

hen scientist Rebecca
Hughes and accountant
Kevin Balloch first spied
this 1930s California-style
bungalow in the western
suburbs of Perth's outskirts, they
knew they'd hit the right project.
'Our challenge was to make the best of the space.
We wanted to get as much light in as well as have

We wanted to get as much light in as well as have the best access to the garden, and there were also so many beautiful and original features that we didn't want to lose along the way,' says Kevin.

Working with designers Samuel Klopper, Matt Davis and Olivia Rees from Klopper and Davis Architects, they formulated a way to convert the original part of the house into a private area of bedrooms and bathrooms to keep its original feel. They then added an extension which included the kitchen, living, dining, laundry and utility areas.

'We love to cook, so the kitchen was a big thing to get right. We knew that we wanted a central marble bench and a stainless steel prep bench, two ovens and lots of cupboards,' says Rebecca.

The couple admit to always having a 'thing' for wood, so wood panelling was an obvious choice. 'I think it gives a warm and stylish finish to the

house,' says Rebecca, who also likes the look of mixed materials: 'Marble because it is beautiful to look at, stainless steel because it's functional but stylish and wooden veneer cupboards to give a warm and sophisticated feel to the kitchen.'

The family wanted to create an open-plan space, but also to keep it cosy and with two energetic boys (Liam, eight, and Hamish, 10) as well as Crunchie, their Golden Retriever, it was vital to have a 'mud room' for road bikes and sports gear. As outdoorsy people and living in a climate that gets 265 days of sunshine a year, the outside area was important.

'The pool was a fantastic addition. It was definitely worth spending a bit more on getting a great garden designer in and getting the planting done at the same time as the house.'

And now that it's all done, what is their favourite thing about living in the house now?

'I think the main thing is all of the extra space and light – it was so dark,' opines Rebecca, who thinks they've doubled the footprint of the original house. 'The kitchen is fabulous for entertaining now and we love our outdoors area. I also like all of the storage, as well as the use of interesting materials and the central fireplace. There are so many stand-out features. We are very happy! **CKBB**

What was your brief? Kevin and Rebecca were very specific. We focused on their ideas of materials and finishes to mix the function of a big and busy kitchen with the warmth and texture of a home.

How did you create the layout?

To respond to the two contrasting requirements - warmth and utility - we designed the kitchen to have a functional 'machine' side and a beautiful and stylish 'home' side.


How did you marry the old and the new in the 1930s house?

The original house was converted into bedrooms and wet areas. The new rear extension is oriented to maximise sun and light and is designed to appear settled and

composed, but in a new form. The kitchen itself is all new. The old kitchen has been converted into a kids' play area linking to bedrooms.

And the colours and materials?

We introduced a dark, textured brick to give depth and warmth. The 'machine' side of the kitchen is a functional and beautiful stainless steel bench. The 'home' side is the island bench of Calacatta marble on a timber veneer base. The floors are a dense and textured limestone laid in a random pattern. The timber cladding that covered the external walls of sections of the house wraps internally to form a screen to the study and breakfast bar bench. The elements of green add deliberate colour add a pop of fun.



ometimes a kitchen is nice, but not nice enough. 'The kitchen is the heart of my home and somewhere I like to spend lots of time,' says Kate Gibson. 'So, although the room was fine when I bought the house, it wasn't just how I wanted it, and after a while, I began to think of all the things I would do differently if I could.'

Then the opportunity rather unexpectedly arose. After a very long wait and quite some to-ing and fro-ing, Kate's patience paid off and she was finally granted planning permission to add a conservatory to the rear of her five bedroom, listed house in central London. 'That was the catalyst,' she says. 'It made sense to remodel the kitchen along with the roof terrace and the new conservatory, and get the work done in one go,' she explains.

Following up a recommendation, Kate headed off to meet Mark Brook, creative director at McCarron & Co.

'I wanted furniture with a classic, elegant and timeless feel, which I knew the company could do very well,' says Kate of her choice. 'The fact that all McCarron & Co kitchens are entirely bespoke and custom built was very important too, because this house is part of an early Victorian crescent, and the rooms are wedge-shaped, so the dimensions are never standard here.'

