glazed horse, in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, accession number 51.66.

Notable for its large size and crisp casting, the present figure represents the Medicine Buddha (Bhaishajyaguru), as evident by the *myrobalan* fruit he holds in his right hand. His face is sensitively modelled with a serene countenance, which is echoed in the gentle folds of robes that are embellished with foliate scrolls. The impressive scale of the lotus flower base adds a sense of authority.

A related figure of a Buddha seated on a lotus flower base of this size, but with his right hand held in *blumisparsamudra*, was sold in our New York rooms, 23rd March 2011, lot 692. See also a gilt-bronze and polychrome figure rendered with similar *mudras* to the present, attributed to the Ming dynasty, sold in these rooms, 16th May 2007, lot 43; and a larger gilt-bronze figure rendered with his right hand in *blumisparsamudra*, attributed to the 17th century, sold at Christie's New York, 6th November 1980, lot 212. Further gilt-bronze figures of similar style include a bodhisattva sold in these rooms, 14th November 2000, lot 16; and a figure of Guanyin, attributed to the 16th/17th century, sold at Christie's London, 15th May 2018, lot 166.

IMPERIAL CERAMICS AND WORKS OF ART FROM THE DETRING/VON HANNEKEN COLLECTION (LOTS 70-91)

The collection from which a number of the following lots derive was formed during the late Qing period by two of the most influential Germans living and working in Tianjin in the late 19th century: Gustav Detring (1842-1913) and his son-in-law Constantin von Hanneken (1854-1925) (fig. 1). Individually both men operated at the highest levels of the Qing bureaucracy and played historically significant roles in the politics, diplomacy and in the military of the tumultuous late Qing period.

Gustav Detring (1842-1913)

Born in the Northern Rhine-Westphalia, Gustav Detring (fig. 2) moved to China in 1865 to join the Customs Service, working under Sir Robert Hart, Inspector General of the Imperial Maritime Customs Service. By 1872 Detring had risen to become a Customs Commissioner in Tianjin and, six years later was appointed to serve as the private and trusted advisor to Viceroy Li Hongzhang, a position he held for twenty seven years. During his time in China,

Detring rose to have one of the senior positions in the Qing bureaucracy, including a post in the Zongli Yamen (Foreign Ministry) and as Commissioner for the Northern Ports. His achievements in China are nothing short of staggering. He negotiated a series of treaties and trade agreements on behalf of the Chinese government; was used by Li during various diplomatic missions in the 1870s-80s; and was relied upon to deal with German arms manufacturers and in hiring military experts. During the Sino-Japanese War, an Imperial edict ordered Detring 'to proceed to Japan to effect a settlement'. In 1896, Detring was conferred with Dingdaihualing 'Rank One' by the Dowager Empress Cixi, making him the highest ranking Westerner in China, as memorialized in a painting now at the Astor Hotel in Tianjin (fig. 3).

Detring's contributions to Tianjin - the city he made his home - were no less commendable. He founded Tianjin University, co-published the Chinese Times, constructed the Tianjin racecourse, paved the roads

此收藏出自一個來源頗為顯赫的家族。此珍藏集大成於晚清,藏家乃十九世紀下半葉在天津最具影響力的兩位德國人——德璀琳 (Gustav Detring 1842-1913)及其女婿漢納根 (Constantin von Hanneken 1854-1925)(圖一)。兩位分別在清政府最高權力機構擔任要職,在局勢動蕩的晚清時期於中國政治、外交和軍事等領域扮演了舉足輕重的角色。

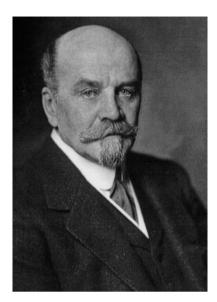
德璀琳 (1842-1913)

德璀琳(圖二)出生於德國北部萊茵-威斯特伐利亞,於 1865年移居中國,在海關總稅務司赫德爵士(Sir Robert Hart)的手下工作。1872年德璀琳開始供職天津海關稅務司,六年後,被委任為總督李鴻章的私人親信顧問,並擔任此職務長達二十七年之久。德璀琳在中國期間,曾任職於總理衙門(外交部)以及北方港口稅務司,皆屬清政府總理衙門(外交部)以及北方港口稅務司,皆屬清政府最高權力機構。他在中國取得的成就非常人所能,才能卓越出眾。出於李鴻章的信任,他在1870到1880年代之間代表清政府參與了多項外交條約和貿易協定的談判,並且負責與德國軍火商交易及聘請軍事專家。甲午戰爭時期,他奉旨前往日本議和。1896年,慈禧太后授予德璀琳一品頂戴花翎,使他成為當朝官銜最高的洋人。天津利順德大飯店內懸掛的一幅油畫記錄了這份前無來者的榮耀(圖三)。

德璀琳以天津為家·對天津貢獻良多。他創立了天津大學、 合辦了《中國時報》、建造天津賽馬場、在租界地鋪路、修 建市政廳,並以英國軍官查理·喬治·戈登 (Charles 'Chinese' Gordon) 的名字將其命名為戈登堂 (Gordon Hall)。德璀琳1913年逝世時,一份中國報紙評論道:「他對天津的繁榮發展有著極大的影響。天津公共空間的每一階段的發展,都可看到德璀琳先生對這個社會偉大而寶貴的貢獻。」

漢納根 (1854-1925)

