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A Advanced Courses, Seminars and Symposia

Advanced Courses and Seminars are English language educational events with an intermediate level of complexity corresponding to the specific educational needs in a particular medical area. These are the most traditional ESO educational events and still remain a pillar of our programme. However, CME (Continuous Medical Education) is increasingly becoming compulsory in the European Union Member states and in the other European countries: many high level and good quality courses in cancer medicine are currently being organised and we feel at ESO that we should now focus on neglected topics or on under-served areas. For this reason we have increased our effort in the region of the Balkans in 2009 and we will start working in Eurasia, especially Kazakhstan, Azerbaijan and Uzbekistan.

We believe that every cancer patient deserves knowledgeable doctors and nurses, and that every doctor and nurse deserves good quality training and honest updating.

B Best Cancer Reporter Award

The Best Cancer Reporter Award is an independent initiative of ESO that is funded by private donors. The School established the Award in 2006 to acknowledge excellence in cancer journalism. Good cancer journalism helps people understand the experience of cancer patients, and that their chances of surviving with quality of life improve dramatically if cancer services are effective, from early detection to treatment, rehabilitation and long-term support. High quality cancer journalism conveys important messages to the general public that cancer is not always a death sentence, early diagnosis saves lives, access to optimal treatment improves outcomes, and that life does not stop because you have cancer.

By establishing the Best Cancer Reporter Award ESO hopes to promote intelligent and critical coverage of cancer and acknowledge the many examples of excellence in reporting cancer by journalists across Europe.

The Best Cancer Reporter Award winner receives a cash prize of € 10,000 plus an all expenses paid trip to attend the Award Ceremony at a key cancer conference. There is also one runner-up prize of € 5000. An article written by winning journalists will be published in ESO's CancerWorld magazine.

D Database

ESO is developing its database directory of selected winners of its clinical fellowship scheme. The printed and online version will be launched during 2011, celebrating the tenth anniversary of the Masterclass in Clinical Oncology.

The general ESO Fellowship fund is supported by private donations and it is uniquely dedicated to clinical education in cancer medicine. As specifically requested by the donors these fellowships cannot be granted to basic research.

The Clinical Masterclass Fellowship fund is supported by the annual contribution of the ESO Industrial Sustaining Members (See S – Sharing Progress in Cancer Care programme) who have in such a way often made an incredible difference in the professional life of these young doctors who are now definitely expected to be among tomorrow's opinion leaders in oncology.

E e-ESO

In an effort to provide the most comprehensive educational programme, ESO has expanded its traditional face-to-face programme through an expanding e-grandround programme .

e-grandrounds are online meetings held weekly. The live session (Thursdays, 18:15 CET) allows the highest level of interaction between the participant, the expert and the discussant, whilst further participants can join the recorded session which remains available for 6 months. CME accredited is granted by ACOE, PRA and within the ESMO-MORA programme.

The e-grandround programme is held without commercial sponsorship and in collaboration with Nature Reviews Clinical Oncology.

Furthermore, the monthly online e-oncoreviews will start late 2010 in collaboration with the Sustaining Members of the School.

K Kazakhstan, Azerbaijan, Uzbekistan

Launched in 2008, the Caspian Sea Programme represents a new challenging initiative from ESO that aims to create a specific programme for those countries that are between Europe and Asia, in particular Kazakhstan, Azerbaijan and Uzbekistan. In these areas particular care will be given to the selection of priorities that correspond to the specific need of each of the countries and of the societies involved.

The main aim is to focus and to organise teaching educational courses on one type of cancer which is considered a priority issue for the population of each country, and to try to gather participants from all these countries in order to get the attention of a variety of medical communities including specialised doctors, nurses, as well as hospital managers and administrators.

An investment in organising educational activities that takes into consideration epidemiology, prevention and treatment can strongly reduce mortality in cancer and cancer related diseases.

The Caspian Sea Programme intends to be a centre of diffusion for the expertise and latest knowledge in the field of cancer prevention and cure throughout the Eurasian countries, developing a web of scientific relationships and collaborations between cancer specialists in Europe and Asian countries.

L Learning to Care

The European School of Oncology was founded by Umberto Veronesi and Laudomia Del Drago in 1982 with the aim of contributing to the reduction of deaths from cancer due to late diagnosis and/or inadequate treatment. ESO's mission is reflected in its motto "Learning to Care", which stresses the concept of studying and learning and also of caring for the patient in a global sense. ESO shortens the length of time needed to transfer knowledge from research centres to daily practice, combining advanced technology with humanism in care.

"Learning to Care" is the motto of the European School of Oncology, reflecting its focus on the importance of the learning process and on the clinical aspects of the cancer problem. ESO promotes a holistic approach to the cancer patient, which makes care, not simply treatment, the ultimate goal and of paramount importance in ESO's commitment to improving the oncology skills of health professionals.

M Masterclass

Masterclasses are one-week, full-immersion courses, where participants and faculty have direct contact with each other. These courses are designed for those who are defining and orientating their professional careers.

There are two main characteristics of these educational events. The first is the extraordinary cohesion of the faculty, which has developed a consistent programme after many years of working together. The other is the fact that admission to the ESO Masterclasses is by competitive selection based on the candidate's CV, his/her clinical experience and level of support from his/her mentor.

ESO Masterclasses are also the key educational event of collaboration between the School and the main European scientific societies. The Masterclass in Radiation Oncology is organised with ESTRO, the Masterclass in paediatric oncology with SIOP-Europe, the Masterclass in oncology nursing with EONS, the Masterclass on surgery with ESSO and the Masterclass in Clinical Oncology with ESMO.
