The IRO41 virus attaches itself to executable files. making them larger and spreading across discs.

It's prime target is the C:DIR command, but it will also look at your startup sequence and attach itself to the first executable program

This is similar to the way in which PC viruses spread, and is not as dangerous as traditional boot block viruses such as Byte Bandit and SCA. But it is sufficiently different to evade most virus checkers, including the Guardian and VirusX1.7.

The virus attaches itself to memory by taking over the OldOpenLibrary() vector. and adds a KickTagPtr - for no apparent reason. If you run a program that uses the OldOpenLibrary() vector and it is hard to predict which ones do - the virus will open your startup sequence

It then picks the first filename it sees, checks if it's executable, and if so, writes itself into the file. If it's not executable the virus will try and write to the DIR command on that disc.

This virus is mostly a harmless joke. It will not kill commercial programs, it doesn't attack anything and doesn't do anything malicious. It's not nice to have around, but it's certainly better than the malicious variety.

It changes the title bar of the Initial CLI window when you boot, and it will try to write to any disc inserted thus bringing up the Volume whatever is write protected requester whenever you insert a write-protected disc.

This virus will not work under Kickstart 1.3 - you will get Software Error requesters whenever you run an infected program.

You cannot spot if a file is contaminated just by looking at it. The virus encrypts the text parts of itself, and does so differently on each copy -

so you can't learn to recognise it.

You can tell your system is infected if you put in a write protected Workbench disc or any disc with a startup sequence - and if the system brings up a Volume whatever is write protected requester, this virus is in ram attempting to infect the disc.

When it first installs itself in your system the virus changes the title bar of the current window on reboot usually the initial CLI window, since it is the first thing in your startup sequence - to say something like Amigados Presents: The IRO Virus, V41.0. This is of course a dead giveaway. The Americans have been

really quick to eliminate the early strains of IRQ41 and Steve Tibbett of VirusX fame has produced VirusX3.1 which will spot and eliminate most of the common viruses, including the new IRO bug To get the virus out of ram.

run VirusX 3.1 and it will tell you if it found it and that it removed it if it did. VirusX will check discs in the same way that the virus does. It looks at the startup sequence, determines if the first file found - or the DIR command - are infected, and gives you the option of repairing them if necessary You can also get rid of the virus simply by deleting all infected programs and rebooting. This virus will not hang around after a reboot.

VirusX 3.1 will look in the same places the virus does for possibly infected programs. If it finds one it will pop up a window and show you where it found it, and ask if it's OK to remove it.

Keep VirusX 3.1 running when you test new programs. It will alert you as soon as it sees the virus appear in memory - probably the last program you ran was infected.

The best place to get hold of a copy of VirusX3.1 is a bulletin board or conferencing system like CIX - a good enough reason in itself for buying a modem. Otherwise contact a supplier of PD discs like the Amiga Users Group for a copy.

OMMODORE UK is Ckeeping quiet about a massive tax bill said to be owed to the Internal Revenue Services in America by Commodore International. None of Commodore's UK

chiefs have been forthcoming with comment on claims by the IRS that they are owed \$74.1 million. An American press report

said Commodore received a statutory notice of deficiency from the IRS for taxes of \$74.1 million over the years 1981 to 1983. "The company strongly

disagrees with the notice and will vigorously contest the proposed deficiency", it continued. "Outside tax counsel Mayer, Brown and Platt has advised management that the company has a solid position on the facts and a strong legal defence with regard to the IRS claims".

Commodore International believes its tax reserves are adequate to cover "a realistic resolution of the tax liability". It is confident that resolving the deficiency will not have an adverse effect on the company's earnings.

Wysiwyg cartoon capers are here

JIM BUTTERFIELD reporting from Canada

THE big crowd-pleaser at the December 1988 World of Commodore Show in Toronto was clearly the premiere of MovieSetter, the "push button wysiwyg animation" program from Canada's own Gold Disc developer.

Professional quality cartoon sequences created with this new software were playing continuously at half a dozen locations around the hall.

Commercial quality comic book pages in full colour can be produced easily by Gold Disc's ComicSetter. Movie-Setter takes this process to the next level of complexity, producing animations of commercial quality images.

commercial quality images.

The resulting smooth, realistic motion looks quite comparable to the professional cartoons that take over kiddie television on Saturday mornings.

Like ComicSetter, Movie-Setter provides non-artists with an extensive library of characters and props to start out with. You can also import backgrounds and characters from other paint programs in standard IFF format, or draw your own images within MovieSetter.

All animation commands are controlled by the mouse from onscreen icons. Clicking the mouse moves the characters and changes the speed, colours, or backgrounds.

The program supports scrolling, colour cycling, wipes and dissolve effects, and editing of sound as well

as visuals.

Movies several minutes long can be created on disc at up to 60 frames a second and with 32 colours. There's full overscan for transfer to videotape.

videotape. With wysiwyg animation you're watching the process in action at every step. Let's say you're creating a walking man in your first frame. Just move this image to the second frame and re-nosition.

the arms and legs. Continue frame-by-frame until you have smooth animation. Animated objects are easily placed and moved anywhere. Path guides simplify the process even more. Use the mouse to draw

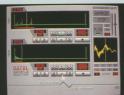
easily placed and moved anywhere. Path guides simplify the process even more. Use the mouse to draw a line across the screen and the object will follow it. Gravity and acceleration can be fine tuned.

Stereo sound effects can be panned between left and right channels and perfectly timed to match the action. For example, the sound of footsteps might follow the motion of a character moving across the screen.

A strong supporting act at the Toronto show was Viva from MichTron – an elegant and powerful "hypermedia authoring environment" which will be marketed in the UK by Microdeal.

Video Authoring) is an interactive storyboarding tool that enables you to combine text, graphics, video, sound, colour and animation on a full range of visual media devices including videotape or laserdisc.

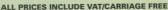

The lavish instrumentation is completed by a no-expense-spared light emitting diode finished in olde gold-style vellow. This glows.

Plug a TV aerial into the back of the Microlest along with some power and load the software. IF you're not familiar with the concept of a mailing list program and tempted to confuse it with mail merge routines in word processors, here's a two-minute tutorial guide.

The mail merge concept goes something like this: You type in a letter with certain items left in a coded form. Here's an example from your not so friendly bank manager.

