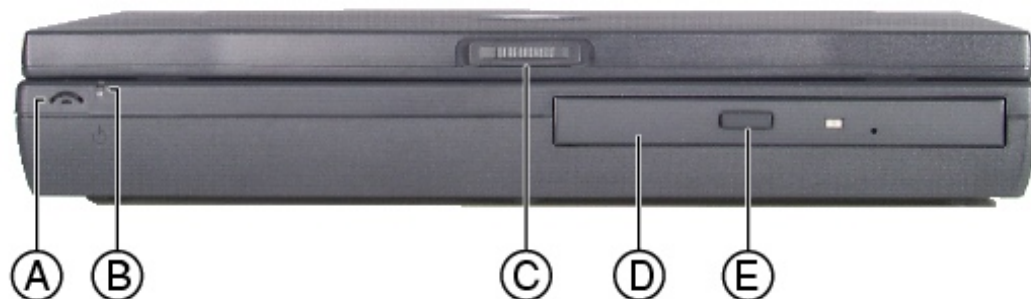

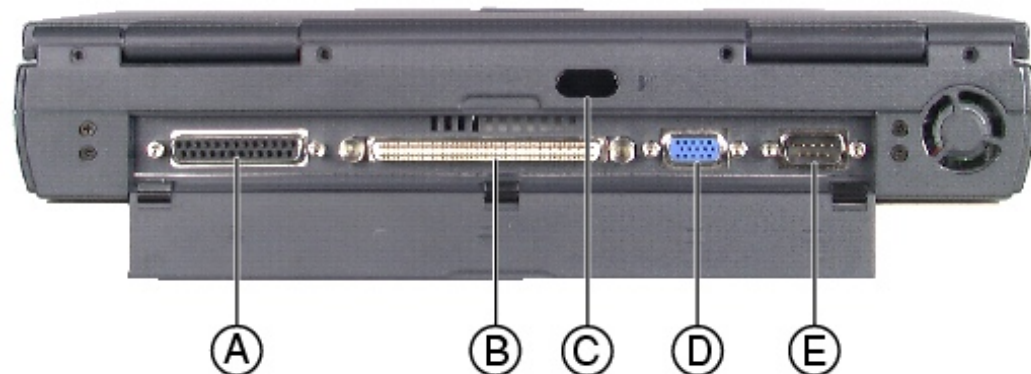

Component	Description
A Microphone	Use to record sound when the system is recording.
B Power LED	Check LED for notebook power status: Steady green - power is ON. Blinking green - notebook is in suspend or standby mode. The LED flashes every four seconds. LED off - power is OFF.
C Cover release button	Open notebook cover by sliding right.
D CD/DVD drive	Insert data or audio CD discs into this drive. Optional DVD drive reads DVD and CD discs.
E CD/DVD Eject button	Press to eject the CD/DVD tray from the drive.

A Parallel port (LPT1)



Connect a parallel device such as a printer to this port.

B Docking port



Connect an optional docking station to this port.

C IR (Infrared) port



Enable this port to connect your notebook to separate devices (printers, peripherals, other computers) using infrared signals that travel between the notebook and the remote device.

D VGA port



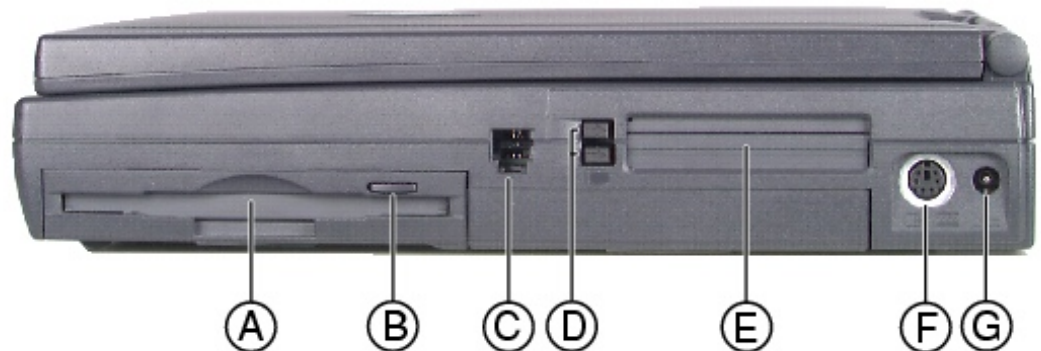
Connect an external monitor cable to this port.

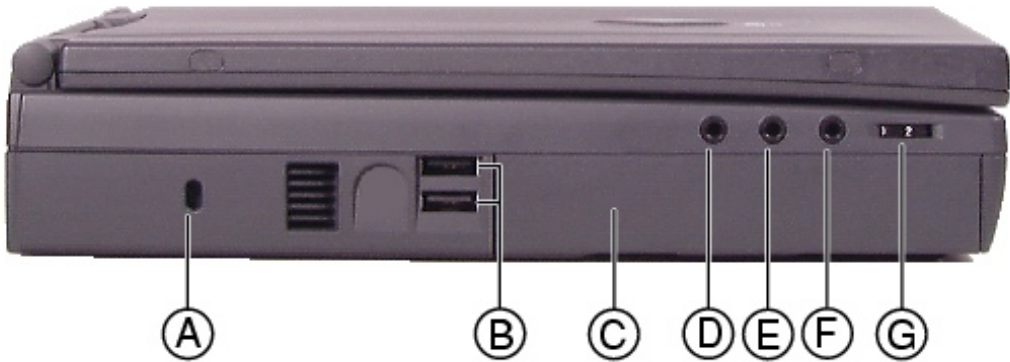

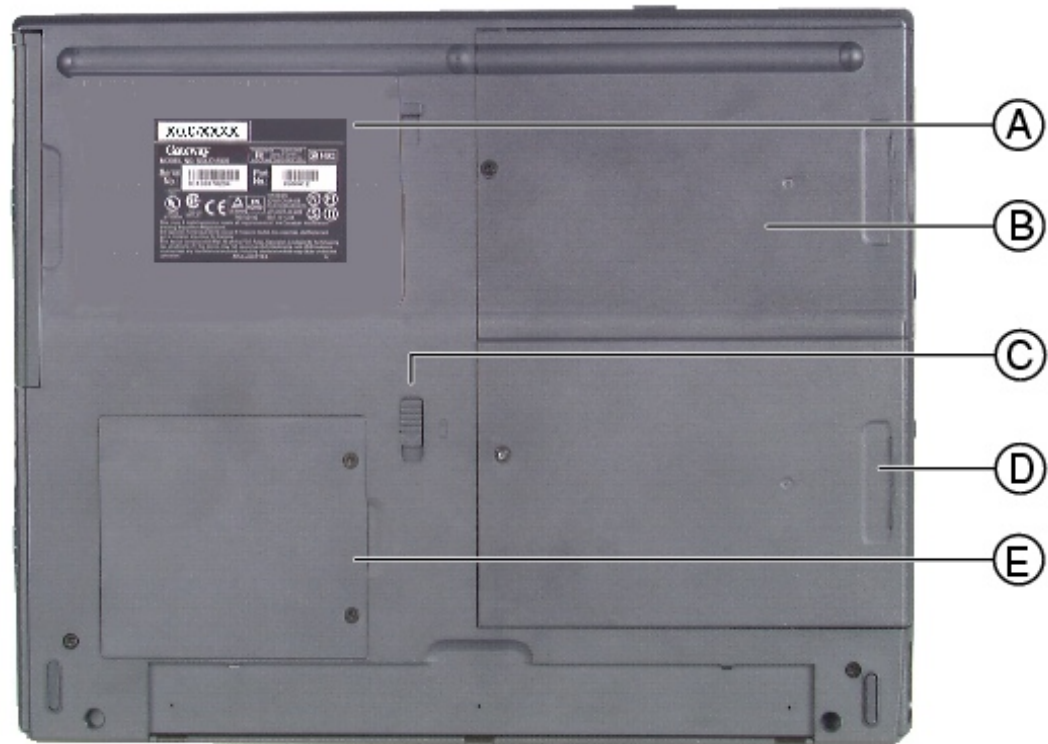

System status indicators

Battery gauge

when...

A battery is installed. It shows battery activity and status.

**Charge**

A battery is charging on AC power. Turns off when battery is fully charged.

**AC power adapter**

The notebook is powered by the AC adapter.

**Hard drive**

The notebook accesses the hard drive.

**Diskette drive**

The notebook accesses the diskette drive or LS120 drive.

**CD/DVD drive**

The notebook accesses the CD/DVD drive.

**Scroll lock**

The scroll lock is enabled.

**Pad lock**

The pad lock is enabled.

**Caps lock**

The caps lock is enabled.

**System docked**

The notebook is docked.

To use help, select **Help** or **Contents and Index** from the **Help** menu in an application.

When the help window opens, you can select one of three tabs:

- **Contents** provides a list of topics and help information about tasks you can do in Windows.
- **Index** lets you search the entire help file for topics using keywords. Keywords are assigned to each help topic.
- **Search** lets you search for any word that appears in a help file.

Microsoft Office assistants

In addition to standard help, Microsoft Office applications provide animated characters called assistants. You can ask an assistant a question to get information about a task.

To use an assistant, select **Help** from the **Help** menu in a Microsoft Office application, then click **Help**.

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Using Your Notebook

Connecting AC power

Your notebook battery was shipped to you partially charged and ready to use. You may want to use the AC adapter while you are checking out some of the features to complete charging the battery.

Your AC adapter consists of an AC power adapter and a power cord.

Warning Replace the power cord if it becomes damaged. The replacement cord must be of the same type and voltage rating as the original cord or it may damage the notebook.



Warning Do not attempt to disassemble the AC adapter. The AC adapter has no user-replaceable or user-serviceable parts inside. The AC adapter has dangerous voltages that can cause serious personal injury or death. Contact Gateway about returning defective AC adapters.



