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

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

Unless you're Benjamin Button, getting older and changing is one thing that's guaranteed in life. At least these days we have access to aesthetic help and a better awareness of what's good for our body and what isn't, both of which should help to slow the ageing process. In the time of King Henry VIII, though, no one seemed to live very long – and gout seemed to be a big issue. If disease or childbirth didn't kill you, you were lucky to last into your 50s. Even if you were wealthy, you would have consumed large amounts of red meat - vegetables were seen as the food of the poor.

The upside of a lack of clean water back in those days was that you could drink alcohol all day long without feeling guilty, which holds some appeal and might have helped dull the aches and pains – for a few years at least!

We're not suggesting that you follow this route, but we do have some great wine and dine recommendations, along with cool rooftop places and top Italian dining experiences (from p161). As for slowing the ageing process, our Beauty section (from p235) and Health & Fitness section (p245) both contain plenty of tips, products and expert opinions to assist you on that front.

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

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



hen I arrive at Namita and Pranay's apartment, the front door is wide open, helping to direct the breeze from the lift lobby through to the large, open-plan living-dining space and out across the balcony. The couple's son Shivum is fast asleep on the sofa; it's been a tough week for him, having only recently undergone a tonsillectomy and adenoidectomy, so it's no surprise he's taking an afternoon snooze. Tentatively starting up a conversation with Namita, I hope not to wake up the recovering patient, but Namita is soon talking animatedly about her recently published children's book, The Magic Spicebox, as well as the many other pies she seems to have her fingers in, including the recent purchase and renovation of their home by the river.

New York to Singapore

Namita and Pranay arrived in Singapore five years ago, following a ten-year stint in New York where she worked for an advertising agency and then as a marketer for Facebook. However, the distance between herself and her mother in India began to take its toll. "I felt disconnected from family, and I really wanted to be closer to them." When a role within Facebook's Singapore office came up, she jumped at the chance.

For the first two years, the couple lived in the River Valley area, in a new and contemporary apartment. "It was tiny, but we loved it there. The location, being so close to Great World City, was super-convenient, and we love this neighbourhood. I would walk along the river when I was pregnant with Shivum, if only to get to Laurent Bernard for ice cream at the other end!"

takes pride of place, and is one of Pranay's favourite possessions. Although he's now senior vicepresident of ecommerce at SingPost. he was formerly a New York DJ, and music forms a major link between father and son. "Shivum loves music and says he wants to be a DJ too."



It also has a touch-sensitive tap in the ceramic sink and some clever storage to maximise the space. "The combination of the latest technology plus space optimisation and clever minimal storage solutions are general themes throughout my home."







When Shivum was born in March 2013 and they realised they were going to need more space, they veered towards the other end of the spectrum, deciding on an old but huge condo next to the Tanglin Club. "It suited us at the time and we also loved it, but we did miss River Valley."

Coming to the end of their next lease, and with the housing market looking more favourable for buyers, Namita and Pranay decided to start looking for a home to buy. "We started casually, but in the end I must have seen around 50 properties. When this unit came up, our realtor warned me that it was much smaller than we had anticipated and the interior was not in good shape. Although it was hard to visualise at first, there was an energy about the place when we first stepped in."

As the property was within their budget, including renovations, within 24 hours the decision to buy was made. "We know this condo is very rentable; it's so family-friendly, and the location couldn't be better. Right now it's our home – but we are always on the lookout for the next adventure."

Rivergate renovations

The couple called on the help of their friend Gaurang Khemka, who owns architecture firm URBNarc. "We didn't think he'd be interested in a residential project, as he focuses primarily on commercial work such as the gorgeous Alila Resort in Bali, but to our delight he agreed."

The condo's style is a combination of Namita, Pranay and Gaurang's creative visualisations. "My husband and I have quite different tastes: his is very visual, very creative, quite crisp, cool and modern; I'm more eclectic; and Gaurang's style is very modern, clean and Zen. We went through an intense three-month design process, with plenty of great discussions, and some disagreement on things like built-ins, concealing televisions and the choice of materials, but in the end we collaborated like crazy and ultimately trusted him. Our home looks shockingly like his original designs!"


Namita admits she researched intensively, spending over 200 hours looking into every part of the décor and design, from sending Gaurang Pinterest images



for design ideas to sourcing taps and tiles. "We were very involved; it's been a real labour of love. Pranay is the decision-maker, while I'm the researcher."

Having purchased the apartment in July last year, the family moved in in November – an impressive feat, Namita agrees, especially considering that the entire apartment was gutted and one of the four bedrooms opened up to allow for a large, open-plan living space.

Books and cooks

The couple found out that Namita was pregnant exactly a year after arriving in Singapore. "After having Shivum, I did go back to work for three months, but then I couldn't bear to be away from him. I felt like I'd put my career first for a really long time, and as my job involved a lot of travelling I struggled with being away from my baby."

She took a position with a venture capital firm for six months. "While there I met lots of founders and entrepreneurs, and that gave me a real buzz. By the time I left I'd written two business plans."

She had in fact already started up a Facebook page for The Indian Spicebox in 2009, which had gained quite a following. The idea behind it was to make Indian cooking at home accessible to everyone, by sharing recipes and ideas. Then, in November 2014, Namita launched her Spicebox set, a box packed with some of the essential spices needed for cooking Indian food at home – part of the proceeds of sales go to fund meals for street children in India. She also self-published her own cookbook, *Cooking with Indian Spicebox*, and her children's book *The Magic Spicebox* was recently published by Scholastic. Then there are her cooking classes at The Providore's cooking studio in PasarBella.

So what's next for Namita? Apart from recently becoming a regular blogger on the Huffington Post, she has her sights on publishing more books. "Another one is inevitable, to be honest; I actually have the idea already, looking at spices from around the world, and mixing food and travel, which are both huge passions of mine."

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ritish auctioneer and valuer CHRISTOPHER LANIGAN-O'KEEFFE lives and breathes antiques. Following a five-year stint in London, working for global art auction house, Christie's – and after the birth of his twin boys – he relocated to the English countryside and took a role at regional auction house Greenslade Taylor Hunt. The job, based in Somerset, had a smaller scope, but it was more handson, and it taught him another side to the antiques business.

Two years ago, Chris and his family made the move to Singapore. He's now one of the driving forces behind **HotLotz**, working with colleagues **Matthew Elton** and **Geoffrey Volpatti**. Specialising in contemporary and antique furnishings, the business runs a combination of live and online auctions. We asked Chris about the new venture, selling online, the strangest items he's valued – and how he got his nickname, "the Ferret".

How long have you been in the auctioneering and valuing business?

It's been my only career, to be honest. It was my father's career too. He worked for Christie's as well; then he had his own gallery. I grew up with that all around me, so it was quite natural for me to get into the business. I studied History of Art at university, but was always a little hesitant about following in my father's footsteps—then I realised it was actually what I wanted to do, so I went to work at Christie's as a salesroom assistant. And that was it.

So you worked your way up from the bottom?

Yeah, it's the best way to do it, actually. The Chairman when I was there had started as a porter, 25 years earlier. I worked in Christie's South Kensington for five years. When I left, I was specialising in silver in the interiors department, but I also spent a lot of time manning the valuations counter – it was just like *Antiques Roadshow*.

Tell us about the new Singapore business, HotLotz.

We wanted to create a traditional auction house for the Uber generation – traditional in what we sell, with different types of sales and different levels of sales; but we wanted to make it accessible to people who don't have a lot of time. So, they can sit in the back of a taxi on their way to work and flick through an auction catalogue on their phone – everything is just as visible online as it is in the salesroom. We have multiple images and detailed descriptions, and you can leave bids on the website – and, very soon, through the app.

How does the mix of online and offline auctions work?

We can run as many auctions at one time online as we want. We've built our own platform on the website, so it's up to us how many we put up. Our bread-and-butter, though, is a weekly interiors and antiques sale – a real home-furnishing sale. There's everything from modern dining tables to antique boxes, modern sofas, decorative items and paintings.

We hold one of these every Saturday, live in the showroom at 10am. That sale is also up and viewable online the week before, and you can place bids before the sale through the website. You put in your maximum and the computer will automatically bid for you up to that level. If no one else bids against you, you get it for the lowest price. We buy it for you as cheaply as we can, in effect.















What sort of services do you offer those who are leaving the country?

When you're moving country, or even house, there are a lot of things to deal with. Many of our clients love the fact we can go in as auctioneers, look at everything and then say, "These 50 things are interesting and have some value; these 50 things I'm afraid we can't do anything with." We help with the process of de-cluttering.

What are some of the strangest things you've found?

We've got a 1960s postcard-vending machine in the storeroom, and we sold a Victorian policeman's truncheon last week.

What advantages does an auction have over a private sale?