Dear A1 A2, At the end of A3 you were A4 pounds and A5 pence overdrawn. Perhaps you could call to see me on A6 at A7 when we can discuss the Using the facilities of the mail merge program, you can incorporate the appropriate name and address at the top of the letter, replace A1 with Mr or Mrs, A2 with Bloggs or whatever and so on.

It's a means of computercustomising correspondence, and

it's a very powerful tool.

The mailing list serves a related, but different job. It's a list of names and addresses which can be entered, edited, sorted and printed

either as a whole or selectively.

Take a large organisation which
has all its staff on a computerised

mailing list. You may want a memo on this month's special offer to go out to all regional managers and their deputies, a note on what you intend to do with cars parked illegally in reserved parking bays to all staff below a certain grade, or an invitation to everyone living in the London area to attend the annual

"fun" Christmas party.
That's the kind of job any wellbehaved mailing program will perform. And it doesn't have to be a list of names and addresses: You could put your record collection catalogue, club membership list.

We will be the computing the thing to the fact that the metric was not just a toy for scientists, it began to invade the office environment, first as a spreadsheet, then as a word processor, and from there right on through the whole range of office tasks – except for making the boss's coffee and biscuits, that is. And rumour has it that Silton Valley is working on that one.

The mailshot program is certainly with us to stay. I suspect that in the early days of office automation, people were so piteously grateful for any program that bashed out address labels that standards were not of the highest. Nowadays there are certain tasks that any self-respecting mailshot program ought to perform.

I've been taking a look at Mailshot Plus from Digita, a company with a solid track record in the field of business software, and I'm here to report as the reviewing equivalent of the office junior on what I've found.

I promised myself in my early days as a reviewer that I would never take my readers on a guided tour of the packaging of the software I'm describing. But I'm prepared to break the habit in this case, since the box that crashed through the letter box is of huge proportions, but when I

plant labels in a market garden, in fact, any small chunks of similar information that can be recorded in address label type format.

So, while a mail merge program is linked to the word processing power of the computer, the mailing list is akin to a database package. It's up to you to make the kind of decision as to which product most closely matches your needs.

And the old corny but none the less vital piece of advice which goes hand in hand with that - not just your present needs, but requirements for the foreseeable future.

opened it – steeling myself to facing a 300 page manual and a dozen master discs – all I found cuddling together for comfort in the bottom of the box was one little disc and a 40 page manual.

Well, perhaps Digita bought a job lot of cases and couldn't think of anything else to do with them. So I breathed a sigh of relief and powered up the Amiga to see what, if anything, marks this mailing package off from the rest of the herd.

THE term wysiwyg is one that's normally associated with a word processor. Meaning what you see is what you get, it implies that typestyles and layouts appear on the screen more or less in the same way as when you press the print button and out it all comes in hard copy.

To find it associated with a mailing list program was a little odd at first blush, I must admit, but the concept works extremely well on screen. To

the left, there's a menu list which can be accessed by mouse, cursor keys or initial letter, and on the right a series of rectangular boxes just like labels, even down to the tractor feed holes on either side.

There's room on the screen for one full default size label, plus half of its predecessor and the next in line

As you enter each label, the list scrolls up politely, and the impression is one of working with a genuine continuous list rather than a series of computerised snapshots in which you are only allowed to see one label at a time on screen

Take a look at the options down the main menu on the left of the screen. and let's begin with a word of warning. As I said a moment or two back, you can access the options in one of three ways, and this can be a mite tricky if you're a hasty and impetuous type like me

I'd hardly keyed in the first address label than I inadvertently found myself in the middle of the Layout menu doing silly things to the default label list, and when I extricated myself from that predicament I found I had squeezed the width of the labels so that they looked like the opening credits of a CinemaScope film projected through the wrong lens. But I gritted the ancestral teeth with

a measure of self-control - and within 10 minutes or so the package and I were on the best of terms. The system is simplicity itself to use and full of neat and thoughtful

- touches: · An option to split long lines or truncate them.
- · Automatic detection of duplicate labels, one of the bugbears of any large label list. It can be quite money-

wasting to send two copies of the same letter to the same addressee. A good selection of search criteria. with options like AND, OR, and so

- The system can sort on any line. and there are facilities for surname sorting, subset sorting, and a marker sort system.
- A useful feature called "memo lines". They can contain information (not for printing) such as telephone numbers, dates, or any comments you wish to make. These can be shown on the screen labels or concealed While it seems blindlingly obvious

to me, there's precious little point in plonking a piece of software on to a computer, giving the novice user a quick tutorial on which buttons to press, and then leaving the poor soul to get on with it.

HAT is so important - and so often overlooked particularly in business software, is a description of the ideas behind the software and its potentiality. People used to clattering out labels on a mechanical typewriter might be tempted to turn a mailing list package into a computerised form of their familiar activity, without realising that, if they adapted their work patterns and data storage to the package, they could enhance their usage of the system almost beyond recognition.

Here Digita scores again. In a clearly written manual, there is a section on how to get the best out of the package, and tips and hints on maximising its impact.

The chief limitation of this program is that it can't be incorporated into a mail merge context, where you can

customise each letter according to the particular circumstances of the individual or institution you're writing to. But Mailshot Plus does have the ability to generate Ascii files which offers good portability across to other systems which do function in that manner All in all, it's difficult to fault

Mailshot Plus, and it's a pleasure for a reviewer who all too frequently is on the receiving end of grotty software to have had the opportunity to explore an unfussy, user-friendly and really professional piece of business software. If mailing's your game, Mailshot Plus may well be the name

you're looking for.

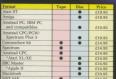

A FEW issues back we looked at samplers for the Amiga. The PerfectSound, FutureSound, Pro-Sound and Sophus systems all have their advantages, but in most cases these are offset by niggling faults such as disappointing sound quality,

fragile hardware or excessive cost. Now there's an alternative which might prove to be the best buy of the and reliability. Datel's Pro Sampler Studio package costs £69.99, and includes hardware, sample editing software and a fairly sophisticated multi-voice tune-player, the Jammer Like the samplers we've looked at in the past, it uses 8 bit analog-to-digital conversion, but has anti-aliasing quality is as good as, if not better than, the opposition. Although it has no Midi facilities, the Pro Sampler is part of a developing product range which includes the Midimaster interface, and the forthcoming Music Manager sequencing package.

The Pro Sampler hardware is a small beige box featuring a short ribbon cable with a connector for the Amiga's parallel port. Since the gender of the connector differs between models, you have to specify which Amiga you have when orderine.

