## Commodore's April Fool buy-out

COMMODORE say rumours that Nintendo are negotiating a buy-out of the company were started as an April Fool's joke by a financial analyst in the States.

And Nintendo, the Japanese entertainment giant who manufacture the highly-successful Gameboy hand-held console, deny that they have even considered the move.

But speculation of a take-over has been rife for several weeks, with one financial analyst reported as telling Reuters: "there is a general consensus

Commodore will eventually be acquired by someone."

Standard & Poor Corporation's Larry Freitag claimed that Commodore stock will rise to \$25 per share within a year, and in the event of a take-over predicts an increase to \$35 per share.

It is thought the Amiga and multimedia sides of the business are key attractions for any take-over.

Commodore share prices peaked at the end of last year at about \$16 each but have since fallen back to about \$12.50.

## Developers get Workbench 3

THE AMIGA operating system has been upgraded further this month, with Commodore sending developers test copies of Workbench v3.

New features are linked mainly with graphics and enable the computer to boot up in either NTSC or PAL mode. There is also support for the proposed AA chip set, due to appear in Amigas late this year.

It allows up to 256,000 colours to be displayed in any resolution and the Workbench screen to appear in 256 colours instead of 16. Later copies of WB2.1 also carry this option.

A Commodore spokesman simply offered: "We're always continuing to work on the development of the Amiga." He would not comment on the new Amigas.

Workbench 3 can be installed on any Amiga running from WB2.1 and Kickstart 38.21 and above.

Commodore's Andrew Ball said: "There are no changes of senior personnel at Commodore, and I don't particularly want to comment on these rumours."

Franklin has been in the number one seat at Commodore UK for five years.

## Sun shines on Amiga

A monitor and one million megabytes of software - about 800 games - will be given away with the A600. The winner will also receive a special plaque.

● As temperatures reach the upper 90s here in the States (that's fahrenheit, of course – we're hot, but not quite boiling yet), the heat is on for Commodore to get new Amigas out with faster processors and better graphic chip sets.

IBM clones with SuperVGA graphics and 486/33 processors have plunged below \$2,000 in price, and Amiga dealers are feeling the pressure.

With *AmigaWorld* reporting that the A570 may be delayed in the US, and Commodore's refusal to even acknowledge – much less release – the A500 Plus and A600 over here, folks are holding out hope that the US sales operation are just hedging their bets on new machines to be released later in the year.

I hope that this is the case, as many US software manufacturers are considering dropping Amiga support – it's just too difficult to convert VGA games that require a 386 to run on a 7MHz 68000 running with 64 colours or less.

## Warp 33, Mr Scott

Texas-based Motorola have announced that they are now shipping the 33MHz version of their 68040 processor.

According to Motorola benchmarks, an Apple Mac Quadra running the 33MHz 040 chip performs 20 per cent faster than a 50MHz Intel 486 system. An Amiga equipped with this chip should be even faster.

The first Amiga product to use this faster version of the 040, the CSA 40/4 Magnum, is now shipping in quantity. The Magnum board is a top level device targeted at Amiga video pros, such as Toaster users, and is priced as such.

Equipped with a 33MHz 68040, 1Mb of super-fast SRAM (Static RAM), 16Mb of

speedy DRAM, high-speed serial and parallel ports (speed seems to be the key word with this device), the board is priced at a steep \$4,995.

However, all is not lost for the speed-crazed Amiga nut who doesn't want to sell his car to make his 1500 or 2000 run faster. CSA are about to introduce a new consumer model of the 40/4 Magnum that will be retail at only \$1595.

Final specifications are still being set, but it's known that the board will ship with less RAM – and probably sans SRAM – and probably without any of the expansion ports.

However, the consumer-level board will be expandable to include all the capabilities of the \$4,995 professional Magnum. So you can get the Magnum now and load it up later.

## Maximum Maxis

RoboSport is Silicon Valley-based Maxis' best Amiga game since *SimCity*. It's a bizarre but well realised combination of the best elements of sports and strategy games. You control a team of cute little robots armed with bombs, bullets, grenades, missiles, and other fun little weapons.

This team, of course, is out to destroy the other teams of cute little robots. Actually, there are a number of other game variations, some of which are a bit more peaceful, including *Treasure Hunt*, *Capture the Flag*, and *Baseball*.

Each turn involves you "programming" the robots (don't worry – it's point-and-click programming, replete with helpful gadgets and a bit easier than *Amos!*).

You move your robots around one of 24 battlefields, programming them to battle the other teams. After you program each robot, the game then goes into "movie mode," allowing you too see the results of the battle. If all else fails, you can send your droids in on a kamikaze mission.

RoboSport was ported to the Amiga by The Dreamer's Guild, namely Joe Pearce and David "Talin" Joiner, who you may know as the whizz behind the classic *Fairy Tale Adventure*.

These guys know the Amiga well, and it shows in the quality of the port. This

## Jump for the disk!

Long before anyone had heard of the coverdisk, a cute little disk magazine emerged from Chico, California, called *JumpDisk*. Now in its sixth year of publication – longer than any Amiga mag except *AmigaWorld* – *JumpDisk* has stuck around while many other Amiga mags have been and gone.

Every other disk-based magazine in the US has failed for various reasons, including A.X. and *AMnews*, but *JumpDisk* just keeps on going – perhaps because it never tries to do too much.

It has never added a paper edition, multiple disks, or free sweeties with every issue. And it's never tried to grow to kill *AmigaWorld* or *Byte* – each issue is hand-duplicated using Amigas in the editorial office.

What it does provide is a disk full – and I mean full – of great little utilities, games, applications, and news stories. Editor Richard Ramella is a dedicated Amiga fan, and it shows in the quality of the articles and programs he's able to assemble for each issue.

While it doesn't have the flash and dash of the European coverdisks, it's a fun read (with luminaries such as Info's Mark R Brown and Morton Kesselman, as well as Nico Francis, providing some of the text) and is always packed to the last few blocks with neat little programs.

It also provides a better feel for what's going on in the US Amiga market than the slick magazines. At \$9.95 per issue, it's a great bargain. Contact *JumpDisk*, 1493 Mt View Ave., Chico, CA 95926 for more info, or call (916) 343-7658.

game uses AmigaDOS Release 2.0-style menus, gadgets and windows, as well as ear-popping digitised sounds.

It is quite speedy, much more so than the recently-released *SimAnt*. And owners of systems with flicker fixers – or people who just like their screens to strobe violently – will love the hi-res screen option.

The game looks as good as a Mac II or PC SuperVGA game in this mode. Of course, if you're short of Chip RAM, or you want to avoid flicker, just run the program in lo-res mode.

The computer players put up a challenging game, but like any sport or battle, nothing beats the sheer deviousness of a human opponent. *RoboSport* offers a plethora of multi-player options.

You can take turns on a single computer, attach two computers together via their serial ports, play over a modem connection, or – using a feature so bizarrely advanced for a game that perhaps 20 people will ever use it – connect a number of Amigas together using Commodore's TCP/IP networking software and Ethernet cards.

The game is hard-disk installable, works under Workbench 1.x and 2.x, and supports all Workbench printers. 1Mb of RAM is needed for lo-res; 2Mb for hi-res.

If you like a challenging strategy game, and can live without 600 frames-per-second real-time polygon action, pick up *RoboSport*.

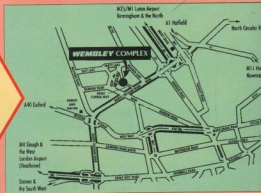

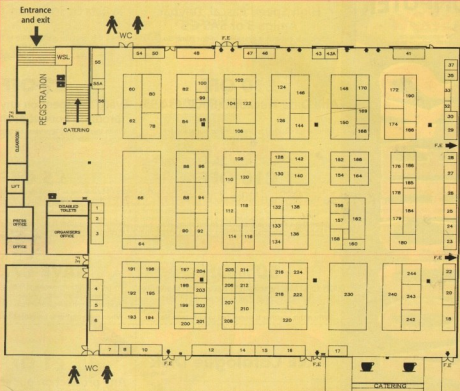

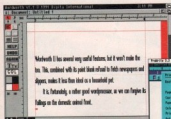

## Home and office

Job number one – buy a decent wordprocessor. Don't worry if this is the most expensive buy of the lot, because it's the one you'll depend on most.

My first choice would be Wordworth 1.1 from Digita International, but this program, though excellent in many ways, is unsuitable for some tasks.

If you want to generate invoices for example, Protext 5.02 has a line drawing function and more professional business features. Other choices would include Pen Pal with its DTP-like features and excellence for its enormous dictionary (with definitions) and grammar checker.

Don't skip on the wordprocessor and settle for KindWords 2 or a PD product. The former is very slow and the latter are almost always just started up text editors.

You could give ProWrite a closer look, though. This quality American wordsmith has never enjoyed the success it deserves in the UK, and has gone through an evolution over the last year to include direct PostScript support and an improved interface. With its recent price cut, it could be a real bargain.

## Printing

A wordprocessor is useless without a printer, and it's at this stage that the budget begins to groan a bit. If you want a 24-pin printer, you'll have to settle for very cheap software as the cheapest 24-pin is still around £200.

However, if you've prepared to stick with 9-pin printers, there are bargains galore almost everywhere you look.

The latest price on the elderly Citizen 120, for instance, is about £115. This perfectly adequate printer will suffice for standard letters, and if you have a PostScript-compatible wordprocessor or one with an ultra-print option, even a basic 9-pin can produce the goods.

At this point, you'll notice that we're rapidly approaching the £200 mark, and will have surpassed it if you opted for one of the more expensive wordprocessors.

As we haven't considered databases or accounting packages yet, our chances of staying within budget don't at first look good.

However, if you bought the May issue of Amiga Computing you will already have a free copy of Superbase Personal, which can

be upgraded to Personal 2 for only £19.99.

Superbase Personal (and Personal 2) is the ideal home office database, so there's no need to spend more than the upgrade fee, which I'd recommend if you are going to use the database for commercial purposes.

The only widely available alternative is Prodata from Amorr. This is an excellent product incorporating most of the features you'd need from a database, but it does have the drawback of not having been given away free, so unless you really don't like Superbase Personal, Prodata is unnecessary.

When it comes to spreadsheets, the Amiga owner has a lot less choice than the average PC owner. There are a few good ones around, but precious few good cheap ones.

I'd go for DGCalk from Digita which, at £39.99, is good enough for basic business uses, or Advantage from Gold Disk.

The latter is only for those who haven't overspent on a wordprocessor, as it retails for approaching £90, but it is a solid product with some good options. The ability to read Lotus 1-2-3 files is a boon for anyone who works with a PC spreadsheet at the office, and I'd recommend Advantage if you fall into this category.

## DTP

This is an area in which it is possible to start spending and never stop. There are so many aspects to DTP that it can encompass wordprocessors, art packages, image processors, and all sorts of hardware from a decent mouse to a laser printer.

Before going credit card crazy, however, it is possible to do a bit of judicious planning.

You'll definitely need three pieces of equipment – a DTP package, a hand scanner, and some extra RAM – but everything else is an optional extra.

Within the bounds of a £250 budget, DTP can be a very tricky purchasing decision, but there are at least two routes you can take.

The first is to go for a low-end DTP package such as PageStream 2 (the lowest practical price for a DTP package) which will save you money to spend on hardware.

By taking this approach, you can upgrade the software at a later date in the knowledge that your hardware will be able to keep.

PageStream 2 can be purchased for about £50 or less, so you will have £200 left for memory and a scanner. The only decent hand scanner at this level is the Power Computing mono-only 400dpi scanner whose greyscale images are of a very high quality. This retails for £99.

## Memory

The only problem now is that you won't have enough for a good memory expansion card. A500 8Mb RAM expansions start at £119 for the 2Mb populated Ashcom AX502, so unless you're prepared to go over budget, a 1.5Mb card for £80 or a 1Mb card for A500 Plus owners at £50 might be a better buy.

The second route is to buy a good DTP package and 2Mb RAM, then spend money on having your photographs scanned at a local print bureau.

This is more expensive in the long run, but for semi-professional DTP where a publication will pay for itself or earn you money, the costs of production are bearable.

PageStream 2.2 can cost you as little as £156 if you probe our small ads, leaving £80 for a 1.5Mb RAM card and a bit over for some shareware PostScript fonts from EM Computergraphics or George Thompson Services.

You won't be able to do much complex DTP with 2 to 2.5Mb RAM but you can always decide to bust the budget and go for an 8Mb RAM bus populated to 2Mb for later upgrading if you feel the need.

On the whole, if you have a simple task in mind for your DTP package and don't envisage going further up the quality scale, stick with PageStream 2 and the hand scanner.

If you're likely to need PostScript quality, and would like eventually to make money from DTP, buy one of the more expensive packages and an 8Mb RAM expansion.

If you are an Amiga owner with an interest in one specialist area, you might have come to the conclusion that to exploit your machine's potential properly you will have to mortgage the cat or sell an internal organ.

In time of recession, however, price wars have become so vicious that for only £250 it is possible to build yourself a system capable of pretty serious productivity.

This is partly due to the machine's age. The Amiga has been around for long enough now that high quality software of a year or two ago can be picked up for a pittance, and competition in

the hardware market has ensured a steady supply of quality, affordable equipment.

There are now enough small manufacturers producing kit for a competitive market that prices have fallen to gratifyingly low levels.

In this article, we look at the five most common areas of Amiga productivity and cast around for a complete system under £250.

Music, art, video, DTP, and home and office areas come under the microscope, and for each we look at what is not only the most balanced and usable system, but also the best value for money.

## Art and animation

If you fancy yourself as something of an artist, the Amiga is the perfect platform, thanks not only to the machine's artistic features but also its accompanying bundled software, DPaintIII.

This package alone provides any would-be artist with an impressive head start in the artistic stakes. Having said that, any system builder would be well advised to invest his or her first £45 in the latest upgrade – v4.1 – which you'll find detailed in this month's Updates column.

The primary reason for doing this is the option to employ Ham in your creations. This is especially useful to any animators out there, as Ham is the only format which can achieve near photo-realistic quality and still produce full-screen images which animate at a reasonably fluid rate.

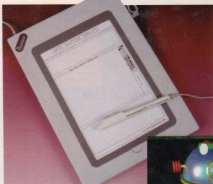
### Purists

If you're a freehand artist struggling to come to terms with the dreaded mouse, there are a few alternatives. For the purists, Take 2 from Rombo could be the answer, as it allows the user to draw his or her creations freehand and then digitise the results directly into the Amiga.

For character animation, Take 2 is perhaps the perfect way around the somewhat tricky transition from freehand art to computer animation. However it does have its limitations, especially concerning flexibility.

Fortunately, if you want to retain your hard-earned freehand skills while taking advantage of the Amiga's vast array of the mouse-driven packages, both artistic and otherwise, a graphic tablet offers perhaps the perfect compromise.

It's true that the stylus of the average graphics tablet can't compete for feel when compared to pencil on paper, but it still offers a very palatable alternative and perhaps more importantly, a bridge between the world of the computer and that of the artist. The best bargain in this particular

sphere has to be the Genitrix graphics tablet from Data. The unit comes with a DPaintIII template as standard and boasts a 9 x 6in working area.

The final piece of the jigsaw is image processing. With the Amiga diversifying into all manner of applications, flexibility is almost as important as talent. As a consequence, the ability to tailor your art to suit a certain package or niche in the market is a near essential.

For the beginner on a budget, The Art Department is ideal. Although out-gunned by its later incarnation, The Art Department Professional, it still provides that vital first step into image processing.

### DTV

Aside from the obvious such as a camcorder, video or perhaps both, the only other thing an Amiga user needs to get into DTV is a copy of DPaint.

This is DTV in the raw, but for only a few hundred pounds you can build a dedicated system which will transform the amateur into the astrophysicist.

As mentioned earlier, DPaintIII – which most users already have – is one of the cornerstones of good DTV. Unlike the artists out there, it's not necessary for potential videophiles to upgrade to v4.1.

A copy of v3 with its animation options is probably as much as you'll ever need – unless of course you have access to a scanner and wish introduce stills from the real world into your creations.

### Titling trio

The next essential investment is a titler. This is a tricky area as there are three contenders for the budget-title crown – The Big Alternative Scroller from Alternative Image, Home Titrer from HB Marketing and Scala 500.

The latter of the three would be my personal choice as it offers a variety of intros and special effects that the others simply can't match.

In addition to any titler, a good selection of fonts is essential. As a result, a stroll through the PD section is in order. Almost all the larger libraries have a sizeable library of additional font disks, some of which are designed specifically for DTV applications.

Assuming you now have a copy of DPaint that supports animation, a titler and

a selection of fonts, your basic DTV software collection is complete.

Now it's time to invest in a genlock. Although a rather intimidating title, a genlock in its basic form is a relatively simple unit which more than anything can transform your creations from the mediocre to the amazing.

Although there are a huge number of genlocks on the market, perhaps the best buy for anybody on a budget is the RocGen RG300C from Silica Systems. Retailing at just £99 – or less from third-party suppliers – it's an ideal intro level unit which offers an excellent ratio of quality to cost.

Although impressive it does have a few limitations, most infuriating of which is the lack of an RGB through-port. Another omission is "invert video", a feature which allows area masking using colour zero which can be adjusted via fading to produce blanked or semi-transparent areas on-screen.

For this particular feature, and RGB-through, you'll have to invest in a unit such as Power's Microgen, which offers both of the above but unfortunately retails at almost twice the price of the RocGen unit.

Audio is the final part of the equation. Don't make the mistake of considering video the all-important component of a production.

If you have good imagery and awful audio you'll sacrifice at least a third of the impact – especially on productions that would benefit from some form of background music.

However, if the audio matches the video the impact of an already graphically impressive show can be instantly tripled.

The cheapest and easiest way to combine audio from various sources is to pick up a basic four-channel mixer from Tandy. It will only set you back around £25 to £30 while adding immeasurably to your output.

## Amiga-based music

If you're planning to employ the Amiga as a sound generation source rather than merely a sequencing environment, by far the most important part of any setup is the sampler.

As a result, there's no point in cutting corners. Although there are more samplers about than fleas on a dog, my particular choice would be Sound Master which retails at a rather inflated £129.95. Fortunately the quality will soon help you forget the expense.

A welcome addition to the above is the inclusion of AudioMaster III, an award-win-

ning package that has long been the favourite of all serious Amiga sampling fans.

Once equipped with a Sound Master and its accompanying Audio MasterIII software, the next and equally important investment is a good quality microphone.

Here again don't be tempted to cut corners. The key to quality results is a high standard of raw materials. To achieve this a decent sampler and microphone combination is essential.

To that end, budget for at least a £50 investment on a quality omni-directional mike. Don't under any circumstances buy a condenser-style microphone as these are nowhere near as flexible.

For the best advice on a particular type of mike, take a trip and any advice on offer from your local music shop. And insist on a demonstration before you part with the cash!

Now you have the means to record and manipulate samples, it's time to breath life into your musical aspirations. Again the Amiga market is fit to burst with an assortment of "sound-tracker clones" – a generic term for piano

roll sample sequencers.

Fortunately this is an area where you can actually save cash by investing in PD program entitled MED. MED is on a par with any commercial sound trackers, but very only set you back a fraction of the price.

The new eight-track version, entitled OctoMed, is available from Amiganut United for £15, but you should be able to pick up Med 3.2 – its four-track predecessor – for as little as £2 from any of the larger PD emporiums.

The final, if slightly less essential, purchase is Superjam, a program which allows you to convert samples to its own TurboSample format and then have any one of the program's six built-in musicians jam away in the style you choose.

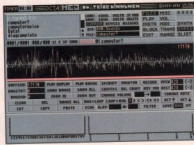

## Gold Disk Office (Gold Disk £129.99)

An integrated package with all the drawbacks and bonuses you get with any such package. It's perfect for the beginner, but it lacks any real punch. However, being a Gold Disk product it's certainly solid enough for most purposes, and like MS5 Works! Platinum is an excellent intro into the various types of program it contains.

The database module, Office File, is limited in certain respects, although it does have some redeeming qualities. Data entry is simple and you can quickly and easily manipulate records with indexes, filters, sets, and reports of your own design. This means you can pretty much tailor the thing to your needs, and for a small and simple program this is very good.

One feature worth singing out is the QuickCalc feature which enables you to do statistical calculations on numeric fields in a range of records. You can do formula substitution too, which is a means of changing fields in multiple records based on a mathematical expression, a bit like a spreadsheet! Bizarre, but useful.

There are a number of presets for this process too, called Built-In Functions, which can be "applied right out of the box". Data can be shared with all the programs, and so you can load the data from your database into the graphs module and even output this as a ProDraw clip for pasting into ProPage documents.

All things considered, Gold Disk Office is the best intro package, and I'd rate it above Works as a beginners' program, simply because it's more Amiga-ised and less awkwardly bolted together. Also Gold Disk are famous for going just that bit further to make sure that programs are pleasant to use and perform well, so the feel of the suite is that much more polished.



There comes a time in every young man's life when his thoughts turn to the larger issues - Where are we going? Where are we from? What did we do with that flipping important address and phone number?

Databases loom large in the history of computing, and not a day goes by without someone popping the question "is it dBase compatible?" to their loved ones.

In the beginning was the word, and the word was dBase, a complex mass of commands and all the kind of hard-to-get-at trickery that keeps PC consultants in the manner to which

they've become accustomed, and keeps beginners feeling like mushrooms, in the dark and up to their knees in manure.

But the Amiga is a friendlier beast than its PC counterparts, and the programs you'll get on the Amiga are much more user friendly and easy to grasp. Yes? Well on the whole no.

Except for the industry - standard Superbase Pro, very little has changed over the years. However, being the Amiga it's growing every day, and things are improving steadily, so let's open the cupboard under the stairs and see what's really growing in those old seed trays.

## ImageFinder (Zardoz Software £59.99)

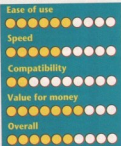
A neat idea and one which has taken its time coming along. ImageFinder is a picture database, in which you can file all your pictures, which if you're like me and have about 60 billion of the bloody things, you'll find it invaluable.

What it does is take the pictures from your disks and show them as a series of tiny black and white pictures on the screen, in any resolution from 24-bit down to 2-bit, and sort them in any way you choose. The trick is that if the picture is in the system you can click on the image to display it in full res. Obviously, the program will prompt you for the disk if you don't have it loaded, and no it can't tell you where you left the disk. Your filing is your own problem!

Not only does the system allow you to find the graphics you are seeking, it also holds a bunch of information about the screens too, like the title, the resolution, the depth in bits, the date and the size. You can search any of these fields for

items with the same subject, if they are digitised or not, or even search for a bunch of pictures that are all 7,000 bytes in size.

The program is fully dBase-compatible, and can even launch other programs and pass information and files to them down the pipe. If you work primarily with graphics, this will be more than valuable to you. Better than food, even.



## K Data (Kuma £49.95)

Kuma developed this program a while back as part of a range that included K Spread, the best selling spreadsheet. K Spread 4 is the bee's knees of the spread world, but unfortunately K Data hasn't been through that much revision or refinement.

OK, so it's an oldie but not bad for that. K Data's overhaul, long overdue, has been passed to a higher authority. Kuma

have ceased to develop their range of productivity software (in favour of a popular range of books), and so another oldie goodie - Hisoft - have taken the seat over.

Hisoft will be dealing with all Kuma software, giving the programs a bit of a face-lift to match the current trends in interfaces and techniques, and ensuring WBS2 compatibility.

