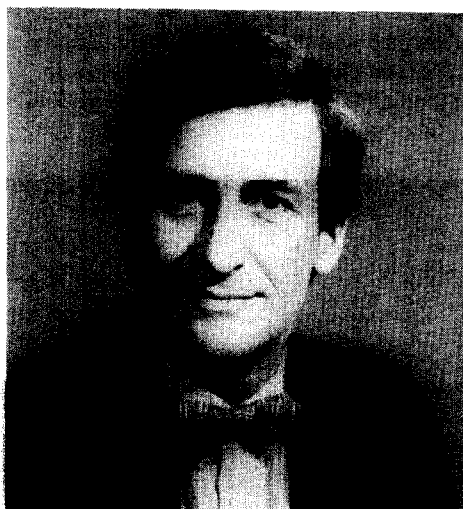

He is deputy Chairman of the Imperial Cancer Research Fund and in 1989 was President of the 5th European Conference on Clinical Oncology (ECCO 5) in London. From 1974 to 1986 he was Professor of Radiotherapy, Institute of Cancer Research and Royal Marsden Hospital.



Matti Aapro

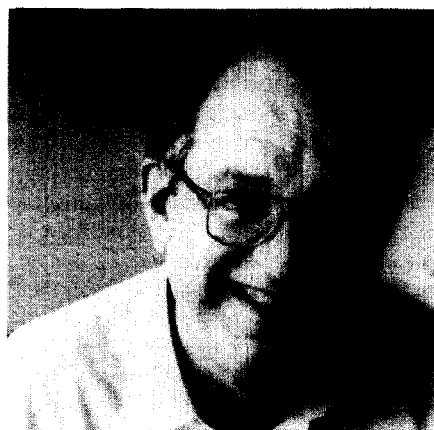
THE EDITORS

Matti Aapro is Chef de Clinique and Head of the Cell Culture Laboratory in the Division of Oncology, University Hospital of Geneva. He was formerly a fellow in haematology and oncology at the University of Arizona Health Sciences Center, Tucson and since 1985 has been Chairman of the Clonogenic Assay Screening Study Group of the EORTC. Since 1988 he has been Chairman of the Melanoma Group of the Swiss Association for Clinical Cancer Research (SAKK).

Peter Boyle is the Head of the SEARCH Programme at the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) in Lyon and Senior Scientist in the Unit of Analytical Epidemiology at the IARC. He was formerly Assistant Professor in the Department of Biostatistics and Epidemiology at the Harvard School of Public Health and at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston. He is Chairman of the Epidemiology and Prevention Branch of the European Society of Mastology, Secretary of the Prevention Branch of the EORTC.



Werner Franke

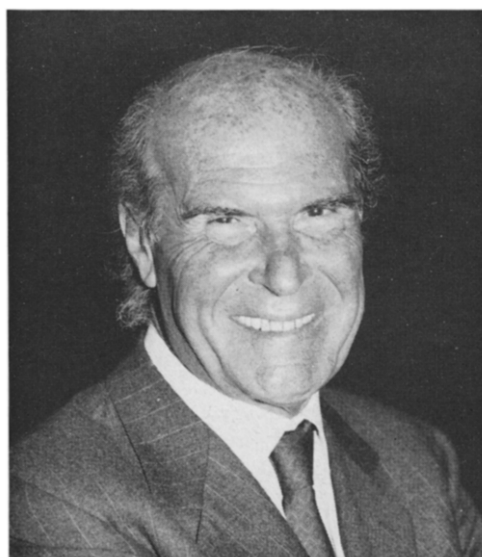
Werner Franke is Head of the Research Division at the German Cancer Research Centre in Heidelberg and acting Director of the Institute of Cell and Tumour Biology at the Centre. He is Vice-President of the International Federation of Cell Biology and President of the European Cell Biology Organization. From 1985 to 1987 he was President of the International Society of Differentiation. In 1988 he was Secretary General of the European Molecular Biology Conference.



Emmanuel Van der Schueren

Umberto Veronesi is Director of the National Cancer Institute in Milan, founder and Chairman of the European School of Oncology and founding President of the European Society of Surgical Oncology. As past President of the European Organization for Research and Treatment of Cancer (EORTC) he established four distinct branches covering epidemiology and prevention, treatment, basic research and education. He was instrumental in instituting and organizing the first Conference for Clinical Oncologists in Europe and is President of ECCO 6 which will take place in Florence in 1991.

Emmanuel Van der Schueren is Head of the Department of Radiotherapy and Professor of Oncology at the University of Leuven. He is President of the European Society of Therapeutic Radiology and Oncology (ESTRO), and Executive Secretary of the Federation of European Cancer Societies. He was founding Secretary of ESTRO, founding President of the Belgian Society for Radiotherapy and founding Editor-in-Chief of the Journal *Radiotherapy and Oncology*. He is a member of the Council and Board of the EORTC and Chairman of the EORTC Treatment Branch.

Comments and Critique

A New Journal from a New Europe

UNTIL the first European Conference of Clinical Oncology (ECCO) in 1981 there was no common European forum for clinicians and scientists to present and discuss original research findings. In September 1989, 3600 oncologists and scientists attended ECCO 5 in London for a four day programme which amply demonstrated the vigour and productivity of European cancer research ranging from basic to clinical research, including newer areas such as psychosocial oncology and important practical issues such as trial methodology and data analysis.

The integration of the major European Cancer Societies in the Federation of European Cancer Societies, the success of the European Organization for Research and Treatment of Cancer (EORTC), restructured into four divisions under the Presidency of Umberto Veronesi, the expanding and successful programmes of the European School of Oncology and the creation of the *European Journal of Cancer and Clinical Oncology*, all contributed to the remarkable momentum generated by the ECCO meetings and laid the foundation for the creation of the new *European Journal of Cancer*.

The EJC appears at a time of unprecedented change in Europe, with, for the first time since the Second World War, the real prospect of developing common programmes between east and west in medical research and health care. The new Journal also appears at a time of unprecedented change in medical research. The aim of the editors is to produce a high quality Journal which offers prompt publication of new and original data and which links basic science with oncology in its broadest aspects. The thrust and ambitions of the Journal are demonstrated by the impressive range of expertise covered by the Senior Advisors, Consulting Editors, Corresponding Editors, Society and News Editors.
