

Minnesota Family Makes Farm Work Fun

The Stanley Nusbaums are nice people living in a large, nine-room house four miles east of Morristown in Minnesota. Their life together is rural living at its best. But it might have been quite different if they hadn't done some thinking and some changing.

The family was well on its way to getting into the well-known rut—that of running competition with themselves. Stanley Nusbaum has 260 acres of fertile land, and the tendency became, he says, to see how much volume could be forced from this land. They got going so strong with production of crops and live-stock all the fun of farming was going down the drain, Stanley says.

They changed things. They cut down on livestock, and let the hired help go. Now they raise what they can handle themselves. They say it's cheaper, and lots more fun with the family working as a team.

This happy family of six enjoys horses. Each member of the family owns his own horse—or has owned one. As a result of their enthusiasm for horses, they can show you handfuls of ribbons won at various shows sponsored by the Cannon Valley Saddle Club. Irene, alone, has won ten ribbons. Jerry owns at least 13, plus a dandy trophy. Stanley Nusbaum has served as President of the Saddle Club for some time.

Three years ago the family quit dairying, and cut their number of hogs from 300 to 150. Less livestock chores leave Stanley more time for field work, a plan which pays off in a wet season such as the one just past.

Corn is picked early and cribbed in high narrow cribs built to let the wind help with drying. The family helps harvest the 85 acres of corn and the 65 acres of soybeans.

The art of good management comes naturally to Stanley Nusbaum. He believes hard, honest work is the best way to get ahead. The weight of responsibility is not new to him either. These are things he and his brother, Everett, learned from their mother, who managed the Nusbaum farm for twenty-six years after the death of her husband. Stanley was just three years old when his father died—he learned farming early and well.

With farm work done, the family has fun together, "growing fat on good cooking" sparked with homemade bread, and snacks of rich chocolate fudge.

Teamwork in the family is not limited to farm work. Play is teamwork too, and winters and evenings they play their Hammond Organ and enjoy the panorama of the countryside from their frost framed windows.

The Hammond Organ is becoming so popular that everyday another one is sold to a school or college. The reason for this popularity is that the Hammond Organ becomes an integral part of the school's daily activities. Dust doesn't have a chance to gather on the organ. When not used for teaching or practicing, you'll find the organ at the assembly program, in the gymnasium for a basketball game or dance, in the lunchroom for a class banquet, or in the band and orchestra. The versatility of the Hammond Organ makes it ideal for any school function whether it's to accompany school cheers, songs, or use at a recital, and chapel services.

The organ is usually found in the auditorium for use in recitals, concerts and assembly programs. Another popular place is in the chapel, where it is used for devotional services and other programs. Other schools use one or more Hammond Organs in their music room, where group and individual instruction is given. But the ease with which an organ can be moved from one place to another does not restrict its use to any area of the school. The Hammond Organ goes where the school needs it.

A number of schools are including instruction on the Hammond Organ in regular adult evening education courses. The tremendous surge in popularity of the easy-to-play Hammond in the home is leading many adults to these informal evening classes. Each year, more communities are choosing the Hammond Organ for their schools, thus assuring increased appreciation and participation in music education.

Organ Instruction

ST. MARY'S CONVENT SCHOOL, Phoenix, Arizona, has one of the most outstanding music departments of any parochial school in the state. Sister Mary Florian, C.P.P.S., head of the Music Department, gives Hammond Organ lessons to a large number of high school girls. The Organ is also used for choir rehearsal, group singings, assemblies, school plays, and other entertainment.



Group Instruction

NORTH COLLINS CENTRAL SCHOOL in North Collins, New York, has trained a large number of Hammond organists in its regular organ instruction course. Mr. Herbert E. Lewen, organ instructor at North Collins, also has a group of organ students at Lake Shore Central School, Angola, New York. School officials at North Collins utilize the Hammond Organ for functions in different areas of the School, moving the console from room to room on a portable rubber-tire dolly.

School Curriculum

TWO HAMMOND ORGANS are kept busy at the Pierre S. Du Pont High School, Wilmington, Delaware. Organ instructor and supervisor at the school is Mr. Henry W. Hallett, a professional organist and chairman of the Mathematics Department. As a result of Hammond Organ instruction, each grade has at least two class organists, and some have three or more. Student organists play for all student and parent functions, assemblies, class plays, parent-teacher nights, and commencement exercises. Many of the churches in the Wilmington area have organists who majored in music and organ study at Pierre S. Du Pont High School. Mr. Hallett has participated in Hammond Organ instruction at the School for fourteen years.