On the rear of the sampler are three sockets. The first is a five-pin 180 degree DIN socket for line-level signal inputs, suitable for connection to the outputs of a stereo tape deek. Next to that is a quater-inch mono jack socket for microphone level inputs, and lastly there's another quarter-inch mono jack for line level signals. A small red LED on the front of the unit lights to indicate that it is receiving power.

As you autoboot the software (or load from the Workbench) you'll hear an example of funky music digitised using the Pro Sampler. You can then opt to enter either the Sampler or

Jammer programs. The screen displays of the Datel software are beautifully designed, with a metallic control-panel look. The main displays shows two waveforms displayed in separate sample windows (left and right stereo channels), a zoom box, and tape recorder like record and playback controls.

The sampling focuses is picus your sound source into the sampler, you select the Realtime Display option from the Extras pull-down menu, which brings up an oscilloscope display of the incoming waveform. If the peaks of the signal are flattened, or they are under half the height of the grid, you should adjust the incoming signal level to obtain the optimum sampling

There's no hardware or software input volume control to deal with — which could be an advantage or a disadvantage depending on what you're trying to sample. Clicking on Exit returns you to the main display, where you can now click on one of

the two Record buttons to arm the sampler.

This is set using up/down buttons, or you can over-ride the automatic trigger level by clicking on the left mouse button to start sampling. The waveform of the sampling the sampling

To issen to me resuns pray your Amiga's outputs into the hi-fi and click on the Loop button to play back the sound continuously. Volume can be controlled with a slider, but to hear its effect you must stop and re-play the sample.

You can then sample another sound on the right-hand channel, even while the left-hand channel is playing. The two samples can be played independently, or in synchronisation. The are are also individual and main Stop buttons. Once you have your sample, you can start playing about with the pitch. Incrementing or decrementing the rate counters affects the original sampling rate, and indirectly the length of the sample. The rate can be varied from 124 to 998, corresponding to the Amiga's DMA playback system.

By placing cursor lines on the display, you can set the start and end points of the sample. Clicking on the start and end buttons for each sample brings up a digital display of the cursor positions to six places. Another set of buttons allows you to reset the cursors to each end of the whole sample, and the current sample length is shown by a red bar below the display.

OVING the pointer into either display window and clicking on the waveform display, brings up a magnified section of waveform in the zoom display. Again, a digital readout gives the exact cursor position. Buttons below the zoom window allow you to ten doubt a grainful product of the position.

Buttons below the zoom window allow you to step slowly or quickly through the waveform, searching for good looping points, and there is a wide range of zoom levels.

The pulldown menus allow access to some incredibly advanced options. Samples between the Start and End points can be saved in "raw" or in IFF format, so you can use them in many other sound programs.

There are options to save one-shot or repeating samples, and either single, three octave or five octaves sample, though this takes a long time and uses up about 70k of disc space. Another menu allows you to reverse samples – you can of course reverse them again to return to normal – or to copy a waveform from one channel to another.

You can create pseudo-stereo effects with the Phaseshift option, which slightly delays one sample. If the two samples are then played together, you get lovely phasing effects.

It's also possible to define and copy an area of waveform to another part of the window, to erase a section of sample, or to mix two samples together. By shifting then combining identical samples you can create delay and reverberation effects.

delay and reverberation effects.

Another impressive option, though
of little practical use, is the 3D
waveform display. This draws a wireframe model of the entire sound
envelope, as opposed to the realtime

display which is in two dimensions. The Wave Edit page actually allows you to redraw the waveshape of your sample, perhaps to eliminate unwanted clicks or to made a perfect loop. As on the main display, scanning buttons and digital displays allowy to to possiblin oyut cursor exactly, while waveforms are redrawn simply by holding down the left mouse button and moving the cursor in the window. Beautifully simple.

AMMER is a four-channel steptime sequencer. Quitting the Pro Studio and loading the Jammer brings up the main display, which features a five-octave keyboard display at the bottom of the Screen. At the left are four buttons which switch on and off the tracks while recording or playing. sliders which control volume of the four tracks, and a master volume slider, while to the right are the

slider, while to the right are the recording and playback buttons, laid out like those of a tape deck. There are also what appear to be

There are also what appear to be four VU level meters, but in fact these serve no function – they're purely for decoration.

To record a tune, load up the sound you want to use, select Record, then pick out the tune on the keyboard. A counter indicates the number of notes you have played, and rests can be inserted using a button on the right.

To correct mistakes you can use the review/rewind function to count backwards. There's also a marker function so you can move directly to any required part of the tune when editing. Having finished, select ZERO RETURN, to record another track.

To enhance your playing, you can switch on the two-note or three-note chord, which multiplies the number of notes you play in an impressive way. Unfortunately you're limited to major chords, and equally obviously this takes up more than one track. Though not everyone might find step-time composition ideal, in the robably a better option than, say, trying to pick out tunes in real time on the querty keyboard.

There's also a drum machine feature which adds a simple boomchick effect. Sync allows you to start the drum machine as you play your first note, and there's a separate tempo slider for the drum machine, which takes up Track Four if selected. Completed tunes of up to 9,999 steps can be saved in Jammer's own file

Iormat.

Jammer can be made to autoboot with any required sounds and tune, and can also run as a task. Provided you have enough memory, pressing AMIGA-M will flip to the CLI from where you can run another application.

PROGRAMMER Roy Harding and consultant Barry Walsh, who wrote Preferences at Commodore-Amiga, have done an excellent job on the Pro Sampler. With the benefit of having looked at the alternatives on the market, they've come up with a user-friendly, flexible and economical

package.

Datel's decision to keep the Pro
Sampler Studio relatively simple and
inexpensive is certainly the right one.
Having created your samples, you
will be able to use the IFF fles with
the £34.99 MidMaster interface and
£39.99 Music Manager sequencer;
then you can get into Amiga music in
a really big way.

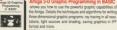

A MSTRAD, a strange name to come across in Amiga Computing, but you may well find that the best thing to come into contact with your Amiga's RS232 port has the words Amstrad Modern SM2400 plastered across the front.