People who are selling things privately mightn't know what something is or how much it's worth; that's where we come in. A lot of the time, it's about identifying something and figuring out what it can fetch. Quite often, the valuable items are things people don't expect. I spent a lot of my time in the UK delving into people's attics - in fact, they used to call me "the Ferret". It's amazing what lurks in the corners of people's houses. Often, they will show you their lovely big dresser, but the Chinese vase sitting on the cabinet is worth 20 times more.

HotLotz is an auction marketplace for buying and selling contemporary or antique home furnishings and décor. It runs a live auction every Saturday at 10am (and has its own coffee shop in the hawker centre next door). If you can't make it there, check out the website to make a bid or enquire about an item. a

When Nevena and her family moved to Singapore three years ago, they were looking for a place that had its own garden and was close to the MRT system. Instead, they found themselves in a Bukit Timah cluster house, tucked away at the far end of Greenwood Avenue. They may not have their own garden, but with the newly extended Downtown Line, they do now have the MRT. She explains how the home turned out to be just the right fit.

wiss-born Nevena is no stranger to living away from her home country. She grew up as an expat child in Algiers, where she lived with her parents for 15 years, and since she met her husband, Daniel, the pair have also lived in South Africa and France. "When we got married, we knew we wanted to travel," explains Nevena, "but more than just holidays. Living as an expat means you really experience a different culture and a different life."

After three years in the north of France, they were ready for a new adventure, and when the call came to move to Singapore, they jumped at the chance. Daniel had been stationed here for a

three-month work stint about 14 years previously, and when Nevena had come to visit, she had loved the feel of it. Asia had clearly drawn them in: for their honeymoon a few years later, they travelled to Thailand, Cambodia, Malaysia and Singapore.

SETTLING IN SINGAPORE

Although they'd originally hoped to be close to an MRT station, their son goes to the Swiss School, and so Bukit Timah was a natural choice. Their other criterion, a garden, was as much for their dog Nala as it was for them; but with so much greenery in the area and both the Botanic Gardens and MacRitchie Reservoir Park nearby, Greenwood turned out to be perfect.

"It's not too far from town," says Nevena. "You have the Botanic Gardens, and Orchard and Tanglin are quite close. We take the dog to MacRitchie and Kranji. It's really in the middle." Plus, the nearby PIE motorway is convenient for her husband's commute to work.

As Nevena shows me around her home, it's clear that her creative eye is inspired by their family and the places where they've lived. "It reflects our history: where we've travelled, but also where we come from, and where we live now," she agrees. Her deep love for nature is another key element in the décor, with beaded animal statues from Africa lining the stairs, and a beautifully stylised protea print (the national flower of South Africa) adorning the sofa.

A large brass butterfly sits proudly on the doors of a Chinese-style cabinet that is one of the few pieces they've bought in Singapore. "We saw something similar on our honeymoon in Malaysia," she tells me. When they found this one in a furniture shop in Dempsey, they just had to have it.

The open kitchen, dining room and living room form the heart of the house. A colour scheme of orange, beige and green gives a warm, comfortable

feeling and the walls and surfaces are chock-full of personal touches, artworks and trinkets, each with its own story to tell. There are quirky teapots, old Nestlé ads, a didgeridoo, an ornate gilt mirror. It's a varied collection, yet it comes together seamlessly. The trick, it seems, is finding the right place for things. "When I buy something now," explains Nevena, "I first try to imagine where I can put it."

ART NOUVEAU FROM ALGIERS

A set of beautiful Gallé lamps inherited from her mother, are, unsurprisingly, Nevena's most prized possessions. Considered one of Art Nouveau's most influential artists, Emile Gallé's elegant glassware is distinctive for its delicate etchings of natureinspired scenes. The lamps glow blue and orange, emblazoned with dancing dragonflies and flowers. Nevena remembers her mother buying them over the years in various antique markets and curio shops, some in Switzerland and others in Algiers. She points out another piece of special glassware: a soft-green vase, Art Deco this time, which belonged to her grandmother. "It's a little damaged," she notes sadly, "but my mother loved it, and now I do too."



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A lovely apricot-coloured glass light fitting hangs in the living room. It's a little later than Art Nouveau, Nevena explains. She has two more in the basement, but has nowhere to hang them. These, once again, were bought in Algiers and have become family heirlooms

Africa is also present in more obvious ways. Kabyle jewellery from Tuareg and Algiers decorates one wall and a collection of pots bought on a trip to the Atlas Mountains sits at the bottom of the stairs. Kabyle jewellery makes another appearance in the stairwell, but this time it is delicately painted on silver foil. The result is so striking that for a moment I'm fooled into thinking there are real necklaces inside the frames. An African bead game has been repurposed as decoration, with more Kabyle pendants artfully lain amongst the beads. "Noa is always sneaking coins and things into it, so I had to check before you came," Nevena says with a laugh.

Moving upstairs to the master bedroom, we pass more souvenirs of her time in North Africa, such as framed wall tiles from Algiers and paintings of the casbah. "They remind me of my childhood," she says.


SETTING SAIL

In Noa's room are yet more reminders of Nevena's youth, these with a nautical twist. "My mother made that for me when I was a teenager," she says, pointing to a small chest of drawers, papered with pictures of boats sailing the high seas. "She used pictures from an old calendar." A lighthouse lamp and even the curtains are old keepsakes, passed on to a new generation.

Downstairs at the breakfast bar in the kitchen, there's a set of photographs taken on honeymoon. One shows them standing together in a bar on Orchard Road all those years ago. In a frame nearby there's another photo, showing the same bar, but this time, they are three. "It's closed down now, but we went back to the same place when we moved here with Noa and took that photo." It's a nice thought of a story come full circle, but their journey has by no means ended here.

So where's next for Nevena and her family? "Who knows?" she says. "For me, anywhere would be fine! Though now I have Noa, I would like to be somewhere that is safe."



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



Our tip is to be open-minded, and to allow Gallery 278 to do the work for you. It's amazing how much they know and remember about your preferences and past choices. They are really great people who have a relentless desire to ensure everything fits together as best as possible.²⁷

**After moving to Singapore, we needed to furnish our apartment. We wanted pieces that were modular, in case we had to move; and well made, with a preference for raw timber that would be suitable for the Singapore climate. A friend raved about Ethnicraft Online's company philosophy, prices, service and quality, and we soon came to the same view!

Almost everything in our condo was purchased from them – the couch, armchair, ottoman, coffee table, entertainment unit, bookcases, sideboards, dining room table and benches, side table, dresser, bedside tables, office desks and a desk drawer. 
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Feng Shui at Work

JOEY YAP, founder of the **Mastery Academy of Chinese Metaphysics**, passes on some simple tips to incorporate feng shui into your home office.



"If you're setting up a home office, there's quite a bit you can do to accommodate the practice of feng shui," explains Joey. "Foremost, it's important to find out your personal favourable Facing Direction, which you can find out either through my system online or by consulting a feng shui expert. You must also welcome in positive *qi* (energy) through the main door of the home office. Once you've completed those all-important steps, you're ready to run through these quick and easy feng shui fixes."

Spacious Workspace

The goal here is to tap into positive *qi* and let it collect. Ensure that your work room has a large holding space; it should also be airy and brightly lit, preferably by natural daylight. If you have windows in the work room, make a habit of opening them periodically to allow the *qi* to circulate.

FOR BIGGER SPACES

For a larger space, you may want to superimpose its floor plan on a Nine Palaces grid, which is typically used for houses. Depending on the Annual Flying Star or Natal charts, you would be able to narrow down a specific auspicious location for your workspace.

2 Facing Direction
Once you've found out

Once you've found out your personal favourable Facing Direction, be sure to place your seat and desk facing this direction. If it's a shared space that you're setting up, avoid having too many desks clustered together.

Z Desk Orientation

You may be familiar with the taboo of sitting under ceiling beams, and it applies here too. If the ceiling slants downward around the workspace area, be sure to avoid sitting under it, as this has the same negative effects. Try sitting at a place where the ceiling is highest.

Office Door

If you do have a dedicated room as your workspace, avoid having to work with your back to the door. Also, you would do well to ensure that the door opens up to a space that is wide, not narrow or small. a

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Property Focus:

The Jervois area, on the edge of River Valley and a stone's throw from hipster haven Tiong Bahru, is a sought-after residential enclave. CHANG HUI CHEW of **Property Guru** explains why.

One of the main attractions of Jervois is its proximity to key areas like Queenstown and Alexandra Road, as well as the CBD, Marina Bay financial district and Orchard Road. Some of the most expensive real estate in Singapore can be found in the neighbouring prime landed estates of Bishopsgate and Chatsworth Park.

Shopping and schooling

Two large malls, Great World City and VivoCity, are minutes away, making it easy to shop for groceries, pick up some new clothes or enjoy a night out at the cinema. Daily conveniences can be found at nearby Valley Point Shopping Centre, which has a supermarket and a number of eateries. Chatsworth International School and the ISS International School are also just minutes away, and then there are the popular local schools such as Gan Eng Seng and Crescent Girls' School.

