





ALIFE, ON COLOR

Danish couple Laust and Lisbeth have built their own hideaway just outside of Copenhagen's city centre to enjoy the views and peacefulness

istening to the waves gently lapping outside and breathing in the fresh sea air have become part of everyday life for couple Lisbeth Juul and Laust Nørgaard and Buster their Labrador. 'It's good for the soul' says Lisbeth. 'It's a little like living in a beach house all year long. It gives a feeling of being away from civilisation, yet we're still right in it.'

The 70 square metre houseboat, built by Laust who is a craftsman and skilled boatbuilder, floats on clear waters just outside of the city of Copenhagen, where Lisbeth fulfils her hobbies of canoeing and swimming every morning. When they're not spending their free time outdoors, the couple make the most of the stunning view as the glass sections are placed as close to the water as possible so that the reflections of light from the water fill the rooms.

'It's half the size of our old house and we've tried to minimise everything and keep it simple', explains Lisbeth. This simplicity runs throughout their home in everything from the building materials, such as the authentic plywood walls and in the concrete floating element, to the pared-back colour scheme and decoration of the kitchen-living space. Lisbeth describes their modular kitchen as 'beautiful, industrial and functional', and it immediately catches the eye when you first enter the house boat. 'We made the right decision with the Vipp island unit as it matches the style of our home perfectly with its simple design and combination of function and aesthetics. I love the black industrial look and the fact that the kitchen is on legs and not one big block.'

Lisbeth likes cooking fish and Asian dishes and when she finds the time she also enjoys slow cooking. The kitchen offers complete flexibility for the couple to cook and relax all in the same space. 'When I'm standing in the kitchen area, I look out at the Copenhagen skyline, see kayakers and watch the fantastic variety of bird life,' says Lisbeth, making it easy to see why she wouldn't change anything about their new home right now. *ekbb*


Kitchen profile

Inspired by industrial and professional kitchens, this particular kitchen is designed to be 'freestanding' meaning that you can place it wherever you wish, and take it with you when you leave or move out. This is a huge advantage and eases the installation process in all kinds of homes. Furthermore, the modules can be assembled according to your wishes and requirements.

What challenges, if any,

did you come across?

We didn't really come

across any challenges.

How have you created a successful working area with the positioning of the sinks and hob etc? We wanted to make a very functional kitchen meaning that a lot of different criteria had to be met. We had a lot of focus on working posture,

the height of the kitchen, and where to place the sink. We also wanted to make sure there's enough space, keeping it simple regarding the technical elements and gadgets.

Why is the design so successful? It's important to emphasise that we do not customise our designs and this kitchen was not made especially for this houseboat. Therefore, instead of a brief I believe that the Vipp kitchen was simply what matched the needs of Laust and Lisbeth. Design is about how products work and make a difference and how they contribute to a better living. We have to remember that it's not just all about how they look. I think the success of this modular kitchen is down to the fact that it has 'staying power' - it will stand the test of time.

FOOD IS ART. ELEVATE IT.




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So when they decided to move next door to a house with more bedrooms and a larger garden in order to accommodate their growing family, including four children aged between seven and 14, they knew exactly where to go for their new kitchen. 'We went straight to see Sola Kitchens, who had done such a good job designing and fitting the room in our old house and said, 'same again please,' she laughs.

Their new home is a 1920s-built, six bedroom property, spread over three floors, in South West London. 'The house had been lived in for 45 years by an elderly couple, and needed renovation and modernisation,' explains Karoline. 'Although we had to keep the front of the house intact, because we are in a conservation area, we were able to extend across the back and

side to create a lovely, large open-plan living-dining-kitchen area, which we felt would suit our family life best.'

That, explains Karoline, meant a defined kitchen area with practical, working space and everything needed for cooking in easy reach, as well as affording the space for a separate utility zone with more storage. 'Because we are a large family, the room needed to work hard and be very practical,' she says. 'But we also wanted a relaxed living and dining space where we could all be together at the same time without feeling cramped.'

Karoline says she is a fan of the Scandinavian cool and clean, white and wood aesthetic, which Swedish company Sola, led by managing director, Sofia Bune Strandh, does so well.

'We wanted to create a beautiful, calm mood with shades of white and grey,' says Karoline. 'Sofia persuaded me to go with the wood worktop and floor. I was worried that they wouldn't wear well, but they actually cope brilliantly and prevent the space looking clinical by adding warmth to the space.'

'The room works very well when we have friends for dinner – something that we love to do – but that wasn't our main concern when we began the project,' says Karoline. 'The most important thing was to create a space that works for family life, every day. And that is what this room does so perfectly.' **CKBB**

How did you begin your plan of the kitchen design?

