iReplaceable?

hen Steve Jobs resigned
late in August – despite
everyone expecting it sometime soon anyway, due to
his ill health – Apple stock quickly fell a few
points. The web was more reactive, and news
stories popped up everywhere and speculations abound about how it's the end of an
era, and the decline of Apple has begun...

Jobs is credited with bringing Apple out of near bankruptcy, and in just over a decade, increasing the stock value of the company over 100-fold. There aren't too many other people who can claim to have taken a struggling company, and led it to become the biggest tech company on the planet, so it's obvious that there are some XXXL-sized shoes to fill. Many believe that Tim Cook will be able to successfully handle things after Jobs, but there are also those who feel that Jobs is irreplaceable.

This is not the first time we've seen such reactions: pretty similar things were said when Bill Gates left Microsoft to pursue philanthropy, full-time. All of this is just an opportunity for us media people to make up some creative headlines, get some extra eyeballs and try to invent new ways to tell the same story over and over again; but will it really affect Apple that much? I don't see it happening for quite some time, if at all. Just as Microsoft went through a lean phase in innovations whilst Apple and Google took over gadgets and the web, the future will probably see the reverse happening at some point. Much like the hardware wars between Intel, AMD and NVIDIA, the software wars will continue to see different brands emerge victorious from various battles, but none will win the war for your attention.

Of course leaders are important, and visionaries even more so, but given a decade, all of them are usually quite successful at transferring their visions down the chain of command. When it's an unsuccessful vision, it changes pretty quickly, and when it's super-successful, Apple-like, you can bet your life savings on the fact that the company will not try and fix what isn't broken, and the vision will continue unhindered – the board of directors exist for this very reason, doesn't it?

Leaders are extremely important in life; take for example, the anti-corruption rallies we're seeing around us, and even taking part in – without the catalyst that Anna Hazare is, none of us would be parading the streets fighting against the corruption that we've experienced almost all our lives. Real life needs wake-up calls. Products, or even brands, for that matter, are a different ball game.

No normal person flocks to Facebook because they love Mark Zuckerberg, or buys Apple products because they idolise Steve Jobs... it's all about the end product. Despite Jobs being credited for almost everything Apple has done over the past decade, you can bet there were hundreds, if not thousands of innovative ideas from scores of Apple employees that went into making the iPods, iPhones and iPads that the company has made billions from. No one man is ever solely responsible for a company of that size, or for products that popular.

"Just avoid holding it in that way" was Jobs' response to a complaint about the now infamous death grip of the iPhone. This of course sparked all sorts of reactions: some found it a cool reply, other thought it was unacceptable, but everyone went ahead and bought it anyway. Such was the draw to the device, that even an arrogant CEO, an obvious flaw in the product and web-wide bashing didn't put a dent in sales, then why would a change in the helm matter to the iPeople? No one is iReplaceable these days, and for that matter, no product is either....d

Rice University researchers build nano-sized batteries

n innumerable number of devices run on lithium-ion batteries. Thanks to Rice University researchers, their size is no longer a factor (at least for mobile devices). Prof Pulickel Ajayan and his colleagues claim to have succeeded in building a complete lithium-ion energy storage device in a single nanowire. The researchers say their batteries are as small as devices can get, and hence immensely valuable as rechargeable power sources for the latest nanoelectronics.


The researchers tested two versions of their battery/supercapacitor hybrid. The first version resembles a sandwich comprised of nickel/tin anode, polyethylene oxide (PEO) electrolyte and polyaniline cathode layers. This setup proved that lithium ions could efficiently traverse the anode to the electrolyte, and then make their way back to the supercapacitor-like cathode. The cathode is called a supercapacitor because of its ability to discharge and charge quickly using ions in bulk.

"The idea here is to fabricate nanowire energy storage devices with ultrathin separation between the electrodes," said Arava Leela Mohana Reddy, a research scientist at Rice and co-author of the paper. "This affects the electrochemical behavior of the device. Our devices could be a very useful tool to

probe nanoscale phenomenon."

Speaking about the time it will take such batteries to actually hit the streets, Sanketh Gowda, the paper's lead author, said: "There's a lot to be done to

optimize the devices in terms of performance. Optimization of the polymer separator and its thickness and an exploration of different electrode systems could lead to improvements."



AMD reveals pricing and release date of the first 8-core Bulldozer Zambezi FX CPUs

MD has revealed the approximate retail pricing of its first eight-core Bulldozer processors on a promotional webpage - \$300. Part of its upcoming

FX-Series, which also includes four and six core processors, the eight-core Bulldozers are codenamed Zambezi, with the first two to be released as

the FX-8100 and FX-8150 models.

The AMD Bulldozer FX-8150 is the top-end offering - based on the 32-nm process, it has a 3.6 GHz core clock that can turbo up to 4.2 GHz, all whilst maintaining a TDP of 125 W. At the \$300 pricing, AMD puts it roughly at the same price as Intel's current Sandy Bridge Core i7-2600 offering, a quad-core processor. However, AMD expects it to compete directly against Intel's

upcoming Sandy Bridge Extreme processors, expected in Q4 2011, and Ivy Bridge processors, expected in Q1 2012.

The first Bulldozer processors are expected to be the Zambezi offerings, and are to be launched in October. Also expected with them are the fourcore and six-core FX-4100 and FX-6100 processors.

Nintendo slashes 3DS prices to boost sales

intendo's not doing so well, announcing its first quarterly operating loss, and that it would be slashing prices of the Nintendo 3DS portable gaming console. The move



worries market watchers, who think it will further affect the company's falling stock prices, which dropped over 30% in the past quarter.

The Japanese video gaming giant still intends to sell 16 million of its projected 3DS units, but at 15,000 yen, the maximum suggested retail price in Japan has been cut by nearly 40%. The

3DS will be priced at \$169.99 in the U.S., two-thirds its current going rate.

The quarterly operating loss is Nintendo's first recorded since 2003, which was when the company first started declaring

quarterly earnings. While Nintendo is not the only Japanese company to be struggling to recover after the Tohuku earthquake, most rival consumer electronics companies, including Sony, have managed to stay above the line in contrast.

The next-generation Wii U, announced for 2012, is Nintendo's greatest hope to

Nintendo's greatest hope to bolster its flagging position in the market, and we hope the Japanese giant manages to create an attractive offering in terms of both hardware and software. A lot of developers have already signed up to create titles for it, with the likes of Ninja Gaiden, Assassin's Creed, Darksiders, and Arkham City all scheduled to make an appearance.

Sony PlayStation Vita to launch this October, in a 'phased global release'

leaked flyer from Blockbuster in the United Kingdom has revealed that the PlayStation Vita, or the Android-based Next Generation Portable we are all waiting for, will be launching by October 28th this year. While Blockbuster has not confirmed the veracity of the flyer, it ties in with last week's rumours of the Vita emerging by the Fall.

Speaking to gaming site IGN, Sony confirmed that the PS Vita will be launching with a 'phased global release' in the 'holiday season.' European pricing of the product was also seen on the flier, at £229.99 for the Wi-Fi only version, and



£279.99 for the Wi-Fi+3G version. The price's rather extravagant compared to the already confirmed U.S. pricing of \$249 and \$299 respectively.

Sony hopes to breathe some life into its aging portable platform with the PS Vita, it looks like it will have a strong chance - it has a list of major launch titles (revealed at E3 2011); the apps of the entire Android platform; as well as the hardware to back it all up - with a Tegra 3 'Kal-El' processor quad-core Cortex A9-based processor and SGX543MP4+ graphics; as well as multiple input interfaces from gyroscopes to touchpads, analog sticks to a 5-inch OLED touchscreen. Check out our previous coverage for more details about the PlayStation Vita.

Meanwhile, it looks like Sony is strengthening the Vita's platform before launch, by giving out free development kits. Rubicon Development, an independent developer, has revealed in a report that it has received dev kits from the Japanese giant. Speaking to IGN, Steve Haggerty of Rubicon said:

"We've worked with Apple, and you can't get anything out of them. Microsoft rarely responds and I suppose Nintendo are okay, but Sony are always there to help. They always get back to you." d

Asus Eee PC X101 launched in India; a MeeGo netbook for ₹12,499

sus has launched a new netbook in India, called the Eee PC X101. It has arrived

here ahead of several major international territories, such as the U.S. and Europe, where it is expected in the next couple of weeks. Priced at ₹12,499, the 10.1inch netbook bears a very basic hardware configuration, and we wonder just how well it will do in the market, when there are plenty of other full-featured netbook offerings out there, at negligibly higher prices. Asus aims for it to be an alternative to both netbooks and tablets.

Asus has also chosen to release the Eee PC X101 with MeeGo onboard, not Windows, or any reqular full-featured distro like open-SUSE or Ubuntu. Looking at the specifications, which read almost like a tablet's, we realize nothing else but MeeGo might work

> with just 8GB of built-in storage space (SSD) and 1GB of RAM. As many folks in the industry have observed, this netbook is a hybrid of a tablet and a regular

netbook, unfortunately. No surfeit of ports (with no VGA and Ethernet), no optical drive, and no touchscreen.

The Taiwanese giant apparently intends to provide a fast, rich and intuitive computing experience, while at the same time keeping costs low with the operating system, and hardware. As for storage, a glaring omission, Asus has pre-loaded Dropbox cloud storage for free, allowing users to store some real data.

The Asus Eee PC X101 comes with a choice of an Intel Atom N435 or N455 processor. Other specs include Bluetooth 3.0 connectivity, a webcam, two USB2.0 ports, and a 3-cell battery

that promises a four-hour battery life, using Asus' Super Hybrid Engine (SHE). The Eee PC X101 will be available in white, red and brown.

Xperia Play exclusive: FIFA 12 for **Android**

All Google and a little of Firefox

here is hardly a month that has gone by since the early 20th century where Google didn't feature in our monthly web watch section, and this time is no exception. We've got other participants, from Mozilla's release of Firefox 6, to a little Facebook we almost chose to ignore.

Google makes 'the web faster'

Google launched its Page Speed Service in early August, enabling publishers to speed up how fast their web pages loaded, by 25 to 60%. Page speed, or page load time is not just a factor in the bounce rate of a web page, but also Google's own Page Rank of it. All this is a part of Google's "Make the Web Faster" campaign, which in the past included the Page Speed browser extension, the Page Speed Online API, the SPDY protocol, and the mod_pagespeed Apache module.

With the new service, Google will start web hosting publishers' content on their servers, and present a web-optimized version to users. Publishers hence will not have to worry about compressing their content, caching solutions, or other website optimization details – Google will take care of it for them, once the publishers have pointed their DNS entry to Google.

Games for Data

Google has added twelve games to Google+, including the ubiquitous Angry Birds and Zynga Poker, as a new Google+ Games service. However, to play them, users need to give permission to the app to view a variety of personal information, including the user's email address, basic infor-

mation about your account, and even a list of people that you have placed in your Circles, with the order or priority of them.

Facebook fights back

Google fired the first salvo, adding a dozen games to Google+ on Friday, but Facebook seems to have fired right back with new features that expand its own existing brand of social gameplay. While Facebook's gaming features may have been in the works for some time, it was certainly timed in such a way as to background and rendering it, so when the user clicks, the page is loaded instantly.

Google Chrome 13 also makes some improvements to the Omnibox that can also lead to speedier browsing. In Chrome 13, the Omnibox now taps into your browser history to offer matches from titles and URLs of previously visited websites.

The new version also adds one very unique feature – multiselection of tabs. One can now select multiple tabs at a time (by pressing the Ctrl or Shift key

Firefox 6 released

Firefox 6 should now load much faster if you are using Panorama. Firefox will no longer load tabs that are part of inactive Panorama groups. This means that your browser starts faster and becomes responsive faster as fewer websites are loaded to begin with. If you switch to a panorama group after loading Firefox, it will then begin loading tabs from that group.

Firefox now promotes the Firefox Sync feature while saving passwords or saving bookmarks. Another subtle new feature is that Firefox will now highlight the domain name in the addressbar, making it easier to ascertain which website you are visiting.

You can also check out a preview of Firefox 7 or 8 by downloading the Aurora or Nightly Firefox build. Remember that these can be very unstable at times and it is recommended you use then with a separate profile. d

Google buys Moto, causes Flipout!

ugust 15th saw an Independence Day announcement of an unexpected kind, with Google declaring that it would be buving Motorola Mobility - a deal that will make it a major hardware player in the smartphone business, allow it to spearhead the course of Android handset development and give it access to the wealth of patents the 82-year-old company has developed and amassed in its long and chequered history.

The news of the deal comes not too long after Google lost out on the Nortel Patent Portfolio - an estimated 6,000 telecommunication and other patents which were finally acquired by a consortium of companies including Apple, Ericsson, Microsoft, Research In Motion and Sony. The Google-Motorola acquisition is also seen as a way to bolster Google, the Android deal are numerous, the biggest being Google's possible alienation of its Android handset partners. Google's CEO, Larry



IM has launched three new smartphones bearing BlackBerry 7 OS, which, including CDMA variants for two of them, make five models in total. These could very well be five of the seven that RIM promised to bring by the end of 2011. We'll have to wait and see what the other two bring. Apple #1 globally

he latest results in the on-going battle of global smartphone manufacturers are in, with reports from market research firms Strategy Analytics and IDC showing some interesting developments in the second quarter of this year. The market as a whole has grown 76.3 per cent since Q2 last year, with Apple and Samsung definitely looking to have enjoyed most of the benefits.

Q2 2011 saw Apple more than double its smartphone sales since the corresponding quarter last year, going from 8.4 million units to 20.3 million. Samsung did spectacularly well in the same period, with sales growing more than six times from 3.1 million units to 19.2 million. Nokia's smartphone sales, on the other hand, fell by a third in the second quarter, shipping 16.7 million units compared to 23.8 million the previous year.

The smartphone market shares have certainly been reshuffled, and now have three nearly equal behemoths on topwith Apple holding 18.5% for the first spot, Samsung is second with 17.5%, and Nokia third with 15.2%. Other manufacturers make up 48.9 per cent of the sales, up from 43.4 per cent in Q2 2010.

The fate of Anna - Annabased Nokia 500 smartphone

e were initially sceptical on hearing things like 'Nokia is now focussing on both Windows Phone 7 and Symbian' going around the industry. However, with the plethora of Symbian Belle phones in the making and the company's latest announcement

of a new Symbian Anna device, the 500 (previously known as the Nokia Fate), things have certainly changed around a bit.

The Nokia 500 has something special in store - a 1GHz processor, making it the first Symbian phone to officially boast of that clock speed. With a MRP of €150, excluding taxes, the

Nokia 500 is expected to hit markets by Q3 end, with a black body and six differently coloured back panels bundled. A white version is expected in Q4.

Other features of the phone include 256 MB of RAM, a 3.2inch capacitive touchscreen with 640x360 resolution, a 5MP camera, as well as 3G (14.4Mbps



Mac OS X Mac OS X A Closer Look

Apple's latest desktop computer OS is heavily influenced by iOS, its mobile platform OS. This path of mutual convergence seems interesting to say the least

in-your-face eye-candy is muted down to a level of understated elegance. The UI is a lot more sleeker, minimalist almost; no longer loud or over-emphasised.

Many blue highlights in pop-up windows, for example, are removed to make for a more monochromatic interface. If you see the image below, the buttons aren't acutely curved, neither are they filled with excessive glossy blue visual cues. Even


ver since the iPhone's explosive debut back in 2007, Apple has been hooked on to the mobile device and its platform, iOS, to a level where most analysts and loyalists couldn't help but think the Cupertino-based company had diverted attention from its once flagship product, the iMac. It was understandable, given the iPhone and iPad's meteoric impact. However, Apple reassured fans by holding an appropriately named "Back to the Mac" press event in October last year, where, among other things, it previewed Mac OS X 10.7 Lion for the first time.

After several developer builds, Lion is finally out of the door. It's a step in Mac

OS X's evolution where Apple has imported plenty of features and insights gained from its iOS business. Let's take a closer look.

Lion's new look and feel

With OS X 10.7, Apple has given subtle face-lifts to the overall interface as it was in OS X 10.6 Snow Leopard. In a sense, the tweaks signal the coming of age of Lion's look and feel, where the sense of glossy,

the top tabs aren't glossy blue anymore – a regular feature associated with the older Snow Leopard's default colour scheme. The radio buttons are toned down and, overall, the interface doesn't distract. Also, the traffic lights red, yellow and green window buttons have gotten smaller in OS X Lion. The scroll bars – not vis-

ible in the Finder window – make the iOS influence plain to see. We prefer this new slightly colour-muted look of Lion's interface.

Apart from changing the Mac OS X Lion's login screen, Apple reinstates iOS lessons a little more forcefully by including a touchenabled input device on every Mac it sells – whether it's the multitouch

trackpad on the MacBooks or the Magic Mouse or Trackpad with the iMacs.


Touch-enabled devices were introduced in the pre-Lion era, but they become increasingly significant with Lion's out-of-the-box support for a slew of touch-enabled gestures. In fact, Lion mimics touch-input similar to an iOS

device like the iPhone or iPad. While we're adept at clicking and gesturing on touch screen phones, trying to convince our brains to do the same on a desktop OS is a little difficult from the outset – an uncomfortable learning curve is necessary to enjoy the pure bliss that awaits at the conclusion.