To connect the AC adapter:

1. Connect the power cord to the AC power adapter.



2. Plug the AC power adapter into the notebook power connector on the right side of the notebook near the back.



3. Plug the power cord into an electrical outlet.

Turning on the notebook

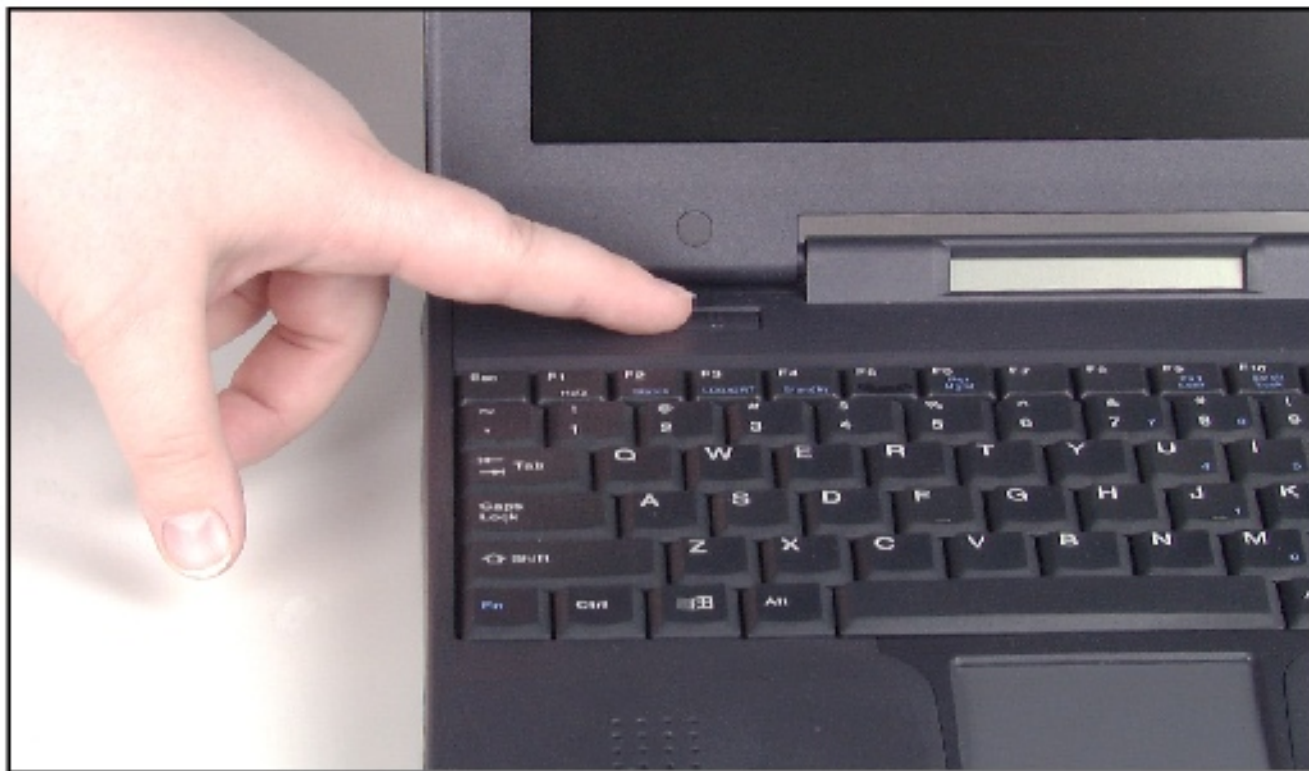


To turn on the notebook:

1. Open your notebook by sliding the latch on the front face of your notebook to the right and releasing the cover.



2. Press the power button.



The power button is preset to On/Off mode. You can set it to function either in On/Off or Standby/Resume mode using the BIOS setup utility. [See "Using the Power menu"](#) for more information about changing power button modes.

Using the keyboard



Your notebook features a full-size keyboard that has the full functionality of a desktop computer keyboard. Many of the keys have been assigned alternate functions, including shortcut keys for Windows, function keys for specific system operations, and pad lock keys for the numeric keypad.

You can attach an external keyboard to the notebook using the PS/2, USB, or serial port. You do not have to shut down the notebook before connecting an external PS/2 keyboard.

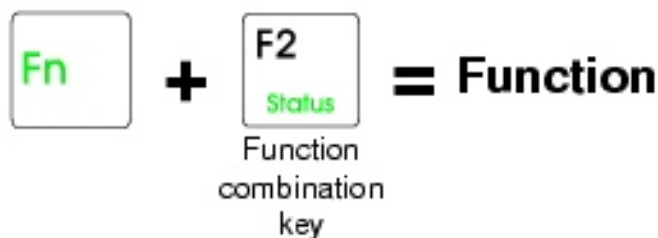
A Numeric keypad

Press **Fn+F9** to activate the numeric keypad.

| B Windows logo key | Press to activate the Windows Start button menu. This key can be used with other keys on the keyboard to open the Windows Help (H), Find (F), and Run (R) or Explorer (E). |
| C Fn (function) keys | Press Fn key plus another Fn Combination key (such as F2 , F3 , F4 , etc.) to perform a specific function. |
| D Right-click key | Provides quick access to shortcut menus and help assistants in Windows. |
| E Fn (function) Combination keys | Press Fn key plus one of the Fn Combination keys (blue) to perform a specific function. For example, Fn+F2 shows the Pop-up status display. |

Function combination keys

By pressing both the **Fn** key and one of the combination keys, the notebook performs various functions such as displaying the power status, enabling the scroll lock, and adjusting the brightness of the LCD screen.



The following table lists the function combination keys and a description of the corresponding function:

Combination key

Function



Opens the status menu in the upper left corner. The menu displays what the battery charge level is, whether the AC power adapter is being used, and what the BIOS version is. Press the key combination again to close the status menu.



Toggles between the LCD display, external monitor, or both at the same time. The monitor must be plugged into the VGA port on the notebook.



Enters Standby mode for Windows 98 and Suspend mode for Windows 95 and Windows NT. Press the power button to exit Standby or Suspend mode.



Enables the Pad Lock function so you can use the numeric keypad.

The Pad Lock status indicator is displayed while this function is enabled. Press this key combination again to disable the Pad Lock function.



Enables the Scroll Lock function so that you can scroll through large volumes of text. (This is only available in some programs.)

The Scroll Lock status indicator is displayed when this function is enabled.



Pauses the display when the text is scrolling very quickly. (This is only available in some programs.)

Press any key to continue the text flow.



Breaks the text scrolling in a DOS screen. (This is only available in some programs.)



Sends you to the starting point of your text. (This is only available in some programs.)



Sends you to the end point of your text. (This is only available in some programs.)



Prints the screen if you are connected to a printer or, in Windows, puts the screen content into the clipboard.



Increases LCD brightness.



Decreases LCD brightness.

Pad Lock keys

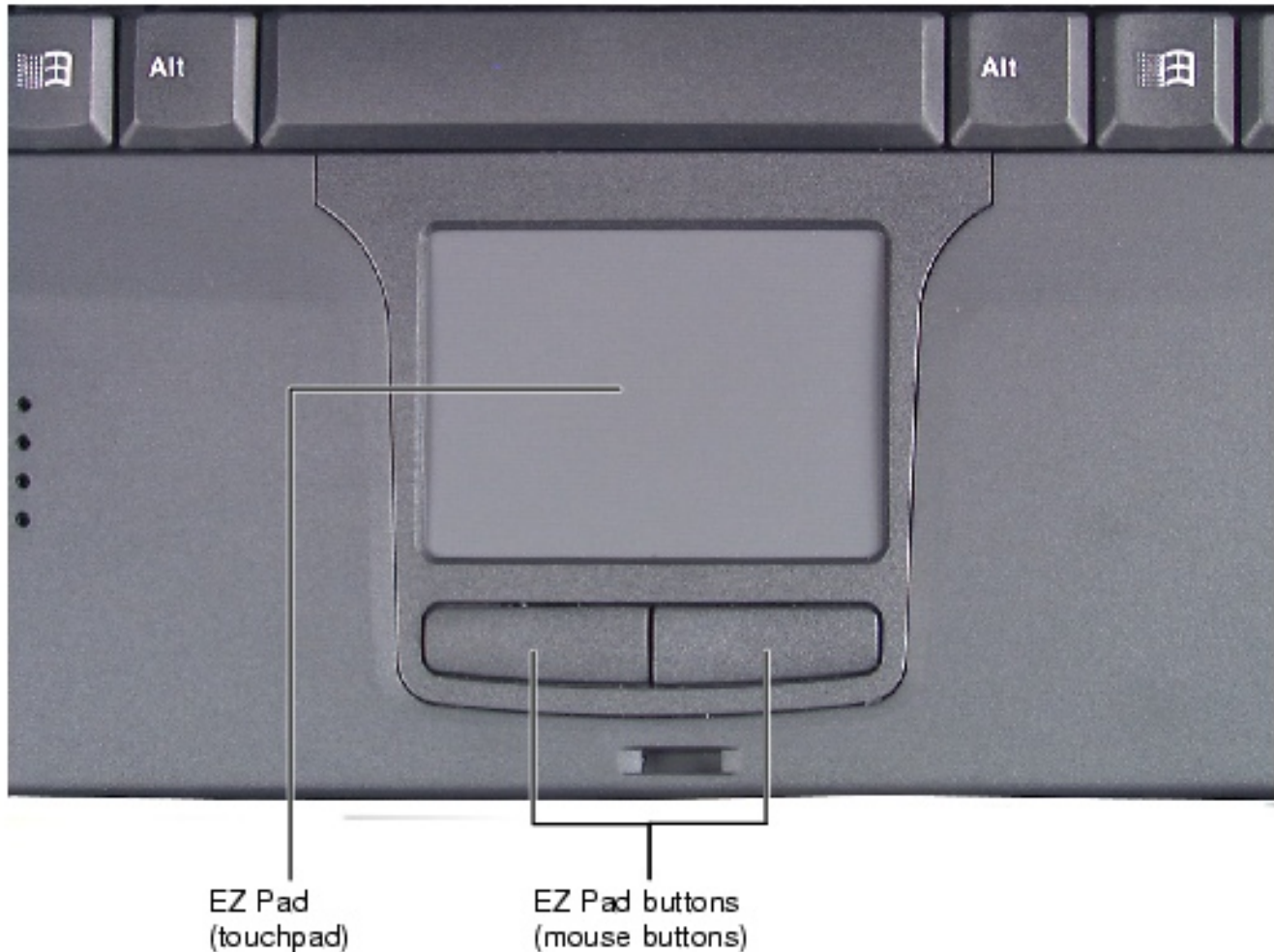
Activate the Pad Lock function by pressing **Fn+F9**. When the Pad Lock function is activated, you can use the embedded numeric keypad shown below. Press **Fn+F9** to put the keyboard back into standard mode.



Using pointing devices

Your notebook came with either the EZ PadTM touchpad or the EZ PointTM stickpoint pointing device. Like a mouse, these pointing devices control the cursor movements on the display.

Using the EZ Pad touchpad



Touchpad actions

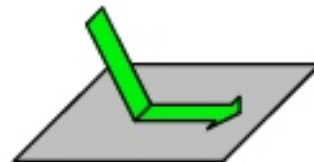
Use the touchpad to select, click, and drag items on your notebook screen. The following table shows the various actions you can perform with your touchpad:

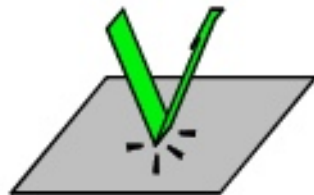

Using the EZ Point

The EZ Point pointing device (U.S. keyboards only) provides an easy way to move the cursor across the screen and navigate through software.

The EZ Point consists of a stick located on the keyboard between the **G** and **H** keys and two click buttons below the spacebar.



To use the EZ Point:

1. Place your hands in the typing position and press the EZ Point stickpoint in the direction you want to move the cursor.
2. Press the EZ Point buttons to select items as you would with a mouse.

Connecting an external mouse

You can attach an external mouse to the notebook using the PS/2, USB, or serial port. You do not have to shut down the notebook before connecting to an external PS/2 mouse.

If you connect an external scrolling mouse to the notebook, you need to disable the notebook EZ Pad or EZ Point pointing device.



To disable the notebook pointing device:

1. Turn on your notebook. The message "To display System Settings Press F2."
2. Press **F2**. The BIOS Setup utility opens at the Main menu.
3. Press the down arrow key until you reach the Built-In Pointing Device option.
4. Change the setting to **Disabled**.
5. Save your changes and exit by pressing **F10**.