Amstad has been producing modems for a while now. Its portable PC was hailed as a bargain because it contained a high specification modem and yet cost under £600. To buy a similar modem alone would have cost £500. produce a stand alone unit, and that is what the S in SM stands for. No points for guessing the M. The number 2400 refers to the speed at which data is transmitted. This is measured in bits per second, bps. Not

Baud is the rate at which the tone changes. If there is one tone and it changes 1200 times a second it can be decoded to 1200 bps. But if there are two tones, still changing at 1200 times a second, and so still 1200 baud, there are twice as many bits going through the system, hence 2400 bps.

to be confused with baud

Think of it like a crossed line. If you were able to understand both the person you called and the person you got a crossed line with you would be capable of receiving information twice as fast.

High speed modems are clever like this. Anyone who claims to have a 2400 baud modem is more likely to have a 2400 bps modem.

In the bad old days of electronic communications, modems ran at two speeds 110 baud and 300 baud. This was when only one tone was used at a time and so things travelled at 110 or 300 bps. Data was sent and received slowly but simultaneously. Communications freaks can't cope with English and refer to this as duplex, or full duplex.

Then British Telecom invented Prestel which was designed to be read without the user sending back much data. For this purpose they imposed a 1200 baud in, 75 baud out standard, this being the best they felt the phone lines could cope with. Technology moved on, and

blown 2400 bps modems still cost around £500, except for the Amstrad. And that is what Alan Sugar does well, selling for £500 what IBM would charge you a grand for, plus VAT, service fee and still make you feel like a cheapskate.

There are other cheap modems around but few have the precious green circle logo which means that they are "Approved for connection to direct exchange lines of public switched networks run by British Telecom and Hull City Council" (Hull has a private phone system.)

HE approval procedure is the way the British stop the market from being flooded with tatty telephones and modems, the way the French test every video recorder which is made in Japan before it can be sold in France. Unfortunately the French are much better at being awkward than even BT, so it is still legal to buy and sell unapproved modems - you just can't plug them in. Amstrad wins both ways. It makes videos in the Southend factory to sell to the French and has approval to sell cheap modems in the UK

The Amstrad SM2400 is quad standard, which means it works at 300, 1200/75, 1200 and 2400 bps. It also works at 75/1200, which is only of any interest to people running bulletin boards. International standards give these speeds special numbers. V22 is Eurospeak for 1200 bps, V21 means 300 bps, V23 1200/75 and so logically enough 2400 bps is V22bis. Well it makes sense to someone. I'm sure.

With these speeds you should be able to connect to practically anything which wants you connected to it. While 1200 bps services are now quite common, 2400 bps systems are still rare. There is a good reason for this. The telephone lines can't provide the extra levels of clarity needed for 2400 bps operation. Yes they should and if you live in a good area, and are talking to a good area, and BT has kept all the bits of string in between good and damp, you might get away with it

One solution to the problem of BT's lines not being up to the job is error correction. Special modems offer a standard called Microcom Networking Protocol. Pace in

Bradford makes a box called an ECU (error correction unit) which plues in between the RS232 lead and the modem which works very well, but this costs £150.

Still, if you really want to use 2400bps it is worth it, otherwise you will find yourself using the SM2400 at 1200bps to log into 2400 bps services.

Software exists to provide MNP for the IBM without any extra hardware and is being developed, albeit slowly. for the Amiga. We can wait. There are not very many places to call which use MNP. Only the Cix Bulletin board and the Mercury X25 network which lets you talk to distant systems - have MNP modems. Some MicroLink/Telecom Gold users are already accessing the service using

2400 bps and MNP Any modem worth buying these days offers Hayes command codes.

which allow the computer to control the modem. Hayes compatibility is to communications what Epson is to making smudges on bits of paper. If you are a real comms freak you can have hours of fun tinkering with the Hayes commands, but any half decent piece of terminal software will look after all that for you.

Setting up that software is more difficult and will have you resorting to the manual. You cannot call up a menu of commands from the keyboard as you can with some modems

The SM2400 does not store telephone numbers, leaving that job to the terminal software. And to be fair if you have an Amiga with at least half a megabyte of ram it seems silly to pay extra for Amstrad to put 4k into a box at the other end of a bit of wire.

ANUALS only get read when something has gone wrong. If you understand about modems and just want to know the correct syntax for commands then the Amstrad manual, written by Robert Goode, is excellent with the information well If you are a new user the sections

on how to wire a plug correctly are condescending and the description of what does what plummets into a techie mire. Still, if you are really green the best advice is to get someone who understands what is going on to explain. No book will be able to teach you what to do

The main purpose of the manual seems to be to hold all the warnings about connecting the modem to unapproved equipment.

The SM2400 is remarkable value for money. At £286.35 it is a couple of hundred pounds cheaper than equivalent approved modems Unapproved modems seldom work at 300 and 1200/75 baud, and are as a rule unreliable.

T is not as cheap as it could be Amstrad's PC card has a rrp of £228.85 and is often discounted to below £190 with Mirror II software for the PC. The software is worth more than £50 - it is clever in the eyes of PC owners in that it multitasks, so the £300 is a premium

in Amstrad terms. The case colour is close to that of the Amiga's and it works faultlessly. The review model has been on test for a couple of months, used daily and you have to look very hard to find fault. I am glad to say that in true picky reviewer's fashion I have done so, and would like a reset button. I have been using the public domain terminal Comm1.34 on both an A500 and an A2000 with no problems.

All in all a highly recommended

The typewriter is dead.... long live the typewriter

HAT'S what it says here, anyway. With word processor software being relatively cheap these days, and plain text editors cheaper still, I wouldn't have thought that there was much of a market for a typewriter emulator, particularly one costing £40. But here it is.

let's look at Read.Me. You can't do that with E-Type, you have to use the Notepad, or use E-Type to send the file to the printer. Anyway, all it says is that the promised demos are "not available on this disc at this time" you have to send them another £1 for another disc.

within E-Type. If you don't have an Epson-compatible printer (the supplied default), you must use Ed or similar to edit the supplied file and insert the control codes for your printer.

There are problems. Firstly the

program doesn't seem to like long control sequences, which meant that I couldn't set my DataProducts printer into NLQ properly – the string <ESC-R.103.5 apparently upset E-Type, so that although the printer was set into NLQ mode OK, it was



control file, seemingly without the leading <ESC>, since the printer printed it instead of acting on it.

So I hooked up my Fujitsu instead in IBM Graphics Printer mode (very nearly Epson-compatible). Nope – NLQ problems again. In this case, the printer expected <ESC>%mn, where m and n are non-printable characters, decimal value 0 through 2, to select print mode.

