We spend a lot of time looking forward at *CKBB* to the newest design or the latest appliance, but here Sean has sympathetically moulded these modern things that make life run smoothly with the myriad elegant period features that abound here. A stunning 10 metre island heightens the drama, lit by huge vintage pendant lights that would certainly overwhelm a smaller space, but here sit perfectly in the oversized rooms. Turn to A Design Dream on page 24 to see the kitchen, but also don't miss one of the bathrooms and one of the bedrooms on pages 114 and 140 respectively. It's very interesting to see how a house can become a home when it's expertly tied together with a united colour palette and given character and interest with the odd quirky twist, bringing each individual part of the whole to life. I think there is something so satisfying and relaxing about a house that has this enduring sense of continuity.

I can't believe we're already heading towards the height of summer. With our July issue you will have found two free extra magazines. The Miele Magazine is brimming with sumptuous recipes and The Specialist has yet more kitchen, bathroom and bedroom ideas - all backed by the reliability of the KBSA.



SEAN COCHRANE CREATIVE DIRECTOR, COCHRANE DESIGN



How did you begin the kitchen-living space?

The room is on the lower ground floor and it is enormous. It is about 116 square metres (380 sq feet) with beautiful, orangery-style doors which open directly on to the garden, and a large roof lantern. It was important to create a design that suited the scale of the room, so I sketched out a layout that divided the space into kitchen, dining and living areas, identified by the position of the new ceiling roses and fireplace.

Tell us about the kitchen area The island has two dropped ends, one for serving, close to the

dumb waiter that speeds dishes up to the formal dining room upstairs, and another as a seating area for bar stools. The design takes its inspiration from a classic country house table, and its large size is in proportion to the size of the room. It is balanced by a wall of tall Shaker-style cupboards, painted in dark grey, which add definition to the light-filled room and provide ample storage for food and crockery, and house essential appliances. The splashback in immaculately book-matched Carrara marble features beautiful veining, and is designed to be the most eyecatching feature of the room.


work as a whole? Using the same Broderie parquet flooring throughout gives the space a wonderful sense of cohesion. It is finished with a metallic grey oil, very much in keeping with the grey palette of the room. We also echoed the dark wood of the island in the console and side tables, and picked up on the polished metal finish of the pendant lights in table lamps and on the frame of the dining table. The L-shape arrangement of sofas is grouped around the fireplace, but open to the dining table, so the room has a natural flow from one area to another.

How did you make the room

t's hard to believe that this elegant four-storey house in West London was once a rather gloomy convent. There were nine dormitories and a series of tiny rooms with endless partitions,' recalls Isobel Nicholson, a TV producer who shares the house with husband, Zac, a film cameraman. 'Our goal was to open up the whole house to create a family home with a much more spacious and light feel.' An essential part of the refurbishment of the Victorian house was the conversion of the nuns' former sitting rooms on the ground floor into a large living-kitchen-dining space, designed for family life with children Bea (seven), Tilly (four) and Amelia (10 months). After ripping out those awkward partitions, Isobel and Zac concentrated on creating an open-plan space, adding floor-to-ceiling sliding folding glass doors which fill the room with natural light, and provide direct access to the garden.

It was word of mouth that led the couple to Tim Higham of Higham Furniture for their kitchen. We had been all over the place looking for the right company, so we rather fell on Tim when we met him, laughs Isobel. 'He approaches each design individually and offers a very personal service which appealed to us.'

As a keen cook (and a devotee of hip chef Yotam Ottolenghi's cookbooks), Isobel's brief to Tim was to ensure that the cabinetry was robust and the layout designed for some serious recipe preparation, with plenty of work surface, and appliances and storage in easy reach to make life easier for Isobel.

'I also felt that the room should be designed to suit a London house,' she explains. 'So I didn't want 'country' and equally nothing too shiny or stark, but more of a blend of contemporary and classic with individuality. Working with Tim to create a simple look, and in a palette of chic and gentle greys topped with classic marble, Isobel added vintage industrial enamel pendant lights on red cords, red stools and an antique bronze utility rail (to hang utensils). 'They are warm touches which add personality and make it feel like home, she says. *eKBB*

Can you tell us about the furniture? The cabinetry is classic, framed Shaker-style design, with simple linear detailing. There is quadrant beading on the doors and a double-beaded edge to the drawers which helps to enhance the modern feel. It is hand-painted in soft shades of warm grey, with a darker shade used for the island to add definition. Grey is a modern neutral and it contributes to the room's classic and contemporary appeal.