漢納根(圖四)生於萊茵河畔的特里爾鎮(Trier),被 家人稱為「愛中國主義者」, 漢納根曾任普魯士野戰砲 兵隊的上尉,後被德璀琳納為軍事顧問。1879年移居 中國,迅速成為李鴻章的密友兼幕僚,一直為其工作 到1887年。李鴻章委任漢納根負責清軍之重組及現代 化,他參與設計建造多處海軍砲台,包括著名的旅順口 砲台。漢納根由於1881年建造旅順砲台有功,表現突 出,迅速升任統領位置,獲建造大連灣、威海衛砲台之 重任。1894年11月中日甲午戰爭爆發,光緒皇帝委任漢 納根領總兵銜,並承諾充足的經費和權力,望其帶領新 軍擊潰日敵。然而,迫於朝內仇外情緒的壓力,計劃最 終被擱置,遂導致旅順砲台和威海衛砲台淪陷。德璀 琳與漢納根共同掌管的英資企業開平礦產,是第一家 把西方工業技術引進中國的公司。漢納根於1895年與 德璀琳長女艾爾莎(Elsa)成婚,實為兩個顯赫家族的 完美聯姻(圖五)。



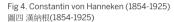




Fig 5. Residence of Constantin Von Hanneken, Tianjin 圖五 漢納根故居,天津

of the foreign settlement, and was instrumental in the construction of the City Hall, named 'Gordon Hall' after Charles 'Chinese' Gordon. At the time of his death in 1913, a Chinese newspaper wrote: "His Influence upon the permanent prosperity of [Tianjin] is incalculable. We can hardly find a stage of public life in our present society which has not been associated with the great and valuable contribution made by Detring."

Constantin von Hanneken (1854-1925)

Born in Trier on the Rhine, and described by his family as a 'patriot of China', Constantin von Hanneken (fig. 4) had served as a Captain in the Prussian Field Artillery before being hired as one of Detring's military advisors. He moved to China in 1879 to take up the position and quickly established himself as a close friend and advisor to Li Hongzhang, for whom he worked until 1887. Li put von Hanneken in charge of reorganizing and modernizing the Chinese army and in designing and building several naval forts including, most

significantly, Port Arthur (Lüshun gang). Von Hanneken was highly decorated for having established Port Arthur in 1881, eventually rising to the rank of Chinese general, and later tasked with the fortification of Talienwan and Weihaiwei by Japanese forces. During the Sino-Japanese war, in November 1894, the Guangxu Emperor issued a decree making von Hanneken commander in chief of China's armies with 'ample funds and power', in the hope that a Western general could defeat the Japanese army. Under pressure from xenophobic factions within the court, the plan was later reversed, eventually leading to the capturing of Port Arthur and Weihaiwei. Together Detring and von Hanneken also oversaw the vast British controlled Kaiping Mining Company, which was the first successful large-scale effort to introduce Western technology and methods into industrial production in China. Von Hanneken married Detring's eldest daughter, Elsa, in 1895, thereby uniting these two prominent families.

德璀琳和漢納根在中國取得的汗馬功勞均有詳細的記載,然而他們的收藏愛好卻鮮為人知。因為兩人皆為李鴻章的親信幕僚,長期與清朝廷、慈禧太后和光緒帝密切往來,為他們的收藏提供了極大的便利。其部分藏品為朝廷所賞,部分藏品則為裝點兩人在天津富麗堂皇的宅院而納(圖六)。當時兩人在中國的官場及社交圈結交了許多滿負盛名的收藏家——包括在1876年至1884年間擔任海關稅務總司的賀璧理(Alfred E. Hippisley 1848-1939),他曾擁有著最為重要的清瓷珍藏之一;另有胡佛(Herbert Hoover 1874-1964),曾在開平礦業任工程師,後成為美國第三十一任總統,他偏愛收藏中國青花瓷;而漢納根擔任海關關員的妹夫伊斯特·奧爾(Ernst Ohlmer 1847-1927),亦收藏有大量中國瓷器,目前藏於德國希爾德斯海市的姆羅默和佩利措伊斯博物館;此外,圓明園遺址的最早的其中一份圖像記錄(攝於1872年),亦出於奧爾之手。

1895年,漢納根回德國暫留了一段時間,出於安全保管的考量,他將大量的中國瓷器帶回德國。1899年,他借出收藏中的160件藏品給希爾德斯海姆羅默博物館。此組藏品於1959年歸還予漢納根伉儷(Constantin and Elsa von Hanneken)。1919年,漢納根一家離開天津,移居漢諾威。時值德國戰後經濟大蕭條,漢納根與家人於1922年回

到中國·本期望重掌開平礦產·但於1925年3月卒於天津· 其遺孀及子女於1926年返回德國。大部分藏品一直留在德 國直到20世紀上半葉。30年代·其子移居美國·亦有帶同部 份藏品移居。餘下部份自1932年起與新加入的奧爾收藏同 於希爾德斯海姆羅默與佩利措伊斯博物館·直至該館1944 年撤空為止。此後·漢納根收藏當中之藏品已經於1959年 歸還予其後人·至今仍屬德璀琳及漢納根後人所擁有。

此次拍賣以及「聖喬治街拍場:中國藝術」拍賣呈獻多件出自漢納根收藏之藝術品,其中數品特別能夠顯示漢納根、德璀琳及奧爾三人之間的因緣。例如一件白釉如意耳葫蘆尊(編號73)及一件青花雲龍戲珠紋葫蘆瓶(編號70),可見於同一張攝於天津德璀琳府邸大廳之照片中。1928年德璀琳夫人返回德國,此兩件瓷器與其他德璀琳收藏瓷器及藝術品同列於中國清關文件之上。德璀琳夫人離世後,此批藝術品由德璀琳女兒、漢納根夫人艾爾莎承繼。另可比較另一作例,如一件胭脂紅地粉彩纏枝花卉紋盌(編號72),早於1899年便已借展予吕梅尔和佩里扎乌斯博物館,或與出自漢納根收藏的一件白地三彩雲龍戲珠紋梅瓶(編號75)一同於1928年捐贈予吕梅尔和佩里扎乌斯博物館,後於1930年展出。