Using audio

Using your notebook audio system you can record audio for presentations, record voice messages that you can attach to your e-mail messages, listen to audio CDs, and use other audio functions in multimedia applications.

Adjusting volume

You can adjust the volume by adjusting the volume control wheel on the side of your notebook or by adjusting the volume controls in Windows. Using the volume controls in Windows, you can adjust the overall volume level or adjust the volume for a specific device. Even if you are adjust the volume in Windows, the volume control wheel must be turned on or you will not be able to hear any sound.



To adjust overall volume level:

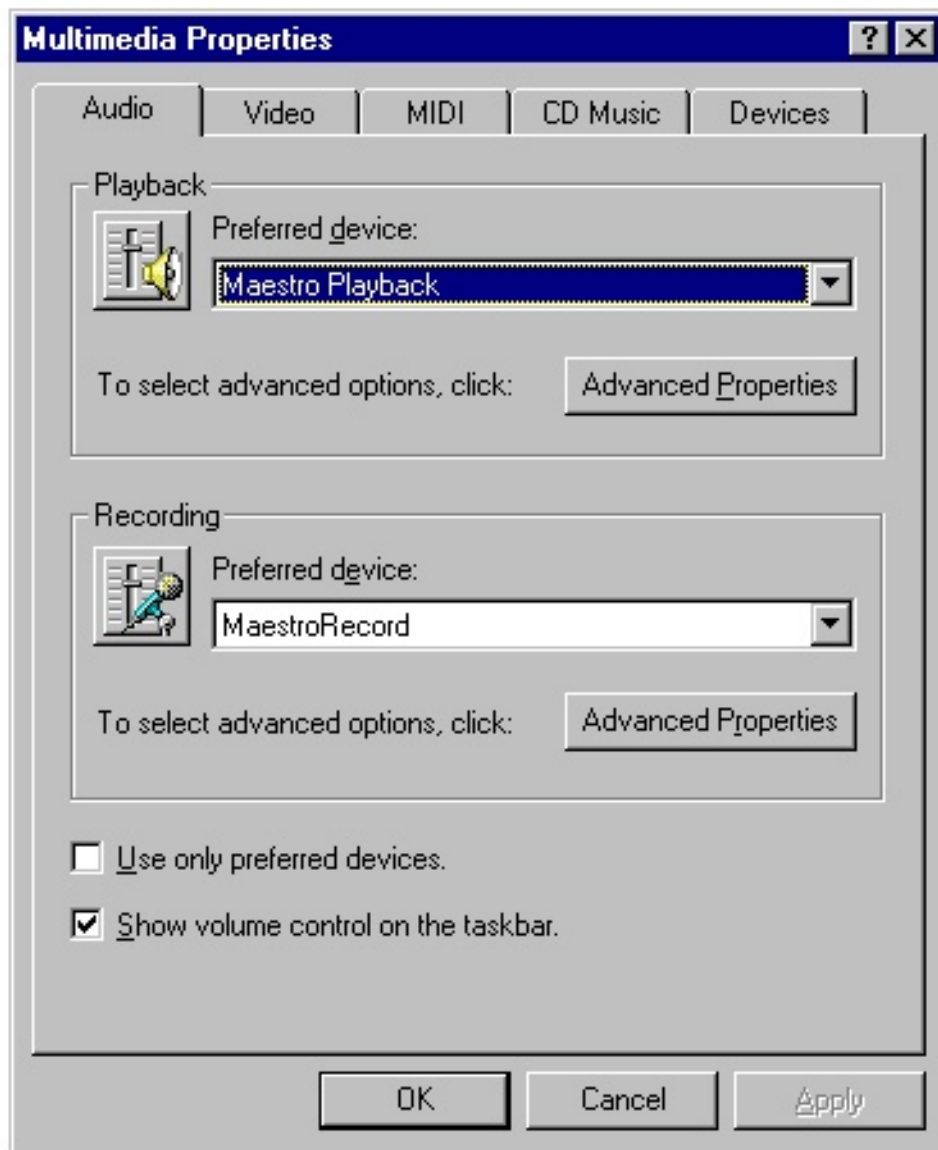
1. Check to see if the speaker icon appears on the taskbar.

If the speaker icon  appears on the taskbar, go to Step 5.

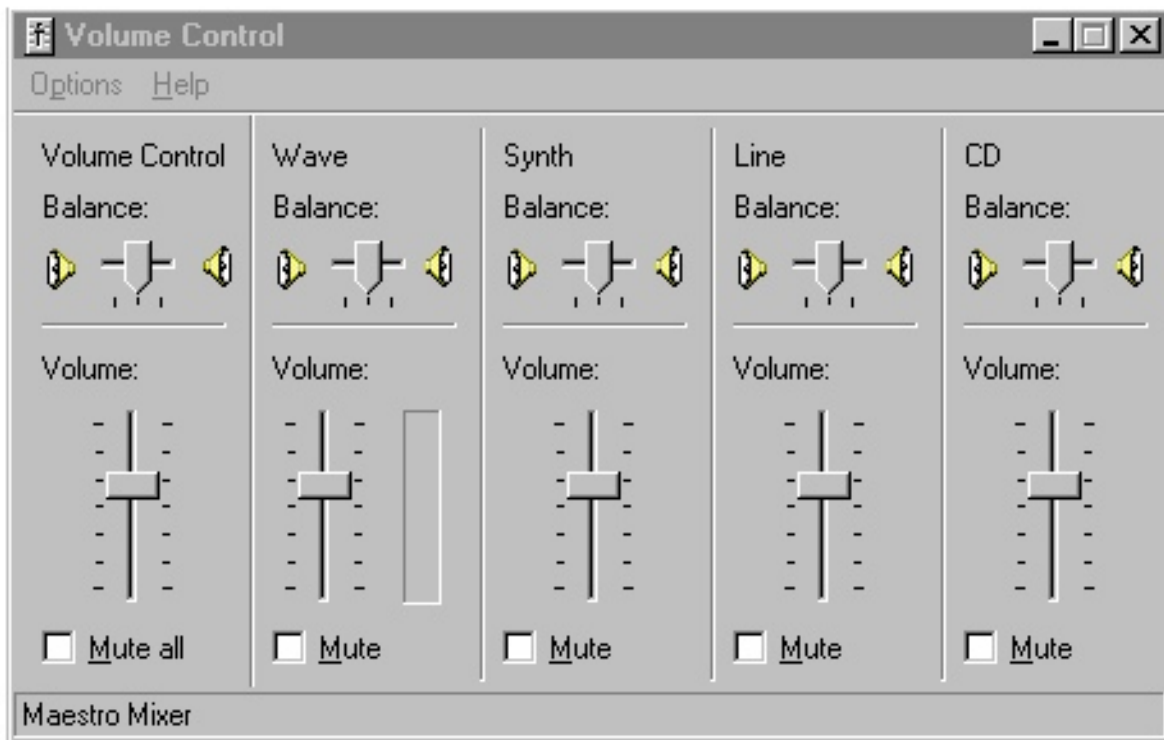
- OR -

If the speaker icon  does not appear on the taskbar, go to Step 2.

2. Click **Start**, then select **Settings**, then **Control Panel**. The Control Panel opens.
3. Double-click the **Multimedia** icon. The Multimedia Properties dialog box opens.



4. Select **Show Volume Control on the Taskbar**, then click **OK**. The speaker icon  appears on the taskbar.
5. Double-click  on the taskbar. The volume control dialog box opens.

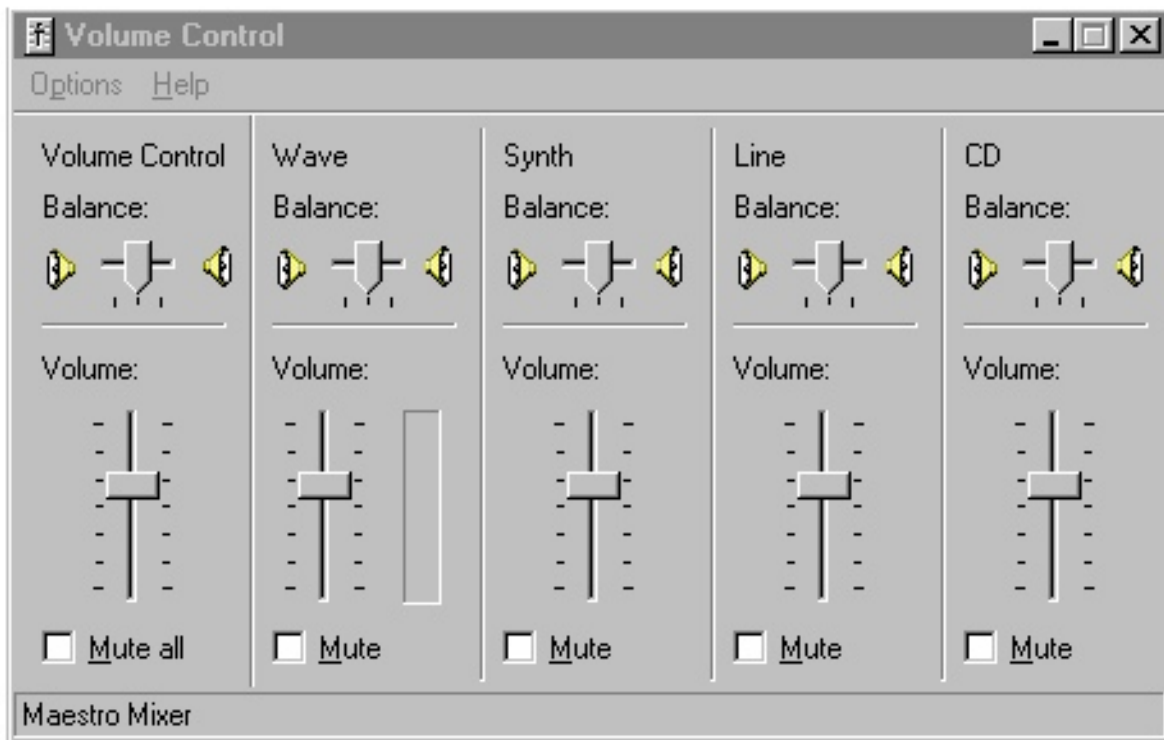


6. Drag the volume control slider up or down to increase or decrease the volume.



To adjust specific volume levels:

1. Double-click the speaker icon on the taskbar. The Volume Control dialog box opens.



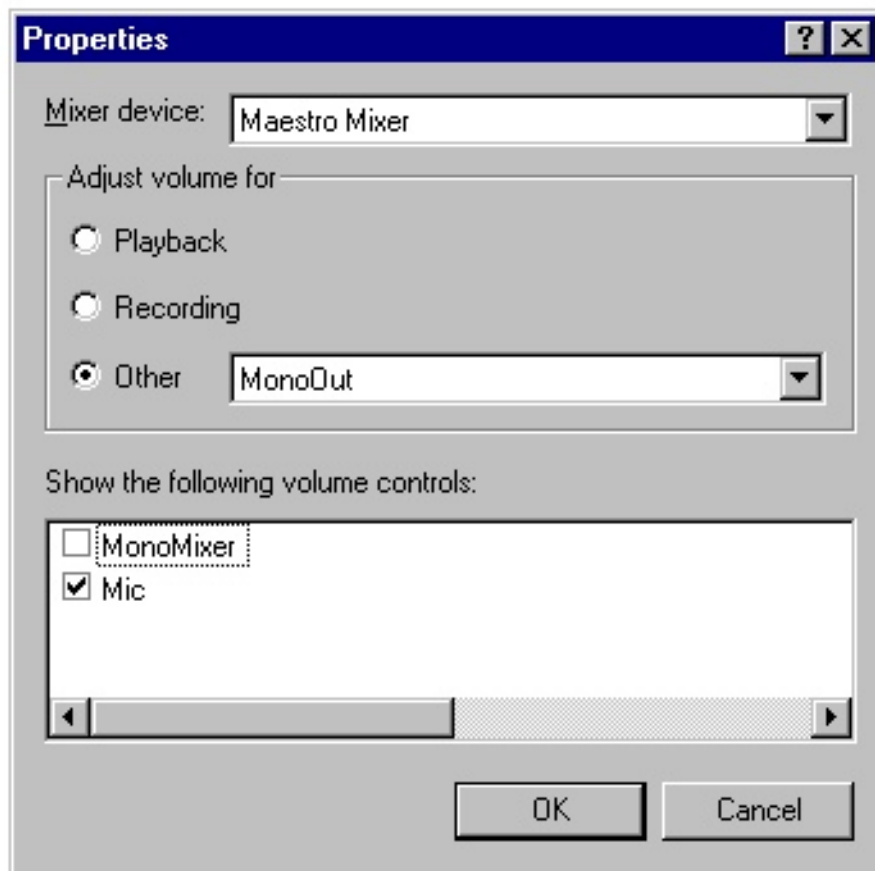
2. Check to see if the device you want to adjust appears in the Volume Control dialog box.

If the device appears in the Volume Control dialog box, go to Step 5.

- OR -

If the device does not appear in the Volume Control dialog box, go to Step 3.

3. Select **Options**, then **Properties**. The Audio Properties dialog box opens.



4. Select the audio device you want to appear in the Volume Control dialog box, then click **OK**.
5. Drag the volume level and balance sliders for the device you want to adjust, then close the window.

Making an audio recording

To make an audio recording, use the built-in microphone or connect an external microphone to the Mic port. Connecting an external microphone disables the built-in microphone.



To make an audio recording:

1. Click **Start**, then select **Programs**, **Accessories**, **Multimedia**, then **Sound Recorder**. The Sound Recorder window opens.
2. Click  (Record). To stop recording, click  (Stop).
3. Speak into the microphone.
4. Click **File**, then **Save As**.
5. Name the recording.
6. Click **OK**. The recording is saved.



To play back a recording:

1. Click **Start**, then select **Programs**, **Accessories**, **Multimedia**, then **Sound Recorder**. The Sound Recorder window opens.
2. Click **File**, then **Open**. The Open dialog box opens.
3. Select the file to play back.
4. Click **Open**.
5. Click  (Play). To stop playing the recording, click  (Stop).

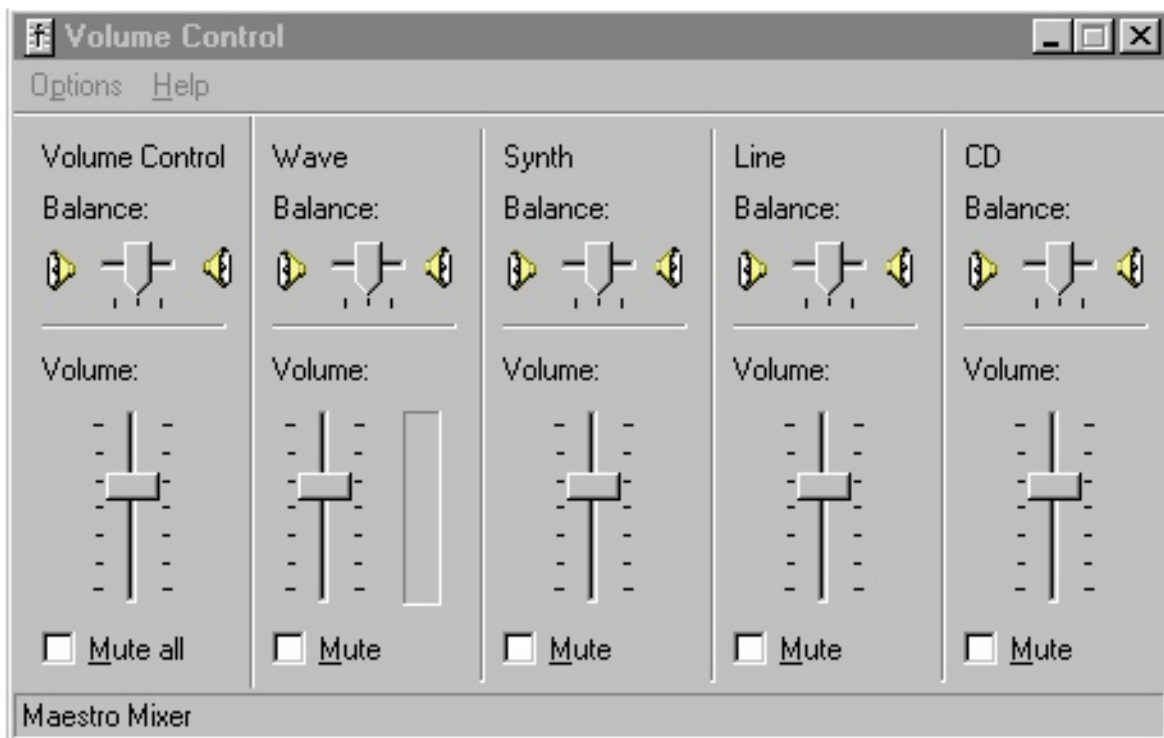
Changing the audio source

If your external source has an Audio Out port available, you need to connect it to the Line In port on your notebook and change the audio source to Line In in the Volume Control window to capture sound.



To change the audio source to Line In:

1. Double-click  in the taskbar. The Volume Control window opens.



2. Click **Options**, then select **Properties**. The Properties window opens.
3. In the Adjust volume for section, select **Recording**, then click **OK**. The Recording Control window opens.

4. In the Line Balance section, click the **Select** checkbox.
5. In the Line Balance section, adjust the balance or volume as necessary using the appropriate slider.
6. Close the Recording Control window.

Playing CDs

CD/DVD drives accept standard data and music CDs. You can play an audio CD using the Windows 98 or Windows 95 CD Player application.

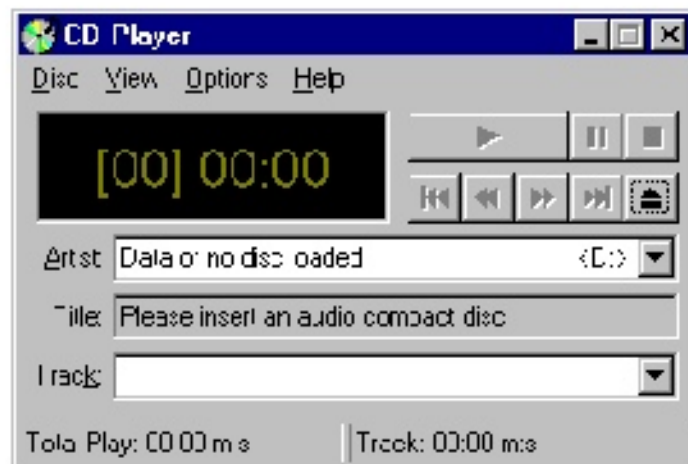


To play an audio CD:

1. Insert an audio CD. After a few seconds, the CD starts playing automatically.

- OR -

If the CD did not play automatically, click **Start**, then select **Programs**, **Accessories**, **Multimedia**, then **CD Player**. The CD Player opens.



You can view playing times, set preferences, define a play list, and even set the system to continuous or random play using the dialog box.

To control the CD or adjust the volume, use the controls in the CD Player application.

2. Control audio play as desired.

Playing DVDs

A Digital Versatile Disc (DVD) is similar to a standard CD, but has greater data capacity. Because of this increased capacity, full-length movies can fit on a single disc.

You must have a DVD drive, a DVD controller card, and DVD Player software installed to use DVDs.



To play a DVD:

1. Make sure that the DVD controller card is in the PC card slot.
2. Press the eject button to release the DVD drive tray. Pull the tray completely open.
3. Place the DVD in the tray. Press down carefully on the DVD to ensure that it snaps under the clips that hold the DVD in the tray.

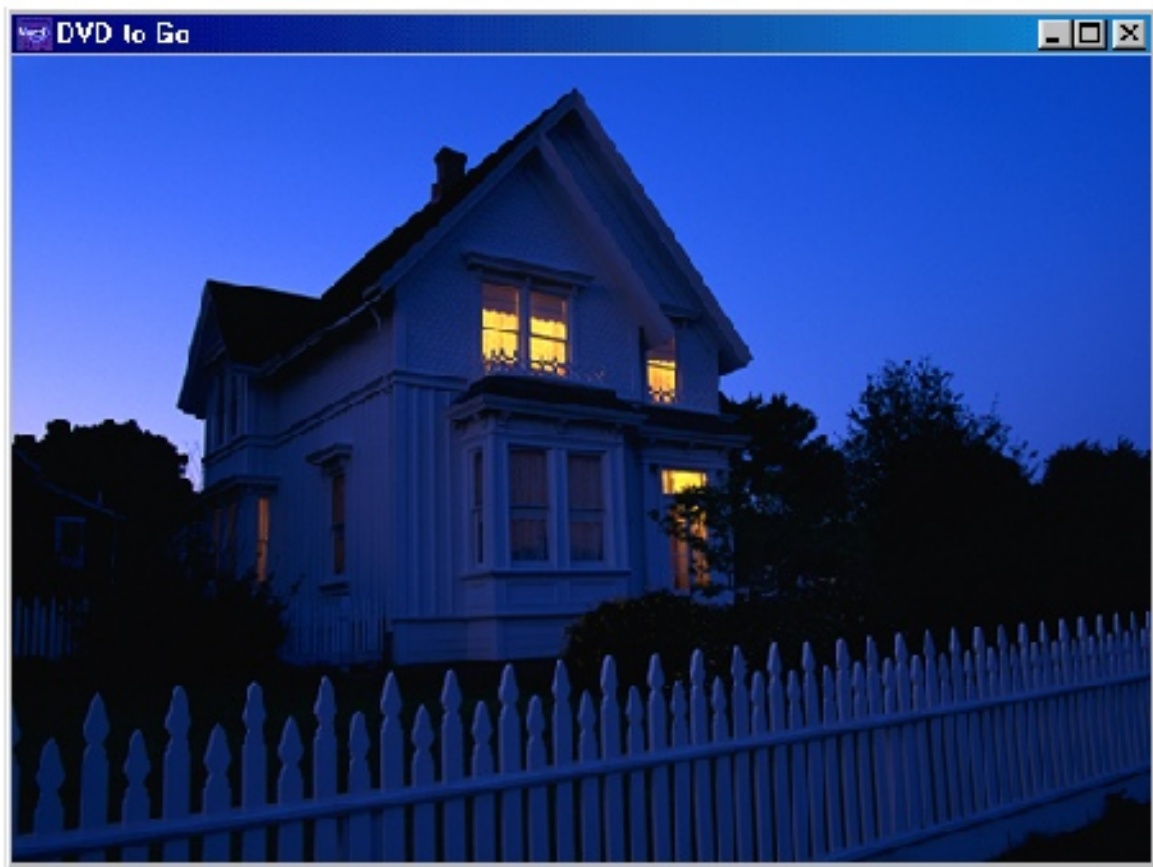
Important Be sure to place a single-sided DVD in the tray so that the label side is facing up. If the disc has two playable sides, place the disc so that the name of the side you want to play is facing up.