It was an easy start, because Karoline simply said she wanted exactly the same as her previous kitchen. So we knew that we would be using the same streamlined and handleless doors in a warm white (just one shade off bright white). But, of course, this is a completely different room, so the layout needed to be designed to suit, and we needed to make sure that there was sufficient storage, worktop space and room to house all the appliances immaculately. This time, we built the tall cabinets to about

2750mm high to take advantage of the height of the ceiling, so that there is now room to store less-often-used platters and serving dishes.

Can you tell us about the plan of the central island?

The layout is a practical U-shape, making use of the three walls of the room. It made sense to include a large island in the centre of the space. This serves as a focal point and bridge between the base units on one wall, tall cabinets on the other. In Karoline's previous kitchen, we had used the same worktops throughout, but this time we

introduced some soft contrast by using a white stained oak finish for the island top.

How did you plan the utilities into the scheme?

To provide more storage, we designed a walk-in utility zone next to the breakfast area. It features cabinetry that is more classic and pantry-like in style than the contemporary handleless design of the kitchen, and it is painted in a soft grey. It also makes a very useful space to tuck messy pots and pans out of sight when guests arrive, so that the open-plan room can be kept calm and uncluttered.



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eering through grimy windows, Kate and Mark Cannon saw something in this 1960s-built house that clearly others didn't, as Kate explains. 'The place had been empty for two years - it was damp and cold with wallpaper peeling off the walls and surrounded by 3ft high grass,' she recalls. 'But it was in a very private location, in a three quarters of an acre plot, and only a few miles from the centre of Sheffield, and we felt it had fantastic potential.'

Together, Kate and Mark run a serviced apartment business, so they are no strangers to making the most of properties, and Kate undertakes most of the interior design herself. I think a lot of people were put off by the thought of a dated 60s house as way too much work, but we felt it would be a great investment,' she says. So, six years ago, the couple purchased the house, and moved in after tackling what Kate describes as 'the bare minimum' of work to make it habitable to share with their two sons, Joe, 14, and Jerod, 12. Over the years, they have gradually undertaken a major refurbishment, and are currently in the process of building an extension to complete the work to the six bedroom house.

To enlarge the size of the kitchen and to make room for both a dining table and relaxed seating area, they demolished an internal wall and began to develop their ideas for an open-plan kitchen design suited to their family life. 'I saw a picture in a magazine of a kitchen with beautiful cupboards finished with a silver leaf effect, which was designed by Goldman & Rankin,' says Kate. 'I'd been looking at lots of kitchens by then, and they all seemed to merge into one - except for this. It was definitely something a bit different.'

Contacting designer Nicholas Goldman led to the eye-catching copper feature cupboards, teamed with Midnight Blue for smart contrast. The large island is wrapped in an L-shape of furniture on two walls, designed to provide maximum storage plus built-in appliances, with separate zones in the room for dining and soft seating. Kate and Mark love to entertain and Sunday roasts are a regular feature. 'The room works so well - and I love the warmth of the copper,' says Kate. 'It creates a wonderful wow factor and everyone comments on how special it is.' **CKBB**

Seriously, natural copper is a very beautiful metal, and we have developed a technique to produce this copper finish with bubbles in it, creating an interesting, textured and aged look. It is made from finely ground real copper mixed with a clear resin to make a liquid, which is then sprayed on to the furniture. As it dries, air is blown through it to create the bubble effect, then the result is burnished and finished with a coat of oil. It requires very little maintenance - just an occasional wipe down with a damp cloth to keep it clean. It will also grow to develop its own beautiful patina as the years go by and the material ages.

Can you tell us about the

extraordinary Copper Aero

finish? It is inspired by the Aero

How did you develop the rest of the scheme? The warm tones of the

copper are echoed in the walnut detailing of the furniture, and the Midnight Blue satin finish creates a smart contrast. The blue adds depth to the scheme, while the light grey quartz worktops, glass splashback, polished porcelain floor and stainless steel-effect plinths introduce a clean, light feel to the room.

And the layout? The island is the main hub of the room, with space for bar stools, as well as lots of work surface and storage. The L-shaped wall run is also designed to be hard-working: a built-in extractor is concealed in the wall cabinets above the hobs, the sink is underneath the window with dishwasher close by, and the ovens are all together in one easy to use run. This is a very functional, working kitchen - as well as one designed for its contemporary good looks.



How did you begin the project? The existing kitchen layout was probably the worst I've ever seen, with a tiny sink stuck in a corner and very little storage, so really not very suitable for a family house. My goal was to introduce more natural light, create a more open feel and improve the flow around the space, making the room practical and functional and better suited to entertaining.

Can you tell us more about the island? The

island drove the layout of the new space. It is the focus of the design, and large enough to include lots of storage and space for people to sit when someone is preparing food. It zones the cooking area and, even though it is 2.8m long, still leaves plenty of space for

a separate dining table and relaxed benches.

How did you decide on the style of cabinetry and colour palette?

