GETTING TO KNOW WINDOWS XP

Windows XP Manual

This printed manual provides general information about the operating system. We recommend that all beginning users or users of previous versions of Windows read this information. It can be found with the CDs in the accessory box that came with your PC.

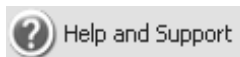
Windows XP Tour

Windows XP includes a tour that you can take to familiarize yourself with the operating system. This tour can usually be found by clicking on the **Start** menu. You can also find the tour by selecting **All Programs**, then **Accessories**.

Microsoft Interactive Training

Training is the most powerful way to acquire skills that help you perform a specific task efficiently. On the **Start** menu, choose **All Programs**, choose **Accessories**, and then choose **Microsoft Interactive Training**.

Windows XP Help and Support



An answer to almost every question can be found in this program. You'll find it in the **Start** menu.

SOFTWARE HELP

Many software programs incorporate extensive help functions. As a general rule, you can access help functions by pressing F1 on the keyboard. Many software programs include Help as an option on the menu at the top of the screen or window. They may also provide an icon (or icons) with a question mark on them that you can click to access more information.

DEVICE DRIVERS

If you install external devices, such as printers or digital cameras, you may also need to install device drivers. The drivers will be included with your peripheral devices. These are occasionally updated by the manufacturer. Check with the manufacturer of your peripheral device to find out if you have the most recent version of your device drivers.

INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR PC

Clicking on Start and then on Information about your PC will bring up more extensive information about your PC, as well as useful links to software tools and other resources. It also contains any last minute information about your PC that may not be included in this manual.

Safety and Security

WARNINGS

Before getting started, please read the following important safety information concerning your PC carefully.



- **DO NOT allow children to play unattended with electrical equipment.**
- **DO NOT open the PC cover or use the PC with the cover removed.** When the cover is open there is a **danger to life** from electric shock.
- DO NOT insert objects through the slots and openings of the PC. This may lead to electric shock, short-circuit or fire that could cause personal harm or damage to your PC.
- Connect the PC ONLY to a grounded, easily accessible AC outlet. For disconnecting the PC from the AC power, disconnect the power cord from the AC outlet.



- **DO NOT cover the slots and openings in the PC cover.** These openings are for ventilation purposes. Covering these vents may lead to overheating.
- **This PC is NOT designed for use within industrial environments.**



- CD-ROM, CD-RW, DVD, DVD-ROM, and DVD-RW drives are **Laser Class 1** devices. These lasers **must** remain in their sealed PC case. **DO NOT remove the drive covers, as exposure to the lasers may prove harmful.**
- **DO NOT look directly into the laser, even when wearing eye protection.**

IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

When using any electronic equipment, basic safety precautions should always be taken. Following the guidelines below can reduce the risk of fire, electric shock and personal injury:

- Do not use this product near water (for example, near a bathtub, wash bowl, kitchen sink, laundry tub, wet basement, or swimming pool).
- Avoid using a telephone or modem (other than a cordless type) during an electrical storm. There may be a remote risk of electric shock from lightning.
- Do not use the telephone or modem to report a gas leak in the vicinity of the leak.
- Use only the power cord that came with your PC.
- Keep batteries away from children at all times.
- **Caution:** To reduce the risk of fire, use only No. 26 AWG or larger telecommunication cords, such as the cord provided with your PC.

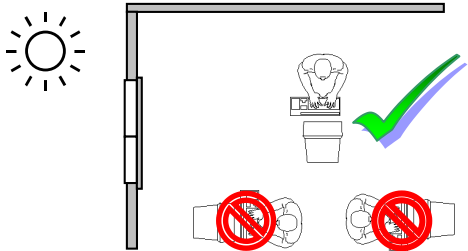

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Working in Comfort

Remember that choosing the proper location for your PC is just as important as connecting it correctly. Place your PC in a stable, vibration-free area. Additional guidelines and details on setting up your PC are provided below.

POSITIONING THE MONITOR

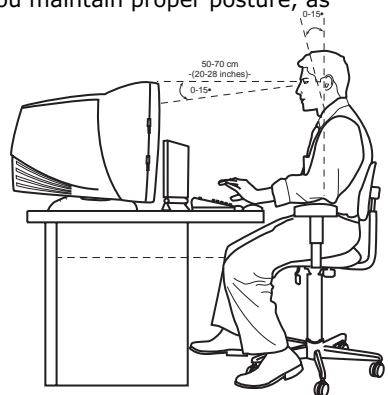
Ensure that the monitor is set up in such a way that reflections and glare are minimized. The top line of the screen should be at eye level or slightly below.



WORKING ERGONOMICALLY

Change your position frequently and take regular breaks to prevent fatigue. Sitting in one position for long periods can be uncomfortable. To minimize the potential for physical discomfort or injury, it's important that you maintain proper posture, as follows.

- **Back:** While sitting at your work surface, make sure your back is supported by the chair's backrest in erect position or angled slightly backwards.
- **Legs:** Your thighs should be horizontal or angled slightly downward. Your lower legs should be near a right angle to your thighs. Your feet should rest flat on the floor. If necessary, use a footrest. But make sure that you have your seat height adjusted correctly before getting a footrest.
- **Arms:** Your arms should be relaxed and loose, elbows close to your sides, with forearms and hands approximately parallel to the floor.



- **Wrists:** Your wrists should be as straight as possible while using the keyboard, mouse or trackball. They should not be bent sideways, or more than 10 degrees up or down.
- **Head:** Your head should be upright or tilted slightly forward. Avoid working with your head or trunk twisted.

SETUP LOCATION

- Keep your PC and all devices connected to it away from moisture, dust, heat and direct sunlight. Failure to observe these instructions can lead to malfunctions or damage to the PC.
- To prevent damage to your PC, place and operate the PC and all connected units on a stable, balanced and vibration-free surface.

Temperature

- The PC is most reliably operated at an ambient temperature between +41° and +95° F and at a relative humidity of between 30% and 70%.
- When powered off, the PC can be stored at temperatures between -40° and +158° F (non condensing).

Connecting Devices

Before you begin using your PC, you must first connect the keyboard, mouse, monitor, and power cord. Other components can be connected later. **The devices listed are NOT NECESSARILY INCLUDED with your PC.** Please refer to the drawing on the inside front cover of this manual to determine the existence and location of ports on your particular PC.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

Please follow the instructions below to properly connect your PC.

- To avoid damage to your PC, connect your peripherals (for example, keyboard, mouse and monitor) while your PC is powered off. Some devices can be connected while your PC is in use. Refer to the documentation that came with each device.
- For best performance, keep the PC at least three feet away from high frequency and magnetic interference sources (for example, TV sets, speakers, mobile telephones, etc.) in order to avoid malfunctions or loss of data.
- Make sure that all cables not in use are disconnected from the PC.
- Only shielded cables shorter than three meters (9.84 feet) should be used for the LPT, COM, USB, IEEE 1394, audio, video and network connections with this PC.
- The connection of devices is limited to equipment that complies with EN60950 ("Safety of Information Technology Equipment") or EN60065 "Audio, Video and Similar Electronic Apparatus") safety requirements.
- Some devices require software drivers to be installed on your PC. Please follow the instructions that came with the device.