The ability to resize a window from any of four sides and corners is a welcome addition to OS X Lion's user interface; we could never really understand why Snow Leopard and older versions of Mac OS X only limited window resizing from the bottom-right corner. In Lion, you merely

need to stray the mouse pointer in any direction of the active window's boundary to see the pointer transform into a resize assist icon. An age-old itch scratched!

However, users are in for a minor shock when Lion informs them that the default scroll behaviour has reversed. If you scroll your finger up on the Magic Mouse, the active window in front of you will actually scroll down, against natural perception of motion. Luckily, there's a fix to this perceived problem: a minor disabling of a radio button in System Preferences > Mouse. In all Finder windows containing scrollable content, the new Lion UI shows no scroll bars when they're launched.

But scroll on the mouse or trackpad to trigger the overlay scroll bar to appear and scurry up or down. You'll witness a few instances of the massive influence exerted by iOS over Mac OS X.

Many of OS X Lion's "improved" UI features can be rolled back to how things were back in the days of Snow Leopard, should you find switching old habits an irritating exercise.

Mission Control and Launchpad

Apple has tweaked an existing feature of past Mac OSes and borrowed the essence of iOS to contribute towards Mission Control and Launchpad,

MAC OS X: DECADE MILESTONES

September 13, 2000: Apple released a beta version of its upcoming Mac OS X code-named Kodiak, a successor to OS X 9. Aqua interface UI surfaced for the first time. Apple sold Kodiak for \$29.95 (₹1,367).

March 24, 2001: After the preview, Apple launched its first stable release of Mac OS X v10.0, Cheetah. Critics applauded the release but Cheetah had very few supported applications to entice mass adoption.

September 25, 2001: Apple fixed Cheetah's shortcomings by launching Mac OS X 10.1 Puma later that same year. Puma was much better than Cheetah and was sold for ₹5,890, but Cheetah users got it as a free upgrade.

August 23, 2002: Jaguar (Mac OS X 10.2) sported many significant changes over past OS builds – advanced graphics, improved performance and visuals, inclusion of an address book and iChat apps. Also Happy Mac gave way to Apple's logo during bootup on the screen, ending an 18-year-old ritual.

October 24, 2003: With Panther (Mac OS X 10.3) out of the door, OS X included muchadored first-time features like Exposé, Safari browser, an improved version of Finder and PDF rendering. Support for running Microsoft Windows reached unforeseen heights.

April 29, 2005: As many as 150 new features were released with Mac OS X 10.4 Tiger. Dashboard and Spotlight were introduced. In 2006, with OS X 10.4.4, Apple launched the first Intel-based Macs that ran on Tiger.

October 26, 2007: Apple launched Leopard (Mac OS X 10.5) with a bang, proclaiming over 300 new feature additions to the Mac's flagship OS. Unlike Tiger, Leopard had a single DVD for installation on supported Macs. It supported 64-bit apps and introduced Time Machine, Spaces and Boot Camp.

August 28, 2009: Apple killed support for PowerPCs with Mac OS X 10.6 Snow Leopard. Instead of introducing a bunch of new features, Snow Leopard focused on fine-tuning, tweaking and improving the existing OS X experience.

July 20, 2011: Mac OS X 10.7 Lion was launched, where Apple introduced quite a few features from its insight into the hugely successful iOS platform.

respectively. Both these apps reside in the Dock next to the Finder.

Mission Control is a combination of Exposé, Dashboard and Spaces with some fresh features all rolled into one. At the top, you see a row of windows (if you have them open) which essentially is the old Spaces. To add a new Space, just click on the top-right corner; every full-screen app is shown as a Space. Below the top row you have the central, Exposé-like section where you see all open windows grouped by their app. In the bottom, you see the ever-present Dock with a spotlight under the apps that are open and highlighted in Mission Control. Mission Control is a lot of fun and is actually pretty useful.

Launchpad is instantly familiar to anyone who has used iOS before. It's a gesture-enabled app launcher with the ability to group apps together as folders, rename them, etc. – basically everything you thought you can do with apps on iOS' home screen. It instantly shows all the software available on your Mac in a tiled icon layout – a little different from the stacked layout when you click on Applications in Dock. Although it looks pretty, Launchpad is a little difficult to use on the iMac. It feels more convenient and natural to launch on the trackpad of a Macbook. Nevertheless, this is a handy new addition to OS X.

Interesting apps and features

While it's impossible to cover every small feature and app within the confines of this article, we'll list some interesting ones nonetheless.

Auto Save and Resume: Apps that support Auto Save (Preview, iWork, and TextEdit) can automatically save changes to your document as you work; think Google Docs. All changes are saved in the background and you can work without any distraction of pauses or progress bars. What's more, Auto Save in OS X Lion adds the changes directly into the file so there's only one copy

of the document on your Mac. Definitely a useful addition.

Resume is one useful feature, letting you save and restore your session "as it was" even after you shut down or restart your Mac. Lion saves a snapshot of your system as it logs off and reloads the instance when you log back in, resuming it in the exact same state as you last closed it. Apps, documents, windows, processes...everything is restored.

Now you don't have to fret about closing your work. This is a great feature if you want to instantly restart your Mac to finish installing a new app, Hopefully, third-party apps will exploit it to the fullest.

AirDrop: A new but limited feature, AirDrop lets you easily share files between Macs within close physical proximity of

each other; works great at an office environment or home with multiple Mac users. It requires zero setup, no configuring and is extremely simple to take advantage of. Click on AirDrop on the left sidebar of your Finder window to see a radar-

like image with your own

Mac stationed at the bottom. If someone is accessing their AirDrop window within a range of ten metre, they pop onto your AirDrop radar (and vice versa). To share files just drag and drop on the Mac icon within AirDrop, that's it. Communication is secure and peer-to-peer.

iCal: As you can guess, the UI is heavily influenced by the Calendar app on the iPad. Even though we like the leather-clad, hand-sewn, minimal look of the iCal in Lion, we don't like the disappearance of the extremely useful left-hand column (present in the older iCal) which would allow quick launch and flipping through multiple calendars.

The tab views at the top, that is Day, Week, Month and Year are identical to the iPad Calendar app and useful. The Quick Add feature for instantly adding a calendar event is nice and helpful, too. Mail: The new email app's interface in Mac OS X Lion is inspired from... yes, you guessed it right, iOS's email app. It has a three-pane

layout: the left pane has all your mailbox-related features like inbox, drafts, starred, etc; emails from the account are shown in the middle pane, arranged as per date, flags,

etc; and the third, right-most pane displays the email content and conversation thread. The new Mail in OS X Lion has

the ability to preview an email under its header, just like in iOS and the iPad. We don't mind the iOS-ification of the Mail app in Lion, it actually works out pretty well.

With all new things, there comes an inevitable end to that which is old,

whether we like it or not. With OS X Lion, Apple has officially discontinued support for Rosetta which used to allow running apps written for older PowerPC on newer Intel-architecture Macs.

Apple has inconspicuously removed support for Front Row, Mac's media centre software. It has disappointed fans and bewildered users, especially because the newer Lion is more than capable of handling the app.

Last few words

Lion is no doubt a major step forward for Apple's Mac OS X and only time will tell whether Apple's philosophy of merging iOS with OS X will be a hit or miss. As things stand right now, Mac users are in a transition phase with Lion, and for \$29.99 (₹1,369) you can see what all the fuss is about. ◀





What Makes Content Go Viral? Awe, Angst, and A-Holes

It's quite surprising what makes some blogs, posts or campaigns go viral. Read on to find out...

hat makes a tweet, blog post, or ad campaign go viral? According to one of two recent studies, one of the best ways is to inspire awe in the reader. And if that fails, well, tick them off.

Last week, Chris Menning discovered that empathy leads to content "going viral," or being repeatedly passed around the Web, both on social networks and elsewhere. Surprised?

A forthcoming study by two assistant professors at the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania, meanwhile, parsed 7,000 articles in The New York Times to try and understand what boosted an article onto the "most emailed" list. The short answer? Provoking an emotional reaction via the three A's: anger, anxiety, and awe.

In a sense, both studies reiterate the conventional wisdom: "if it bleeds, it leads" is a journalistic cliche, and so-called "yellow journalism" has sold papers for a number of decades. Instead of provoking outrage or disgust, however, Menning took a slightly different tack: he discovered that a reader's sympathy for social awkwardness could create an empathic connection that prompted users to share that content online.

And Menning tested his hypothesis, creating a new meme ("10 Charts of Awkward Situations," or "lolgraphs") that drove three times as much traffic by referral as those that clicked directly on the

BuzzFeed site.

Interestingly,
Menning also found
that a second meme,
pairing a stock photo
with a first-world
cliche ("I poured my
cereal into the bowl
without checking
to see if we still had
milk. We didn't," one
reads, against a photo
that suggests abject
despair) failed to take
off, until someone

removed the BuzzFeed tagline and republished it on Tumblr. There, it attracted over 68,000 Tumblr interactions and started spreading via variations on the theme.

"In attempting to create content that will go viral, many try hard to incorporate popular Internet memes hoping that the right catch phrase, reference, or format will be the magic bullet," Menning wrote. "Most often, it's not about the form that the meme takes, but the relatable common experiences that it conveys."

TICK PEOPLE OFF, AND THEY'LL SHARE – IT'S TRUE

Jonah Berger, who has studied the problem at the University of Pennsylvania, came up with a different conclusion: emotional arousal. Berger has published his second paper on the subject, which is due to be published in the The Journal of Marketing Research at a forthcoming date.

In January, Berger's paper in Psychlogical Science concluded that arousal drives sharing, specifically high-arousal emotions like anxiety or amusement, versus low-arousal emotions like sadness or contentment. Berger's January study showed users an emotionally-charged video, than and neutral video and article. A second experiment forced users to jog (physical, though not sexual, arousal). In both experiments, users who were emotionally aroused or physically aroused shared content more than those who weren't.

Berger's upcoming paper goes further, however, suggesting that readers value and share hope and awe, but that they'll share content that makes them anxious and angry as well. The paper was co-authored by Katherine L. Milkman, an assistant professor of operations and information management at Wharton.

The study examined more than 7,000 New York Times articles over a three-month period to discover why they made the "most emailed" list. It tried to eliminate other sources of influence, such as the time of the day when the story was published, in which section it appeared, its topic, the popularity and gender of the author, and other factors.

Arousal, Berger and Milkman concluded, provokes; it prompts users to act. Anger, the most provocative negative response, also spurs action, while sadness Awe-inspiring headlines included "Rare Treatment Is Reported to Cure AIDS Patient" and "The Promise and Power of RNA". Anxiety-inducing headlines included "For Stocks, Worst Single-Day Drop in Two Decades". Feel-good stories also did well, including "Wide-Eyed New Arrivals Falling in Love With the City". And "What Red Ink? Wall Street Paid Hefty Bonuses" provoked anger, and emails.

What does that mean?

Interestingly, the authors found that a one-standard-deviation increase in the amount of anger provoked by an article

upped the chances of being in the most-emailed list by 34 percent, or the equivalent of an additional 2.9 hours on the site's front page.

Berger and Milkman also tested their theory; the researchers dummied up a pair of ad campaigns, based on the premise that sausage maker Jimmy Dean had hired either a farmer or a rabbi as its new spokesman. Not surprisingly, the fact that pork products are not considered kosher in the Jewish faith amused most of the survey respond-

ents, and they said they were more likely to share the news. They also asked the survey respondents which headline they would be most likely to share: one that said an airline "breaks" guitars, or one that reported

When asked whether they would be likely to share about a woman's recovery (one version of the story used 9/11 as an excuse; the other, a fall down stairs) the respondents chose to share the second version more.

that the airline "smashes" guitars. Again,

unsurprisingly, most chose the latter.

The study measured emailed stories, however, and not sharing of content on Twitter, Facebook, or blogs. But the study found the two overlap, with one exception.

"Analysis suggests that similar factors drive both virality and blogging: more emotional, positive, interesting, and angerinducing, and less sadness-inducing stories are more likely to make the most blogged list," the study found. "Interestingly, the effect of practical utility reverses – though a practically useful story is more likely to make the most emailed list, practically useful content is marginally less likely to be blogged about. This may be due in part to the nature of blogs as commentary."

is a passive response, and generally does not result in content being shared. However, the most high-arousal, positive emotion is awe, meaning that awe-inspiring or, literally, "awesome" content is most often shared.

hotography is a form of art. It isn't just about taking a picture or cataloging a memory, it's an expression of your vision – your vision of what the scene in front of you can be. The function of a photographer is to bring this vision to life. In the days of film, photographers had to rely almost entirely on their experience to assist them in realising this vision. Now, with the advent and proliferation of digital cameras, this task has become much easier. The instant feedback gives us the ability to review our images on the fly and helps perfect the image to match our vision.

Among these various tools is a small, underrated little tool known as a remote shutter release. The main function of this tool is to release the shutter of the camera without the operator actually touching the camera. This might not seem like much, but when it comes to images with slow shutter speeds, every tiny vibration can have a drastic impact on the image. Mounting on a tripod does help, but when it's the pressure of the photographer's finger that can cause the

vibrations in the first place, the remote trigger comes in very handy.

Remote shutter release

Consider a situation where you want to take photographs of lightning, or better yet, as Diwali is around the corner, fireworks, especially the rockets. The ideal way to go about this is to set up a tripod and mount your camera ensuring that it's pointing at the night sky where you expect the said lightning or rocket to explode into existence with all its fierceness and glorious brilliance!

Capturing this moment requires setting the camera on a tripod in "bulb" mode and releasing the shutter at the correct time; then waiting for the event to pass and then letting the shutter close. The longer the shutter exposure, the longer your streamers will be. This is a simple enough task on paper, but when you realize that you have to stand absolutely still for 7-10 seconds with your finger on the shutter release of your camera, you realize that there is a very real chance of ruining the image with unexpected vibrations. It is in situations like these where the remote shutter release will come in very handy.

Hunting around for the parts presented no problem; most of them were available at local electronics and mobile repair shops. We did run into some trouble while trying to construct the trigger. As you'll see on the next page, you require 2.5mm to 3.5mm headphone adapters. Unfortunately, the first pair we bought turned out to be a mono adapter when we actually needed a stereo adapter. The lesson here: make absolutely sure that you have a stereo adapter and a stereo line-in line-out cable. To verify, use a multimeter and do a continuity check, or just plug in some earphones and listen to a track which you know has stereo sound.

DIY

After a bit of delving around we found the approximate cost of a wired remote shutter to be in the range of ₹1500. Being Digitians and fiddle-some by nature, we dug around a bit more and found that the trigger circuitry is actually very simple to reproduce. Simple enough for a Digit DIY. Cost? Not more than ₹200.

The internet is choc-a-bloc with many designs for making a simple remote trigger. After a bit of brainstorming, we settled on one for the convenience of having a modular design and the ability to extend the cable as much as is required. d

Items required (approx. ₹200):

Small empty bottle or container (we used a Tic-Tac container)

2.5mm to 3.5mm stereo headphone adaptors (2 nos. - ₹60 each)

Stereo line-out/line-in extension cable (1 nos -₹25-50)

A length of wire 20 cm at most. (₹5)


Switches (2 nos - ₹20 each)



Attach the cables to the 2.5mm jack using the circuit diagram as reference. After soldering the contacts, we glued the whole setup so that the wires didn't come loose.



Solder the contacts as shown in the circuit diagram. Just make sure none of the contacts are shorted



Carefully insert the apparatus into the box and slot in the buttons. Connect the cables as shown.

Your dSLR remote trigger is ready. Hook it up and fire away! Press the focus button to verify the focus, press the shutter button to focus and shoot.





Soldering gun, solder and flux; wire strippers; drill (optional); a precise ruler or Vernier callipers; glue gun (optional);

Tools required:


marker pen (optional)

Hold the container in your hand and decide where you want the buttons placed. Bear in mind that there will be two buttons. Now, measure the diameter of the switches



and note it down.

Drill the marked holes to a little less than the diameter of the switches. You might also need to make an opening at the bottom to put in the wires.





As we used a Tic-Tac box, we inserted a 2.5 mm to 3.5 mm adaptor through it and knotted the end to ensure it didn't slip out.

Which Open Source licence is for you?

Even if you're not a developer, but are curious about how Open Source stays free, this is a must-read. But say you're thinking of building or are in the process of building an Open Source application. Which licence you should go for depends a lot on what your goals are. Read on to unravel the labyrinth of FOSS licences, and get one that fits your needs perfectly*

he world of Open Source is guided by a philosophy and is strongly bound by principles. The righteousness that permeates the far corners of this world is so strong that even when non-coders think of the subject, there's an inner glow they feel about being on the side of something that's not evil, something that has honour, a way of life that stands for something. Yes, when you install VLC or tinker around in Audacity you feel it too; it's like belonging to a movement and par-

taking vicariously in that collective warm fuzzy feeling. Ever wonder why that is? And what is it that keeps Free and Open Source Software (FOSS) what it is – open and free? Well, since we're laying it on so thick you've probably guessed it – yup it's the licences that govern the mechanisms of FOSS.


How do they do that? By being the guardians of the philosophy and protectors of the code creators' intentions. To understand this, we need to first delve into a bit of history which will also help us understand a few of the terms involved. The first and the foremost term (and perhaps the most often misused one)

means that free software is different from freeware and ergo Open Source need not always be free of cost. Surprised? It's true. The licensing framework is what allows some individuals and companies to make money off Open Source. The much-talked about dual-licensing model is one way to ensure that.