And how did Kate brief Mark? 'The kitchen needed to function perfectly for entertaining with lots of appliances, but be welcoming and relaxing if I just want to read the newspaper or have a casual supper with friends,' she says. 'The one thing I was determined to do was get rid of the island that was in here, it made the room look like a tram line, and seemed to get in the way of everything.

Now Mark's layout combines practicality with a more open feel. 'This isn't a huge room - in fact, it's quite slender - but it now feels spacious and calm, and flows easily into the conservatory, continues Kate. 'It actually is now just how I want it.' Simple perfection. *CKBB*



How did you begin the project?

Because Kate enjoys entertaining regularly, the list of appliances and fittings to be included in the room was extensive: the range cooker, ovens, large fridge-freezer, two dishwashers, wine fridge, two sinks, two bin systems and lots of storage for dry goods, china and glassware. The space isn't huge, so this was quite challenging, but important, so the layout began to develop from this starting point. Two sweeps of wall and base cabinets house all the equipment, and then we built two tall cabinets at the entrance of the room to provide larder storage. The sinks are positioned on both sides of the room, making two 'working' stations with plenty of countertop, without the need for an island cramping the space.

Can you tell us about the style of the cabinetry? It is a tailored, classic design, deliberately understated and without fussy embellishment. The look is elegant and refined, and not ornate, very much in keeping with the timeless décor of the house. The subtle palette of soft ivory and taupe is warm and gentle, and the ribbed button knobs in polished nickel add a carefully considered detail.

How did you cope with the unusual room shape? Because the room widens gradually as it approaches the window, we absorbed the changes in width into the cabinetry. We added a painted ceiling infill above the cornice line to disguise the changes in ceiling height, and finished everything immaculately to ensure a precision fit.









Kitchen profile

t may look like a regular Edwardian semi-detached house on a West London street, but open the front door to Bojana and Jonathan Bellamy's home and you're in for a surprise. 'The view is straight through to the garden, as if it is completely open and there is no glass there at all, explains Bojana. The clever design with almost frameless floor-to-ceiling sliding glass doors across the rear of the property is part of a contemporary extension, recently completed by Bojana and Jonathan to share with their daughter Martha, 19, and twin sons Luke and Hugh, 17. 'When we bought the house, it had a warren of smaller rooms at the back,' says Bojana. 'In our previous home, we knocked down internal walls and added on an extension to create a wonderful, large family living space, ideal for cooking and entertaining,

and we decided to do the same again here.'



Working with architects 51% Studio, the couple readied plans to demolish the walls between the old kitchen, dining room and study, and replace the lean-to and patio with an extension. With drawings in hand, Bojana headed off to London's 'Kitchen Alley', as she explains, 'Wigmore Street is the best place to go and see a variety of showrooms with different styles and options.' I settled on Halcyon Interiors, because I liked the designs, the quality of the German-made construction, and the friendly service.'

And what was her brief to designer Louise Richardson? 'I wanted something easy to maintain and pretty indestructible, she laughs. We are a busy family and we all love to cook, so 'sturdy' was an important word. We also wanted something that would be neutral, clean-lined and clutter-free with lots of storage.'

Bojana attributes the success of the kitchen to its pared-back and quiet look, which doesn't fight with the beauty of the natural light and open garden views. 'It fits perfectly into this modern space and creates a simple backdrop to our busy lives,' she says. 'We all love its minimalist look, perhaps because it is such a contrast to the exuberance of our family, and because it is such a calm and welcoming place to be. *eKBB*

How did you begin the

project? Working from the architect's plans, I was able to design a Z-shaped layout, with the tall cabinets leading round to the sink run and then flowing around the corner to the dining area. That simple corner turn adds gentle interest, and links the different zones of the room. The wall cabinets are balanced by a large island, which completes the main preparation and serving area, including a section of overhanging worktop to make space for bar stools.

Can you tell us about the colours and materials?

The scheme is neutral and soft, to create a calm setting that allows the spectacular views of the garden to stand out. The Cashmere colour isn't magnolia, nor grey, but a soft taupe tone that it sometimes called 'greige' as it's a cross between beige and grey. Interest comes from the subtle contrast of materials: the matt laminate cabinet doors, the glossy glass wall units and the satin sheen of the quartz worktops and upstands. The added bonus

here is that they are all very easy to clean and stand up well to the demands made of a well-used family kitchen.