Unfortunately % is used to indicate a replaceable value for margin settings, and it seems that E-Type intercepts it even if the control sequence isn' 'set margins'. It didn't work, anyway. I also feel that the inclusion of at least one (preferably several) user-defined entries would have been useful for things like sub/ super-scripts.

VENTUALLY I gave up on NLQ and carried on with the Fujitsu, where everything else could be set Ook. I'm glad to say that the rest of the program worked fine—but then accepting characters and sending them to a printer isn't exactly hand. EType multi-task quite happily, but makes little or no use of any other Intuition features.

You can drag the main window up and down a bit, although it fills most of the screen, and flip it to the back or front of the display, but there are no gadgets for rodent-lovers.

Function keys are used to select Bold. Underline. Word wrap, Help – basically the same information that the manual gives – and Bell – warning near end of line – and to set tabs and margins, print from a file rather misleadingly called Load File, send a form-feed, select the Printer Options screen, and exit.

An option to centre text on the line is missing. Exit gives no second chances – you're asked if you want to save your current setup or not, but there's no way to cancel the exit.

The printer options screen allows selection of bold, underline, condensed, enlarged, italic, pica/elite pitch, NLQ and proportional spacing, and allows you to set the left margin. There's also a Set right margin in the printer control file, but I could find no way to select it.

The main screen shows some of the

selected options, plus the last 12 lines typed, but for some reason these lines are cleared when you return from the Options screen, except for the current line if you select Options in mid-line.

me it you select Options in mid-line. You can send output to a file by altering the PARK device line in the control file to a filename, but unfortunately E-Type seems to output unfortunately E-Type seems to output each character followed by a space and a backspace, and then drops the backspaces when you use it to send the file to the printer. Result – double spaced characters.

You can send the output to a file and then COPY the file to the printer, but it's more trouble than it's worth. Pity you can't specify a printer control file name to E-Type when you load it, as you could then have one for the printer and one for a disc file.

but the ability to easily "print" to a file would be handy for repetitive labels. Single character (manual typewriter) mode isn't quite as useful as it could be, though that's not the program's fault. It is a fair criticism however, since one of the main uses suggested is for filling in forms.

Unfortunately, any half-way intelligent printer won't move its head if it's given spaces – it waits to see if you're actually going to print anythine.

My DataProducts printer does this, as will most Epsons, and the Fujitsu is even worse. It works out what's going on and refuses to print anything till it gets a line-feed, so there's no difference between single character and line modes.

I suspect this is likely to be true of any printer which is designed to waste as little time as possible on needless head movement, thus making E-Type no better than a word processor for getting the right alignment on forms – you still have to measure the paper.

E-Type is described as fully wysiwyg, and the Amiga has an italic character font, but when italics are in use the text on the screen doesn't show this. An oversight, or just laziness, I wonder?

To conclude – I don't like reading reviews that consist of nothing but criticisms, and I don't like writing them, but unfortunately it's hard to think of much to say in E-Type's favour.

If you can write reasonable Basic, do so. It'll only take you an evening to write your own typewriter emulator if you really feel a need for one. C wouldn't be much harder, especially if you settle for a program that only runs from the CLI.

Alternatively, have a look at the public domain sector – you may well find something like this for the price of a disc. Otherwise, if you have no word processor you'll probably find

Ed adequate – and free.

Assembly is so-called because of the way it takes a program and that a computer runs. Compilers, together pre-written chunks of someone else's code - a program is never a program in assembler speak it's 'code' - and interpreters, which work out what a program means and then run someone else's code each time the program is used, always make machine code that's less than perfect for the job

This simplifies programming no end, but a good grounding in the design and foibles of the micro processor in the machine is still needed. And it's the 68000, heart and mind of the Amiga, that the would-be hacker should study first

The 68000, or 68K, is quite an old processor as such things go. Conceived in the late 70s, it was one of the first to be designed by a team which studied the way in which the first generation microprocessors had been used. As a result, the instruction set - the list of commands that the processor can understand - is both simpler and more powerful than many others.

Instructions to do things like add numbers together, check for particular conditions and change values tend to use the data registers.

Seven of the eight address registers, again 32 bit, are mostly used to address memory. This becomes steadily more important as languages get more machine-oriented – in Basic, memory addressing is hidden away completely; in G it becomes important and in assembler there's no getting away from it.

Consider the Basic line: LET planet\$="Hello, Mars":PRINT Bonzo

says, ";planets.

This, behind the user's back, allocates some memory, stuffs the 11 bytes of "Hello, Mars" into it, takes the PRINT command, points it at first to "Bonzo says," and then the recently-stuffed area of memory and, byte by byte, copies the text on to the

To do the same thing in assembler might involve pointing one address register (A1) at a free area of memory A2 at "Bonzo says," and copying the text. The process would be repeated of the text worked out and put at the beginning of the text and then an address register (say A0) pointed at the whole caboodle.

A routine – a self-contained chunk of code which performs a function, either provided by Commodore or home-written – would then be called upon to take the area of memory pointed to by A0, get a count out of the first byte and copy that many subsequent bytes to the screen,

translating them to characters as it

The eighth address register - A7, of course - is normally used for stack management. The stack is an area of memory which is used for special purposes by the 68K. If, for example, the computer is interrupted by a hardware signal because it has to dash off and run some code to receive a byte from the serial port which just won't wait, it shoves the address in memory of the program it was running "on the stack" to retrieve later. The same thing happens if a program calls (like GOSUB in Basic) another part of the program; the processor has to know where to RETURN to

Putting stuff on the stack involves getting the information, storing in the memory pointed to by A7, changing the value of A7 to point to the next free area in memory and repeating the process as required.

This happens automatically, and the machine code programmer doesn't have to worry about the mechanics. You do have to make sure that A7 is pointing to an area of memory that has enough free space to store the addresses of however many routines are likely to be interrupted or make calls.

It's common to put data on the stack in order to pass it to a routine, because the processor provides special instructions to make this easy. Most of the time, for small assembler programs AmigaDos supplies enough stack to be safe, it's only when large programs or peculiar practices are indulged in that the stack need be considered.