The poles of the spectrum

Now that we're getting to the actual licences part, it's important to understand the spectrum of licences that can exist. On one end, we have public domain code that has no copyright, while on the other end there is proprietary code. Public domain means that the creator of the software has relinquished his copyright over the code. In between the two poles we have licences like the Berkeley Software Distribution (BSD), GNU General Public licence (GPL) and various others. Some are closer (in the rights that they grant) to public domain while some are closer to proprietary or Closed Source software.

It's interesting to note that some countries, especially in the European Union, don't recognize the concept of public domain. The rationale is that if you wrote it, you're the author and treating that as a

is "free". This term when associated with software in this domain relates to freedom; mainly freedom to modify and depending

on the licence, the freedom to copy and redistribute too. It's been infamously said that the "free" in FOSS is like the free in free speech, not free beer. This fact they can't stomach the idea of giving away something that belongs to someone! A good example of public domain code is SQLite, which is possibly the most used code in the world.

The left and the right

Licences broadly fall under two categories: permissive and non-permissive. All of them as a collective are approved by two schools of thought. One is the Open Source Initia-

tive (OSI) and the other is Stallman's Free Software Foundation (FSF). Both schools of thought have a few things in common and allow certain basic rights. These include the right to use, copy, modify to suit user need or create derivative works and redistribute software. Where the permissive and nonpermissive licences differ is with respect to how each one is redistributed. The GNU GPL gives all rights but when it comes to redistribution, the provisions of the GNU GPL imply that the rights you got must be transferred to others. This means that GPLed code will forever remain GPLed.

The licence (in a viral manner) attaches itself to the entire code from then on. GPL is hence called a "copyleft" (as opposed to copyright) licence. Licences other than copyleft ones are permissive. Take the case of the BSD licence. It grants all the basic

rights; even when it comes to redistribution you're free to redistribute under a different licence. All that it asks is that you acknowledge the original creators but not associate

or use the original author's brand equity (so to speak) with your product. Therefore code under BSD can be used in proprietary software (and it often is). You can even chose a different licence for your product and charge fees. This is why characteristically on the spectrum it lies closer to public domain.

The licences themselves

What is a licence? Broken down, a licence is simply text that tells the user (and the world) how he or she may use the accompanying software and code. Back in the day when Open Source was gaining ground, many people came up with their own

licences. On the OSI page that lists licences as per category, there are more than 50 licences (http://www. opensource.org/licences/category). Theoretically, if you understand legalese a bit and are smart enough to cover loopholes, you could come up with your own licence. Of course, it may not be approved by the OSI or FSF, but you could still use it.

If you're still confused about which licence to use, you can take the help of this online tool to help you decide. All you have to do is tick the specific rights you wish to reserve, and the Licence Chooser will identify any licences that match your combination. Of course it's not exhaustive, but it does give a certain degree of information.

Because projects (especially on the enterprise level) use code from a plethora of sources, it becomes difficult to keep track of the various samples and what licence governs them. Some developers (especially on the mobile side) and even large corporations don't really bother with any of the "licence stuff". But when working with parts of Open Source components, there should ideally be a concern for legalities. Should your application become widely used, and you've violated rights ascribed to a code package you've used, you're bound to face some action. Sometime back, Microsoft came under the radar for using GPLed code for one of its Windows 7 applications. When this news was publicised, not only was it embarrassing, but as per the licence norms Microsoft had to open source the code for that application. This disclosure spawned tracking software such as Developer Assistant from a IP company called Protecode. It ensures licence compliance by detecting violations in real time.

Which one is for you?

The answer to that question depends on a few factors. The first is: Did you write the code from scratch? If so, then the entire licence world is open for your picking. Heck, you can even keep it proprietary. The option to make money (and continue to be open source) is most easily available in this case. For example, Ot is available under both, GPL and Commercial licence as is the more famous MvSQL.

But no one writes code from scratch these days. You take code from Open Source projects, mix and modify and build something of your own. In this case, what licence option is available to you depends entirely on what licence that code was governed

under. Copyleft licences like the GPL make the resultant software also GPL. Check up on the accompanying box for details on which one to use when. It's important to note that going in for custom or esoteric licences will deter contributors.

You can also choose to make the images half, quarter, etc, sizes. Please remember: Do NOT set the output folder the same as the one where your originals are. If


Temperature issues

Programming woes

I am also failed to give any execute permission to it (both chmod command and GUI ways are tried!). So I am unable to execute it. But if the same thing can be done in the live user directory (i.e., /home/ubuntu) it gives the execute permission and executes it properly. Please help me whether there exists any way of executing files from windows partition or not?

Windows has no concept of execute permissions, so you cannot set the execute permissions of individual files. Use the home directory instead. Keep your source files on your windows partition, but generate he output binaries in the home directory

While you cannot set the execute permissions of individual files on an NTFS / FAT32 partition, you can set permissions globally for all files on the partition while you are mounting it. If you want you can unmount and then remount the windows partition with the exec permission. You can do this by appending -O exec in your normal mount command.



AUTODESK HOMESTYLER

A web app that allows users to redesign their home with the simplicity of drag-and-drop.

Autodesk Homestyler is a free web app, also available as a Chrome extension. It's a very handy application for designing and laying out the rooms of your home, and, if you were in America, you would be able to directly place orders for the items you selected to furnish your designed home.

The software also allows you to share your designs online on sites such as Facebook as well as export the design to professional software such as AutoCAD.

System requirements

It's recommended that you use a browser such as Firefox or Internet Explorer 9 that supports hardware acceleration of Flash content. Since the software is also a bit resource-heavy and will get bogged down on netbooks and low-speed internet connections.

Getting started

Having a rough sketch or diagram of the overall design before you begin will get things rolling in the right direction. You could run into unexpected problems if you try to modify your design later on.

You can also lay out the floor areas first and add the rooms on top of them. This helps as you'll have a general idea about where the rooms will go and so avoid overlapping walls.

The interface

The interface is very simple. Everything is on an on-screen panel and you just drag whatever you need onto the main canvas. While all the items are classified based on various criteria, it's often easier to just search for what you need as eve-

rything is not necessarily where you expect it to be.

The layout

Basic room placement is quite easily done as the rooms snap to 90-degree angles. It's when you try to create angles and other shapes that you can run into trouble. The software doesn't provide a tool to measure angles accurately so you had better delve into the deep recesses of your mind to dig out what little trigonometric knowledge you may have left. The dimensions are shown on the fly however, so you'll always know what your wall dimensions are.

There are various tools available to nudge the walls to certain shapes, but it sometimes works out better when you split the wall and manipulate the axis and length yourself.

Placement rules


Homestyler has a feature called "placement rules". This feature basically ensures that everything you place in your design is following the laws of physics. For example, without placement rules, you wouldn't be able to place, say, a pot on a table. The pot would end up on the floor, clipping through the table.

You can enable placement rules by going to Edit > Edit Preferences and checking the box marked "Enable Placement Rules".

Placement rules can make moving large objects such as sofas around a room a challenge. This can be overcome by just holding down the [Shift] key while moving the object.

Furnish your home

Furniture is classified into living room, dining room, etc. for quick access so you can choose accordingly.

It's important to note that the furniture is not to scale, so you may find your room looking a little too sparse or cluttered, especially when using furniture from different brands.

Clicking on an item of furniture before dragging it onto your design will sometimes provide you with various options regarding the dimensions and colour of the piece in question.

Snapshots

One very interesting feature of Homestyler is the ability to create photo-realistic snapshots easily.

To create a snapshot, just select the Snapshots button on the menu bar and click on "New snapshot". You'll now see a camera in your design. Position it where you like and rotate the field of view so that the camera is pointing in the direction you would like.

Name your snapshot and hit "Create snapshot" to begin the process. Autodesk will automatically accept your request, render the snapshot and notify you by e-mail whenever your snapshot is ready. The entire process rarely takes more than five minutes.

Sharing

Your design and all snapshots that you take will be stored online and can be shared at anytime. The interesting part about this is that your design, if shared, can be edited at any time by your friends, but they will only be allowed to edit copies created on their own profiles. Your design will remain untouched.

With these few tips to get you started, and a bit of effort of course, you should be well on your way to designing your perfect home!

TABLETS

Tablets are all the rage right now. Whether it's the iPad or one among the army of Android tablets launching every month or even the reclusive Black-Berry PlayBook, whatever the platform, our tips will make you revere your tablet more than ever.

IPAD TRICKS Take a screenshot

Not many people know that there isn't much difference between taking a snapshot of your screen on your iPhone / iPod Touch and taking one on your iPad tablet. In fact, it's exactly the same, minus the differing form factors of course.

To capture your iPad's screen, simultaneously click the Power button (top right) and Home button (bottom, centre) to see a quick flash on the screen and hear a shutter click sound from the device. That's it. You can access the saved screenshot from Camera Roll under Photos - from here you can choose to

email the picture, print it or use it as a wallpaper, among other things.

Disable 3G data roaming

If you jet-set quite a bit and recently bought an iPad with a 3G SIM, you'd do well to turn the 3G radio off whenever you leave your home network. You don't want to incur significantly higher data charges, unless

ANDROID TRICKS Browse sites as on your desktop

Since Android's primarily a phone OS, its browser is recognized as a mobile phone browser by most popular websites who have a phone-optimised version of their site. As you can imagine, viewing a 7-inch smartphone-optimised web site on a 10-inch tablet screen can be a severe mismatch - not to mention a sheer waste of screen space. How do you rectify the problem?

Most web sites allow you to select between a mobile and full version but you can manually override your Android 3.0 browser's default mobile version by tweaking it in Settings. Select Browser settings and click on Advanced tab. All you need to do is change the User Agent String to either Desktop or

Tablet. Now, you should be able to view web sites just the way you see them on your desktop browser.

Encrypt your Android tablet's data

If you're using your Android Honeycomb tablet for official use, don't think your data can't be protected right out of the box - no third-party apps or no special services are required. Honeycomb adds data encryption (much like BitLocker in Windows 7) support right at the OS level.

To enable data encryption on your Android Honeycomb tablet, ensure your device is completely charged first. Next, put a password or an unlock pin on your tablet's Home screen. The final step is to go to Settings > Location and Security, and hit on "Encrypt data on your device." Google doesn't specify what sort of data encryption it uses, but hey, at least something's better than nothing.

BLACKBERRY PLAYBOOK

Delete the associated BlackBerry ID

During first use of the newly purchased Playbook, a Blackberry ID sign-in is compulsory to authenticate the device and associate your activity with BlackBerry's products and services with that account. To change the associated BB ID, you need to perform a security wipe on the PlayBook. Here's how:

Click on the gear icon on the top-right of PlayBook's screen to launch the Options menu. In the left column, select Security. Type "blackberry" to indicate security wipe followed by clicking on Wipe Data. This will restore your Playbook almost back to factory settings - take care, security wipe will delete your personal data, photos and videos from the device. Proceed with caution.

Delete apps






Like most people you've probably used Google Calendar and are aware that you can create your own calendar for work-related events. But did you know that you can create additional calendars to schedule and track other events? For instance, you can create a family calendar to schedule your important festive events, gatherings and social engagements or create a calendar with work mates to co-

ordinate team outings. To create a team calendar the first step is to create a regular calendar and share it. To create a calendar click Settings, then Calendar settings, then Calendars, and finally Create new calendar.

Share the calendar

"Share this calendar with others" enables you to either share the calendar publicly or share just it within your organization. After making a selection, you can then select what viewers are allowed to see when they view the calendar. The options available are defined by your Google Apps administrator. "Share with specific people" enables you to define a select group of individuals to view, modify or manage the calendar.

Use the calendar

After creating the calendar, it should now be visible in the 'My calendars' section of your main calendar. If it doesn't display immediately, you may need to refresh your browser window. Now when you create a new event, you have the option of creating it on your personal calendar or on your new team calendar.

Copy events between calendars

It's easy to display events on one or more calendars. Let's say you create an event on your personal calendar. You can quickly copy it to the team calendar without having to re-create it by following these steps:

- 1. Open the event's details screen.
- 2. From the 'More Actions...' drop-down menu, select the calendar you wish to copy the event to.
- 3. Click Save.
- 4. Now when you view your calendar, you will see the event listed twice once on your personal calendar and also on the team calendar. if you want to hide the team

calendar on your personal calendar, simply click its name in the 'My calendars' section. To view it again, simply click the name a second time.

Layering Google Calendars

Layering Google Calendars is a great way to see others' calendars layered on top of your calendar and can be a great time saver. For instance, layering calendars can help you quickly find a time when certain individuals are available for a meeting. To layer calendars you first need to populate your Other Calendars or My Calendars section by adding Co-workers calendars.

Adding a Co-worker's Calendar

To add a co-worker's calendar to the Other calendars section, simply enter their email address in the 'Add a coworker's calendar' field (1) and press Enter. If your co-worker has opted to share his or her calendar, it will display in the list below. If they've opted not to share their calendar, the 'Add a coworker's calendar' dialog displays allowing you to request view access to their calendar. To request access, edit the message in the text field (2) or leave the default message as is and click Send Request (3). Your co-worker will then receive an email indicating you would like to view their calendar. If they then share their calendar with you, you will receive an email indicating you can now add and view their calendar.

Using Layered Calendars

To layer multiple calendars, click once on the calendar or individual listed below the My calendars or Other calendars sections. You can layer multiple calendars over your calendar. Any calendar that displays color behind the calendar or individuals' name is layered on top of your calendar.

To remove or hide a calendar from being layered on your calendar, click once on the name of the calendar with a solid color in the My calendars or Other calendars sections.

Viewing multiple layers efficiently


If you have multiple calendars layered on top of your calendar, a quick way to show only your calendar, and hide the calendars of others. is to click the down arrow to the left or your name or email address and click Display only this Calendar. This also works with any calendar listed in either section.

Smart rescheduler

Often in chockablock calendars it's difficult to find a convenient time that suits multiple people. In such cases instead of going through everyone's calendars to look for a slot use the Smart Recheduler lab feature to automatically find new times for you and your team. To use this feature you must first enable it.

Enabling Smart Scheduler

Smart Scheduler is a Google Calendar lab. Labs in Google Calendar are accessed the same way you access labs in Gmail:

- If this is the first lab you're enabling labs in Google Calendar, click Settings > Calendar Settings and select Labs. If you've already enabled labs in Google Calendar, then just click the green beaker.
- 2. Next, enable the 'Smart Rescheduler' and save your changes.

Rescheduling Meetings

Open the event in question in edit mode and click the small arrow at the right of the screen to reveal the enabled lab. There vou'll find the Smart Rescheduler lab. Click "Find a new time....". On the "Find a new time" screen, enter the the length of the meeting and a date and time range if desired. The information to the right will update automatically. If you find a time that works based on the information in green, click "Schedule this....". If there is a conflict (orange or red text) click show details to view the conflict.

Enabling Tasks in your calendars

The same tasks feature that you see in Gmail can be enabled for Google Calendar as well. To do this click Tasks located in the 'My Calendars' section. Tasks will display to the right of your calendar. Click Tasks again, or click the small arrow, to minimize the section.

NTFS

Transparently compress your files

What does it even mean to transparently compress you files? Well, it means your files are stored in a compressed form on your hard drive, but any application can open it as normal. You can save some space (or a lot of space, depending on the contents of the file) and still continue using the file without worrying about zipping it and unzipping it each time since this feature is at the file-system level.

This only works on NTFS partitions that are configured a certain way — don't worry,

unless you messed about with allocation unit sizes while formatting, this will work.

- Right-click the file / folder you want to compress and click properties
- 2. Here in the attributes section you will find a button labelled "Advanced..."; click on it
- Under the "Compress or Encrypt attributes" section,

- click on the chekbox labelled "Compress contents to save disk space"
- 4. Click OK twice, and you will see a progress report for compressing the files

Windows will now auto-

matically compress this file while saving and decompress it while opening, so the application you use need not know that it is even compressed.

This works best for uncompressed text files. JPEG / PNG photos and even documents such as docx and

odf are already compressed, and wont compress more.

Transparently encrypt your files

You can set up all the permissions you want for your files, but such "security" measures will easily be thwarted by someone


who opens your hard drive under their own copy of Windows or Linux. If you really want to maintain control of your data, and ensure that it doesn't fall into anyone's hands even if they steal your hard drive, you should consider using encryption.

The procedure for encrypting is similar to the procedure for compressing mentioned above. The only difference is that in the 3rd step, instead of clicking on the checkbox labelled "Compress contents to save disk space",

contents to save disk space", click on the checkbox for "Encrypt contents to secure data". You can't both compress and encrypt at the same time.

We have to warn you about using this though, since it can have some unpleasant complications if you are not careful. Here is what you should be aware of:

1. Encrypted files can only be opened by someone logged

in with your user account, unless you specifically add others

- 2. Encrypted files are encrypted will a key that is encrypted with your password
- 3. Thus, encrypted files are only as secure as you password
- 4. You could loose all your encrypted files if you forget your password
- 5. You could loose all your encrypted files if you reinstall Windows

You should back up your encrypted file keys to ensure you can get access to your data if the worst should happen.

Use symbolic / hard links and junctions

We are used to looking at files and folders a certain way. We have drives, that have folders, that have further folders and files. If you want the same file in two folders you have to make a copy. This makes greatly constrains how you organize you computer.

Size: 26.8 MB (28,159,661 bytes)
Size on disk: 9.15 MB (9,603,612 bytes)

"Size on Disk" is much lesser than the "Size"

The fact is, NTFS allows the same file to exist in multiple folders at the same time, or under different names in the same folder! We are not talking about copies here, to be clear; NTFS allows for multiple files in multiple directories to point to the same data on the hard disk. This way the data is stored once, and each "copy" doesn't take more space.