CONNECTING THE MONITOR

Inside cover drawing reference: W, H1

To connect a monitor, simply plug the monitor cable into the blue VGA monitor port on the back of your PC. If your PC has two blue VGA monitor ports on the back panel, use the port on the horizontal panel at the bottom.

Some monitors have a separate cable to support built in speakers. This cable should be connected to the green speaker port on the back of the PC (drawing reference H1).

Note that the monitor may not be included with your PC. For more information about connecting your monitor, refer to the documentation that came with it.

It is possible to change the display settings that were preconfigured at the factory, such as resolution and refresh rate. However, if your monitor does not support the selected settings, it could malfunction during use or even become damaged. Refer to the documentation that came with your monitor for more information on supported settings.

To change your monitor settings, right click (press and release the right button of the mouse) on the Windows Desktop and select **Properties**. A dialog box will open with several different tabs. Each of these tabs provides options for configuring your display.

If you select a resolution that is not supported by your monitor, the screen will go black. If this happens, do nothing. The PC will automatically reset to the previous settings after several seconds and you will be able to view your screen and readjust the settings as necessary.

CONNECTING WIRELESS KEYBOARD & MOUSE

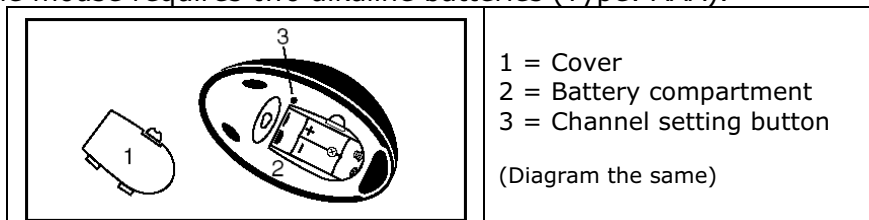
These devices are optional. The wireless keyboard and mouse operate with digital radio technology to ensure smooth communication between the keyboard, the mouse and your computer without a connecting cable. The keyboard and mouse do not need to be pointed toward the receiver in order to function properly.

There are two frequency channels each for keyboard and mouse to prevent interference if you are operating several radio transmission devices simultaneously.

Before working with your new keyboard and mouse for the first time, perform the following initial setup steps.

Inserting batteries in mouse

The mouse requires two alkaline batteries (Type: AAA).

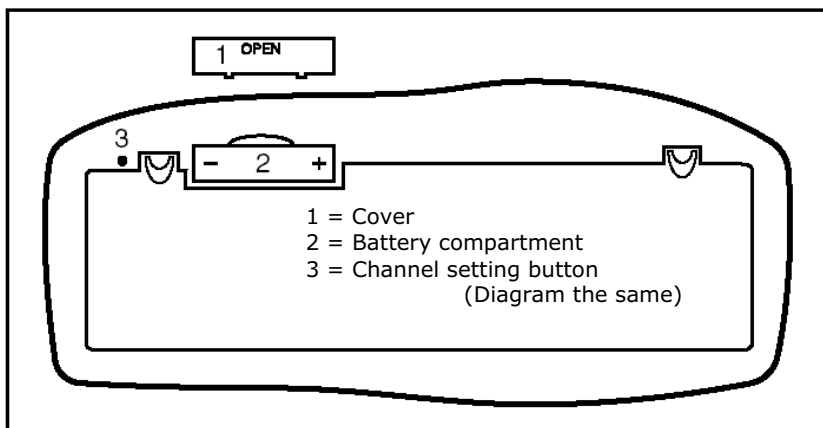


1. Remove the battery compartment cover (1) on the bottom of the keyboard by pushing it in the direction of the arrow.
2. Insert the two alkaline batteries (AAA) in the battery compartment and fix the battery compartment cover (1) on the bottom of mouse again.

➡ **Note:** Please do not push the channel setting button (3) near the battery compartment cover while inserting or changing batteries. It may cause the channel or ID to change.

Inserting batteries in keyboard

The keyboard requires two alkaline batteries (AA).



1. Remove the battery compartment cover (1) on the bottom of the keyboard by pushing it in the direction of the arrow.
2. Insert two AA batteries. The illustration in the battery compartment (2) shows how to insert the batteries properly.
3. Close the battery compartment by pushing the locking lug (2) under the battery compartment.

➡ **Note:** Please do not push the channel setting button (3) at near the battery compartment cover while inserting or changing batteries. It may cause the channel or ID to change.

Setting frequency channel or ID

➡ **Note:** Please make the following setting **only after** setting up your PC as described on the other chapters in this manual.

For the radio connection, the frequency and ID of the keyboard and mouse need to be set to the receiver.

Using different IDs for the keyboard and mouse can help them work without interference on the same frequency channel. There are 255 IDs each for keyboard and mouse.

Changing the frequency channel may prevent interference between the wireless keyboard and mouse and another wireless device.

Setting frequency channel on keyboard and mouse

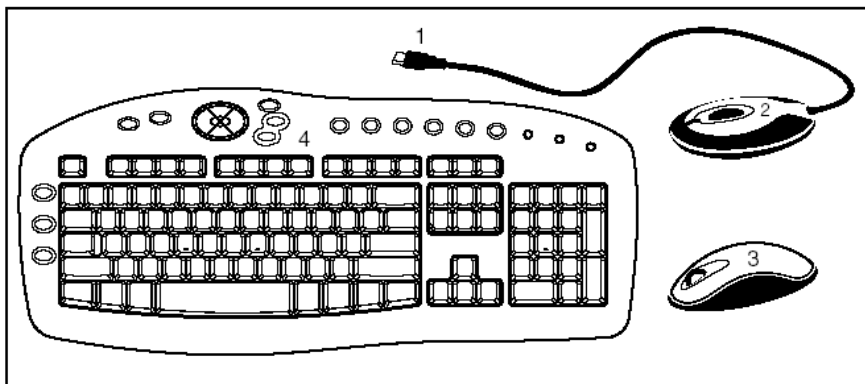
1. Push the connect button on the top of receiver. The indicator will blink.
2. Push the button on the bottom of keyboard or mouse. The channel will be changed after the button is released.

➡ **Note:** Please do not hold the button down. After 3 seconds it will change the ID instead of channel.

Setting ID on keyboard and mouse

1. Push the connect button on the top of receiver. The indicator on the top of receiver will blink.
2. Hold down the button on the bottom of keyboard and mouse for 3 seconds. The ID will be changed after the button is released.

Connect the keyboard and mouse



1 = USB Receiver plug (black)

2 = Receiver

3 = Mouse

4 = Keyboard

1. Plug the USB plug (1, black) of the receiver into an USB port of your computer. The computer will activate your mouse and keyboard after 10 seconds.
2. Place the receiver at least 20 cm (8 inches) from other electrical devices (e.g. monitor) to achieve optimum performance. The distance between the keyboard, mouse and receiver should not exceed 5 feet. Do not place the receiver on metal surfaces.