The area is currently served by Redhill and Tiong Bahru MRT stations, and by the end of 2019 a new station will have been built close to Great World City on the upcoming Thomson-East Coast line, connecting Jervois to Singapore's north. If the state's plans come to fruition, this line will one day run across the Causeway and terminate at JB Sentral, in Johor Bahru, Malaysia.

Property prices

This convenience comes at a price, however. Real estate costs in the area, for the most recent quarter, stand at around \$1,631 per square foot, which works out to be almost \$2.5 million for a 1,500-square-foot condo unit.

Rentals in the Jervois area are also higher than in less-central areas of the island. As of May, median rental prices for the second quarter stood just shy of \$6,000 per month for a 1,500-square-foot unit. However, this is about six percent lower than in 2014, reflecting the weaker sentiment in the real estate market.

Those looking to rent condos in Jervois should shop around and negotiate aggressively. There are a number of recently completed projects in the area, such as **Ascentia Sky**, **Echelon** and **Mon Jervois**. Competition for tenants among landlords is high, with many willing to make concessions.

Expats interested in investing in real estate should look at two projects in particular: **The Crest** and **Principal Garden**. In a weaker real estate market, developers have moderated their prices to move units, and it's definitely a good time to grab a bargain. α

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



ART AND HOME COLLIDE

For its eighth edition, the Art Apart Fair has swapped its usual hotel suite location for Isetan Wisma Atria (Level 2, 435 Orchard Road), while sticking to its novel approach of presenting artworks in a homelike setting. Combining over 800 artworks by 60 emerging artists from the Philippines, Japan, China, Korea, Vietnam, Malaysia, Indonesia, Russia, Italy, Iceland and Singapore, with furniture and design in one room, the fair aims to show ways in which art merges with different living spaces. Contemporary artworks are matched with vintage and retro furniture to juxtapose old and new, while modern and pop art are displayed with industrial furnishings. See it until 28 August. LOTS OF LAND

Featuring around 200 intricate pieces – ranging from some of the earliest embroidered and beaded pieces to celebratory items like wedding slippers, bed and wall ornaments, and accessories such as belts, purses and handkerchiefs - the artworks not only represent untold hours of painstaking hand-stitching, but also tell stories of Peranakan daily life and ritual. 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WHERE TO FIND SINGAPORE'S STREET ART

he loosening of laws regulating street art and the emergence of specially designated areas set aside for people to paint legally has provided an exciting opportunity for a creative bunch of up-and-coming artists. Many of these artists also obtain permission from private estate owners to paint on designated walls, while others are commissioned to lend colour and character to otherwise monotonous walls.

Exhibitions and festivals, such as the well-known Singapore Street Art Festival, have sought to increase knowledge and appreciation of this alternative art form, and street artists were widely commissioned to commemorate Singapore's rich history as part of the SG50 project.

Can't wait to get started on the hunt for street art? From Kampong Glam to Little India, join us in a discovery of what's out there.

Along Victoria Street, between Jalan Klapa and Jalan Pisang

Even someone who doesn't love street art is likely to have spied these iconic murals by street-art sensation Ernest "Zach" Zacharevic (arguably Asia's Banksy, minus the anonymity). Initially rising to fame on account of his street art in Penang, the Lithuanian-born artist often depicts children engaged in innocent playtime activities. His work has a quirky and nostalgic appeal that adds colour to Singapore's urban landscape. Around

the corner, check out local artist Yip Yew Chong's remarkable work *Coffee Story* at Sultan Gate. Commissioned by Academy Roastery Café, it depicts the history of coffee-making in Singapore.

Haji Lane

Haji Lane has long been synonymous with quirky and eclectic murals that add to the quaint, old-world charm of its colourful and authentic shophouses. Here you'll find art by ZincNiteCrew, a collective of local and international artists, including a larger-than-life mural by Colombianborn artist Didier Jaba Mathieu, who also works as a digital painter and concept artist. To round out your visit, look for pieces by artistic duo Sheryo and The Yok. Sheryo is a Brooklynbased Singaporean who explores the human psyche through surrealist imagery, while Australian-born Yok's work is heavily influenced by the comics and skateboarding graphics of his childhood.













40 Everton Road

Self-taught local artist Yip Yew Chong was inspired by stumbling upon the murals of Ernest Zacharevic. "I thought I could attempt to paint murals in my country too, Singapore-style," he says. Like Zach's art, Yip's sentimental works have captured many hearts with their nostalgic glimpses into the past. His first two murals, *Provision Shop* and *Amah and Barber*, were painted as symbols of the area's historic conservation. "Since then, almost all the requests I've received have been to paint heritage-themed murals," he says. Look around to see if you can spot another of Zach's pieces, *Style Wars*, in Everitt Road.

Little India, Rowell Road

Bustling Little India is home to a striking mural, *Light in Little India*, by American artist Miles "Mac" MacGregor. His work is easily recognisable, with a distinct usage of ripple-like contour lines to depict lifelike human faces. Providing an interesting contrast is *Green Goblins* by Saigon-born artist Tyke Witnes, now based in California. Witnes grew up inspired by youth subcultures like skateboarding and graffiti.

Little India, Buffalo Road

Also in Little India, the Tekka Centre has undergone a colourful transformation thanks to collaborative works by one of Singapore's pioneering street artists, TraseOne, and Australian Regan Tamanui. Commissioned in conjunction with the Australian High Commission as part of the SG50 celebrations, the eye-catching murals of cricket and traditional Indian dance are as vibrant as the Indian culture and heritage that surrounds them.

Amoy Street Food Centre

Much of the allure of Singapore's street art is its preservation of heritage and culture, as city walls are transformed into bright canvases. A brilliant fusion of the old and the new, Amoy Street is lined with nostalgic murals portraying the hawker centres, street food stalls and shophouses of yesteryear. Look out for the iconic *Samsui Lady* by local artist Muhammad Azlan Ramlan. His style, which combines graffiti spray paint with Western fine art techniques, is steadily expanding the boundaries of street art in Singapore.

222+51 Waterloo Street

This former site of the Catholic High School has been transformed into a buzzing art hub. Inspired by the colourful history of Bras Basah, a series of six door-panel murals depict nostalgic memories from the 1960s, incorporating scenes of daily life and national landmarks long lost to redevelopment. Given the current focus on heritage and culture, it's no surprise that the murals are by Yip Yew Chong and his friend and fellow local artist Yuen Kum Cheong.

Also: Check out a mural painted at Tiong Bahru wet market by Melbourne artist Makatron as part of the Australian High Commission's SG50 project, which saw Aussie street artists painting in heartland locations. (*Photo: Australian High Commission*) &

Most of us cook routinely to satisfy hunger, but on other occasions cooking can rekindle memories of an amazing holiday, or inspire us to visit a far-flung destination. This new cookbook can answer all these impulses in one hefty hit, with 221 recipes from a selection of chefs from SLH's collection of 500 properties worldwide.

I agree wholeheartedly with the company's CEO Filip Boyen, a former chef, who visited Singapore to launch the book in May and who said: "It serves as a reminder that small, independent hotels offer standout culinary offerings that can significantly add to the experience of staying there." There's no doubt that the food at a destination is just as important as the sights and the quality of the accommodation.

In this book you'll find culinary variety, from local favourites to regional stalwarts and modern creations that veer off-piste (think foams and so on). There are chapters devoted to vegetarian dishes, seafood, fish, red meat, desserts and baking, and one focused on *foie gras*, frogs' legs, chicken and duck; plus, a helpful index of the participating hotels and their respective contributions.

All recipes come with alternative suggestions for those hard-to-source ingredients. I'm looking forward to trying the simple recipe for Table's Pop (coconut and berry popsicles) as contributed by Singapore's Naumi Hotel and illustrated with a gorgeous photo.


Living in Singapore - Fourteenth Edition Reference Guide

American Association of Singapore | 488 pages

It's little wonder this guide is nicknamed the "Bible" to Singapore, because it's as good (if not better) than having a wise local in your back pocket. *Living In Singapore* is also a testament to longevity, with the first edition published in 1976, years before the first section of MRT line opened (1987). The wisdom of over a dozen expatriate authors – who collectively have many decades' experience of living in this city – is compiled into user-friendly, easy-to-read chapters.

The guide borders on encyclopaedic as it navigates a range of topics from dogfriendly cafés and adoption to the Hungry Ghost Festival and the complexities of the health system; even the acceptability (or not) of public nudity is covered! Of particular usefulness are the websites listed at the end of every chapter, and the questions to ask yourself when faced with the difficult dilemma of choosing a home or a school. It's unquestionably a valuable addition to every bookcase (alongside your *Expat Living* collection, of course).



How has the theatre scene here evolved over the years?