How did you design the tall cabinets? This is the main storage and appliance housing zone, so it is recessed into the wall to ensure that it doesn't dominate the room. The white 'frame' accentuates the linear, sleek, flat look of the design, and is in keeping with the quiet and timeless look that Bojana and Jonathan wanted. They are also extremely practical.



or Nicky and Tim Warren creating their dream kitchen meant knocking down the entire back portion of their 1930s detached house in Surrey. After the dramatic extension was built they were then left with a vast 70 metre space to play with. With a room this large, the kitchen naturally focused itself around a central island. 'We also knew we wanted to be looking out onto the garden while cooking, with the larder cupboards, fridge and ovens situated behind us,' says Nicky.

Although the layout was quite clear in their minds, Nicky and Tim were grateful for input from designer Matthew Carey at Harvey Jones. 'We researched a lot of kitchen companies but chose Harvey Jones after seeing one of their kitchens at a friend's house,' says Nicky. 'I was very impressed by the quality and although the Shaker style my friend had was more traditional than I wanted, the company's Linea design was just perfect. It is modern without being glossy, which was a look I knew wouldn't date.'

One of Matthew's most valuable suggestions was a change in the configuration of the seating around the island. 'We originally planned to have the bar stools all in a row but Matthew persuaded us that positioning them around a corner would be more congenial. We're so pleased we took his advice as it's made the island a real hub for the family. More often than not we eat dinner there with our two daughters, Eloise and Amélie. We have to force ourselves to use the dining table for Sunday lunch otherwise it would never get used!'

Having chosen a bespoke painted kitchen the possibilities for colour were endless but the couple decided to keep it simple with pure white. I originally wanted grey but had second thoughts, fearing that such a big room might end up looking like an airport hangar. Choosing white also freed us up in our colour choices for other elements in the room. We went for a soft tone for the walls and added splashes of red with details such as the light cables and dining chairs,' explains Nicky. The walnut worktop on the island and antique French dining table also add warmth and a sense of character to the room, allowing the white to be fresh and contemporary without seeming clinical.

Nicky was particularly excited about cooking with quality appliances, having spent previous years wedging the oven shut with a spatula! 'We didn't do anything about it as we knew we were going to change the kitchen, laughs Nicky. I love my Neff FlexInduction hob and steam oven, and also the warming drawer, which Tim insisted on. Being Irish he hates cold plates but I also find it really useful for keeping the children's dinner warm. To my surprise it's turned out to be one of my favourite things about the kitchen, along with my wine cooler... and the fridge... and the island. In fact I think it's fair to say I love everything! There honestly isn't a single thing I would change. **CKBB**

How did you plan the layout for Nicky and Tim's

kitchen? For contemporary kitchens I always try to keep the layout as simple as possible and keep the lines clean. In Nicky and Tim's kitchen this meant keeping all the tall units together in an unbroken line along one wall. As these contained the ovens, fridge and larders it made sense to place the hob on the island facing them to create a good work triangle.

What are the ingredients for the perfect island?

In order to make the kitchen

functional most people need to place either the sink or hob on the island. I always recommend positioning the hob here as it's when you're cooking, at the beginning of the evening, that you want to be social. You end the evening at the sink, clearing up, so being at the centre of the room is less important when you are in winding down mode. People will always naturally congregate around an island so we always include seating if we can. Try to avoid arranging your island in a straight line if you can, as this sometimes can give the feeling you are sitting at a bar.

What tops your must-have appliance list? Hove

FlexInduction hobs. A lot of people still prefer gas but it's just a mindset. Induction hobs are actually more responsive than gas as well as being safer, more energy efficient and easier to clean. The new Flex technology also means you have a wonderfully flexible cooking surface as it will adjust according to the size of the pan. When you pull a roasting tin out of the oven to make gravy on the hob, for instance, there will be even heat distribution across the entire underside of the tin.

Designer Emma Sims-Hilditch created a stunning family kitchen from scratch in a beautiful new-build in the countryside

hen Emma Sims-Hilditch was approached to design the entire interior of a brand new, breathtakingly beautiful family home in Hertfordshire, she jumped at the chance. Opportunities like this don't come along very often and, with this completely blank canvas and the chance to create balance throughout the whole property from the ground up, it was a dream project for her. Emma and her team worked closely with the architect to ensure they reflected the lifestyle of the family who were to live here, and this stunning kitchen was just one of the rooms (including a gymnasium, games room and cinema) that they created.