- The driver for these devices has already been installed on your PC.
- You will find a detailed manual with your wireless keyboard and mouse.
- The operation of the mouse and the keyboard is described on page 29.

CONNECTING THE KEYBOARD

Inside cover drawing reference: R, E

Connect your keyboard cable to the back of the PC. Use the PS/2 keyboard port for a PS/2 keyboard, or one of the USB ports for a USB keyboard.

CONNECTING THE MOUSE

Inside cover drawing reference: O, E

Connect your mouse cable to the PC. Use the PS/2 mouse port for a PS/2 mouse, or one of the USB ports for a USB mouse.

CONNECTING A PRINTER OR SCANNER

Inside cover drawing reference: P

If you want to connect a printer or scanner with a parallel (25-pin) connecting cable, connect the cable from your device to the parallel port on the back of the PC.

If your printer or scanner uses a USB port, please refer to the next section, "Connect USB Devices."

Printer and scanner are not included. For more information, refer to the documentation that came with each device.

CONNECTING SERIAL DEVICES

Inside cover drawing reference: S

Some older devices require a serial port. To connect a serial device (not included), connect the cable from your device to the serial port on the back of the PC. For more information on these devices, refer to the documentation that came with the device.

CONNECTING USB DEVICES

Inside cover drawing reference: E

USB ports provide an easy way to connect many peripheral devices to your PC. You can use any USB device (not included) with any USB port. USB ports are located on both the front and back panels of the PC for your convenience.

Some USB devices require that you reinstall software drivers when you connect the device to a different USB port than the one originally used. This can be avoided by always using the device with the same USB port.

Refer to the documentation that came with your device for more information.

CONNECTING FIREWIRE DEVICES

Inside cover drawing reference: F, F2

FireWire (IEEE 1394) ports provide an easy and high-performance way of connecting high-speed storage, imaging, and many new types of audio/video devices.

FireWire devices (not included) are either 6-pin or 4-pin. Identify which of the connections your device requires and use the corresponding FireWire port on your PC. Your PC may not have both types of port, depending on the model. Please reference the diagram on the inside front cover of this manual to determine the type and location of your FireWire ports.

Refer to the documentation that came with your device for more information.

CONNECTING TO A NETWORK

Inside cover drawing reference: Q

Your PC has a Fast Ethernet Network connection. You can use this to connect to a network.

You will need CAT 5 (or higher) cable with an RJ45 connector to use your network port. This cable is not included with your PC.

The Windows XP Help and Support Center offers extensive information about networking your PC. You can access this information by clicking on **Start**, then **Help and Support**, and selecting the "Networking and the Web" help topic.

CONNECTING TO THE INTERNET

Inside cover drawing reference: Q, Z

There are two basic ways you can connect your PC to the Internet:

- Through an analog modem/telephone connection.
- Through a LAN (Local Area Network) connection

In each case, you will need to sign up for an Internet account with an ISP (Internet Service Provider) or broadband provider before you can access the Internet. They can give you specific instructions on how to get started using the Internet.

Connecting to the Internet through an Analog Modem/Dial Up

Inside cover drawing reference: Z

To connect your PC to the Internet using an analog modem/dial up connection, you need an RJ11 cable (standard telephone cable). This cable is provided with your system.

Connect the RJ11 cable to the modem port on the back of the PC. Connect the other end of the cable to your telephone line wall jack or the line out of your telephone or fax machine (not included).

Connecting to the Internet through a LAN Connection (Broadband)

Inside cover drawing reference: Q

Most broadband Internet connections are connected through a LAN (local area network) connection. Your broadband service provider may require additional equipment to connect to the Internet, such as a DSL or cable modem (not included).

You will need CAT 5 (or higher) cable with an RJ45 connector to use your network port. This cable is not included with your PC.

CONNECTING SPEAKERS

Inside cover drawing reference: H1, I, J

You can connect speakers (may not be included) to the green speaker port on the back of the PC (drawing reference **H1**).


Setting up Surround Sound

Depending on the model, your PC may not be ready for surround sound. If your PC is equipped with surround sound, connect your speakers at the back of the PC as follows.

1. Connect the front speakers to the green port (drawing reference **H1**).
2. Connect the rear speakers to the blue port (drawing reference **J**).
3. Connect the center speaker and/or subwoofer to the pink port (drawing reference **I**).

Configuring Surround Sound

To configure your surround sound

1. Click this icon  in the task bar
2. Select the "Speaker Configuration" tab
3. Select the number of speakers that you would like to attach to your PC.

Note that the rear panel of your PC may differ in appearance from the panel shown in the software for configuring your surround sound.

CONNECTING AN AUDIO SOURCE

Inside cover drawing reference: I, J

You can connect three types of external audio devices to record sound on your PC:

- Analog audio devices, such as a conventional stereo system
- Digital audio devices, such as a CD player with digital out
- Microphones

Connect an Analog Audio Device

Inside cover drawing reference: J, G

If you want to use the PC to record input from an external analog audio source (not included), connect the cable from your device to the light-blue Audio port on the front or back of the PC. The port on the front is Aux, the port on the back is Line In. Refer to the documentation that came with the device for more information.

Connect a Microphone

Inside cover drawing reference: I

To connect a microphone (not included), use either the pink port on the front panel or the back panel of the PC.

The microphone input is muted by default. To set the recording input levels and select input sources, click **Start** then **All Programs** then **Accessories** then **Entertainment** then **Volume Control**.

Click the button next to "Recording" to select the source for your recording (e.g., microphone).

Tip: Position the microphone in such a way that it does not point directly at the speakers. If you hear feedback (for example, loud whistling noises), reposition the microphone until the sound stops.

CONNECTING HEADPHONES

Inside cover drawing reference: **H**

You can connect headphones to the green port on the front of your PC. Connecting a device to this port will mute the speaker port (drawing reference H1) on the back of the PC.

CONNECTING A VIDEO SOURCE

Inside cover drawing reference: **F, F2, J, K, L**

Connect an Analog Video Device

If your PC is a model with Video In Composite and/or S-Video In ports, you can use these to connect analog video devices such as an analog video camera or VCR. Refer to the diagram on the inside front cover of this manual to determine the existence and location of these ports on your PC. You can connect an analog video device (not included) in one of two ways, depending on your device:

- To the Video In Composite port (drawing reference **K**)
- To the S-Video In port (drawing reference **L**)

You may also need to connect a separate cable to the audio input port (drawing reference J) in order to capture sound along with your video images. The audio input on the front is Aux, the audio input on the back is Line in.

Refer to the documentation that came with the device for more information.

Connect a Digital Video Device

Most digital video devices, such as digital video cameras (not included) currently use FireWire to connect to your PC. Please see the section "Connect a FireWire Device." Refer to the documentation that came with the device for more information.

CONNECTING AN ANTENNA SOURCE

Inside cover drawing reference: Y, Y2

If your PC is a model with a TV-Tuner card, you need to use special 75 Ohm coaxial antenna cables.