How did you create the layout? The island serves as the main food preparation and presentation area, with the

wall run providing storage, fridge space and wet zone in an efficient use of space. Everything is within easy reach, and Isobel can cook without the children or quests under her feet, but still be part of the conversation in the rest of the room. The AGA is both a homely, traditional feature and a focal point, and it is topped by a shelf with a utility rail to make a display area.

And the storage areas?

As Isobel is such a good cook, it was important to include masses of storage for all of her pots, pans, equipment, speciality ingredients and cookbooks. The island is large, so it houses cupboards and drawers, while the tall cabinets include a spacious pantry so that it's easy to see and reach dry goods. And we were even able to make use of some of the otherwise wasted space above the doorways to build recessed shelves to house Isobel's recipe books.

What materials are used?

Painted cabinetry is smooth and classic, and in its shades of light grey, it enhances the spacious feeling of the room. Polished Carrara marble is always elegant, with beautiful natural veins that run through the stone and create a sense of subtle movement.

fter three years of living in their Edwardian house in North London with its awkward ground floor layout, Amelia Quicke and husband Iain decided enough was enough. 'The kitchen was long and skinny, with very little natural light, and a family dining area leading off it that was also tiny and very uncomfortable,' explains Amelia. 'We realised we were spending most of our time in the coldest, pokiest and darkest part of the house.'

But what to do? Quotes to add an extension across the rear of the house, complete with bi-folding glass doors, topped well over the £100,000 mark. 'We weren't sure that the results would be worth that kind of investment, so then we started thinking about moving,' recalls Amelia. But, just as she was beginning her estate agent search, she followed up a recommendation and popped into Funktional Kitchens to meet Director Vicky Shudell. 'It was immediately obvious that Vicky is very creative and clever at working out how to use space in a more imaginative and better way, says Amelia.

It was Vicky who suggested demolishing an internal wall that separated the existing kitchen from an under-used dining room (usually occupied by the couple's children, Joseph, seven, and Daisy, six, as their playroom) to create one larger space. Then Vicky suggested spinning the kitchen and dining spaces around to create a much more effective and family-friendly layout,' explains Amelia. By enlarging two windows, they also made the space much brighter.

Project Manager Amelia says that her love of natural light stems from her upbringing in New Zealand with its open vistas and acres of space. While London is less given to sunshine, Amelia says the tall-ceilinged rooms of Victorian and Edwardian architecture enhance the feeling of space, something she was keen to accentuate in her new kitchen. 'We wanted classic, simple furniture in a fresh and modern colour palette, with cabinets that made the most of the grandeur of the height of the room, she explains.

The result, she says, is a great success. 'Vicky's ability to think outside the box has given us a beautiful new room at less than half the price of an extension,' she enthuses. 'It feels light, calm and spacious - exactly the opposite of how it was before - and perfectly in tune with the age and beauty of this Edwardian house.' **CKBB**



How did you develop the

layout? Once we had settled on demolishing the internal wall and spinning around the old layout, it was a case of making the areas of the newly enlarged room flow smoothly. It made sense to build the new kitchen in to the old dining room, making use of the chimney breast to house the hob. We were also able to tuck the tall cabinets, housing the American-style fridge-freezer and ovens behind the entrance door, creating more of a flushfitted feel which makes the cupboards feel less bulky in the room. The island is the focal point and main work station, looking out over the new dining area. We converted the slender

space, which had previously been home to the family's dining table, into a snug.

Can you tell us about the cabinetry? Amelia and Iain chose Shaker-style furniture from our Timeless collection. Just as its name implies, it has a classic design that will stand the test of time, with a simple frame, without fussy beading or detail. The wall cabinets are tall at 950mm. They are designed to provide lots of storage, which is essential in a busy family kitchen, as well as accentuate the height of the ceiling. We added uplighters above them and this again emphasised the height of the ceilings and also

removed some of the dark shadows which can make a room feel gloomy.

And the colours and materials? The cabinetry is painted in a lovely, soft Partridge Grey, and teamed with supersmooth Corian Glacier White worktops and white backpainted glass splashbacks. It is a fresh, modern and cool colour palette which, coupled with the steel appliances and chrome handles, accentuates the light and airy feel of the room. Amelia's Scandinavian-designed dining table and chairs add to the mood, creating a contemporary space that sits very comfortably in a traditional Edwardian house.

Liam TREANOR

Where do you find inspiration?