Where to start? Singapore and the arts scene – and SRT – have gotten a lot busier compared with 15 years ago. SRT is now producing up to ten productions a year and, with the development of the integrated resorts, new theatre venues and the growth of many other entertainment options, there are so many choices out there for your time and dollars. There are more players in the field in terms of local theatre companies, which is wonderful, but we still have a relatively small pool of actors, directors and designers. I'm very encouraged by SOTA, Lasalle and NAFA, and how they, over time, will help us build the industry.


How did you originally get involved with SRT?

The first play I watched in Singapore was SRT's Oleanna - little did I know that was only the start of my relationship with them. A wonderful friend introduced me to Gaurav Kripalani, our Artistic Director, and the rest is history. It's been a truly magical and amazing journey, and I'm so proud of what I have achieved with SRT.

What have been your proudest moments so far?

We're always working to develop more educational programmes and international partnerships to take our work abroad, and to collaborate with even more amazing theatre companies to give our audience here access to new theatre experiences.

Some of the things I'm most proud of at SRT include our wonderful team and how we, together, have created The Little Company - the biggest producer of theatre productions for children, new educational platforms and major projects like the annual Shakespeare in the Park.







How are the productions picked?

Our Artistic Director sets the direction, but he is very inclusive in his decisionmaking process, so we all get to share our views and ideas.

What do you love most about what you do?

I love that, in a relatively small team, I'm involved in all aspects of the business - and that whatever I do makes a huge difference. We have a fantastic Board who support our ideas and have helped us get to where we are today. I love producing, seeing a project through from idea to final curtain call, and being involved in everything both on and off stage - from reading the script, planning marketing campaigns and meeting potential sponsors to greeting our audiences and chatting with them after the show. And, honestly, I think what we do matters; it makes Singapore a more culturally rich society – it's a great way to spend my day everyday.

But, honestly, the best part of my work life is when my son tells me he loves one of my productions and would like to come with me to watch it again. Or, when I receive mail from former students in our Young Company, thanking me for giving them their first stepping stone into theatre

 – and that they are doing really well now as professional actors somewhere around the world.

What are your favourites of the shows staged by SRT to date?

So many! I love Dick Lee's Forbidden City. I still remember him playing the first songs for us at a dinner in the early stages of its development, and being part of making this the most successful Singaporean musical ever created. So, I'm thrilled we're producing it again next year. I'm also very proud of our works for young audiences. Seeing our production of The Three Little Pigs — a wonderful musical by award-winning team George

Stiles and Anthony Drewe – open in London's West End last summer made me tremendously proud. (Singapore audiences can catch *The Three Little Pigs* from 4 August at KC Arts Centre; tickets from Sistic.) Additionally, I absolutely love our Shakespeare in the Park productions – this year's Romeo &

Juliet took my breath away. And, of course, it was very cool to work with Kevin Spacey on Richard III in 2011.

What upcoming productions are you most looking forward to?

I'm super-excited about Yasmina Reza's Art, which we are staging at National Gallery in September, and the Pulitzer Prize-winning play Disgraced in November – both are just insanely good pieces of theatre! α






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



Did You Know?

Thousands of elephants around the world are killed every year for their ivory tusks, and Singapore is a key transport hub for the illegal ivory trade. In June, authorities here crushed almost eight tonnes of ivory, seized from shipments either bound for Singapore or in transit. Conducted by the Agri-Food & Veterinary Authority, the process involved feeding the ivory into a rock crusher, incinerating the remains and taking them to a landfill site at Pulau Semakau. Singapore is the latest Asian country to publicly destroy its stockpiles of illegal ivory, following China, Thailand and Malaysia. Read more about what conservation organisations say at wwf.sg.

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The Children's Showcase Tanglin Mall &

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With a new academic year just around the corner, how can we help children embrace change and new experiences? DR VANESSA VON AUER, Principal at the Integrated International School, shares her advice.

Starting school for the first time, or commencing at a new school, is a big deal for both parents and children, and the unfamiliarity of the school setting – including new classrooms, teachers, responsibilities and challenges – can have a huge influence on a child's development. A positive start can build a child's resilience and, importantly, can help instil self-confidence and courage in the long term. Here are some practical and emotional steps you can take to prepare yourself and your child.

Most of us feel better about change and new experiences when we know what to expect. Before the first day, visit the school and go on a tour to familiarise your child and yourself with the new school or new class. If a physical visit is not possible, get to know the school and teachers by looking at the school's website.

Remind your children about the transition to school with enthusiasm, but don't "over-discuss" the topic as this could provoke more anxiety. Let your child approach you if they need to run their thoughts and feelings by you.

Set aside one day when you and your child can go on a special trip to purchase school essentials such as uniforms, stationery and lunch boxes. You could make it an adventure or even a treasure hunt with a special map and clues to the various shops.

Put aside weekly "chat time", especially during the first week of school, when your child can report their exciting experiences but also feel safe to discuss doubts or concerns. It's important not to force these kinds of chats. Sometimes, kids need a little time and space to process their experiences before they can verbalise them to their parents.

Troubleshoot any potential issues your child may be concerned about prior to starting the first day of school. For example, if they are nervous about getting lost, teach them to identify an adult at the school who can help with directions. It's important that your child discusses concerns independently and that these concerns aren't brought up by you.

Keep your own feelings, worries and anxieties in check. Children see their parents as pillars of strength, and they have a tendency to mirror their feelings, so if you cry on the first day of school, your child may become scared to leave you or may worry that they're not safe. Give them a hug and kiss (or the age-appropriate reassurance) and tell them when you will see them and pick them up. This gives a child certainty that you will be there at a specific time.

Tips!

- Acquaint young children with the idea of school by reading them books with characters who start school.
- Make sure your child can recognise their own written name. A

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With decades of experience in education and literacy, BRIAN CASWELL, Dean of Research and Programme Development at **MindChamps**, shares his expert view on a topic close to every parent's heart: children and reading.

We've heard differing advice on when parents should commence reading to their child; what's your recommendation?

Parents can start this from birth – even before the words they utter make sense to their child. In the early months, until the child begins to make sense of words, the purpose is to develop the neural networks that lay the foundation to "wire" their rapidly developing brains with the circuits essential to future reading. Young children learn by experiencing things (including language) through the senses, and literary language – which is different from spoken language – must be experienced early if it's to be mastered later.

Why is reading to children from a young age so important?

Developing effective and positive reading skills and habits in a child from a young age, and providing positive, engaging and comforting experiences related to the act of reading, especially during the pre-school years, lays the foundations for being an enthusiastic reader for life. It will accelerate a child's language and literacy development during the school years and pave the way for academic success.

How can parents entice reluctant or "busy" children to sit and listen?

In this instance, it's more important to get a child to start developing a love for learning first – by parents themselves getting involved. A good way to facilitate this is by reading not to the child, but with them. This creates a stimulating learning environment and makes the learning experience fun so that they will seek out such an experience again and again. There is absolutely no substitute for engagement. The key is to make the shared reading experience more engaging and more fun than anything else. Make reading an adventure to be shared, not a chore to be endured.

Do you recommend "teaching", or simply reading to children for pleasure?

The two are not mutually exclusive, but we must be very careful to remember that the main purpose of reading with children is to experience the world of the story together – to connect with the magic of print and let it transport us where it will. A child who has fun reading with his or her parents will inevitably pick up the mechanics of reading. A child drilled only on the mechanics rarely makes the transition to actual enjoyment, and without enjoyment in the act of reading, there is little chance of that child becoming an enthusiastic life-long reader.

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

The reality of repatriating can be full of surprises - reverse culture shock is a very real experience. Here, we talk to four previous expats to find out how they really feel about having returned home, and ask them for any tips they can pass on to others who are about to jump into the same boat.

"Accept that things and people will be different from when you last lived in your home country"

Lauren, what were your expectations about returning home?

Relocating back to Australia as my eldest daughter was starting kindergarten, and for medical reasons regarding my youngest, I was expecting things to be easy. I thought it would be exactly the same as when I left 11 years ago, but of course it isn't. To get anything done takes a lot of time, and this can be frustrating. I was expecting the medical system to work like it does in Singapore, but I have realised we were very spoilt there when it came to medical issues.

I was worried about moving to a small town after being in big cities all my life and not knowing anyone, but I have met many lovely people. I was looking forward to the laidback beach lifestyle, less humidity, being close to family and friends, and being in our own house again. I was also worried about how I would cope without our wonderful helper, and it has been hard but you do adapt. It has been a big adjustment, but I love being back home.

What would be your advice to others moving home?

Keep an eye on your kids to see how they are settling in. It's a massive change for them as well, with new schools and making new friends. Do stay in touch with friends you have met overseas, as they understand everything you're going through and can be great sounding boards. Accept that things and people will be different from when you last lived in your home country.

What do you miss about your Singapore life?