Emma's challenge was to achieve a mix of comfort and refined beauty, for a practical kitchen that looks good and feels good - she wanted to create something that was neither a pastiche of a bygone era nor too modern or hard edged. This room is all about a calm, sophisticated feel, so lighting was key to the design. Rows of pendants in uniform style blend visually to balance the scheme, while offering options of bright, task lighting or soft mood lighting. Symmetry plays an important part here, bringing units, furniture, lighting and appliances together and Emma chose extras, such as a built-in wine fridge and warming drawer to make the room work hard for this family. With warm wooden tones, meticulous accents and a palette that mixes bold and muted tones throughout, the end result is an up-to-date interior that is modern yet timeless in its appeal. *CKBB*

What is your favourite part of the kitchen that you've designed?

well-designed utility room can act as second in command to the kitchen. It can be thought of as a separate area for doing the family laundry, cleaning muddy children's boots and even providing a cosy sleeping space for the family pet.

On a practical level, it's important to plan the layout carefully, just as you would the kitchen. Think about what you want to use the space for and how much storage you need. 'Consider power points and plumbing for the washing machine and tumble dryer,' adds Robert Burnett, head of design at Holloways of Ludlow. 'Also, invest in a large sink for hand washing and cleaning footwear. A drying cabinet or rack, perhaps hung from the ceiling with a pulley if there is sufficient space, and a tall cabinet is useful for storing an ironing board and vacuum cleaner.'

If space is tight, use walls for storage and a stacking kit to house your appliances. Where there's room, consider having separate wet and dry zones - imagine an area with a butler sink and washing machine with tumble dryer on one side with a linen cupboard and plenty of open or closed storage and workspace on the other.

The perfect utility room should feature fully integrated appliances for a seamless finish and plenty of low-level storage for the multitude of shoes and boots that feature in many family households,' says Andrew Hall, managing director and chief designer at Woodstock Furniture. 'Wall cabinets are also useful for hiding away smaller items such as boot polish, shoe brushes and washing powder, as well as other household sundry.'

Remember that while you can buy standard sizes, bespoke designs allow you to be creative and achieve the perfect utility to suit your needs. A designer can work with existing architectural features, as well as create distinct features for a personal touch.

Style-wise, designer Charlie Kingham says that this often neglected and obscure room can very easily become your little hidden gem. 'We can transform even the most messy of areas with the addition of a Belfast sink, bridge taps, a raw oak top, cast iron bracketed shelves and the simplest of cornices. Although it is nice to have some cohesion running through the two rooms, it's also a great moment to create some contrast or potentially go a little bolder in the design or finishing touches. **eKBB**

EXPERT ADVICE

- Appliances, supplies, storage, work surfaces ensuring that these four elements are arranged in close proximity, not more than a step or two away from one another, will provide the basis for a great utility room design.
- A utility room is usually intended primarily as a laundry room, so it makes sense to first install plumbed items. Utility sinks are designed for jobs that don't quite belong in the kitchen, so an oversized, deep sink that can cope with all those muddy wellies and major cleaning jobs is a must.
- Built-in storage is a great idea to make the most of the space available. Ensure there is ample storage in tall cupboards for vacuum cleaners and mops, with space to tuck away laundry baskets under worktops.
- You may also want to consider installing built-in ironing boards, clothes airers and retractable washing lines, as well as storage for boots, shoes and any pet supplies. In terms of style, we are seeing a move towards simple design, classic lines as well as a neutral palette.

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


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

Where did you grow up and how has your childhood influenced your work?

I grew up in Eastbourne, in East Sussex. I'm one of five children so we were always out of the house, looking for adventure. We would often build camps and ride bikes on the South Downs and that landscape has always had a lasting impression on me. When I visit family down there it feels like going on holiday.

Who or what would you say inspired you to start illustrating and designing? I found myself always drawing from a very young age. I enjoyed sketching animals and wildlife because I was slightly obsessed with it. I was a perfectionist to the littlest detail, which

is something that I now see as a great

benefit to the things I create. I always wanted to make beautiful imagery.

Can you tell us how important colour is in your work? It's very important, although working with salvage materials, this is often dictated by the inherent colour of the piece. In print, it's a matter of trial and error for me and I do a lot of sampling to get the combinations right. Printing to order also allows the flexibility to be experimental.