The flat-fronted cabinetry is modern, its painted finish introducing a classic feel. Teamed with the solid surface worktop, the combination is contemporary, but not overtly so - we didn't want the look to be hard or cold. The warm grey tones accentuate that effect: we used dark grey for the island ends to anchor the design, adding base cabinets in a mid-tone grey and using a lighter shade on the wall cupboards. Bright colour from paintings, books and even the red cables of the lights lifts the scheme - and make the room unique to Anna and Lucas.

ARCHITECT DESIGNED Kitchen

Designer Rory Harmer shows how a classic Edwardian house can learn new tricks, with an efficient Scandinavian upgrade

here once a small north-facing kitchen stood, now a statement space four times its size sits pretty on the arm of this listed house. From within a timber framed and triple-glazed extension, architect Rory Harmer of Tate Harmer, has worked hard to eliminate the downsides of an old house while illuminating its beauty and architecture at the same time. He tells how his design was inspired by his clients, the owners of the home, who are a couple with both English and Swedish roots. They had fallen in love with this very traditional old house but wanted to give it a Scandinavian upgrade, which meant creating a well-insulated and efficiently heated home,' Rory explains. 'We designed a double-height glazed break between the old house and the extension which meant light could filter straight into the kitchen and deep into the house,' he says. 'Inside the kitchen our starting point was a long island so the owners could cook while talking to family and guests. It made sense to have a through section from the front to the back of the house, with a small breakfast area at the front to eatch the morning sun and a dining area towards the back making the most of the last light of the day, feeling almost like you are sitting in the garden.'

The result is a design which is inspired in equal measure by both the existing nature surrounding and all the latest upgrades; from a cantilevered foundation to protect the mature trees outside to underfloor heating and insulation which feeds energy right into the heart of the house. **EKBB**

METALLIC EFFECT

Can you talk us through the materials you used? The cabinets are solid walnut, as the owners were keen for them to tie in with the furniture in the rest of the house rather than have a contrasting style. For the flooring we

used tiling in a lovely light grey colour which hides dirt but isn't too dark, instead bouncing light upwards to keep the space bright. The worktop is Belgian blue limestone, which is extremely hardwearing and arrived in two large continuous slabs, perfect for covering the long kitchen island.

How did you decide on the layout?

Freestanding furniture is becoming more popular and it creates a lot of flexibility because the cabinets aren't so fixed. Here you could even move the central island around by extending the waste pipes from the sink. The downside is that it can be hard to work big and bulky necessities into the cabinets without ruining the effect. Alongside Hansen Kitchen designer Knud Kapper, we fitted the fridge, freezer and ovens into the tall wall cupboards and sourced two dishwasher drawers which would blend in with the island cabinets better than a normal-sized dishwasher.

Can you tell us about the new heating system?

We tried to keep this simple because we were working on an existing house. We installed underfloor heating to the ground floor throughout and the first floor of the extension, replaced all the heating piping and radiators in the existing house, fitted room thermostats so you can control the heating in different parts of the house and installed a new highly efficient boiler and hot water cylinder. We ensured the fabric of the building performs as efficiently as possible with a thick timber frame packed with insulation and triple-glazing.

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Modular THINKING

Creating a casual-contemporary style, freestanding furniture is a versatile way to plan your new kitchen look

or a relaxed kitchen look that can be personalised to create a truly unique design, freestanding furniture is the way to go. Whether you want a totally all-freestanding scheme or a combination of fitted and modular units, there's something out there to suit. From storage solutions such as sideboards and larders to worktables, islands and butcher's blocks or even simply a mobile trolley for serving drinks, there are plenty of options to cover every practical need. 'Freestanding kitchens follow the idea of an

independent workstation in a professional kitchen,' says designer Laurence Pidgeon. 'Often in a commercial context, the workstation is for a specific function or type of cuisine like the pastry making or salad section. At home, the freestanding workstation is likely to be multi-tasking - with everything needed for the preparation of all kinds of food in one place.

The key to avoiding cluttering the space and making sure the freestanding elements work with their surroundings is to ensure that you add a functional purpose to the furniture, as well as an aesthetic one.

So why is it so popular? Apart from the practical aspects, it seems that old school larders and pantries have become on-trend again. 'There's something really nostalgic about a larder stashed full of homemade jams, pickles, spices and biscuits, says Charlie Marshall, founder of Loaf, 'and they're so handy for extra storage.'

Whatever item you are introducing, it should have sufficient space to 'breathe'. 'The individual pieces have to be very specifically placed to ensure the flow of the kitchen is as practical as possible, adds Xavier Dupuy, CEO of La Cornue. 'Make sure any necessities such as power points, storage, food prepping and laying out areas are carefully thought through and incorporated into the design right from the beginning.