The home help, public transport, social life, friends, restaurants, shops being open at night, the year-round warm weather and being able to eat alfresco year-round too. I also miss how child-friendly Singapore is.

Reverse culture shock: what is it?

When we spend an extended amount of time abroad, our thoughts and memories of home tend to become rosier; it's easy to remember the good and forget the bad. It's also common to assume that while we continue with our lives overseas, time stands still back home, and that no one and nothing changes.

The reality is that life goes on without us, of course, and things change all the time. Readjusting to changed conditions, rather than just slipping back into our old lives, can be uncomfortable and unsettling.

Dealing with it

- Stay connected to the people you met abroad
- Talk about your experiences, but realise that not everyone wants to hear about them in detail;
- at the same time, do try to find people who are interested in and happy for you to talk about your adventures
- Get out and about, explore – many things will almost definitely have changed since you last lived in your hometown or city
- Move on and keep positive. Realise that this is yet another new experience for you to enjoy



Americans Ashley and Ryan French, and daughter Grace, lived in Singapore for three-anda-half years, until Ryan's assignment was complete and they relocated to Capitola, California, in December 2014.

Ashley, what were your expectations and apprehensions?

It was quite hard moving back. We had created a lot of memories in Singapore; we had our daughter there and made some wonderful friendships that we will cherish forever. We didn't actually move back to our hometown, so we had to find a place to live and essentially start over. I was, however, looking forward to delicious Mexican food, cheap groceries and good wine!

How was it in reality?

I found it was easier to move to Singapore than to move back. In Singapore, everyone is more open to meeting people because so many of us are in the same situation. Back home, people are not as open and keep to themselves. On the other hand, it's great to be so close to our family and for Grace to grow up with her grandparents, aunts and uncles. We've been back for a year and a half, and I can honestly say it took about a year to finally feel at home.

What would you advise others who are moving back home?

Act as if you are moving abroad. Get involved with activities and groups so you have a network. I found a mothers' exercise group called Stroller Strides that made the transition easier – it really helped me get to know the area and also find some playmates for Grace; I've made some great friends so far.

What do you miss about your Singapore life?

Living in a big city, being able to travel to so many amazing places, the food, our friends, and of course the Singapore Expat Wives Facebook group – you could get an answer for every question, and I wish we had something like that in Capitola!

Are you happy with your decision?

We knew Singapore was not forever, so yes, we are happy. We live in a beautiful place and my husband doesn't travel as much as he did when we lived in Singapore.





Suzy Mellor, Adam Philpott, Gabriela (8) and Charlie (6), from the UK, lived in Singapore for nearly three years and were in Sydney for eight years before that.

Suzy, why did you relocate to the UK?

Adam and I met in Australia and had never lived in the UK as a family, so we moved back at the end of 2012 to be close to our extended family and our friends. We always intended to move back, but the relocation happened sooner than expected.

What were you looking forward to on your return?

We were looking forward to being closer to our families, particularly our children getting to know their grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins. I was also looking forward to properly re-entering my circle of friends. I am still very close to a group of friends I grew up with and, having lived overseas for a long time, I had missed a lot of their major life events.

Neither of us felt we were escaping from the UK when we originally left and moved (separately) to Australia, so we were both really looking forward to moving back home. My only apprehension, apart from the weather, was a feeling that the adventure would be over, that moving back to the UK would mean settling there forever. For both of us, though, the excitement about returning outweighed any misgivings.

In reality, how is life back home?

Great, but busy! There are many more demands on our time here, particularly when it comes to catching up with our large families. Also, travelling to work and to visit people takes up a surprising amount of time. It feels like we fit here, though that can be good and bad. It's great to understand all the cultural references and history, but I liked a bit of culture shock and not knowing what was going on, and I miss that.

Also, since we came back we really appreciate the UK and Europe as though we were newly arrived. We seem to have renewed energy and enthusiasm for day trips, sightseeing, music and theatre.

What would you advise others who are moving back home?

Look at your location carefully. After 11 years of living in big cities, we thought it would be great to live in the Sussex countryside, but it wasn't right for us. Although it was beautiful, it was too far from work and family and, for me in particular, country living was a shock. We've since moved to East Molesey in outer London and love it, but it meant another upheaval for the children, which was actually much harder than when we moved them back from Singapore.

What do you miss about your Singapore life?

It's a long list! I miss the food an awful lot and am becoming quite the expert on where to get authentic Asian food around here. I miss my helper; she was absolutely fantastic and remains a good friend, and obviously I miss the luxury and freedom that having a helper gives you.

I miss being in Asia and my job, which gave me the opportunity to work with people from all over the region. Most of all I miss the lovely friends I met there, some of whom really became a surrogate family. My husband doesn't miss the humidity, but he'd give anything for a decent *nasi lemak*.

Although we had a great time in Singapore, we wouldn't change the decision to come home. The perfect arrangement would be if we got to spend a month or two in Singapore every year!



British publisher Philip Tatham' lived in Singapore for 20 years and is married to Malaysian Sandy. They have two children, Olive (8) and Leo (6); Philip returned to the UK with his family 18 months ago.

On learning of our decision to relocate, our friends in Singapore would joke that we were leaving "because we could", as I'm fortunate that I can run Monsoon Books from anywhere. We left behind friends who were tied to jobs and extended family, many suffering an irrational fear of leaving safe Singapore. In reality, we left Singapore for more space, a rural environment in which to raise our children and, after two decades in Singapore, for a new adventure.

When I left England, there were only four channels on television, Pulp was yet to introduce Britpop to the common people, and I was young and single with a full head of hair. Twenty years is a long time to spend away from home; it had changed and so had I. It was in my adopted home of Singapore that I experienced many of the milestones of life that bring some form of self-actualisation: getting a dream job, falling in love, getting married, becoming a parent and, of course, losing said hair.

How have you found rural life?

After considering Melbourne and Canada, we settled on Rutland, a tiny, idyllic county in rural England. Rutland and Singapore are similar in size, and Rutland's motto of *Multum in Parvo*, "Much in Little", could well apply to Singapore. However, while five million people are squeezed into Singapore, a mere 35,000 people enjoy the tranquillity of Rutland, where a typical village accommodates fewer people than a large condo.

Eighteen months in and we are over the honeymoon period experienced by new repatriates, but thankfully village life is everything we had hoped it would be. We're only an hour from London by train, yet we are deep in the countryside and on the shores of Europe's largest reservoir, Rutland Water. The kids ride horses and bikes, they sail, climb trees, birdwatch, play endless sport and basically just get dirty.

My wife and I entertain a lot more in the UK than we did in Singapore, and life is an endless round of dinner and drinks parties and multi-family outings and camping trips.


What do you miss about your life in Singapore?

We miss Singapore's food, but my wife cooks Chinese, Malay and Peranakan dishes. She grows her own bok choi, choi sum, kailan and chillies, as well as potatoes, zucchini, lettuce, rocket, long beans, broad beans, spring onions, tomatoes, sweet corn and myriad herbs.

What would you advise readers considering moving home?

Subject to employment limitations, I would encourage people to follow their dreams – and hire a good tax advisor. My wife, the kids and I are very happy with our decision to move. It took several years to plan and execute, but it has brought us closer together. In another 20 years we'll be ready for another adventure, but until then we are home. ϵ

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Five Principles to Guide Long-Term Financial Security

The path to long-term financial security is strewn with uncertainty and complexity, says chief investment officer at St. James's Place Wealth Management, CHRIS RALPH. Here are five principles to help keep you on track.

#1 ENSURE YOU HAVE SUFFICIENT MONEY FOR YOUR SHORT-TERM NEEDS

All over the developed world, savers are enduring the lowest returns on cash for centuries; but many remain wary of stock markets, despite their recovery from 2009 lows. In such an interest rate environment, those who wish to achieve meaningful returns will need to reassess their savings on deposit. However, cash does still play a vital role in an investment strategy, and enough should be kept on deposit. As Chris Ralph says: "If you maintain adequate liquidity, you should not need to sell long-term investments at a bad time. As a guide, you should have enough to be able to sleep at night, and to cover both expected needs and unforeseen emergencies."

#2 GUARD AGAINST INFLATION

One persistent obstacle that an individual will need to overcome on the road to wealth creation is inflation. Even modest levels of inflation can erode cash in a low-interestrate environment. While you should hold money on deposit for short-term needs, there is significant risk in trying to play it safe by putting all your money into cash-like investments. When investing for the long term, you should keep an eye on inflation.

#3 INVEST FOR THE LONGER TERM

"Investors cannot consistently and successfully time the markets, but those who hold assets for extended periods can reap the cumulative benefit of time's smoothing effect on market fluctuations and unforeseen events," says Ralph. No one knows what will happen to share prices in the short term, but those who invest over a longer period – say, five years or more – are likely to be better off than they are today.