K Data is part of this program, and Hisoft are currently involved in updating and updating this age-old program, bringing it into the 90s. The interface being tickled for Release 2.0, and all bugs are being tracked down, stomped and swept up.

Currently K Data is a fairly ordinary program which does the job but no more. Obviously with Hisoft's programming muscle behind it propelling it along, can expect something a bit more radical than the not too distant future.



## Microfiche File (Software Visions £39.95)

The original idea of this program was to be a sort of microfiche viewer on a computer, with digitised images taking place next to raw textual data on screen. Of course that was a bit of a gimmick really for what was just a nice and clever little database system.

You move the little white square in the top right-hand corner about on the

## Superbase Professional 4

(Oxxi £299)

This is the big one, really. The only consistently updated program in this area for the last five years, and certainly one of the most powerful if not the most. Superbase Pro is a tiny bit overpowered if you only have a list of a few names and addresses or 20 records or CDs. If you want to collate stock for an international company on an Amiga, however, this is the only program that will do it.

It has its own personal definition language called DML, although it reads and writes SQL (Standard Query Language, as used in mainframes and most high-end PC database packages) like it was a native, and it also loads a number of picture formats too, like GIF and PCX. The only thing it won't do is design your databases for you, which is the hard part.

The really hard part once you've been running Superbase Pro for a while is once you know all the capabilities you're a little bit spoiled for choice about how you create your databases. You can have simple text-only affairs, or you can make standalone databases for other people to use which have graphic screens with custom buttons and all manner of hyper-media-type effects and twiddles.

You can load, store, and retrieve "billions" of entries according to the blurb, although personally I've yet to input anywhere near even hundreds of entries. The performance is very good, but you can rest assured that you're paying for it through both nostrils.

The only black spot is that the printer support is Prefs only, which is OK for text but text with graphics... hmmm. This is one area that really should be looked at with perhaps special drivers being written to optimise the quality on even dot matrix printers.

Also, yes I know it's just dropped in price, and although some (especially Oxxi) would say you can't get this power for this price on any other machine, I'd say look again. Surely the R&D costs have been recovered by now, and many people would benefit from having a product like this at a more manageable price.

That minor niggle aside it has to be said clearly that SBPro is most definitely the industry standard, and it'll take a very big program indeed to knock it off that particular perch. The power of this program is intoxicating, and it makes all the

not as fast it is certainly cheap. The suite approach to productivity software is good in one sense, in that it's a good (and very cheap) way to get up and running and find out which of the programs you really need. Once you've done that you can add a standalone program for each of the modules and then finally discard it.

Works! is pretty good overall, but the programs lack a little design or just plain omph. I always prefer to use standalone myself, although a beginner would probably benefit from such an easy integrated approach. Check out the Gold Disk suite and see which one you like best, before you shell out on this one though.

## Works! Platinum Database (MSS £89.95)

...ure version of your data, and just like a microfiche viewer the expanded view filling the left side of the screen moves about. The system is what you might call flat file, with all the records laid out on one sheet. When the mouse is clicked on a certain entry on the main sheet, a box comes up showing you the full listing with all the fields displayed.

Although MFF has just about disappeared now, you may find it around in some places, and if you can get hold of it it's a bargain. A very useful base for addresses and phone numbers, although it lacks real meaty report formats which you might want for larger and more complex applications.

Released as part of the Works! Platinum Edition (a suite of programs covering all aspects of the productivity spectrum), the database module is a fairly new revision of a previous product called Organize! and although somewhat aged it has a number of very nice features, like 128 fields, 4.2 billion possible records, compatibility with dBase III file structures, as well as some extensive mathematical functions.

Not too shabby for a program of this size. Although not as meaty as Superbase, it does have a lot of features, and while



## Jargon buster

**Card File:** A database in which the records are stored as if they were cards in a card file, that is to say you see one card at a time in alphabetical order.

**dBase:** The PC program and format which dominates the field. If your program doesn't emulate or use this file format you could find yourself up the creek without any toilet tissue.

**Field:** An area on the screen in a database program which can

contain an item of data. Used for searches and comparisons of your data.

**Flat File:** The opposite of card file, where all records are stored on one big sheet.

Personal says it all – it's a personal database system. Meant less for the likes of General Motors, more the likes of Gerry Morris.

This was what Superbase used to be like before it went professional and through four versions. The VCR controls are the same, although because it's an earlier and smaller program, it doesn't quite have the technical punch and sophistication of the bigger program.

Sure, this doesn't mean that it's less of a program for being more elementary, but before you decide on this baby as your data cruncher, you'll have to figure it – are you turning around a few hundred bits of data or several thousand? Is Personal going to croak before you've done the job, or is it going to cover your needs perfectly?

Don't get me wrong, it's a good solid program in its own right (you know that because you got 1.0 free on the cover of our May issue), but it's strictly for nickels and dimes data storage and retrieval. If you want a club database or a collection base of your videos, stamps or model cars, then this is perfect. If you find you need something a little more corporate and massive, then you may have to look at Superbase Pro 4. Sad but true.

Puts me in mind of a pumped up Ford Fiesta XR2. Speed and flash all in a compact and versatile package, but slightly laddish and not really good at any one thing. For beginners only.

## 6. K Data

A Ford family saloon, and no mistake. The 90s model will be more streamlined and sporty looking, but underneath it's the same reliable but slightly limited model.

## 7. AmiBase Pro III

Cheap and quick like an old Capri. A bit flashy with its graphics interface and fast enough, but still hanging onto its roots, in the case in the public domain. And just like the Capri, a brand new version will be out soon.

## 8. Works!

An all-terrain vehicle, four wheel drive look alike, jack of all trades and master of none. A bit funny looking on the road, but bags of scope. Pay out for the real thing when you find out which job you like the best.

## Summary

There's not much of a race on here, with Superbase coming out ahead by several car lengths every time. Nobody else is trying very hard to emulate their success on the grid, and most of the other contenders are either in the pits or soon to be out of the race.

Some budget models are worth a look, but first you must decide what you want the package for. Just ripping down in Sainsburys on Saturday, or burning up the strip down in St. Tropez?

## AmiBase Pro III (Amiganuts £10)

AmiBase Pro started life as a PD program, and this shows a little in the slightly flashy design. The quality of the program is another thing, and although written in compiled Amos it's actually very good. Again, you should have had a taste of this when version 2 was released on our CoverDisk a few months back.

Using the program is easy, navigating around it using a series of buttons on the screen, supplemented by a series of drop down menus for some of the more complex functions.

The support disk comes with a group of utility programs which perform tasks like formatting a special data disk for your data, and version 1.2 of the program has two more programs than previous versions.

These programs are called MemDel and MemSort, and they are for people with very large files, who find the built-in "delete records" and "sort records" functions are too slow.

They work by loading the data file into memory, doing the deleting or sorting

required, and then re-saving back to disk again. It's said you'll notice a significant difference in speed. These programs will only work with files of length around 2,500 records, although moves are under way to deal with larger files, and an updated MemDel and MemSort should be available in 1.4 very soon.

For the price you'd be hard pressed to find something as good. So it's not dBase compatible, but what do you want for a few quid, flippin' **AC** Superbase?

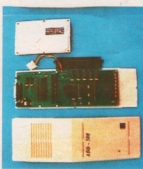

Stevie Kennedy  
builds a better  
startup-sequence

MyDisk is beginning to look a bit crowded, but there's still plenty of space for more programs.

So far in the beginners' series we have built an auto-booting disk (MyDisk) from the ground up, equipped it with a Shell so we can talk to it, and the correct files to enable simple printing to take place. It's now time to go back to the startup-sequence and fill it out a bit.

We left MyDisk's startup-sequence in a pretty sorry state last time we visited it. It has the bare files needed to load Workbench and set up Shell, but that's all. However, there are several vital commands we haven't yet added, without which our disk would be in trouble.

This month, we'll pad out the startup-sequence and find out just what some of these more exotic-sounding commands do.

The first addition is Setpatch, which should always be right at the beginning of any startup-sequence. This command is designed to "patch" certain parts of the Kickstart ROM, which means it modifies the operating system in RAM.

Some of the modifications are bug fixes, others are minor tweaks and your disk will still work without them, but for compatibility with all properly coded programs Setpatch should always be run.

One annoying feature of the Setpatch command is that it splices a long list of patch reports to the screen when run, so to avoid our startup becoming untidy, we'll use redirection to steer this output away from the screen.

As mentioned in previous columns, redirection is the technique whereby output from a program or command is sent to a device other than its default.

Most AmigaDOS commands default to the screen, but others will send output to

the printer and so on. Using the redirection symbols < and > we can send it anywhere we please, but as we just want to get rid of the Setpatch output without having to see it, we'll send it to the Amiga's version of limbo – the NIL device.

This is just another way of telling the Amiga to scrap something – the device doesn't exist as such – so fire up ED and add the following command to the start of MyDisk's startup-sequence:

```
SETPATCH <NIL;
```

Of course, Setpatch isn't on our disk as yet, so open Shell and type:

```
COPY C:SETPATCH TO MYDISK:C
```

to avoid all those nasty "unknown command" headaches.

The next command, Setmap, requires a bit more setting up. This command is used to impose a software "keymap" on the keyboard so that it responds correctly for the country in which the Amiga is being used and the layout of the keyboard itself.

Without a British keymap, you will have to search around the keyboard for certain symbols. For example, the hash mark "#" suddenly appears where the pound sign should be, and the pound sign itself becomes very elusive.

Keymaps need their own special directory in the DEV5: drawer, so type the commands:

```
MAKEDEV MYDISK:DEV5/KEYMAPS
COPY DEV5:KEYMAPS/GB TO MYDISK:DEV5/KEYMAPS
```

to set up the GB keymap on your disk. You will also need the Setmap command,

MYDISK SHOULD NOW LOOK  
LIKE THE DIRECTORY TREE  
SHOWN BELOW.  
AS YOU CAN SEE, IT IS FILLING  
UP AT A RAPID RATE OF KIBIBYTES.



which usually resides in the System drawer, so type:

```
COPY SYS:SYSTEM/SETMAP TO MYDISK:SYSTEM
```

Notice the funny #? symbols we used above? These constitute the AmigaDOS "wildcard". A wildcard makes it possible to type in a filename then tell the Amiga to ignore files with the same extra characters.

The wildcard can be treated as any number of extra characters, so in the example above the file Setmap.info is copied across as well.

The startup-sequence entry to enable our keymap is simply:

```
DEV5:SYSTEM/SETMAP GB
```

which you should insert after the line containing the Setpatch command. You don't need to tell the Amiga where the keymap file is kept, because it knows to look in the DEV5:KEYMAPS/ directory.

If it doesn't find the keymap it's looking for it will tell you, but as long as you've followed the columns so far this won't happen.

Another standard command you will find in the vast majority of startup-sequences is the AddBuffers command.

This is used to set aside blocks of memory to act as a RAM cache for your floppy or hard drives, thus speeding up read/write

operations. It is always a good idea to use addbuffers where disk space and memory permits, so we'll add it now.

Add the following line just below the Setmap command in your startup-sequence:

```
ADDBUFFERS <NIL; 40K; 10
```

This simply tells the Amiga to add ten buffers to the internal drive, which will use 5k RAM (512 bytes per buffer), and instructs it not to bother us with a report.

You can add lots more buffers if you want, but anything more than about 20 will have little effect other than to eat up more memory.

To put the AddBuffers command in our C: directory, just type:

```
COPY C:ADDBUFFERS TO MYDISK:C
```

and now every time MyDisk boots up, the internal drive will have a little more breathing space.

On to the next addition. Failat is a strange command in that it allows the user to tell the Amiga where to drop dead. An AmigaDOS script such as our startup sequence will execute until it reaches a line containing an instruction it cannot properly carry out for one reason or another. In these

## This month's jargon

### Error return codes

These codes, ranging from five to over 30, report the severity of any errors which have occurred in a script file. The boobie I made a couple of months ago will have made you all familiar with the message:

```
LOADWB FAILED RETURN CODE 20
```

which is just the Amiga's way of saying that the return code indicates that the error was sufficiently serious to halt boot-up. Note that if you had used the command:

```
FAILAT 21
```

before the LoadWB command, the script would have attempted to carry on executing.

### Multiple argument parsing

This is a very techie jargon term given to many Workbench 2.04 commands' ability to carry out their function more than once with the same command. This means that you can type:

```
DELETE FILE1 FILE2 FILES ... and so on
```

rather than type DELETE three times with the separate file names.

cases, an error "return code" is generated.

These can vary in severity, but normally a return code of 10 will cause an alert, with the script continuing to execute, and a return code of 20 will stop the script in its tracks.

When we have a very long script it is usually a good idea to raise the Failat level to a point where even if something drastic goes wrong the remainder of the script will execute and leave us to fix the problem afterwards.

The command used in this case is:

```
FAILAT 21
```

which sets the fail level above the usual drop dead 20 barrier. Add this line below the Addbuffers command in your startup-sequence. It is possible to set the Failat level to above 30, but this is not a good idea.

Error return codes of 30 and over are generated by very serious faults in a script, so unless you want a script to run wild until manually broken into, it's best to leave the Failat level at 21.

Let's race on to the next one. When a disk boots up, the Amiga will often create a temporary startup-sequence file, and there are many programs such as text editors and so on which will do the same. The directory used is called T: and unless you tell the Amiga otherwise it will look for this on the disk itself.

To avoid having temporary files written to what you may in the future want to be a write-protected disk, or to help avoid a disk being cluttered up with unwanted files, we create a T: directory in RAM and use an Assign command to redirect all temporary files to it.

First, copy Assign to MyDisk using the command:

```
COPY C:ASSIGN TO MYDISK:C
```

The lines we'll need in our startup-

sequence are:

```
MAKEDIR RAM:T
ASSIGN T: RAM:T
```

so add these to your startup-sequence now. In addition, Workbench 1.3 users should insert the following lines:

```
MAKEDIR RAM:ENV
ASSIGN ENV: RAM:ENV
MAKEDIR RAM:CLIPBOARD
ASSIGN CLIP: RAM:CLIPBOARD
```

and Workbench 2.04 users should edit the original two lines to read:

```
MAKEDIR RAM:T RAM:ENV RAM:ENV/STS
COPY MALL: ENVARC: RAM:ENV ALL QUIET NOER
ASSIGN T: RAM:T
ASSIGN ENV: RAM:ENV
ASSIGN CLIP: RAM:CLIPBOARD
```

Notice that the Makedir command under Workbench 2.04 can be made to create several directories with one command. This

is called "multiple argument parsing" and is a handy feature of many commands in Workbench 2.04.

The above blurb has probably given you some food for thought, but what we have done is really quite simple. We have set up a temporary directory in RAM which we've made the Amiga use by assigning it the logical name T:, and we've set up two other directories called ENV: and CLIP:.

Don't worry about CLIP: for now, as it is usually only used by the Clipboard device, which we don't have on the disk yet. The ENV: directory, however, is much more important. This is where "environment variables" are stored for use by AmigaDOS, and under Workbench 2.04 it is where the Workbench prefs files are kept.

A prefs file under Workbench 2.04 is generated by each of the programs you find in the Workbench prefs drawer, and at first will contain the default settings.

As soon as you change, say, the colour scheme and select Save, the new prefs file is saved in the Prefs/Env-Archive/STS drawer ready to be loaded up next time you boot.

In other words, when you change your Workbench pattern, palette, font, or just about anything else, the new defaults are written to disk, but they are not used when you reboot unless copied to the ENV:SYS directory in RAM by your startup-sequence.

The directory from which your prefs files will be copied when a 2.04 disk boots up is ENVARC:, which is AmigaDOS's logical device name for the drawer on your disk in which they have a permanent home.

To ensure that this directory exists, type the following lines:

```
MAKEDIR MYDISK:PREFS
MAKEDIR MYDISK:PREFS/ENV-ARCHIVE
MAKEDIR MYDISK:PREFS/ENV-ARCHIVE/STS
COPY ENVARC:STS TO MYDISK:PREFS/ENV-ARCHIVE/STS ALL
```

This will create the relevant prefs and env-archive drawers, then copy all your own Workbench prefs files across to MyDisk. If

you have never changed the standard preferences settings for Workbench, don't worry as the default settings are saved on disk in any case and will be copied to MyDisk instead.

There's one other file Workbench 2.04 which users will need in relation to the prefs settings. IPrefs is the command used to read all the prefs files and pass the information to Workbench and it should be included in the startup-sequence right after the line copying ENVARC: files to RAM:ENV.

To do this, first copy IPrefs to MyDisk with the command:

```
COPY C:IPREFS TO MYDISK:C
```

then edit your startup-sequence to include the simple line:

```
IPREFS
```

after the COPY ENVARC: line. IPrefs will launch itself, run in the background and keep track of any prefs changes made. It will then pass any changes made by the user through the prefs programs to Workbench, and reset Workbench if necessary when a change is made.

OK, let's take a breather and look back over what we've accomplished. The MyDisk startup-sequence was a fairly diminutive little chap until this month and, although it was sufficient to enable auto-booting, it failed to carry out several more or less important startup jobs.

We first of all made sure that Setpatch was run to keep our house in order, then used Setmap to force the keyboard into British mode.

At the same time, we found out what redirection does and added some memory buffers to the internal driver, thus making it work faster and smoother. So far so good.

## Stickier

Next, though, things started to get a little stickier. If you feel confused about anything we've covered from Failat onwards, just sit back and chew it over for a couple of minutes.

The Failat command and our brief look at error return codes shouldn't provide too many difficulties, but the hefty amount of directory building to enable a T: directory and to copy the Env-Archive files to MyDisk could easily be confusing.

I'm afraid there's not much we can do about this for now. With a sound – if painfully gathered – base of knowledge on the sort of well hidden operations we've discussed this month, you will be much more able to deal with seemingly random crashes, freezes, or error messages.

In a similar vein, we'll look next month at the most common error messages you will encounter, what usually causes them, and how to get around them. Until then, may your Amiga be free from the little so-and-so.

## This month's commands

We've covered the following commands this month:

ADDBUFFERS, SETPATCH, SETMAP, FAILAT, ASSIGN, and IPREFS

Their usage should have been sufficiently explained in the column, but we will be returning to some of them over the next few months, so watch out for more detailed explanations as we go along.

### COPY with arguments

The Copy command we used in our startup-sequence this month went something like:

```
COPY C:FILES ALL QUIET NOER
```

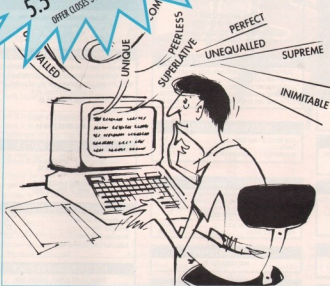
The arguments attached to the command tell it to copy all the files in the indicated directory, to do so without reporting to the screen every time a file is copied, and not to show a file requester if a file cannot be found.

Most AmigaDOS commands have several optional arguments which can be used to make the command more flexible or powerful, and we'll be looking at them as we need them.

**A**rcadia, or Arkanoid, or Breakout (the game has had many names and variants), is one of the all-time classics, and a direct ancestor of modern puzzle arcade games such as Tetris.

The object of the game, for the dozen or so inhabitants of the planet who don't already know, is to clear a screen of bricks using a paddle and a ball.

When the game starts you will be presented with the simple first screen showing a plain wall of bricks, at the bottom of which will be your paddle and a ball, which will be your paddle and a ball. Move the paddle from side to side with the mouse, and click the left button to release the ball and start the game.

The ball will fly at an angle towards the bricks, removing the one it hits, then bounce back towards the bottom of the screen.

Your task is to intercept it with the paddle and send it bouncing back up again before it goes out of play. Fail to do so and you lose one of your five balls, and when all of them have gone the game is over.

The screens become progressively harder as the game goes on, with bricks appearing closer to your paddle, making it harder to react to the bounce of the ball, and there are some bricks which take two or more hits to remove.

To complicate things a little more, there are power-ups to collect and a couple of mobile obstacles to avoid.

The simplest of these are the balloons, which just float around until the ball or paddle hits and destroys them. However, they can be a real pain when they unexpectedly deflect a ball so that it goes out of play.

## Disastrous

Other, more dangerous hazards are the stars which when they hit your paddle freeze it for a couple of seconds. This can be disastrous when you're rushing across

the screen to catch a speeding ball.

Power-ups come in seven flavours – Bomb, Hardball, Slow down, Extra ball, Magnet, Elongate, and Wave end. Bomb will remove all balloons on-screen when it is collected, Hardball turns your ball into a small red dot which ploughs through everything it touches, Slow down reduces the speed of the ball, Extra ball does what it says, Magnet makes the ball stick to your paddle, Elongate gives you a double width paddle, and Wave end clears the screen and takes you to the next level.

All power-ups appear in random positions and float down the screen, so all you

have to do to collect them is touch them with the paddle before they disappear at the bottom. Remember that any active power-up is cancelled by another, so if you have something handy like Hardball active it's probably best to give, say, Slow down a miss.

The level designer is used to create your own custom games, and by using it you can create levels with bricks laid out in any pattern.

Designing your own levels is a breeze, controlled by simple mouse clicks to place the bricks, and there are only two menu selections, one each for colour and brick value.

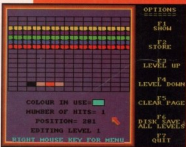
The right-hand side of the screen has a list of function key controls for loading, saving, and moving through the levels, so you shouldn't need instructions other than to remember to store a level (F2) before saving it to disk.

## FileOfax

From the same author as The Directory Manager (TDM), FileOfax is a program for storing names, telephone numbers, and diary dates on disk in much the same way as the paper-bound original.

The program comes in two parts – the FileOfax itself (not to be confused with the trademarked FiloFax), and the FileOfax reminder.

The first is a calendar and diary program which is used to collect phone numbers, set up events you want to be reminded of, and so on, and the latter is run at the start of every day from your system disk or hard drive.

When FOFReminder is run, it looks for a directory called FOdata: which contains all recorded events, then decides whether you should be alerted to them.

Alerts are determined by the advance warning period decided upon when the events were set up in FileOfax, so if you had decided that you needed two weeks' warning of your mother's birthday and that happened to be two weeks from now, FOFReminder would kick up with an alert.

The only problem with FOFReminder is that it makes a lot of disk accesses. You can get around this in your startup sequence by copying your data and event files to RAM: at the beginning of the day, but if this is too much hassle for you, you can just allow the program to check for today's events once, then click on the FOFReminder window and press Escape to exit the program.

To get started, load up FileOfax, which will only work if you have booted from the CoverDisk or manually typed in the line:

**MODIO FORMAT: COM2023C:\UTILLIT\FILES\FOFAX\FOFAX**

The screen will open with a calendar representation of the current month, which should be accurate as long as you have a battery backed-up clock. This means A500 Plus/A1500/A2000/A3000 owners, and those who have upgraded their A500s with 512k plus clock will be OK. Owners of unexpanded A500s and those with the new A600 will have to forego the benefits of FileOfax or buy the appropriate RAM

upgrade with clock.

To move around the calendar on FileOfax, select Calendar Set from the menus or press Right Amiga-C. This will bring up a calendar screen with year entries going all the way to 2027 and a list of the 12 months in the year.

Clicking on the appropriate month and year, then on OKAY will return you to the main screen where your month will be displayed.

Entering and editing events – diary dates to you and me – is just as easy. Click in the box for the event's date, then simply select New from the Events menu and a requester will pop up asking for details of the diary date you wish to keep an eye on.

If you choose a date that has already gone by, FileOfax will say so and refuse to keep a note of the event.