Unfortunately Windows doesn't include good tools to actually make use of this functionality. So we recommend Link Shell Extension [link / path here] a free utility that add support for creating links to Windows Explorer. With it you can work the following:

- Hardlinks: Hard links are what we have described above. Multiple file names and locations all pointing to the same piece of data on the hard drive. If you create a hardlink to a file, it will start to exist in another location, but you can edit / view the file from either location. A hard link to a file has to be created in the same drive as the original file.
- Symbolic Links: These are more like shortcuts, is that you can create a link to a file in another drive or even on the network. Unlike shortcuts, symbolic links are transparent to applications, they will open the file directly instead of first interpreting the link.
- Junctions: Junctions let you create a link to a folder like you create a symbolic link. So a folder such as D:\folder1\folder2 could be linked to C:\foldera\folderb. You could access all files of D:\folder1\folder2 could be accessed C:\foldera\folderb. Any operations you perform on the linked location, such as adding / deleting files will actually happen in the original folder.

Volume mountpoints: If you've used Linux, you'll know that it has a very different way of handling partitions, instead of C:, D:, E: etc, in Linux partitions are mounted as "folders", so / hardrive, /home, /media/cdrom etc. Something similar is possible with Windows! You can have a new partition show up as C:\ partition instead of E:

Take advantage of fsutil

This is a nice utility included with Windows XP and above that allows you to control many low-level features of NTFS. NTFS is an advanced filesystem with many features, but this also means that unused features can impact performance. Some of these can be turned off or turned on for better performance.

Fsutil: Disable old DOS names

In the old DOS days, file names were limited to 8 characters, and each file could have a 3 character extension at most. A lot has changed since then, and now file names can be as long as 255 characters of Unicode — so you can even have file names in Hindi.

Windows 95 and 98 relied extensively on DOS, and thus they needed to maintain the old 8.3 names in addition to the longer file names. To maintain backward compatibility with older OSs even Windows 7 generates these file names. If you don't use any obscenely old software, you are better off turning this feature off.

To disable creating these file names, run the following command using the run dialog or the commandline:

fsutil 8dot3name set 1 This will disable it for all drives, while the following will disable it for all drives except the Windows system drive: fsutil 8dot3name set 3 Another way to do this use this if you are running Windows XP — to run the following command:

fsutil behavior set disable8dot3 1

Fsutil: Disable Last Access timestamp

Windows maintains a Last Access timestamp for each file and directory that keeps a relatively up to date record of when the file / directory was last accessed / modified. The trouble is, this will be updated each time you even open a folder. The latest timestamp will be written to disk, and this can have a performance impact especially if there is an application making a lot of updates to the disk.

However, this is a core feature and some applications rely on this information. According to Microsoft's own documentation, their Backup and Remote Storage applications / services need this enabled to function. Be caution and use only if necessary, there may be other third-party applications that need this information.

You can disable this timestamp using the following command:

fsutil behavior set disablelastaccess 1

Fsutil: Encrypt the paging file

You RAM has some of your most personal data, since it any running, or even non running applications will have stored some stuff there. This would include private documents, passwords etc. Once you switch your computer off though, all that data is lost so there isn't much to worry about.

However you computer also uses your paging file to store such data, and that paging file survives reboots. Yes, there is an option to delete the paging file at each boot, but that is not

enough, since deleted files can easily be recovered. This feature will make your private data more secure, but it also has a performance impact, so be wary.

fsutil behavior set encryppagingfile 1

Changes will occur on reboot.

Pick the right Allocation Unit Size

You may have noticed an option to select an Allocation Unit Size while formatting a drive, and possibly wondered what it does. This setting can have an impact on performance and storage efficiency so it is important to understand how to select it and why.

The allocation unit size also known as the cluster size. A cluster is the basic unit of storage on the disk. Your file size might be measured in bytes, kilobytes etc, but it is stored in clusters. What this means is, if you have a 4 kB cluster size, the minimum amount of space that will be allocated for a file, will be 4 kB. So a file whether it is bit or the full 4 kB will take 4 kB of space; additionally a 6kB file will take 8 kB, i.e. two clusters. This is why there are two values for file / folder size, "Size" and "Size on Disk" in File properties. This difference can be quite significant — just check a folder with many files - since the differences add up.

For maximum efficiency it is best that the average file size be a multiple of the cluster size. This way lesser space is wasted per file. Since you can only change this value while formatting a partition, it isn't possible to know this in advance. However you can estimate this and accordingly organize your files. If you are storing larger files, such as music, videos etc. on a partition, use a higher cluster size, know that if you pick a size larger than 4 kB, then you will not be able to use

file compression (mentioned above) on the drive.

If on the other it will have smaller sized files, such as those that accompany some games and software, it is best to go for a small cluster size. Cluster sizes can go down as low as 512 bytes i.e ½ kB.

Pick wisely because once you pick a cluster size, it cant be changed without reformatting the drive! At least not using Windows itself. There are some advanced (non-free) partition management software that can resize the cluster size without needing to format the drive.

MUFIN PLAYER 2

Mufin is a refreshing new player that has a strong focus on music recommendation and cloud integration. The free version gives you online storage of upto 1GB in the form of a Mufin Drive and the player is supposed to have a good enough database to manage large collections of music. A much touted feature lets you analyse songs for evaluating similar

characteristics for automatically generated playlists (kinda like Genius in iTunes).

Import music

When you start the player for the first time (Download: http:// www.mufin.com/) like any other player, it will ask you to import your music. Mufin howlibrary for quicker access, it also analyses the tracks to identify their aural genre - happy, sad, synthetic, acoustic etc. Be warned if you have a large collection it'll take ages, and bring a slightly outdated system to a grinding halt. The player can import from iTunes as well as add files from the hard drive. Simply point to the path. Next, the player will prompt you to sign in with a Mufin account. It's recommended that you register for making full use of the features.



Blackberry Bold 9900:

Needs a Hard Reset

RIM desperately needs to innovate if it wants Blackberry to capture market share

s a Blackberry addict and connoisseur, the Torch was a huge disappointment - it was a phone released while in beta, and as such one was eagerly awaiting Torch 2 and Bold Touch. In particular, the touchscreen integration on the Torch was awful, the screen poor in terms of resolution and the overall experience pretty dismal. One had high hopes from the Bold 9900 but it too disappoints. Let's start with what's good about it: the keyboard is the best in class. Simply put, no one else in the world makes keyboards like Blackberry does. Second, the touchscreen experience is markedly better than on the Torch. Thirdly, the build quality is significantly better than before, but still way behind peers like the iPhone, though it is thinner and sleeker than before. As far as good news goes, that's about it.


It took two brand new devices to be bought and returned because the Blackberry OS 7 is simply not a major improvement over OS 6 but actually a disaster while using the switch device wizard, which simply refused to work. I tried everything from wiping the device clean to removing third-party apps, but no luck. Finally it was done the old fashioned way by backing up and restoring which happened only after four attempts. Not just this, the first new device kept randomly rebooting itself - I did about 40 random reboots, yes 40 in 4 hours! The web and user forums also indicate that several others are facing

the same issue. Blackberry should be ashamed on releasing buggy OS software time and time again. Has anyone ever heard of an iPhone rebooting by itself?

The Bold 9900's screen again disappoints with its mediocre resolution (640x480) - Samsung Galaxy S2 remains the best screen on any smartphone in the world today with the Super AMOLED, not to mention the myriad qHD and retina displays out there. The battery life is noticeably less than the Torch for the battery is smaller (1200 mAH vs. 1500 mAH on the Torch). The app store continues to disappoint, as does the user interface and the third-party apps. Another small gripe - when someone pays ₹31,000 for the phone don't you give him a 8 GB micro SD card with it like Samsung does? Also there are numerous complaints about its poor customer service and responsiveness in India - just search the web.

The only place where Blackberry pushes the envelope is with Near Field Communications (NFC) in the Bold, but then one is not aware of any NFC applications or outlets accepting them in India yet.

Blackberry's problem is it's simply not cool enough to attract the younger generation, and its corporate attractiveness is diminishing rapidly. All changes in it, be it the processor speed (still 1.2 GHz single core Snapdragon processor vs. dual core in most 2011 top-end smartphones), or features or the camera



iPhone are clawing into Blackberry's market share every single day, it should get out of its incrementalism and smugness of being the best corporate device, for that position is under serious threat today. d

The case in point

20 cabinets (₹2,000 - ₹7,000) face off against each other to help you get the right fit

fter selecting the core components of your rig, the next important decision is selecting the right cabinet to house them. Five years back, the person who assembled your PC gave you the

most affordable cabinet along with a power supply. The situation now is completely different.

Cabinet selection is given as equal importance as the rest of the components, since a cabinet with poor air flow, poor build and no wire management features won't help in the longetivity of your core components. Cabinets as a product category

vary in price range – from the sub-thousand rupee cabinets to ones over ₹25,000. Based on the user queries we receive, we concluded that most of the buying happens in the under-₹7000 price bracket. So we called for cabinets within this price range from around six brands and got around 20 of them. Here are the test results.

₹2,000 – ₹4,000

Cooler Master Elite 335

CM Elite 335 has a mesh design on the front frame while the lower half of the frame has ventilation cutouts on the edges. Clean and simple design is the mantra. The side panel has a bulging grill section which has the air guide on the inner side to direct the air out from the CPU cooler section.

The cabinet is quite spacious even for an ATX board. HDD and ODD bay trays are fixed and have the clip-lock mechanism to hold the drives in place. An Ideal case for those on a budget and are willing to spend some money on custom fans.

Circle UberCool

This looks like an ordinary cabinet except for the two red fans on the top portion. There's a fan controller with two USB ports on the side. The side panel has no fan section or provision to add a fan, but there are circular openings to let the air out. On opening the cabinet, you'll find a single fixed HDD and ODD bay frame. There's very little space to play around with after you've lodged an ATX board. There's some space on the side of the

HDD bay frame where you can manage some unruly wires.

Also, we found the tray to bend in places – a sign of poor build. The base of the cabinet has minor rubber pads for absorbing vibrations. There's a dust filter under the base of the cabinet around the PSU section.

Cooler Master Elite 371

Cooler Master Elite 371 is a mid-sized tower built with ventilation in mind as the front portion is covered in mesh. This cabinet has no front fan but has a rear fan. There's a provision to add two fans on the top. The case is quite solid and we didn't notice any bending of the metal on the motherboard tray. However, there's little space to move around after an ATX board has been placed. The HDD and ODD bays have click locks.

ePRO Dragon

At first glance, this cabinet looks like an out and out gaming cabinet, but what's surprising is its low price point. The front frame has a black and red plastic design with neat spaces exposing the mesh section it hides. The side panel has a large 240 mm fan and a honeycomb grill on the outside. The cabinet interiors are grev. The HDD bay is detachable to help you in conveniently setting up your system and managing wires. Both, the HDD and ODD bays have a toolless clicklock mechanism for the drives. For a cabinet this economically priced, the build quality is quite sturdy. It's ideal for gamers on a budget.

GELID GX-7 CPU cooler

The glossy red surface is a surefire dust magnet.

The front frame has a slide mechanism to reveal the connecting ports. The lower half has a mesh opening for air intake with a triangular power button upfront. The side panel is transparent and has one 120mm and one 80mm fan. The PSU is mounted on the top. We noticed

that once you add an ATX cabinet it leaves very little space to maneouvre around. The fixed HDD bay tray doesn't help matters when you want to add in a longer graphics card.

Zebronics Aviator

Despite its compact size, our board fit in perfectly. Once again though not much room to maneouver around. The HDD bay has no clip lock system. The HDD has to be placed with the SATA ports coming out towards the side of the motherboard. So if you want to add a card, one bay will have to be sacrificed.

We like the two fans on the side panel which can be manually controlled with a switch. Also this is one of the few boards that has support for an SD card reader.

Cooler Master Elite 430 Black

CM Elite 430 Black is a simple looking case with a black plastic frame covering the 120mm fan behind the mesh and opening out to show the 3.5-inch and 5.25-inch bays. The front panel is removable and has dust filters around

the 5.25-inch bays. The side panel has a transparent window with

provision to add a 120mm fan. The side panel is very weak, as in it easily bends applying on minimal pressure. The HDD and ODD bays have a toolless design, and there's around 90-95 mm free space between the motherboard edge and

the HDD bay frame. We were surprised to find no rear fan.

NZXT Source 210

The Source 210 Elite looks fleetingly like the H2 thanks to the front frame jutting out from the plane of the frame. The ports are located at the top edge. There are slits around the front portion for ventilation and the entire frame can be detached to add two fans at the front. On the top, there's a provision to add two fans.

The side panel doesn't have any fan but you can add one 120 mm fan. Inside the cabinet there's sufficient space to move around even after adding an ATX board. The motherboard tray is quite sturdy and there's enough space to manage the wires between the right side panel and the board tray.

Considering the board has just one rear fan, you'll need to invest in additional fans if you want a cooler system. It's great for amateur case modders as there's ample scope to experiment with fans.

Circle Polar

The front frame has a glossy exterior along with recessed

optical drive bay and connecting ports located in the front. On the inner side of the side panels you'll find O.5cm thick sound dampening foam. The base and top portions also have these sound dampening foams. This case is targetted at those users who want an extremely silent system.

The HDD bay is removable and there's sufficient space within the cabinet for wire management. There are dedicated dust filters on the base of the cabinet.

Cooler Master USP 100

The logo in the lower half of the cabinet also functions as the power button. The mesh appearance is maintained from top to bottom for optimal ventilation. There's a dust filter on the inner side of the mesh. The ports are located on the top with a slightly depressed top portion to have a portable HDD.

The side panels of the cabinet have an option for two intake fans. The base of the cabinet has anti-vibration pads for the PSU. There are enough wire management options with dedicated U-shaped plastic cable management clips located just on the periphery of the motherboard tray.

Circle Volcano

Volcano's whole front frame is detachable and doesn't have any dust filters on the inside. The connection ports (USB 2, USB 3 and eSATA) are located on the top of the cabinet just behind the power button and under a slide door.

The presence of green coloured anti-vibration rings is quite a good feature as it prevents HDDs and ODDs from unnecessary vibrations. The USB 3.0 wire must be con-

nected to the USB 3.0 port on the motherboard back I/O panel. Overall it has a pleasant design inside.

Antec Sonata Proto

The top half of the front face can be locked and hides the 5.25-in ch bays and the power/reset buttons. There are only two thumb screws on the left hand side panel which can be locked with the help of a key. This prevents an unauthorised person from opening your cabinet.

The all-metal body has sharp edges. Specially the 3.5in HDD bays. Although the are the click-lock types, but since they are made of metal you have to be doubly careful around its edges. Also the 3.5in bays are located very close to the front wall such that your finger will get sandwiched between the clip and the front edge.

₹4,001 – ₹7,000 NZXT Guardian 921RB

This was one of the most welldesigned cabinets that we tested and the only one with connection ports on the side. The Guardian has a definite head section, a body and the base. The three slits forming a Y shape get illuminated when the system is on. The head portion has an LCD readout of temperatures of the components inside. This feature was quite interesting and adds a professional touch to the cabinet. The front frame door opens to reveal three 5.25inch bays and two 3.5-inch bays along with a fan at the base.

The side panel looks quite attractive with its designer window which holds a fan in the centre. This portion tends to bend easily under minor pressure. The HDD can be lodged with the help of two plastic rails and nails at strategic positions to lock the HDD. With an

ATX board inside the cabinet, there's little space to maneouvre around, but it's ideal for a microATX board.

We would have liked to see anti-vibration rubber rings for the HDD and the PSU on this otherwise feature rich board.

Antec NSK 4482

The front portion of the frame is slightly protruded with gaps for air ventilation on the edges. It looks simple, and this look carries onto the side and top panels as well. This is a rare board in which you have to open the top panel first to unlock the

side panels. It comes with an Antec 380W power supply, but we used out own Corsair HX620W for the performance tests. There's a proper section to house the PSU, and if you aren't using the ODD you can use that space to manage wires. The HDD bay has anti-vibration rings but the design requires you to screw in your HDD. This is something we didn't like. You can only add one fan in the front portion. Also, things get cramped if you're using an ATX board, as there's little room for wire management if you add in more HDDs or ODDs.

Cooler Master Storm Enforcer

The bevelling on the lower half of the front frame resembles the thorax of a honey bee, whereas the top half is a solid bevelled lid which opens to reveal the 5.25-inch bays. The matte black finish ensures that the front frame is dustproof. The Enforcer houses two USB 3.0 ports and the top portion has a slight depression just behind the location of the ports. This is an interesting touch as you can just place your portable hard drives in that space.

The side panel has a transparent window without any provision for adding a fan. We found it to be much stronger than the tinted window seen on NZXT Tempest Evo.

The base of the cabinet has anti-vibration pads for the PSU and just in front of them is a rectangular structure to either house a 2.5-inch driver or manage the wires coming out of the PSU there. The HDD bay can be detached as well as rotated. The USB 3.0 adapter can directly be connected onto the mother-board, which is a huge plus.

Zebronics Invader

This is one of the largest cabinets we have in this compar-

ison. It has a click-lock mechanism on both the side panes which is

interesting. But you cannot lock the cabinet with a key as you can in the Antec Sonata Proto cabinet. Just above the power button on top, you have four fan control buttons. Behind it there's a slider which reveals two USB ports, an eSATA port and a

regular SATA port. On the front of the cabinet you have the SD / CF card slot.