I find inspiration in architecture, urban environments and pragmatically designed industrial buildings, for example. Some of the architects that interest me include Oscar Niemeyer, Walter Gropius, Alvar Aalto, Le Corbusier and Frank Lloyd Wright.

What is it about wood that is so appealing? There are few materials humans have lived with and used for as long as wood. We understand it and feel comfortable around it. It has warmth, texture, colour, stories and importantly it's natural and sustainable.

How important is sustainability to you and to the future of design?

All of my products are produced from trees that are replaced once felled. I also design in such a way that my products do not find themselves specifically slotting into current trends, with emotional durability in mind. Sustainability is something that's essential for designers to address; it's our responsibility to do our part for the environment.

What would you say is unique about your work? My approach to design and strong architecture influences. I like to believe my mentality is similar to various early modernists albeit focusing purely on wooden products. The machine aesthetic, design suitable for production, attention to detail, focus on function and understanding of ergonomics. for example. But also my attitude to designing furniture and lighting that is to be suited for a wide variety of domestic environments.

How have your designs evolved?

My first range, which began to take shape in early 2011, was based around the idea of a soft aesthetic, easy on the eye with smooth flowing forms. Whereas with the second collection I wanted to achieve a balance between strong bold linear components with a subtle softness created by the use of turned constructional components. It's more traditional British craftsmanship meets refined Scandinavian design.

What do you hope your furniture brings to other people's homes? A sense of warmth and positivity, comfort and quality, beautiful forms that enhance the home environment. But importantly, my products are not about decoration. I believe that this should be shown

through the house owner's personality with their chosen adornments, be it cushions or ornaments. As Martino Gamper said, 'A shelf, however beautiful, is only half a story.'

How do you decide on product names?

My products are mostly named after architects, objects or influential modernist buildings. For example, the Weimar and Dessau dining tables are named after two of the Bauhaus schools. The Mairea bench and Carre coffee table are named after Alvar Aalto buildings. Products in the new collection are named after architects involved in the 1957 Berlin Hansaviertel Interbau -International Building Exhibition.

Why do you think that classic furniture designs are being re-imagined? We have endured some forgettable periods of design over the past couple of decades. So perhaps it's to do with the realisation that elements of the way we used to live in our homes 40, 50, 60 years ago were more successful. We also appreciate quality more, and we understand that these products last, not just structurally but aesthetically, too.

What's the best piece of advice you've ever been given? Treat others as you would want them to treat you. This may appear to be a relatively soft answer, but this phrase informs many of my everyday decisions.

Can you tell us something about your work that we'd be surprised to know?

The Homemaker bookcase was designed in 2010 as a third piece in my final year of university after I realised I had a few days to spare before submission of work. Which makes the bookcase my oldest product, and it remains one of the most popular. **EKBB** liamtreanor.co.uk

e're always hearing that the kitchen is the heart of the home. So why would you want to hide it away? Well, precisely because we want the kitchen to be an integral part of our living areas, so the less it looks like a kitchen the better. There are some stunning appliances and pieces of culinary equipment on the market today but, let's face it, we don't really want to be sitting among them when we're putting our feet up at the end of the day. And what a dream to be able to close the door on the inevitable mess of food preparation and enjoy company in totally uncluttered surroundings.

The trend towards invisibility has been creeping into kitchen design for some time and integrated appliances, flush-fit ceiling extractors and handleless cabinetry are key to this look. The concept is one that can be taken to extremes or dipped into. The use of tall doors to totally conceal the kitchen when not in use is a solution perhaps best suited to compact spaces such as urban apartments, luxury open-plan studios or high-end hotel suites. In other situations, homeowners may want to retain areas of open worktop but create a closable work station where toasters, kettles and the like can be hidden away but still be plugged in ready to use. Kitchen experts Bulthaup term such areas 'appliance garages' and are seeing a steady rise in their popularity, along with other hiding mechanisms. 'Our air extractor with wing slats, for example, seems to be a hanging lamp, and of course can be used as such, but it also hides an extractor, says Roland Spieth, Director of Export Sales for Bulthaup.

Whether you want to conceal all or part of your kitchen, pay particular attention to the mechanism by which you do so. The doors will be in regular use and it will take away all the benefits they impart if they get in the way or are anything less than a pleasure to use. 'Pocket doors are the most practical solution because they tuck away and allow access to all of the concealed parts, whereas sliding doors only allow you access to the open section not covered by the door, says Keith Atkins, Director of Design at DesignSpaceLondon. 'Soon we'll see folding pocket doors that will allow wider open workspaces to be concealed.'