Before you buy, consider the size of the kitchen and take care not to overpower the room with large units. Be realistic about size and proportion. Laurence Pidgeon suggests an ideal size for a workstation is approximately 330x100cm. Smaller spaces could benefit from compact butcher's blocks, trolleys and neat islands while open-plan rooms are ideal for adding a sideboard onto the dining side.

Think carefully about the layout you envisage and see if it would work well for you and your family's needs. Do you want the furniture to provide storage and somewhere to sit and catch up on paperwork? Or would you prefer it to take more of a central role in the daily cooking?

It's also important to get the scale right. Period rooms with lofty ceilings need tall pieces of furniture, whereas a modern home with lower ceilings require carefully designed pieces to make the most of the space available to you.

Try to keep it simple. Running services to a freestanding kitchen can sometimes be difficult, as everything has to come up from the floor. This includes electricity, plumbing, gas and waste too. If this seems too daunting, stick to movable islands and storage solutions instead. 'We find that a combination of fitted and freestanding units offers the best of both worlds,' says Jane Stewart, design director of Mowlem & Co. 'This allows key services to be neatly integrated into wall units in the fitted kitchen, leaving an island, pantry or butcher's block to create the modular style.

As well as combining freestanding with fitted furniture, you could also combine and contrast styles, by using modern and traditional pieces for a more individual approach.

'Mix and match textures and surface finishes are currently and increasingly on trend, agrees Jenny Handley, head of marketing at T&G Woodware. 'You can have wood, granite and stainless steel all in the same kitchen. Country cream and vintage greens are very popular at the moment and it's all about creating your own unique look.'

Consider combining painted with unpainted, mid-century with traditional, stone with wood and you'll soon have a space perfectly reflective of your own personal style. **EKBB**

- as easily to create a contemporary look, with eclectic elements that can help personalise your space.
- Different pieces can be added as your needs change, without the hassle and expense of replacing the entire kitchen. You may start with compact components for instance and then replace these with larger designs as the family grows and their individual needs change.
- You will also be able to take any modular elements with you if you move house, which makes any investment entirely worthwhile. Bear in mind though that anything that incorporates plumbing or electric such as an island with hob and sink will need to stay in situ.
- Freestanding islands or tables provide additional workspace and storage with the benefit of being able to be moved into a different position when needed. This means you could also save on installation costs.
- Larders and pantry cupboards can be combined with fitted furniture for the best of both worlds. Many kitchens are now designed with fitted and freestanding units and the old fashioned store cupboard has been given a modern update that provides a chic and statement alternative to the pull-out metal larder.
- Bespoke items can be made to suit your space, style and colour scheme while incorporating any appliances you may want, such as the hob, downdraft extractor, sink, dishwasher, wine cabinet or fridge drawers.

PRODUCT DESIGNER PROFILE

Thomas HOUSDEN



This trained architect and designer discusses his hands-on approach and admiration for playful and thought-provoking design



Can you tell us about your studio workshop? This is, as much as anything, an aspiration which I am saving up for. London property prices are so expensive that my workshop is my home. We have a simple set up for ceramics and general prototyping and it is amazing how much you can do with very little in the way of space, but it is a bit of a balance between making sure your kitchen does not become overrun with bandsaws and kilns. We hope to get a separate space in the next year or so with a few new tools we have our eyes on.

Where did the name 'Hand & Eye Studio' come from and what inspired you to set it up? It comes from the idea of using both your hands as well as a keen eye and

Are there any materials you haven't worked with that you'd like to use?

Many! We are actually just starting to play with porcelain. You can make much finer edges with this ceramic material. I am also interested in silicone and rubber as well as pulped recycled materials, such as wood chips used to make pallets.

Lighting forms a large part of your work. What do you believe makes a good light? For me a good light creates ambiences and defines spaces within spaces. I decided to investigate one area at a time until I felt I had a strong body of work and then move on to something else. We'll continue to grow our lighting range for a few years and then look at something else. I'm wondering about ironmongery.

mind when designing. I feel that sitting in front of a computer and designing is not a great way to work. You miss out on using all of your senses and intelligence if you don't get messy while being creative.

What's your favourite part of your job? Developing an idea from a quick sketch to a working, manufacturable object. I like to understand the making process first and then design with this in mind.

Who or what inspires you and why? I admire the work of many people but often for very different reasons. For example, I love the madness of Austrian artist and architect Hundertwasser. He makes me think about how conservative we are as a society and I find many of my architecture clients are too. I also like the work of Rural Studio, a design-build studio run by Auburn University. Their inspirational work involves using building design to help people and communities alike. While it's a little clichéd, I'd also say that nature and being in large, open spaces is something that is inspiring. One of my favourite places is The Monastry of Panagia on the Greek island Amorgos.

Can you tell us the about the process of working with terracotta and what makes it interesting to work with?