The glossy surface is a dust magnet, but overall the design is quite appealing with the grilled sections neatly complementing the solid glossy plastic.


Internals are quite spacious, and you have a 2x80mm fan door on the side which is independent of the side panel. This door is removable incase you don't want it. HDD and ODD bays are situated at around 70 mm from the far end of the board, which means there's enough space to add in a long card without affecting HDD bay frame. On the other side of the panel there's sufficient space to manage the wires.

Cooler Master HAF 922

The sturdy body with matte black anodised finish looks a bit dull when your system is off. The front panel is designed with air flow in mind and you'll find a 200 mm intake fan with mesh slots through the entire frame. Side

panels have noticeable tapering bulk which helps in managing thicker wires behind the motherboard base. The top portion houses the power/reset and fan LED buttons. But they are recessed within the indented top portion of the cabinet where you can place a portable HDD. There's a provision for adding either a 200mm fan or two 120mm fans on top.

Inside the cabinet the HDD bays have a toolless design. There's enough space to maneouvre around inside the cabinet once you place your ATX board. Wire management is a breeze, thanks to enough space between the tray and the right-hand side panel.

Circle Black Hawk

Black Hawk is a proper gaming cabinet. There are two fans in the front portion and it has two USB 2.0 ports, two USB 3.0 ports and an eSATA port on the top edge. That will take care of pretty much all your connectivity needs. Fan control buttons are also present. We really like the whole grilled metal look with the fan sections protruding on the front and top.

Inside the cabinet you're greeted with a very modular design. A tray separates the motherboard section from the PSU section. There's provi-

HOW WE TESTED

On the outset we decided to limit the cabinets within the price range of ₹2,000 to ₹7,000. Within this range we further split the cabinets in the price bracket ₹2,000 - ₹4,000 and ₹4,001 - ₹7,000.

TEST RIG

We assigned 60 per cent weightage to the features and the rest to performance. We noted the location of USB ports, power buttons, audio/mic jacks, options to add more fans, wire management, etc. More points were given to boards having a toolless design. We also measured the thickness of the board with the help of a Vernier Callipers.

For performance we calculated the difference between the ambient temperature and the core component temperatures such as CPU and GPU cores. To stress the CPU we ran CineBench R10 in five loops and noted the maximum temperature of the hottest core (using RealTemp) in the last two runs. Ambient temperature was measured with a digital thermometer.

For the GPU test we ran the Unigine Heaven v2.0. Settings were: Extreme Tessellation, Resolution of 1920x1080 and 4x AF. We used MSI AfterBurner utility to get the temperature of the GPU core.

In both the CPU and GPU tests, we locked the fan speeds (stock cooler for CPU and GPU fan) to 40 per cent as we wanted to see how cool the components stayed with the fans within the cabinet.

Coming in all black, the H2 has a flat plain door with chrome accents on the edges. The frame opens to reveal three 5.25-in bays and two 120mm fans on the lower half. These fans are

clipped on and there's a circuit which is completed when the top left-hand corner of the fan's enclosure touches the contact on the frame.

Thumb screws hold the side panel in place and there's no opening on either of the side panel in terms of mesh or grills. The top portion of the cabinet is interesting. It has the power

button, fan controller and the USB 2 and USB 3 port. There's a bay for a SATA HDD on top with a covering; Behind this is a magnetic cover which when opened reveals a space to add an additional 140mm fan.

The cabinet's side panes and front door have foam for dampening noise. Disappointingly, the build quality of the HDD trays is quite flimsy though. Wire management is taken care of by the grommets on the motherboard tray.

NZXT Tempest Evo

The front frame looks quite simple, but the two projections on the side which continue on the top have an angular design which rises up and then tapers down giving a classy touch to the cabinet. Each of the two front fans have their separate dust filter.

The side panel has a tinted window design which tends to bend on minimal pressure. Assembly of fans on the EVO is quite prolific, with two 140mm

fans on top, one on the side, two in front and one on the rear, you can be rest assured that your components have enough cooling inside the cabinet.

PSU has anti-vibration pads and there are two cages for holding upto eight drives. There are dedicated grommets on the base support of the motherboard for wire management. Also, the panel on the other side bulges out slightly so that the wires coming out of the other side have some breathing space.

There's around 100 mm which is enough space between the motherboard edge and the hard drive bay.

Verdict

Cooler Master HAF 922 won the Best Performer thanks to its silent and cool operation within the cabinet.

In the ₹2,000 to ₹4,000 segment, ePRO Dragon won the Best Buy as it had many features and provided a decent performance thanks

We divided the contestants into three major categories: entry-level dSLRs, enthusiast dSLRs and pro dSLRs. We listed all possible specifications, but only features were assigned a score and taken into account for computation of winners. For example, specifications such as sensor size and shutter speed range were listed but not scored, whereas the presence of an auto ISO mode was. For each camera, we rated the menu system and its intuitiveness, as well as the ergonomics and of the buttons and dials and their layout, and build quality.

We didn't want a camera's image quality restricted by the quality of lens. Sony didn't agree to send us the lens we wanted; but Canon, Nikon and Olympus did. For Olympus, this was the Zeiko 12-60 and Zeiko 35-100 f2.0, and for Canon and Nikon we used their 24-105 f4 IS USM and 24-120 f4 IS SWM, respectively. For Sony, we used their 18-55-kit lens.

Our image quality tests consist of focussing and subjective image quality tests. For focussing, we check each camera for front or back focussing. We focussed at a point on a diagonally placed display. A spreadsheet is displayed on the screen, since its cells serve as a good way to gauge front/back focussing. With a particular cell within focus, we observe blur and sharpness of the adjoining cells. If the sharpness is uneven further away, the camera is front focussing and if it's closer to the camera, it is a problem

could just be that we need to get used to Sony's attempt to do something new here. Nikon and Canon largely stick to their proven menu systems.

Performance

The first mini battle takes place between the Canon 1100D and Nikon D3100. The Sony A33 falls a little behind, as it struggles to resolve more detail in our test scene. This could be an issue with the lower quality with back focussing. We also test each camera for wide angle and long range focussing accuracy. Here, we observe detailed objects with textures such as flowers and fruits. We do this indoors and outdoors.

In image quality, we check dynamic range and highlighting. We shoot brighter objects with dimmer and reflective backgrounds to check for spot highlighting and detail. The more overblown the detail, the lower the dynamic range of the camera's sensor. These tests are done at ISO 100 and ISO 200. For quality and micro detail, we use our test scene with a lot of colour, texture and detail. For stability, each camera is mounted on a tripod.

We use the same scene for higher ISO tests, where we keep changing the shutter speed to ensure proper exposure. For this studio test, we use a fixed aperture setting of f8. Auto white balancing is used – this also allows us to judge how well the white balance of each camera works with fluorescent light. For ISO tests, we increase ISO settings through 400, 800, 1600, 3200, 6400 and 12800. We shot in JPEG mode for most of the tests, and also used the RAW mode to check the camera's image processing.

We tested video quality at 720p and 1080p resolutions. We used zoom liberally to check for focus and clarity, and audible noise. Two 30 second clips were taken, one indoors and the other outdoors. For our flash tests, we used entry-level flashes for those dSLRs that didn't have integrated flash units.

lens, but to Sony's detriment they weren't willing to part with another lens after repeated attempts. The 1100D resolves more detail than the D3100. The D3100 does have a slightly more realistic texture to the orange, but overall, the 1100D appears sharper. The D5100 is clearly better than the D3100, but is very close with the Canon 1100D and 600D. Surprisingly, the 1100D holds up pretty well here, and is able to offer a bril-

liantly sharp image. Focussing was spot on, too.

The 600D seems to have a softer output than the 1100D, which strangely changes in the higher ISO tests, where it is able to both suppress noise and deliver more detail than the 1100D. This might be less about the sensor, and more about a stronger noise filter. However, it is outclassed by the D5100 that outperforms both Canon cameras in terms of texture.

dSLRs Comparison Test

In our high ISO tests, once again, the Sony A33 disappointed with more smearing of textures, colour and details at ISO 800 and above. The Canon 1100D is shockingly less noisier at ISO 800 than its costlier sibling, the 600D, but very slightly so. However, the 600D is still more detailed, and textures are more evident on the 600D. The D3100 cannot handle noise too well, while the output is mostly clean, some smearing of details is visible, and the 1100D is better in this respect. The D5100 does show a bit of noise, but also shows a lot of detail. However, the 600D is a bit better than the D5100 in terms of finer details. In fact, at ISO 1600, it is actually more detailed than the 7D.

At ISO 1600, the Nikon D5100 displays a bit of chroma noise while the output from the 600D is free from this. Both cameras are fairly close, but the 600D just eases ahead. At ISO 1600, the 1100D and the D3100 are about equal, the former shows less noise, while having a softer output, while the D3100 has a little more of noise, but shows a bit more detail. Surprisingly, the output from all these cameras, including the A33 is quite pleasant at this sensitivity, as long as you don't work with close to 100 per cent crops.

And the winner is

All considered, the D5100 offers a lot for the money – full HD recording, a great sensor capable of much detail and rugged body. It won our Digit Best Buy award after carefully considering all the facts and numbers. The D3100 and Sony A33 also make very good buys and came up with identical value scores, a little behind the D5100. In fact, with full HD recording, a new menu and mirror system, the A33

offers a tremendously detailed output at up to ISO 400, and is mostly grain free till ISO 800. It bagged the Editor's Pick.

ENTHUSIAST DSLRS

For many, this will be the most interesting category. These cameras typically offer improved ergonomics and better image quality with larger, more rugged bodies that are just about better in every way. Many pros in India, who do not need the higher-end full frame dSLRs, actually use cameras in this segment for their work. We received four cameras in this price category two from Canon – the EOS 6OD, 7D and one each from Nikon (D7000) and Olympus (E5).

Canon EOS 60D: ₹65,295 (body only)

The EOS 60D is a well-built dSLR that exudes a quality feel in hand. It has a nice ergonomic grip and an articulating LCD, as well as an 18 MP sensor derived from the 7D. It isn't as well built as the 7D, and is slightly smaller, but has almost the same button layout, with dual dials and a status LCD. However, the buttons on the left of the LCD have moved to the right, to accommodate the articulating LCDs mechanism. The buttons near the status LCD feel clicky, and are set flush in the body, making them a little less intuitive. The 60D isn't weather sealed. The Nikon D7000 feels better built, with slightly tighter shut lines.

The ergonomics of the 60D are a bit questionable, with play and delete buttons being located on opposite ends of the camera. The 4-way joystick seen on the 7D and 5D Mark 2 has been moved and is inset in the rear dial. With its 9 cross point focusing system, the 60D focuses fast, but the focus points feel a bit sparse, and are

not configurable. We prefer the focussing of the D7000 and the 7D. The LCD on the 60D is a bit sharper than the 7D, but the difference isn't very noticeable.

At base ISOs, the 60D offers a clean, detailed output. The colours are punchy, and there's a lot of detail. There's no noise at ISO 400, and just a little at ISO 800. We noticed the 60D trying just a bit harder to remove noise and therefore there is a little loss of detail. The D7000 in contrast offers even less noise, while maintaining more detail and higher dynamic range, noticeable in the quality of the highlights it produces. At ISO 1600, the 60D's output is largely clean and noise free, but more detail is lost. ISO 800 and 1600 show similar levels of noise - a

some chroma noise visible, but the output is still largely clean. The effects of some ham-handed noise control is visible however, as more detail is lost and textures appear a bit flat. ISO 6400 shows a lot of chroma noise in 100 per cent crops along with some loss of detail, but when viewed at a normal size, the output is still quite punchy and pleasing.

Nikon D7000: ₹59,450 (body only)

The replacement for the D90, the D7000 actually has more in

common with the D300s, with a partial magnesium alloy body, a 39-point focussing system with 9 cross points. However, in terms of its look, it looks more like the D90 and is a size smaller than the D300s and the 7D, with less rubber on the grip, but in hand, it feels extremely solid partially on account of its smaller size. The control layout is similar to the D300s, with some differences. There's no ring for metering, and the focus switch has just 2 modes instead of 3, the third being continuous focus that can be activated via the rear dial. There is also no switch for setting the auto-focus area and points like the D300s. The status LCD is smaller than the D300s and less detailed. The drive mode dial is located beneath the menu dial and is locked against accidental usage with a small button. A dedicate video mode switch is a welcome addition.

The D7000 focuses really fast, accurately and it captures a lot of detail. At base ISOs, the D7000s output is very clean, with great highlights, better than the 7D and 60D. At ISO 800, there is minimal noise, and little difference at ISO 200. The D7000 controls noise reasonably well at ISO 1600, and maintains more detail than the 7D and 60D that have a softer output. At ISO 3200, the D7000 is sharp, although highlights take a toss, but noise is still well controlled. At ISO 6400, the D7000 begins to lose its composure and noise

begins to obscure details and textures. However, this is evident in 100 per cent crops and not when viewing the image full-screen. ISO 12800 is clearly avoidable, except for emergencies, for the dynamic range takes a nosedive and the noise that was slightly evident all along now becomes blatant, blotting out finer details. Still for a crop sensor, the D7000 performs commendably and there is no doubt that it is much better than the Nikon D300s we tested last year, and better at ISO 3200 and onwards than the Canon 60D and 7D. It wins our Best Buy award for its brilliant mix of performance and price.

Canon EOS 7D: ₹87,995 (body only)

The Canon 7D sits at the top of Canon's range of dSLRs with crop sensors. It has a very solid build, with a magnesium alloy body and a nice rubber grip on top. It feels very solid, but not as chunky as the D3OOs. Canon nails ergonomics on its head—the 7D has a near perfect control layout and ergonomics. Whether it is selecting focus points, or changing some setting, the 7D is very intuitive to use. The buttons are well spaced and large, and while they have a bit extra

travel, they work well for the most part – the extra travel's good with gloves on. The 19 cross point focussing system is very fast, although some might find the focus points a bit sparse, we feel the focus points don't cover as much of the frame as we'd like – the D7000 has better frame coverage. Both cameras focus equal in accuracy, although the 7D is a little faster in lower light. With a lack of contrast, both systems will "hunt".

The 7Ds menus are detailed, but not as intimidating as the D7000's. Canon has chosen a good bunch of settings, one isn't boggled with extras that will be used once every 5000 shots. The 7D supports CF cards, but misses a trick with only 1 slot. The status LCD is reasonably detailed, while a dedicated video mode and live view button is a nice addition. The one button RAW + JPEG button is useful.

The 7D produces good clean images at base ISOs right up to ISO 400. There is one huge problem however – the 7D struggles with displaying any sort of detail with the colour red, and our red flowers appear flat – there is no texture, and the nuances of the petals get lost when viewing a 100 per cent crop. In fact the

petal edges aren't visible - too soft. At ISO 800, there is a fair bit of noise present in dim conditions, but our test scene with its bright lighting looks clean and largely noise free but textures look softer. The D7000 in comparison is a little more detailed. At ISO 1600, the 7D still manages a clean output, but with textures and details losing their liveliness. However, for small to medium sized prints, the output is acceptable. At ISO 3200, the 7D starts to lose a bit of dynamic range, and noise now becomes clearly visible. However, in com-

parison, the 60D with the same sensor shows a bit more chroma noise, and had some anomalous bright pixels whereas the 7D is free from this. ISO 6400 isn't the cleanest around, but for a crop sensor it does pretty well. The D7000 preserves more detail,

while showing about a similar amount of noise, and is thus better than the 7D at ISO 3200 and more so at ISO 6400.

Olympus E5: ₹85,000 (body only)

The E5 won't win any awards for its looks, but it's extremely well built with a metal body, very rugged. Even the popup flash unit is built of metal – something we've not seen. With support for dual cards, one CF and one SD, the E5 offers good versatility, given that you can configure the card slots in a number of ways.

The E5 is comfortable to hold and the dials within easy reach. Unfortunately, (and here's where Olympus starts to get things wrong), the menu system isn't the most intuitive and it takes a while to get things going. The buttons are small, and not laid out very intuitively, and having directional joypad-like buttons

is typically a no-no for dSLRs in this price segment. The status LCD is reasonably detailed but has a weak illumination lamp. The main LCD isn't good for cameras in this price segment, during live view it flickers – not something that is very conducive for judging composition and lighting before clicking.

The sensor on the E5 is smaller than the regular APS-C sensors on most other cameras. The sensor is a micro 4/3

meaning it has a crop factor of 2. Thus theoretically, we weren't expecting as much in low light. At base ISOs, the E5 has a good clean output. It is fairly detailed, but misses out on liveliness in highlights. In our test shot, the camera captures texture nicely, and even manages to highlight flaws on the surface of a fruit. There is a very slight amount of noise visible at ISO 400, but it's not unpleasant. With normal viewing, ISO 800 isn't a lot different from ISO 400 - a good thing. There is no extra noise, but a slight loss of sharpness and detail, and a further reduction in dynamic range. Still, the E5 manages some nice highlights.

At ISO 1600 darker materials lose textures, and the black cloth looks flat. There is a bit more noise, but the sensor really struggles to resolve details. ISO 3200 is noisy, with a loss of colour and clarity but is okay for screen size

PRO DSLRS

Canon EOS 1D Mark 4: ₹2,59,995

The camera's built like a tank, has great in-hand feel, tight seams, weather sealing, metal body – the works. However, the rubber grips aren't as cushioned and soft as the Nikon D3x, and neither are the grip's contours as comfortable. The Mark 4 has a crop sensor that is larger than APS-C, called APS-H by Canon. It offers the best of both worlds – better performance in low light than APS-C sensors, and more corner sharpness with lower vignette than full frame ones.