1. Connect the VHF cubicle antenna to the correspondent FM stereo antenna port (**Y**) of the tuner card.
2. Connect a terrestrial or a cable TV antenna cable to the TV antenna port (**Y2**) of your tuner card.

CONNECTING THE POWER SUPPLY

Inside cover drawing reference: X, X2

After connecting the keyboard, mouse, and monitor, and any other peripheral devices, plug the PC and monitor into an AC outlet. Use only the supplied power cord. Observe the following safety precautions.

- The AC outlet must be in the vicinity of the PC and within easy reach of the power cables. DO NOT stretch the power cables tightly to reach an AC outlet.
- In order to disconnect your PC from the power source, remove the power cord from the AC outlet.
- To provide additional protection against electric shock, power surges, lightning strikes, or other electrical damage to your PC, we recommend the use of a surge protector.
- If you are using an extension cord, ensure that the cord meets your local safety requirements. If in doubt, ask an electrician. Never use frayed or worn extension cords.
- **The power supply unit has an on/off switch on the back of the PC. Setting the switch to "I" turns the power on and setting the switch to "O" turns the power off.**

Caution: Even with the on/off switch set to "O", some components of the PC remain under voltage. To completely disconnect the PC from all voltage, the power cord must be disconnected from the AC outlet.

GETTING STARTED

Read "Safety and Security" at the beginning of this book before you power up the PC!

Once you have properly connected the monitor, keyboard, and mouse as discussed in the previous section, you are ready to start up the PC.


All software included with your PC has been pre-loaded on the PC. You do not need to install any of the CDs that came with your PC. These have been provided for back up purposes.

The first time you turn on the PC, Windows XP will ask you several questions to customize the set up of your PC. Some of this information, such as network and Internet settings, can be skipped the first time and set up after your PC is up and running. Contact your ISP (Internet service provider) or network administrator for the correct settings.

Starting Up the PC

When you are ready to begin, follow the steps below.

1. Turn on the monitor and any peripheral devices you have connected (for example, a printer).
2. Set the on/off switch on the back of the PC to "I" if it is not already set.
3. Briefly press and release the power switch on the front of the computer (drawing reference: **N**) to start the PC and begin loading Windows XP.

The PC and Windows XP start and now go through several phases. Follow the instructions on the screen. Dialogue boxes will explain any steps that need to be taken. Should you have any questions just click the  icon.

Mouse Familiarization Program

Windows XP provides a mouse familiarization program.

If you are new to PCs, we recommend that you use the mouse familiarization program to learn how to use the mouse to work with the PC.

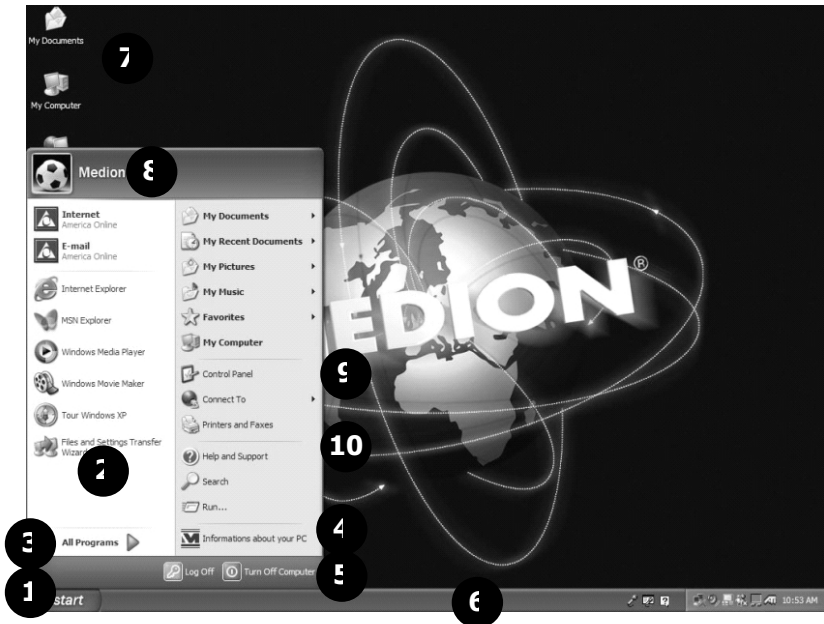

THE WINDOWS XP DESKTOP

After the login procedure the Windows XP desktop appears on your screen. (Your desktop might not look exactly like the one shown here.)



1. Start Button

Clicking the Start button brings up a menu where you can access help, software programs, files, and settings. For more information, click **Start** then **All Programs** then **Accessories** then **Tour Windows XP**.

2. Program Bar

The most commonly used software programs are listed here.

3. All Programs

All of the software programs installed on your PC are ordinarily listed here. Click **All Programs** to reveal an extensive menu.

4. Information about your PC

Click this button to receive important information about your PC as well as valuable hints and additional assistance.

5. Turn Off Computer

Click this button to shut down Windows XP and the PC.

6. Task Bar

Here you receive information and status reports about Windows XP and which programs are running.

7. Desktop Icons

Desktop icons link to their respective programs. To start a program, double-click its desktop icon.

8. Logged in User

This tells you which user is logged in to your PC.

9. Control Panel

You can use the icons in Control Panel to change the appearance and functionality of Windows XP. These icons represent options for configuring your PC.

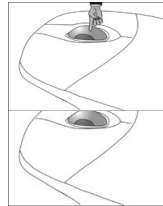
10.Windows XP Help

Here you can find information on using your PC, networking, backup, and many other tasks.

THE MOUSE

The mouse has a wheel that can be used:

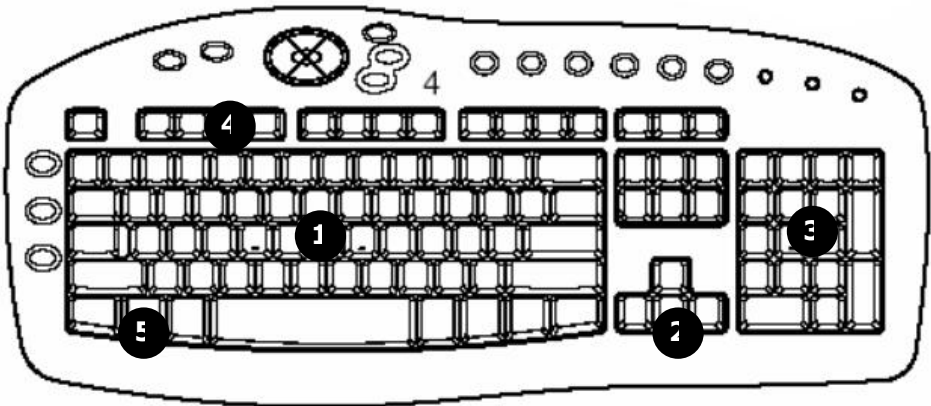
- As a third mouse button by clicking as shown in the picture.
- To scroll through a document or internet pages.



You can assign different functions to the buttons using the Mouse settings in the Control Panel.

KEYBOARD

A typical PC keyboard includes standard keys, special keys for PC functions, and special buttons.