Whilst Detring and von Hanneken's professional endeavours in China are well documented, their collecting activities are less known. Collecting Chinese art appears to have been something of a hobby for both men - no doubt facilitated through their close working relationships with Li Hongzhang as well as their access to the Qing court, including to the Dowager Empress Cixi and to the Guangxu Emperor. Certain works from the collection were likely personally gifted to them by the Qing court, but collecting may well also have been a means of decorating their palatial Tianjin homes (fig. 5, 6 & 7). Furthermore, both men moved in the same professional and social circles in China as some of the most legendary Chinese art collectors of the time, including Alfred E. Hippisley (1848-1939), commissioner of the maritime customs between 1876 and 1884, who formed one of the greatest collections of Qing dynasty porcelain; Herbert Hoover (1874-1964), a mining engineer who worked at the Kaiping Mining operation,

later becoming the 31st President of the United States, who collected Chinese blue and white porcelain; and von Hanneken's brother-in-law Ernst Ohlmer (1847-1927), a maritime customs officer better known for providing one of the earliest photographic records of the remains of the Yuanming yuan in 1872, and whose extensive collection of Chinese porcelain is today housed in the Roemer-Pelizaeus Museum in Hildesheim.

Von Hanneken returned briefly to Germany in 1895, bringing a large quantity of porcelain from his collection back with him for safekeeping. In 1899. Approximately 160 pieces from his collection were loaned to the Roemer-Pelizaeus Museum in Hildesheim. They were returned to the heirs of Constantin and Elsa von Hanneken in 1959. In 1919, the family left Tianjin and settled in Hannover, Germany. Against the backdrop of the post-war economic depression in Germany, von Hanneken returned to

China with his family in 1922 hoping to regain his influence and position in the Kaiping Mining Company. In March 1925 he died in Tianjin, and Elsa and their children returned to Germany in 1926. Most of the collection remained in Germany through the first half of the 20th century. A number of pieces accompanied their son when he emigrated to the United States in the 1930s. The remaining part exhibited together with the Ohlmer collection in the Roemer-Pelizaeus Museum in Hildesheim from 1932 until the evacuation of the Museum's collection in 1944. Since the pieces from the von Hanneken Collection were restituted to the heirs in 1959, they have remained with Detring and von Hanneken's descendants to this day.

Several of the porcelains and works of art from the von Hanneken Collection offered in this sale and in the St George sale illustrate the close ties between Constantin von Hanneken, Gustav Detring and Ernst

Ohlmer. For example, the rare white-glazed double gourd vase (lot 73 and the blue and white dragon double-gourd vase (lot 70) are illustrated together in a photograph taken in the 1890s depicting the salon of the Detring home in Tianjin. These two pieces were listed by Chinese customs among other porcelains and works of art from the Detring Collection when his wife Eva Detring returned to Germany in 1928. After her death, they were passed down to Gustav Detring's daughter, Elsa Detring, Constantin von Hanneken's wife. Other pieces, such as the rubyground famille rose bowl (lot 72), were on loan to the Roemer-Pelizaeus Museum as early as 1899 and may have been included in selection of porcelains including a green and a blue 'dragon' meiping (lots 74 and 75) from the von Hanneken Collection exhibited alongside the Ohlmer Collection of Chinese porcelains and works of art donated to the Roemer-P Museum in 1928 and exhibited in 1930. Magnificently painted with nine dragons leaping through clouds above crashing waves, this vase boasts the formidable power of the Qing Empire. In its dynamic composition and skilfully painted design, it belongs to the early years of the Jiaqing Emperor's reign, when the imperial kilns at Jingdezhen were still heavily influenced by the imperial patronage of the preceding Qianlong period. The vivacity of the cobalt blue, superbly rendered dragons and the impeccably finished body emphasise both the craftsmanship of the time and the splendour of the period. In its complex design, it also epitomises the importance of manipulating negative space in the overall composition to achieve balance and harmony.

Jiaqing vases of this type are rare and only two closely related examples appear to be known, both sold in our Hong Kong rooms, one, 11th April 2008, lot 2831, and the other, 31st October 1974, lot 199.

Vases decorated with a central frontal dragon in pursuit of a flaming pearl, and surrounded by secondary dragons, appear to have been a popular motif during the Jiaqing reign, appearing on a variety of pieces of various shapes; for

example see two blue and white vases in the National Palace Museum, Taipei, one with a long cylindrical neck, included in the Museum's exhibition Lord Jiaqing and the Journey to Taiwan: A Special Exhibition on Cultural Artifacts of the Qing Emperor Renzong, 2016, cat. no. III-36, and a globular example, published in the Illustrated Catalogue of Ch'ing Dynasty Porcelain in the National Palace Museum, vol. 2, Tokyo, 1981, pl. 93; and another one sold in these rooms, 2nd May 1995, lot 86.

Double-gourd vases painted with front and side facing dragons in copper-red from the Qianlong period may have served as the inspiration for the present vase. See a closely related Qianlong example sold in these rooms rooms, 20th June 2001, and again in our Hong Kong rooms, 9th October 2007, lot 1216; and another from the collection of T. Y. Chao, included in the exhibition Ming and Ch'ing Porcelain from the Collection of the T. Y. Chao Family Foundation, Hong Kong Museum of Art, Hong Kong, 1978, cat. no. 781, and sold three times in our Hong Kong rooms, 17th November 1975, lot 222, 18th November 1986, lot 71, and 3rd April 2018, lot 3203.