Do you have a favourite design?

The Astoria coffee table because it uses innovative print processes with heritage salvaged iroko hardwood. This piece applies my craft ideology with technology to create a contemporary outcome.

What do you hope that your designs bring to other people's homes? I like to think they bring something unique and create a talking point. I hope that

Can you describe your studio and its location to us? My studio is based at Blackhorse Workshops near Walthamstow, East London. I have a large workshop space within a converted warehouse, which holds all of my printing equipment, Downstairs, I have open access to metalworking and woodworking facilities. The studio complex houses a range of designers and makers from different disciplines and so has become a melting pot of creativity, with makers sharing tips and skills with each other.

What materials did you start working with and how have you progressed your work? I started off as a screen printer, mainly printing onto wallpaper and fabric, but have now diversified over the years to include materials such as stone, wood and glass for making mirrors. I've been able to do this by embracing non-traditional processes; I'm always drawn to new approaches in craft.

What do you enjoy most about working with salvaged materials? The diversity within the material and the time-worn patina are very interesting, as is finding out about the history of each - where it has come from and what it was used for.

Do you have any favourite artists or architects and if so, what is it that you like about their work? At the moment I'm into Frank Lloyd Wright, specifically the colour pencil drawings he produced that were developed into textiles.

my designs are aesthetically pleasing but also conversational and engaging.

Can you tell us about the story behind your slate tile designs? The designs are part of my Perivale collection, named after the Hoover Building which was designed by architects Wallis, Gilbert & Partners, in London's Perivale. So my influence came from the Art Deco era.

Has anywhere you've travelled in the world influenced your work, and why? When I travel I am always inspired. We took a trip to Nicaragua in Central America and loved the colourful handpainted, wooden masks and the encaustic tile work produced in the region. The Guatemalan woven fabric was beautiful.

What do you consider to be your favourite part of your job? It would have to be working out something new, whether it is a pattern or a process, or making a new material work really well aesthetically. These are the daily design challenges which I enjoy.

Are you working on any new designs or exciting projects that you can share? We'll be launching a screen printed geometric wallpaper called Onyx Skyline, some Welsh slate tiles and the Astoria coffee table at Decorex International design show (20th-23rd September). We've been busy making some sample pieces, so it's all very exciting for us at the moment. **CKBB** danielheath.co.uk

rom wood, stone, leather and terracotta, there are so many natural materials that have long been used in kitchens, and never before has it been more fashionable to do so. In a move away from white gloss finishes, the look that is most coveted now is in fact handcrafted, the appeal of a natural kitchen being in its warm earthy tones, organic shapes and rustic textures.

Not only is this style easy on the eye, it's also adaptable and full of character, adding a softer and more lived-in edge to contemporary spaces.

One of the most attractive and practical materials is wood, as it can be used on large surfaces from walls and floors to countertops and furniture. 'A good designer and maker can meet almost any needs using wood. It's versatile, beautiful and, in the case of American hardwood, sustainable and abundant', says David Venables, European director of the American Hardwood Export Council. Here in Britain too there's an exciting new generation of designer-makers who are experimenting and challenging our preconceptions of what can be achieved with various sustainably sourced woods such as ash, beech and oak.

Rustic and natural materials are also being used for lighting which is an important consideration right from the get-go when planning a kitchen. If you look around you'll see there are many interesting designs to choose from. Mark Holloway of Holloways of Ludlow explains, 'Wood has always been used to manufacture lighting but in recent years thin veneers and bold designs have transformed the wooden pendant into something of sculptural beauty. Other materials such as concrete and hand-blown glass are also very popular as each piece is essentially a one-off, giving a project true individuality.'

In essence, kitchens of this kind are all about tactility, for example the patina of marble, aged metals such as bronze and also knots in wood, all add unique personality. These are all materials and finishes that we can live and grow with, and although they may take some upkeep they can usually withstand tough use.