Also think carefully about the finish of the door fronts as, when closed, these will form a large surface area. You may want them to blend in with the surrounding décor as much as possible, in which case it is often possible to match particular paint colours. Or you may want to make a design feature of them, choosing a contrasting colour, a textural effect, or wood veneer. As Roland Spieth of Bulthaup says, 'the goal is not just to hide away your kitchen but to make it an integral and admirable part of your interior architecture. eKBB



TOP TIPS TO CONSIDER

A hidden kitchen demands particularly careful planning to ensure good looks and ease of use

- 1. APPLIANCES Think carefully about whether you want to hide all your appliances or just certain ones. Some appliances, such as dishwashers, fridges and washing machines, lend themselves to being concealed, with integrated models widely available. Others, such as built-in ovens will need to be concealed behind additional doors, which will make them less readily accessible.
- 2. DOORS When deciding upon a door mechanism consider ease of use and the accessibility of other areas when the doors are open.
 - 3. LIGHTING Make sure the interior of your hidden areas are well lit and consider carefully how lights are switched on and off. Think about installing door-operated switches which turn lights on automatically when cupboard doors are opened.
 - 4. SURFACE FINISH A kitchen that is totally hidden is in danger of appearing cold and clinical, so consider a finish that will add warmth, such as a wood veneer or soft-touch lacquer.
 - 5. DETAILS Pay extra attention to detail as the hidden, streamlined look can be unforgiving. Don't go to the effort of concealing all your appliances only to have visible power sockets, for instance. Make sure these are located in hidden areas and opt for pop-up sockets for islands.



MY FAVOURITE KITCHEN APPLIANCE

Anjum ANAND

Food writer and television presenter Anjum Anand talks to us about her brand new cookery book, and reveals which appliance is an absolute essential in her kitchen

How did your journey into cooking and writing begin? Even though, growing up, I would help my mother in the kitchen when my parents had friends around, I only started properly cooking in my twenties. I wanted to cook healthy Indian food for myself and decided to learn properly, so went to my mum and watched what she did. I realised I loved cooking and the more I cooked, the more I wanted to learn. I decided to write my mother's recipes down as a sort of family culinary heritage to pass on but then decided that these healthier, lighter Indian recipes were exactly what we needed to dispel the myths that Indian food is all unhealthy, creamy and the occasional meal, as opposed to every day fare.

What is your favourite dish from your book, 'Anjum's Quick & Easy Indian'? I'm not sure I have a favourite as I genuinely think they are all great and choose what to cook depending on my mood and the season. But things I have cooked from it recently are the Southern Spiced Vietnamese Crab Spring Rolls and the Quickest Ever Tarka Dal.

What is the aim of the new book?

To give busy cooks a book to turn to where they can find delicious, spiced but not heavy or elaborate, Indian-inspired dishes to incorporate into their repertoires. It is a useful book with delicious food that is completely relevant to how most of us live and eat today, with recipes for busy weeks or easy entertaining for all occasions.

You have two children, what is your favourite thing to cook for them?

They enjoy cooking with me but I keep them away from the stove so they don't quite feel the magic of cooking, although we do bake a lot together. My favourite thing to cook for them is a big pot of wholesome lentils because I think they are really nutritious and they rarely get to eat them outside of the home.

What is the best way to save time in the kitchen for those with busy lives? Obviously choosing recipes that are quick or effortless is the first thing to do but after that, I find chopping and cooking at the same time is really helpful, so allow the first ingredients to cook as you chop the ones you would add next.

What is your favourite appliance to use and what do you like most about it?

My Kenwood kMix hand blender. I can blend ginger and garlic into pastes which saves me a lot of chopping. I blend my tomatoes for the same reason, but also use it to make smoother curries. It is the most utilised appliance in my kitchen and perfect for blending ingredients finely into a homogenous mass. Also it's easy to clean.

I would invent a gadget that you could affix to the edge of a saucepan and could be programmed to stir the food as often as you like and all around the pan. This

would really help in making Indian curries smoother and more harmonious but be invaluable in making long-cook Indian desserts such as kheer and halvas.

Do you have any exciting news to reveal? I am launching a range of proper Indian

chutneys this year that are authentic (not all sweet and sticky) to join The Spice Tailor sauces. I think they are fantastic and could be essential pantry fare. **CKBB**



he hob is one of the most frequently used appliances in the kitchen. From rustling up bacon and eggs in the morning to whipping up some fine cuisine, you use your hob day and night, and it is important that it is able to cater to your every need. Cue the trend for induction hobs. Using the latest technology, these sleek and sophisticated models offer a flexible, as well as speedy, cooking experience and they are also an energy efficient option in comparison to gas models.