The harmonious form, purity of colour and pleasing tactility of the present vase embodies the voluntary reduction of ornamentation and aesthetic triumph achieved by potters of the Qing dynasty. The revival of the imperial kilns in Jingdezhen under the Kangxi Emperor and his pursuit of the recreation of forgotten glaze recipes was continued under the Yongzheng and Qianlong Emperors. Combined with their love of antiquity, they pushed craftsmen to the limits of their abilities, of which flawless light monochrome wares such as the present represented one of the most understated vet difficult achievements. Such wares required perfection in every stage of production, from the material to the potting, glazing and firing, as any defect would result in the destruction of the piece.

Plain white vases of this type are extremely rare. During the Qing dynasty, three types of white wares are recorded to have been produced:
Ding-type wares, which were fired at a higher temperature than the original; soft-paste type wares which were characterised by a yellowishivory tinge; and the traditional high-fired wares with a transparent glaze, first created during the Yongle reign of the Ming dynasty, which formed the majority of white wares including the present.

The form appears to derive from early Ming moonflasks (*bianhu*) painted with flower scrolls in underglaze-blue which were revived during the Yongzheng reign and continued into the Qianlong period. This exact shape is better known with an enamelled design of exquisitely painted butterflies

and flowers, also with an underglaze-blue Qianlong seal mark, of which only six pieces are known to have been published, including a pair sold at Christie's London, 9th May 2017, lot 99.

Qianlong vases of related double-gourd form and flanked with ruvi handles, but with slight variations in proportions, are known; see one covered in a clair-de-lune glaze, from the Wah Kwong collection, included in the exhibition Qing porcelain from the Wah Kwong Collection, The Art Gallery, Chinese University of Hong Kong, Hong Kong, 1974, cat. no. 15; another sold at Christie's London, 12th June 1989, lot 35A; and one carved with stylised lotus scrolls, covered in a pale celadon glaze, from the collection of the Hosokawa clan, published in Sekai toii zenshu / Collection of World's Ceramics, vol. 12: Shinchou henfu Annan, Thai / Ch'ing Dynasty with a Supplement on Annamese Ceramics, Tokyo, 1956, pl. 92. A Qianlong mark and period vase of comparable form, decorated with lotus scrolls in underglaze-blue, was included in the exhibition Ming and Ch'ing Porcelain from the T.Y. Chao Family Foundation, Hong Kong Museum of Art, Hong Kong, 1978, cat. no. 88.

Instituted by the Guangxu Emperor on 7 February 1882, the Order of the Double Dragon, or 'Double Dragon Precious Star', was China's first Western-style Order and was instituted solely as a decoration for foreigners.

The forced opening of China after the Opium Wars and 'unequal treaties' engendered immense change, upheaval and the arrival of numerous diplomats, traders, missionaries, railway constructors and military adventurers from abroad. As Gavin Goh, writing in the *Journal of the Orders and Medals Society of America* (September-

October 2014, pp 4-15) has shown, many of these individuals rendered long and loyal service to the Qing Court and this was to be duly recognised by the award of the Order of the Double Dragon.

Sir Robert Hart (1835-1911), Inspector-General of Chinese Imperial Customs (and Gustav Detring's immediate superior) was instrumental in the establishment of the Order, first considered in the early 1870s. Designed to symbolise China's efforts to engage the West on a basis of equality and mutual respect, the Order and its insignia took over a decade to prepare. A complicated structure of precedence evolved, comprising five classes of which the first three were each subdivided into three grades. Insignia of the first type were issued for about 20 years but began to be replaced by transitional-type breast stars (and some badges) of rather more European style in the 1890s, culminating in the introduction of a new type Order of the Double Dragon in 1902. This second type was more standardised in form than the first and Chinese citizens finally became eligible to receive the Order in 1908. It is known to have been conferred until the very last days of the Qing Dynasty in 1912.

This and the following five lots are known to have been awarded to either Gustav Detring or to his son-in-law Constantin von Hanneken.

鴉片戰爭後,清廷被逼簽訂不平等條約及對外開放,社會經歷巨變,時勢動蕩,外國來使、商人、傳教士、鐵路建設商及軍事探險家紛紛來華。Gavin Goh於《Journal of the Orders and Medals Society of America》(2014年9-10月,頁4-15)評論道,此批來華人士其中多有長期效忠清廷者,故而獲頒發御賜雙龍寶星。

赫德爵士(1835-1911年)乃海關總稅務司,亦為 德璀琳直屬上司,在御賜雙龍寶星訂制過程當中 扮演重要角色。該勛章於1870年代初開始構思, 以代表中國與西方國家平定交往、互相尊重為 旨,從構思至徽章設計等過程共超過十年。勛章 分五等、每等各分三級。第一款沿用約二十年, 此後漸由歐洲風格更濃厚之胸章取代,1902年改 用全新款式。第二款設計較統一,1908年起中國 人亦可獲頒此章,直至1912年清朝結束方止。

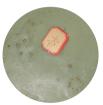

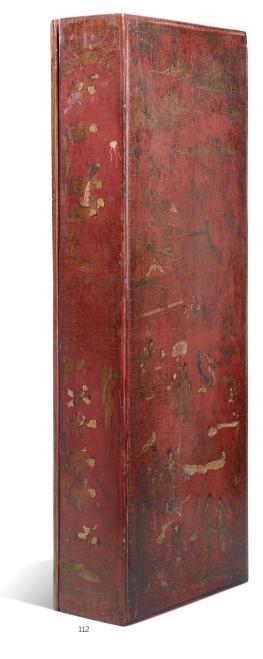

A sense of refined grandeur is successfully captured by the minimalist form of this attractive table, supported by four elegant square legs culminating at horse-hoof feet. This simple design also highlights the rich colour and attractive natural patterns of the grain of the wood. Long tables such as the present are known as *tiaozhuo* and would have been used in the scholar's studio as its length and absence of stretchers would have made it suitable for sitting at for the creation and admiration of scroll paintings, while holding books, brush holders and other scholar's objects.