There are, although this is not apparent to the programmer, two A7s, changing when the 68K changes between supervisor and user mode. Some instructions, those that allocate and control memory for example, can only be carried out when the

The user mode is intended for ordinary programs, which have restricted power over the system and shouldn't be able to disrupt others that might be sharing memory with them. It's convenient to have two separate stacks for the two modes, and the 68K provides this

The final two registers are status and program counter. Status provides information about the state of the processor, and also remembers part of the result of previous maths or logical operations. If a subtraction result in a negative number, for example, then a bit of the status register gets thanged so that a later instruction can find out this fact. The program counter holds the address in memory instruction, essential to the processor but forspettable to the average assembler animals.

The general idea behind assembly programming is to get data into the data registers by locating it with the address registers, change it and put it back out again.

What that data is, what modifications are perpetrated and where it finally comes to rest, is no business of the language. It's all up to you.

Before the concrete stuff comes next month, the mechanics of assembly programming need to be shoved under the microscope. Various different assemblers can be used: some are public domain and are ideal for learning/experimenting with the language, and some cost a few tens or hundreds of pounds. They all perform the same function.

The PD ones – A68k and Asm68k are the most common – have the fewest frills, but produce just the same code as those that cost real money. The expensive ones tend to earn their keep by providing what's called an integrated environment; text



editor, debugger and assembler working together to make program development easier.

The usual way to write an assembly program is, from the CLI, to start with a normal text file - if you don't have a commercial editor that can produce plain Ascii text, use Ed. That's provided with every Amiga and works well for small-medium sized files

Say the file is called GIZMO.ASM This is then sent to the assembler by a line similar to A68K GIZMO ASM The assembler chews over the work of magnificence newly writ, and spits out either an object file or a set of terse error messages

An object file is half-way to the finished code - error messages are somewhat further removed. It normally needs to be linked with other object files before it can be run; these files contain routines which were written earlier - standard routines you rely on, or other people's code - and let you write and test a

large program in small chunks.

The link process also sorts out exactly what goes where in the final program - for example, each of your small chunks of code might contain a separate area for data storage. The linker will separate out all these areas and lump them together, dealing with the code likewise, making two big areas which can be saved separately instead of one even bigger mishmash of little 'uns. Keeping track of what goes where and does what is one of the bigger headaches of programming in assembler.

So, finally, the executable program falls out. Type its name at the CLI prompt and... the machine crashes Ka-boom. This always happens first time, and almost always on the second. It's time to go back to the source code (which has, of course, been saved before running the new program. Hasn't it?) and check what's gone wrong.

There are some essential books to be bought, borrowed or otherwise obtained. The first, which every Amiga should have come with but

every Amiga owner has to go out and buy, borrow and so on, is the AmigaDos User's Manual. This covers the use of Ed, how to set up sensible working environments, and lots more technical stuff that's indispensable.

Next on the list is the official Motorola 68000 User's Manual Unlike many manufacturer's books, this is well laid out, clear and simple to use. It is written for an expert audience - "The powerful vectored priority interrupt structure of the microprocessor allows straightforward generation of reentrant modular input-output routines", and that's page 9 - but as a work of reference it can't be beaten.

Recommended, but not must buys are the AmigaDos Rom Kernel. Developer's and Intuition manuals. All of the above except for the Motorola book should be gettable by your local dealer or Amiga Centre, or a technical bookshop. Otherwise Commodore UK will help (are you listening, C-UK?). Motorola's sales office is Television House, 10-12 Mount Street, Manchester, M12 5WS

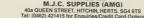

Especially those who design a computer with the sound gizmos to synthesise, in hi-fi digital stereo, Jean-Michel Jarre sneezing well enough to make the man reach well enough to make the man reach

for the Kleenex.

They get the software spot on, the electronic bits fair resonating with rightness, and then forget to put in an amplifier, so nobody can actually hear the stuff. Not even a headphone socket. Perhaps they were all telepathic, and just didn't notice...

To be fair, the Amiga is designed to
be used with a monitor which can
reasonably be expected to have some
sort of speaker system. But most
aren't stereo, and while wiring the
computer up to the hi-fi is guaranteed
to enthral your eardrums it's both
messy and inconvenient

Another problem, but one which isn't really Commodore's fault, is the way in which AmigaDos steals a little more memory for each disc drive connected. Just about every operating system ever written does this: memory is needed to keep information about the disc drive as information about the disc drive as well as to transfer programs and data in and out of the floppy. This doesn't matter in normal use but when a utility or game needs every last microbyte of ram, having a second drive attached can seriously damage your software capability.

However, there's a better way to disconnect a disc than by yanking the cables. All it takes is one switch in one of the lines that run from micro to drive, and the unpalatable peripheral is electronically

invisible.

When the Amiga scans around for extra bits, the line that asks "Are you there?" is cut. No reply from the disc

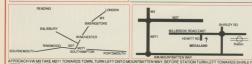

- no extra memory munched. And it just so happens that the sound and floppy sockets are serendipitously congruent (he means it's lucky that they're next to each other - Ed.)

Astech, a brand-new company, noted all the above and has produced a small box which combines a disc isolation switch and a stereo audio amplifier. Tastefully finished in black to match the Amiga (with the lights out), it simply plugs into all three sockets. The disc connector is taken straight through, so any normal Amiga floppy will plug in. On the top of the box are two 3.5mm jack sockets for loudspeakers, a switch and two knobs.

The switch is marked Drive Disenable and Enable. Disenable is a new one on me: why they didn't call the other position Endisable I don't know. But it simply makes or breaks the appropriate line, and thus enables or disables any and all external floppies. It is possible, with extra electronics, to just disable DF1: or DF2:, but this isn't much more useful and costs extra.

HE two knobs are volume controls for the two audio channels. This is as effective but cheaper than having one volume and one balance control. Inside the box sits one circuit board and a few wires - closer investigation shows one LM377 stereo amplifier chip together with precious little else.

This chip is a very rugged, two watts per channel device and should be impossible to blow up by any means short of plumbing 240V mains directly into the output sockets. This will also destroy the Amiga and kill you, so stick with speakers. The unit takes its power directly from the computer, so there's no extra wiring

It works, almost flawlessly - a

connectors on the back of an Amiga 2000 mean that this is an A500 only product but then the rich kids will probably run the sound through their Quad set-up anyway

One oddity is that the box is plastic and all of the leads are unshielded, so in use there's a small degree of pickup from the floppy wires and the Amiga's internals which results in quiet hums, buzzes and churr-churrchurrs as the machine thinks. And on the (obviously pre-production) model

However, Astech has taken this to heart, and promises to put this into all production units. I've taken the liberty of plumbing one into mine. and as a result the box will be permanently plugged in. It's not a flashy product, but it fills a need and isn't too expensive. Recommended.