The Mark 4 has a good button layout, despite being different from other Canon cameras. There are no buttons down the left side, they're moved to the left shoulder of the camera. There are 2 status LCDs, both quite small, and the rear one doesn't show a lot of info, unlike the D3x and D3s that allow previewing and changing some settings like WB and ISO. The menus are detailed, and a bit complex, but not as deep as the D3x.

The 1D Mark 4 focuses very fast, and accurately. Its 45 points are good, but the frame coverage is strictly decent, and with so many points, the view-finder around the centre can look a little busy. Image quality is excellent, as expected. Immediately visible is the far improved specular highlights on the paper clips compared to the 7D and the D7000 that are of course much cheaper cameras. The highlights

are easily at par with the D3x, with the larger sensor on the Nikon only scoring a bit more detail with textures of some fruit.

At ISO 800, the Mark 4 is clean, very clean, with no loss of detail and absolutely no noise. ISO 1600 has a touch of noise, but it's like film grain and looks integral to the output without disturbing it. The details and highlights remain almost unchanged. Some of the texture on the fruit does seem to have become a little less pronounced, but it's still more than what the other crop sensors managed. At ISO 3200, the cloth's fine texture is still clear, and the paper clips still have good highlights although they have lost some detail. Some parts of the cloth that are facing our lights seem to have taken on a slightly greyish tinge from their default black, but really, this is only noticeable in 100 per cent crops. At ISO 6400 there's more noise smearing details, but smaller prints should easily be possible. Surprisingly, the Nikon D7000s output seems a bit close to the Mark 4 - high praise indeed. And through all this, corner sharpness is much better than the D3x, and the Canon 5D Mark 2 (not part of this test).

With its high speed shooting, and amazingly clean and detailed output quality up to ISO 32OO, the 1D Mark 4 is really meant for action sports shooters or for pros looking to shoot wildlife. At ₹2,59,995, many people will prefer opting for a full frame and there are some cheaper ones about, but the 1D Mark 4 is the true king of the crops, just not very affordable! Having edged

out the D3x at higher ISOs, it also bagged our Digit Best Performance award.

Nikon D3x: ₹5,24,990

We were pretty surprised when Nikon sent us the D3x - a pro studio tool. It's a massive looking camera, with a plush integrated vertical grip, a huge bulge at the top for the large pentaprism viewfinder and a very solid magnesium alloy frame that's weather sealed and covered in certain parts with thick, heavy duty rubber. The D3x is bristling with buttons, dials and knobs, and while the control system is intimidating at first, it grows on you within the first 6 hours of use. It feels better in-hand, than the Canon 1D Mark 4.

The D3x is blessed with dedicated buttons for nearly everything, and in conjunction with

the dials and the 2 status LCDs, accessing vital settings is easy and fast. The menus are very deep though, and loaded with more options than most will use, some require referral to the manual. Most D3OO users will feel right at home. The 51-point AF system is fast, has decent frame coverage and focuses extremely accurately.

Owing to its larger sensor, the viewfinder is also a bit brighter than other cameras in this comparison.

The D3x is an older

camera, and video shooting is missed. However, pros will love 24 MP sensor more than makes up in the still image department. The D3x shows excellent resolution and sharpness at base ISOs. In fact, highlighting is so natural it looks like your looking at a real scene and not a captured image. The D3x resolves fine detail and texture very nicely, much more so than the 7D, D7000 and lesser cameras. Though this is only visible when working with 100 per cent crops, and so the D3x is clearly a tool for the discerning professional.

It's not without flaw though, as at ISO 400 a tiny bit of noise creeps in - there's lots of detail, but 100 per cent crops don't look as pristine as they look at ISO 100. ISO 800 is noisier, and while not serious, it is enough that you might not want to use it for images that matter. ISO 1600 and 3200 are not really usable. We've tested the D3s earlier and are happy to announce that it is still the low light champ and is better than all the cameras here, the D3x included. In fact there is an at least 4 ISO stop advantage. In our performance scores, you might be surprised to see the D3x score low, but remember that it doesn't shoot video, and isn't good at higher ISOs. For studio shooting, check the dynamic range and detailing scores - it outscores other cameras quite easily.

It is also good when cropping photos, due to the huge sensor resolution. Pros do a lot of this. It will also allow larger prints if the image is captured at base ISOs (up to ISO 200). Still, blowing upward of ₹5 lakhs on a dSLR that is vulnerable in low light seems daft. If you're looking for something more rounded from Nikon, we recommend the D3s, or waiting for a successor, that could be next year. ◀

We compare seven all-in-one PCs from Apple, Dell, HP, Lenovo and Zenith to tell you which one deserves a place in your living room

n our comparison this month, we conclude that the consumer has a decent variety of all-in-one PCs from different manufacturers to choose from, each offering something different, something unique to appeal to a variety of tastes. Here's the gist.

LENOVO IDEACENTRE A320

The IdeaCentre A320 is exactly similar to its predecessor, the IdeaCentre A300, in terms of design — it has a high gloss piano white surface, its base connected to the screen with a rod not at the centre but towards

the right of the whole machine; as a result the IdeaCentre A32O has a slightly off-centre centre of gravity. The screen has a steel rim that houses the 21.5inch LED-backlit display. Unlike the Apple iMac and IdeaCentre B320, the A320 doesn't have an I/O port on the side of its screen

in an attempt to keep its design minimal and elegant. Lenovo IdeaCentre A320

The screen is glossy, the base quite slim and small, and the whole unit is actually pretty compact — it's great for showing off in your living room and can fit snugly on a cramped office table. The all-in-one comes with a variety of connectivity options. Four USB, two HDMI,

mic, a headphone, 5-in-1 card reader, ethernet, power and TV-in port. The A320 has a pretty handy media centre remote which lets you manipulate your TV connection through the system — it's great to use and works well within a range of 20-25 feet.

The A320's stand

placement is questionable and its on-board speakers aren't great, but apart from that, it's a pretty looking thing good enough for watching movies and basic computing in a posh living room.

LENOVO IDEACENTRE B320

The Lenovo IdeaCentre B320 is in Lenovo's words "an allin-one for everyone." It isn't as svelte as the IdeaCentre A320, nor as iconic as the Apple iMac, but it sports a functional, working design. The IdeaCentre B320 has a photo-frame shape with an adjustable stand that allows the screen to tilt back (only), nothing more. The all-in-one

All-in-one Desktops Test

PC's plastic stand is sturdy and well-built, no problems whatsoever. The IdeaCentre B320's back panel has a fake wooden finish, lending it a touch of elegance.

The B320 is predominantly black in colour with a 20-inch non-glossy screen - surprising for an all-in-one. The bezel is glossy with a piano black finish, and a prominent grilled extension below the bezel houses the PC's on-board speakers. The speakers are loud and boomy, and clearer at full volume compared to the iMac and A320.

Like the Idea-Centre A320, the

No other all-in-one PC in this comparison comes even close to matching the iMac's internal hardware, which boasts a quad-core Intel Core i5 processor and AMD Radeon HD 6750M graphics. Multitasking isn't a problem and the GPU allows for a decent gaming experience. The iMac is also equipped with a highspeed interface called Thunderbolt, supporting transfer speeds of up to 10 Gbps — supported devices should surface soon. Overall, the iMac is a stylish all-in-one PC for your home, if you have the money to afford it.

DELL INSPIRON ONE 2310

The Dell Inspiron One 2310 is like the IdeaCentre B32O allin-one PC with a photo-frame design. The all-in-one PC has a polished matte shell with gunmetal grey on the back panel. Its two on-board stereo speakers are placed below the screen bezel. The Inspiron One 2310 comes with wireless keyboard and mouse, doing well to limit cable clutter on the desk - however, connecting its mouse via the Bluetooth USB dongle was

less than ideal. The unit is built well overall, apart from its thin plastic stand which looks shaky.

Apart from a decent (albeit older) hardware set, in terms of processor, RAM and graphics, the Inspiron One 2310 has a 2MP webcam for videochats over the Web which has a useful webcam software to record videos, take

photos and upload them on YouTube or Flickr. It comes with a fully-featured media centre remote, like the Idea-Centre A320. The Dell all-inone PC has a number of connectivity ports, however it lacks an eSATA port.

Watching HD movies and gaming on the Dell Inspiron One 2310 isn't as good as the iMac mainly because of its matte screen. Colours didn't pop out as much and viewing angles were okay. Overall, the Dell PC has a bit of everything but is too costly compared to some others in the test.

HP OMNI 200-5310IN

The Omni 200-5310in is a block of dark, obsidian plastic moulded in a form similar to the Apple iMac's iconic design. The HP all-in-one PC's 21.5-inch LED backlit screen is glossy

in nature, supporting a full-HD pixel resolution. Like the Dell Inspiron One 2310, the HP PC's matte screen isn't great for watching movies and videos, compared to the likes of Lenovo IdeaCentre A320 and the Apple iMac.

Despite media centre remote, inbuilt TV tuner, the HP Omni all-inone PC comes with a mixed set

multitask day-to-day home apps with ease, but don't have high hopes of gaming on this PC as there's only on-board Intel graphics to make do with. The B320 comes with a great set of proprietary software and at its price offers a well performing, space saving all-in-one desktop PC

Performance is good for basic use - speakers, especially - but not comparable with Lenovo B320, Apple iMac and Dell Inspiron One 2310. Watching movies isn't all that great, mainly because of the matte screen finish. But at the asking price of ₹22,000, the Zenith SmartStyle ECO PC is worth a consideration for budget-conscious buyers. d



f you have ₹20k to spend on a touchscreen smartphone, the choices are just endless. A gamut of solid Android phones- Samsung Galaxy Si9003, Samsung Google Nexus S and the LG Optimus Black, are available. Plus, let us not forget that the ageing Apple iPhone 3GS is now available for around ₹19k after the recent price reduction.

The Nokia X7 handset looks superb. It's edgy with the corners angling inwards giving it quite a futuristic look. The sides are also at an angle – curved inwards towards the rear panel. It seems like there are speakers hidden away on all four angled corners, but actually, there are only two – the other two are evidently for uniformity. The mixture of plastic and aluminium does give the phone a classy look.

Carrying forward from the trend set by the Nokia N8, the SIM card slot is on the left side,

and so is the microSD card slot. Push them in from one side, and once the other end emerges, pull it out! This mechanism isn't very smooth to operate. What we don't really understand is the point of such a design.

There really is no other way of putting this – the X7 isn't a performance phone at all. A 680MHz processor with 256MB of RAM is a bit of a disappointment. While some may argue that the Anna update has changed things, the reality is that this change has only happened up to a certain extent.

Moving beyond this disappointment, the 4-inch AMOLED display is quite good. Colours are appreciably distinct, but do lack a bit of punch in terms of vividness. The crispness is quite good, and shows in the clarity of the text – reading text on websites, for example is a pretty good experience. The brightness is quite

solid, so much so that turning it up too much may lead to the display becoming uncomfortable to use.

The updated web browser is one of the really good things to come out of the Anna update. Web pages render quicker and smoother. Pinch to zoom works in a smoother fashion and the text generally fits well. The good old feeling continues from the Nokia E6!

The X7 does tend to become a bit hot when browsing the web, or while chatting on the phone for a long time. And the metal back does induce some sweat on ones palms.

Battery backup is very good, and full marks to Nokia here. The X7 offers two full days of usage, more than what we bargained for.

Symbian Anna is like a completely new OS, in some respects. The Anna update has gone a long way in bringing it closer to Android. The performance has improved appreciably. However, Nokia's Social app needs a complete overhaul – poor design, literally no confiurable features and no integration with the contacts.

The Nokia X7 is quite a unique looking phone, and kudos to Nokia for finally getting aesthetics right, at least for the most part. At 20,000 bucks, it lands slam bang in the hottest price bracket in the smartphone market – and therefore also has to contend with the most competition.

Unfortunately it doesn't stand out in its price segment. Symbian Anna gives the X7 an edge over the N8, (in terms of performance), which while part of a different series could be called a spiritual predecessor. It is strictly for those who find its looks appealing, or Symbian/Nokia aficionados.

All work, no play?

lackBerry was one major smartphone player missing from the tablet segment. With the PlayBook, BlackBerry has entered the arena of sleek tablets sporting a completely new operating system. So should the tablet market leader face shivers from the PlayBook? Let's find out.

The PlayBook measures 9-inches diagonally, but the effective screen area is 7-inches. There is a prominent bezel around the LCD screen and the device is rounded at the edges. The edges and the rear side have a rubberised finish which gives a very good grip on the device. Build quality is top notch and the thick bezel has its own pros and cons. The top central portion of the tablet has a small round power button, which is a bit too recessed for our liking and you will have to depress it at a right angle.

The BlackBerry PlayBook houses the 1 GHz dual core Texas Instruments OMAP 4430 SoC. The tablet runs on the proprietary BlackBerry tablet OS, based on the QNX Neutrino micro kernel architecture.

You will notice that there are no buttons on the tablet apart from the ones on the top edge ie. no Home button. The bezel forms a touch-sensitive frame.

Multi-tasking is the USP of RIM's BlackBerry PlayBook. Although we have seen multi-tasking on the iPad2 and Android tablets, none of those can come close to what BlackBerry brings to the table with Playbook. You can have an HD video running in one app, have your email on another and play a game on a third app without any slowdown. The 1024x600 pixel WSVGA reso-



lution on the 7-inch LCD screen looks quite sharp and crispy.

PlayBook does not have any native email client, out of the box! You get apps for Gmail, Hotmail, AOL Mail and Yahoo Mail respectively. This brings us to the feature called BlackBerry Bridge. In essence, what the BlackBerry Bridge does is sync your Black-Berry smartphone with the tablet over Bluetooth. Once done and activated, the BlackBerry Bridge will form a separate tab housing apps such as BBM, Mail, Contacts, Tasks, Calender, etc. Remember, these apps will not be stored on the PlayBook, but will just be shared between your BB smartphone and the PlayBook so long as the Bluetooth connection is on. In short, all your mails, contacts etc will still be secure as the Playbook is not storing anything.

The Bluetooth link is 256-bit AES encrypted one, so you can surf the web using your phones data plan or browse through BBM, contacts, calender under a secure environment.

The BlackBerry PlayBook's web browser is based on WebKit and technically it does support tabbed browsing.

Video playback was flawless and it supports a variety of formats such as .AVI, .MOV, .WMV but does not support .MKV which is a bit sad. Quality wise we did not face any issues, there was no framing and rendering and even a 1080p clip was quite smooth.

The PlayBook lasted a good day and a half on moderate usage. If does tend to use a lot of battery while playing back 1080p video or when it is connected to an HDTV via a HDMI out option. It takes quite long to charge.

At ₹27,990 the BlackBerry PlayBook 16 GB WiFi version is ideal for a BlackBerry smartphone user looking for a tablet, mainly due to the BlackBerry Bridge sync option. However, even then we would advise potential buyers to wait it out till there is a respectable apps eco-system. Current apps are nothing to rave about.

ith the new Aspire 5755 range, Acer tries to add more value into laptops targeted at budget-conscious consumers. It sports the newer 2nd generation Intel Core i3-2310M 2.1-GHz processor, exclusive software like Dolby Advanced Audio V2, and a chiclet or isolated keyboard.

It's good to see that Acer's laptops are no longer drab and boring. With the Aspire 5755, Acer's offering customers a choice of five different colours - green, blue, brown, red and black. Although Acer has done a good job to hide the laptop's predominant plastic appearance, its feel isn't as good as the higher-priced Dell Inspiron 15R

or Gateway ID59C.

The kevs are well spaced and good to type on, having a different feel compared to the keyboards found on the Sony VAIO S, Lenovo IdeaPad U260 or Samsung RC510. Frequently used keys are easy to hit and the tactile feedback is nice. The palmrest is slightly raised like a VAIOS laptop - to snuggle your wrists better while typing.

Don't expect the Acer Aspire 5755 to offer the moon, it's after all aimed at budget conscious customers. Suffice to say that the Aspire 5755 packs in a basic punch in terms of its internal hardware.

With a PC Mark Vantage score of 5179, the Aspire 5755 outperforms both the Dell Inspiron 15R and Samsung RC510.



Watching movies and videos is fine, the laptop can handle both 720p and 1080p HD playback support. Audio from the laptop's onboard speakers isn't exceptional. Taking all things into account, Acer's aggressive pricing of the Aspire 5755 is the key here - it will be hard to get a similar configuration for a laptop sold by Dell, Lenovo, or HP, and with so many features.

Good features, attractive price, what's not to like?

he new Eee PC RO51PX is Asus' signal to the world that it isn't letting netbooks die just yet. The 10-inch netbook sports latest dual-core Intel Atom N570 processor, promising improved performance at a low price.

We like the netbook's seashell design, its exterior is pearly white in colour, smooth non-glossy on touch. Prop the screen's lid open to reveal a white keyboard and palmrest, a silvercoloured mouse button below the touchpad and a glossy black screen bezel surrounding a matte screen. The Eee PC RO51PX is built well, despite its tiny form factor, hinges securing its screen firmly to the base. The included

0.3MP webcam is ordinary at best, its accompanying webcam software helpful while taking pics.