As long as you're on the right day, you should be faced with a requester which allows you to note if the event is social, business, or other, what time of day it will be happening, and presents you with a brief note line text box for entering a brief note on what you should be doing.

There isn't a lot of space for long notes, but there's plenty for events like "Take the dog to the vets" or "Next issue of Amiga Computing out today".

Once you're happy with it, the event can be saved to disk by clicking on OKAY, or you can choose to repeat it using the REPEAT gadget.

## Regular

This handy function gives you the option to repeat the same event at regular intervals, making the recording of birthdays, anniversaries, and monthly events very easy.

To increase or decrease the intervals at which you'd like an event to be repeated, press the + and - keys rather than click on the gadget. You should then be able to set the interval in numbers of weeks, monthly, or yearly, and decide on the number of repetitions.

A second function of the main FileOfax program is the storing of phone numbers. To add a number to the list, select Add

Number from the Phonenumber menu, at which point you just type in the number and name of person or business to whom it belongs.

Deleting numbers is fairly self-explanatory, but searching for them is just a bit clever. The search routine will find approximate matches for whatever you type as a search string, so it doesn't matter if you type a person's name in capitals, nor whether you give the full name.

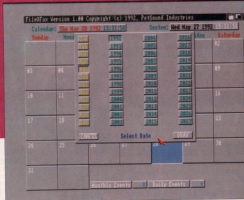
For instance, searching for Higginbottom Arthelboggie's number should not be the typing nightmare it at first looks to be, as "Higginb" should be a close enough match.

The program's final function is the jobs To Do list where the user can make a note of all those little jobs which really must be done.

The list isn't alarm related, it's more of a simple notepad where you can jot down anything you'd rather not forget, but in the unregistered version, most of the space is taken up by Chris Pettet's reminder for you to register as a shareware user.

This, of course, is the first job for anyone making full use of a shareware program, so select List Jobs, make a note of Chris's address, and get those livers in the post.

The calendar goes up to 2027, which should be adequate

and the clicking sound will be turned off in all your floppy drives. To turn the click back on, type:

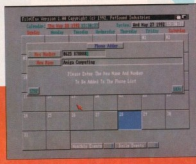

## MultiDOS

MultiDOS, like the better known MessyDOS, is a utility to enable Amiga owners to read, write, and format PC disks using their standard Amiga floppy drives.

This is particularly useful if you want to share graphics or text with PCs, STs or Macs, and is essential in some cases when you want to send files to DTP bureaux or other commercial organisations.

MultiDOS is ready to go on this month's CoverDisk, but has not been mounted. To do this, type the following command in the CLI window left open at the bottom of the CoverDisk screen:

```
PERFORMALL FROM DEVS:WORKLIST:MULTIDOS
```

If you keep an eye on the memory count at the top of your Workbench screen, you will notice that MultiDOS takes up a fair amount of memory when mounted, but as it can be easily turned off again with the command PKILLALL, this shouldn't present a permanent problem.

Once MultiDOS is operational, it treats the Amiga's floppy drives as both AmigaDOS and MS-DOS drives at the same time. For example, DF0: is also MD0:, DF1: is MD1: and so on, and to for-

mat a floppy in either Amiga or PC format, it is a simple matter of using the appropriate format command.

The standard Format command is used for Amiga disks, but for PC disks, the PCFORMAT command must be used. Fortunately, the author has seen to it that this is much easier to use than the MessyDOS equivalent, MessyFmt.

For a start, there's a Format specification file in your S: directory which gives the Amiga all the information it needs to set up the PC disk so that you don't need to answer a dozen questions as with MessyFmt. Secondly, the syntax of the command is very similar to its AmigaDOS counterpart.

To format a PC disk in your external drive (as long as MultiDOS has been mounted, of course), you would type:

```
PCFORMAT DRIVE NO0: NAME MYDISK
```

There are the usual options such as QUICK and NOICONS, full details of which are given in the on-disk documentation.

For the moment, it is enough to say that the usual AmigaDOS commands, such as Copy and Dir, will work with your PC disks, and that MultiDOS devices can be accessed via SID and TDM. This makes the Amiga a much more efficient PC disk management system than the PC itself, which says a lot for the Amiga's archaic rival.

The one major bug with MultiDOS is that if you copy files with names of more than eight letters or three letter suffixes to a MultiDOS device when using a Kickstart 1.2/1.3 Amiga, the system will crash.

This is because MS-DOS only accepts files with the shorter names, a fact which may seem strange to Amiga owners used to naming their files any way they want. Keep this in mind and you should have few problems with the program.

To help users install MultiDOS on a new floppy or their own Workbench disks, we've included a simple installer script on

the CoverDisk. This will copy the MultiDOS files to a disk called MultiDOS, so you should first of all give your Workbench disk this name using the Rename feature found in the Workbench pull-down menus.

Secondly, you'll need between 75 and 80k of free space on your disk, so delete some of the unwanted stuff before copying MultiDOS. If you are using a hard drive, the script will copy the relevant files to DHD: so as long as you have booted from the hard drive.

An alternative to renaming your new disk then changing the name back after the installation is complete would be to use an Assign command. To do this, open Shell and type the following command before running the install script:

```
ASSIGN MULTIDOS: "DISKNAME"
```

where Diskname is the name of the disk on which you want the program to be installed.

This is a smoothly programmed, attractive-looking puzzle game, created in Amos and good for a few hours' fun in between playing those full-price spectacles.

You are presented with a grid which contains a flag, hidden who knows where? Well, no-one at this stage, as the grid is covered up.

Uncovering squares, by pressing your Fire button after moving to the required position, may present you with a clue as to the flag's whereabouts – an arrow maybe, or a number telling you how many squares away the flag is.

Alternatively, you may uncover a bomb, which will cover up all the squares you have uncovered so far, thus dispensing with all of your clues.

Guess what? You only have a certain number of moves in which to find the flag. Dastardly programmers.

As the levels progress, the number of "friendly" clues diminishes, while the number of nasty bombs rises drastically, making the whole thing a lot harder.

At the end of the game the board is uncovered, *Strike it*

Lucky-style, revealing the position of the elusive emblem for you to umm and ahh at.

Also on this disk is an grossly understated and wildly funny Stan Laurel animation – well worth taking a look at, I promise!

## E-Type

17 Bit Software, Disk 1930, by Matt Hall

Based upon the age-old arcade favourite Asteroids, this dubiously-titled version upgrades the mono original and takes advantage of the Amiga's obviously superior graphical capabilities.

The asteroids, now 3D, spin as well as move. There are also outrageous power-ups which give you missiles about 20 times the size of your ship.

As you progress you are faced with space ships as well as asteroids, although they don't actually seem to do anything that the rocks don't – they are just different sprits.

Although this looks and sounds a lot nicer than the original, it's missing some of its predecessor's features – hyperspace, asteroids breaking into smaller, more dangerous rocks when hit – and so some of

## Virus Checker/Boot X

17 Bit Software, Disk 1954, by Dave de Pauw

A couple of competent virus checkers, boasting full Kickstart 2.04 compatibility, a rise in the number of non-virus boot

blocks recognised (to reduce the number of "false alarms"), improved R.O.L.L. and Saddam virus handling, keyboard control and several other refinements.

For a virus checker to be really effective though, it needs to be kept regularly updated, and this is where these killer really score.

Updates are available from virus-kills extraordinaire, the famous Erik Lavendal Sørensen, who is also offering, along with his group (who can best be described as the Guardian Angels of the virus world), a reward of \$50 for people who supply him names and addresses of those known to be



**DANGEROUS DEMOS!**

Most demos, it must be said, are about as dangerous as a half-set jelly, and about as interesting.

For all the programming genius that goes into making a cube bounce off a polygon into a wall while a dice spins in the top corner of the screen, the entertainment value of such efforts is marginally less than zero for all but the programmers who then immediately shout "I can do that!" and knock out more of the same to bore us all.

What is obvious is that all the programming knowledge in the world is of no use unless you apply it properly, creating finished products which are amusing, innovative and interesting – preferably all three.

Luckily, some of this month's demos (though, I must add, a minority) achieved this aim, and here are my favourites.

● **Yesterday NBS, Disk M430**, by Sanity contains some original graphics, which, although somewhat limited, are absorbing, as is the music – a selection of Pet Shop Boys-ish numbers, which sound in turns layered, professional and tuneful.

● **Front 242 NBS Disk D769**, by Symbiosis deserves a mention because it features the music of Euro-electro posters Front 242 (well I never!) alongside some suitably obscure strobe-ish pictures of who one can only assume are members of the band. Not particularly stunning, but original and entertaining.

● **Euphoria Amiganuts, Disk 1248**, by Jon Raichnie contains some truly original stills – both DPaint and HAM/ray traced efforts – which are impressive in their own right, not just because they happen to have been drawn on an Amiga.

It's all very New Age and fantastical at times, but the pictures never descend to the level of boring cliché as so many other competent but dull efforts manage to do. Music's not bad, either. Excellent stuff.



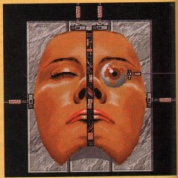

## Super Pacman 92

17 Bit, Disk 1973, by  
Pendle Europa

This is described by 17-Bit as the best PD pacman ever, and I'm inclined to agree. The graphics are smooth and, on the whole, faithful to the original.

All the usual features are there – power pills (dubiously referred to as "acid" by the programmers), fruit, eyes which shoot around the screen when you "eat" a ghost, and the familiar and frustrating wilting movement your pacman makes when he's been ghosted.

The difference is that the screen scrolls as you move, so at any one time you can only see a part of it. I'm not too sure why this is – maybe the levels are bigger than the original, but this does not really add any addictiveness to the game.

You also have to remember where there are dots you have yet to eat, as they're not all visible to you at all times. Still, I'm probably just moaning because it made me think a bit.

Generally this is competently programmed, very playable and full of features, even stretching to a top 30 scores chart. Well recommended.

As well as all of this, there are a mass of programs – some better than others, it must be said. Go-Mulko is a strategy/board game where you must get four pieces in a row on the board, playing either the computer or an opponent.

There's a kind of 3D Connect 4, a chemistry program which teaches budding chemists their periodic table and would be of use to GCSE and A-level Chemistry students, and a program which calculates calendars for any year from 1900 onwards. Hmmm.

Disk 2, however, was a mystery. Either I'm very stupid or very impatient – both are distinct possibilities – or all it contains

is a seriously rubbish bat-and-ball game. Remember those mono Binatone TV games that were popular in about 1924? Remember the worst game on them? Squash Practice? Yeess.

Still, an interesting selection, and I'm sure the bat-and-ball game was a practical joke. It certainly made me laugh.

## War

NBS Disk G279, by Philip  
G Harle

This is a truly interesting little game. It stands out immediately due to its impressive graphics, some of which wouldn't look out of place in the very best commercial offerings.

There's quite a lot to this game, but the basic idea is to use your space fleet to attack and destroy the opponent's – who can be either the computer or a friend.

Destroying the opponent's base is necessary to win completely, and this is achieved by moving your fleet towards the opponent's base on the grid.

Should you and your opponent both take a fancy to the same grid square, you can rest assured that a hi-tech space battle will ensue, which will be

staged either on a planet or in deep space.

Although these "arcade" sections are actually pretty naff, you still get very wound up indeed as you are always aware of the strategic implications of winning or losing.

It's a little bit like those old Spectrum football simulations, where the games, with their stick-men and jerky blobs, were responsible for emotional outbursts completely beying the extremely dodgy appearance and playability of the matches themselves.

You have a resource panel which allows you to allocate your resources – gained by conquering as much space as you can – to whatever you wish, from negotiating with an (unreliable) third-party who might just help you, to building more ships.

There is some digital speech, which is not averse to informing your friends that you are actually playing at "Vegetable Level", and which insults you continually. This has the effect of winding you up even more, thus adding to the fun when you see an alien blown to bits.

Along with the – admittedly also simple – Star Wars-style base attack sequence, these elements add to a game which, for all of its amateurish flaws, is my favourite of the month.

## Race Rater

17 Bit, Disk 1986

This is another horse-race prediction program. It allows you to choose your type of race and meeting from the various British courses as well as the time of the race; the horse's name and form; the weight of the rider; the animal's past finishing positions and so on.

It's not particularly well presented, and unfortunately I have neither the time nor the money to test it to see if it works, but should you be into this kind of thing, I suppose its as good as any. Let me know if you win a million with it, and then maybe I'll assess it more accurately...

# MIGA Update

**T**his month we'll be taking a look the latest hardware updates along with the usual assortment of software. To open the column we'll start with an upgrade to perhaps the best known software package in the business.

DPaint has long been the benchmark against which all other Amiga paint programs have been judged. With the release of v4.1 this trend is set to continue thanks to a series of long awaited additions and improvements designed to cure some of the notorious shortfalls in v4.0.

For existing users Electronic Arts are offering a two-disk upgrade which will cost £9.99 for new versions of the main program and Art disk#2.

The revision of the art disk is merely to upgrade the original Animation Player which unfortunately never worked on PAL machines.

If you only require the player, EA are happy to upgrade Art disk#2 for free. However if you're interested in the main program you must pay the £9.99 upgrade fee. Obviously any potential upgrader must include his or her original disks.

## What's on offer...

Perhaps the most interesting change from v4.0 is the inclusion of support for scalable fonts on machines running WB 2.0, and above. Employing this new feature is simplicity itself - all the user need do is select the font and type in the desired size.

The new font can then be shown as normal in the font view window and employed just like a normal font back on the canvas.

Running a close second to the inclusion of Scalable fonts is a major improvement to the metamorphosis option.

Previously the function was limited to brushes with a maximum width of 250 pixels. Now however, all restrictions have been removed and full screen metamorphosis is simply a matter of available RAM.

If there's one area that needed attention more any other it was speed, especially concerning HAM and -

some of the

more advanced painting modes. Fortunately EA have made a reasonable attempt to cure the problem with noticeable speed enhancements when employing features such as Blend, Smooth and anti aliasing.

Processing techniques such as Tint, Hue and Colourise have also been improved. Unfortunately enhanced speed with HAM is negligible at best.

More HAM enhancements include markers on the palette to indicate cell numbers plus additional selection features which make the cutting and duplication of colours much easier than before. Also the importation

and conversion of HAM brushes has been tweaked to improve performance.

Along with the scalable fonts perhaps the biggest improvement in the eyes of countless DPaint animators is the new option to carry stencils across frames - an infuriating omission in earlier versions.

Another animation-friendly change is the option to set the offset of the Toolbox and Anim control panel when running in extreme overscan via a new Tooltype, namely ToolLimit. The new positions are simply added to DPaint's Info icon and from then on will act as the default setting for the software.

## ADPro finds Fred...

After a lonely vigil as the Amiga's premier image processing package, ADPro has finally found a friend. In its latest update ASDG have added an impressive animation and batch editing program entitled Fred.

This new program comes as a standalone package in the ADPro bundle which can be run both with or without ADPro.

The primary aim of the new software is to enable the power of ADPro and ARexx to be applied without the need for total ARexx literacy. Although ARexx is a wonderful language, many users have neither the time

nor the inclination to master it. As a result, ASDG have finally done the decent thing and made the language, and in turn ADPro, much more accessible to the user by providing an intuition-based interface which will automatically apply certain ARexx/ADPro scripts while adding the option to use editing scripts on batch files.

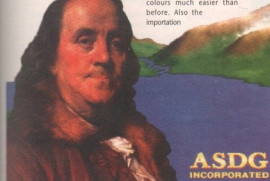
Now before all the existing ADPro users rush to the shops or start signing cheques for the upgrade, it must be stressed that Fred is not an ARexx macro generator - unfortunately. Although it does support batch editing in several forms they are strictly aimed at animation.

For example, it's possible to load in two separate images and instruct Fred to generate an animated fade from A to B using ADPro's Composition option - as in our example - over a number of frames, thus producing a new multi-frame anim from just two initial frames. This can then be saved in the file format of your choice and combined in DPaint or any other anim compiler.

Alternatively the output could be controlled by ARexx and sent to a still frame recorder. This is perhaps a classic example of the compromise between automation and ARexx literacy.

Although the program will compile the aforementioned sequence by issuing composition commands via ARexx to ADPro, it does not produce any additional scripts.

As a result, if you wanted to send the out-

put to a still frame recorder you would still require a standard AReex script waiting to be launched from Fred with which to control the output of each image to a display board and subsequently onto tape.

Just as in our still frame example, an AReex script would be required to complete the conversion prior to saving.

If this frustrating inconvenience can be ignored, the power of the animation options makes Fred the most impressive anim tool yet to appear on the machine.

The ability to auto-generate animation effects previously only possible through hardware intervention is sure to win the hearts of many animators.

Another amazing option is the ability to stretch or shrink time. Sound impossible, but I assure you it's true. For example, if you have a 30 FPS animation but know your display device can't possibly manage that speed, Fred can change 30 FPS into 15 FPS.

The information within the original 30 FPS will then be squeezed into 15. As a result the finished anim will appear much more fluid than by merely dropping every other frame.

Even more impressive is the ability to stretch time. If the scenario above was reversed and you had 15 FPS but required 30, Fred could generate the "twens" to produce a full 30 frames from the original 15.

The end result would be a much smoother anim than before. Of course it wouldn't have the quality of an anim generated with the correct number of frames initially, nevertheless it could turn out to be a real lifesaver on occasion.

Aside from compilation, Fred is also capable of a miniaturised playback of the generated anim, no matter what the format of the files being edited, even 24 bits.

It achieves this minor miracle by producing miniatures of each frame which are then

appended to each file. Once the editing and processing is over the animation can then be viewed as a thumbnail representation prior to compilation. It's even possible to have the miniature play back at the frame rate of your choice.

As ever, space is short so for more of Fred's hidden secrets and the latest enhancements to ADPro, I'm afraid you'll have to wait until next month, when AC will bring you the definitive guide to image processing.

There'll be a three-way head-to-head with the latest ADPro on one side, and CVP's eagerly awaited Mirage and Image Master packages on the other – both of which are being marketed as ADPro beaters. To find out more, don't miss next month's AC.

## Optical upgrade

In the latter part of 1991, Power Computing released their 128 optical which although initially expensive is perhaps the perfect answer for those among us who require almost unlimited storage.

Thanks to the cutest 3.5in floppies on the planet, adding another 128Mb of storage to your system is simply a matter of pushing the eject button and sliding another floppy (a rewritable optical costing only £30) into the drive unit.

In the intervening period, Power have been hard at work trying to squeeze more

speed from the drive, and by the time you read this article the first batch of the new Power 32ms drives should be on the streets.

Aside from general speed, the biggest bonus of 32ms access is that it could prove to be the ideal environment for the ever-growing band of direct-to-disk recording systems, all of which require at least a 32ms access time from their storage devices.

Aside from the new improved access, Power have put a little more into aesthetics of the drive by recasing their external optical, which by pure chance can be seen in all its glory on this very page.

## IV splitter shipping

After a long delay the IV24 splitter has finally arrived in the hands of eager IV users. Although the board has been available since late 1991, a great deal of the board's potential has been inaccessible due to the delay in supplying the splitter.

At long last, CVP have got their act together, and to their credit they've despatched a new splitter to all registered users free of charge.

Without the splitter it has been impossible – without investing in third-party peripherals – to take advantage of the board's PIP (picture-in-picture) option, frame grabbing or built-in genlocking abilities.

Thankfully, the board now comes

as standard with the new splitter plus an additional ROM upgrade designed to improve speed and allow original boards to use third-party software such as TecSoft's TVPaint. Thankfully this new ROM is also included with the splitter to all registered users.

The new splitter comes in two forms – the free upgrade version entitled the VIU-S, plus an additional offering in the form of a broadcast-quality alternative called the VIU-CT, which retails at £399 and should allow the IV24 to slip unnoticed into even the most advance Studio **AC** setup.

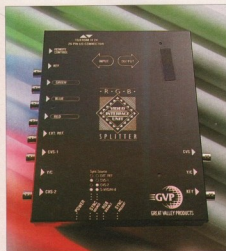

Over the last year, Progressive Peripherals have made a real impression at the AC offices, with a series of hardware releases that have impressed even the most cynical office hack. As a result, news of a dedicated video/audio mixing station early last year was eagerly waited.

After an agonising delay, their latest branchchild is finally ready to make its debut on the UK market. For a while we suspected a similar situation with the Blender as exists with its infamous kitchen companion the Video Toaster.

Thankfully this was not the case, and the PAL version is now safely entrenched at the AC offices. Before we dive headlong into the various control programs and utilities, it's perhaps worth defining exactly what the Blender was built for...

The Blender is basically a box of tricks designed to provide the ultimate mixing environment for video, sound and Amiga graphics and animation, via a single self-contained unit. Sounds impressive, and indeed it is.

The unit itself offers two video ins, one of which is normal composite while the other consists of separate RGBs plus black-burst, Key-in and BNC connections.

Monitoring is well catered for, with two identical composite video outs – one for output to tape and the second as an optional monitor out.

## Audio

On the audio side, the unit offers two single stereo inputs on the front and a single stereo input on the rear. As with all quality video kit, the Blender also boasts RGB-through. The Amiga's RGB out is connected directly to Blender and then passed unharmed to the monitor.

Fortunately the blender occupies the serial port, rather than the parallel, so it's impossible to employ DCTV on the same machine. Of course you could also record the DCTV element of the production first and employ the Blender to mix this with other graphics or additional video later.

As you may have guessed, at the heart of the Blender is a very impressive genlock which operates as the palette within which all the various video ins are combined.

Although the rear of the unit literally bristles with inputs and assorted outputs, the front is relatively bare. On the left are

basic saturation and contrast controls for the final composite signal leaving the unit.

Alongside the on/off switch are the twin stereo audio ins mentioned earlier with a pair of accompanying knobs for adjusting input.

With such an obvious lack of manual control, software is the key to the Blender, and in fact – apart from adjusting audio input and basic image preferences – all the Blender's options are controlled from a variety of custom-built programs bundled with the big waxy box.

As mentioned earlier, the built-in genlock is the heart of the system and is perhaps the ideal place to reveal some of the many features of this impressive product.

The genlock itself is easily the best VHS-based unit I've yet had the pleasure of using. Aside from the impressive array of effects and near-broadcast quality output, perhaps the most important plus is its flexibility, which far outstrips all its competitors in the VHS market.

The keying options include Background, Invert, External, Luma and Notch filter. Some of the above are no doubt familiar but others may be a mystery. Invert can be found on most modern genlocks, while Luma keying is an option usually only found on hardware in the S-VHS bracket and above.

The Luma option allows you to define the brilliance at which an image will become keyed. As a result images with varying luminance or brightness appear to move back and forth through an invisible

wall as their luminance increases or declines.

The Notch filter is another unusual feature which allows the user to sharpen the keyed image. For example, if you want to display a detailed Amiga graphic above video signal, the notch filter could be used to sharpen the detail between the key and background image.

The price for the enhanced display is slight loss in saturation. Personally, I found it well worth the sacrifice, especially during titling.

Aside from the impact of various effects, perhaps the biggest bonus is the way in which the Blender can apply them to incoming signals.

The system allows for two video inputs, the Amiga's RGB output, plus a defined local colour. Thanks to the Blender's channel selection, a maximum of three separate signals can be combined within a single output image ready for recording onto a target VCR.

This may sound a little confusing, but practice it means you can have the two video signals mixed in the background while an Amiga graphic floats above

## Magic buttons

Once your effect is generated with the various mixes and transition times set, the next problem is where to store it, and perhaps more importantly how to apply it easily during a production session.