4. Push the tray in until it is closed. After a few seconds, the DVD starts playing automatically.

- OR -

If the DVD did not play automatically, click **Start**, then select **Programs**, **Margi**, then **DVD -to-Go**. Click  (Play) in the DVD Player control panel.



To control the DVD or adjust the volume, use the controls in the DVD Player application.

For more information on using the DVD Player application, click the question mark icon on the DVD player control panel.

Using video

Changing screen resolution

Your notebook features a color LCD TFT panel with a resolution up to 262,000 colors. You can change the display resolution in display properties.

To change the display resolution:

1. Right-click your desktop screen.
2. Select **Properties**.
3. Select the **Settings** tab.
4. Drag the slider to change the display resolution.
5. Click **OK**.

Connecting the modem

Your notebook may have an optional built-in V.90 56K modem and a telephone cable.

To connect the modem:

1. Insert one end of the telephone cable into the modem jack on the right side of the notebook.



2. Insert the other end of the telephone cable into any analog telephone wall jack.
3. Turn on your notebook.
4. Start your communications software.

For more information on using your modem to connect to the Internet, see Chapter 4,

"Getting Online."

Using PC Cards

The PC Card slots (also known as PCMCIA card slots) are located on the right side of your notebook. Install Type I or Type II PC Cards in either the top or bottom PC Card slot. Install Type III PC Cards in the bottom PC Card slot.

These PC Cards can be used in your notebook:

- PC Card
16
- PC Card 32
(CardBus)
- Zoomed Video Cards (Place in bottom slot
only)

You do not need to restart your notebook after changing most cards because your notebook supports *hot-swapping*, or the ability to insert a PC Card while your notebook is running. If your PC Card does not work after hot-swapping, refer to the PC Card manufacturer's documentation for further information.



To insert a PC Card:

1. Insert the PC Card with the label facing up.
2. Slide the card firmly into the PC Card slot until it is flush with the notebook case.



3. Follow the Windows Setup Wizard installation steps the first time you insert a PC Card. Operate the device as recommended in the manual from the PC Card manufacturer.



To remove a PC Card:

1. Click the PC Card icon in the taskbar.
2. Click the card you want to remove, then click **OK**.
3. Release the eject button by pressing the PC Card eject button once.
4. Eject the PC Card by pressing the eject button again.



5. Reset the eject button by pressing the eject button again.

Using USB ports

The Universal Serial Bus (USB) port lets you connect devices such as mice, joysticks, keyboards, scanners, cameras, and speakers that traditionally have required their own specific ports.

To use a USB-compatible device, connect it to the USB port. After the device is connected to the USB port, the notebook automatically recognizes and installs the device in Windows 95 and Windows 98. If you have Windows NT, the USB device will not be automatically recognized and you will have to manually install the software so that the device will be recognized.

Using the infrared port

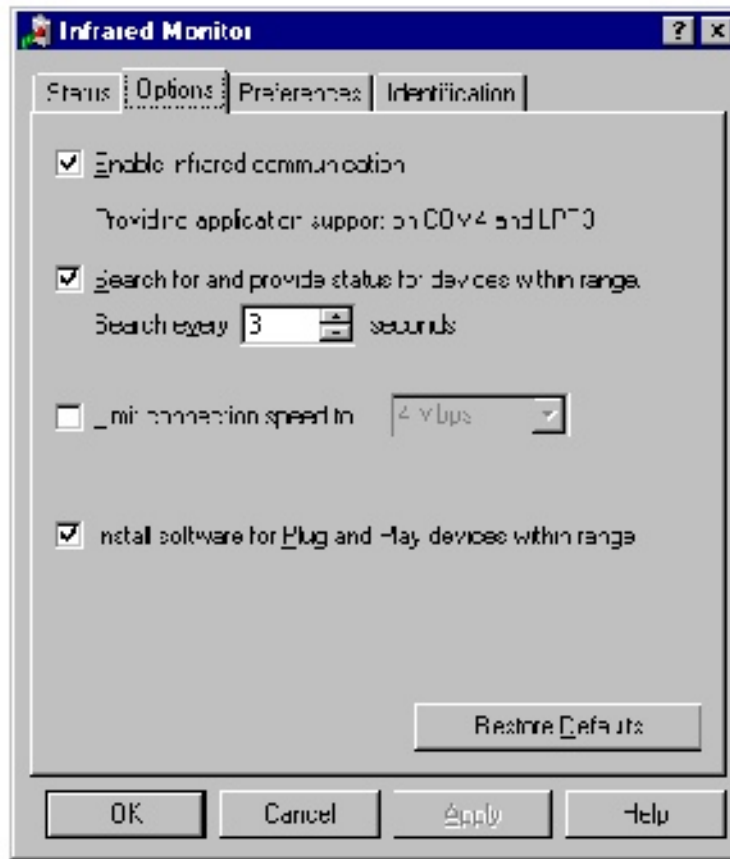
The infrared (IR) port uses infrared technology to send and receive signals between the notebook and a remote device also equipped with an IR port. A variety of desktop computers, printers, and other peripherals are IR-equipped.

Your notebook shipped with the IR port disabled to make more resources (IRQs) available for other commonly used devices.



To enable the IR port:

1. Click **Start**, then select **Settings**, then **Control Panel**. The Control Panel window opens.
2. Double-click the **Infrared** icon. The **Infrared Monitor** dialog box opens.



3. Click the **Options** tab.
4. Select **Enable infrared communication**.
5. Click **OK**. The notebook searches for nearby IR devices.

Replacing the hard disk drive

You can remove the hard disk drive from your notebook to swap to a second hard disk drive.

If you decide to add a new hard disk drive, then use the documentation that comes with the hard disk drive to prepare the drive for use.

Caution



Do not expose the hard disk drive to liquid or magnetic fields. Exposure could damage the data on the hard disk drive.

Preventing static electricity



To prevent static electricity:

Before opening the computer case, read and follow these precautions to prevent damage from static electricity.

Caution



Static electricity can permanently damage electronic components in the computer. Prevent electrostatic damage to the system by following static electricity precautions every time you open the computer case.

1. Wear a grounding wrist strap (available at most electronic stores).
2. Turn off the computer power.
3. Remove the battery pack.
4. Remove all external cords and cables.

Also follow these static electricity precautions:

- Avoid static-causing surfaces such as plastic and styrofoam in your work area.
- Remove parts from their antistatic bags only when you are ready to use them. Do not lay parts on the outside of antistatic bags because only the inside provides antistatic protection.
- Always hold cards by their edges and their metal mounting brackets. Avoid touching components on the cards and the edge connectors that connect to expansion slots. Never slide cards or other parts over any surface.



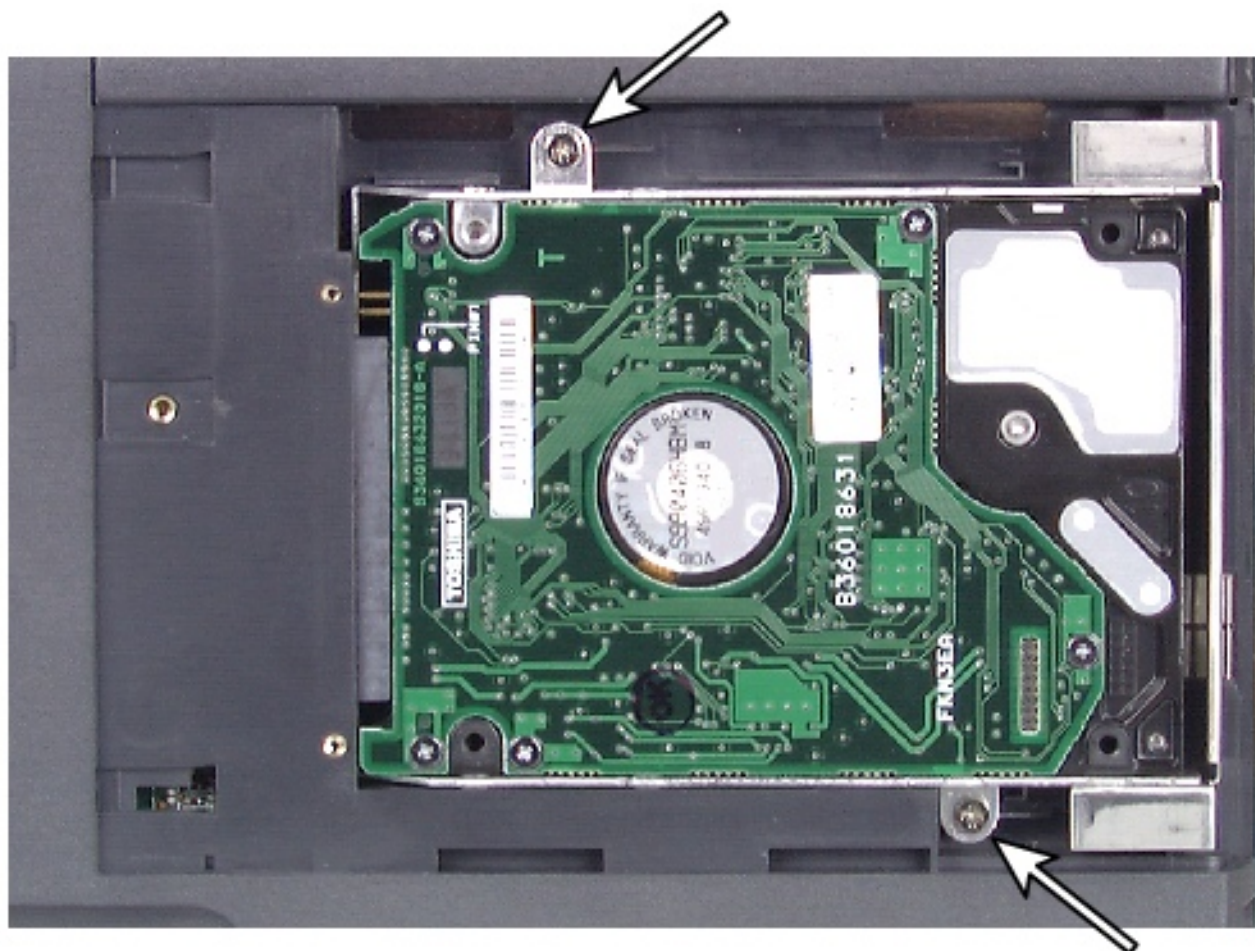
To replace the hard disk drive:

1. Save all work.
2. Click **Start**, then select **Shut Down**, **Shut down**, then click **OK**.
3. Close the LCD lid.
4. Disconnect the AC power.
5. Remove the battery. See [Swapping batteries](#) for instructions on removing the battery.