1. Alphanumeric Keys

These are the standard keys for alphanumeric and special characters, similar to what you might find on a typewriter.

2. Cursor Control Keys

The cursor control keys, also known as arrow keys, are controls for up, down, left, and right. Basically, they control the movement of the cursor in a document, Web page, or game. The exact function of the cursor control keys may differ from program to program.

3. Numeric Pad

When the Num Lock key is on (the Num Lock light is lit), the numeric pad keys are for typing numbers and the basic arithmetic functions found on a hand calculator. When the Num Lock key is off (the Num Lock light is off), the numeric pad keys work like cursor control keys.

4. Function Keys

The F1 through F12 keys in the top row of the keyboard are known as function keys. The operation of these keys may vary from one program to another. Refer to the documentation that came with each program for more information.

In most software programs, the F1 key brings up the Help window for that program.







5. Windows Keys













The left and right Windows keys are the two keys on the bottom row with the Windows banner. They are used to call up the Windows XP Start menu.

Multimedia Buttons

Some keyboards include several multimedia buttons. These are typically located along the top of the keyboard, above the function keys or above the numeric pad.

Special buttons are often provided for starting the Internet browser, Email program, or search engine, or for adjusting or muting the volume of your PC's system volume.

Symbol	Function
	Standby Mode Depending on the settings in the BIOS Setup or operating system the computer switches to a standby mode.
	Internet Starts your default browser.
	E-Mail Starts your default e-mail program.
	Favorites Opens the "Favorites" folder.
	Calculator Activates the Windows default calculator.
	Search Activates the OS default search function.

	Back Switches to the previous web page/folder.
	Forward Switch to the next web page.
	Previous Track Use this key to skip to the previous title in the active player.
	Stop Use this key to end the playback of a title.
	Play/Pause Use this key to start or pause for a short time the playback of a title just as you would with a normal CD player.
	Next Track Use this key to skip to the next title in the active player.
	Decrease the volume This key decreases the volume of the soundcard.
	Mute Use this key to switch on/off the soundcard.
	Increase the volume This key increases the volume of the soundcard.
	Cut Cuts the content you selected.
	Copy Copies the content you selected.
	Paste Pastes the content you have copied or cut.

Configuring the Keyboard

To configure the keyboard:

1. Click **Start**.
2. Choose **Control Panel**.
3. Double-click **Keyboard**.

The Keyboard Properties window opens.

4. Choose the keyboard options you prefer.

HARD DRIVE

The hard drive is the PC's main storage medium combining large storage capacity and rapid data access. This is where Windows XP is installed, as well as most software programs.

If you are looking for a file on the hard drive and you know the name, go to Search on the Start menu to find the file. Following is some general information on where you might find some common files.

Usually your hard drive is divided into partitions, as shown below. The partitions of your hard drive may vary from what is shown here.

Local Disk	C:	Windows XP Software programs Your documents
Recovery	D:	Drivers for internal PC components Restoration software Installation files for software that came with your PC

Important Directories

The most important directories preinstalled on your PC are shown below. These directories may vary from what is shown here.

Caution: Don't delete files unless you know what they are. Windows XP might require these files for your PC to operate correctly. Also, do not alter or resize the partitions – this will make it impossible to restore your PC to the factory settings.

C: This is the main hard disk drive partition for your PC. It is where your program files, settings, and documents are stored, as well as files necessary for running Windows XP.

C:\Program Files Includes files belonging to software programs.

C:\Windows The main directory for Windows XP.

C:\Documents and Settings Includes the settings and documents for all PC users.

D: Includes files for restoring hardware components, software programs, or your entire PC to working order.

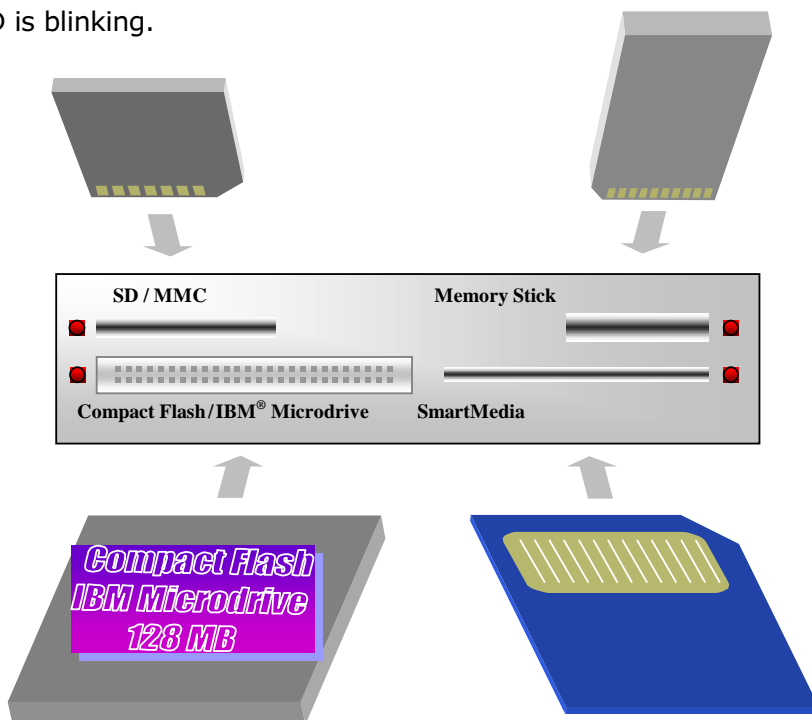
D:\Driver Drivers for internal PC components.

D:\Recovery Includes the files needed to perform a system restore.

D:\Tools Includes installation files for software that came with your PC.

CARD READER

If your PC has a card reader, you can use several types of memory cards (also called flash cards) to read and write data. When you insert a card, the LED next to the slot is lit. The LED light will blink while data is being transferred. Do NOT remove a card while the corresponding LED is blinking.



Here are the types of memory cards you can use.

THE NETWORK

What is a network?

A network means connecting your PC to one or several other computers. Users can transfer data between computers and share resources such as printers, modems and hard disk drives.

Here are some practical examples:

- You can exchange E-mail and manage appointments in an office.
- Users can share a printer in a network and save their data on a central server.
- Users can share one modem or one ISDN card among computers for Internet access.
- Two or more computers can be connected to play network games or share data.

Fast Ethernet-Network

Your PC has a Fast Ethernet Network connection. You can use this to connect to a network.

The Windows XP Help and Support Center offers extensive information about networking your PC. You can access this information by clicking on **Start**, then **Help**





What do you need for networking?

Some requirements have to be fulfilled to successfully network computers:



1. The Notebook must have a network card that supports the same network technology as the other computers on the network. Unless otherwise quoted, your Notebook will support the current **Fast Ethernet** (10/100 Mbit) standard.
2. The network cards must be connected. You need a Shielded Twisted Pair-cable (CAT5) that has an **RJ-45**-connector.
 - If you want to directly connect two PCs you need a **Cross-Link** cable.
 - If more PCs must be connected you need a supplementary distributor (**Hub** or **Switch**) and a Patch cable.