Terracotta is one of the oldest manufacturing materials and is basically cooked earth, as the name suggests. I like the idea of making things in terracotta that have a contemporary feel; it's a nice contrast. It also has a real depth of colour and warmth (if it's the right type). We love the Gooseberry family of lights. Can you tell us where the inspiration for this range came from? I came across a technique to create lines within the glaze by making fine ridges in the clay itself. This way the glaze slips off the ridge when it is fired and allows some of the clay colour to come through and corrupt the glaze. When we tested it, it reminded me of the distinctive and beautiful white lines on gooseberry fruits.

What was the last item you bought for your home? A 1930's 12-piece set of vintage French cutlery.

What is your favourite product from any designer (past or present) and why?

any designer (past or present) and wny?
This is a difficult one. I'm going to go
for something slightly obscure as I don't
know who designed it. In the Paris Metro
I recently came across a route finder that
reminds me that we should design our
environments with a bit of charm and
playfulness. A large metro map has had
small light bulbs added to every stop.
Below the map is an old board with a
button for every tube stop. When you
press the tube stop you want to go to
it illuminates the best route. There's
something so playful about the way it
works that you end up checking routes
for places you don't want to go to.

Are you working on anything exciting at the moment? Yes, we have been experimenting with the clay slip make-up and we're looking at how to modify the colour and finish using different oxides. We're hoping that the tests are successful. **CKBB** handandeyestudio.co.uk

Create a unique kitchen scheme with a variety of materials, finishes, tones and textures for the ultimate cutting-edge design

orget a fully co-ordinated finish – today's kitchens are mixing materials for drama and definition. Anything goes when it comes to texture, colour, pattern and print but for best results, carefully consider the finished look and what purpose you want to achieve. 'Kitchens with contrasting materials will define particular zones in the space,' explains Andrew Hall, chief designer and managing director of Woodstock Furniture, 'which is why this has become so popular in line with the trend for open-plan living.'

Larger areas can support different materials more easily than compact spaces – an island may be contrasted with a run of cabinets for instance, while worktops can be mixed and matched to create a tailor-made cooking surface to suit your needs. One trend is to choose a harder, heatproof material near the hob with seamless solid surfaces in the wet zone and a cool marble for pastry.

The key is to avoid a disjointed feel with a hotchpotch of random materials, as Jamie Telford, Roundhouse director, explains. 'We use mixed materials in many of our kitchens – the urban industrial look combines rough sawn surfaces with polished concrete. Patinated or burnished metallics are teamed with polished stone surfaces while matt painted classic furniture is topped with beautiful Carrara marble.'

To ensure it remains current and not a fad that you grow tired of, kitchen designer Laurence Pidgeon advises you to choose the materials wisely. 'If it's a function driven decision, it's likely to be an enduring material. Elemental and natural materials have the greatest longevity – natural stone, wood and even stainless steel and glass. Be careful about artificial stone in bright colours and unnatural designs.'

When it comes to practicality, granite is the hardest stone for worktops and the least susceptible to stains. Next is artificial stone, which includes quartz, then marble and then limestone. Wood and Corian® by DuPont™, according to Laurence Pidgeon, are softer and less heat-resistant but are easy to make good with a rub from a Scotch-Brite pad. 'Stainless steel is incredibly durable and easy to clean but it'll scratch − though wait six months and the scratches will join up and become a uniform patination.'

Timber cabinets come in all forms, from painted and panelled to untreated and grained. 'Materials such as textured or raw wood have been heavily featured in design schemes in 2014 and going into 2015,' says head of design at DesignSpaceLondon Jamee Kong. 'I predict that design palettes will become even bolder, with wooden components still being popular but being incorporated in a less processed fashion.'

For a successful mix, wood works well with stone, old with new, light with dark, matt with gloss. Consider combining shiny accents such as copper pendant lights with wooden cabinet doors or worktops for that blend of the refined and the rustic. *CKBB*

Metallics have been featured in interiors trends over a long period of time and I think that this has something to do with their natural elements. Incorporating copper or gold in a room adds a warm hue and provides a sense of welcoming, while silver and chrome offer highly reflective qualities and can easily be used to create a sleek, minimalistic look.



form? Stainless steel was, for a long time, the most common metallic finish found in the kitchen, mainly in appliances and lighting.

However, other metals such as copper, oil-rubbed bronze and polished nickel are now more prominent and these can be found in splashbacks, small appliances, handles, taps and worktops.

What other materials complement these


elements? The beauty of these elements is that they can be paired with almost anything. Being natural materials, they look good when combined with other metals such as stainless steel to create an industrial feel, or with wood for a rustic look. As an accent, they work equally well with both matt and gloss lacquered surfaces, making them perfect for kitchens.