Known as *sijiangui* (four-part wardrobes), or *dingxiangligui* (top cupboards and upright wardrobes), massive two-part cabinets of this type were generally made and displayed in pairs. Composed of two cabinets stacked on top of each other, the spacious lower cabinet was used to hold robes and large items, while smaller items, or objects that were not often needed, were reserved for the top, which being so high up often necessitated the use of a ladder. 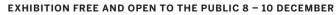

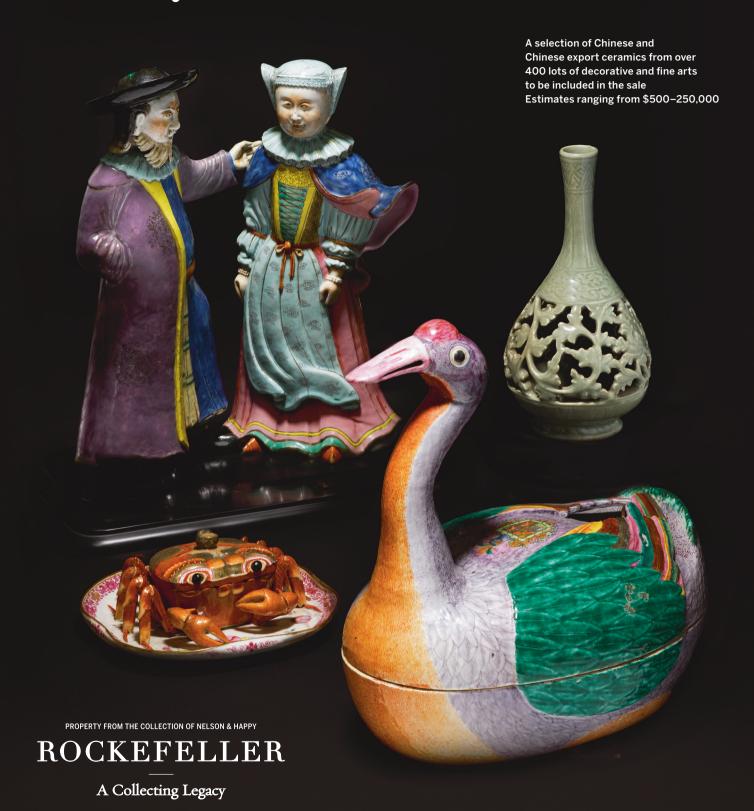

VAT AND OTHER TAX INFORMATION FOR BUYERS AT BOOKS SALES

The following paragraphs are intended to give general guidance to buyers on the VAT and certain other potential tax implications of purchasing at Sotheby's book department sales. The information concerns the most usual circumstances and is not intended to be complete. In all cases the relevant tax legislation takes precedence and the VAT rates in effect on the day of the auction will be the rates charged. It should be noted that, for VAT purposes only, Sotheby's is not usually treated as an agent and most property is sold as if it is the property of Sotheby's.

In the following paragraphs, reference to VAT symbols shall mean those symbols located beside the lot number or the pre-sale estimates in the catalogue (or amending sale room notice).

1. PROPERTY WITH NO VAT SYMBOL

Where there is no VAT symbol the property is free from VAT and Sotheby's will not charge VAT on either the hammer price or the buyer's premium.

2. PROPERTY WITH A # SYMBOL

Although these items are not free from VAT, Sotheby's is able to use the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme and VAT will not normally be charged on the hammer price.

Sotheby's must bear VAT on the buyer's premium and hence will charge an amount in lieu of VAT at the standard rate on this premium. This amount will form part of the buyer's premium on our invoice and will not be separately identified.

Please see 'Exports from the European Union' for the conditions to be fulfilled before the amount in lieu of VAT in the buyer's premium may be cancelled or refunded.

(VAT-registered buyers from within the European Union (EU) should note that the amount in lieu of VAT contained within the buyer's premium cannot be cancelled or refunded by Sotheby's or HM Revenue and Customs.)

Buyers from within the EU requiring an invoice under the normal VAT rules, instead of a margin scheme invoice, should notify the Post Sale Service Group or the Client Accounts Department on the day of the auction and an invoice with VAT on the hammer price will be raised. Buyers requiring reinvoicing under the normal VAT rules subsequent to a margin scheme invoice having been raised should contact the Client Accounts Department for assistance.)

3. PROPERTY WITH A † SYMBOL

These items are standard-rated and will be sold under the normal UK VAT rules. Both the hammer price and buyer's premium will be subject to VAT at the standard rate.

Please see 'Exports from the European Union' for the conditions to be fulfilled before the VAT charged on the hammer price may be cancelled or refunded. Sotheby's must always charge VAT on the buyer's premium for these lots and will neither cancel nor refund the VAT charged.

(VAT-registered buyers from other European Union (EU) countries may have the VAT on the hammer price cancelled or refunded if they provide Sotheby's with their VAT registration number and evidence that the property has been removed from the UK within three months of the date of sale. The evidence of removal required is a certificate of shipment or, if the lots were carried by hand, proof of travel and completion of a form available from the Post Sale Service Group.

(All business buyers from outside the UK should refer to 'VAT Refunds from HM Revenue and Customs' for information on how to recover VAT incurred on the buyer's premium.)