We're looking at the future of kitchens here, with ideas and designs that are being built to last and are considerate to the environment. And if our attitudes continue to shift towards a 'reuse and recycle' and 'waste not, want not' ethic then one of the most exciting things that we could be doing is creating kitchens that will be passed on for generations to come. *eKBB*

Can you tell us about your collaboration with deVOL and describe the kitchen in terms of materials and its function? The

collaboration came about through passionately held and shared values. The design was truly created in partnership, using the tendencies of the material to lead the construction of each piece. This kitchen is full of texture; woven panels, subtle band-sawn timber and neatly panelled drawer fronts. The whole kitchen is designed to look like it breathes. Together we've created something that feels clean, simple and light.

As a designer, how important do you believe the use of natural materials is in the home? I think it's hugely important. Wood is such a timeless, warm and tactile material. I believe it connects us with nature

and gives us a real sense of

place. It's so important to use

unacknowledged hardwoods

within our homes so that we can appreciate the beauty of our home-grown timbers. With the deVOL kitchen in particular our mission was to return English beech to it's rightful place in the kitchen, where it has been used traditionally for years and years.

What are the main advantages of choosing sustainable materials?

There are no disadvantages from choosing sustainable materials! As designers it's our duty to make products with as little impact on the environment as possible.

What special quality do you think wood brings to a modern day kitchen?

Wood adds subtle yet luxurious detail and intrigue. It also brings timeless style. While other materials can come in and out of vogue, wood will always be beautiful. In fact, the more you use it, live with it, wear it in, the more beautiful it becomes

- If you want to start introducing natural materials into your kitchen, a stone floor is a great choice. It provides a practical addition that's easy to look after and one which won't date.
- In terms of what's on-trend for flooring, textured surfaces are still sought after but there's a move towards square-edge stones with a honed finish. When it comes to colour, blue and grey shades popular, as are beige and creams. On the walls, glazed wall tiles and glass are very popular, as they're practical and easy to clean.

MY FAVOURITE KITCHEN APPLIANCE

Rosie BIRKETT

Food writer and stylist Rosie enthuses about her debut cookery book and travel inspirations

FEATURE LUCY MACDONALD

You have just released your first cookbook, A Lot On Her Plate. What can people expect from it? I wanted to create a really vibrant and inspiring book that would get people excited about cooking for themselves at home, and would show them that it doesn't have to cost a fortune or be super difficult to cook interesting, exciting dishes. I hope I have put together something that encourages people to think a bit more intelligently about food and where their ingredients are coming from, as that's where a lot of people can go wrong.

Your journalist parents inspired your love of writing and cooking, what dishes bring back childhood memories for you? My whole interest in food came from how I grew up and the fact that food has always been really central to my family. My mum was the cook in the family and the cherry brûlée was something she made a lot for Sunday lunches with friends and family, but my dad had certain signature dishes, such as the seafood sizzle, which he used to get very excited about making.

Travelling has also influenced recipes in your book. Where in the world would you say has amazing food? I think that food and travel are very comfortable bedfellows and when I travel anywhere I want to know what people are eating there because I feel like food is a key to unlocking the culture and the workings of a place. You can get to the heart of somewhere by understanding and enjoying its food. One of the most inspiring places that I've been to is Vietnam. The Vietnamese know how to balance different but amazing flavours and textures all in one mouthful.

What are your favourite ingredients and why? I must have eggs in the house, because to me eggs are a meal in a shell. I also always have herbs in the fridge, things like fresh flat leafed parsley, coriander or tarragon because you can use them to liven up a dish. They are affordable and bring so much flavour and freshness.

What appliances do you use the most? For blitzing up things in a hurry, my Cuisinart Mini Chopper is so easy to use. I use it for whizzing up nuts for a stir fry, herbs for a salsa or to chop up lots of garlic. Another is my KitchenAid. It's a piece of kit that just completely changes what you can do, it's like having an extra pair of hands.

What's your kitchen like at home? When I wrote the book I was in a one bedroom flat with a tiny kitchen, which was a challenge but it did show that you don't need a big fancy kitchen to make amazing food. My kitchen now is really modern and light, it has a glass ceiling, so it's almost like an atrium, which is great for taking beautiful photos! I wanted to get an island but it was too expensive so I bought a stainless steel, second-hand catering cabinet. It's another surface to work on so that's where I do most of my prep. I've also got an antique ercol dining table and eight chairs that I bought from eBay, which we are restoring.