K for katastrophe

DJ Walker-Morgan finds you need to be an expert in C and intuition just to use Kuma's K-Gadget

WHEN programming tools increase the effort expended it is time to write your own. K-Gadget from Kuma is a programmers' utility for the Aniga. It's purpose is to simplify the creation of gadgets and requesters by automating the process of generating C source code.

The idea is that you draw up your gadgets on screen, set their operation, and K-Gadget goes away and writes the code for you.

K-Gadget has two basic screens, one on which you construct your gadgets and one from which you can pull the different types of gadget. To construct a Boolean gadget—that's a yes/no on/off type box — you pull the object marked on/off from the parts window and move it on the main window.

The utility then puts a prepresentation of the object on the screen, and using pull down menus, you can define how the gadget will behave and look. This is fine in theory – such software tools are as important to commercial programmers as coffee in plastic cups. Unfortunately in K-Gadget, the implementation leaves much to be desired.

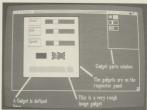
YoU never see the gadgets you are designing under Intuition, only K-Gadget's representation of them, which is not really the true picture. Most code generators have a test mode which lets you do this. Here there is no sign of such an option.

When setting up a gadget you have to fill in various screens, but there is no quick way to move between them. For a program that is supposed to make life easy for the user and programmer its requesters rely too heavily on keyboard entry.

The keyboard setup is dismal. When setting up borders, you have to enter a list of border coordinates,

which involves entering X and Y coordinates into a list. Instead of allowing you to move

through the list with cursor keys and pressing Return to move to the next field, K-Gadget demands that you click on every entry box whenever you want to enter a value. For a simple box border, this is mildly irritating. For anything more complex

it is a major pain.

It is in designing the gadget's image

that K-Gadget reduces to worthless any positive advantages it might have had. The image editor is slow, very slow, and for no apparent reason. When you go into the window to start drawing and press the left mouse start drawing and press the left mouse

•

button, you expect, as with most applications, there to be a trail of pixels following the mouse pointer. There isn't. You have to point and click every pixel for your gadget. You cannot load in IFF brushes, so this is also the only way to generate images. slowly

I couldn't find any way to copy a gadget either. You have to define each one. A colour palette requester would be an nightmarish exercise in tedium. But you couldn't really do a palette requester, because K-Gadget only works in four colours on the 640x200 Workbench screen. Anything else, and you'll have to sit down and hack the C source.

OMING on to the C source, a particular irritation is the fact that no comments are added into the code. It makes altering the generated code that little bit harder.

The manual assumes you are literate with Intuition, so if you are new to programming the Amiga be warned that no allowance for you is made. It's a pity really the people that a gadget generator could most help are cut off from using it by the manual, but there it is

Just as a blind test. I called a programmer friend of mine who was working on a communications program. I said I had a gadget generator and would he like to borrow it and put together some gadgets. He did. He came back three days later, very frustrated, after hitting nearly all the same problems that I'd encountered. His only comment was "Buy 30 pounds worth of graph paper it is more user friendly'

K-Gadget is a good idea gone sadly wrong. It seems to be written as an exercise in menus and requesters. rather than with the aim of being an effective tool for a programmer. You spend more time filling in the blanks for K-Gadget rather than creating good gadgetry. But then I should have been suspicious when the most complex gadget image in the program was a simple hexagon....

The blocks for the background use eight colours – which can be different to the pallette chosen for the ships – on a 32 x 32 grid. You can have up to 140 blocks, which means there is plenty of scope for interesting backgrounds.

Up to 22 levels can be designed and they don't have to smooth scroll, you can flick scroll or have a static screen. You can even switch the type of scroll in mid-flight so as to tackle a particularly nasty alien at the end of a level. like Xenon.

The game can be tested with infinite lives and then the finished result saved to a disc to form a standalone game.

Starting from scratch is difficult, it is far easier to modify an existing game, so the programmers have put together three sample ones. Since they are the same men who wrote Amiga Wizball for Ocean it is no surprise that the graphics are great. But you will soon progress to

writing your own games. Pete Stone from Palace says the most clever idea he saw for the Commodore 64 versio was a game where a boy had to win the affection of girlfriends by throwing hearts at them. There is certainly plenty of scope.

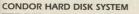

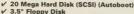

LOMBARD RAC RALLY

SUPER HANG-ON

ZKJ was not asked to write Super Hang On for the Amiga. He had collaborated with Chris Wood on the Amstrad and Spectrum conversions of the Sega areade game and then went on to write the Atari version for Electric Dreams.

But he had been trained as a chip designer and wanted to get his hands on an Amiga, so when the Atari version was finished he embarked upon an Amiga port to produce a game which looked as though it belonged in the arcade.

When he had a running demo, ZZ - whose real name is Zareh - took the disc to Electric Dreams and it agreed to commission enhanced graphics and sound to suit an the Amiga's superior hardware.

You race a motorbike through four continents - Africa, Asia, America and Europe. Each is divided into timed stages. Fail to complete a stage in the allotted time and the game is over.

Any extra time is added to the 32 seconds you get for the next stage. You must average more than 280 Km/h to do this. Every second left at the end of the game is worth a million points. This leads to two aims—finish as many stages as possible and score

as many points as you can This is the best racing game on the Amiga, putting Buggy Boy in the shade. You can play with the keyboard or joystick but the pros will take to the mouse. This lets you control how much the hike leans and keep a tighter rein on turn in. In true motor racing fashion drive wide and clip the apex of the turn - this is the path the rival bikes take so be careful not to hit them. Clipping the side of another bike takes a third off your speed, while a 100 per cent collision will halve your speed. They won't drive into the back of you, so you shouldn't do it to them.

The speed controls can be used to position the bike. You have nitro, accelerate and brake. The nitro boost can be called upon at 280 Km/h to take you up to the maximum speed of 324 Km/h. This delivers a lot of thrust and is accompanied by flames from the back of the bike.

The standard acceleration control can be held down for most of the race, but for really tricky bends you will have to resort to the brake.

This defies credibility. Stopping a bike from over 200 mph takes some doing and the SHO bike stops very quickly.

quickly.