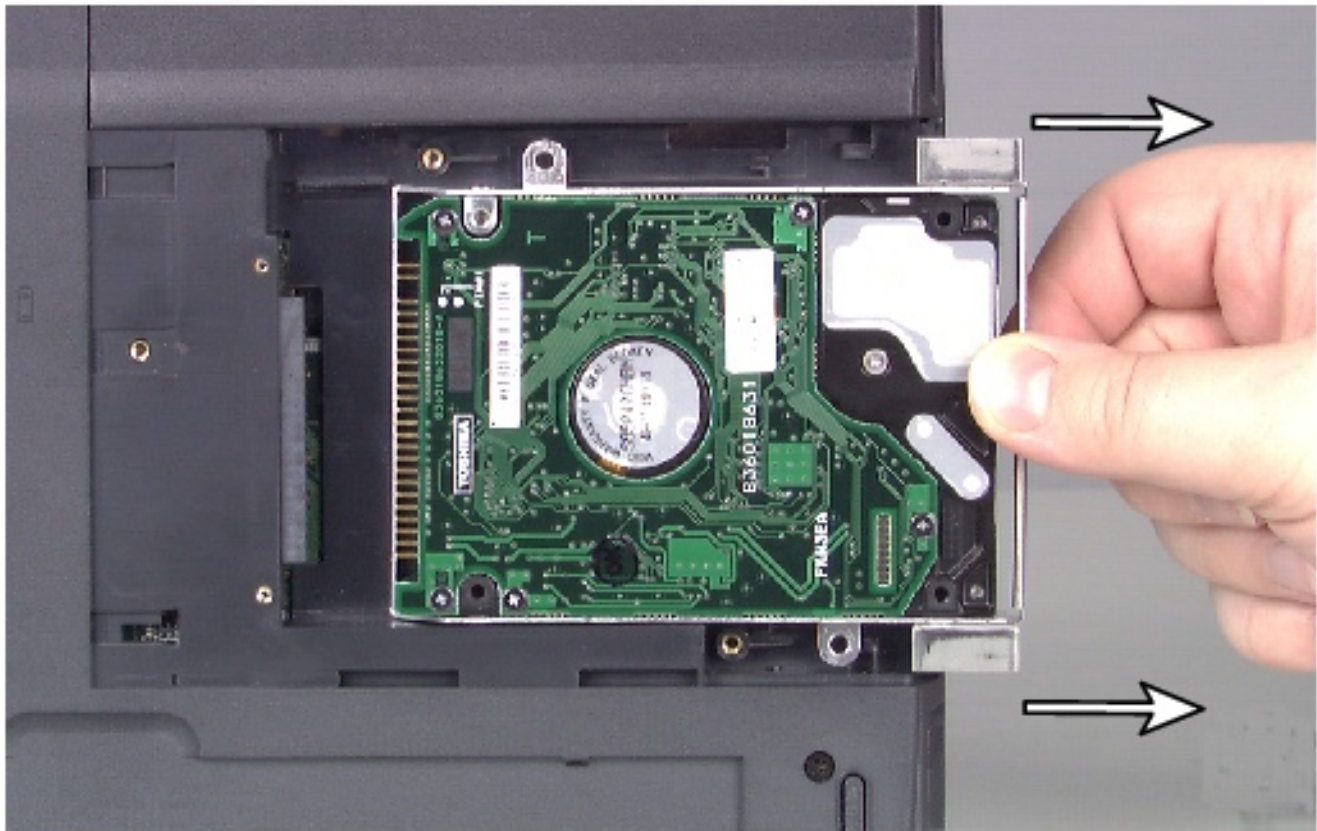
6. Turn the notebook over.
7. Remove the screw that holds the hard disk drive panel to the notebook case.



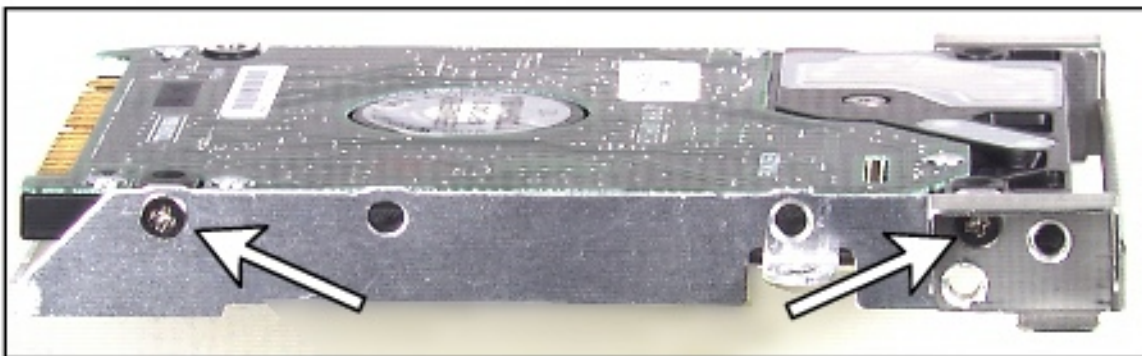
8. Remove the two screws that hold the hard disk drive kit to the notebook case.



9. Slide the hard disk drive kit out and lift it up.



10. Remove the four screws on the sides of the kit.



11. Remove the old hard disk drive from the drive kit.
12. Place the new hard disk drive into the drive kit.
13. Secure the new hard disk drive to the kit with the four screws.
14. Insert the new hard disk drive kit into the notebook case by plugging the pins into the connector in the bay.



15. Secure the hard disk drive kit to the notebook case with the two screws.
16. Replace the hard disk drive panel on the notebook.
17. Secure the panel with the panel screw.
18. Turn on the notebook when you are ready to use it.
19. If this is a first-time installation, then follow the instructions that came with the hard disk drive to prepare the drive for use.



Managing Power Use

Checking battery status

The notebook can run on a fully charged battery (normal operation) for about 3 to 4 hours for a Li Ion battery and 1.5 to 2 hours for a NiMH battery before the battery needs recharging. As long as the AC adapter is properly connected, the battery will charge while your notebook is operating.

Charge level

If you want to check the charge level of your battery, you can:

- Press **Fn+F2** keys to view the Status window, which appears in the upper left corner of the display. The Status window displays the battery level.
- Look at the battery gauge icon in the system status indicator window. The icon indicates the level that the battery is charged. One tick is the lowest charge and 5 ticks is the highest charge.
- Position the cursor over the power cord or battery icon in the lower right corner of the taskbar. A battery status popup window appears.

Low battery

When your battery is low:

- The battery gauge icon appears with no ticks and blinks.
- The battery icon in the lower right corner of the taskbar has a red "X" over it.
- The Low Battery window opens, advising you to change your battery or connect to AC power immediately to prevent losing your work.

Battery malfunction

Battery malfunction occurs when icon appears with all ticks blinking.

Maximizing battery life

If your notebook is relying only on the battery for power, try these tips to conserve power:

- Dim the display brightness as low as is comfortable.
- Make sure that the "Auto dim with battery" feature is enabled. Auto dim cuts LCD power 50% when your notebook is operating on battery power.

Important Your notebook comes with this feature enabled. You can disable this feature in the Power menu in the BIOS Setup utility.



For more information about changing the Power menu settings in the BIOS Setup program for Windows 95 and Windows NT, [see "Using the Power menu."](#)

- Close the LCD lid when not in use. The LCD display stays off until you open the lid.
- Set your power scheme in the Power Management Properties to the Portable/Laptop power scheme. For more information about changing the power management settings in Windows 98, [see "Managing power."](#)
- If your PC Card uses battery power even when not in use, remove the card between uses. Check the manufacturer's documentation for the power requirements for the PC Card.
- Use the CD/DVD drive only when necessary. These drives use a large amount of battery power.

Swapping batteries

Battery packs can be "warm-swapped." This means that you can change battery packs while in Standby mode.

Important Because notebooks operate in Standby mode for only a short time without power, swap batteries quickly.



To replace the battery pack:

1. Save all work, and press **Fn+F4**. The notebook goes into Standby mode.
2. Close the cover.

3. Turn your notebook over.
4. Slide the battery release latch to release the battery pack.



5. Hold the latch forward and slide the battery pack straight out from the notebook.
6. Slide the recharged battery into the bay and snap it into place.
7. Open the cover.
8. Turn on the notebook.

Warning Danger of explosion if battery is incorrectly replaced.



Replace only with the Gateway Solo 2550 Li-Ion or NiMH battery pack. Discard used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions.

If the battery is used incorrectly in this device, it may present a fire or chemical burn hazard. Do not disassemble, heat above 212°F (100° C), or incinerate. Dispose of used battery promptly. Keep away from children.

Recalibrating the battery

Recalibrate the battery gauge once a year using the Battery Learning Software to increase the accuracy of the battery gauge, which loses this accuracy over time. The process of recalibrating the battery can take as long as 8 hours. You may want to let the Battery Learning Software run overnight.

Important Removing the battery or disconnecting the AC power will interrupt the process of recalibrating the battery. If the process is interrupted, you must run the program from the beginning to properly condition the battery.



To recalibrate the battery:

1. Plug the AC adapter into the notebook and to an AC outlet.
2. Turn on your notebook.
3. Place the Portable System Restoration CD into the CD/DVD drive.
4. Turn off the notebook.
5. Insert the battery into the battery bay.
6. Turn on the notebook. The message appears, "To change system settings Press F2."
7. Press F2. The BIOS Setup utility opens at the Main screen.
8. Go to the Boot menu using the arrow keys.
9. Select **ATAPI CD-ROM Drive**.
10. Move **ATAPI CD-ROM Drive** to the top of the list, by pressing the **Shift** and (**+**) keys.
11. Go to the **Exit** menu.
12. Select **Exit saving Changes**.
13. Press **Enter**. The Microsoft Windows Startup Menu appears.
14. Select **Boot from CD-ROM**. The Portable System Restoration CD **Main Menu** appears.
15. Select **Go to other options** by pressing the down arrow.
16. Press **Enter**.
17. Select **Battery learning...** (of your particular notebook model) by pressing the down arrow.
18. Press **Enter**. A screen with a description of the Battery Learning Software appears.
19. Press **Enter**.
20. After reading the last screen of instructions, press any key to continue.
21. Type **Y**.
22. Press **Enter**. After a couple of minutes, a screen showing the progress of the Battery Learning Software appears. It takes approximately 8 hours for the battery to be recalibrated.
23. After the battery is recalibrated, exit the Battery Learning software program by pressing **Ctrl** and **C**. The Portable System Restoration CD Main menu appears.

24. Select **Exit to DOS**.
25. When you are asked to do a virus scan, select **Y**.
26. At the A: prompt, remove the Portable System Restoration CD from the CD/DVD drive.
27. Turn off your notebook by pressing the power button.

Managing power

Power management is handled differently in Windows 98 than in Windows 95 and Windows NT. The following sections describe these differences. Refer to the section that applies to your operating system.