#4 DIVERSIFY YOUR INVESTMENTS

Shares, bonds and commercial property are examples of assets that can provide growth. Investing in funds rather than individual investments also ensures that money is more widely spread. And by investing in a selection of funds that diversify across different shares, sectors and regions, as well as asset classes, investors will be better placed to withstand shifts in economic and financial conditions and achieve above-inflation returns over the long term.

#5 FIND THE VERY BEST MANAGERS

Different managers have different styles and assets, but many invest in the same way, so variety is no guarantee of diversity. There are a large number of fund managers to select from; some are excellent, some are very good, and some are not. "It's critical to have an investment approach that gives the best chance for your money to be with good managers," advises Ralph. "Understanding how your adviser researches, selects and monitors the fund managers should be high on your list of priorities."

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Lower the Curtain How to remove drama from your life

rama in daily life can be characterised as a situation that drains your attention, energy, wellbeing and often time, without progressing toward a definitive resolution. The danger with drama is that, like an emotional black hole, it can suck in all those around the epicentre; the conflict expands beyond its original participants to affect the wellbeing and contentment of those at a distance. "I had no opinion about the situation; it was none of my business," she explains. "But, all of a sudden, my name was being injected into conversations about the situation and I felt like I was being pressured to take sides."

A recently arrived expat, Amanda joined a choir as an outlet for her love of singing and to spend time with like-minded musicians. Instead, she soon found herself trying to defuse the personality clashes, conflicts and complaints of other members. "I kept pretending I could cope with the nonsense and just focus

on the music," she says. "But, in time, the constant conflict was consuming my time and attention. It had taken over my life."

Conflict is a natural part of life; it's inevitable that you will encounter incompatibility, disagreement or even targeted malice. But by choosing how to deal with these situations, you can determine whether they are a brief, unpleasant episode or become a soul-sapping saga. You can help eliminate drama from your life by consciously choosing to:

GIVE GOSSIP A WIDE BERTH

Be wary of injecting your opinion into any situation that does not involve you directly, or voicing judgement of someone without applying compassion and understanding. Idle talk is both destructive and harmful; gossiping not only fills your personal sphere with other people's drama, it can make it more difficult for those involved to find a healthy resolution to the situation.

RESIST THE URGE TO RESCUE OR RESOLVE

Don't buy into the storyline! The moment you try to pacify conflict or appease personalities, you have become a part of the drama. Avoid inserting yourself into conflicts, taking sides, or offering to help or mediate (unless there can be a definite resolution from you doing so).

TREAD LIGHTLY ON SOCIAL MEDIA

Social media is a minefield of spontaneous ranting, unmitigated opinion and psychological power-play. Consciously choose what you want to bring into your personal space and put out to the world. Be aware that there are very real consequences when you share your opinion online, and be mindful of the opinions you allow to appear on your newsfeed.

RECOGNISE DRAMA EPICENTRES

It is important to realise that some people have a need (unconscious or conscious) to create drama in order to garner sympathy and attention, or simply to relieve boredom. Allow yourself to be aware of those who stimulate chaos, discord or conflict in their lives. It's not always their fault, but neither is it healthy. Once you learn to recognise the people in your environment who have a need for drama, you can better distance yourself from their ongoing conflicts.

ADOPT THE HIGH ROAD

It's not always going to be easy to hold your tongue, walk away or forgive a hurtful comment or slight. But it is always, *always* going to be the healthiest option and the swiftest path back to happiness and contentment. Taking the high road requires courage, resilience and self-love. You may not always be able to take it, but knowing that this option exists certainly helps. You have a *choice* how to respond to any situation.

TAKE RESPONSIBILITY

Remember, drama cannot enter where you have not invited it in. We're all human, and many of our habits and behaviours stem from deeply unconscious patterns and desires. Learn to discern any actions you have taken to invite or increase drama in your life. Congratulate yourself on recognising this behaviour, gently remind yourself of the consequences of repeating this pattern and choose otherwise whenever you have the awareness and courage to do so.

FIVE PHRASES THAT CAN REDUCE DRAMA IN YOUR LIFE:


- #1 "I wouldn't like to comment on something that is none of my business."


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
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

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Situated on the ground floor of Robertson Quay's new M Social Singapore hotel, **Beast & Butterflies** is all about sharing and socialising. The flamboyant Philippe Starck-designed space features communal tables, an extensive bar with table-top TV screens playing avantgarde performance art, tablet-lined walls (free for patrons to use), and books and lava lamps purposely placed as conversation starters – not to mention the conversation-worthy, bright-blue curaçao, vodka and rum-based **Aquarium** cocktail (\$49), served in a massive martini glass and designed to be shared; normal-sized cocktails range from \$20 to \$32.

The global-eclectic menu features all kinds of East-meets-West dishes (ordered via tablet) think rack of lamb in Szechuan pepper sauce (\$36), pork knuckles with Asian sauerkraut (\$28/38) and lamb and cheese (Australian lamb loin with burratina cheese, orange oil infusion and pomegranate dressing, \$26) - plus locally inspired specialties like **mee tai mak laksa** (\$16) with shrimp and clams. Standouts include cody mee (\$28) - soy sauce-marinated cod with crispy egg noodles; carpaccio-style Hokkaido scallops (\$24) with yuzu, ginger and shallot oil; and crab and leaves - baby spinach, Alaskan crab and wasabi citrus dressing. Portions are big, so come hungry, and with a group - unless, of course, you plan on making new friends there. 6206 1888 | msocial.com.sg/restaurant >







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Marina Bay Sands' culinary extravaganza **Epicurean Market** returns from 12 to 14 August, featuring all kinds of food-focused activities. Held at the Sands Expo Convention Centre, the three-day festival features masterclasses and demonstrations by bartenders and renowned chefs such as Daniel Boulud, David Thompson, Nancy Silverton and David Myers, as well as a farmers' market with fresh produce and gourmet goodies. First impressions: Tucked away at the end of Boat Quay, this super-casual and relaxed riverside bar is reminiscent of an American dive bar. An outdoor pool table and bar stools dominate the outside space; inside, there are cute candlelit tables, funky artwork and a cosy, intimate karaoke room (reservations start at \$200 per hour). The restrooms are covered in fluorescent graffiti (add your own!), the bar is well stocked and the music is 90s-fun.

The Chosen One: The Pimm's Cup Cocktail tower (\$200; serves eight to 12) will take you back to lounging in long English summer twilights. This classic summer cocktail is done well here, and consists of Pimm's No.1, cucumber and fruit, topped with ginger ale.

The Cheapskate: Basil-lovers will be in green herb heaven with the **Gin Basil Smash** (\$18). Zesty and flavoursome, this cocktail contains London dry gin shaken with fresh basil and a muddled lemon wedge.

Bite on this: The menu is lean; this place is all about classic cocktails. We

snacked on the piping hot **jumbo soft pretzel** (\$10), and the **ruffles with sour cream and onion dip** (\$8), but it's best to arrive with a full belly.

Last but not least: The cocktails are already well made, but we loved the option to "make it nice" with top-up spirits at only \$3. The Queen's Park Swizzle "made nice" with Plantation Original Dark Rum not only looked lovely, but tasted delicious too. Bonus: There's no service charge, and all menu prices are nett, leaving more money for cocktail towers!

GATTOPARDO COURTYARD BAR

First impressions: This little courtyard bar sits at the front of Gattopardo Ristorante di Mare on quaint Tras Street. Here, *aperitivo* (that's Italian for predinner drinks and nibbles – an Italian social tradition!) is the name of the game. I never tire of a shophouse bar setting, and this one has an air of peace and calm about it, just perfect for a *tête-à-tête* with a good friend; or for a small group, for which you could take over the whole courtyard. It's open to the elements here, but don't worry – there are fans; and if it's raining, you'll just have to treat yourself to a table in the main restaurant instead!

The Chosen One: It's got to be the **Aperol Spritz** (\$18) – the trendy Aperol, Prosecco and soda mix; or the potent **Etna Soil** (\$18) – Monkey 47 gin, Averna, muddled basil and lime juice.

The Cheapskate: All their superb cocktails are \$16 during Happy Hour, from 6pm to 9pm, Monday to Saturday.

Bite on this: For every cocktail ordered, you receive three complimentary bites to accompany your drink, such as ocean trout crepe with salmon roe, bread fritters with ricotta truffle mousse, wild mushroom arancini and pig trotter terrine, to name a few delights. The canapé menu changes regularly, so you never quite know what you're going to get!

Last but not least: Gattopardo's Chef Lino Sauro was recently awarded Sia Huat Chef's Choice Award at the World Gourmet Summit Award of Excellence 2016, and, at the recent Savour competition, the dishes submitted by Gattopardo won first place. After all these awards, this pretty Italian spot with its sweet courtyard bar is likely to be *en vogue*, so be sure to book ahead.