Zareh tried putting realistic figures
into the game but it wrecked the
gameplay. While the brakes are super
powerful they work progressively,
gripping harder the longer you apply



them. The change in speed affects the radius of your turn. If you decelerate as you turn, the bike moves closer to the inside bend. Whack on a bit of power and the bike slides out. Use this to steer and you will get through comers very quickly.

You must learn the courses. As you speed over a hill you have no way of knowing what is on the other side. There are signs indicating sharp turns, but these are not always reliable—one or two point in the wrong direction. ZZ says this is based on the road signs near Eastcote.

The routes are not the same as on



the arcade game, for two reasons. Firstly Zareh did not get a video tape of the Africa section until the Atari version was finished, and secondily there are different versions in the arcades. Knowing that the third bead among the cach is a really sharp one makes the difference between cruising around at a leisurely 130km/h and coming to a prickly end.

If you do crash, the accident is

spectacular. Depending on what you hit, and how fast you hit it, the game plays one of two different sequences. The arcade offered more, but memory and disc space are limited on the Amiga. The result is that you can end up sprawled out, yet hover-

ing in mo-air.

Still you are too busy worrying about finishing the leg to notice most minor of graphics aberrations. Finish the course and you are rewarded with an animation as the crown welcome the triumphant rider. Finish the last one for a clue as to who he is. For an experienced Aming a pro-

grammer Super Hang On is an impressive bit of coding. For a first program on the Amiga it is incredible. Zareh went out of his way to really use the Amiga, although the basic gameplay is the same as that on the Atari – because it is the same as that on the arcade machine – the Amiga version is very much better.

The whole game is very much smoother. The road drawing module is the biggest part of the program, only the Amiga version has wide road bars and a track which is in the correct proportion to the rest of the graphics.

This is thanks to the blitter, which is so fast that there is no flicker or slowing of the graphics in tight corners - the hardware can deal with the horizontal pixel scroll the game needs. This makes the movement of the signs around the track super

The copper looks after the colours, which coming from a wide palette can be really subtle. The greys in the road are gentle to give an impression of speed without it looking as though you are driving along a 20 mile long zebra crossing. The subtle colours have resulted in dramatic skies with extra clouds blitted on.

Having used the blitter and copper there is one more graphics aid to be exploited. Sprites. When I first wrote about the Amiga five years ago I thought that hardware sprites would be important. I was wrong, few games use them, blitter objects being

more flexible although not as quick.
SHO uses sprites for the nitro
flares, dust clouds and the extended
time details which need to flash at
regular intervals, but the need to do
other things overrides the flashing on
inferior machines. Only the Amiga
makes it possible.

If there is a flaw in the scheme of things it is the sound. Unusual since many of the games which are a simple port have beefed-up audio effects, but while the Amiga sounds are better than those on the ST they are not all they could be.

Perhaps in a game which so clearly demonstrates how good the Amiga is when programmed with finesse, I expected too much from the speakers.

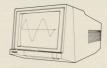

Plain man's guide to CLI

This month Phil South delves into what we have to look forward to with the release of Workbench 1.3, particularly PATH, RESIDENT and HISTORY

It is funny you know, but it only seems like yesterday since they announced the release of 1.3. To be factual it's more like a year and a bit, but what's a matter of a few months between friends, eh Commodore? I thought I'd give you a taste of what you can do with some of the new

AmigaDos commands. It's quite odd how AmyDos seems to borrow from other, more archaic systems, but it's true. Most of what AmyDos is has been drawn from MSdos and quite rightly so; it works and it's a simpler transition for PC folks to the Amiga. But, curiously, a lot of newer Amiga commands, like some of those you find on PD discs in 1.3. have their roots in Unix. This is not so surprising, as Unix and AmigaDos share the same progenitor, the C language in which both are written. (OK, so part of AmigaDos was written in BCPL, but lets not split hairs here.)

PATH is a tricky command which has a direct ancestor in the PC one of the same name. What it does is tell the computer to look in certain directories for any information it might need. The syntax is:

PATH <subdirectory> <subdirectory>

PATH isn't like ASSIGN, which tells the computer where to look for commands. No, this could be a program name, or similar, so that typing anything causes the Amy to look in ALL the directories specified Let me give you an example:

PATH df1:libs dh8:games df8:scrabble
After typing this into your CLI, any

word you type causes the computer to first look in the libs directory of df1:. If there isn't a program with the same name as the word you typed, it moves to the games directory in dh0:.

If the word isn't there to be executed it moves onto df0:scrabble. And finally if it can't find the word in any of those three, it LASTLY looks in df0:sc.

Now this might seem like a bit of drag for normal everyday use, but if you have a few programs you use a lot, and they are all in different parts of your hard disc say, or even on different discs, you can type the name anywhere and it'll execute the program.

AmigaDos will always search the directories you specify each time you type anything and hit Return. The options usable with PATH are ADD, RESET and SHOW, Just typing the standard format as illustrated above cancels all previous paths and institutes the specified ones.

Another goodie from 1.3 which I could never do without is the RESIDENT command.

You know when you type a command how it loads it from disc every time before doing it. This cannot only be a pain when you're using the Workbench disc, but what if you've switched discs? What you need is a method of holding commands in memory so you can

execute them instantly.

With RESIDENT this is no problem.
You simply type:

RESIDENT <command>
and that command is loaded into

memory. You can load as many commands as you like, remove the Workbench disc and continue using the commands as if the disc was still there. It's a sort of C directory ramdisc. This really cuts down development time.

The one word which you can not make RESIDENT is DELETE. That's because DELETE is an option with RESIDENT. Like so:

RESIDENT <command>

DELETE removes the specified name from the resident segment. The other option with RESIDENT is REPLACE. You can use it like so:

RESIDENT <command> <file> REPLACE

This means that the code segment for the named command is replaced by the specified file.

Another life saver is the shell, which provides a line history by using the cursor keys. This is a hangover from Unix, and means that you can call up the last few lines you typed into the CLI and edit or execute them again without having to retype.

You just press cursor up or down to scan through the recent commands until you get the one you want. Ctrl+K deletes to the end of line.

Ctrl+U deletes from the beginning of the line to the cursor, while shift and cursor movements jump to the end of lines. Very handy for file housekeeping and deleting long lists of files. You can just call up the commands and alter the filenames.

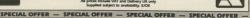

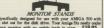