Induction works using magnetic technology, so inductors beneath the surface of the hob create a magnetic field when an iron-based pan is placed on the cooking zone. This technology supplies heat directly to the pan, meaning that no energy is wasted. As it is the base of the pan that heats up, the hob itself stays cool to the touch, which is ideal if you have young children, as they can't burn themselves, and it also makes the hob easy to clean. It's handy to know if you are looking to invest that you may need to buy iron-based pans. The general rule is that if pots and pans stick to a magnet they will be perfect to use on an induction hob.

If you're a keen cook and want to be able to seal, simmer or boil at the touch of a button, then the responsiveness of these hobs means you have full control. Richard Walker, Sales and Marketing Director at De Dietrich says, 'For speed, induction outperforms all other hob types and is almost twice the speed of gas at high heat. Food cooks faster because the energy from the inductor is directed into the base of the pan.' Many models on the market boast extra features including temperature adjustment, giving you complete precision.

Take time to consider your cooking requirements. Do you host a lot of dinner parties or often cook for a large family? Then be sure to check out a model that offers you plenty of versatility and enough space to work with. Hobs with four to five cooking zones tend to be the most popular for their flexibility and size, and many higher-end models offer the option to bridge those zones into two or three larger ones, making room for bigger pots and pans. Or if you are after true flexibility then opt for a top-of-the-range model from a brand like Gaggenau or De Dietrich, which will give you zoneless cooking so that you can place pans wherever you need to on the hob surface. *CKBB*



Taking his design cue from an elegant Parisian salon, Sean Cochrane creates a sophisticated bathroom that whispers - rather than shouts - timeless luxury

magine the salon of an eighteenth century apartment in Paris, and here you have interior designer Sean Cochrane's inspiration for the master bathroom in this luxurious London home on Clapham Common. 'I wanted the room to convey that sense of opulent living with its grand scale and beautiful detailing,' says Sean. The bathroom forms part of a master suite extension to the original early Victorian house, so Sean's first task was to design simple panelling, cornice work and a ceiling rose in keeping with the initial design of the rooms of the house. Tall double doors, clad in mirror and finished with crystal knobs, open from the dressing area into the tranquil space, with the bath underneath the tall sash window forming the focal point.

'We designed pieces of furniture with a freestanding feel, echoing the idea that we had come along and simply installed beautiful pieces into a gracious salon,' explains Sean. The vanity unit is one such piece with its framed design on simple legs, painted in silver grey. Set below three panels of mirror that accentuate the symmetry of the space, the look is classically elegant

Marble surfaces add a luxurious note, while polished chrome wall lights and a pretty chandelier hint at glamour. Designed for the lady of the house (there is a 'his' bathroom, too), it is a calm, uncluttered space, filled with natural light and allowing for peaceful relaxation. 'It may be a modern room with a powerful shower, great music system and contemporary brassware, but it has a timeless feel inspired by gracious beauty of the past,' he says. **CKBB**

BATHING BEAUTY

How did you create the layout?

From the double entrance doors, the bath is the centrepiece, and was best placed directly under the window to enjoy the views of the garden. It's balanced with a symmetrical arrangement of towel warmers on either side, directly underneath the wall panels. We created the vanity area on one side of the room, and built the shower on the other.

Can you tell us about the colours and materials?

Nothing says classic elegance and luxury quite like marble, so we chose a simple Carrara stone for the floor, to surround the bath, and to top the vanity unit. The vanity unit and walls are painted

in a silver grey, which has just a hint of warmth and prevents the room looking clinical or cold. Together, they create a quiet mood, which we lifted with simple touches of crystal on the chandelier and door knobs, and polished chrome on the wall lights, taps and towel warmers. And mirror of course - it always adds glamour.

And the finishing touch?

This is a luxurious room, so there needs to be somewhere to sit and relax or throw a robe, so the ottoman is a useful, as well as stulish, addition. It has a classic buttoned design, but it reaches right down to the floor, giving it a contemporary twist.

Bathroom profile

Tall double doors open from a dressing room in the master bedroom suite on to a pretty bathroom, its design inspired by the most elegant of Parisian salons. Decorated in a palette of silver greys with coolly classic marble, a crystal chandelier and touches of polished chrome, it is a luxurious space designed for privacy and tranquil relaxation.

hile we are clearly a nation of bath lovers, the concept of installing a full-blown, walk-in wet room in our own homes is enough to get us reaching for the shower gel, pronto. A true wet room isn't just a big shower, it is a fully waterproofed, open-plan room that has been expertly transformed into a single, walk-in space thanks to clever drainage and seamless tiling.