Student Programs and Assemblies

HAMMOND CONCERT MODEL ORGAN was installed in the new Music-Auditorium building of Shafter High School, Shafter, California. The front portion of the edifice is a 957-seat stadium-type auditorium, while in the rear portion is the music unit, with separate choral and instrument rooms, uniform and instrument storage rooms, music library, and offices for the music staff. The organ was presented to the school by the Coberly West Company in memory of Harry D. West, former member of the Board of Trustees of the Kern County School District. Miss Margret Bennege, organist of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Bakersfield, performed during the organ dedication ceremonies.









FUN AT THE HAMMOND

Family Entertainment in the Living Room

Have you noticed how the tempo of living has changed in the past fifty years? There was a time, you know, when your grandparents planned months in advance on a trip, and then they walked the two miles from the farm-house down to the Stage Coach road. If they were late and missed the stage coach, they went back to the house and waited another two months until the next coach came by. Today, people grumble and growl if they miss ONE section of a revolving door. Yes, times have changed and people today are leading a hurried, frustrated life, filled with tremendous activity and keen competitions. Yet, with all this, people are basically the same, and they have the same wants, the same desires that our grandparents had. You can perhaps remember the old reed organ in grandmother's "parlor." This parlor was the "sancto sanctorum" of the home . . the room which was kept immaculately dusted, the blinds pulled and the family never entered it except on Sundays. Then they all gathered around the organ on Sunday afternoon and evening and had an old-fashioned "hymn sing." Many times other numbers would creep into the song fest, and we loved to sing old tunes like "Moonlight Bay," or "In the Evening by the Moonlight" or other favorites.

Today there is a wonderful renaissance of that music in the home. Today music is again taking its rightful place in the family life. When a Hammond Organ is moved into a house, it becomes a HOME and something wonderful happens. No more are the children tempted to roam outside the home seeking such amusements as they can find for themselves. No, today the slogan has become "Happy is the home that has a Hammond." And it's so true. It becomes the center of interest, for Mother and Dad (using new, improved methods of learning) have found that music is no longer a child's occupation, but are finding new pleasure in creating music for themselves, using the thousands of wonderful tone combinations which are to be found only on the Hammond Organ. When Dad comes home restless and weary from the office, with cares piled high on his mind, he finds instant and welcome relief in just sitting down and running through the half dozen numbers he has learned. It relaxes him, puts him at peace with the world again.

Many a mother has found wonderful surcease from the busy and exacting life of running a modern home in the joy which playing the Hammond Organ brings her. She has found new companionship with her children and her husband in their comparisons of which drawbar setting sounds best with this or that number; she has found an intellectual challenge which is most interesting to work out as she progresses rapidly with her Hammond Organ lessons. She is amazed at the difference in teaching Hammond today, and the older methods of teaching piano.

Teaching Hammond Organ today IS different. Anyone, even those with NO former musical experience of any kind, can learn rapidly today with a course such as my DO IT YOURSELF (which still requires a good teacher for guidance) or the PLAY THE HAMMOND ORGAN course, wherein you play MORE numbers of a higher calibre with far less difficulty in five weeks than you could accomplish at older methods of piano study in a year and a half. And these are not numbers which you would be embarrassed to play for company. They are numbers like the BLUE DANUBE and EMPEROR waltzes of Strauss, the SERENADE by Toselli, and many others. Yes, it's fun like you've never had before.

The main thing for you to remember is to go to a GOOD teacher. We are traveling from coast to coast and border to border these days working with the teachers in each community helping them to set new

and border to border these days working with the teachers in each community helping them to set new goals in their teaching, helping them to step up their teaching methods so that they can accomplish the same good work in a shorter time. This must be done with no loss of valuable material; you must still be WELL TRAINED, must know all about what you are playing, yet this must be done with the emphasis on HAVING FUN at the Hammond. Too many times teachers feel that because they are expert musicians, you, too, want to become a "professional" player. Most of the time this is not true; you are interested solely in having a good time with the Hammond Organ; true, you want your playing to sound well, and of course you want to be taught so that you KNOW WHAT YOU ARE DOING, not just playing "spots" here and there. So this is quite a challenge for the teachers of Hammond Organ. You'll find a GOOD one in your locality . . . one which is even now being CERTIFIED by the Hammond Organ Company and your local Hammond dealer, to guarantee to you that his or her instruction will be the finest you can receive.

After you've had a few lessons you will begin to realize that here is something you have always wanted to do. Every person in the world is desirous of playing organ music; most people can hardly believe that it is as easy to accomplish as it really is. That is why it is important that YOU give it a try. Talk to your local Hammond Organ dealer; he's the best friend you'll ever have. He is just as interested in getting you to play well as you yourself are.