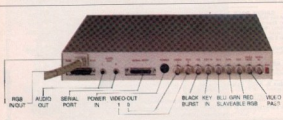
The answer is provided by the function keys which serve as a home for all your designer effects. These can be saved individually or together and then activated at any time by simply tapping the appropriate key.

To produce such a large number of on-line effects, the VBIPanel software uses all the function key plus the Shift, Alt, Ctrl and Amiga keys to achieve its full repertoire of 60 effects which sit invisibly in the background quietly waiting for the touch of the appropriate button during the midshow.

If, for example, you're using an external program that requires certain function keys, all is not lost. The control software allows you to cut and paste effects as required thereby freeing the required keys. These software essential keys can then be made transparent to the Blender and as a result work as normal.

# Print a tin can

Another example might be to have a title above a local colour which could slowly fade to reveal a video signal, while retaining the title.

The variety and combination of channel selection and mixing methods is almost infinite. All these keying effects can be employed either singly or in concert, while the channel selection offers countless possible combinations.

With such an array of possible mixing and locking options, the output control has to be something special. In the case of the Blender, all the possible configurations can be saved as either single events or in groups as entire sessions.

Each event can also be given timed transition between its primary and secondary state. As a result, effects can not only gradually be introduced but they can transform between channels as they do so, producing effects that as yet have only been available to broadcast TV and cable networks.

The option to time transitions between effects takes the occasionally tricky process of fader control out of the hands of the user and instead uses predefined mix levels and timed transitions to realise fades.

### Results

The beauty of a software-driven genlock and mixing environment is the fluidity of transitions which produces extremely professional results. The fade rate can vary from just 0.04 of a second right up to ten seconds. It's at these longer fade times that the benefits of software control really make their mark.

A gradual fade over ten seconds from video to local colour with titling still happily scrolling away is the sort of effect that the Blender was built for, and would be difficult if not impossible to better with a manually-driven system.

Having said that, even at high speed the

system is still impressive. For example, one source can be exchanged for another instantly but with perhaps a flash of a "theme graphic" or maybe a tiny blip of brilliant colour between edits to emphasise the change.

Programmable genlock effects aren't the only options available from the VBPanel control software - in fact, each of the 60 available options can have audio control added. Like video effects, audio changes can be given a definable mix and a transition time in which the new mix is to be achieved.

### Flexibility

As well as sound and vision, AmigaDOS adds even more flexibility thanks to the control software's ability to launch external programs as part of an event.

As a result, a single event could consist of a genlock effect with a timed signal transition, an audio fade over a defined

period and an external program perhaps loading and displaying a still or maybe playing a sample. All this from a single key stroke - automation at its best!

The only point worth remembering is that effects generally require an intro and outro. For example, to add a spinning animation over live video you'd need one event to fade up and a second to fade out, ready for the next effect.

As a result, the variety of usable effects in a single production is unlikely to consist of 60 radically different events, unless you're prepared for very harsh transition on the final tape.

Although the Blender's fades and genlock effects are indeed impressive, the Blender also offers a whole range of wipes with which to switch between available inputs.

As you can see from the examples, wipes are basically stylised reveal effects in which one image appears to overwrite the existing one during an animated sequence.

Numerous built-in wipes come as standard, as well as an option to create your own via another Blender program entitled MixMaster.

MixMaster is basically a DPaint-style paint program with enhanced animation. It's designed to get the best from the Blender's ability to employ two-colour anims as wipes. The resulting effect is that the white part of the wipe contains the new image while the black retains the original.

These anims can then be used indepen-

ently or as part of a larger script containing hundreds of normal wipes and your own designer animated variants.

Wipes are anims at their best when used between two video sources, although some impressive effects can be achieved when applied to animation. The actual image compilation is controlled via the VBPanel software, so you can easily define what will be wiped and which input will replace it.

My only complaint concerning wipes is the rather 70s look that's all too easy to fall into. If you're not careful, a masterpiece can soon look like a cross between a rather dodgy porn movie and an episode of *The Loveboat*...

Having said that, if you can keep your tacky tendencies in hand, some excellent effects are available with the impressive array of supplied wipes, all of which can be edited individually to produce countless variations on a theme.

Like genlock events, wipes can be assigned to hot keys for "live play" or alternatively built in to complete multi-wipe, multi-anims sequences which can then be run independently with either timed or mouse-activated transitions.

Both the genlock effects and wipes work perfectly together, offering easily the most versatile and advanced method of video production yet seen on the machine.

### Criticism

My only criticism of assisted control software is its rather amateur appearance which will no doubt put a few people off what is an excellent system.

Another annoying point is the system's need for an RGB plus sync signal as its secondary video source. This will definitely affect its appeal to amateur users.

Firstly, equipment which supplies RGB as standard is very expensive, and secondly if you already have good quality equipment you'll need to invest in a time-based corrector, or TBC for short, to convert your existing signal and supply the necessary sync. Again this is an expensive process, with the cheapest TBC retailing around £1,000.

The final cause for concern is the Blender's VHS-only output. Again this will reduce its appeal to professionals, but shouldn't really affect the home user.

In short, the Blender is a very impressive and original product which makes existing Amiga-based VHS post production methods look very basic indeed. If you're in the market for cable station quality from a single self-contained unit, this is the system you've been waiting for.

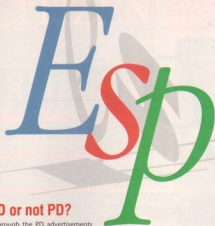

### PD or not PD?

Looking through the PD advertisements several months ago, I decided to buy the RSI Demomaker Pack from 17 Bit software, comprising of font, Bob and vector edition, program and utility disks for £4.

Because the ad stated nothing about postage or foreign penalties I assumed there weren't any, although I sent £1 extra just in case.

I have waited all this time assuming the package was held up somewhere, but in your latest issue 17 Bit are selling the pack for £5 plus 20 per cent for foreign orders!

What can I do? I sent the order months before the price change (or so it

seemed to me) and it cost the equivalent of £10 in bank fees and so on. I will most definitely have to consider not buying from the UK again.

If you sent your order to 17 Bit when they were advertising the pack at the lower price, they should sell to you at that price. However, they may not have received your order (did it go registered delivery?), or it may have arrived after the decision to change prices.

Most mail order companies reserve the

right to change prices without prior warning, so 17 Bit haven't done anything out of the usual by upping the price to £5.

However, the RSI Demomaker is not a PD product, being originally a commercial product which was circulated around British PD libraries without the author's consent, so you may not be legally entitled to buy it from 17 Bit in any case.

I should write to 17 Bit, explain what has happened with your order, and ask them what they can do for you. They're a helpful bunch and should be able to clear up the confusion.

Remember to send your letter registered delivery, though, so you'll at least know when it arrived.

### Disk dilemma

I have owned my Amiga for around 18 months and something has been niggling me for quite a while. When you have to reluctantly stop using a disk and put it back in your disk box... which way do you put it back?

I would like this point to be debated by your professionals at Amiga Computing. Personally I believe it boils down to your individual preference, but when people say to me "they, your disks are upside down!" I have no relevant

## Industry in error?

I am writing this letter in reaction to the poor state of the software production and computer retailing businesses, because I sometimes wonder whether the aim of producers and retailers is to force all Amiga users into piracy.

From the way they go about their business, I'd say a lot of the people in the industry only care about the fast buck and screw the consumer. What they're forgetting is that we hold the bucks and therefore the power and it's not a good idea to treat us like idiots.

In the time I've owned my Amiga I've seen it all – the selling of a beat-up demo Amiga as new, second- or third-hand software going as new, viruses in so-called new software, ridiculous over-pricing, and bugs galore.

However, retailers seem happy to take your cash then say "don't tell me you're having problems with the program – take it up with the manufacturer".

The computer industry is busy alienating the consumer and yet complaining when they turn to piracy. They spend thousands on copy protection – which is easily cracked – then pass on the cost to the consumer.

Here's the crunch, though – some copy protection systems actually send your drive to an early grave.

When I discovered this I nearly exploded. What right do they have to do this? Don't let this issue die! What everyone has to realise is that the industry is only too happy to let us be the patsy and it won't get in line unless we want it to.

Your magazine can raise the standards by rating

products properly. Stuff like F19, which had a bug in it giving you access to only a quarter of what it was supposed to, and Red Baron with its very slow screen update, don't exactly have the right feel for a flight sim.

Pirates may be the industry's favourite target, but without them I don't think they could justify prices for some of the junk they churn out.

They should cut back on silly packaging, cut out the hyper adverts, cut back on insane cash payments for useless licences, and invest instead on quality products at a reasonable price.

A survey in Australia carried out by the Prices Surveillance Authority found that 70 per cent of software is grossly overpriced.

The debate continues! It's significant to note that we've had not one single letter supporting the view that current prices are justified by quality, from either a customer or an industry insider, but that this sort of angry, disillusioned letter is becoming more and more prevalent in our growing mailbox.

Your tone is that of a genuine user driven to a cynicism which is only partly justified. True, many companies seem to over-advertise products which then flop after an initial massive sales boom, and some even release software which is incomplete or bugged.

However, the general quality of Amiga software, in both games and serious areas, has increased over the past year.



This is not to say that a drop in prices, the abandonment of expensive and normally pointless on-disk protection, and a move away from the disk-in-a-suitcase packaging approach would lead to an improvement in the quality/price ratio. It might, and it might not.

Microprose, for example, utilise simple, easy to break manual protection, yet their packaging and games are of such a high quality that they still sell well, despite being some of the most expensive on the market.

On the other hand, a shoot-'em-up might cost £10 less, have little or no fancy packaging besides the box, be protected by fearsome on-disk routines, and make the manufacturer an instant if unsustainable profit.

The thorny topic of disk damage resulting from protection routines is one which produces cries of outrage from games houses, but in my opinion the loud and very painful noises elicited by some games can only have harmful long-term effects on your drive. Perhaps this is one reason why so many AS500 drives pack it in after less than a year.

I wonder what the industry would think if they ever cared to reply? Ezra Surf promises to print any open letter received from any industry figure on this topic, so if they want to join in the debate they're quite welcome.

There are many schools of thought on this problem, and attempted explanations based on everything from parent-child bonding to psychosomatic trauma have been advanced.

In the final analysis, however, one must conclude that whether a disk is replaced slide down (the so-called Laundry Chute method) or slide up (the Dumb Walter Syndrome) is determined by the colour of your bed linen.

The message then changed to "Insert Superbase Personal in any drive" and the ever-decreasing circle begins. Also, the lack of any support for DFT is most annoying.

It is fair to say that we will have to wait months for little booklets that tell us how to play with the garbage data you have filled the disk with rather than to use the software for any sensible use?

It all seems to be a bit of a con. The only way to use this package, let's be to update it. I'm opposed to this because, let's face it, if the first version is unstable and virtually useless why pay £20 for more rubbish?

Pull your proverbial finger out and support the software as you promised, don't hamper it. No other Amiga

magazine would insult its readers' intelligence by making them wait months to use a free disk.

No other Amiga magazine has, only one month after releasing free software, produced a professional quality user's guide to that software and cover mounted it on the next issue.

I can only assume that you failed to read the disk pages in the May issue, in which we stated our intention to give away the user's guide, and that you haven't bothered to actually use Superbase Personal.

For example, by holding down the right mouse button and selecting Directory/Change from the System menu, it is possible to make Superbase use ANY floppy disk, RAM disk, or hard drive you have available.

In addition, if you think the database files on the original disk are "garbage" (they were put there to make it easier for users to experiment) you should just delete them.

If you don't know how to delete a file, I would suggest you consult our beginners' column or employ TDM, a directory utility given away on a recent CoverDisk which makes all such operations easy as pie.

## Deserted A500?

With the release of the A600, where does this leave us committed A500 users? As far as I can see, the A600 will be aimed solely at games players and with the extra cartridge slot Amiga games could soon be released exclusively on cartridge format.

The next step up is an A1500, but with its expansion slots and so on, more software will begin to be produced for the extra hardware, leaving the A500 out in the cold. I personally enjoy a good game, but I mainly use my computer for serious use, either through my own programming or by using applications packages.

However, if they all start to take advantage of the new machines, will my A500 soon be obsolete?

Despite the news, revealed exclusively in last month's Amiga Computing, that Commodore have officially dropped the A500, the software and hardware industries would be barking mad to follow suit. When you have an installed user base of over a million in the UK alone you don't walk away in favour of a machine which has only just started to sell.

Games software at least should continue to be released in A500-compatible versions for several years to come, and as the Amiga's basic chip set hasn't as yet changed to a great extent, most if not all serious applications released in the foreseeable future should work on the older machines.

As for the A600 "cartridge" slot, this is in fact a rather expensive 4Mb RAM credit card-type slot, and it is unlikely that manufacturers will release software in this format until it can be made an economical possibility.

**G**raphicStation offers many possibilities for tweaking, converting and transferring graphics around different machines, but it also comes complete with its own paint package in the form of Paul Burke's Picturesque.

Using this program, users should be able to create graphics to rival the output from most commercial packages.

To begin, let's load the program by either selecting it from the ShortCut menu or double clicking on its icon. The shareware message will appear first, and after a single mouse click you will be ready to paint.

Picturesque defaults to a lo-res screen, which is ideal for creating graphics for games and so on, but for static images of a higher quality we'll need the hi-res screen. Select Format/Hi-res from the Project menu to go into this mode.

## Default palette

Again, the default palette is fine, but if we want to paint, say, a countryside scene, we'll need a few more greens and browns than are available to begin with. To create a custom palette, click on the palette gadget on the lower line of gadgets, which will bring up a fairly standard looking palette tool.

The first job is to set up the colours we'd like as our deepest and lightest greens. You'll find a very dark olive colour fourth from the right of the colour bar, which you should click on to make it the current colour.

Now click on Ex (Exchange) and then set the second colour from the left (the lightest cyan colour). Notice that this colour is now olive and that the cyan has moved to where olive used to be.

This will be our darkest green. To set up the lightest green, click on the third colour from the right of the colour bar, then on Copy, then on the very deep blue colour in the middle of the colour bar.

Now that this colour is light green, click on it again to make it the current colour, then click on Spr (Spread), and then on the dark olive at the left of the bar.

See what's happened? Picturesque has created a colour "spread" from light to

dark green on one half of the colour bar. Do the same with light and dark blue on the right half of the colour bar, using the cyan we originally moved over to the right as the light blue, and the dark blue you should find on the extreme right. Simple, isn't it?

Before we return to the canvas, there's one thing left to do. No nature scene would be complete without the colour brown, which we as yet don't have on our palette. To make the new colour, click on one of the dark blues to make it the current colour, then play around with the RGB (Red, Green, Blue) sliders in the bottom left of the screen.

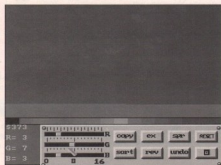
You can experiment for yourself, but a recommended set of values would be Red 9, Green 5, and Blue 3, which you can see in numeric form on the extreme left. This will give you a fairly all-purpose brown. Once you're happy with it, click on the boxed-out dot in the bottom right to return to the canvas.

## Competent

Unless you are already a competent free-hand artist, it would be best to start the scene by drawing a grid on-screen to guide you when composing the picture.

Choose a bright green, then click on the straight line tool (fourth from left on the top row) and draw horizontal lines every 50 pixels down and vertical lines at 100 pixel intervals.

When you've finished, you should have a grid of more or less square boxes, which you should now flip to the spare page by pressing the "J" key. Try pressing this key a few times to get the feel for how quickly the

spare page flips over. We'll be using quick flips to take a look at our grid as we paint the scene, so the "J" key should take a bit of a hammering.

Now to start painting. Flip back to the blank canvas and click on the Fill tool (the one with the large "F") and on dark blue. Fill the entire screen with this colour, as we should always start with the dark colours, then work our way up to the lightest. Dark blue is as dark as the sky is going to get, so this is the base.

Now select the darkest green and click on the solid rectangle gadget (second from the left, bottom row) and draw a filled rectangle starting on the left from about a third of the way up the screen and ending in the bottom right-hand corner. This will form the basis of our land mass.

From here on in, the shape and form of the landscape, and just how good the finished picture appears, is entirely down to your own imagination and artistic ability. For the rest of this column, I'll be concentrating solely on tips and techniques to make the budding artist's life a little easier.

For example, you'll probably want to introduce a tree or two into the picture. To start a tree off, it's best to position the trunk first using a solid rectangle of brown, then use the spray can's small spray size to brush in the branches as they spread out from the main trunk.

To change brush sizes, choose Spray Can from the Options menu and select one of the four sizes available. As I mentioned, the

small size is best for reasonably detailed work such as the addition of branches, so select this one for now.

Tree branches, unless you're working on a fairly exotic species, should always be drawn as a series of Y-splits, so start with a single Y shape, then add a few to the two branches of the original Y until the tree looks more organic.

Be careful not to overdo the branches, though, as from a distance you can rarely see more than a handful of the major ones.

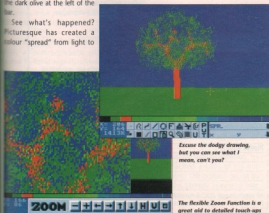
Try to ensure that a few droop downwards or your tree will look rather startled when finished, and will appear not to answer to Mr Newton's law.

## Airbrush

When adding the leaves, start with a small airbrush and a dark colour of green, then spray in a dense pattern towards the lower part of the tree and a lighter pattern towards the top.

Add a little life to things with progressively lighter colours, but try to avoid using more than three shades of green, and always avoid just drawing around the branches. Don't be afraid to obliterate the work you've just done by drawing over it as this is essential for the growth of a painting "out" of the canvas.

OK, we've looked at the spare page, the spray can, fills, and a few techniques. Next month we'll conclude our examination of Picturesque with a look at a few of the more advanced features. For now, experiment and have fun.

To remove the problem, drag an old Workbench disk out of your disk box and use SID to locate the file and copy it to your hard drive.

I found that where all tracks were 3,080 or so bytes long, two were not. On cylinder 1 both sides, the track length was approximately 300 bytes longer. Also there is no data on these tracks, not even the usual 11 sectors and headers. In fact the whole track was a continuous stream of X's/AAAA's.

Obviously this is for copy protection

and while I accept that I cannot make a backup copy I would love to know how it is possible to get an extra 300 bytes on a track.

Unfortunately, I can't tell you how they force some tracks to go above the usual limit for two reasons. First of all, I haven't a clue how they do it and have no desire to find out, and secondly if I did it would be irresponsible of me to tell the world. Sorry, but that's copy protection for you.

I am also thinking of investing in a flicker fixer, and wondered if you could advise me on the one to get. Are flicker fixers hard to fit in an A500 Plus?

I have also noticed when changing screen modes that the Super hi-res mode says it requires bypassing the display enhancer. Are flicker fixers software switchable?

Commodore recommend that Productivity mode is only used in conjunction with one of their own 1950 or 1960 monitors, and the screen warping you are experiencing seems to fit in with this.

It is more than likely caused by the Amiga's signal being slightly incompatible with the monitor, though it could be a problem with the monitor itself.

Have the monitor checked out by the dealer from whom you bought it and if it works OK on PCs and other machines, then it's the Amiga's productivity mode video signal which is at



fault.

The best flicker fixer for the A500 Plus is the ICD Flicker Free Video card, which gives a superbly steady display, and can be boosted using the new ICD Preferences program.

The card is available from Power Computing (0234 843388) and is quite easy to fit, though you will have to open the Amiga and invalidate your warranty.

## Old upgrader

I am a proud owner of an A2000 which I bought about four years ago, and although I am using Workbench 1.3, I still have the Kickstart 1.2 ROM.

I realise that most (all - Ed) new Amigas have been fitted with the 2.04 ROM and ECS, and I am now seriously considering upgrading my machine. Before I do, could you answer the following question?

- My machine is a revision 4.3 A2000. Would it be possible to replace my old Kickstart directly with the new 2.04 ROM without modification?
- Which of the PAD custom chip set make up the new ECS, and can I upgrade my machine to the new chip set?
- Would upgrading my machine give me 1Mb of chip RAM?

You should be able to carry out a simple ROM swap to upgrade to Kickstart 2.04 without any further modifications as the chip socket and the chips themselves have not changed in size, even on the new A600.

As for the ECS, you should be able to fit a Fatter Agnus (chip no 8372A) as long as your 4.3 board is a B motherboard and not an earlier A. You can check this by looking at the rear of the machine.

If it has a CVBS video out, yours is a B board and will accept the Fatter Agnus. However, you will still have to cut a track and adjust three jumper settings.

I would advise against this unless you are comfortable with electronics, but if you insist on having 1Mb chip RAM, a local dealer should be able to convert your machine for you. As for the rest of the ECS, Super Denise should fit OK, but the ECS Paula chip has not yet been released.

## Not so fast?

I recently bought an A1500 with Workbench 2 and really enjoy using the new-look interface rather than the older 1.3 Workbench. However, I'd like to

know how to use the Fast File System on floppies.

I formatted a disk using Super Duper v2.0, then copied my Workbench disk to it file by file and installed the disk. I then booted the disk and got errors after inserting the disk.

Is the FFS much faster than the standard file system? I use Fixdisk v1.2 which told me that the Workbench 2.04 disk was standard file system. I thought that Workbench 2.04 allowed FFS to be used on floppies, or am I mistaken?

Forget Super Duper when formatting an FFS floppy. It's best to use the standard Format command thus:

```
FORMAT DRIVE SP: NAME "whatever" FFS
```

This will provide an FFS floppy reliably, if a little slowly.

FFS floppies don't access appreciably faster than SFS floppies. The main advantage is that you will have an extra 35k or so extra storage on an FFS floppy. Remember that Workbench 2.04 support FFS floppies, but that a 1.3 machine will not read them.

To answer your last question, Fixdisk 1.2 can be get the file system wrong on hard drives as well as floppies. My GVP drive is formatted in FFS, but Fixdisk insists on telling me that it's the old file system. Just ignore the program when it does this.

## OU IBM

Having just bought an A500 Plus on the pretext of it being a birthday present for my daughter, everything seems so bewildering. This brings me to my main point. I am an Open University student contemplating one of the many computer courses offered by the OU.

However, the specification required is biased towards the IBM computer using MS-DOS. What's the best way to tackle the problem, both in terms of quality and price?

For your purposes, one of the hardware-based PC emulators would be best. The Vortex AToNce Plus is available from Silista Systems on 081-309 1111, and the KCS Powerboard is available from Bitcon Devices on 091-490 1919.

The Vortex unit would be best

suited to maths-intensive applications as it has a slot for a maths co-processor, but the KCS board comes supplied with MS-DOS and fits in the trapdoor, so it won't invalidate your warranty unlike the Vortex which you'll have to fit by opening the Amiga's casing.

You pays your money and takes your choice, but one other possibility is the GVP AToNce-based emulator. This fits inside the GVP Impact Series II hard drive, which might be the best long-term solution if you will be using PC application designed to work from hard drive (as most of them are).

The GVP's only drawback is that it is expensive, so a KCS in combination with a cheaper hard drive might suit your pocket more.

## Horrendous HAM

After purchasing my Golden Image hand scanner and being very pleased with it, I decided to answer your cries for better pictures in the gallery, so, scanner in hand, I transformed an all-colour postcard of a beautiful white horse into a mish-mash of grey pixels.

Using these as an outline, I traced the horse using DPaint IV and cleaned it up. Then I changed the format to HAM mode so as to be able to use a heck of a lot more colours.