4. PROPERTY WITH A α SYMBOL

Items sold to buyers whose address is in the EU will be assumed to be remaining in the EU. The property will be invoiced as if it had a # symbol (see 'Property with a # symbol' above). However, if the property is to be exported from the EU, Sotheby's will reinvoice the property under the normal VAT rules (see 'Property sold with a † symbol' above) as requested by the seller.

Items sold to buyers whose address is outside the FLI will be assumed to be exported from the EU. The property will be invoiced under the normal VAT rules (see 'Property sold with a + symbol' above). Although the hammer price will be subject to VAT this will be cancelled or refunded upon export - see 'Exports from the European Union'. The buyer's premium will always attract VAT. However, buyers who are not intending to export their property from the EU should notify our Client Accounts Department on the day of the sale and the property will be re-invoiced showing no VAT on the hammer price (see 'Property sold with a # symbol' above).

5. PROPERTY SOLD WITH A + OR O SYMBOI

These items have been imported from outside the European Union (EU) to be sold at auction under temporary importation. When Sotheby's releases such property to buyers in the UK, the buyer will become the importer and must pay Sotheby's import VAT at the following rates on the hammer price:

- Ω the standard rate

You should also note that the appropriate rate will be that in force at the date of collection from Sotheby's and not that in force at the date of sale.

These lots will be invoiced under the auctioneers margin scheme. Sotheby's must bear VAT on the buyer's premium

and hence will charge an amount in lieu of VAT at the standard rate on this premium. This amount will form part of the buyer's premium on our invoice and will not be separately identified.

(VAT-registered buyers from the EU should note that the import VAT charged on property released in the UK cannot be cancelled or refunded by Sotheby's, however you may be able to seek repayment by applying to HM Revenue and Customs - see VAT refunds from HM Revenue and Customs)

(VAT-registered buyers from the UK should note that the invoice issued by Sotheby's for these items is not suitable evidence in respect of import VAT.)

This may enable a buyer who is VAT registered elsewhere in the EU to avoid payment of VAT in the United Kingdom. Re-invoicing in this way may make the lot ineligible to be re-sold using the margin scheme. Sotheby's will transfer all lots sold subject to Temporary Admission to its Custom warehouse immediately after sale.

(VAT-registered buyers from the UK should note that the invoice issued by Sotheby's for these items is not suitable evidence in respect of import VAT.)

On request, immediately after sale, the Temporary Admission Department can either ask HM Revenue and Customs to generate a C79 certificate (for UK buyers), or obtain a copy of the import C88 (for other EU VAT registered buyers), which may be used to claim recovery of the VAT. Otherwise Sotheby's may re-invoice the lot as if it had been sold with a + symbol and charge VAT at the standard rate on both the hammer price and premium and provide a tax invoice to the buyer. This may enable a buyer who is VAT registered elsewhere in the EU to avoid payment of VAT in the United Kingdom, Re-invoicing in this way may make the lot ineligible to be re-sold using the margin scheme.

6. EXPORTS FROM THE EUROPEAN UNION

The following types of VAT may be cancelled or refunded by Sotheby's on exports made within three months of the sale date if strict conditions are met:

- the amount in lieu of VAT charged on buyer's premium for property sold under the margin scheme i.e. with a # symbol or a α symbol.
- the VAT on the hammer price for property sold under the normal VAT rules i.e. with a \dagger symbol or a α symbol.
- the import VAT charged on the hammer price and VAT on the buyer's premium for property sold under temporary importation i.e. with a ± or a Ω symbol.

In each of the above examples, where the appropriate conditions are satisfied, no VAT will be charged if, at or before the time of invoicing, the buyer instructs Sotheby's to export the property from the EU. If such instruction is received after payment, a refund of the VAT amount will be made. If a buyer later decides not to use Sotheby's shipping services a revised invoice will be raised charging VAT.

Where the buyer carries purchases from the EU personally or uses the services of another shipper, Sotheby's will charge the VAT amount due as a deposit and refund it if the lot has been exported within three months of the date of sale and the following conditions are met:

- for lots sold under the margin scheme (no VAT symbol) or the normal VAT rules († symbol), Sotheby's is provided with appropriate documentary proof of export from the EU. Buyers carrying their own property should obtain hand-carry papers from the Shipping department to facilitate this process.
- for lots sold under temporary importation $(\mbox{$\updownarrow$}\mbox{ or }\Omega$ symbols), Sotheby's is provided with a copy of the correct paperwork duly completed and stamped by HM Revenue and Customs which show the property has been exported from the EU via the United Kingdom. It is essential for shippers acting on behalf of buyers to collect copies of the original import papers from our Shipping Department. HM Revenue and Customs insist that the correct Customs procedures are followed and Sotheby's will not be able to issue any refunds where the export documents do not exactly comply with their regulations. Property subject to temporary importation must be transferred to another Customs procedure immediately if any restoration or repair work is to be carried
- buyers carrying their own property must obtain hand-carry papers from the Shipping Department for which a charge of £30 will be made. The VAT refund will be processed once the appropriate paperwork has been returned to Sotheby's.
- Sotheby's is not able to cancel or refund any VAT charged on sales made to UK or EU private residents unless the lot is subject to temporary importation and the property is exported from the EU within three months of the date of sale.
- any refund of VAT is subject to a minimum of £50 per shipment and a processing charge of £20.

Buyers intending to export, repair, restore or alter lots under temporary importation († or Ω symbols) should notify the Shipping Department before collection. Failure to do so may result in the import VAT becoming payable immediately and Sotheby's being unable to refund the VAT charged on deposit.