3. All connected PCs need a network **operating system**. Windows® can act as a network operating system.
4. All networked PCs must speak the same “language” to understand one another. They use protocols for this purpose. The setting of protocols, therefore, must be the same for all networked PCs.

Troubleshooting within the Network

-  Why does an error message appear when I click on the network environment?
 -  The **computer name** must be unique on the network and may not be the same as the **task group**.
-  It appears that the network boards are unable to communicate. What might be the problem?
 -  Maybe one of the used network boards works with a **different speed** (e. g. 10 instead 100 Mbit) and your network computer is unable to recognize this. If necessary, set the network driver to the compatible speed.

If two PCs should be linked you require a **cross-link cable**, otherwise use a **patch** cable.

In addition, check the **protocols** and the **configuration**.
-  The data transmission is incorrect or very slow. What might be the problem?
 -  Maybe you have the wrong cable (UTP / CAT3 or lower) or the problem is the proximity of a power cord or another source of interference.

For further hints on troubleshooting search for “network errors” in Windows Help and Support.

Wireless LAN

Wireless LAN is an optional feature. This function allows you to create a wireless network link with a partner.

Conditions

The partner used can be a wireless **access point**. An access point is a wireless transmitter that communicates with your PC and controls access to the network connection (e.g., a home network or a broadband connection such as DSL).

To set up a wireless network to share Internet access, files, and printers at home, you will need an access point, a router, and a broadband (DSL or cable) modem. Some access points can also serve as a router and/or a broadband modem. Check with your retailer to find the best solution for your needs.

A link to another computer with wireless LAN functionality can also be created **without an access point**. This will allow you to share files, but you will need an access point and a router to share an Internet connection.

The wireless network link works according to standard **IEEE 802.11b**. Other standards (802.11a, 802.11g etc.) are not supported.

If encrypted transmission is used, this must be set up the same way **on all devices on the network**. Encryption is a method of protecting the network from unauthorized access.

The transmission speed (max. 11 Mbps) can vary according to **distance** and other factors.

Search for “wireless networking” in Windows Help and Support for more information.

OPTICAL DRIVES

Please reference the drawing on the inside front cover of this manual to determine the type and location of the optical drives included with your PC.

CD-ROM Drive

This drive can play music CDs or read data CDs. It can also run software programs from CDs.

CD-RW Drive

Like the CD-ROM, this drive can play music CDs or read data CDs. It can also run software programs from CDs. In addition, this drive can write data and music CDs and copy CDs. It writes to CD-R or CD-RW.

DVD-ROM Drive

This drive can play both movie DVDs and music CDs. It can read data DVDs and CDs. It can also run software programs from both CDs and DVDs.

DVD-RW or DVD+RW Drive

This drive can play movie DVDs and music CDs. It can read data CDs and DVDs, and run software from both CDs and DVDs. It can write to CD-R, CD-RW, or special DVD discs.

In order to write to DVD, you must select a disc that matches the type of drive on your computer. DVD-RW drives use DVD-RW or DVD-R discs, DVD+RW drives use DVD+RW or DVD+R discs. See the "Writing DVDs" section for more information.

Handling Discs

To maintain the life of CD and DVD discs, observe these guidelines.

- Avoid radiation by direct sunlight (UVA/UVB).
- Avoid scratches and damage to the disc surface.
- Avoid extreme temperatures.
- Do not attach labels or paper to DVD discs.
- Do not use record-cleaning or anti-static agents to clean your discs.

We also recommend that you avoid specially shaped discs such as hearts or polygons, or discs that are not standard size. Do not use warped or cracked discs as they may cause damage to your drive.

Loading a Disc

1. Press the eject button on the front of the drive to open the tray.
2. Place the disc on the tray so that it lays flat with the label facing upward.
3. Press the eject button again to close the tray.

Many discs automatically start when they are loaded and launch a playback software program. In some cases you might need to start a program (for example, a DVD player program).

Removing a Disc

Press the eject button on the front of the drive to open the tray.

Playing Music CDs

Several programs may be included on your PC that will play music CDs, including Windows Media Player and MusicMatch Jukebox. Please refer to the documentation for these programs to decide which program you would like to use.

Playing DVD Movies

To play DVD movies on your PC, you need a DVD playback software program, such as CyberLink's award-winning PowerDVD (may not be included with your PC). To play DVD movies using this software, insert a movie DVD into the DVD-ROM or DVD-RW drive, then click **Start**, then **All Programs** and select PowerDVD.

Regional Playback Information for DVD

The playback of DVD movies includes the decoding of MPEG2 videos, digital AC3 audio data, and the deciphering of CSS protected contents. CSS (sometimes called copy guard) is the name of a data protection program incorporated by the movie industry as an action against illegal copies.

Among the numerous regulations for CSS licensees the most important ones are the country-specific playback restrictions. In order to facilitate the geographically restricted release of movies, DVD titles are released for certain regions. Copyright laws require the restriction of each DVD movie to a certain region (usually the region in which it is sold). DVD movie versions can be published in several regions but the CSS regulations require that each CSS decipherable system may only be used in one region.

The decoding software included with your PC may be changed for regional DVD decoding up to five times, after which the drive will only play DVD movies for the region setting last entered. Changing the region code after that is not covered by the warranty.

Writing CDs

If included with your PC, you can use your CD-RW, DVD-RW, or DVD+RW drive to write ("burn") data and music CDs.

A data CD is a compact disc (CD) used to store PC data (for example, files and folders you have on your hard disk).

A music, or audio, CD is a compact disc (CD) used to record music that you can play on your home or car stereo CD player. Using a CD-R instead of a CD-RW for music CDs will help ensure a greater level of compatibility with conventional CD-players.

There are several different options for burning CDs. The first step for using any of these options is to insert a blank recordable CD into your CD-RW, DVD-RW, or DVD+RW drive.

- Nero Burning ROM (may not be included with your PC) can create different types of audio, video, and data CDs quickly and easily. Click **Start**, then **All Programs**, then **Ahead Nero** to access Nero Burning ROM. Follow the step-by-step instructions given by the software wizard to create a CD.
- Windows XP includes functionality for quickly and easily creating data CDs:
 1. Select the files or folders you would like to write to your CD. To select more than one file, hold down the CTRL key while you click the files you want.
 2. In the File and Folder Tasks menu on the left (Picture Tasks if the files are located in My Pictures), click **Copy this file**, **Copy this folder**, or **Copy the selected items**. If you do not see the File and Folder Tasks menu, select **Tools** on the main menu, then **Folder Options**. Under Tasks on the General tab, select **Show common tasks in folders**.
 3. In the Copy Items dialog box, click the CD-RW, and then click **Copy**.

4. Double-click **My Computer**, then the CD-RW. Windows displays a temporary area where the files are held before they are copied to the CD. Verify that the files and folders that you intend to copy to the CD appear under Files Ready to be Written to the CD.
5. Under CD Writing Tasks, click **Write these files** to CD. Windows displays the CD Writing Wizard. Follow the instructions in the wizard.
 - Music jukebox and media player programs (such as Windows Media Player) often offer alternatives for burning audio CDs. Refer to the help within the program for more information.
 - You can also purchase third-party CD burning software for writing files to a CD-R or CD-RW disc.