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Jamie's Italian

#1-165-167 VivoCity, 1 Harbourfront Walk 6733 5500 | jamieoliver.com/italian/singapore

Go for: The big serves: burgers so tall they defy gravity, and seemingly bottomless bowls of delicious linguine.

Entering Jamie's, you're transported to what feels like an edgy yet comfortable home – almost like a converted warehouse in NYC, with funky lighting, rustic wooden floors and tables with mismatched chairs. It's easy to relax and forget the busy shopping mall outside. The staff are very friendly and accommodating, and it's a great place to go with friends or with children (the kids' menu is good), especially before or after catching a movie at the cinema upstairs.

The portions are all generous in size; the famed **prawn linguine** (\$26) didn't disappoint, with loads of prawns and a nice level of spice. The **Italian burger** (\$28.50) was really tasty, the meat cooked to a juicy medium and accompanied by deliciously crunchy **rosemary chips**. For a starter, we shared a **cured meats plank** (\$15.50 per person) with coleslaw and pickles; the quirky presentation of the plank stacked on tomato cans was fun, but we could have done with more of the flavoursome prosciutto! Italian wine enthusiasts can also find nice bottles here to match the menu, and the prices aren't exorbitant.

Don't leave without trying: Dessert. I wanted one of everything on the menu! Chocolate-lovers will appreciate the **Epic Brownie** (\$12.50) with caramelised *amaretti* popcorn, or the divine **molten chocolate praline pudding** (\$12.50). The **creamy panna cotta** (\$10.50) was another winner, and there's a great selection of gelati and sorbets (\$11).

Tip: Try to grab a table outside on a Saturday evening to see the Universal Studios fireworks display across the water at Sentosa.

Senso Ristorante & Bar 21 Club Street 6224 3534 | senso.sg

Go for: The setting – it's in a beautiful old building in Chinatown (a good place to take visitors to see the old architecture). The central courtyard has the real wow factor, but there's also a modern bar area and main dining room that are lovely as well.

I'd say Senso is definitely an adult venue, especially in the evenings, as the courtyard has little tables for two for romantic dinners. For groups, there's also a private dining room (where we had our *Expat Living Christmas party*), and the main dining room can hold larger groups as well – in fact, it's where we held my daughter's 21st birthday dinner.

The pastas are the real standouts here, and the chefs will make them vegetarian upon request; choose from dishes like **homemade taglierini with Boston lobster**, **tomato**, **basil and chilli flakes** (\$34) and **linguine with mixed seafood in a spicy Sardinian Vermentino white wine sauce** (\$30), among others. The girls said their pastas were absolutely delicious. My *carpaccio di manzo* (beef carpaccio with aged balsamic vinegar and shaved black truffle, \$32) and *filetto di merluzzo* (roasted cod fillet with pumpkin puree, mushrooms, leeks and Chianti reduction, \$38) were only average, but the desserts were good, and we finished everything off with some *caffè corretto* (coffee with a splash of Italian liqueur or *grappa*) – and *sambuca*!

Don't leave without trying: The Tiramisu Senso (\$14).

Tip: They have several free-flow options that include beer, spirits and wines that were really good value for money. There are also set menus if you want to simplify things with a group.

Fratini La Trattoria Hillcrest Park, 10 Greenwood Avenue 6468 2868 | fratinilatrattoria.com

Go for: Date night. It's a casual setting with first-class service, and something outside of the box.

What's unique about Fratini La Trattoria is that there's no menu – that's right, none! What's more, after finding out about any allergies or foods you don't like, to ensure an enjoyable evening, the staff enter into their system each item you have eaten to ensure that the next time you dine you have another wonderful experience. The tasting menu for dinner (\$90 per person) includes 12 items, some of the servings bite-sized and others rather generous; each dish is influenced by a different region of Italy.

The stewed **beef cheek**, served with veal jus, roast potato and broccoli, was not something I would normally order, but it was exceptionally tasty and melted in my mouth. The **truffle pasta** – tomato, cream



and crab pasta with *burrata* cheese – was another flavoursome dish that got the palate going. We ended with a nice selection of sweets: **chocolate salami**, **pandan panna cotta** and **tiramisu** – their tiramisu was quite different, containing a Kahlua jelly.

Don't leave without trying: The beef cheek is definitely worth requesting when you make your reservation. Make sure to book well in advance if you're planning a weekend date night.

Go for: Simple yet sophisticated Italian fare. No flummery, frills or fads here; just quality produce, generous servings and a commitment to upholding Tuscan tradition.

When your friends, your colleagues *and* your hairdresser recommend a dinner spot, you know you're in for the win. Going strong for three years and backed by the 30 years of experience under Chef Mario Balotelli's belt, InITALY's solid fan base is no surprise. A man of pride and candid charm, Mario's presence is a pleasant constant in this shophouse setup. Guests are quickly drawn in by his story and knowledge. Trust us; you wont regret heeding his recommendations. To tease the taste buds, we started with **The Real Raspadura** (\$14), freshly-shaven Lodigiano cheese flakes, and *crudo di pesce* (\$38, *pictured*), a raw seafood platter featuring red tuna tartare, Boston lobster and more. Such a refreshing and light appetiser set us up nicely for the indulgence to follow: *maialino da latte* (starting from \$70) – oven-baked suckling pig with crispy skin, served with balsamic-glazed shallots – and a **pumpkin**, **Robiola di Roccaverano cheese and truffle risotto** (\$32) from the summer truffle menu.

Don't leave without trying: A glass of wine from Mario's very own Eight Acres Vineyard in Brisbane's Granite Belt. We recommend **Girom**, a moreish shiraz that pairs perfectly with the suckling pig.

Tip: Round up your girls for ladies' night every Wednesday (6pm to 10pm) and enjoy prosecco, moscato or chardonnay at only \$5 a glass! If *burrata* is your guilty pleasure, book dinner on a Thursday evening to enjoy that day's fresh delivery.

Zafferano

Ocean Financial Centre, Level 43, 10 Collyer Quay 6509 1488 | zafferano.sg

Go for: Classy, sky-high Sicilian

The lift in the super-slick Ocean Financial Centre whisks us up to the 43rd floor so quickly that it's a surprise to suddenly be overlooking the sparkling Marina Bay Sands and see Singapore laid out before us. Whether seated indoors or out, the view from Zafferano (Italian for "saffron") is a motivation to visit, as is the superb food of Italian head chef Marco Guccio, who moved to Singapore 10 years ago on the trail of the burgeoning restaurant scene. He earned his culinary credentials at the likes of Il Lido and Gattopardo before heading up Zafferano.

There's much to like on his menu of contemporary Italian dishes, so we go with the recommendations of the knowledgeable staff. The two starters – carpaccio of eight-hour marinated fjord trout (\$28) with green asparagus and trout roe, and pan-seared Hokkaido scallops (\$34) with green pea puree, beetroot and sun-dried tomatoes – are both served with the lightest of embellishments, because the flavoursome fresh ingredients are at their peak.

The handmade pastas are a must-try. We devoured the **spanner crab linguine** (\$40) served with

fresh tomato sauce, which was clearly made with the same diligence as Marco's Sicilian mother and grandmother who inspired his love of cooking. Wine recommendations come courtesy of the inhouse sommelier, who suggests a light red from the 200-strong collection; it pairs nicely with the 12-hour slow-cooked beef short rib (\$50), cooked in a rich veal reduction.

Zafferano's fine-dining ambience, attentive service and furnishings (did I mention the striking saffroninspired art installation above the bar?) are as fitting for a special occasion as they are for signing a business deal. Don't forget to head outside, take in the view and toast the good life.

Don't leave without trying: Handcrafted *agnolotti* (\$28, *pictured*) filled with 12-hour marinated oxtail celeriac puree and sprinkled with Sicilian pistachios; this is a dish to savour and remember!

Tip: Check the daily business lunch specials, or – after work – sit back and savour a cocktail or Peroni on the large outdoor terrace. The private dining room is perfect for groups.

Go for: A genuine Italian feast, home-cooked the way Mamma would make it!

Ever wondered what it would be like to have dinner with an Italian family? Wonder no more. Chef Carmine and the team welcome you to Vita Italiana like a long-lost relation, then proceed to feed you authentic cuisine.

There are no menus; instead, tell the chef what you don't eat, and they'll tailor a regularly changing dinner of nine (\$68) or 13 (\$98) courses to your liking, or a three- or five-course lunch (\$28/\$38). Our nine-course dinner offered food from all corners of Italy, the chef narrating to us the origins and carefully sourced ingredients of each dish.

From cured meats with focaccia and olives, steamed king prawn with a rocket mousse and red pepper sauce, and melt-in-your-mouth beef shin with mash, to sublime sea bass, tortellini pasta with porcini mushrooms, and a trio of desserts, you won't leave hungry! For \$38, you can accompany your meal with wine and beer; we chose to start with the signature Collesi triple malt light beer, then continued with a



selection of wines. This is truly a different dining experience, and one we highly recommend.