'Around 90 per cent of our customers are now asking for wet areas rather than the traditional shower enclosure,' says Jade O'Bryan, designer at Ripples. 'People want showering areas that are as maintenance-free as possible, by eliminating hinges, seals and even doors and replacing them with simple pieces of glass or even a tiled wall to walk behind. Wet rooms open up the bathroom and create a more attractive space.'

Waterproofing is key and should be carried out by an experienced specialist. One system is to 'tank' the room, whereby walls and floors are protected with a waterproof membrane (experts recommend a paint-on neoprene for ease of use) and then covered with moisture-resistant, sealed plywood. On top of this you, you can create your own look and finish using tiles, stone, laminate wall panelling or a more unusual material like rubber. To ensure the water flows away into the drain, it is crucial that wet rooms have accurate gradients in the floor.

'If not, the water will 'pool' or even flow to areas of the room where you don't want it to,' explains Steve Middleton, UK Sales Manager at Fiora. 'It is essential to consider how much water 'splash' will occur and thus how big a wet area you need if you are not using a glass enclosure to contain the water.'

For floors, a sunken tray or 'floor former' can be used, which, once tiled and treated with a sealant (and with a membrane underneath) will 'form' the necessary gradient for efficient drainage. Do remember to double-check if your drain is big enough so that it can cope with the deluge of water.

If you don't want to go with a true wet room, you can always emulate the look with a low-level, slimline tray and a sheer pane of frameless glass. This way you can get a minimalist, wet room-style, set-up but without all the extra installation costs of a true wet room - and the added security of a tray and screen to boot.

Don't despair if you haven't got a ballroom-sized bathroom because the typically small and awkward UK bathroom can be successfully adapted to create a luxurious walk-in shower - particularly as there is a growing trend to do away with the bath and free up space for a wet room as the main bathroom of choice.

'A wet room needs a basin, a WC and a shower area,' says interior designer Shalini Misra. 'So the benefits of a true wet room are that glass shower panels are not required and the different elements can be placed closer together. A smaller floor area can therefore be utilised.' eKBB

INSIDER INSIGHT

GIVES US HIS TOP TIPS AND USEFUL ADVICE

A wet room can be fitted in the most awkward of spaces. It doesn't have to be square or oblong like a standard shower tray, instead a wet room can be a bespoke, made-to-measure design (rounded or angled in any way you like) to fit a particular shape or size of bathroom and suit any space.

Think about the position of the gully so that can you avoid standing on the grating when showering, as this can be uncomfortable. Alternatively, choose a drain that is positioned in the wall at floor level to create a completely smooth shower area.

Think about underfloor heating. Certain systems will damage taking membranes, which can cause big problems so be cautious and get good advice.

Tiles, mosaic, stone and vinyl are all good choices of surfaces for a wet room. It's important to bear in mind that porcelain tiles are much tougher than ceramic and that the surface must have some grip for safety. If you are keen on a natural stone floor these can be sandblasted to add grip.

Go to town with body jets, a luxurious fixed overhead and a hand shower. You are not restricted by space and practicalities in a wet room as you are with an overbath shower or a small enclosure, so you can go wild. Anything goes!







DESIGNER, C.P. HART

What are the main practical considerations of a wet room?

A good installer will seal the area with a waterproof membrane before tiling, but check if you have a concrete or wooden floor as this will affect the products that you use. Make sure there is enough gradient so the water drains effectively and choose a drain that is suitable for the size of your shower head. If you choose a particularly large one then your drain must be able to cope with the bigger volume of water.

What are the best surfaces to use for flooring and walls?

Non-slip and non-porous materials are best in wet rooms. Porcelain tiles are great for walls and floor - never use polished tiles if you can help it. Marble adds a luxurious touch and is en vogue right now.

What showers work well in a wet room? Drench heads are great in wet rooms as the spray won't

bounce off when you're showering. Consider installing a separate hand shower for cleaning.

Do you need a minimum amount of space? Recommended shower screen length is around 1200mm high to keep water enclosed. An ideal showering space would be around 900x1200mm.

What's next for wet room design? Look out for interesting glass options, some with integrated LEDs, personalised etching and coloured films for a neon finish. Digital brassware is becoming more popular and accessible and spa-like functions like sprays and chromotherapy are emerging in luxury bathrooms. Don't forget to wire up your sound system or Aquavision TV for added entertainment in the mornings.