The 10-inch netbook comes with a pre-Windows quick-boot OS called ExpressGate which takes you to a web browser within seconds of pressing the power on button. It's a useful utility if you just want to browse the Web and

ee PC

prolong the netbook's battery life. The netbook also bundles Asus WebStorage which offers online data backup free for up to a year the cloud drive is added as a partition in the Computer screen, drag and drop files to get started.

Performance of the netbook is mildly better than most Intel Atom netbooks out there, courtesy a dual-core Atom processor -- but nothing much to get excited. Its battery lasted 3 hours 24 minutes in our synthetic test, better than most netbooks tested in the June issue. We think you can get over 6 hours of browsing the Web over Wi-Fi on a conservative power plan on the Eee PCRO51PX. Not bad at all. And the netbook's price is attractive as well.

AMD A8-3850 APU

Integrated graphics finally come of age

MD's answer to the Intel Sandy Bridge processors has arrived with the launch of the Llano APU A8-3850 which is a quad core CPU clocked at 2.9 GHz with HD 6550D integrated graphics on board. The graphics solution has 400 stream processors. Just like the Sandy Bridge processors, AMD has also got the PCIe controllers, memory controllers on the processor die itself. In case of A8 3850, the Turbo Core technology (ability to increase clock rate dynamically) is not supported and the multiplier is locked at 29x.

The integrated graphics on the A8-3850 can be teamed up with discrete graphics and used in the

CrossFire mode. Right now only HD 6670, HD 6570, HD 6450 and HD 6350 cards are compatible.

We tested the board on Giga-

byte A75M-UD2H board with 2 x 2GB Kingston HyperX DDR3 RAM at 1333MHz without any discrete card. PC Mark Vantage scored 7817 whereas CineBench R11.5 gave 3.39. Encoding a 100MB VOB file to DIVX took 39 secs. Gaming is what impressed us, with Resident Evil 5 (RE 5) giving 44 FPS on 1680x1050, med setting and STALKER COP giving 32.7 FPS on 1280x1024, med setting. Crysis Warhead was

not that impressive with 15 FPS at

1280x1024, med setting.

We paired the APU with Powercolor HD 6670 and enabled CrossFire mode. STALKER COP gave 46.8 FPS at 1680x1050, med and RE 5 gave 66 FPS.

For a price of ₹7,000, you are getting a processor with integrated graphics which really good compared to Intel's HD 2000 / 3000 when it comes to gaming. Right now the A8-3850 is recommended for those who want decent gaming on integrated graphics or those looking at building an HTPC with a decent gaming option.

The Slingbox PRO-HD is capable of doing 1080i HD video streaming over a network. What the Slingbox PRO-HD misses out on is HDMI input and wireless LAN capabilities.

Explorer and Mozilla Firefox, this refused to work on Google Chrome. Post the account signup and login, allows the PRO-HD to be detected. We did face the issue that the device wasn't detected the first couple of times. First off, we connected the Tata Sky HD set top box via the Component cable. We were surprised by the quality offered, when we were viewing on a laptop - it's pretty good. Once the video begins, you can also open up the remote for the device connected to it. The Tata Sky HD remote

that popped up looked exactly the same as the actual remote! Impressive attention to detail, we must say.

The Slingbox Pro-HD is a very interesting concept and a unique device aimed at what is currently a very niche market, but one that has the potential to grow given its abilities. The streaming from the connected devices (STB, DVD player, etc.) is absolutely flawless, even for HD content assuming your Internet connection is up to the task.

The ability to watch content streamed from somewhere, anywhere is a novel feature, but so is the price tag (₹15000).

HTC ChaCha

Singing a soothing tone

t is true that the HTC ChaCha sings a completely different tune- mid range Android smartphone offering a touchscreen and physical QWERTY keypad. We have the Samsung Galaxy Pro for the lower end of the market, while the HTC Desire Z caters to the higher end.

Straight off, the looks of the phone will catch your attention. While there is nothing very different, there are these little things that make a difference. The slight banana curve makes typing a lot more comfortable. The little "F" button lets you post on Facebook with just one click.

However, while this phone essentially shows off the social networking capabilities, the real

value pack is the touchscreen and physical keypad combo. The dual capabilities will appeal to

those who want a touch device, and also to those who want a physical QWERTY keypad for their mails and messages. The ChaCha is built well. Despite the plasticky looks, the phone does feel very solid. No creaks or rough edges anywhere. What is really impressive is the typing experience offered by the keypad. No problems with the key size they are adequately big and well spaced out. Key-press is quite soft, so much so that even the keypad of the phone you are used to will start feeling a little uncomfort-



able! The "F" button, for all its hype, lets you only post to Facebook, and not much else.

To read the timeline, comment on posts or chat, you will still need to use the official Facebook app.

Call quality offered is okay, but the phone does tend to lose some grunt at high volumes, both for the earpiece and the speaker. No problems with the quality though. The battery life however, is a huge disappointment. With just a few calls, SMS and FB chat running in the background, the ChaCha barely lasts a day. Absolutely no doubt that this phone needs a higher capacity battery.

Dell Latitude E6320

Elegant business performer

he new 13-inch Latitude E632O is Dell's Rolls-Royce of a business laptop, combining strong build, elegant design and powerful performance for executives that need a portable, uncompromising laptop. It takes on competing laptops like the Lenovo ThinkPad X1 (http://goo.gl/mvK3l) and Apple's MacBook Air ultraportables.

The Latitude E6320 is built very well, its screen lid is made of anodized aluminum (scratch resistant) fitted in a magnesium alloy frame and secured to the powder-coated plastic chassis with two steel hinges. Dell has spared no expense in ensuring the laptop feels elegant on touch, be its brushed screen lid or

smooth palmrest. There isn't a hint of gloss on the E6320, ensuring fingerprint smudges are down to a minimum.

The laptop comes with dual-input keyboard, like the Lenovo ThinkPad X1 - a standard trackpad and additional trackpoint navigation. The rubber-tipped keys are concave and a treat to type on, the pointing stick for navigation is great to use as well. The laptop's matte screen is well lit and good for reading text, not so much for multimedia usage. With the kind of internal hardware present on the Dell Latitude E6320, performance is never going to be a problem. Multitasking with

regular office suites, video conferencing, listening to music, and browsing the web is easily taken care of, no problems whatsoever.

The laptop's battery life isn't great though, lasting just over 70 minutes in our synthetic test – expect just about 3 hours (or less) on a conservative power plan. That's about the only blemish on this otherwise stylish ultraportable business laptop which sells at a very high premium.

he RC510 is a reasonably slim 15.6-inch notebook with a stylish glossy finish in charcoal grey. The notebook feels well built. The glossy raised palmrest takes stress off ones wrists while getting slick if used with sweaty wrists. The keypad is an isolated type and while key spacing is decent, we found the keys a little small - the keypad is decent. There are no multimedia keys, although a dedicated number pad is provided. The trackpad material feels just right, while its accuracy is good, for precision work a mouse is required. 4 USB ports, an HDMI port and the usual card slot, optical drive and LAN port are mundane nowadays. The display is glossy while above it

perches a 1.3MP web camera.

The RC510 is blessed with a shiny new power plant the Intel Core i3 38OM, a dual core with HT support. With NVIDIA Optimus, the RC510 can switch between Intel HD graphics and its dedicated GeForce 315M GPU. This isn't a potent gaming system by any stretch, and will strictly play older games sans framing. It barely managed 24.17 fps in Far Cry 2 at medium setting and a resolution of 1024 x 768 pixels. A GT540M manages over 60 fps at the same settings. The storage system consists of a 500GB HDD, and not a fast one at that. With just 20 and 25MB/s in the non-sequential and sequential transfers respectively. Playback of 1080p content is



seamless, and the display while plagued with poor viewing angles has a nice saturated look that gives colour in videos a little more "pop".

From the perspective of someone looking at a desktop replacement, the RC510 performs reasonably well and will easily run more mundane applications, but it is not a performance machine, nor would be expect it to be at a price of ₹39,990. For anyone looking at something to browse on, do a lot of office work as well as play the odd game, the RC510 will deliver.

he ZEB-Station is meant to be a speaker cum dock for all types of audio interfaces. This simple looking, but well built box houses two 15-watt speakers. The mock dark mahogany finish is nice, but the large cheap-feeling volume knob is not. The front panel has a plethora of buttons for changing input source and multimedia functions. These are small, hard to press and feel clicky. The volume knob also changes sources as well as serves as

the tuner for FM Radio. And while on topic, the Station supports FM Radio, RCA input, SD/ MMC cards and USB connects. It lacks a proprietary Apple iPod port.

The ZEB-Station betrays its basic nature by not including a track information display when playing via memory card. All you'll see is track 1. The inclusion of a fully featured remote unit is a plus, it lets you access more functions like changing treble, bass, and selecting a track. The remote operates well from a distance of 6-7 feet although you'll want to sit closer to enjoy the music. There is no auxiliary out, the ZEB-Station relies on its own small speakers.

The volume level isn't much, so no worries about bringing the house down. We found the bass lacking, but this was expected. However, the mid-range is pretty decent, and some vocals sound nice, as do accompanying instruments. The treble is rolled off, but not too harsh. Finer nuances of sound get missed, but the midrange maintains its sweetness.

When one talks music quality and uses phrases like audiophile, the little ZEB-Station cannot keep

> up. But that becomes irrelevant when you read the price tag - a mere ₹1,650. Its value for money quotient cannot be denied. The ZEB-Station is sure to be a little cash that's well spent.

Do not go by the small form factor of this board, it can very well be used as your mainstream system with the Core i7-2600K. It is priced quite high specially when you take into consideration the price you will have to pay for a laptop RAM stick (thanks to the SODIMM slots), which is comparitively pricier than a desktop RAM stick. If you do not want to be limited to GT 430, you can go for the economical Z68 ITX-A-E WiFi board which has everything this board does except the graphics. For ₹10,000 we would recommend the board for someone looking to build a small form factor PC with limited graphics.



ASUS P8Z68 V Pro is an ideal board for overclockers and it's priced considerably lower than MSI's Z68A GD80 and Gigabyte Z68X UD7. It has the UEFI BIOS and supports Lucid Virtu which allows users to get the best of both integrated and discrete graphics. We did notice a drop of 5-8 frames when using discrete graphics and taking the output via the boards onboard DVI port. Existing P67 users should switch only if they will use Quick Sync for transcoding and plan to use Intel Rapid storage technology. We would still wait for the price to drop though.

The multi-faceted app's antimalware scan is lightning fast - faster than offerings by McAfee and Kaspersky, the interface is great as well. Scheduled scans work as promised, no problems. In the Anti-Theft feature, it took under 2 minutes on an average to get replies to SMS SOS - it took slightly longer with GPS off. We think this is pretty good for a lead on your lost phone's whereabouts. Blocking SMS messages and phone calls is easy to setup. Web Protection worked well, blocking access to fraudulent sites. Overall, the app covers all bases in terms offering a fully-featured Android security app.



The McAfee Mobile Security suite is a fully-featured antivirus software for your Android smartphone - it doesn't support older Donut builds. The tool has a mini tutorial explaining the different aspects of the software - a nice addition which ends with the user keying in a secure PIN number. The malware scan time, on the same device, was considerably longer compared to the Norton suite. McAfee allows you to backup and restore your phone's SMSes, contacts and call logs. The app's web console is comprehensive. Price is high and on current evidence, the app's interface needs polish - just too many notifications.



The Acer Aspire 5253 houses AMD's E-series Zacate low-power APU, the E-350 clocked at 1.6-GHz. The laptop definitely is a lot better than any Intel Atom netbook in terms of performance, and it has a DirectX 11-enabled GPU - not quite for gaming. Of course, don't expect stellar build quality either, it's acceptable. We like the laptop's overall matte, non-glossy look. It has a flat-top, closely packed keyboard that works well. Onboard audio is ordinary. The low-powered AMD platform helps keep the price of the 15-inch laptop down, almost makes it a steal. Recommended for home users with basic usage.



The NWZ E363 has only a few things going for it. The PMP can do audio/video and it throws in an FM player. The UI lets you get around fairly easily, but apart from these basics, there are a lot of factors stacked up against the player. The quality of the bundled earbuds leaves a lot to be desired and the player lacks severely in terms of features. File format is limited and features such as voice recording are missing. We'd recommend going for players such as the Cowon C2 or this player's own superior sibling, NWZ E454, by paying about 30 percent extra for roughly twice the feature set.

This is an entry level board for the A8 APU with limitations such as two DIMM slots and minimal connectivity options as compared to the other three boards. SATA ports pointing upwards is not desirable and there is no heat sink beside the CPU region. In terms of performance, it is at par with the others, but there are limited performance tuning options. Pricing is quite decent for those looking at a mid-range motherboard. It makes sense as an HTPC board, thanks to the great graphics performance of the AMD processors it will eventually house.



ASUS F1A75 V Pro is priced on the higher side when compared to the other three motherboards. On the positive side there are lots of performance tuning options for the overclockers such as the TPU, the UEFI BIOS or the AI Suite II. The motherboard's build is quite sturdy and its performance score was at par with the other three boards. With as many as seven SATA 3 ports, four fan connectors, four USB 2.0 headers, it has more expansion options than any other board alongside. The second PCIe x16 slot runs at x4 speed.



This is a better version of the A75M-D2H with great connectivity options and four DIMM slots. It has a DisplayPort out which is not found on the A75M - D2H. Performance wise it isn't different from the other boards. Only in PC Mark Vantage we found this board to be leading over all others, but gaming scores were almost identical. We would like to see a UEFI BIOS on Gigabyte boards as they are feature rich. Makes for a great HTPC board. At just ₹300 over the A75M-D2H, we recommend this ahead of the A75M-D2H board.



Biostar TA75A+ is a feature rich board but we would have liked to see some more USB 3.0 ports, a better heat sink design for the south bridge. Looking at the layout one gets the feel that this board could have been a microATX one as 2 PCI and 2 PCI x1 slots seem a lot. POST debug LED is a great addition. For this high price though we would recommend the ASUS F1A75 board for more features and a better UEFI BIOS Layout than the Biostar TA75A+. If its price were around the ₹7,000 mark, sure this board would be recommendable.

A chat with virus warriors

We spent a day talking with Mark Kanok and John Harrison, Symantec's crusaders against the war on malware.

still in its infancy, when do you think smartphone users would start taking mobile threats as seriously as threats from PC? Imagine a thousand dollars strapped to your body - our mobile devices have become like that because of the banking capabilities that you have along with other personal information on the device. It's an evolution, primarily because of the things

It's already happening, there are a number of different

partners we are working with. People may want to choose their mobile security the way they do with their PC security. There are a lot of vendors that are taking different approaches at this time. People have already started taking mobile security pretty seriously.

d Where do you see the tablet market heading in terms of security apps and features?

Tablets are an interesting angle and Norton mobile security works in the tablet mode. We've adjusted the UI to work and accommodate the larger form

factor. With tablets you see similar type of activities - people are either browsing on the internet or they are downloading apps to play. So the same security features are applied. Our goal is to make sure people download safe things and also they don't lose their device.

d How long does it take before an infected app is discovered on the Android market?

Apps try to go by in a pretty undetectable fashion, but we keep looking at things on constant basis. We have a number of capabilities such as mobile insight capabilites to evaluate and assess hundreds and thousands of different apps. Looking at apps which are malicious is a little bit tougher as there are couple of different types of layers involved. There are permissions that are requested to one's that are actually utilised if there is a submission of personal information somewhere in a disguised fashion. All these things come into play to assess things if they are dangerous or not. d

d Whenever there is a virus outbreak what is the first thing that Norton researches do?

There are a variety of outbreaks, what our researches are doing is understanding when new vulnerabilities are announced. We have a team set up that is tearing apart and understanding the implications of a vulnerability in an operating system or a third party plug in. If there is malware that is reaching certain parts of the world, we'll understand and see whether we have protection in place or whether we need to update the existing protection out in the field. We're looking at keeping up and understanding what is the malware actually doing and making sure that we stay ahead of the curve and understand the methods of what we need to do to detect the new malware that's put there.

d Can you tell us about the new sonar technology used in Norton products?

The sonar technology is really exciting because rather than focusing on the file finger prints which may change all

the time, what it does is that it analyses and looks at behaviour of the malware or programs when they execute. So what we've done is first started with all applications that are running on a system and characterise what good applications do and what bad applications do. Along with this, there's machine learning and analysis to see what good or bad programs do - or do they even open.

d So how's a typical malware generated?

Malware these days is dynamically generated just for you; it's not been seen by any security vendor so if you rely on waiting and then create protection, that's not going work. We had to create network intrusion program or browser protection, if we see a vulnerability being exploited it could potentially have an outbreak so

this is one of those proactive technologies. So the Insight system is based to tackle such dynamically generated threats.

d How do engineers at Norton prepare against threats?

Our insight technology not just looks at bad things, we calculate a risk and trust rating for every app executable on consumer and enterprise PCs. We have 2.5 billion files today that we've calculated under a risk or trust rating to provide a reputation score and when you download a new file that pretends to be a video player or a PDF we can look at it and say this has only been seen on

A look at Web Intents – the future of the web ecosystem

Web Intents are the next big thing to come to the open web, and stand to not only change the way we interact with web applications, but also the way web applications interact with each other

Disconnected islands

It's difficult to refute that the web has made the world a much more connected place. Information is now at our fingertips, no matter where we are, as long as we have any device with internet connectivity.