It's also hardwearing and can give your space a unique finish. Choose from concrete worktops or concrete-finished cabinetry, which is fairly new to the market. Puro Design use a partially synthetic concrete, which has an anti-mould additive and is extremely hygienic.
- It is a material that needs to be looked after to prevent cracks and stains. A Nano sealer will help resist acids, juices and fats. Always use protective boards and pads for preparing food and placing hot pans on the surface.
- Another benefit is that it will look better over time, as any wear and tear adds to the character of the material and the patina improves with age.
- Polished concrete tops work well contrasted against rough sawn timber. It also gives a contemporary finish when teamed with stainless steel or a complementary worktop in Silestone or Dekton. Use a lighter shade to create a contrast with the grey of the concrete.
- As a material, it's a really affordable way of achieving something different and you can decide how thick you want the worktops to be. Be prepared to wait for the worktops to set before use and go for a polished finish for a more refined effect in the kitchen.

TOP ARTISAN CHOCOLATIER PAUL A. YOUNG TALKS THROUGH HIS UNIQUE CHOCOLATE FLAVOURS, RECIPE TESTING AND HIS FAVOURITE APPLIANCE

FEATURE LUCY MACDONALD

You're known for creating unique chocolate flavours – what's your favourite combination and why? I think chocolate is so emotive, so my favourite flavour can change several times in one day. If I had to pick, I have a big soft spot for my Sea Salted Caramels. I adore them, making sure I try at least one of them every day, just to ensure they're still up to scratch. They've won so many industry awards and I am very proud of them.

What is the process that you and your team go through to create each chocolate? I consider us an artisan chocolate company. To me, this means small batch, really hands-on chocolate making - most definitely from scratch. I often work through recipe ideas in my own space before sharing them with the rest of the team. I love to be inspired by unusual flavours and coming up with new recipes that are unexpected is very exciting - it's fun to surprise people. As everything is made using fresh, natural ingredients, we are able to introduce new flavours every week, choosing our ingredients as they alter with each harvest and every season. When the first batch of a new truffle is created, we taste as a team for quality control - it's a tough job but we struggle through somehow! Once we are all in agreement that we have reached the perfect recipe, the products are released into the world for everyone to enjoy.

What makes your chocolates different? Our principles have been the same since we opened the first shop in Islington in 2006: accept nothing other than perfection in everything you do. We only source the finest ingredients and don't compromise on quality. I also truly believe we have the most unique flavours in the UK – just some of our new flavours last year included Toast & Marmalade and Caramelised Garlic.

Where do you get your inspiration from? I'm from the North and my grandma and mum used to cook with me every Sunday, which taught me so much, so they've inevitably been a huge influence on my interest in food. But day-to-day, I find inspiration in everything. Sometimes it might be something I've eaten at a restaurant that will spark off an idea, or I'll pick up an ingredient or technique from somewhere on my travels. Going to India was hugely inspirational for me.

Your favourite appliance is the KitchenAid hand blender, how does it help you when it comes to creating new recipes? It's simply fantastic for developing my products and has so many attachments, there is no limit to the possibilities you can create with it. As it is so versatile, we especially use it for developing different consistencies for the fillings we wrap in chocolate. I love the fact that one minute I can be puréeing an ingredient and the next I can whisk or chop nuts. As it is so sensitive, it retains the quality and the delicacy of the ingredient, which is obviously top of my priority list.

What exciting news have you got coming up this year? Ideally, we would love to expand out of London with a fifth shop in 2015, so keep your eyes open for that. And as ever, we hope to bring our customers some exciting new innovations and delicious flavour combinations. *CKBB*

According to research conducted by Quiet Mark, the international mark of approval from the UK's Noise Abatement Society, noise is having a negative impact on over three quarters of the UK population at home. Research by John Lewis reveals that almost half (49%) of British consumers consider sound an important factor in their purchasing decision when buying appliances. This increases to 62% of those with an open-plan kitchen/lounge/dining room.

A key way to finding quieter appliances is to be aware of the decibel rate. For comparison, washing hands under a running tap is about 45dB, a keyboard 50dB, the sea has a noise rate of 55dB, a rainstorm 48dB. Normal conversation is around 60dB, a lawnmower 90dB, a car horn 110dB and a firecracker 110dB. Do bear in mind however that the decibel level will vary according to context, for example if there are hard reflective surfaces or sound absorbing materials around the appliance.

'When we surveyed our Quiet Mark Community, 45% named the washing machine as the most annoying appliance at home, followed by 14% who said the vacuum cleaner,' says Poppy Szkiler, managing director at Quiet Mark.

'Quieter appliances don't necessarily have to be more expensive,' she adds. 'Noise reduction is the new consumer eco trend and therefore more brands are investing in lower noise high performing technology.' $\it CKBB$ </sup>

uying a new bathroom needs careful thought and meticulous planning. It can also involve a large financial commitment and a great deal of disruption to your daily routine, so it's vital to get things right from the outset. While kitchens were once deemed the number one priority project in the home, the bathroom is now just as important, having transformed from a purely practical room to a haven of relaxation and great style.