What is your one piece of top advice? Install underfloor heating. It will dry the floor in 15 minutes flat!

nterior designer Sean Cochrane has won many awards and an outstanding reputation for his ability to combine classic with contemporary. But what he doesn't do is pattern. 'I prefer to use textures to convey a sense of timeless luxury, he says. 'That doesn't mean you can't add pattern later on with cushions, throws and prints, but if you want a design that will still look great in ten years' time, use textures as your foundation they are much more likely to create a timeless appeal.'

In the master bedroom of this luxurious early Victorian home on Clapham Common in South London, Sean and his team used a palette of soft greys and warm creams in velvets, silks, faux suede, linen and wool. To add definition, lacquered dark timber and accents of polished nickel complete the look. 'It is consistent and creates a sense of flow, both within the bedroom and the entire suite, including the dressing areas,' he explains.

Large enough to accommodate two sofas, a footstool and an armchair, the bedroom required a design that would suit its grand size. 'It all started with the headboard, which reaches to the ceiling and gives the bed a real sense of presence,' continues Sean. 'I like to make entrance doors as tall as possible in my designs and here their grand affect is amplified by the floor-to-ceiling headboard.

The result is a coolly elegant, restful sanctuary with its own balcony overlooking the 130ft rear garden. 'It's your own private retreat, perfect however busy your life, he says. *eKBB*

How did you begin? This room is part of the extension to the five storey house, so we added panelling to make it feel as if it has always been part of the fabric of the property. We also carried the intricate cornice work in here, and painted the ceiling in Pointing, which is the same colour we have used throughout the house. I think it always helps to create a natural sense of flow if the ceilings are all the same colour.

And the layout? It is a huge room, so we worked from the bed, to a sofa, to a separate seating area with another sofa, footstool and chair - a place to curl up and read a book.


Given the grandeur of the proportions of the room, we created a symmetrical layout: the large bed and impressive headboard are balanced on either side by matching bedside cabinets, lamps and prints.

And the finishes? We layered the textures to create the sense of luxury. The silk carpet, the crisp white bed linen, the velvet cushions, the wool throws - they all add to the cocooning effect. And the furniture itself is classic and smart, without fussy details, but with elegance in its shape. The look is quite subtle, with its muted colour palette, but it is very inviting.

o bed exudes comfort quite like an upholstered one. As the centrepiece of a bedroom it will impart an instant feeling of luxury and ease and set the tone for what this room should be all about: relaxation. Although, generally, upholstered beds and headboards may conjure up images of a traditional country house there are designs to suit every personal style, from contemporary minimalism to decorative designs. 'French-style beds are going down a storm at the

moment due to their timeless appeal,' says Charlie Marshall, founder of Loaf. 'Studded designs are also popular, offering that lovely boutique hotel feel.'

The fabric does as much to determine the eventual look as the shape. A buttoned headboard in luxurious velvet, for instance, will look completely different when covered in light linen. So when browsing brochures, websites and showrooms don't dismiss designs just because you don't like the fabric. Most companies offer a variety, and many others will let you supply your own.

When choosing a fabric make sure it is suitable for upholstery (i.e has a minimum rub test of around 15,000) and conforms to the UK's standards for domestic fire retardancy. Other than that there really are very few constraints. Do bear in mind though that very few upholstered beds or headboards have removable, washable covers so you may want to steer clear of pale colours for practical reasons. Also think about the effect of particular designs on pattern. 'Don't put checks or stripes on a buttoned model as it distorts the lines of the fabric, advises Euan Kelway-Bamber of The Headboard Workshop.

Headboard height can vary enormously, from low minimal styles to tall statement pieces. Your choice on the scale depends on comfort, the proportions of your room and personal taste. Most people want to be able to rest their head when sitting up in bed reading, so if this is the case try a few models out to ensure you can do so comfortably. 'The minimum height for comfort is around 125 centimetres,' advises Julia Cussins of Sofas & Stuff. 'And a headboard should only take up around a third of the height of the room.'