I set my palette using lots of ranges from black to white and grey to white, then began faithfully reproducing the colouring from the original.

I wanted to have a dark grey running into a light grey, so I did this carefully by changing the lightness of the colour as I progressed. Why then did I end up with

such colours as green, blue, purple, and yellow?

The program obviously thinks that mixing light grey and a little bit lighter grey produces green. This is the only problem I have encountered with this wonderful program, and considering it's so wonderful it must be solvable.

Please tell me how! I'm a desperate man, and if I can't sort it out there'll be no horse for the Gallery. Gatted, huh?

HAM is supposed to stand for Hold And Modify, but in practice it means Headaches And Migraines, because this is what you'll get if you have to do a lot of converting to and from HAM.

Retaining your old palette is virtually impossible when converting to HAM, and tweaking a 4,096 colour range is a royal pain in the you-know-where. I would advise you take the original scanned image and load it into DPaint IV HAM mode and work on it from there.

If you still have problems, load the image into a 64-colour screen, save the palette (Colour/Palette/Save), then go to a HAM screen and load the palette in. You'll only have 64 colours, but you can use the spare palette ranges to create as many new colours as you'll need.

I'm not an art expert, so these "solutions" might be less than ideal. If any of our readers has a letterful of DPaint palette tips they'd like to share with the rest of us, I'd be glad to print it, so get scribbling all you Leonards.

## Beginners' Guide - a problem solved

For all of you who wrote in with the following query, we have an answer.

We told you to copy LIBS:icon.library to MyDisk:Libs to get over the problem of Workbench not loading on the tutorial disk. What we should have mentioned was that this is only necessary for users of Kickstart/Workbench 1.3 owners, as icon.library is built in to the 2.04 Kickstart ROM.

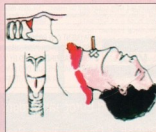

**A**fter last month's DTP feature, you might have come to a decision on the DTP package that's right for you, and you may even have decided that you've got all this publishing stuff down pat.

However, when it comes to actually printing the documents you've created on your Amiga, you soon realise that the complicated world of publishing is just beginning.

In this mini-series, I hope to cover some of the more ankle-wrenching potholes you might encounter as you struggle towards the printed word, in the hope that some of the confusion and unnecessary bumph surrounding the world of DTP can be dispelled.

A tall order, perhaps, but as long as you can shut out of your mind the garbled jargon and plethora of pseudo-scientific terms seemingly designed to keep publishing a closed shop, the printing process can be reduced to an exercise in common sense.

For the average Amiga owner struggling along with a 24-pin or bubblejet printer whose requirements from a print job are fairly modest, a great deal of the high-end terminology and technology can be binned from the outset.

## Attractive

This is especially true if you cast about a bit and find a local print shop where good old-fashioned printing can be had with the minimum of fuss and at very attractive prices.

I settled on the Keele University Students' Union print shop. Near the potteries in Staffordshire and run by the ever-smiling Pat Borsky, it's a haven for frustrated publishers.

Unless you are determined to go all the way to full colour glossy magazine printing, this is exactly the sort of print shop you should be looking for.

Pat and her team use an offset litho printer to produce everything from admin material and the on-campus magazines for the students' union to advertisements and flyers for local businesses, so they cover most of what an Amiga owner might want.

Local print shops in areas all over the country should do likewise if you're not located close to Keele. The process is sim-

ple. The Amiga user produces a document on his or her DTP package and outputs it to printer at the best resolution possible.

If you have a decent 24-pin printer or bubblejet, you should get good enough output for fanzines and the like, but for a more professional look it might be best to have the document laser printed.

This will mean printing your work to disk as a PostScript file, then transferring it to an MS-DOS disk (using the MultiDOS utility on this month's disk) so that a high street printing service can download it to their laser printer. Once your work is on paper, especially if printed by a 300dpi laser, it will be "camera ready".

The print shop can then make a printing plate directly from the page by pho-

tographing it to make an electrostatic negative on either paper or metal.

Paper plates are cheaper but can be used only once for up to about 2,000 copies of a document. Metal plates cost between £8 and £10 per page, but as they are more durable they can be used indefinitely.

## Which plates?

It follows that if your document is a one-off affair, you should stick with paper plates, but if you are printing letter heads, business cards and so on which might not change for years, go for the metal plates and when you go back for reprints you won't have to pay a second time to have plates made.

Including photographs in your document needn't be too expensive either. If

you haven't the cash for a scanner, and don't have access to one, you can usually instruct the print shop to have photographs screened, for which service they'll charge about £12 to £15 a time.

Screening is the process whereby an image is scanned and broken down into halftones for the printing press to deal with.

Halftones are just a series of larger and smaller black dots in varying densities which are used to represent lighter and darker shades of grey.

You will see the process in operation on newspaper front pages every day, and most cheap hand scanners will produce a halftone image for this sort of mono printing process. It goes without saying that if you're going to produce a fanzine or newsletter with several photos in it, you would save a lot of money by investing in a cheap 400dpi hand scanner.

Things become a little more complex and expensive when you start to look at colour printing, but the principles are the same. To print a basically black and white document with just the odd spot of colour for logos, special offer flashes, and so on, there are only a few extra steps to take.

Simply design your page as normal, use two or three colours where needed, then print the document using mechanical separation. Most decent DTP packages support mechanical separation, which is just the process of printing a page once for each colour used on it.

## Coloured bits

The black and white elements of the page print as normal without the colour parts, then a fresh page is printed for each colour in which only the coloured bits are printed.

This produces a set of three or four camera ready pages which are made into separate plates. When the document is printed, the mono (black and white) plate is printed first, then the printed pages are put back in the printing press to have the colours printed on one at a time until the full page is complete.

Using spot colour in this way, you can put together a document every bit as colourful as a local newspaper, and of much the same quality as long as you have a PostScript-compatible DTP package and access to a laser printer.

The process is relatively painless, cheap (at Pat's rates you could have 2,000 pages of double-sided A4 printed in three colours for quite a bit less than £100), and what's more it is accessible to human beings who don't speak the litho lingo.

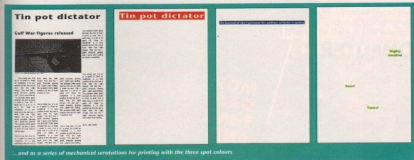

If you're a regular reader of the Updates column you may already be aware of Alternative 3D Textures from Alternative Image, which has been on the drawing board for a while and has now arrived in its final form.

Our second contender in the battle of the texture collections comes from Activa - the company responsible for Real3D - and is called Texture City.

## Alternative 3D Textures

Alternative's collection has hit the streets as a 12-disk set, plus an additional two free disks packed with assorted Real 3D animation files, tutorial images and example textures. We'll return to the freebies a little later, but for now I'll concentrate on the 12-disk texture collection itself.

As you might expect, the included images are impressive, as indeed are those of the opposition, especially when viewed in their 24-bit form.

However, it's Alternative's variety of image formats that may make them attractive to more than just the ray tracing community.

Unlike the Texture City collection, Alternative have put a little more thought into their compilation, and rather than a straightforward selection of 24-bit files, each floppy contains a single image which appears in a variety of formats.

To the 24-bit ray tracing purists, additional lower quality images might be of little interest, but as the Amiga moves ever closer to the roll of a multimedia workstation the ability to access a file in a variety of formats becomes ever more important.

The beauty of multiple format is continuity, a commodity which makes the seamless combination of multiple applications much easier. It's true that anyone with a copy of ADPro and a 24-bit image can create their own variations, but that's assuming you have £250 spare for the processing software.

Each Alternative disk contains the original 24-bit texture (400 x 400) plus a Ham (320 x 512), an eight-colour IFF (640 x 512) - suitable for Scala backdrops, a four-colour

## Texture City

As opposed to the Alternative collection, Texture City's assortment comes with only one version of the image which you can then manipulate yourself, given the necessary software.

Again unlike the Alternative set, the images themselves are provided in the jpeg format which drastically reduces the storage space required for each file.

Unfortunately this means that each image requires decompression prior to use and as a result there is a tendency for slight image degradation.

The collection comes on either disk or CD-ROM, along with its own installer which takes the liberty of installing miniatures of all Activa's available images in the various collections while adding the decompression utility onto your hard disk.



The images themselves are impressive and a good deal more varied than the Alternative collection, but with the cheapest set retailing for the £99.95 for 15, and the most expensive 60-image set at £250, Texture City is strictly for the very serious, or very silly...

greyscale (640 x 512) - ideal for either bump mapping in Real3D or altitude mapping within Imagine.

As mentioned earlier, the collection comes with the added bonus of two tutorial disks for Real3D which I must admit are an impressive sweetener.

The disks contain tutorial images showing how to apply various textures plus mapping information so you can to achieve effects such as clip mapping, chrome, spiral wraps and so on.

Aside from basic tutorials, the disks also contain animation files which will automatically recreate the images and environments shown in the tutorials, the most interesting of which has to be the water effect which can be seen in our example.

## Conclusion

The Alternative collection has a lot in its favour, not least its price. At less than half that of the cheapest Texture City collection

for only three images less, it's a comparative bargain, plus there's the added bonus of the Real3D tutorial disks.

On the down side, there's no support for DCTV Display files, which considering their relatively small size and obvious appeal to the average user has to be a big mistake. The

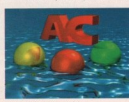
only other cause for concern is the somewhat less-than-video-spec image size on the 24-bit images themselves.

The Alternative collection are primarily wraps while the Texture City images are more akin to backdrops, hence their full video spec hi-res interface with severe overscan.

The main flaw in the Texture City sales pitch has to be the price, with even the cheapest collections coming in at a frightening £99.95 for just 15 images.

The second problem is that of inflexibility. If you're planning to invest, it's safe to say that a copy of ADPro is a near essential, along with a sizeable hard disk to store any decompressed files that you plan to employ.

Perhaps the collection's biggest plus is variety. In comparison to the Alternative selection, the choice of available images is immense, and if you're a professional user

who doesn't consider price his or her prime consideration, the option of hundreds of images as opposed to 12 could be the deciding factor.

For we mere mortals, the most interesting set in the Texture City collection is that of 40 images in either Ham or DCTV Display format.

Still at Activa's favourite figure of £99.95, they're far from cheap, but in comparison with the Alternative collection they nevertheless win hands down image per pound...

**L**ife can sometimes be quite startling, can't it? Why, only the other day I looked in my rear view mirror at some traffic lights, and saw none other than Inspector Morse in the car behind.

Well, OK, it wasn't really Inspector Morse. He was driving an Austin Allegro for one thing. And he had red hair and a beard. But the initial similarity was quite alarming.

Then there was the time when I dialled a wrong number and accidentally rang up Mother Theresa.

"Hello," said I, "Is that Mr Crisples Dial-A-Pizza?"

"Do you know what time it is?" grumbled an old lady's voice.

"You mean this isn't Mr Crisples Dial-A-Pizza?" was my reply.

"No, it's flippin' Mother Theresa" said the voice and hung up. Uncanny, eh?

But these startling events pale into insignificance alongside the sheer palpitation-inducing sight of the control panels for Virgin's Shuttle game.

The game comes with a poster-type sheet which shows you all the dials and switches for easy reference, and it could quite easily double as a three-man tent. It's big. And perhaps the most terrifying sight I've ever seen.

Shuttle is perhaps the most detailed and in-depth sim ever in the entire history of the universe. Every single knob and switch that's in the real thing is lovingly recreated here. Well, probably, I'm not about to start

counting them. The reason for this is that the shuttle is a million times more complex than any aircraft and so needs squillions of controls to prove it.

You can't just open the doors up in space, y'know. Instead you have to activate all the relevant motor mechanisms, seal valves and other technique things. If you didn't do that then the whole shuttle would be de-pressurised and all sorts of nastiness would ensue.

And yet despite the unprecedented hugeness of it all, it's not that difficult to get into. 'Tis true. The programmers have thoughtfully included a load of helpful features to show you the ropes.

Because, let's face it, even the most experienced flight sim addict would be entering stormy waters with this game.

So, you can redefine loads of options to suit your experience level. If you don't want to go through all the pre-flight palaver (about three hours of checks and initialising booster rockets, although thankfully not in real time) then you can start

the mission actually in orbit, or ship straight to the end and just land the thing.

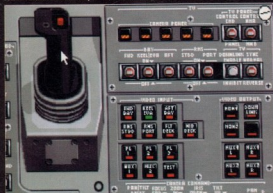
You can also have plenty of help during the mission. On the easiest help level, the computer shows you exactly what to do and which buttons to press so there's really no way you can go wrong.

As you get better and start to remember what buttons do what, then start to reduce the Help level and slowly set out on your own. Me? I'm still clinging to the help option for dear life.

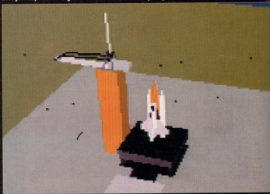

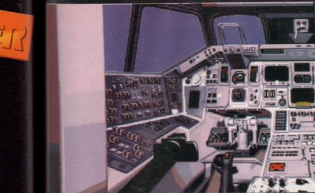

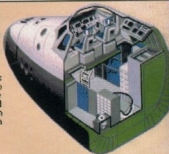
Or indeed, any excitement at all. Shuttle is not an exciting game. It's an intriguing and demanding simulator. It's not even a game as such, more like a learning experience.

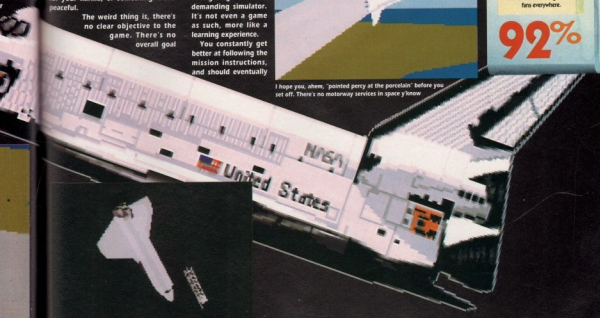

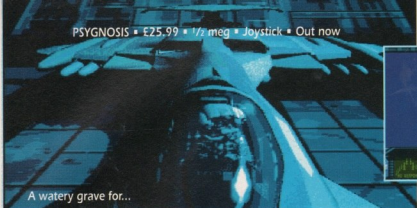

**S**tingray, stingray, diddle der der dah. Possibly the best theme tune of all time, I'm sure you'll agree. And not a bad programme either, when you think about it. Admittedly, it was just Thunderbirds with a fishy ting, but it was still a right royal stonker of a programme.

The latest game from the Pygries has a distinctly fishy tang as well. And there's good news and bad news. The good news is that another of those pesky nuclear holocaust things has devastated the planet, as nuclear holocausts tend to do.

The remnants of mankind have taken to hiding under the sea in colonies, linked by under-sea tunnels, as the sea is too full of radiation for safe transit.

The bad news is that the Spauricans have got their beady eyes on Earth and have taken over all the colonies, infested all the tunnels

and stolen all the beer. The last remnants of the human race flee into space and start plotting how they can get rid of the Spauricans. Now as any great tactician would tell you, the best way to defeat an alien invasion force is to send out a solitary ship with the puniest weapons imaginable. So that's what mankind does.

And in true arcade story-line style, no sooner has our lone hero blasted off than the spacecraft containing the last people alive explodes and leaves him all alone. So, he scowls, swears and sets off on a mission of vengeance. Yowzers.

It's a sort of 3D shoot-'em-up. A bit like Afterburner meets Starglider, but it somehow manages to avoid the good points of both. It's lacking the simplicity of Afterburner (and the depth of Starglider, lurking instead in a no-man's land between the two).

"The game of the decade" proclaims the box: Fib Central, kids. Aquaventure has been in development for years. Yonks and yonks. And yet with all that time, the game still manages to be a horribly shallow, and disappointingly tiny little thing.

But first, let's look on the bright side and pick up on the good points. Unsurprisingly, it's got all the usual Pygnosis frills and frills: bits, Smooth and fast 3D graphics, great sound, and FX and the first intro, since Blast 2. It's just a pity that the game doesn't quite match up to the standards set by the presentation.

For a start, there are

only eight main levels and they're all the same. In each level you've got to shoot all the solar panels before you can attack a pyramid which leads on to the next level. The only difference is that the higher the level. The more solar panels you have to shoot.

Each level is linked by the undersea tunnels, which are shown in wireframe 3D and are fairly confusing. They're fairly pointless, other than to pad out the game a bit.

At the end of each level, you get refuelled, your missiles are restocked, you get your energy back, and an extra weapon is installed.

Your extra weapons are activated by pressing the trigger, but (to advise you not to be fooled), I kept running out of energy and dying without anything hitting me.

I finally figured out that it was my extra weapon that was draining my energy, a fact mysteriously missing from the manual. Oh, and you only get one life. Mucho crapola, señor.

Given the amount of time that this game has been in production, it's ridiculously weak. On my fifth go, I reached level four - that's halfway through the game, fact fans - and was getting fairly sick of playing the same level over and over.

And so would you be, especially after paying full price for it. Watch this one sink without a trace. Very poor indeed.

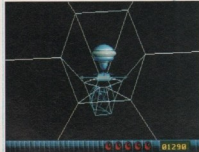

Or if you fancy a bit of Open University-style studying, then you can play an experimental game that lets you build a nest to your specifications and then watch it evolve.

Sounds a bit deep, doesn't it? Well, it is written by the same rock 'n' roll rebels who gave us *Sim City* and *Sim Earth*. Options and choices all over the place basically.

Whichever game type you're playing, the basic controls are the same. You're initially controlling one ant, who appears in yellow rather than the drab goth black outfits of his pals.

You use this ant to carry out more direct actions, such as exploring and digging tun-

nels. But by using the menus, you can set all the ants not under your direct control to do other stuff like fetching food or looking after eggs.

If you click on our yellow friend, you get a sub-menu that allows you to recruit other ants who will then follow you around - handy for attacking red ants' nests - or switch direct control to another ant.

Your priorities are to keep your nest stocked with food, with plenty of room for all the other ants, and to keep the Queen ant alive, 'cos without her there won't be any more baby ants.

You can also leave pheromone scent trails for other ants to follow, so you can lead them home, lead them to food or tell them which bits of your territory to guard.

However, ants being what they are, things don't go easy. Despite your best efforts, attacks from predators are bound to occur. Great big spiders scuttle about and eat all the poor little ants.

Charge into the enemy nest, find the red Queen and kill her and you've beaten the game. If you're playing a quick game then that's it - if you're playing the full game, then you move on to a new patch of garden. And you keep doing this until you've achieved total suburban ant bliss.

Well, that's the bare bones of the game. But just how exciting can a game about ants be? Unfortunately, the answer is 'not very'. It's an incredibly brave and original idea, but I found it very hard to actually get involved in it.

It's great fun to wander about the game for an hour or so, discovering all the little quirks of ant life (hey! it's educational, kids!) but as an actual game it gets fairly repetitive. Dig nest, get food, reproduce, raise army, attack red ants. And so on.

The graphics are great, with all the different types of ant looking suitably, erm, different and the predators look really nasty, especially the gargantuan spider.

Even the sound is good, despite the fact that ants aren't known for their musical tastes. So you get bouncy tunes, including a fanfare if you take on the role of Queen, with some functional FX.

There's also a brilliant 'silly' mode, where all the ants, eggs, and predators keep talking in speech bubbles. So the spider walks around telling everyone how cool he is, while the eggs wonder why it's so dark. And in battles, all the ants call each other names. It's totally pointless, and of course, totally excellent.

The 'silly' approach is mirrored in the stonking manual, which covers not only how to play the game, but also gives you a fairly detailed run down on ants in general, illustrated by cartoons and text book diagrams with silly speech bubbles.

This makes the 176-page tome a lot easier to consume, and gives the game a more approachable feel. And if after reading the manual you still feel stuck, then there's a step-by-step interactive tutorial to have a play with on-disk.

It's just a pity that the actual game is so uninspiring. Hardcore insect fans, or slightly eccentric strategy fans, will probably take it to their hearts, but I couldn't help feeling slightly disappointed.

At £35, rather than being bowled over by the ins and outs of insect life, I found that ants eat, have babies, have fights and then die. Just like us. Maybe that's the whole problem. A nice idea, but it just doesn't quite make it.

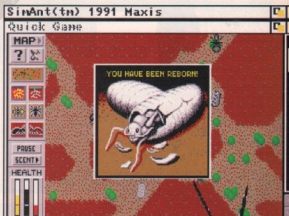

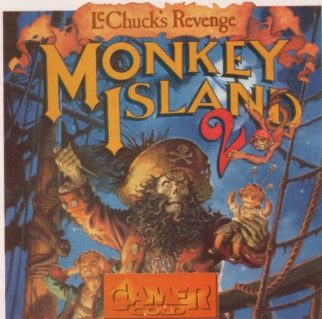
While we were away things have changed for our hero. Guybrush has grown himself a natty goatee beard and become a respected and admired hero. At least, that's what he thinks.

The humour's back as well, and it's rib tickling stuff. Oh yes indeed misad. All the way through it manages to spoof everything from *Star Wars* to the original *Secret of Monkey Island*, with little digs at people in general all the way through.

If anything *M2* is even daffier than its pre-

decessor, and its got the most ridiculous ending ever.

The control system remains unchanged, with the same commands only a mouse click away. The only thing it does lack is a drop command so Guybrush's pockets soon stretch to Tardis-like proportions.

There's no limit to how much you can carry, but the more stuff you have, the longer it takes to look through the inventory. However, it does eliminate the problem of choosing which items to take and which to leave.

It's also a very user-friendly game. If you're a beginner then you can opt for a trainer version of the game with some of the

stranded. There's no sudden death, and if you make a mess of a problem, maybe by forgetting to get a certain object, then the game will let you get it rather than forcing you on without it. This means that you are free to experiment with different responses and ideas without fear of being penalized for it.

Other points worth highlighting are that despite the incredibly detailed graphics and animation, the game still skips along at a fair old pace. Take note, Sierra. Even playing from the startling 11 floppies, it's smooth and swapping is kept to minimum. Ber-limey, eh?

Well, this is all getting a bit sycophantic so I'll go into "cynical old man mode" and pick up on some downers. Hmm. Well, my biggest problem is that the whole thing is fairly unsurprising.

There's been no great shake-ups on the style front. If I was feeling very brutal I could

be tempted to say that it's basically a remake of the original with cosmetic changes and different puzzles. But then, *Evil Dead 2* was a remake of *The Evil Dead* and it was tons better.

The other problem with games of this ilk is that once you've finished it, you won't be back; it may take you a long time to get there, but once you've done it the appeal vanishes. Yeah, it's nipping but you should be warned.

Apart from that though, this is horribly close to being a perfect game. It's certainly the best adventure I've seen for ages, and it sets the standard for future graphic adventures in the same way the original *Monkey Island* did.

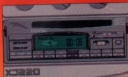

**O**uestion – what's the difference between Jaguar XJ220 and Lotus Turbo Challenge 2? Answer – not a lot.

To say Jaguar XJ220 has been warmly received by the computer press is a bit of an understatement. In fact some computer mags have gone so far as to give the game a four-page review and percentages bordering on the ridiculous.

I mean a four page review on a driving game? It's just not physically possible, believe you me I'm having trouble filling one page. What on earth do you say about a

Oops sorry my temper took over, I'm sorry, it won't happen again. Right what can I say now? Ummm.

Jaguar is good. In fact it's very good, but it's far too similar to Lotus 2. The graphics and sound are better than Lotus 2 which is fairly obvious seeing as though Lotus 2 was released a year ago – you know technological advancements and the like.