Think carefully about your budget, available space and personal style to ensure your bathroom looks, functions and performs reliably and efficiently and lasts for a long time. Before you hit the high street, it is crucial to work out exactly what you want. Look closely at your lifestyle, how much money you have to spend and what products appeal to you. What suits you and your family's day-to-day lifestyle? Think about your bathroom routine and how you use each item: do you like a quick morning shower or a long, luxurious soak at night? If you have the space would you benefit from a pair of basins to avoid the early morning scrabble and do you have space for a separate shower or is a combined bath/shower more appropriate. Do you favour a conventional bathroom with a three-piece suite or do you fancy a wow factor wet room instead? And what sort of storage do you require for lotions and potions? Go with your style instinct (do you love modern, traditional or an eclectic mix of both?) and even create a moodboard to get yourself started.

If you hanker after a large, luxurious bathroom complete with a fabulous roll-top bath, consider knocking two smaller rooms into one, or opt for a boutique-style bath-in-bedroom with a separate dressing room. Converting a room that isn't already a bathroom (such as a loft space) may need building regulations approval to ensure there is adequate ventilation and drainage and that any structural alterations are stable and safe.

Planning a large bathroom can be as tricky as a teeny one and you will need to think about zoning the space for it to look and function well. If you have a huge walk-in shower at one end of the room, for instance consider cladding this area in a different stone or marble for visual contrast and don't forget multi-jets, steam functions and lighting for a true spa at home vibe.

His and hers basins are a must and depending on your taste, you could go for a vintage-style vanity unit on legs or a pair of modern, wall-hung basins with floating storage beneath or even two conical washstations for a graphic silhouette. A deep, double-ended freestanding tub oozes luxury, (think antique Bateau bath clad in a flash of copper or a classic, composite version on legs) but equally a fully fitted inset bath (or plunge pool) will instil a sense of hotel room-like peace and harmony. Positioning a bath next to a window – which isn't overlooked – will mean you benefit from a view while you soak.

Gadget lovers might want to consider added extras such as a waterproof TV set into the wall, hands-free, electronic taps and showers and centrally controlled lighting as well as music that can be changed at a touch of a button depending on your mood.

Family bathrooms

Busy family bathrooms need to work extra hard but that's not to say they can't be stylish and sleek too. Think about who will use the bathroom - does it need to be multi-generational to suit a variety of ages and degrees of mobility? Consider incorporating accessibility and inclusivity into the overall design of your bathroom now rather than making adaptations in the future. For instance, grab bars, hand rails and extra seating or a walk-in shower with a super-slim, low-profile shower tray or level-access tiled wet room floor that can easily accommodate a wheelchair. Choose tough, durable finishes that are humidity and water-resistant and glass or stone-topped furniture that is both stylish and practical. Storage is crucial in a bathroom used by several members of the family so plan in modular fitted cupboards and drawers with compartments and dividers to help keep toiletries, make-up and bath toys organised, accessible and out of sight. Group your storage with toilet rolls close to the WC, towels close to the bath and make-up near to mirrors and basins and if you have very young children a large bath is key. Look out for movable headrests, shaped, ergonomic interiors, taps with a hand shower and a recessed bath panel so parents can gain closer access. Wall-hung sanitaryware leaves clear space underneath so the bathroom is easy to clean, while underfloor heating will keep the space warm at all times and avoid 'cold spots'.

En suites

To cut out early morning bathroom queues and to cope with the demands of a growing family, an en suite is perhaps more of an essential than a luxury these days. Good planning is key where space is limited and every detail of a bathroom's layout needs to be carefully considered. Don't squeeze in too many items as this will make the en suite difficult and uncomfortable to use (as a benchmark, experts recommend a 600mm clearance around basins and WCs and a reasonable gap between each item). If you want a spacious shower, compromise with a space-saving basin with a short projection (but remember to pair with a tap that fits) and back-to-wall sanitaryware in order to create a slick, streamlined look.

If you fancy going all out on a walk-in shower, consider one of the new low profile trays that fit flush with the floor. These are easier and cheaper to install than a true wet room. Bespoke, made-to-measure enclosures may be more costly but allow for a tailor-made shower around existing fittings and awkward spaces such as sloping ceilings.

Good storage is essential, so plump for wall-hung cabinets which free up floor space in either pure white or neutral wood grains and remember to keep the space as open as possible with a run of glass shelves. Be clever with fixtures and fittings and chose hardworking items that can do two jobs at once such as mirrored cabinets for extra storage or ladder radiators that heat the bathroom and store towels.