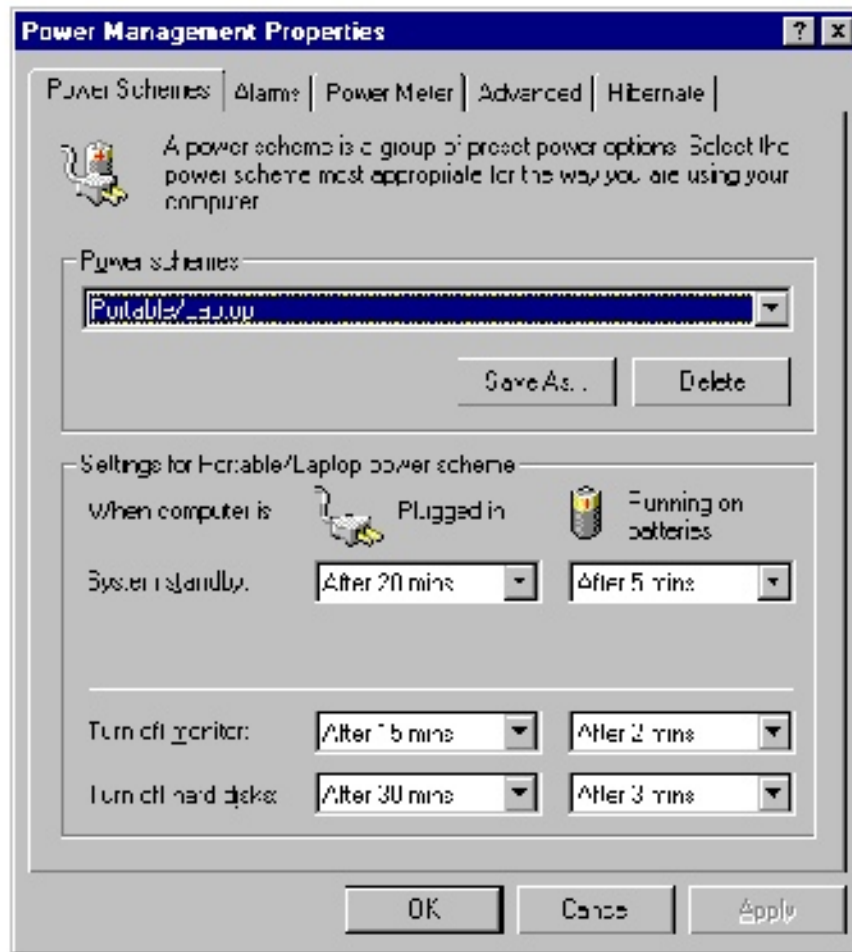
Windows 98

To manage your power management settings in Windows 98, you do not need to open the BIOS Setup program. In Windows 98 you can change power settings in the Power Management Properties dialog box.

Opening Power Management Properties

 **To open the Power Management Properties dialog box:**

1. Click **Start**, then select **Settings**, then **Control Panel**. The Control Panel opens.
2. Double-click the **Power Management** icon. The Power Management Properties dialog box opens.



3. Click the appropriate tab to view and modify settings.

Setting power schemes

Within the Power Management Properties window you can change power saving options such as when the monitor or hard disk is turned off.

You can select one of the pre-defined power schemes from the **Power schemes** drop-down list, or you can make your changes and save it as a power scheme. The **Portables/Laptop** power scheme changes the settings to maximize the battery life of your notebook.



To change your power saving options:

1. Open the Power Management Properties window.
2. Click the **Power Schemes** tab.
3. Select a pre-defined power scheme from the drop-down list.

- OR -

Set your power saving options, then save the power scheme by clicking **Save As** and typing in a name.

4. Click **OK** to apply the change.

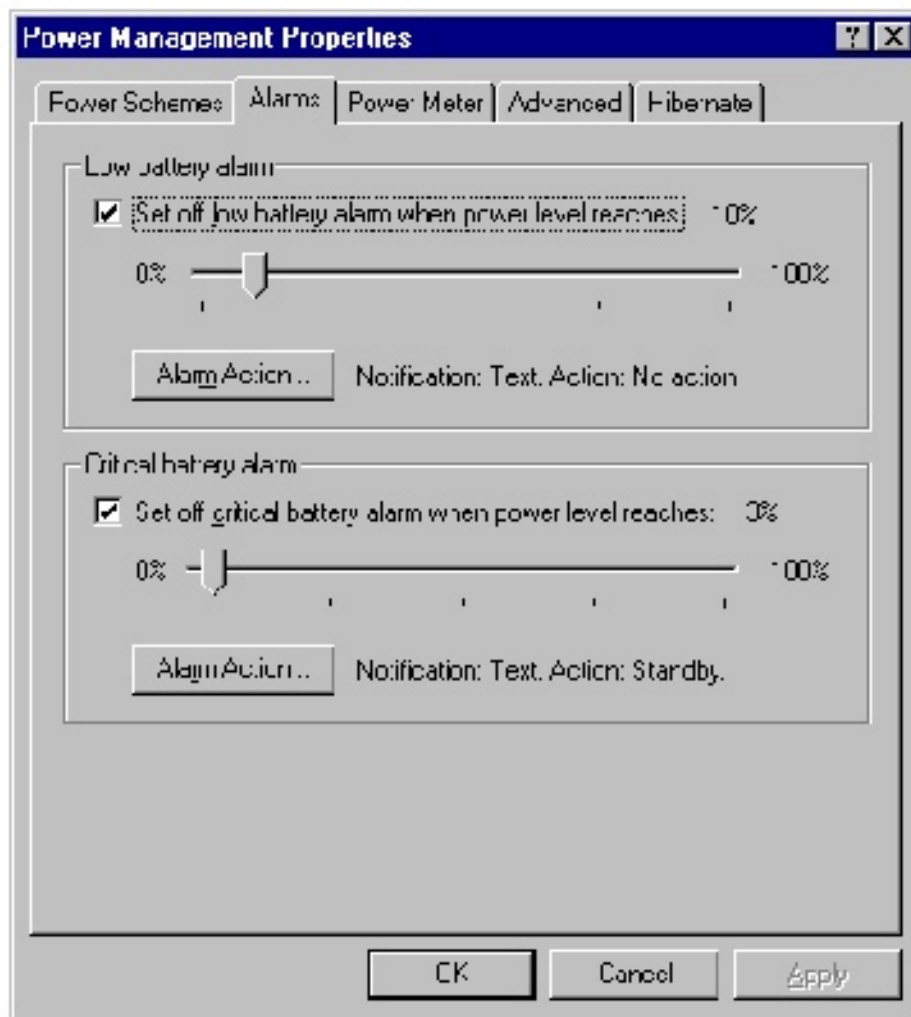
Alarm settings

Your notebook is equipped with alarms that can alert you if your battery power is running low.



To change your alarm settings:

1. Open the Power Management Properties window.
2. Click the **Alarms** tab.



3. Make your alarm settings. You can turn alarms On and Off, set the level of battery power when the alarm rings, and select how you are notified (sound or

message).

4. Click **OK** to apply the change.

Using Standby mode in Windows 98

Windows 98 uses Standby mode (which is called "Suspend" mode in Windows 95). When in Standby, your notebook cuts off power to most devices except memory.

The following table shows how to change the system modes in Windows 98.

If your notebook is...	...and you want to...	...then do this
Off	Start up	Press the power button.
On	Standby	Click Start , then select Shut Down, Standby , then click OK . - OR - Press Fn+F4 .
In Standby mode	Resume power	Press the power button.
On	Shut down	Click Start , then select Shut Down, Shut Down , then click OK .

Windows 95 and Windows NT

To manage your power management settings in Windows 95 and Windows NT, you need to enter the BIOS Setup program and change the power management settings. [See "Using the Power menu"](#) for more information on the power management settings and how to modify them.

Using Suspend mode in Windows 95 and Windows NT

Windows 95 and Windows NT use Suspend mode (which is called "Standby" mode in Windows 98). When in Suspend, your notebook cuts off power to most devices except memory.

The following table shows how to change the system modes in Window 95 and

Windows NT.

If your notebook is...	...and you want to...	then do this
Off	Start up	Press the power button.
On	Suspend	Click Start , then select Suspend .
In Suspend mode	Resume power	Press the power button briefly.
On	Shut down	Click Start , then select Shut Down , Shut down the computer , then click Yes .

Using the Power menu

The Power menu in the BIOS Setup utility contains power management settings. You can make changes to the settings to improve battery-powered session time and performance.

This screen example is similar to what you see on your LCD. You may have a notebook with a newer BIOS version than the one described in this manual. If there are differences, refer to the Item Specific Help box in the right column of the BIOS Setup menu for assistance.



To enter the Power menu:

1. Turn on your notebook.
2. As soon as it starts, press **F2**. The BIOS Setup utility opens.
3. In the Main menu, select the **Power** menu using the right arrow key.

- Navigate through the various options using the keys identified at the bottom of the screen. When you select an item on the Main menu and in the submenus, additional information related to the selection appears in Item Specification Help Box.

The following settings are most commonly changed:

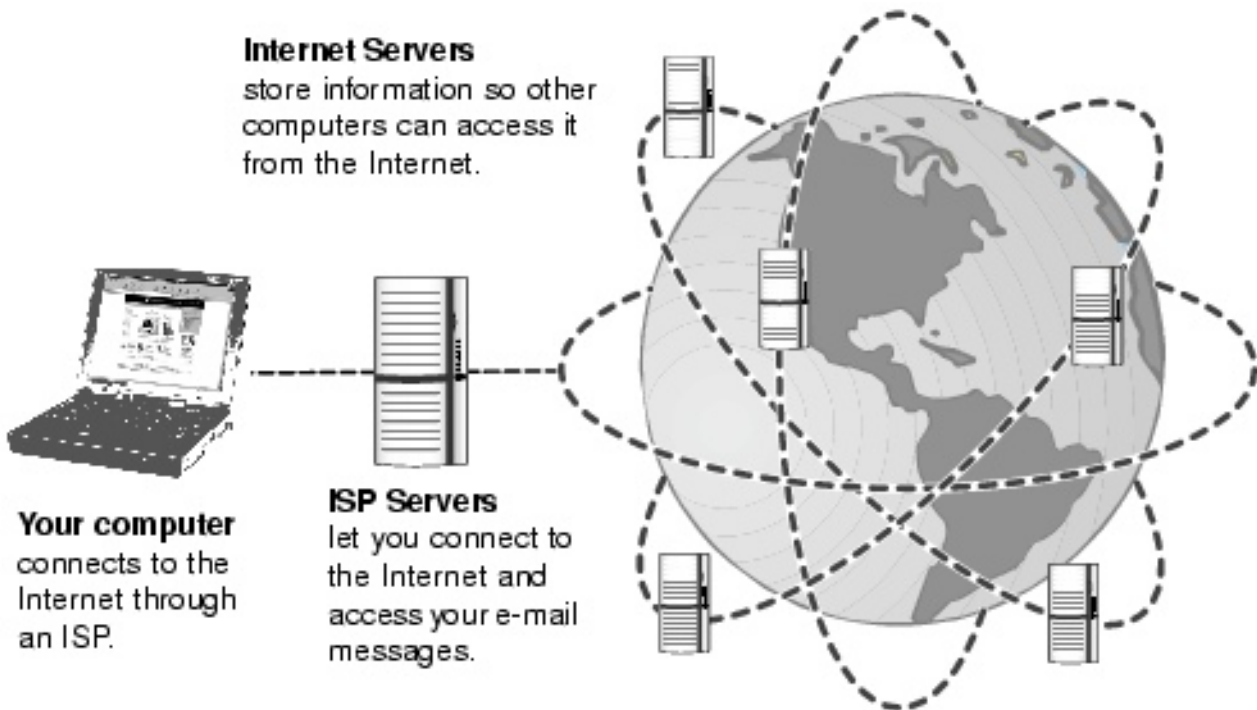
- **Power button mode** sets power switch functionality. When you press the power button, the notebook can be set to either Shut Down or Standby. Press the spacebar to select **On/Off** or **Standby/Resume**.
- **Power Savings** provides preset or customized power management for Windows 95 and Windows NT. If you have Windows 98, [See "Setting power schemes"](#) for information on changing your power savings settings.
 - Set **Power Savings** to **Maximum Performance** for the best system performance.
 - Set **Power Savings** to **Maximum Battery Life** for the best battery performance.
 - Set **Power Savings** to **Customized** to manually set the **Sleep**, **Standby**, **Hard disk**, and **Video** timeouts.
- **Auto dim with battery** decreases the LCD brightness 50% when using battery power only. (Press the spacebar to select **On** or **Off**.)