There is major difference between the two games and that is that Jaguar XJ220 has a track editor, thus allowing you to construct tracks from scratch or modify any of the 36 available.

This is a fairly neat idea, but in the end it's just another gimmick. Talking of gimmicks, remember the in-car stereo in Jaguar? Well it's back in Jaguar and for one reason only it's tons better.

That one reason is Thrash Pig – probably the noisiest, rocking tune since, well since ever really. As soon as you hear those wonderful

opening notes, it's time for a mosh frenzy. All the other tunes are a bit bobbins to say the least. A new nice little feature is the car radio with the option to tune into your favourite station. Let's put it this way – it raises a smile for at least three seconds, and then the novelty wears off.

One small

teeny weeny problem with Jaguar XJ220 is the Jaguar XJ220. It has a maximum speed of 213 mph. This little baby can do 0-100 mph in eight seconds. Now because of all this speed you'd think that the game was pretty fast... wrong!

In Jaguar XJ220 you just don't get any feeling of speed. For instance I was taking sharp corners at 200 mph and it just felt as though I was doing 40 mph.

The handling on the jag is so good that the game is really easy to play. You race against Porsches and Ferraris and you fly past them as if they weren't there.

You get to race in 12 different countries and each country has three tracks in it. The first track is a breeze and you are guaranteed to come first. The second is slightly harder with more difficult corners and you probably come first or second, but – and this is a big, big but – the third track is really hard. It normally puts you in some freak weather conditions like snow, fog, night etc and chances are you'll find it difficult to get into the top five.

Overall Jaguar is good, but not that good. It has almost the same features as Lotus 2, like the pits and the in-car stereo, etc. The graphics are excellent and sound is very good, especially Thrash Pig.

The problem is not that it's not as playable or addictive as Lotus. But Jaguar has far more tracks and it is a lot harder to complete. If you like car games then

Daisy being a dopey croc bimbo decides to forsake her love for the twins and runs off to a Crockery. Why she would want to leave those boys and join a load of cups and plates, I don't know. Oh all right, it's not a load of plates. It's sort of a conivent for crocs.

Now if your girlfriend-to-be decided to bugger off and become a nun, you wouldn't be the happiest little croc in the world. So it's time for a fight back. Punk and Funk must battle through 60 screens to win back the lovely Daisy.

The Cool Croc Twins is a straightforward

platform game, but it's very difficult to explain what it actually looks like, so if you care to gander at this page you will see what can only be described as screenshots.

The idea is simple - all you have to do is guide either Punk or Funk around the screen. By pressing Fire on the joystick you must make them jump into some little blocks which are liberally dotted around.

A light will illuminate each time you hit a block. You have to hit each block three times, so that the three lights, err light up. Light up all the blocks and you will progress to the next level. Easy, ain't it?

Now all games with good guys in them have to have bad guys too - it's the law of computer games. The battle of good against evil is what computer games are all about.

There are loads of murderous beasts trying to stop you from reaching the croc goddess Daisy. They do this by turning the lights on the blocks off again. If one of these monsters hits you, you will lose one of your precious three lives.

Don't worry though - help is at hand. If you land on top of, or hit, a beastie in mid-air it will disappear. You will receive bonuses when you kill one of these beasts,

but don't hang around because another will be around to fill its place.

The poster/manual included with the game - to be honest - tells you precious little. It's got Punk and Funk in conversation telling you what to do, but unfortunately because it's a supposedly cool game it's got supposedly cool "speak" in it.

Phrases like "yeell it like it is, bro" litter the instructions. Besides, it's probably better not to read the instructions, and to work it out for yourself instead.

Overall, The Cool Croc Twins is not bad. The graphics are fairly good, but nothing really special. Soundwise there are a few funsome tunes to be heard and a few effects.

It is very playable, being more fun in two-player mode than in one. I liked Cool Croc Twins, but there's something about it that doesn't make it a hit game.

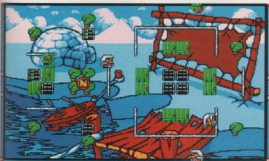

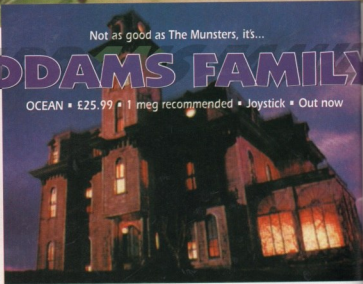

All that talk about The Addams Family video plastered all over the box has actually influenced my decision to rent the film. Blimey, there must be a marketing man

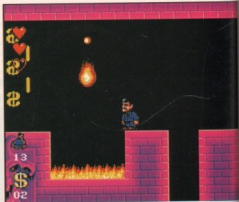

It's got loads of platform clichés in it. Secret rooms are to be found everywhere, hundreds of coins to be collected, invincibility pills to be plundered and a handy little item that can be found to help Gomez find his family is his fez.

This little fez is no ordinary fez – it flies, thus enabling Gomez to reach those parts of the game that other non-fez wearers can't reach.

Overall *The Addams Family* is probably one of the greatest little platform games of all time on the Amiga. The graphics are

excellent and give it a console feel.

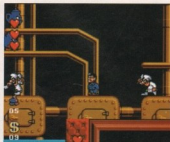
The backgrounds used to be parallax scrolling, but due to speed loss they have been changed to a simple black, which isn't as bad as it sounds because the sprites are easier to see.

If you are looking for a challenging platform game with astounding graphics and downright sexy sound, then Jim Power could be just what you're after.

You are Jim Power, the chief of the Special Warfare Unit for the Security of President Halley (S.W.U.S.P.H.). OK it's a crap abbreviation, but don't you worry because Jim Power just so happens to be the best member of the S.W.U.S.P.H.

The story goes that President Halley's beautiful daughter Samantha has been kidnapped (wow that's original). The mad, bad and very scary indeed Vulkhor is responsible for this terrible deed, but then again Vulkhor is the infamous devil from the Mutant Planet and kidnapping is the sort of thing that devils are meant to do.

The Mutant Planet is not the sort of place that Justin Chalmers'll recommend you go to. It's full of, er, mutants and a few more mutants. Noone has ever dared venture to the Mutant Planet - that is until now.

Now why on earth would Vulkhor want to kidnap the President's daughter? Well maybe it's because the

President is the only person in the whole wide world who knows where the ultimate arm is. That's arm as in gun type thing, not as in the thing that hangs from your shoulders.

So Vulkhor does the decent thing and decides to blackmail the President, or else his daughter gets it.

As you might have guessed, Jim Power is a platform game - a five level platform game to be precise. Jim roams through dense forest, strange cities and gloomy caves just to save the President's daughter. What a darling, brave chap Jim is.

Now this won't be an easy task by any means. Using his blasters, Jim has to, err blast through the many beasts that inhabit the Mutant Planet.

Fearful creatures such as zombies, vultures, dragons, spiders, carnivorous plants and other strange creatures are all after your blood. Not only does Jim have to contend with beasts, but he has to survive all the traps such as acid drops, stakes, flames and stalactites.

Well I think Jim could do with a little help, so just to help him there are modules. Inside these modules are things such as shields to shield you, clocks that give you a bit of extra time and the 1UP bonus which,

surprisingly enough, gives you another life. The most important thing to collect in Jim Power are keys. These handy little items open doors and secret passages, but if you forget a key while you are on your way you are in big trouble because you have to go back for the little blighter.

Now I said Jim Power was a platform game, but I lied. There are in fact three levels of platform prancing and two levels of fast shoot-'em-up action.

I love Jim Power - that's the game, not the bloke. I bet you were getting a bit hot under the collar there for a minute.

The graphics are amazing. There are 200 colours on-screen at once (oooooh), three playfields in 50Hz (guisspl) and an ergonomi with univalled flexibility (eh). Well it means now to me, but it sure does look good. Soundwise - well the bloke who created the music for Turrican is back, so if you loved the music from Turrican you're sure to love the music in Jim Power.

It's as playable as Kim Basinger's bits (calm down, Bill - Ed) and more addictive than something that's quite addictive indeed.

But it is very hard indeed, and is definitely not for the beginner - a couple of years of platform paratrooning experience is definitely needed. Good graphics, sexy

After some Nancy Drew-type investigations, it transpires that Dylan Dog is Italy's number one comic book character, which just goes to prove that when it comes to thinking up really butch names for comic book heroes, the Italians haven't quite got the knack. Dan Dare, that's a butch name. Dylan Dog? Sounds a bit Disney, doesn't it?

Anyway, casting aside the rather mysterious nature of our hero, let's see just what this spooky Italian offering is all about. Apparently Dylan went to a bit of a knees-up in some mansion or other last night, but unlike everyone else he didn't have a tipple or three of finest Bavarian booze.

Just as well really, because for reasons best known to the brewery, the happy juice has turned everyone into homicidal maniacs. There's a moral for you there kids - if you don't drink you miss all the fun. So, poor old Dylan is stuck in an old mansion with a crap name and loads of axe-wielding nutters.

Dylan's razor sharp instinct tells him to get out of there pronto, and it's up to

you to do it. Oh, and if you could find out just why the beer sent everyone bonkers, that'd be quite nice too.

Arcade adventure? Yes it is, actually. The usual mix of running around, scrapping and picking up objects. Any good? Weeell, it's bearable I suppose.

The good points - the graphics are great, with nice realistic animation and loads of tomato ketchup splattered all over the place. You also get plenty of tunes that change as you go on, but very few meaty FX to go with the gore.

Whenever you reach an important point in the game, you get an animated scene to illustrate it, which is quite nice. And, erm, that's about it for the good points actually.

The bad points - it gets very boring. You never seem to make any progress, you pick up objects that don't seem to serve any purpose and wander through rooms that appear interesting but aren't. You only get six bullets for the whole game, which means you have to indulge in far too much hand-to-hand combat.

And, blow me down, hand-to-hand combat is crap. You punch, then they punch. Worlds are born, stars go supernova, the universe revolves, and eventually they fall over dead.

It's also nigh-on impossible to die. I spent five minutes being attacked by a maniac

with a power drill, and barely lost any energy. Challenging it is not.

Plus, the control system is annoying. You have to push up to go through a door, but that also makes you jump. Be prepared to spend a lot of time jumping in front of doors before going through them.

It's always a shame to see a potentially good game spoiled by some thoughtless and generally lazy programming, and that's

exactly what's happened here. The presentation is almost perfect, and the graphics are always nice and gruesome, but the actual game itself seems to have bugged off.

Perhaps it was in there when they sent it out, but it got lost in the post, I don't know. But when I played it, it was definitely a fun-free zone. Looks like Dylan's destined to remain in obscurity for a bit longer.

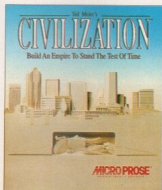

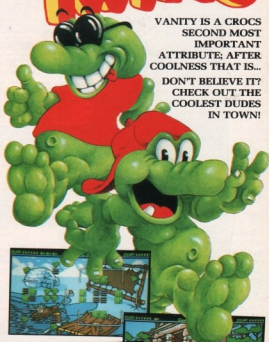

# The Gamer guide to HARLEQUIN

Having trouble getting started playing Harlequin?  
Jonathan Maddock guides you to the first piece of the heart



## The Clock Tower - Part one

Right, the adventure's about to begin. Your first task is to climb to the first switch which starts the moving platform. Jump on to the platform and while there fire your hearts at the baddies below. Once you've killed them, jump off the platform.

You should be able to see another switch. Throw the switch - it creates a platform further up the tower. Get back to the moving platform and stop it when it gets close. Jump on the moving platform that isn't moving any more and use this to jump to the platform above the switch.



Open the box and grab the broly - you'll need it later. Now get to the moving platform moving again, jump on it and climb up the tower until you reach the next switch. This switch opens the door at the bottom of the tower.

Once flicked, you can jump off the platform and free fall all the way down to the bottom, remembering to open that broly just before you hit the floor. Run towards the big arrow and enter the Clockworks.



## The Clockworks - Part one

Flick the first switch you see in the Clockworks and slide down the slopes. You'll see another switch at the bottom. You won't be able to reach it, but if you climb the last slope and jump across you will be able to throw the switch.



This starts the clock hands in the Clock Tower. Now climb to the swinging pendulums and swing across to the left-hand side of the Clockworks.

Slide down the big slope, carefully avoiding the drips, and leave at the door marked Exit. This takes you to The Dream Mile.



## The Dream Mile

Open the box and collect the thing that turns you into a fish. Be careful not to drop into the water if you haven't collected the fish icon.

You'll come to a pyramid with a temple inside. Climb over it and head towards the next pyramid structure, sliding down the left-hand side.

After getting past the tricky jumps and the strong wind, you should be able to flick the switch to open the temple.

Head back towards the temple and go inside. In the top right-hand corner there is a large plug with a switch beside it. Flick it, as this operates the Virtual TV in TV Wonderland. Leave The Dream Mile the way you entered and go back into the Clockworks.



## The Clockworks - Part two

Use the moving platforms to reach the big slope before jumping across to the left in the direction of the cogs. Jump on to the cogs and up on to the conveyor belt - watch out for the snake head!

Using the conveyor belts, head towards the right until you can go no further. Drop off the last conveyor belt and land on the platform below. Hit the switch above.

Now jump on the platforms to your left collecting energy as you go. At the bottom of the Clockworks, just underneath the pendulums, there's a very narrow passage which was blocked before.

Harley should now head left towards the entrance of the passage. Enter it and crawl towards the right until you reach a small chamber with a switch in it. Flick the switch and collect the hidden bonuses.

Go back the way you came in. Use the pendulums again to head left towards the cogs. Use the conveyor belts and go right. Remember that wall that was blocking your progress? Well it is no longer there, hurrah!

The next bit can be tricky if you don't do it right, so listen carefully. Where the last conveyor belt is, there's a piece of floor at the end. If you hit this you will slow down and won't be able to jump the gap to reach the exit.

So when you come to the last conveyor belt and are ready to jump for the exit, jump before the bit of floor. Now feel mighty proud of yourself, because it's time to move on to the next bit.







## The Clock Tower - Part Two

Here we are back at the Clock Tower and you must climb all the way back to the top where you will see the clock face. There are tons and tons of bonuses hidden here.

Jump on to the clock hands and swing round a couple of times. On your way you will see a kite. When you are good and ready, and providing you haven't had a dizzy spell and fallen off your chair from watching Harlequin spinning around the clock face, jump for the kite.

Harley will grab the kite and fly magically towards the next level.



## Come Fly With Me

This is probably the easiest peasiest bit in the whole game, but don't get too cocky because from now on it gets really hard (ooer). On the kite you should be able to collect loads of tokens and bonuses, dodging all the obstacles before reaching the next destination The Jigsaw Puzzle.



## The Jigsaw Puzzle

Right your first task is to find and flick four switches. They are located in roughly the four corners of the level.

Once all have been switched on, you should be able to find an upward passage which was blocked off before. This is located in roughly the centre of the level.

Use the small platforms to climb upwards and you will find a bank of TVs at the top - all turned off at the moment, but not for long.

Switch them on by running right and finding a hidden switch that isn't very well hidden at all. Head back towards the TVs - they should be displaying TV SALE NOW ON.

This means that you can enter TV Wonderland, which is the level after the next. Go to the exit in the Jigsaw Puzzle, this is on the far right-hand side, about halfway up. Enter the exit and it's time for those Dick Van Dyke impressions because we're off among the chimneys on the rooftops.



## The Rooftops

You will find your first piece of heart near the bottom right of the level. Your first job is to flick the switch directly below you and find another one situated near the start of the telephone wires.

Head right along the telephone wires towards the top right of the screen until you reach a shaft with a moving platform in it. Go down the shaft, flick the switches nearby and the heart will be yours.

OK, so you're now the proud owner of the first piece of heart - only three more pieces to go. Don't forget to flick the switch that's just after the heart piece. This is where I should stop but because I'm a kind chap I'll guide you to the end of the level.

Head back up the shaft. Go left along the telephone wires until you reach the slope that goes down. Go down it and now head right until you come to the end of the wires and land on the roof.

Slide down the roof. You will fall on top of another roof, slide down this one at well and you'll hit another.



Slide down it until you see a platform, then jump on the platform.

Now head left until you see a huge window with a familiar arrow jumping up and down. This is the exit to TV Wonderland. I've got you started - now you're on your own.

Remember there isn't a time limit in Harlequin, so take your time!

Also remember to use the handy save option because it's a massive game and takes a good few hours to complete if you start from the beginning. That's it, I'm outta here. Bye!



## Ooh, what's inside that Jack in the Box?

### Umbrella

This object not only allows Harley to fall down to mother Earth gently, but it's quite handy for those on-the-spot Mary Poppins impressions.



### Fireworks

They circle Harlequin, giving him a shield of protection. You can collect up to four rockets but they disappear after a while.



### Space Hopper

Harley can use this to reach higher platforms and crush his enemies. In the Jigsaw level, use the hopper at the beginning to jump to the top. You can then access some of the later levels.



### Heart

Gives Harley a mega power boost and changes his weedy pink hearts into dangerous red ones. Harley will now be able to fire further and do away with the baddies quicker. These also disappear after a while.



### Angel Fish

Hmm, fishy goings on. Harley can use this to change into a fish, but be careful because it's got a timer on it (like most of the objects), and if you go too far underwater you might not make it back.



### Burger

Fills your body full of cholesterol, it makes you really fat and you'll have a heart attack and die. Fortunately in Harlequin it restores your energy and you won't die.

# Compound

Alex Gian looks at  
Dynamic Array  
handling in ARexx

In order to be effective for general programming tasks, a language must provide – in addition to flow control and functions – some way of handling ordered arrays of data.

ARexx does not have direct support for arrays, but it does have another very interesting structure, called compound symbols. These allow the user to create arrays, and much more besides!

Those of you who have programmed in languages other than ARexx will know that when you want to use an array of elements, you have to declare its type, and more importantly its size, right at the beginning of your code.

That space then gets reserved, and takes up your memory throughout your program run. If you do not know how big your array finally needs to be, too bad – you must reserve enough memory to make sure that you do not run over your bounds, otherwise you must write dynamic allocation code yourself.

There's no such problem when using ARexx. Since it is typeless, you can mix all types of different data in your compound symbol arrays (numbers, characters and so on) and, as usual, they will all be stored as strings.

But more importantly, you do not have to declare the size of the array at the start. As you add or remove elements, the memory requirements of your structure are taken care of automatically by the system.

This dynamic data handling makes programming quite fun, and many small databases and utility programs have already been produced fairly effortlessly, even by novice programmers.

You may remember that we touched upon compound symbols very briefly, way back in the first article of this series. We will be looking at them in some more detail this month.

Basically a compound symbol is made up of any number of valid ARexx symbols separated by a full stop, eg array.x, man.name and Sabc.1.x.y are all valid compound symbols. They can be assigned

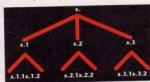


Figure 1: Compound symbol representation of a 3x2 array

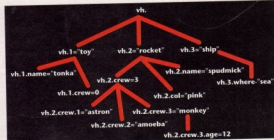


Figure 2: Complex structures can be represented by ARexx compound symbols

values, just like normal variables – if they have not been assigned a value, their value is their own name in upper case.

For instance, xyz.9 prints out as XYZ.9 if it has not yet been given another value. In other words, they are identical to normal variables.

In addition, compound symbols have some other interesting properties. The first part of a compound symbol – the part up to the first full stop – is called the stem, and each subsequent part is called a node.

If you think that this makes compound symbols somewhat like trees, you are quite right (see Figure 1). Now, an array of any dimensions is a special case of a tree, and can easily be represented as such.

For instance, a three-element array called bcd would have the elements (branches) bcd.1, bcd.2 and bcd.3. Figure 1 shows a compound symbol representing an array of dimensions 2 x 3.

Here we can see another subtle and interesting difference. With compound symbols, it is not only the last layer of nodes that can have a value, but also every preceding layer.

In Figure 1, x.1, x.2 and so on can also have a value, as well as x.1.1 etc. This would obviously be impossible in a Basic-style array.

We have already said that compound symbols let us use arrays without having to initialise their size. They also allow us to initialise all "values" of the array at one fell swoop, even the ones that have not been created yet.

We achieve this by initialising the stem. For instance, the clause bcd. = 55 will set all subsequent compounds of bcd., eg bcd.1, bcd.2, bcd.fred, bcd.xoz, to "55", until they are explicitly given new values.

Compound symbols can be removed as easily as they can be created. The instruction DROP, which is used to remove the setting of any variable, can be just as well used on compound symbols.

If you DROP stem, then all compounds of the stem are dropped. Of course, the nodes of a com-

# d symbols

-pound symbol are not restricted to being numericals – any valid ARexx symbol is acceptable. In this way we can use nodes as variables which can be placed in counter loops, much the same way as we would in Basic:

```
DO I = 0 TO 100 BY 10
  JO J = JO TO 4 BY 2
  array(I,J) = surfaction(I)
ENDDO
```

The power and flexibility of compound symbols does not end here. New nodes can be created or removed at any time, and our "tree" is not confined to any particular shape.

Thus it does not have to follow the fixed form of an n-dimensional array, and can look pretty much however it likes. Complex structures can easily be created and accessed, in a way that would never be possible with arrays. Figure II shows an example of just such a structure.

When ARexx encounters a compound symbol, it checks to see if any of the nodes are variables that can be evaluated. The variables may evaluate (expand) to any ARexx string, including a compound symbol.

The new expanded compound symbol resulting from this operation is the one that is used from here on to refer to the tree-like compound structure. This is a lot simpler than it sounds, and a few

examples will illustrate.

Consider the data in Figure II. If we have the following lines of code:

```
/* Expanding compound symbols */
vh.2.crew.3 = "monkey"
vwant = "2.crew.2"
vh.vwant.gender = "tree"
say vh.vwant
```

"vh.vwant" expands to "vh.2.crew.3", and the printed result is "monkey". Similarly, "vh.vwant.gender" expands to "vh.2.crew.3.gender" and a new bit of information is added to our compound symbol, ie the third crew member in the rocket is a female monkey.

You might have noticed that this even allows for the existence of compound symbols that cannot legally be written in ARexx. Look at the following example:

```
/* Compound symbols that can't be written! */
stem.1.1 = "testing..."
va = "++" ; vb = "-1"
say stem.va.vb
say stem."++-1"
say stem."-1"
```

The last line in the above example is not allowed, since neither "++" nor "-1" are valid ARexx symbol names. -1 yields an error. The line above it simply gives "STEM.++-1", so the compound symbol can only be accessed through variables, as is the case

In the fifth line, this is despite the fact that the compound symbol's name is "really" stem.++-1. A technicality perhaps, and unlikely to bother your programming, but still useful to know.

Next time we will look at the powerful way in which ARexx symbols and their values can interact, and we will also examine a neat requester library.

## Arrays in strings

ARexx offers a unique way of representing simple arrays, which is particularly useful for small one-dimensional arrays that need to be accessed quickly.

This is done by using the strings themselves as the array. Every character string is, by definition, also an array, where the characters are indexed according to their position in the string.

Elements of a known string length can be stored in a larger string and accessed via their position in the string.

Here is a string where five characters are reserved for each element, the rest being padded with "x". Obviously elements whose length is more than five are not permitted:

```
"**xcat**dog**duck**hen**mouse**"
```

However this technique can lead to complications, and is unlikely to be used by an inexperienced programmer, although it could be useful for some applications, such as bitmaps.