7. VAT REFUNDS FROM HM REVENUE AND CUSTOMS

Where VAT charged cannot be cancelled or refunded by Sotheby's, it may be possible to seek repayment from HM Revenue and Customs. Repayments in this manner are limited to businesses located outside the UK and may be considered for

- VAT charged on buyer's premium on property sold under the normal VAT rules (i.e. with a \uparrow or α symbol) or
- import VAT charged on the hammer price and buyer's premium for lots sold under temporary importation (i.e. with a \ddagger or Ω symbol).

8. SALES AND USE TAXES

Buyers should note that local sales taxes or use taxes may become payable upon import of items following purchase (for example, use tax may be due when purchased items are imported into certain states in the US). Buyers should obtain their own advice in this regard.

In the event that Sotheby's ships items for a purchaser in this sale to a destination within a US state in which Sotheby's is registered to collect sales tax. Sotheby's is obliged to collect and remit the respective state's sales / use tax in effect on the total purchase price (including hammer price, buyer's premium, shipping costs and insurance) of such items, regardless of the country in which the purchaser resides or is a citizen. Where the purchaser has provided Sotheby's with a valid Resale Exemption Certificate prior to the release of the property, sales / use tax will not be charged. CONDITIONS OF BUSINESS FOR BUYERS

The nature of the relationship between Sotheby's, Sellers and Bidders and the terms on which Sotheby's (as auctioneer) and Sellers contract with Bidders are set out below.

Bidders' attention is specifically drawn to Conditions 3 and 4 below, which require them to investigate lots prior to bidding and which contain specific limitations and exclusions of the legal liability of Sotheby's and Sellers. The limitations and exclusions relating to Sotheby's are consistent with its role as auctioneer of large quantities of goods of a wide variety and Bidders should pay particular attention to these Conditions.

1. INTRODUCTION

- (a) Sotheby's and Sellers' contractual relationship with prospective Buyers is governed by:
- (i) these Conditions of Business;
- (ii) the Conditions of Business for Sellers displayed in the saleroom and which are available upon request from Sotheby's UK salerooms or by telephoning +44 (0)20 7293 6482;
- (iii) Sotheby's Authenticity Guarantee as printed in the sale catalogue;
- (iv) any additional notices and terms printed in the sale catalogue, including the guide to Buying at Auction; and

- (v) in respect of online bidding via the internet, the BidNOW Conditions on the Sotheby's website,
- in each case as amended by any saleroom notice or auctioneer's announcement at the auction
- (b) As auctioneer, Sotheby's acts as agent for the Seller. A sale contract is made directly between the Seller and the Buyer. However, Sotheby's may own a lot (and in such circumstances acts in a principal capacity as Seller) and/or may have a legal, beneficial or financial interest in a lot as a secured creditor or otherwise.

2. COMMON TERMS

In these Conditions of Business:

- "Bidder" is any person considering, making or attempting to make a bid, by whatever means, and includes Buyers;
- "Buyer" is the person who makes the highest bid or offer accepted by the auctioneer, and includes such person's principal when bidding as agent;
- "Buyer's Expenses" are any costs or expenses due to Sotheby's from the Buyer and any Artist's Resale Right levy payable in respect of the sale of the Property, including an amount in respect of any applicable VAT thereon:
- "Buyer's Premium" is the commission payable by the Buyer on the Hammer Price at the rates set out in the guide to Buying at Auction plus any applicable VAT or an amount in lieu of VAT:
- "Counterfeit" is as defined in Sotheby's Authenticity Guarantee;
- "Hammer Price" is the highest bid accepted by the auctioneer by the fall of the hammer, (in the case of wine, as apportioned pro-rata by reference to the number of separately identified items in that lot), or in the case of a post-auction sale, the agreed sale price;
- **"Purchase Price"** is the Hammer Price and applicable Buyer's Premium and VAT;
- "Reserve" is the (confidential) minimum Hammer Price at which the Seller has agreed to sell a lot;
- "Seller" is the person offering a lot for sale (including their agent (other than Sotheby's), executors or personal representatives);
- "Sotheby's" means Sotheby's, the unlimited company which has its registered office at 34-35 New Bond Street, London W1A 2AA:
- "Sotheby's Company" means both Sotheby's in the USA and any of its subsidiaries (including Sotheby's in London) and Sotheby's Diamonds SA and its subsidiaries (in each case "subsidiary" having the meaning of Section 1159 of the Companies Act 2006);
- **"VAT"** is Value Added Tax at the prevailing rate. Further information is contained in the guide to Buying at Auction.

3. DUTIES OF BIDDERS AND OF SOTHEBY'S IN RESPECT OF ITEMS FOR SALE

(a) Sotheby's knowledge in relation to each lot is partially dependent on information

- provided to it by the Seller, and Sotheby's is not able to and does not carry out exhaustive due diligence on each lot. Bidders acknowledge this fact and accept responsibility for carrying out inspections and investigations to satisfy themselves as to the lots in which they may be interested.
- (b) Each lot offered for sale at Sotheby's is available for inspection by Bidders prior to the sale. Sotheby's accepts bids on lots solely on the basis that Bidders (and independent experts on their behalf, to the extent appropriate given the nature and value of the lot and the Bidder's own expertise) have fully inspected the lot prior to bidding and have satisfied themselves as to both the condition of the lot and the accuracy of its description
- (c) Bidders acknowledge that many lots are of an age and type which means that they are not in perfect condition. All lots are offered for sale in the condition they are in at the time of the auction (whether or not Bidders are in attendance at the auction). Condition reports may be available to assist when inspecting lots. Catalogue descriptions and condition reports may on occasions make reference to particular imperfections of a lot, but Bidders should note that lots may have other faults not expressly referred to in the catalogue or condition report. Illustrations are for identification purposes only and will not convey full information as to the actual condition of lots.
- (d) Information provided to Bidders in respect of any lot, including any estimate, whether written or oral and including information in any catalogue, condition or other report, commentary or valuation, is not a representation of fact but rather is a statement of opinion genuinely held by Sotheby's. Any estimate may not be relied on as a prediction of the selling price or value of the lot and may be revised from time to time in Sotheby's absolute discretion.
- (e) No representations or warranties are made by Sotheby's or the Seller as to whether any lot is subject to copyright or whether the Buyer acquires copyright in any lot.
- (f) Subject to the matters referred to at 3(a) to 3(e) above and to the specific exclusions contained at Condition 4 below, Sotheby's shall exercise such reasonable care when making express statements in catalogue descriptions or condition reports as is consistent with its role as auctioneer of lots in the sale to which these Conditions relate, and in the light of:
- (i) the information provided to it by the Seller:
- (ii) scholarship and technical knowledge; and
- (iii) the generally accepted opinions of relevant experts, in each case at the time any such express statement is made.