Have you got any exciting news coming up? I'm working on my YouTube channel. I'll be cooking recipes from the book but also doing some food documentaries, which will be short, interesting pieces about food producers, chefs and insightful food content. **CKBB** alotonherplate.com

p until now beautiful oak sideboards, plush button-backed pouffes and luxurious long-pile rugs are furnishings that belonged in the living room and bedroom. But the style barometer is shifting, and today's bathroom is now also home to all of these warm and luxe decorative features, (yes, even the rug) as well as the more functional bath, basin and shower kit.

It's all down to the changing role of the bathroom, according to the interior cognoscenti, which has embraced an opulent and decadent ambience to become a place for pampering, relaxing and getting ready for the day. Yes, it's time to welcome in the new bathroom/dressing room, a sumptuous, multi-use zone where we are spending more time than ever before.

'Our clients are spending longer in their bathrooms,' explains Dan Cook, designer at C.P. Hart. 'It has become a space in which to indulge and luxuriate. The bathroom area has now evolved into an extension of the bedroom which means new designs and finishes are on the market to reflect that.'

The new-look bathroom offers a warm, welcoming vibe, packed with feel-good textures to envelop the user - think smooth stone basins, tactile wall tiles, soft rugs and velvet matt lacquers. Bold, bright colours are replaced with a palette of crisp white, rich timber, classic marble and just a hint of on-trend gold, creating the perfect neutral backdrop that can be accented with colours and fabrics to echo the boudoir.

Think of experimenting with a mix of focused and task lighting (minus any glare and shadow), for getting ready and general, ambient lights for creating the mood that you want.

Work out how much storage you need and incorporate wide drawers, neat racking and open shelves for keeping lotions and potions in order; you can decant products into old perfume bottles to get the look. In larger spaces, consider a vintage-style armoire for stacking piles of clean, fluffy towels or commission a bespoke wall of cupboards for hanging clothes and shoes.

For that decadent touch, how about an old-fashioned chaise longue, a twinkly chandelier overhead or even a real, working fireplace? These are all ideas hitting bathroom interiors now.

The bathroom is a focal room for relaxation and well-being, so creating a calm environment is essential when getting ready, explains Kelly-Jane Everest of Grohe UK. 'Prepare for the day ahead with luxurious showers and elegant bath mixers and extra features such as lighting and music which can be generated through some shower systems. A sanitary system with a quiet flush and odour extraction feature will also ensure the air in your bathroom is fresh and noises are kept to a whisper.' *eKBB*



Large, decadent vanity units that function as a dressing area for beauty treatments are also key and work as an extension of the master bedroom.

- Lighting is key: spotlights in recesses, marker lights around a bath and decorative lighting can enhance a relaxed and indulgent aura. Consider a wash of coloured lighting under a bath or vintage-style wall lamps either side of a vanity basin (but do make sure they all comply with the IP ratings that regulate the use of lights in the bathroom).
- Illuminated mirrors and cabinets around the dressing area offer 360° views with a dash of old-school, dressing room glamour.
- Freshly laundered, pure white towel and robes create a spa-like mood and keep your space feeling serene. Include a big wicker basket where dirty laundry can be thrown, rather than left to clutter the floor.
- Upholstered, buttoned stools or pouffes in silver, lavender or jet black velvet will add a homely touch.
 Echo the colours and fabrics in your bedroom for a calm, harmonious vibe.
- Splash out on beautifully packaged and sweet smelling toiletries and line up on glass shelves or in a glassfronted cupboard. Stash cotton wool balls and soaps in vintage jars.
- Try warmer, softer finishes for brassware such as matt gold, brushed nickel, rose gold and brass.

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

odern life can be hectic to say the least and a welldesigned bathroom can be just the antidote, allowing you to relax and unwind in the ultimate tranquil haven. That must have surely been on the mind of interior


designer Catherine Smith when she designed this well-appointed, light-flooded bathroom space in one of Brighton's most prestigious townhouses. As she says, 'Originally the bathroom was very basic with cold pale blue walls and some Victorian-style sanitaryware. The space was unloved and it had been unsympathetically converted previously.'