The irony is that the model of the web has created as much disconnection. No, we're not taking a philosophical stand by saying that we're now less personally connected because we're connected through inhuman machines. Our stand is technical, so let us explain.

The web used to be an interconnection of documents, and hyperlinks were well suited for the purpose, however now the model of the web has transitioned to that of web applications. Hyperlinks are no longer enough; neither is it enough to simply launch an online social network by clicking on a share link if one wants to share content as well. For this purpose, each social network has its own solutions, but there's no general solution, and links just aren't enough anymore.

The web is quickly encroaching on areas traditionally covered only by native applications. Sure, web-based email clients are old, but today we have everything from advanced photo editors to 3D modeling applications. Many of them connect to social networks, allowing you to easily share your work with friends. Google Docs, for example, lets you share documents, and work with others in real time; web applications like LucidChart do the same for diagrams while Aviary's


image and audio editing / processing tools let one create, share and remix photos. But is it really as connected as it appears to be?

The web has turned into small islands of connectivity; within these islands, you might get a seamless experience, but stray outside and things start going downhill. For example, Google Piknik lets you open images from your Picasa, Facebook, Flickr, MySpace or Photobucket accounts and even save back to them; but what if you're using SmugMug? Or something even less mainstream such as Ipernity or Phombo?

The desktop paradigm

Compare this to the non-web alternative; your flash drive will work on your computer regardless of the brand.

Motherboards aren't pre-programmed to

support a few brands of storage drives, nor are DVD burners programmed for each brand of media. They just work.

If you wanted to use a SmugMug photo in Piknik however, you'd have to first download it to your hard drive (or

possibly use a URL pointing to the image), open that image in Piknik, edit it, download the result and re-upload to SmugMug.

There are innumerous combinations of applications and services that are incompatible. For an image editing service it's an insurmountable task to implement support for each storage service – each using different APIs for pretty much the same tasks.

Take another example: sharing on social networks. Here, we see an extreme; either web sites ignore the more obscure social web sites

or clutter the interface by listing nearly all of them. What if the browser managed this and showed only the services you used and cared about?

On your desktop, this would be comparable to listing only Photoshop when you use GIMP or listing every application ever created for handling images.

On a similar note, why's it so difficult to associate your image files with web applications? Or to associate emails links with your arbitrary web mail provider?

Services, stores and applications

The Google Chrome Web store already allows installion of web applications on a user's computer, albeit in a non-standard Chrome-specific way. A web store for web apps sounds good but until web applications aren't empowered a lot more; it's just a glorified way of creating bookmarks, nothing more.

Mozilla is working on a cross-platform, cross-browser, web-standard store and applications delivery mechanism but even that is dependant on web apps being a lot more capable. service in a seamless manner. Web Intents is the term Google prefers to use, since it is similar to the concept of Intents on the Android platform, while Mozilla refers to them as Web Actions, but the concept is quite similar and in the process of being merged.

Web applications need a standard way to expose their capabilities, and to use the capabilities of other applications. For image data to work in your image editor, it will invoke the "image.get" service – this is comparable to a desktop application asking the OS to show the user a file browse dialog. Storage providers can then register themselves as providers for the "image.get" service.

Let's say you use SmugMug and Facebook for your images and have them installed on your browser. Now your online image editor application could simply show a button called "Open Image" or "Get Image" or the like. This button when clicked would show a list of all your installed applications that provide the "image.get" service and browse the files you've saved there. Images there will now open in your image editor. The

on other services for social networking, storage etc.

This approach isn't limited and can be extended to other common web activities such as sharing content or shortening URLs. In both cases, the services you use could be registered on your browser as service providers – for example "url. shorten" and "url.share" could be offered as options when you choose to share or shorten a link.

Payment processing, too, can be overhauled with this, as you can add PayPal, Moneybookers, Google Checkout, Amazon Payment, ClickandBuy or <insert your favorite or trusted payment processor here> to make payments for your online purchases. This, however, might be a little more complicated to handle, and might need more time to standardise.


Conclusion

We can go a bit beyond this though, and think of even more applications. Why can't you use Google's Contacts system on other sites? Or use Yahoo's contact management system with Google? You could you one central contact management service that you like, and use it as a source for both, Gmail and Yahoo Mail! No need to enter the data again.

Or why be forces to use PayPal when there are many other, possibly better and cheaper, options out there?

In the end it is data from one service going to another service that needs it. As long as the data is yours, there should be no barriers on how you use it. Not only does this stand to change the way we use the web, but also have a deeper impact on the economy / ecosystem of the web. With such a standard system in place, it will be difficult for Service A and Service B to form a tie-up, at the cost of integration with Service C that you really use.

These standards are still in development, and Mozilla and Google have taken interest. There are sample web sites and applications that let you test these functionalities and get a peek at what the web might be like very soon. Internet speeds are increasing and web standards are evolving, but nothing has been more compelling a case for cloud computing than this.

These issues are central to the very concept of web applications, and quite obviously, the likes of Mozilla and Google are on the task, defining new mechanisms to give web applications some of the same powers we're used to in desktop applications. Both are working on a common specification and API for having applications register themselves as service providers, and handle this

Agent 001 goes lens hunting

t was a cloudy Saturday - a welcome relief from the heat. The weather buoyed my soaring spirits as I quickened my step to the nearby Saket metro station. My mission was to shop for a medium telephoto for my Canon 7D. I'd bought a Canon EF-S 18-135, EF 50 fl.4 and Tamron 17-50 f2.8. I wanted a good quality lens, something that would last me many years of upgrade cycles. My needs were something to shoot close-ups, take basic bird and animal shots, as well as serve as a tight portrait lens. I needed image stabilisation. I also needed something that would focus fast. Since there was also a need for good quality photos, that meant shelling out for one of the higher-end lenses.

Whether you're upgrading from your kit lens or buying another one to compliment it, first decide what focal range you need. Buying an 18-200 lens won't cut it, for I have found that lenses with wider focal ranges offer poorer results - simple laws of physics at work here. For APS-C sensor cameras, anything between 15 mm and 80 mm is good for general shooting, while 100-300 mm can be considered as a telephoto range. Above 300 mm would be a super telephoto - suitable for wildlife and such. Primes are good for shooting in low light owing to their wider apertures and most primes offer better quality than a variable focal range that costs twice as much. The only minus is they lack versatility.

The first thing to do is decide your focal range and fix your budget. Do some research before visiting shops. Google reviews, product details etc. and shortlist one or two models. Then

look around your city. There are several places in larger cities where you can pick up good deals on second-hand lenses. Buying a second-hand body is a no-no, but a lens is something that will either work, or not – so there are less chances

of getting duped. But don't be cheap – restrict second-hand forays to costlier, higher-end lenses. Cheaper ones like kit lenses aren't built well, and old stuff will wear faster.

Sigma and Tamron are two other popular brands that build lenses for Canon, Nikon and Sony. All these manufacturers will have lenses that compete in similar focal ranges. Obviously prices will vary – Canon and Nikon charge a premium for their lenses. One generic thing to look for is the presence of faster, silent drive systems – Canon

calls this its USM, while Nikon calls it SWM but they work pretty much the same with faster focus (a huge boon) and quiet functioning (not so much). The second thing to look for is image stabilisation (IS). Though lens IS systems aren't as good as the ones featured on compact cameras, they do help you maintain at least a 2-stop shutter speed advantage – useful for handheld photography. Both,

faster motors and IS will cost you pretty penny, and the cost of these two features could double the price of a lens, but it's worth it. Those who shoot in studios will use tripods and can do without IS.

The best deal for a generic focal range

lens I found was the Nikon 16-85 VR, available on the street for ₹36,000. The Canon equivalent, the EF-S 15-85 IS USM is a bit expensive at ₹54,000, and while

it's good, if you want quality, the Canon EF-S 17-55 f2.8 IS USM is better, costs marginally more, and has a fast fixed aperture of f2.8. If you want a cheaper fast aperture lens, and can do without IS, look for the Tamron 17-50 f2.8. There are two versions of this lens: an older non-IS version which reportedly gives better quality results at a cost of ₹21,000 or so, while the IS version costs 5,000 bucks more. Nikon also has a 17-55 f2.8, and

its lens retails for around ₹73,000.

I visited a Canon lounge, but it doesn't allow trying lenses on one's camera. In areas like Chandni Chowk in Delhi, shopkeepers will carefully open a sealed lens and allow you to test it. A known dealer might also allow you to keep it for a day to decide. I saw Canon's 70-200 f2.8 IS USM available as second-hand for ₹55,000 (₹1,05,000 for brand new) - a great lens, but a bit too heavy for handheld work, plus I wasn't going to shoot much of indoors. Then I saw the 70-200 f4 IS USM and after trying found it perfect it's light, focuses fast and is really well built. The non-IS model was available for ₹41.000 while the dealer wouldn't budge off ₹54,000 for the IS model. From reviews I read, the IS model is a bit better optically, and this really sealed the deal and my wallet. After an hour of bargaining, he included a nice Hoya 67mm neutral filter and settled for

₹54,000. And my kit was complete. d

The NVIDIA GT 540M isn't as powerful as AMD Radeon HD 6770M. Acer and Lenovo don't have any high-end gaming specific laptops. ASUS has its G-series gaming laptops (http://in.asus.com/Notebooks/) but they'll be costly. At ₹60,000, it is difficult to get a Core i7 processor-based laptop with adequate graphics. So if you are getting HP dv6 6121tx for around 60k, go for it.





Fight your own case

What you should know to play your own lawyer in a consumer court

he consumer court gives you a chance to play a two-fold role in real life - that of a litigant and your own advocate in the consumer forum. That is, you can file your case and fight it to the logical end to enforce your consumer rights. The only downside is that if you drop the case, you don't have another person to hold responsible. But, if you win, you can sing your own praises. Though you can employ an advocate to do this, you must educate yourself about important information if you do decide to fight a case on your own.

It's advisable to engage an advocate dealing in consumer protection. Even if you wish to fight for yourself, seek expert help at least for the drafting of the complaint because, very often, the relief sought can be unclear and inadequate.

In the complaint, mention the full name and address of the complainant and the opposite party. Providing detailed informa-

tion of the deficiency or defect is important to be able to present a good case. Specify the various kinds of relief you want to seek from the court. Generally, seek correc-

tion of the deficiency or defect and ask for compensation and costs. Don't forget to attach copies of all relevant papers; say bills, photos, letters, any legal notice sent etc. After this, personally file it at the consumer

forum and collect the complaint number. Every complaint has to be filed within two years of the occurrence of deficiency or defect which is called "limitation period". There is a small court fee payable at the consumer forum which differs from state to state. It may take a few days for the first hearing to take place, while it takes several months for a complaint to be disposed of.

If you're dissatisfied with the decision at the consumer forum, you can appeal to the state commission. This should be done within 30 days of the verdict being delivered.

If you're unhappy with the judgment there, you can appeal to the National Commission in Delhi which is the apex forum in the country and finally, you can appeal to the Supreme Court. d

Mobile Phones Bad experience with Samsung mobile phone

I had bought Samsung Duos GT-B7722QKAINU from one of outlets at Sohna Road on 18th April. The very next day, there was a software problem, so I went to the service center at sector-31, Gurgaon. They replaced the set but the same problems exist:

Set hangs when deleting messages, non-functioning conference call option and internet, message details appearing in log calls, issues viewing contacts and incompatible Bluetooth headset regardless of the company.

I was to buy Nokia, but only went for Samsung for its dual-SIM feature. I made a big mistake buying it and would advise others not to waste their money on Samsung.

Contacted by: Vineet Kumar Ahuja **Answer By Consumermate:**

Dear Consumer,

Thanks for sharing your inputs and suggestions regarding the product which would be beneficial in guiding prospective customers. Since your product is under

warranty, you can get it repaired free of cost. This appears to be a product with an inherent manufacturing problem. The quality maintained by the company is not good. There are deficiencies in the service on the part of the dealer and the company. You have to take legal action to put them in motion. Do not feel cheated as you can complain in the district consumer forum.

But before that, serve them with a registered letter in the shape of a legal demand notice containing all your details and intimate them, failing which you can file a complaint with the district forum.

Keep a record of all the communication for future reference. I am sure some sense will prevail over them and they will do something about your problems after receiving the notice itself.

Delay in obtaining spares for Nokia C6 mobile

I had approached Nokia Care at Sector 5, Dwarka on 3rd June to repair my mobile. Despite the fact that the order was from Delhi and not a remote village, about 26 days have passed and the offices have failed to either dispatch the spares to the Nokia

Care Center or even notify a probable date of supply.

The logistics support of the company definitely needs a relook. Kindly look into the reasons and help me take action at the earliest.

Contacted By: Raj Singh Chauhan Answer By Consumermate:

Dear Consumer,

It is the duty of the company to provide the spare parts for the proper functioning of your product. Any delay in doing so would amount to deficiency in services. They must return the product duly repaired within a reasonable period. Beyond that period, they must arrange for an alternative mobile set.

Of course, this is a serious issue for the company who makes high claims for customer satisfaction. Nevertheless, at this stage we suggest writing a letter containing all the relevant details and problems you're facing to the company and the dealer from where you purchased the product. I hope they would be sensible enough to respond. Keep a record of all the communication exchanged. Thereafter, if the response is not positive you can file a consumer complaint.







n times when run-n-gun FPS games rule the roost, Limbo comes as a welcome change.
This beautifully crafted Indie game offers one of the most interesting gaming experiences, excelling in gameplay, visual and sound design. In fact, we'll go as far as to say that this is one of the best games to come out across any platform over the last 12 months - in fact the PC version launched just a month ago on August 2.

Let us start out by saying that Limbo is not for the faint of heart. Its 'trial and death' styled learning curve force you to see the game's boy protagonist being charred, maimed, decapitated, perforated and impaled to death in the most gruesome fashion imaginable. With no special tools at your disposal and a harsh and unforgiving environment that demands every second of your attention, Limbo gives you no quarter if you slack off.

PLOT

There's no narrative as such. You're a silhouetted boy with bright white eyes

who wakes up in the middle of a forest, searching for his missing sister. This forest is full of things, living and non-living, which are most eager to kill you. The controls are dead simple. You use the arrow keys to get around and the control key helps you grab in-game objects.

But don't let the simplicity fool you. This beautiful and eerie platformer-cumphysics puzzle has a lot to offer. It's monochromatic, film-noir environment gives it this unnerving feeling. The background always has something moving in it and even the little blades of grass sway when the boy walks past it.

The game relies heavily on ambient sounds to give the player cues which help solve the puzzle. Though music is present at times, it's used to accentuate emotional high-points in the game. In later levels, you must time your moves according to the ticking countdown timer. Failing to do so might get you killed. But, the game is very forgiving that way. Once you die, you're immediately taken back to the last checkpoint. So dying in Limbo really isn't that punishing from a game-play perspective – thankfully.

Then again, Limbo doesn't trivialise death. In fact, it shows you how fragile

this boy protagonist is. Make one wrong move and the boy pays for it. Even though the game's colour schematic is limited to just black and white, the boy's death has much more of an emotional impact on you than any ultra-realistic blood red flesh wound you'd see in triple A games. Just goes to show how simple games crafted with precision can trigger emotions as well or better than photo-realistic graphics.

An average Limbo playthrough will take between 5-6 hours. The puzzles aren't simple or tough-as-nails hard. The difficulty is just right and best of all, there aren't any loading screens! So once you're in Limbo, it's hard to leave it till the very end.

VERDICT

If video games were art, then Limbo would be in the Louvre. Limbo is fun, scary, exciting, well thought out and engrossing. Sure you'll get frustrated when you die repeatedly, but that's what makes Limbo great. Just like life, you have to learn about it the hard way. Download it off Steam right now.





Definitive guide to types of dSLR lenses

f you're intending to buy a dSLR camera, you should also ponder over the kind of lens you'll be using along with it. Deciding on the right lens shouldn't be an afterthought, as it's as important a part of the camera as the flash. Camera lenses are mostly on the higher side of the budget but for some people the cost wouldn't matter as

long as the lens is right; while for the others, the decision is mostly based on the price. In today's day and age when dSLRs are constantly evolving it's best to invest in a lens as it can be used on different camera bodies. Here's a look at some of the most commonly used lens types. Standard

Most cameras today come with a standard kit lens that covers a focal length range of about 18-55 mm. The standard focal length magnification in lenses today is 35 mm. Standard lenses are capable of offering modest wide angle settings and a modest telephoto effect.

range, a wideangle lens helps. The focal length of a wideangle lens is less than 35 mm. The shorter the focal length the more the number of objects you can fit in your range. For example, a 20 mm lens is wide enough to capture an expansive landscape.

Telephoto Zoom

Meant for sports, action and wildlife photography, Telephoto zoom lenses in the range of 200-300 mm are used. Super telephoto lenses are used by professional photographers although such lenses are not widely used due to their high price.

Fisheye

Fisheye lens is a type of wideangle lens which got popular among photographers due to its hemispherical effect. A fisheye lens gives a distorted one-off result in your pictures which can't be obtained from other lenses. These

were used by the meteorology department to study the formation of clouds and are also called whole



sky lenses. These are quite popular among enthusiast photographers due to its ability to bend straight looking objects.



Superzoom lenses cover a wide range of shooting situations. Aimed at a professional user these lenses have a focal length range of about 18-200 mm or 18-250mm. At maximum zoom, you have to have a very steady hand else you will get shaky images



The above image shows how much area is covered by a particular lens based on its focal length