Using the Internet

This chapter provides information about the Internet and basic instructions about setting up Gateway.netSM or America Online[®] (AOL) Internet services. These services give you access to the World Wide Web (WWW), e-mail, and other Internet resources.

Learning about the Internet

The *Internet* is a worldwide network of computers linked together to provide information to people everywhere. The two most popular services on the Internet are e-mail and the World Wide Web. You can access this network by connecting your computer to a phone line and signing up with an Internet Service Provider (ISP).



If you want to access the Internet you need:

- A **modem** - a device that connects your computer, using a telephone line, to other computers or servers. If you have a modem jack on your computer, you have a modem.
- An **Internet Service Provider account** - a service that provides access to the Internet through their ISP server. When you connect to an ISP, the ISP server lets you access the Internet and your e-mail messages.

- A **Web browser** - a program that displays information from the World Wide Web.
- An **e-mail program** - a program that lets you create, send, and receive e-mail messages over the Internet.

Setting up an Internet account

Before you can view the information on the Web, you need to set up an account with an ISP (Internet Service Provider). If you selected Gateway.net or AOL as an ISP, follow these instructions to set up and connect to your account.

If you set up an account with Gateway.net or AOL, an Internet e-mail address is created for you. After completing the setup you are ready to access the Internet.

To set up an Internet account with Gateway.net or AOL:

1. Double-click the **Register with Gateway.net** or the **America Online** icon.
2. Follow the on-screen instructions. After setting up your account, you can connect to the Internet and access your e-mail services.

Accessing your Internet account

To connect to your Gateway.net or AOL Internet account:

1. Double-click the **Connect to Gateway.net** or **America Online** icon. The Connect dialog box opens.
2. Complete the member name and password information, then click **Connect**. The computer dials the Internet account phone number.

After connecting, the Web browser opens. For information about the Web and the Web browser, [see "Using the World Wide Web."](#)

To disconnect from your Gateway.net or AOL Internet account:

- Click **X** in the top right corner of the Web browser. Your computer disconnects from the Internet.

Important Make sure that your computer disconnects properly from your Internet account. If you do not have an "unlimited hours" ISP account, you may have to pay for the time that you are connected.



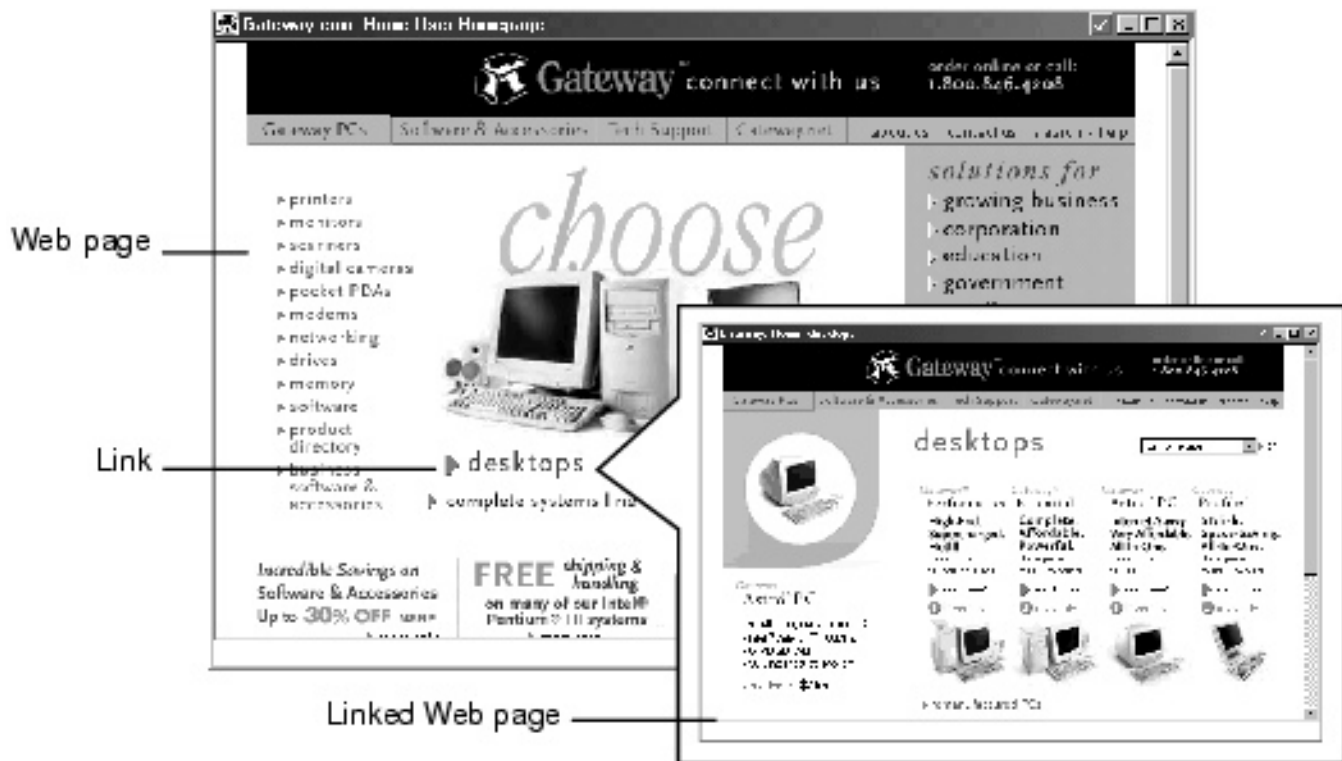
Using the World Wide Web

The World Wide Web is a user-friendly multimedia window to the Internet that gives you easy access to millions of sources of information.

The information you access on the Internet appears in Web pages. A group of related *Web pages* is called a *Web site*. You can access Web sites to shop, track investments, read the news, download programs, and much more.

You can travel through a Web site or visit other Web sites by clicking areas on the Web page called *links*, or *hyperlinks*. A link can be colored text (sometimes underlined), a picture, or an animated image. You can identify a link by moving the mouse pointer over it. If the pointer changes to a hand, the item is a link.

To learn more about using the Web browser features click **Help** in the menu bar.



Connecting to a Web site

After you set up an account with an Internet Service Provider (ISP) such as Gateway.net or AOL, you are ready to begin accessing the many information sources on the World Wide Web.



To connect to a Web site:

1. Connect to your ISP account. After the computer connects, the browser home page opens.
2. If you want to go to a different Web site, type the address (for example www.gateway.com) in the browser address bar, then click the **GO** button next to the browser address bar.



- OR -

Click a link to a Web site.

The Web browser locates the server computer on the Internet, transfers (downloads) data to your computer, and displays the page in the Web browser.

Sometimes Web pages display slowly. The speed that a Web page displays on your screen depends on the complexity of the Web page and other Internet conditions.

Downloading files

Downloading is the process of transferring files from a computer on the Internet to a folder on your computer.

To protect your computer against viruses, make sure that you run a virus scan on files that you download. For more information about scanning for viruses, see *Maintaining and Troubleshooting your Gateway Solo Notebook* for information on checking files for viruses.

To download files or programs from a Web site:

1. Connect to your ISP account.
2. In the address bar, type the address of the Web site that contains the file or program you want to download, then click the **GO** button next to the browser address bar.

- OR -

Click on links to navigate to the Web site where you want to download a file.

3. On your computer, create a folder where you want to store the file.
4. Click the link for the file that you want to download.
5. Follow the on-screen instructions to save the file in the folder that you created.

A copy of the file is downloaded to your computer. The time that it takes to transfer the file to your computer depends on file size and other Internet conditions.

6. Open the folder that you created.
7. Install or view the downloaded file by double-clicking it. If applicable, follow the instructions provided on the Web site to run or install the program.

Using e-mail

E-mail (electronic mail) programs let you send messages to anyone who has an Internet connection and e-mail address. E-mail is a free service of your Internet account.

The Internet never closes, so you can send e-mail messages at any time of the day or night. Your e-mail messages arrive at most e-mail addresses in minutes.

An *e-mail address* consists of a user name, the @ symbol, and the Internet domain name of the Internet Service Provider (ISP) or company that "hosts" that user. Your e-mail address is assigned when you sign up for an account with an ISP. For example, a person with an account with the Gateway.net ISP might have an e-mail address that is similar to this one:



Sending e-mail



To send e-mail using Gateway.net or AOL:

1. Connect to your Gateway.net or AOL account.
2. Click **Create Mail**.

- OR -

Click **Write**.

3. Type the e-mail address of the recipient you want to send e-mail to in the **Send To** box.
4. Type the subject of your e-mail in the **Subject** box.
5. Compose the e-mail message.
6. When finished, click **Send Now**.

Your e-mail is sent over the Internet to the e-mail address you specified.

Checking your e-mail



To check your e-mail using Gateway.net or AOL:

1. Connect to your Gateway.net or AOL account.
2. Click **Read Mail**.

Click **Read**.

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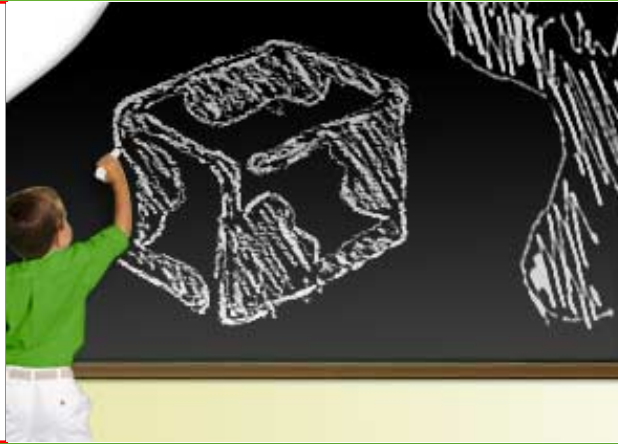