Having worked with the owners across the whole property, Catherine intuitively understood the couple's design aesthetic so approaching the bathroom was a simple extension of the rest of the home's style. 'The property renovation took just over a year and the bathroom was very much at the forefront of the owner's minds,' says Catherine. 'They wanted a luxurious but practical bathing space that was timeless and had a nod

to the 1930s.' This came in the form of interesting material combinations, from Calacatta honed marble flooring complete with underfloor heating to bespoke sprayed brass splashbacks. A similar look is echoed in the use of an elegant cut crystal and brass pendant light, strategically placed over a contemporary freestanding bathtub that becomes the focal point of this room, thanks to some clever use of bright, eye-catching Cole & Son wallpaper. All this is complemented with a palette of gentle neutrals offset against splashes of teal and brass and a generous light-flooded window. 'It really is the perfect mix of comfort and design,' says Catherine. 'It's important in any space to add layers of interest, using a clean backdrop and then building on tactile materials that add warmth and texture as well as some interesting fixtures and fittings.'

Plus, there's impressively very little clutter in the bathroom, thanks to storage. From mirrored, recessed, wall-mounted cupboards and niches in the shower enclosure, everything is concealed behind closed doors for a streamlined finish. With the shower enclosure neatly tucked away, along with vanity unit, basins and toilet, it allows the capacious bathroom, in all its glory, to take centre stage. And what a stage it is. *CKBB*

The owners opted for a similarly arresting wallpaper in the kitchen so I carried this aesthetic over into their bathing space. It really lifts the room and gives it a modern character to an otherwise very timeless space. And contrary to popular belief, wallpaper can be a practical solution in the bathroom just opt for a matt sealant and you can enjoy it for years to come.

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
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


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

'Happy Chic' author, Jonathan Adler has developed his interior design business to become a lifestyle brand. Here are his stylish insights...

INTERVIEW SUSAN SPRINGATE | PORTRAIT TODD TANKERSLEY

It's hard to believe that Jonathan Adler started his career as a potter. Giving the wheel a spin for the first time at summer camp aged 12, he secured his first commission from Barney's in New York with his début collection of ceramics. As an interior designer he has judged Bravo TV's Top Design show, written several books and designed high profile restaurants and hotels. He has since become a self-styled lifestyle brand and now creates everything from furniture and lighting to rugs and handbags, housewares and textiles. He lives between an apartment in New York and a beach house on Shelter Island with his husband Simon Doonan and their dog, Liberace.

Any tips on bringing colour in to the home? Start with a bold rug and you won't look back. Red, white and blue is a chic and 'always' combination.

Is beige dead? What will take its place? Beige is so... beige. Grev is the new neutral, and the perfect foil for colour.

How about adding personality to a kitchen? Think beyond countertops. I love my new collection with Formica Laminate, which includes a malachite pattern that is a pared down, modern take on stone. It's fabulous on cabinets, and it rocks as a splashback.

Anything for the bathroom? Everyone loves a hotel bathroom, so luxe up your loo and make it as hotel-like as possible. Stacks of thirsty towels, graphic shower curtains and a vase of flowers will make your morning routine anything but.

Can pottery tiles be used beyond the bathroom and kitchen? I'm first and foremost a potter, so I think nearly every surface could use a soupcon of ceramic. One of the walls in the living room at

my beach house is covered with tiles I designed, inspired by the drawings of Eva Hesse. Use it like you would wallpaper.

Is pottery still your first love? Yes. The pottery studio is where I work out all my ideas and influences everything else.

Did your parents inspire your work? I was so lucky to have the parents I had. My dad was a lawyer who spent every spare moment creating brilliant art. My mum's ebullience and sense of colour continues to inspire me to this day.

Describe your home in New York?

My New York apartment is in a pre-war building in Greenwich Village. The living room and dining room have doubleheight ceilings, and the living room even has a little Juliet balcony that looks down from our dressing room. It's grand and full of my stuff and it makes my morning oatmeal feel civilised and sophisticated.

Do you have any ideas for open-plan spaces? Different level changes create areas within the space that feel private and separate; a conversation pit encourages guests to spill their secrets. Screens are a decorator's best friend - put one in an awkward corner, or use them to create rooms. Rugs help create nooks and crannies that are pleasing, too.

You advocate filling one's surroundings with things you love, but are there any guidelines to making it harmonise? It will harmonise because it's all stuff you love and stuff that is selected through your specific lens and in your own personal taste. If you love it, it will work.

What's your number one design tip? Always buy a chandelier bigger than you need and more expensive than you can afford. eKBB uk.jonathanadler.com