Bathrooms without any windows must be fitted with an extractor fan. These are usually operated by the light switch and continue to run after the cord has been pulled. If it's a dark room, enhance any light with sleek, recessed spotlights and wall-mounted lights above mirrors and in wall niches to wash light upwards and help create a feeling of space. *eKBB*



If you have lots of long dresses or trousers, consider plenty of higher hanging rails like in the Hangar design by Lema. Or alternatively, if you prefer multiple shelves and drawers for items like bags or shoes, a design like the Kensington dressing room from Neville Johnson could be right for you. Alan Borra, national sales manager at Neville Johnson says, 'Factors such as pull-out shoe shelves, full length internal mirrors, trinket drawers and handbag displays use all the available space intelligently to marry aesthetics and function.' There is also the option of dividing up the space into 'his' and 'hers' sections, this way you can make everything clear and easy to find.

Once you have both your design and internal configurations planned, there's just the small matter of the finishing touches. Good lighting has both looks and practical qualities – it can help to show off your statement storage as well as assist with finding that dress at the back of the wardrobe if you're up early in the morning and don't want to disturb anyone else in the room. Infrared or movement sensors can be installed so that when the doors are opened discreet lighting can help you find what is needed. Whether you go for showpiece storage or a classic solution, there are plenty of options to ensure that your clothes are stored in style. *CKBB*

What are the key points to consider when planning a walk-in wardrobe? Firstly you should really think about the amount of clothes, shoes and bags you own that need to be accommodated in the storage, and how you would like them to be stored. It is also important to consider the length of the clothes on hanging rails and making sure that your long dresses or even shirts hang perfectly without sweeping the bottom of the next shelf.

What's the best solution for a smaller space? When space is limited making use of the full height of the room should be considered. Having

shelves or extra cupboards above the hanging area or cabinets below gives extra storage space for those items you may only use very occasionally.

What other aspects need to be considered?

Lighting in cabinets can be very useful, especially if there is no natural light in the room. Lights can turn on automatically when opening the cabinet doors through infrared or movement sensors. Drawers are also always useful - think about whether you need some for either jewellery or ties with dedicated dividers to make sure your items are organised more efficiently.

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


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
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




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Chloe MACKINTOSH

Creative director of Made.com, Chloe Mackintosh shows us around her house and talks about her design favourites and insider trend tips

Parisian-born Chloe Mackintosh set up the hugely successful online retailer Made.com in 2010 with partners Ni Ling and Julien Callede to sell design-led and stylish furniture direct to the customer. Sometimes called 'the Zara of the home', the company prides itself with enabling its savvy customer to create their own identity and provide a cost-effective way of becoming their own interior designers.

What is your background and training? I worked at architect Norman Foster's for 10 years. I was an associate partner when I left to join Brent Hoberman at Mydeco in 2007. I felt I was ready for a new challenge, but I was pregnant at the time, so I took a real leap of faith leaving the security of Fosters to start a new career. Three years later Made.com was born. I lead the brand vision, collections and designer collaborations.

You've collaborated with designers such as Philippe Starck and Terence Conran - do you have a favourite? It has been fun and challenging working with them all but I feel very close to Terence's ethos of making design more accessible. Philippe brings humour to his products and this is something that has inspired me with quite a few Made collection pieces, like the Rodnik Band for example.

How do you decide which designers to work with? There's no specific criteria - we've worked with over 50 designers. While some, like Steuart Padwick and Nina Campbell, are names in their own right, we also work with a lot of fresh talent in the form of our annual Emerging Talent Award, launched in 2013.


What was it like growing up in Paris? I spent a lot of time with my mother, an antiques expert, visiting flea markets. It influenced my outlook - that a home should be made up of pieces gathered over time, your own personal museum.

What is your home like? Clean lines, neutral colours and lots of light in the communal spaces. I think that's the architect in me! But it's far from impersonal - it's filled with pieces my husband and I have collected over the years. It was originally two houses, which we knocked together. We added a glass extension which has transformed the downstairs space. It's a family home but also the perfect setting for a party.


Other than Made, where do you shop? Many of my household favourites were gifts but when I travel I always have my eyes peeled for unique and interesting pieces you can't find elsewhere. I put this down to my early days scouting items for my parents' antique shop.

Do you see any particular trends in home furnishings in the coming year? Danish mid-century furniture made a big comeback in 2014, but I think designers will start to move away from that towards fuller furniture shapes in the coming year. Instead we'll see more 'New Scandinavian' inspired pieces, characterised by curves and pale wood accents. Dirty pastels are a key palette to watch out for as we transition from spring into summer. Memphis-inspired shapes and prints from the 80's will make an appearance.

Any ideas for the kitchen or bathroom? Adding a pair of characterful stools or chairs to the kitchen instantly creates a communal environment. And picking up on the rising trend towards bathrooms as living spaces, I'd recommend one of our cushioned seats, designed by Nina Campbell. **eKBB** made.com