However, ARexx also has the ability to consider strings as "sentences", and their individual elements as "words". You can then use the word manipulation functions built in to ARexx to access and add/remove elements.

This makes things very easy. Before we proceed to an example, we will have a brief look at these functions:

```
WORD(string,n) returns the nth word (element) in the string.
WORDLENGTH(string,n) returns the length of the nth word.
WORDINDEX(string,n) returns the string position of the first character of the nth word.
DELWORD(string,n,[l]) deletes "l" words from the string, starting with the nth word. If "l" is omitted, then all the words after the nth one are also deleted.
WORDS(string) returns the number of words in the string.
```

In the listing below, Array1 is first assigned four elements. We easily add more elements by the simple joining up techniques that we already know. We delete elements using the delword() function.

There is no built-in function for inserting words into a string, but we can easily do this by making our own function – the procedure addword() does this. It is a simple function that does not do any checks, but it can easily be extended.

In our example below, we insert our new word as the third element, so we use the wordindex() function to find its position in the string.

Note that we must subtract 1 from this position for the correct operation, since ARexx string positions start at 0. This was explained in our third article, on parsing. We must add a blank to our element to ensure that it stands as a separate "word".

```
/* Arrays of words */
Array1 = "cat dog duck hen"
Array2 = Array1 " mouse"
/* Array1 is now equal to
"cat dog duck hen mouse" */
Array3 = delword(Array1,4,1)
/* Array1 is now equal to
"cat dog duck mouse" */
Array4 = addword(Array1,"hen",3)
/* Array1 is now equal to
"cat dog hen duck mouse" */
say word(Array1,4)
exit 0
addword:
PROCEDURE
addword = arg(1)
newword = arg(2)
elementno = arg(3)
insertat = wordindex(addword,elementno) + 1
newarray = insertnewword[" "] , addword,insertat
return newarray
```

An advantage of using this method, rather than compound symbols, is that the order of elements in an array can be rearranged quite easily. These arrays are also easier to access, since you do not have to collect data from individual nodes.





# As easy as DCTV

**D**uring the last few months, AC have had the pleasure of Digital Creations' excellent DCTV as a permanent fixture. During this time we've also had a few frustrated users phone in for advice on how best to employ the system as an animation tool.

It appears that the majority of users are, on occasion, having problems when it comes to animation. The main cause for complaint appears to be a dislike which DPaint displays when playing or displaying DCTV-based anims or stills.

In fact the problem lies neither with DPaint nor DCTV - in the majority of cases the cause of many a sleepless night is often the cabling between the DCTV and monitor/video.

The moral of this story is don't skimp on the connections, get down to the local video specialist and invest in some well shielded RCA leads, alias phono cables - it's money well spent.

While we're on the subject of animation and DCTV, it's perhaps worth exploring a few alternative anim generation programs other than DPaint.

Although DPaint is indeed impressive, it's nevertheless a bit limited on the flexibility front. For the animator working with limited memory, perhaps the worst problem is the inability to assign pause values to individual frames. Many ray trac-

ing packages boast their own anim players which in the majority of cases allow the user to produce a simple accompanying script file, which when complete can control every aspect of the performance.

Predefined frames can be looped, others paused for a definable number of seconds, and all to an accuracy level of 1/25th of a second. Imagine employs its Make Movie option to produce controlled anims, while Real 3D uses its DeltaConvert utility.

Of the two, the Real 3D utility is perhaps the more flexible for general animation and can be used on images generated from any source, including DCTV. As a result, a script-controlled DCTV anim is easily achieved by anyone with access to the aforementioned software.

Unfortunately, Real's Delta anims are much larger than standard Anim5/DPaint creations, but you do have the bonus of timing, definable loops, playback speed variation and pause control built into its associated script file.

If you don't have access to DeltaConvert or any other such commercial program, don't panic - there's a multitude of PD anim players which will at the very least provide a basic playback environ-

ment for your creations. My personal favourite is View 2.0, a truly wonderful utility that puts many a commercial anim player to shame, including our old friend DPaint...

The program is a creation of Cryogenic software and should be available from most of the larger PD libraries. It will load any IFF, Ham or DCTV display file as either a still or complete anim.

In our case, it's the anim control that really makes it special. Once loaded, any Anim5 sequence can be slowed to a little as one fps or accelerated right up to 25, with the various increments stretching over ten of the Amiga's function keys.

Any one of the ten speeds can be accessed glitch-free even during playback, and if that's not enough, the anim can be paused completely and advanced a frame at a time thanks to a spacebar-A key combination.

## Cueing up

As any budget animator will know, the option to pause an anim at any point while cueing up the VCR is well worth adding to your collection. In short, View 2.0 is almost the perfect anim player and out-guns even the best commercial programs.

The only flaw is its inability to loop sections - something which can only be done with script-driven Delta formats.

Having said that, View 2.0 still has a big advantage in the all important area of storage. Script drive anims are generally much larger than Anim5 productions, so as long as you can live without loops and don't mind manual control, View 2.0 is just about perfect.

If I can play our illustrious kilt-wearing, caber-tossing editor with a few complimentary bottles of Im Bru, you might even see the aforesaid software on next month's CoverDisk.

## Going backwards

The ever-industrious Alternative Image have just released their latest brainchild, Reverser - a small but essential utility that any serious animator simply shouldn't be without.

The program is basically a renaming utility that takes all the agony out of post-anim production. As I'm sure you're aware, all the major animation programs have their own peculiar methods of naming the files they produce.

As a result, using the products of one package as part of another formerly meant hours of manual labour painstakingly renaming every file to suit the needs of the next program in the line.

With power packages such as Real 3D and Imagine offering frame-by-frame texture changes, the need for automated renaming has become more and more of a problem.

Fortunately, that problem is now solved - all you need do is point Reverser at the directory containing the frames, and the software automatically locates all associated files under a predefined title, waiting patiently as you decide which format you want your anim to become.

As the name suggests, it's also possible to reverse an entire animation as well as rename the files which make it up. Thus spinning logo-type anims are much easier to compile.

Almost all such anims are created backwards for greater accuracy, as a result, the long suffering animator is then forced to waste valuable time renaming the files in order to run the anim in the right direction.

If you're serious about your animation, Reverser is easily the best £10 you'll ever spend. If you'd like a copy, contact Alternative Image on 0533 440041.

# Just intuition...

Input and output is handled so easily in the DOS window with C library commands. Why does it become so fiendishly difficult when an Intuition Window is open?

The question was inspired by a letter from an Australian reader, W Dring of Lowood, Queensland. This article features the use of numbers, calculations with them, and output of the results in an Intuition Window.

In the DOS window the C library routine, `printf`, can be used to display characters, strings and integers. It is very convenient to store a number as an integer, and use the `printf` routine to convert the number to its equivalent ASCII form and display it.

Floating point numbers needed a little more work - my article in the July issue of described how used routines to give me an ASCII character string corresponding to a floating point number.

There is a similar routine, `scanf`, to accept formatted input from the keyboard - it also works very well in the DOS window provided that the input buffer size is not exceeded. As soon as an Intuition Window is opened, all these benefits are lost.

There is an Amiga library routine to write text at the graphics cursor position using the current font:

```
TextRastPort(textstring,number);
```

where `rastport` is the pointer to the `RastPort` used for drawing, `textstring` is a pointer to the start of the phrase to be written, and `number` is the count of letters in the phrase.

The numbers need to be stored as characters in an ASCII string so that the `Text()` routine can be used. Floating point numbers are converted using `ftoa()` which will provide an ASCII character string

...which is about all you have when trying to handle numerical input and output in an Intuition Window. Margaret Stanger gives you some more solid pointers

corresponding to a floating point number. I adapted some routines from the text editor in last October's Amiga Computing to handle the input of the numbers. Since this was published quite a long time ago, I will recap briefly for new readers.

The normal window polling loop `Handle_IDCMP()` can be used to detect any key-presses, `RawKey` events give more information about the keypress.

## Information

The message handler is fairly simple, with only `MouseEvent` and `RawKey` events. I do not reply to the message straight away after a `RawKey` event, as I need the information later.

A console device is opened using the `OpenDevice()` function, passing a pointer to the device name and one to the I/O structure. Unlike other devices, the console device must be used in connection with a window.

The screen and window are already open, and the pointer to the window structure is passed when the console device is opened.

The `InitConsole()` routine in the source code sets up a dummy console port for reading only, to enable the use of the `RawKeyConvert()` command. The key handler `KeyConvert()` uses the `RawKeyConvert()` command to read the key code,

and put the equivalent ASCII code or escape sequence into a chosen buffer. The function takes data from an `InputEvent`, as described in the include header files. I initialised one of these structures in my header file, and set its `Class` to `RawKey`.

Values from the `IntuiMessage` are put into the structure before the `KeyConvert()` routine is called. Other inputs include a pointer to a buffer to hold the data, and the size of the buffer.

The routine `HandleRawKey()` calls the `KeyConvert()` routine, the length of the output string is returned and the key data will be in the chosen buffer.

If a key code is less than 64, the ASCII equivalent is returned. Some of the other keys generate escape sequences of up to four characters. Mostly a length of one character is returned from `KeyConvert()`. The routine checks for keys like `Return`, `Escape`, `Tab`, `Delete` and `Backspace`, and performs the necessary function.

Anything else of that length is probably a letter, number or other character. A length of more than one character indicates an escape sequence of some sort. This could indicate a cursor key, `Help` key or one of the function keys.

The source code, `sums.c`, contains all these routines, `Handle_IDCMP()`, `HandleRawKey()`, `InitConsole()` with full comments.

## Library routines

The calculations involved square roots, sines, cosines as well as simple conversions. I needed to use some library routines, rather than write my own. My first thought was to use the routines in the disk-based `maths.lib` library.

The prototypes of the routines in each library are in the corresponding header file in the proto directory. Although this library can be used in the same way as the `diskmath.lib`, I found that it had some disadvantages.

The input and output were in four-byte float datatypes rather than in eight-byte double datatypes, and we need all the precision we can get.

Although the Amiga was accessing the routines and returning a value, yet another routine was probably needed to unscramble the result. It was not immediately obvious which one - I find British spelling difficult enough. I include the `math.h` header file in the source code and use the following code to link the object code with the Amiga IEEE floating point maths library:

## The program on the disk

The program has a C source file, `sums.c` and a header file, `sums.h`, on the support disk, as well as the compiled program, `sums`. The object program opens a screen and window and handles keyboard input until `Escape` or a mouse button is pressed.

A number consisting of numerals, an optional sign and decimal point can be entered on the left-hand side of the window. It is possible to delete and overwrite any of these characters.

The program assumes that each number will not contain more than minus sign or decimal point, or have spaces in the middle. It does not attempt to parse the line, garbage in will have the usual consequences.

Press `Return` to continue entering another number on the next line. The cursor keys are supported, to edit a previous entry. The program acknowledges the `help` key being pressed, but there is no `help` screen.

Up to 20 numbers can be input at the left-hand side of the window. Pressing a function key can perform a calculation on the number

and output the results on the right-hand side of the screen.

Each function key press displays a separate result:

- F1 the square of the number
- F2 the centigrade temperature
- F3 the kilogramme weight
- F4 the circumference
- F5 the kilometre distance
- F6 the square root
- F7 the sine of the angle
- F8 the cosine of the angle
- F9 the tangent of the angle
- F10 the log to the base 10

All angles are assumed to be in radians rather than degrees. The last calculation is a reminder that there was life before calculators - but not as we know it.

Seriously though, this program is not intended to replace a scientific calculator, but a simple illustration of how a number can be input, and the result (after a little crunching) output.

# Changing times...

**T**he Amiga 4000 is the name of Commodore's latest musical masterpiece, a machine which according to the specs looks to be years ahead of its time.

The machine itself won't be on general release until Spring 93, but the first commercial releases should be in the hands of the developers around Autumn – hopefully giving time for some dedicated software which could take advantage of its immense power.

Even if new software isn't available, total downward compatibility is promised with existing Amiga software, so hopefully we won't suffer a painful transition as we did with the infamous 1.3 to 2.0 Workbench upgrade.

The retail of the new machine is expected to be around the £4,000 mark. Nevertheless, if the specs are to be believed it will be worth every penny.

As the name suggests, the new machine will boast a 68040 processor putting it well above the fastest 486 PCs. In real terms, this means speeds 40 times faster than that of a standard A500.

With the introduction of an 040-based machine, the Amiga's real potential will soon be exploited to the full with countless applications all running in concert to provide the ultimate platform for Midi, video, and multimedia.

Like its predecessor the A3000, the new machine has a 32-bit architecture throughout, and to take full advantage of this, the 040 CPU, Commodore have produced a completely new AA chipset which – among other things – includes a maximum on-screen resolution of 256,000 colours

## Paul Austin looks at a new breed of Amiga and how to get the best from direct-to-disk recording

from a palette of 16.7 million. For we musos, perhaps the most exciting addition is the AT&T 3202 Digital Sound Processor, or DSP for short.

This all-new chip has a small amount of its own fast RAM on board, but perhaps more importantly holds a blisteringly fast maths co-processor which makes it the ideal vehicle for power sound processing.

Commodore have teamed up with Roland to perfect their new sound system which will produce eight stereo channels – 16 channels in total – with custom controller chips for digital sampling and

compression.

Perhaps the most amazing innovation is the quality of this sound, which I'm assured will be full 16-bit – in other words, studio quality.

Obviously employing multiple 16-bit samplers you'd expect storage to be a nightmare, but it appears that Commodore have even managed to solve this rather thorny problem by employing state-of-the-art compression via a custom compression chip dedicated to packing as much as possible into the available space.

The new machine has been designed to usher in a new era in Amiga-related audio and should allow the A4000 to become the first personal computer to employ voice recognition as a control option.

Apparently the sound processing is so fast that the new machine could make modern computers obsolete. Comms would simply be a matter of plugging in a phone line and kicking up a comms package. 1993 could be the dawn of a new age...

And finally, the Sunrise 12-bit sampling board is already available and will soon be joined by GVP's 14-bit stereo opponent. According to an informed source, a further three direct-to-disk systems are already in development – watch this space and next month's monster music feature for more details.

## Not so direct-to-disk

There's a common misconception among many musical computer users in that they consider direct-to-disk recording to be simply a matter of storage.

This I'm afraid, simply isn't the case. Although sufficient storage is a vital element, speed of data transfer is equally important.

For example you could build a system around a standard Amiga by adding a sizeable hard disk. If we assume a recording time of five minutes per 100Mb at studio quality, the average song would easily fit onto a 100/120Mb hard drive.

Unfortunately, life isn't that simple. And of course, what happens when the next classic comes along? If you were to back that amount of data for ever song you wrote, you'd need a couple of hours free for each, a mountain of disks, and a disk box big enough to get a bed in.

A possible solution is to invest in removable hard disks, which generally hold around 80Mb or four minutes, depending on how you look at it. Unfortunately, RHDs are expensive at around £80 a time.

The only other option is to use optical drives which are much cheaper in the long term, at £30 per cartridge. Unfortunately they usually have an access time of between 50 to 60ms, which is well short of the 32ms that most direct-to-disk systems require.

Fortunately this annoying problem could soon be resolved thanks to Power Computing, who are at this moment putting the finishing touches to an upgrade of their existing 128Mb optical which will boast a access of 32ms, which could make it an ideal vehicle for direct-to-disk recording.

The second part of the direct-to-disk equation is the Amiga's CPU, which on a standard Amiga is unlikely to be fast enough to cope with incoming data in such magnitude while running a sequencer simultaneously, so you'll need to upgrade to an 030

accelerator, as well as invest in an optical or RHD. Unfortunately we're still not out of the woods. If you upgrade to a 32-bit processor things will indeed get a lot quicker, but if the data is being imported into the machine via the original 16-bit bus, there's still the chance of the occasional log-jam as the information queues to enter the processor – especially if you're running your sequencer on the same machine.

The answer is to either run the sequencer separately or invest in a self-contained 32-bit accelerator such as GVP's Combo card which has 32-bit memory, hard disk and accelerator all linked on the same card via a 32-bit bus.

Now you can record direct to hard disk and run your sequencing software without a care in the world, and when your classic is complete, you can save everything to the optical for safekeeping.

# Telephone trio

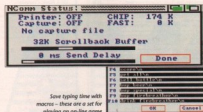
To make much use of the comms community you need three things – a modem, terminal software and somewhere to call. The two expensive items are the first and the last – something to call with, and the bills for calling a board in the first place.

In between, and acting as a buffer, is terminal software. This needn't be expensive at all, and in fact can be free, but for the cost of downloading a file, ordering a PD disk or buying a magazine with a coverdisk.

Terminal software is simply a program which allows your computer to tell the modem what to do and vice versa. Remember the old films which bristle with comments such as "I'm currently watching the pirates – their ship is weighing anchor. Over" to be replied to by "Roger and out"?

There the people at opposite ends of the link are relaying instructions to each other, but how much more convenient it would be to simply press a key rather than having to go through the time-consuming process of vocalising commands?

## Pat Winstanley discusses the three things you need to enter the absorbing world of comms

Comms software (terminal software) does just that. Although most modems offer the facility to dial direct, this can be cumbersome. While most modern phones now have memories enabling you to store regularly used numbers to be recalled at the touch of a button, terminal software does the same thing for comms.

One of the most popular Amiga comms programs is NComm. No doubt its popularity began due to it being free, but it has recently moved to become shareware with the release of v2.0, and the reported level of registrations show that not only is it cheap, it's pretty good too.

Many people unwilling to move to the fully registered shareware version now use v9.121, which is the last PD offering.

Like any software which offers a good range of features, NComm can be very confusing for the beginner. There are just so many options, all shown on pull-down menus, and nearly all given in jargon.

Possible settings range from the initialisation of the modem, an address book of BBS phone numbers, the speed of connection, and even which script – if any – you wish to use.

### Trial and error

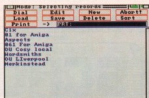
Setting up comms software is a matter of trial and error since phone, modem, computer and BBS all need to be matched to work in harmony. It is the job of the terminal software to hold all the necessary settings and apply them at the right time.

The first thing is to set an initialisation string for the modem. This can simply be an entry like "ATD" which means "attention, dial" or possibly "ATdp" to dial on a pulse exchange.

If you have a Mercury account, and use it for all your comms, the PIN number can go here too. This saves time later when adding entries to the address book, as then only the short number needs entering. Other settings for the modem include MNP error correction if

your modem supports it.

Your modem manual will give a list of the various codes and what they do, although you'll probably be following instructions blindly at first.

Once your modem is initialised you can start calling up BBSs all over the world. The address book on NComm allows several phone numbers to be saved so that simply clicking on the name of a board will automatically dial it for you.

And that's about all you need to do to connect to a BBS. Set the speed of your modem to its highest, probably 2,400 baud for low-end modems, and virtually everywhere you call will be capable of talking to you.

Once you have found your way around a particular board and know what sequence of keystrokes are required to reach a favourite area, have a shot at writing a script to do it for you. It's not as difficult as it sounds and saves lots of hassle.

A small selection of BBS numbers is included here to get you started. Don't be afraid of looking silly – everyone is a beginner at first and you'll find old hands are more than willing to help newcomers overcome the initial confusion.

Most boards also have lists of other local boards as well as full national and international lists.

## Jargon busters

**SCRIPT** To save time and money, a script is run instead of you having to type in all the commands on a BBS. It's rather like the start-up script used to boot your Amiga into life and simply containing a set of instructions.

**OLR** Offline readers are real money savers. Instead of logging on to a board and slowly scrolling through messages, replying during expensive online time, an OLR allows you to grab all the messages, download them to disk, and read and reply at your leisure.

**BLINK** The term used to describe the use of an OLR, presumably so called because you can be on and off a board in seconds rather than minutes.

**MNP** A series of features which are becoming more common in modems. With these in operation, line noise can be suppressed and downloads can be compressed.

**LINE NOISE** When the phone line is "noisy" the computer seems to have a life of its own, and merrily scrolls garbage at the typing prompt. Sometimes it can be ignored, but it's usually easier to log off and try again.

**ZMODEM** This, along with its earlier cousins Xmodem and Ymodem, controls the way files and message bundles are up and downloaded. It checks data during transfer and will resend a batch if there's a problem due to line noise or other causes.

**M**y name's Phil South, and I'm taking over the Amos column from Peter Hickman, who's been doing it since issue one without a break. Whew, you must be tired, Pete, have a break.

As you can imagine, Peter's covered a lot of ground since he began the column, but some of you won't have been here from the start (no taste, some people) or will have forgotten most of the stuff that goes beyond, say, two years ago.

In any event I'll be chasing up your questions about Amos, printing Amos news as it happens and providing listings for you to type in. Peter has done a lot on games recently, and although I will be too, I'll also be covering some of the more serious aspects of Amos coding, and printing some programs which do something other than whizz a sprite around at amazing speed - although I have to say that is great fun.

If you are coding something other than a game, you'll have to get used to generating Amiga windows and menus. This is much easier in Amos than it is in, say, AmigaBasic, where you have to specify everything so precisely you might as well draw it on the screen with a Biro.