If you're buying solely the headboard, it will need to be fitted to a divan base. A whole upholstered bed, however, may come with a slated base and feet, which will give more of a sense of space but won't have the advantage of storage drawers. As with most furniture, it's worth paying that bit extra for quality materials and good craftsmanship. Cheaper models may have flimsy fixings, meaning the headboard is likely to warp over time, and fabrics and stitching will be of inferior quality. A finely crafted piece, on the other hand, will be like you're in a luxury hotel every time you curl up under the covers. *CKBB*

BUYING BESPOKE


The Headboard Workshop can make upholstered beds and headboards in any size and any fabric and are one of the few companies who offer removable, washable covers on some of their headboards. 'These are frequently ordered for holiday homes or homes that are let, as the covers are easily washed or replaced when necessary,' says Managing Director Euan Kelway-Bamber. As a rough quide, a king size bed takes between five and six metres of fabric and a headboard around three metres.

ALL FIXED UP

When buying an upholstered headboard check the way in which it will be fixed in place. The traditional way is with mounting struts that slide over bolts located on the divan. However, make sure the struts are sturdily made from strong wood as otherwise they can easily break or warp. A more reliable method, especially for taller models, is to fix the headboard directly to the wall. For extra stability, slats can be fitted which extend to the floor and take most of the weight. Choose an inset back to ensure a minimal gap between the headboard and the wall.





CARE AND MAINTENANCE

The best way to maintain the appearance of an upholstered bed is to vacuum it regularly and treat marks with nothing more than a damp cloth. In addition, many companies will offer to treat fabrics with fabric protection to make it easier to remove stains and dirt. It's also a good idea to get the bed professionally steam-cleaned every so often.

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
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


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
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
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Elizabeth HURLEY

We find out about Elizabeth's design tastes, why she loves living in both the country and the city and how travelling to the Far East has inspired her style

Actress and designer, Elizabeth Hurley, 49 (on 10th June), was first known for her 13-year-long relationship with Hugh Grant. A former face of Estée Lauder and star of the Austin Powers films, in 2005 she launched her swimwear range, Elizabeth Hurley Beach, which is a favourite with celebrities such as Heidi Klum, Princess Marie-Chantal of Greece and Helena Christensen. Recently she has ventured into the world of interior design with a bed linen range for House of Fraser.

The daughter of a British soldier and a primary teacher, she lives with her 11-yearold son Damian, between her South West London townhouse and a 400-acre organic farm in Gloucestershire.

What do you love about living in **Gloucestershire?** It has to be the great outdoors. I wanted my son to grow up climbing trees and making dens and he can happily do that in Gloucestershire. But I also love my London home, which is on a street lined with cherry trees. I like to balance my time between the two places - the city and country.

What is your kitchen like in the country? I converted a stable which has beautiful

beams, a stone floor and an AGA, and is always warm and cosy. The dogs love the underfloor heating and I love the way the light falls from three directions. We eat at an 18th century oak table.

What does home mean to you personally?

It is my sanctuary. I lived out of a suitcase for years but that changed when I had my son. Now my life is less frantic. I still enjoy entertaining though. We have family and friends to stay every weekend and the house is always full of dogs and kids.

Are you a bath girl or a shower girl? I love baths and mine is a freestanding, cast iron one. I have a marble-topped table on which I nestle all my favourite Jo Malone bath oils and a stone tub full of Dead Sea salt. I have

a low, wooden stool with stacks of books and magazines and small lavender plants in old plant pots standing on my window sills. A big black and white photograph by Ellen von Unwerth dominates the whole room.

Do you own any pieces by well-known artists? Well you could say I have a demi-Damien Hirst. He is a friend and I went to his studio on one occasion and we made some mini Spin paintings together which I kept. I love his oil paintings; they always look stunning.

What do you buy when you travel?

I always pick up things on my travels but they don't always work when I get home. I love textiles and silver and have found some wonderful pieces in India and Morocco.

How would you describe your bedroom?

My bedroom has four big, beautiful windows overlooking the gardens. It's decorated in various shades of white with muted, antique wall hangings from Rajasthan. I have a huge Anglo Indian carved bed which can fit me, my son and all five dogs. I like to pile extra cashmere blankets and knitted pillows on the bed when it gets chillier.

Why did you go into bed linen design?

I jumped at the chance to design bed linen for my Home Collection at House of Fraser. We spend a third of our lives in bed, so to me it's worth making every minute enjoyable. My initial three designs were inspired by my love of the exotic and they all have a sensual feel. Some of the patterns were inspired by the marble fretwork I saw in Rajasthan.

What other aspect of homeware would you like to explore as a designer?

I love table linens and I built up quite a collection of hand-embroidered napkins and placemats when I lived in India. I had dinner with a friend of mine recently who had exquisite table linen - it was all embroidered in Beirut - and I'm now thrilled that she's getting me some too. **CKBB**