More information about copying CDs reliably can be found in the “Technical Reference” section of this manual under “CD Facts.”

Unless you own the copyright or the permission of the owner of the copyright, unapproved copying of copyrighted CDs or DVDs violates national or international laws and can result in serious punishment.

Writing DVDs

A DVD-RW drive can not record to a DVD+RW disc, and vice versa. The media (discs) that you can use with your PC depend on the drive that it uses. Please double-check the inside front cover of this manual to determine the type and speed of drive that comes with your PC.

- A DVD-RW drive can record to DVD-RW discs. It can also record to DVD-R General discs, but not to DVD-R Authoring discs.
- A DVD+RW drive can record to DVD+R or DVD+RW discs.
- Both DVD-RW and DVD+RW drives can record to CD-R or CD-RW.

Not all DVD formats are compatible with all DVD players.

Do not use media that exceeds the speed of your drive. For example, do not use 4x DVD-R discs in a 2x DVD-RW drive. Please note that the speed at which your drive records depends on both the speed of the drive and the speed of the media. For example, a 4x DVD-R drive will record at 2x speed if a 2x DVD-R is used in the drive.

If included with your PC, you can use your DVD-RW drive to write to DVDs. Nero Burning ROM (may not be included with your PC) allows you to burn data to DVDs. The process is very similar to burning CDs.

Video editing and/or DVD authoring programs often include options for burning your movies to DVD. Please refer to the documentation for your software programs for more information.

INSTALLING 3RD-PARTY SOFTWARE PROGRAMS

During software installations, important files can be changed or even deleted. Medion recommends that you set a Windows XP recovery point before installing software. Instructions and additional information about Windows XP can be found in the "PC and Data Care" section under "Recovery" / "Restoring Microsoft Windows XP."

For specific installation information, refer to the documentation that came with the software program. Here is a typical installation procedure.

1. Load the software program installation disc in an optical drive (CD-ROM, CD-RW, DVD-ROM, DVD-RW, etc.). If your installation disc is a DVD, make sure that the drive that you use can read DVDs.
2. Most installer programs start automatically after a few moments.

If the installer program does not start automatically, you can manually start it by double-clicking My Computer, and then double-clicking the drive letter where you loaded the software program installation disc.
3. Follow the instructions given by the program.

Digital Signatures

When installing software or drivers, you may receive the message "The software you are installing has not passed Windows Logo testing to verify its compatibility with Windows XP." Although the software lacks the digital signature, it may work properly. Click on "Tell me why this testing is important" to get detailed information. Click on "Continue Anyway" to continue to install your software.

To set file signature verification options for Windows XP:

1. Click **Start**, then **Control Panel**. Double-click **System**.
2. On the **Hardware** tab, select **Driver Signing**.
3. Under **File Signature Verification**, select one of the following:

Ignore allows all device drivers and software to be installed on this PC regardless of whether they have a digital signature.

Warn displays a warning message when you attempt to install a software program or device driver without a digital signature.

Block prevents installation programs from installing device drivers without a digital signature.

4. If you are logged on to your PC as an administrator, you can click **Apply setting as system default** to apply the selected setting as the default for all users of your PC.

THE RADIO-/TV- TUNER CARD

The Radio-/TV- Tuner Card is an optional feature. If your PC is equipped with a Combo board, you will find TV and Radio antenna sockets near the modem.

Please note the following:

- The installation, removal and conversion of a board require the technical training – do not attempt these procedures if you do not have the appropriate training.
- If you would like to use a different modem or ISDN board, the built-in modem/TV Tuner Combo board **must not be removed or plugged into a different slot.**
- The built-in modem/TV Tuner Combo board only works properly **in the intended blue Combo slot.**

ATTENTION: In another slot the PC may not be able to start.

Software for your Radio/TV Tuner Card

The Software to watch TV and listen to Radio broadcasts is already installed and can be found in **All Programs, Power Cinema 2.0, Power Cinema**. You can control this program with the **optional** remote control (see online help and/or separate operating instructions). Get additional help by pressing the F1 key. Please keep in mind that recording broadcasts can occupy up to 2.4 GB per hour of broadcast.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Question: Do I need to install the software programs on the included CDs or DVDs?

Answer: No. Your PC comes with all the software preinstalled. The discs are provided as backup copies.

Question: How do I perform a backup?

Answer: Use the program Backup for this. It can be found by clicking **Start**, then **All Programs**, then **Accessories**, then **System Tools**.

Question: When do I have to activate Windows XP?

Answer: Your Windows XP software has been activated in the factory. An activation will only be required if:

- several components (such as the hard drive, optical drives, etc.) are replaced;
- you have installed a new motherboard;
- you have installed a new BIOS version;
- you install the software to another PC.

DATA AND SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

Windows XP provides programs for data and system maintenance. Refer to Windows Help for more information.

Data Security

Back up your data regularly to external media such as CDs, DVDs, or floppy disks. Windows XP provides both a Backup program and a Files and Settings Transfer Wizard for this purpose. To use these tools, click the **Start** menu, then choose **Accessories**, then choose **System Tools**.

Maintenance Programs

You can avoid some hardware and software errors with periodic use of two Windows XP programs: Disc Defragmenter and Disc Cleanup. The System Information tool can also be helpful. It tells you detailed information about your system configuration. To use these tools, click the **Start** menu, then choose **Accessories**, then choose **System Tools**.

Password Reset File

To protect individual user accounts from complications resulting from lost passwords, you should create a password reset disc and keep it in a safe place. If you forget a password, the password can be reset using the password reset disc so that you can regain access to your user account. Windows Help describes how to create a password reset.

TROUBLESHOOTING

If you are experiencing a problem with the PC, read this section to look for possible solutions to common problems.

Check Cables and Connections

Visually check all cables and connections. If all LEDs are off, check to see if any of the power cords is disconnected from the AC outlet.

- Check all power connections for all devices and all power switches. Don't forget the main power switch on the back of your PC.
- If you are still experiencing problems, shut down Windows XP and turn off the PC. Recheck all cable connections including the peripherals. *Do not* exchange cables, even though they may look similar. The polarity may differ among cables.
- When it is confirmed that the PC and all devices have power and that all connections are correct, restart the PC.

The Power On Self Test (POST)

The Power On Self Test (POST) is executed during each boot process to test the memory, motherboard, monitor, keyboard, and other components. If the PC does not pass the POST but beeps several times, or if the screen remains blank, contact your dealer.

Some Common Problems and Solutions

Problem	Solution
The monitor is blank.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Confirm that the system is not in Standby mode by pressing any key on the keyboard and seeing if the PC wakes up.• Make sure the monitor cables are properly connected.• Confirm that the monitor has been turned on.
Wrong date and time.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Double-click the clock on the taskbar and correct the date and time.• Check that the correct time zone is selected.
No data can be accessed from the optical drive.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Check whether the disc is inserted correctly.• Check to see if the disc is bad by trying another disc that you know to be good.
The Printer (or other peripheral) does not work.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Check the printer cable.• Do a Printer Self Test.• If several devices are operating from the same port, check all devices and reinstall the drivers.• If you have access to the Internet, download and install the latest drivers from the manufacturer's website.