4. EXCLUSIONS AND LIMITATIONS OF LIABILITY TO BUYERS

(a) Sotheby's shall refund the Purchase Price to the Buyer in circumstances where it deems that the lot is a Counterfeit and each of the conditions of the Authenticity Guarantee has been satisfied.

- (b) In the light of the matters in Condition 3 above and subject to Conditions 4(a) and 4(e), neither any Sotheby's Company nor the Seller:
- (i) is liable for any errors or omissions in information provided to Bidders by Sotheby's (or any Sotheby's Company), whether orally or in writing, whether negligent or otherwise, except as set out in Condition 3(f) above;
- (ii) gives any guarantee or warranty to Bidders and any implied warranties and conditions are excluded (save in so far as such obligations cannot be excluded by law) other than the express warranties given by the Seller to the Buyer in Condition 2 of the Sellers' Conditions of Business:
- (iii) accepts responsibility to any Bidders in respect of acts or omissions (whether negligent or otherwise) by Sotheby's in connection with the conduct of auctions or for any matter relating to the sale of any lot.
- (c) Unless Sotheby's owns a lot offered for sale, it is not responsible for any breach of these conditions by the Seller.
- (d) Without prejudice to Condition 4(b), any claim against Sotheby's or the Seller by a Bidder is limited to the Purchase Price with regard to that lot. Neither Sotheby's nor the Seller shall under any circumstances be liable for any consequential losses.
- (e) None of this Condition 4 shall exclude or limit Sotheby's liability in respect of any fraudulent misrepresentation made by Sotheby's or the Seller, or in respect of death or personal injury caused by the negligent acts or omissions of Sotheby's or the Seller.

5. BIDDING AT AUCTION

- (a) Sotheby's has absolute discretion to refuse admission to the auction. Bidders must complete a Paddle Registration Form and supply such information and references as required by Sotheby's. Bidders act as principal unless they have Sotheby's prior written consent to bid as agent for another party. Bidders are personally liable for their bid and are jointly and severally liable with their principal if bidding as agent.
- (b) Sotheby's advises Bidders to attend the auction but will seek to carry out absentee written bids which are in pounds sterling and, in Sotheby's opinion, clear and received sufficiently in advance of the sale of the lot, endeavouring to ensure that the first received of identical written bids has priority.
- (c) Where available, written, telephone and online bids are offered as an additional service for no extra charge, at the Bidder's risk and shall be undertaken with reasonable care subject to Sotheby's other commitments at the time of the auction; Sotheby's therefore cannot accept liability for failure to place such bids save where such failure is unreasonable. Telephone and online bids may be recorded. Online bids ("BidNOW") are made subject to the BidNOW Conditions available on the Sotheby's website or upon request. The BidNOW Conditions apply in relation to online bids, in addition to these Conditions of Business.

6. CONDUCT OF THE AUCTION

- (a) Unless otherwise specified, all lots are offered subject to a Reserve, which shall be no higher than the low presale estimate at the time of the auction.
- (b) The auctioneer has discretion at any time to refuse any bid, withdraw any lot, re-offer a lot for sale (including after the fall of the hammer) if he believes there may be error or dispute, and take such other action as he reasonably thinks fit.
- (c) The auctioneer will commence and advance the bidding at levels and in increments he considers appropriate and is entitled to place a bid or series of bids on behalf of the Seller up to the Reserve on the lot, without indicating he is doing so and whether or not other bids are placed.
- (d) Subject to Condition 6(b), the contract between the Buyer and the Seller is concluded on the striking of the auctioneer's hammer, whereupon the Buyer becomes liable to pay the Purchase Price.
- (e) Any post-auction sale of lots offered at auction shall incorporate these Conditions as if sold in the auction.

7. PAYMENT AND COLLECTION

- (a) Unless otherwise agreed, payment of the Purchase Price for a lot and any Buyer's Expenses are due by the Buyer in pounds sterling immediately on conclusion of the auction (the "Due Date") notwithstanding any requirements for export, import or other permits for such lot.
- (b) Title in a purchased lot will not pass until Sotheby's has received the Purchase Price and Buyer's Expenses for that lot in cleared funds. Sotheby's is not obliged to release a lot to the Buyer until title in the lot has passed and appropriate identification has been provided, and any earlier release does not affect the passing of title or the Buyer's unconditional obligation to pay the Purchase Price and Buyer's Expenses.
- (c) The Buyer is obliged to arrange collection of purchased lots no later than thirty (30) calendar days after the date of the auction. Purchased lots are at the Buyer's risk (and therefore their sole responsibility for insurance) from the earliest of i) collection or ii) the thirty-first calendar day after the auction.