Getting a screen together is easy enough with the Screen Open command, but what do you have to do to make the screen and its windows act like a normal Amiga program? I've been doing a lot of this sort of thing lately, so try this listing for size:

```
Screen Open 0,640,256,16,kHires
```

Nice and simple to start with. Just a med-res screen to give you that utility look. Now we define our menus:

```
Menu(1) "Project"
Menu(1,1) "Load"
Menu(1,2) "Load As..."
Menu(1,3) "Save"
Menu(1,4) "Save As..."
```

That's menu 1 sorted, and as you can see it's a very simple procedure to name the menus, with 1 being the menu title, and 1,1 being a submenu. We do the same for the next menu, but with a little twist:

Menu(2,2) "Are you sure?"
Menu(2,3) "Yes"

2,1,1,1,1 to infinity, but bear in mind that anything other than one or two submenus really gets on the operators' nerves after a very short while. Finally we turn the menus on:

```
Menu On
```

and at this point the menus are active. You can of course turn them off later if you don't want any-one using the menus at a certain point in the program. Finally, for the benefit of our listing, a few cosmetic and diagnostic details:

Curs Off : Cls 0
Do

```

You can now run the program. Notice how the menu and selection numbers change when you select a different menu item. This is how you know what the user has selected, and it's simply that.

Find out what choice 1 and 2 are and you know what menu item was under the pointer when the user let go of the RMB.

But to really get to grips with the menus, especially if you have a number of them, you have to use the Amos auto menuing system with On Menu On.

This takes a little bit of practice, but it's really quite simple. The revised program starts the same, pretty much:

But at this point it diverts into new territory:

This turns on the auto menuing system and waits for you to either make a selection from the menus or press a key on the keyboard. The PROCs you mentioned in the ON MENU ON statement are then defined somewhere else in the program, like right now for example:

And there you have it. The responses are put into PROCs and this makes the whole thing a lot simpler. You only have to scan for one variable CHOICE(2) as the first one, the menu title is chosen for you automatically, and you're sent right to the PROC that deals with that menu.

Once you've got subroutines accepting input from menus, you've got yourself the basis for a mighty fine menu driven utility program.

# On the cards

**D**esktop publishing packages aren't cheap, and unless you are going to use one professionally it can be difficult to justify the expense. But there is one thing you can "publish" that in one fell swoop can more than recover the outlay – business cards.

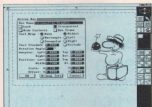
Walk into a stationers or print shop and ask about business cards and you'll probably be shown an album of "ones we did earlier" and a price list that specifies the cost per hundred.

You're losing out in two areas here – firstly you have to pick a "standard" design that at least one person has used before, secondly the price is comparatively high because of the small number of cards being printed.

One alternative many people take is to go to a "back street" printers – you know, a guy moonlighting with a printing press in his garage. But the odds are you'll have even fewer designs to choose from and end up with that awful gold lettering on a maroon card.

The way to go is to use your Amiga or desktop publishing software to design the card yourself, save it as a PostScript file, and then give this file to a print shop or printing firm that can handle PostScript.

The first decision to make is the size. It's your card, so you can do what you like, and a big card will certainly get you noticed, but you should bear in mind that a lot of people keep business cards in special wallets or albums that take a maximum size

## Design matters

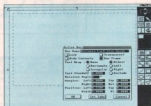
The design of a business card is important. It tells the person who is reading it more about you than simply your name, address and telephone number – it also passes a message about your personality, or if it's a company card it gives an impression of what kind of company you work for or run.

To give a classic and over-simplified example, if you use a traditional typeface like Times it will give people who read your card a subconscious impression that they are dealing with a person or company that has traditional or Victorian values.

If on the other hand you use an Avant Garde typeface, this sends a message that the card owner, or his/her company, has a more modern approach to business.

To reinforce this specially designed logo, and this is the main stumbling block in stationers and print shops because any deviation from the standard card designs in their album costs money.

of about 100mm by 65mm. If your card is larger than this it won't fit in the album, and consequently may get lost or thrown away.

So create a new page in whatever DTP package you are using – any standard page size will do for the moment – and create a box that is 90mm wide by 60mm high.

This box represents where the card will be cut after printing and will be our guide – before saving the final PostScript file we will use it.

## Positioning

The next decision is where to put your name and details. It is generally a good idea to use the same type family for all the words on the card (Times, Times-Bold, Times-Italic, Times-Bold-Condensed for example), and to have your name and/or company name larger or bolder than everything else.

Be extremely careful that you type your details correctly – it's no good noticing mistakes only after you've had a couple of thousand printed, and if you use a business card with incorrect or misspelt details you will give a poor impression.

If you are going to use a graphic or a logo, leave plenty of room for it. You want a lot of white space on your card otherwise it will become difficult to read, and thus less attractive.

Because they will output at an imagesetter's top resolution, use structured (vector) graphics if you can, created with something like Professional Draw or your DTP package's own drawing tools.

Use colour if you like, but investigate the costs and the print shop's requirements before committing yourself.

The next job is to create a "four-up" page ready for output. Don't panic, it's nothing complicated, merely a page that is two cards across by two deep, all positioned edge to edge.

So alter your page size to be 180mm by 120mm, group all the elements of your page

design, and move to the top left-hand corner of the page – it helps at this stage if you have a grid size of 1cm and Snap to Grid turned on.

Now duplicate or "clone" your group and position the copy to the right of the original so that the left-hand edge of the copy is exactly on top of the right-hand edge of the original. Make another clone and position it underneath the original, and stick one last clone to the right of that.

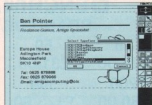
We're finished now, so we can get rid of the 90 by 60mm "guides" we created first of all. Don't worry, the print shop will be intelligent enough to know where to cut them, but tell them the individual card size to be on the safe side.

The final job is to save the page as a PostScript file. Remember that if you have used any fancy fonts on your card you will either have to include them in your PostScript file as "download" fonts, or check that the print shop or printing firm has a PostScript equivalent of the same font (with exactly the same name) on a disk at their end.

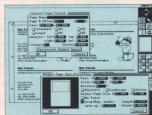
Most print shops will use Macs or PCs, and will not be able to read an Amiga disk, so you need to transfer the PostScript file to an MS-DOS formatted disk, a format which both the Mac and PC can read.

There are two commercial utilities that will help you do this, Dos-2-Dos and Crossdos, or you can use the famous public domain program MesyOss. Personally I use the just as public domain, but not so famous, MultiDOS utility.

Get at least 1,000 printed – it works out a lot cheaper that way. My last batch of 2,000 more cards cost me less than £60 from a High Street print shop.



Choice of font is important, and you must make sure that you either download it to the PostScript file or check that the print shop has the same typeface available at their end

# Chaos theory

**T**his month, as promised, I shall be taking an in-depth look at one of the more exciting titles to appear as yet for the CDTV - Fractal Universe, written by Jolyon Ralph and David Annal.

I can best describe Fractal Universe as being a wonderful journey of discovery - a look into the world of fractals, a world that is at once fascinating, scientific, natural, artistic, and beautiful.

It would be wrong to think of this CD as just an introduction to the subject - it is far more than that. So let us start at the beginning of this voyage.

I was at once impressed with the professional, polished look and sound of the program. A brief but adequate spoken introduction invites you to either proceed to the main menu screen, where all the options within are open to you, or to go straight into making your own fractal images.

If you do nothing you will be presented with a demonstration slide show. The best advice, at least initially, is to opt for the menu.

The menu system is simple and straightforward - as it should be - although I feel that some of the selections are in the wrong order. There are six options available to you, and they are:

- Generate your own fractals
- See our art gallery
- More about fractals
- Are fractals art?
- Further information
- Help using this disc

Selecting the first option gives you the choice of three fractal generators, allowing you to create fractal images for yourself.

To give you some idea of how long a CD of this quality takes to write, I can remember helping to test the first of the three generator programs over a year ago.

Trees was programmed using Amos, and is a fine example of what can be achieved from this

language. As the name suggests, fractal trees are what this is all about.

There are many options available to allow you to produce an infinite number of different examples. It is also the fastest of the three programs when it comes to rendering the images.

The second of the three is a Mandelbrot generator, producing the most familiar of fractal images. Because of the complex nature of the Mandelbrot set, and the related Julia set which is also available from this option, the images themselves do take a while to actually render.

The further into the set you zoom, in other words the more you magnify a specific part of the image, the longer it takes as the image becomes more and more complex.

The last of the three is a fractal plasma generator. The rendering is fairly quick - definitely speedy when compared to the Mandelbrot program - and the colour cycling options are excellent.

Going back to the main menu and selecting the second option takes us into the Fractal Universe art gallery. There are some 400 examples of different fractal images on the CD.

### Slide shows

You can decide if you want to see these in one of three slide shows, each of different length and choosing the images to include randomly so you will get a different selection each time you visit the gallery.

You may want to spend some time admiring individual images, and there is an option to allow for that as well. The animated fractals slide show seems to be padding to me.

The animations cycle too quickly so there is little time to actually admire the fractal image. Mind you, I am not complaining as I am much happier seeing a CD that is full to capacity rather than half empty.

For my money, the third option on the main menu is the most interesting. "More about fractals" is the name, and that is what you get.

The first selection within this group explains what fractals actually are, followed by a history of the matter in the next. Both these



sections are superbly narrated - the voice is authoritative but friendly and most of all the sound quality is excellent!

Also accessible from this group is a section on fractals in nature, and a selection of different fractal images complete with the mathematic formulae that is used in their creation.

The fourth option from the main menu deals with the debate over whether fractal imagery is really art or not. The demonstrations of the effect that colour has on the way that the same fractal image can be interpreted is interesting, but the question posed by the section title isn't really explored at all. Once again I felt that I had stumbled across another bit of padding.

The remaining two options include an information screen that credits the people involved with the project, as well as the software that was used in the development of Fractal Universe.

The online manual is accessed from here, and provides enough help to enable someone who has not used the CDTV before to be able to explore the CD without any problems.

### Music

It would be amiss of me to review this program without mentioning the music. It is pleasing to note that there is not a soundtrack blasting its way all over Fractal Universe, but where there is music it is damn good.

For example, during the art gallery slide shows the music is completely complementary to the images, helping to provide a super atmosphere in which to view the beautiful imagery of the fractals themselves.

It doesn't matter if you don't think you are interested in fractals - believe me, you will be after watching this. Even if you think you have fractals all wrapped up, you will be surprised. I thought that way, but I still learned a good thing or two from watching Fractal Universe.

Fractal Universe is available now, priced £29.95 and by the time you read this there should be French, Italian, and German versions available as well.

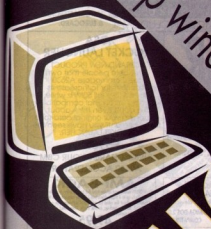

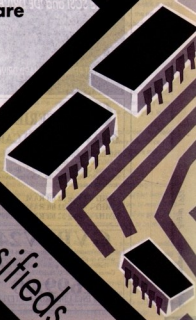

**T**housands of small companies and traders have gone out of business in the past year or two, thanks to the well-publicised recession.

Even the most optimistic government analysts acknowledge that a few more companies will go under before the sun starts to shine on the Stock Exchange once again.

So what can you do if a company that owes you money or goods goes down? According to the Consumers' Association, publishers of Which! magazine, if you have paid an advance payment or a deposit for goods, you automatically become a creditor.

The only problem is that there is a strict pecking order as far as creditors are concerned. First come the secure creditors such as banks and financial institutions, then other organisations like the Inland Revenue. Guess where you end up? Yes, you were right, you're last in the queue.

The first thing to do is to contact the receivers or liquidators, usually a reputable firm of accountants, and put your case in writing. Under the 1986 Insolvency Act, you're entitled to be told what is going on.

You could just be lucky. If you've ordered and paid for some equipment and it happens to be packaged up with your name and address on the box, ready for despatch, you have a good case for claiming it. Similarly, if you have returned goods for repair or warranty examination, they are still yours. In this case, you should consider visiting the premises in person and speaking directly to the liquidators or administrators with a view to recovering your property.

Take some proof of identity and all the correspondence that you have regarding the transaction such as receipts or even just a cheque stub.

If you've paid by credit card and the purchase price exceeds £100, so much the better. You can claim a refund from the credit card company.

Not surprisingly, they don't like that one little bit and it's one of the reasons credit card companies quote for the high charges they levy on traders and borrowers alike. Stick with it though - you'll win in the end as the law is well and truly on your side.

# Mail order answers

When a mail order ad turns into an investment, is there anything you can do if it all goes horribly wrong? AC investigates the occasionally perilous world of mail order...

## How to avoid trouble - the golden rules

There are a few golden rules about mail order purchase which may well sound obvious, but it's surprising how many people take no precautions whatsoever.

- ◆ When you see something you like, check that the magazine or catalogue is up to date - it's no use sending off cheques in answer to 1989 advertisements. And don't laugh - it happens!
- ◆ Read the advertisement carefully. If there are parts you don't notice, it's hard to get out of it later.
- ◆ When you write off for and return goods, always remember to include your name and address - and make sure it's legible! A telephone number is also a very good idea in the event of subsequent delivery problems.

- ◆ Keep a copy of the order and the date on which it was sent. Keep any correspondence you receive in the meantime and copies of that which you send. It's actually better to keep photocopies of the original than keep the file on disk - modern courts are still wary of computers!
- ◆ Make notes of any telephone conversations you have with the company and the names of the people you speak to - notes made at the time can amount to powerful evidence.
- ◆ Never, never send cash through the post - if it goes missing you'll get absolutely no sympathy from the Post Office. Not only that, but the temptation for the person opening the envelope can sometimes prove too great. The letter goes in the bin and your money goes in their pocket.
- ◆ If you intend to pay by cheque or postal order, only send them when specifically asked to send money in advance and then make sure you keep all counterfoils and cheque stubs.

Delayed orders are a frequent cause of complaint. What can you do? Strictly speaking, the mail order company shouldn't cash your cheque or take any money until the order is fulfilled. It isn't unlawful, however, so you have to approach the problem in a different way.

If the goods don't appear, write to the company's head office stating that you need to take delivery by a certain date as "time is of the essence".

This powerful piece of legal talk puts the ball straight into the supplier's court. Provided the time allowed for delivery is reasonable, a week or ten days for example, you become entitled to a

refund as soon as the time limit expires because the mail order company is in breach of contract.

You may also be entitled to claim reasonable expenses incurred as a result of the delay, especially if you had to go elsewhere to buy it.

Damaged goods are another problem encountered in the mail order game. The risk is an inherent one and most of it rests with you. If the goods are damaged in transit, you will have to pursue the matter with the carrier or post office - it's not the supplier's responsibility unless the packaging is to blame.

If the goods are defective, that's another matter. You have the same rights under the Sale

of Goods Act as if you had bought them over the counter. Contact the supplier immediately, preferably in writing and sent by recorded delivery, and arrange for return of the goods. Ask for the return carriage charges to be reimbursed, too.

Finally, there is a source of help available that might just tip the balance your way - Amiga Computing's Customer Services Manager.

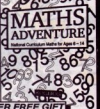

## Ashcom ADDHard 45Mb

The new Ashcom ADDHard drive is easily the cheapest 45Mb Amiga 500 hard drive available. Its £265 asking price is in fact lower than some suppliers will charge for the 20Mb AS90 and at least £100 cheaper than most 40Mb drives, so it's not surprising that it holds a very high spot in this month's VFM Top Ten.

The drive is aimed at the total novice user, and is supplied ready formatted with Workbench installed ready to go. Users can specify Workbench 1.3 or 2.04 depending on their machine's Kickstart ROM, so this really is a plug-in-and-go product.

No bad thing for a hard drive, you might think, especially as hard drives come second only to printers in the headache stakes, but there's a price to be paid for the user-friendliness and extremely low price.

The unit has a simple Quickstart manual in the form of an A4 sheet of instructions, but no software. This isn't needed at first because the drive is already set up, but if something were to go wrong, such as a read/write error – rare in hard drive circles – or even a simple validation error, the user would have to resort to sending the unit back under warranty or using a shareware program such as Fixdisk.

Problems such as this will be very rare



trouble the likes of the GVP drives or the 500AT reviewed below, but as it is designed to make hard drives a possibility for the sort of users who couldn't normally afford them, it should do well.

In such terms, ADDHard deserves to succeed, and its almost silly pricing should guarantee it a place in many AS500 setups. Full marks to Ashcom for an excellent printer product.

## IVS Trumpcard 500AT

Interactive Video Systems (IVS) have for long been producing good, reliable hard cards for the A1500/2000 range, but have never really made a push in the AS500 market.

The 500AT is an attempt to cash in on the upgraders who are considering RAM and hard drive combinations to boost the power of the low-end Amiga, and is aimed at those who might otherwise consider an AS90 or a GVP Impact Series II.

The drive is mounted in a very sleek GVP-style plastic casing designed to match the AS500 wedge shape and has space on its motherboard for 8Mb RAM.

No external power supply is fitted, but IVS claim this will not be necessary due to the unit's low power design.

The model we tested was fitted with the full 8Mb RAM and we didn't encounter any crashes, so the claims about power drainage seem to hold up.

There is a power socket on the rear of the unit for an optional external PSU if the user requires it, and a DMA through-port to allow the connection of other devices to the Amiga's DMA slot, such as the AS70 CD-ROM drive. Software

with a new hard drive, and Ashcom will be distributing a full set of software utilities to users when available, so the ADDHard doesn't suffer too much as a result. It's still an unmissable bargain.

The physical dimensions of the unit, as it has no on-board memory space, are gratifyingly small. The sturdy plastic case is smaller than the AS90 casing, and though not sleekly styled is no ugly duckling. It certainly doesn't cause any desk space problems.

It doesn't require an external PSU, so there's no power socket, but there is a DMA through-port. Speed is not the ADDHard's forte, but for those upgrading from floppy-based systems it will still seem very fast.

## KCS adaptor card

The KCS Powerboard PC emulator has been around for a while now, but has until recently been an AS500-only product. However, the release of the adaptor board and v3.0 of the system software has over the last couple of months boosted the emulator's power and overall appeal.

The adaptor card slots into any A1500, A2000, or A3000 and sports an AS00 trapdoor slot controlled by a custom chip which handles the conversion from trapdoor to Zorro signals.

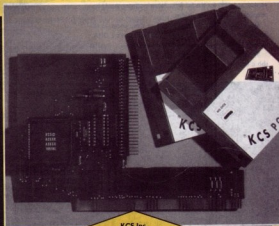
Apart from this the unit is very simple, and can be fitted quickly and easily.

At £74.95 it is quite pricey, but it's the only way those who upgrade from the AS500 can use their existing Powerboards, and is the only route for existing A2000 owners who want to take advantage of one of the most popular Amiga emulators. With the new

Vortex 386SX card on its way, many will elect to wait a bit and spend some more on a proper bridge-board-style card with more power, but the adaptor board offers one of the best A1500/2000 emulator solutions available at the moment, especially as v3.0 of the KCS software is so much better than previous incarnations.

VGA 16-colour mode is now available, as well as VGA mono, and EGA mode will use the full palette and a software flicker fixing function keeps interface at bay while in the higher resolution PC modes.

As the KCS still comes supplied with MS-DOS, GW Basic, Shell, and DOS. Help as part of the package price, it has managed to keep up with the newer 286-based emulators, even if it's now slower than most.

comes in the form of the TCUlets program which has rendered sterling service over the years on the A2000 Trumpcards.

It is fairly easy to use, and less confusing than some hardware installation disks, but if beginners feel lost there's a comprehensive manual complete with sections on hard drive operation principles and general information.

The best aspect of the software is its partitioning gadget, which allows users to select the number and size of partitions with the mouse rather than type in high cylinder numbers and so on.

This is some of the easiest partitioning software around, though on the bottom of the range 52Mb drive there's not much point in splitting the drive into more than one partition in the first place.

Speed is quite good, with data transfer test running out at about 530Kb per second. This is by no means blistering, but it is appreciably better than some drives on the market, and was tested in a no cache or buffering situation, so could be improved if necessary.

The 52Mb version with no extra RAM fitted costs £399, which is in line with most Amiga 52Mb Quantum drives – overpriced – but at this level the 500AT could suffer from competition with the faster SCSI-based (if more expensive) GVP Series II drives. Expect suppliers to price cut this quality product.

## Power Computing 8Mb RAM card

The latest externally-fitting A500 8Mb RAM expander, Power Computing's is also one of the cheapest. At £129 for the 2Mb version, and £299 for the full 8Mb, Power's offering should be tempting to the buyer on a budget.

Design hasn't been sacrificed to achieve these prices, as all RAM chips are modern, low power ZIPs and there's a DMA through-port to allow hard drives to be connected.

Reliability is ensured by the RAM chips used, and Power are confident enough about even the 8Mb variant not to offer any kind of optional power supply.

The 2Mb version we tested was very well behaved and gave us reason to believe other configurations would be just as reliable, so the lack of a PSU socket isn't a problem.

If you're an A500 owner with a view to serious applications, the Power RAM board deserves a look.

## Expert Draw

Gold Vision's Expert Draw is a vector drawing program aimed primarily at those who need good quality clip art for use in DTP packages. It offers the basic drawing tools you'd find in any package of this sort, and a number of powerful effects for the user with more intricate design needs.

The program's interface will be familiar to anyone who's used a DTP or drawing package before, as it uses fairly standard gadgets for most of the toolbox icons and reasonably well laid out menus.

However, the file requesters are non-standard and do not respond to double click selections, and some keyboard shortcuts could be more obvious.

That said, the program is very easy to get into, and beginners should have few problems in creating their first drawings.

There's not much to most drawing programs when all is said and done, but many manage to muddy the waters in an attempt to look and feel different to the rest. Expert Draw avoids this temptation and sticks with ease of use.

After a quick smiley face, yin-yang symbol, or one of the other usual vector drawing beginners' drawings, the user will want to move on to something a little more adventurous, and this is where Expert Draw's advanced features come into the picture.

For a program in this price bracket, there are plenty to choose from.

Many make a beeline for is the text-to-curve feature. This is the technique used to bend a line of text around the top half of a circle or along a wavy path and it is ideal for logos or specialist design clips.

Expert Draw's implementation isn't ideal, but it is good enough to satisfy most design needs, if a little awkwardly. You can only select text-to-curve when adding text, which is a disadvantage.

It is better to see the text and curve on the page before deciding to bend one around the other as otherwise it is easy to try to fit a lot of text on a small curve.

It is also difficult to place the text exactly where you want it on a circle or ellipse, but this can be rectified with a quick rotation once the main operation is out of the way.

On the whole, Expert Draw's manipulation of text is excellent.

lent, although the ability to point edit outline fonts would have been useful.

The metamorphosis special effect is another useful tool, and capable of producing pretty stunning transitions from one shape to another.

Its limitation is that it will not morph objects with more than 100 curve points, thus ruling out text morphing, but for simpler cube-to-sphere-to-arrow type transitions it is ideal.

For logos, especially those with a message related to speed, the metamorphosis effect can be a real face lifter. Balls which turn into arrows as they speed across the screen and a host of other effects are possible with little effort, giving flyers and ads a pizzazz boost in the most important areas.

Another flexible tool is distortion. Using distortion, it is possible to select an object then pull any of its four corners to new positions, thus stretching and distorting its appearance.

In addition, X and Y symmetry can be turned on to ensure that the object isn't completely disfigured.

For 3D fans, X and Y perspective buttons are also available on the distort requester, making the creation of 3D-style logos and headings very easy.

These would be more effective if text shadowing and embossing effects were supported, but the finished logo can still be quite impressive.

In combination with a text object which has already been fitted to an arc or path, distort can put the finishing touches to original text designs which can then be output for use in a DTP package.

Output – or export – is supported in three formats – Encapsulated PostScript (EPS), Clip, and Screen. EPS files are written in ASCII EPS format, so they can be imported to most DTP packages but will not display on-screen; Clip (according to PageStream at least) is written in ProDraw format rather than DR2D; and Screen carries out a screen save in IFF format, complete with toolbox and so on.

The export options are adequate, although they could be better, and the import options follow suit. Clips can be imported in Aegis Draw format, Clip, or Vector Trace. The latter is a proprietary format produced by the program's Autotrace function.

Autotrace is the procedure whereby a bitmap IFF graphic is imported then traced around its outlines to produce a vector graphic, and has until recently been exclusively a feature of far more expensive packages. Expert Draw's Vector Trace works beautifully, if very slowly on unaccelerated machines.

To produce a vector drawing complete with all the advan-

tages of the format from a hand-sketched piece of artwork, the user need only scan it using a cheap mono hand scanner, import it for Vector Trace to get its teeth into, then touch up and colour the final product using Expert Draw's Colour Fill requester.

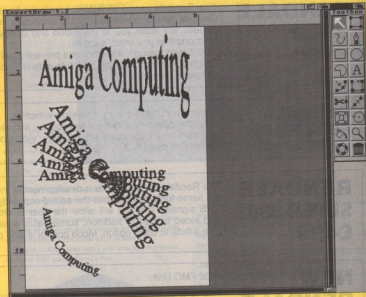
In this way, hand-drawn artwork can become an integral part of your production without the hassle involved in trying to recreate your masterpiece with an unwieldy mouse.

You needn't stop at hand sketches, either. Any scanned image or bitmap file can be traced, though it is best to stick to black-and-white single biplane images for speed.

The finished drawing is created in simple outline without colour information, so there's no point in trying to recreate a full colour image on-screen. In addition, an image with anything more than about three biplanes will take ages to trace, so use Vector Trace circumspectly.

In conclusion, Expert Draw is an ideal tool for the DTP fan, and for its

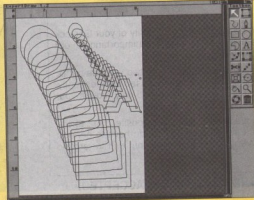
price has some hefty power features. There are a few downs, of course, including the duff file requester, and it should support more font types.

The program is supplied with Times and Helvetica, but you'll need to fork out an extra £39.95 to enable the use of other file formats.