SYSTEM RECOVERY

Before performing a recovery, you should review the “Troubleshooting” section in this manual to see if you can resolve the problem. If not, it is possible that a software file required by Windows XP to operate the PC was damaged or deleted. If this is the case, there are two strategies for recovery:

1. **Restoring Microsoft Windows XP using Windows XP System Restore**

This type of recovery is usually very quick and will solve most typical problems that occur after an unsuccessful installation of an application, device, or driver has caused instability in the system.

2. **Restoring the factory settings using the Application & Support CD provided by Medion**

There are several options for recovery available using the Application & Support CD, including the ability to restore your entire system to its original factory settings.

Restoring Microsoft Windows XP

Windows XP System Restore allows you to set "recovery points." This feature enables you to take a snapshot of the current system configuration, which you can return to should an unsuccessful installation of an application, device, or driver cause instability in the system.

While Windows XP automatically creates recovery points, you can also set them manually. In addition, you can configure the maximum amount of memory used for this.

To use System Restore to set recovery points or restore your system, click the **Start** menu, then choose **All Programs**, then choose **Accessories**, then choose **System Tools**, then choose **System Restore**. Select the task that you would like to perform and follow the on screen instructions. For detailed information refer to Windows XP Help and Support.

System Restore includes various functions to help ensure that your PC and installed applications and devices work correctly. These functions assist you in solving the problems which might occur by adding, deleting or replacing files required for proper functioning of Windows XP, and your software and devices. The restore function you use depends on the type of problem or error.

In general, it is a good idea to set a recovery point before installing a new software program or driver. If the system becomes unstable during or after the installation, you can usually return to a workable configuration without deleting newly created documents. If Windows XP System Restore does not solve your problem refer to the next section, *Restoring the Factory Settings*.

Restoring the Factory Settings

If your system is not functioning properly and Windows XP System Restore did not solve the problem, then you should use the Application & Support Disc provided by Medion to restore your system to working order.

There are three options for restoring your system.

1. **Recovery of start-up files**

Use this option to restore the start-up files. This option is most useful when a virus has corrupted certain files necessary for your computer to boot. It is executed very quickly.

2. **Recovery of system and driver files**

This option will copy the original system and driver files to your hard disk. This feature shouldn't affect your personal files and settings. However, we recommend that you first back up your personal data just to be safe.

3. **Restoring the factory settings**

This recovery will reset your system to its condition at delivery. ALL DATA ON YOUR LOCAL DISC (C:) DRIVE WILL BE ERASED. If possible, back up your personal data to external media before performing this restore.

Restoring the Factory Settings: Important Limitations

- Any changes made to the original factory configuration (for example, settings for your display, printers, network, or Internet connection) will be overwritten by this restoration.
- Any software that you installed after purchasing the PC will be erased and will need to be reinstalled.
- ***Everything*** on the C:\Local Disk partition will be erased. This includes all of your documents and settings.
- Tampering with the Recovery (D:) hard disk drive or its contents will make it more difficult to restore your PC. Do not alter, resize, or delete the Recovery (D:) hard disk drive. Also, do not alter or delete the files on the Recovery (D:) hard disk drive.

Performing the Restore

Each step of the restore replaces an increasing number of files on your hard drive, and therefore takes longer to finish. We recommend that you attempt each of the restore options in order, starting with "Recovery of start-up files." After finishing each restore option, you should test your system to see if it has solved your problem. If the problem persists, then try the next restore option.

To make selections in the restore program, use the up and down arrow keys to highlight the option you would like to select, then press enter to make the selection.

1. Copy your data files to external media (such as a floppy disk, CD-R, CD-RW, DVD-RW, or flash card) BEFORE you continue!

2. Insert the "Application & Support" disc and restart (reboot) the PC. Make sure you use a drive that can read a DVD, such as a DVD-ROM or DVD-RW drive!

Caution: Do not use the "Medion Product Recovery" CD-ROM (a Windows XP CD for restoring Windows XP itself) for restoration purposes. This disc does not restore the original factory setup of the PC.

3. Select the option "**Boot from CD-ROM**" from the first screen.
4. Use the arrow keys to read through the license agreement, then press the **Esc** key to proceed.
5. Read the information screen that appears, then press **Enter** to proceed.
6. Select option 1, 2, or 3 to perform a restore (the types of restore are described earlier in this chapter). Select option **4. Reboot** to cancel the restore process.
7. The next screen shows information about the type of restore that you have chosen. Select either **Abort** or **Back** to return to the previous screen, or select **Finish** to execute the restore.
8. When the restore is completed, it automatically restarts the PC. Remove and store the Application & Support CD.

CLEANING AND CARE

You can extend the life of your PC by taking the following measures:

- Before cleaning, always turn off the PC and remove the power plug and all connecting cables.
- Clean the PC with a damp, lint-free cloth.



- **Warning! There are no user-serviceable or user-cleanable parts inside the PC case.**
- **DO NOT use any solvents, corrosive or gaseous cleaning agents**
- **DO NOT use any cleaning discs or similar products that clean the lens of the laser to clean *any* of your optical drives.**

TRANSPORTING THE PC

Please observe the following guidelines when transporting the PC:

- To avoid damage during transport, repack the PC in its original packaging.
- Wait until the PC has reached ambient (room) temperature before connecting it to the AC outlet. Extreme variations in temperature and humidity can create condensation within the PC and might cause it to short-circuit.

RECYCLING AND DISPOSAL

At the end of its life-cycle, the PC can be recycled or its material reused—assuming the PC has not been abused. The PC and its packaging were produced mostly from environmentally-friendly materials that can be safely disposed of and professionally recycled.

Warning: There is a lithium battery on the motherboard, inside the PC case. Batteries should not be disposed of in the household waste. Return batteries to the manufacturer, dealer, local recycling center, or one of their representatives for proper disposal.

If you have any questions concerning proper disposal of the PC, contact your dealer.

REPAIRS

- Only a qualified service engineer should perform repairs to your PC.

This section contains technical information of interest to intermediate or advanced users. You do not need to read this section to connect your PC and get started using it. However, as you become more familiar with your PC you might find some of this technical information helpful for performing more advanced tasks, such as copying DVD discs from one format to another.

CD FACTS

Disc Colors

Blank CD discs have a silver or gold colored synthetic layer which stores the information. Some optical drives work better with one color than the other. If your drive has problems reading one type of disc, try a disc with a different colored synthetic layer.

Copying CDs More Reliably

To help reduce errors when copying CDs, you can select the simulation option before permanently copying a CD. This option performs a test run of the reproduction process before attempting to burn data onto the CD.

Most CD copying programs have a simulation option. In Nero Express, this option is incorporated into the software wizard that starts up when you open the program.

1. Choose **Copy entire disc** in the wizard
2. Click the **More** button