Don't leave without trying: Pork neck with polenta and chickpeas. Not something I would usually order, but a surprise winner with us both.

Tip: It's a small venue, so be sure to book ahead – and let them know your dietary requirements in advance so they can tailor the menu accordingly.



Go for: Family-friendly dining.

Situated on the Singapore River, this indoor-outdoor Italian restaurant offers an exceptional range of authentic Italian pastas with wonderful view across the water.



First up, I sipped on a **limoncello mojito** (\$15) while I mulled over what to order – it's a nice drop to kick things off. To start, we shared the insalata formaggi di capra con babarbietola (\$17) – mixed spinach and arugula with roasted beetroot, fresh goat cheese crumble and candied walnuts. A wonderful combination of extremely fresh ingredients and gracefully presented, this salad was so scrumptious. The calamari fritti (\$20) – deep-fried calamari with marinara sauce – was a generous portion cooked to perfection. The al dente *linguine al gambero* (\$33) – linguine with king prawns and scallops in a seafood-tomato sauce - was very flavoursome. If you're gluten-intolerant, try the glutenfree spaghetti or the porcini seafood risotto; and soon they'll be introducing gluten-free gnocchi, along with a few other options. We ended the night with **tiramisu** (\$10) that melted in our mouths.

Don't leave without trying: The tiramisu was one of the best I've tried to date (and I've tried many over the years!).

Go for: Hearty Tuscan cuisine with a modern flair. Upon entering the homey atmosphere of La Barca, we were warmly greeted by the friendly team and executive chef Michele Sorrentino, who hails from Calabria and has been working in the industry since 1979. Needless to say, we asked the Italian for his recommended dishes.

After settling in with a glass of prosecco, we were served *parmigiana di melanzane* (\$22), oven-baked eggplant in a rich mozzarella, parmesan and tomato sauce; and *tartara di vitellina* (\$28, *pictured*), a flavourful combination of grass-fed veal tartare, dehydrated egg yolk, seasonal truffles and shaved parmesan. Next up was the *risotto con asparagi*, *parmigiano a tartufo estivo* (\$32), an organic risotto served *al dente* with garden asparagus and seasonal truffles, and *spaghetti con cicale di mare* (\$26), an interesting combination of pasta with Mediterranean

slipper lobster, spicy anchovy sauce and ground prawns for a salty twist.

Though we were now getting full, a dish of line-caught steamed snapper fillet (*il filetto di dentice a vapore*, \$35) was too good to overlook; and, in any case, it was light and healthy, served in a broth of dried porcini and oyster mushrooms, and Italian broccoli – a beautiful mix of fresh, earthy flavours.

The cherry on the cake was the **traditional tiramisu** (\$14). La Barca's version is prepared without alcohol or cream, allowing the flavours of the coffee and mascarpone to develop better on the palate.

Don't leave without trying: The risotto – perfectly cooked with well-balanced flavours.

Tip: It's easier to reach Block C, where the restaurant is situated, by using the side entrance on Mountbatten Road, rather than the main entrance on Goodman Road.


We asked Italian expats where they go for great grub from their homeland.

"I love the casual atmosphere and flexible service at iO Italian Osteria at HillV2. Though the location is a bit out of the way, the food tastes like a real osteria in Italy, and the prices are reasonable. I also love the environment, the service and the antipasti and entrée dishes at Caruso Italian Restaurant on Bukit Timah Road; they've got good wine, too, and their prices are OK. Pietrasanta The Italian Restaurant at Portsdown Road has great food across the menu, including its pizzas, plus good service, reasonable prices and a great wine menu – worth a visit to the small cellar! I also love Fratini La Trattoria, thanks to Chef Gabriel's creativity and hospitality - surprising dishes and good wine; prices are a bit steep for the location, but it's worth a visit."

"I'd recommend Trattoria Nonna Lina, a littleknown Italian restaurant on Cantonment Road. It has friendly but not entirely efficient service, no pizza on the menu and background music that I'm certain will not include your favourite songs. And this is precisely why you absolutely must pay it a visit. The service is not world class because it's a proper family-run restaurant, and most of the staff hardly speaks English; there's no pizza on the menu because the family hails from Porto Santo Stefano, a small coastal town in Tuscany almost 400km from Naples; and you won't be familiar with the music because it's cheesy Italian songs from the 70s and 80s – the kind I grew up listening to from my parents' tapes. If you want to impress your pretentious foodie friends and show them the real deal, take them here and order fried calamari and gnocchi done the way they should be, and pretty much everything else done the way it should be, including a rare seafood carbonara that will fill your stomach for the next two days - but you won't complain.'

I also like omakase-style Italian restaurant Fratini La Trattoria – very good value for money and an elaborate tasting menu that showcases some of the very best Italian culinary combinations; I love their seafood appetiser."

CARBONARA

Feeling inspired to fix your own Italian feast? Stock up on ingredients at **Huber's Butchery** before trying your hand at this authentic carbonara recipe, courtesy of Chef LORENZA PAVAN at Oso Ristorante in Chinatown.



- 110g guanciale, diced
- 1 egg
- 50g Parmigiano Reggiano cheese, grated
- 50g Pecorino Romano cheese, grated
- 80g spaghetti
- Extra virgin olive oil
- Coarse sea salt and freshly cracked black pepper



- 1. Boil water for the pasta; once the water starts to boil, add sea salt and spaghetti.
- 2. Meanwhile, break the egg in a large bowl and season with freshly cracked black pepper. Then, add the two grated cheeses. Mix with a fork or a pair of tongs just until the yolk breaks. Set aside.
- 3. Heat some oil in a pan on medium heat, then add the diced *guanciale* and fry until crispy.
- 4. When the pasta is ready, drain and quickly add it to the bowl containing the egg. Mix the pasta well with a pair of tongs. Meanwhile, keep the pasta water in the pot on low heat.
- 5. Add the hot *guanciale* to the pasta and mix well with a pair of tongs.
- Place the bowl of pasta over the pot of water (a double-boiler, or bain-marie). Keep mixing until the sauce becomes creamy.

This medium-bodied dry red is made from the Calabria region's Gaglioppo grape – an unusual grape that may be a relative of the Nebbiolo and has been likened to the prized Pinot Nero. In fact, the Gaglioppo grape is so rare that Italy's most famous winemaker, Riccardo Cotarella (who has his own highly respected winery in Lazio and is regularly asked to consult at other estates), personally requested a role in creating this special wine. Expect vanilla and some spices on the nose, with sweet tannins and a lingering finish. The wine pairs well with any red pasta dish or pizza.



Halian WEPICKS

We all know Italian food is fabulous, but it's even better with quality Italian wine. We asked boutique Italian wine specialist and online shop **Bacco** to share some prime picks from its extensive collection of organic and biodynamic wines, which are sourced only from artisanal winemakers who use little to no chemicals during the entire soil-to-bottle process.



Lugana Molin 2012, \$48.70 (\$44 for members)

Winery: Provenza

Made from a selection of Provenza's best Trebbiano grapes in Northern Italy's Lombardy region, this light-bodied dry white is elegant and fresh, and pairs nicely with soft cheese like burratina. Not eating Italian? It also goes well with dim sum or local chicken rice.

Lysipp 2009, \$79.30 (\$71 for members)

Winery: Serra San Martino

This red is made from Montepulciano grapes grown on the Serra San Martino estate in Central Italy's Marche region. The winery focuses on making high-quality, natural wines with minimal use of sulphurs, employing only traditional techniques so as to avoid altering the composition of the wine. In fact, they use the local system of growing beans in between the vines (every other row) to create a natural fertiliser, and the vines are tied by twine crafted from local grasses. Expect a complex and full-bodied wine, with an elegant tannin structure and a long finish. This wine pairs nicely with any red pasta dish or pizza, and is also a great choice for a barbecue.



\$38.20 (\$34 for members)

Winery: Jasci & Marchesani

Made from the local Pecorello grape, this is a full-bodied white that manages to be both fruity and earthy, pairing nicely with chicken and seafood. The Abruzzo-based winery in Central Italy focuses on biological production, which means no chemicals are used, either in the field or in the cellar — and the absence of sulphites means less chance of a next-day headache.

A Taste of Tuscany



Originally from Lucca, Tuscany, Chef GABRIELE PIEGAIA has been in Singapore for 15 years now. He initially worked at fine-dining establishments like Senso and Alkaff Mansion, before opening his own Tuscan-inspired restaurant, **Burlamacco Ristorante**, an elegant and authentic favourite in Tanjong Pagar. (Fan favourites include potato gnocchi with scampi in pink sauce, beef tripe stew and lobster linguine.) Just last year, the Italian expat took over **Pepenero** at nearby Stanley Street, offering yet another menu of mouth-watering Italian fare. We spoke to Chef Gabriele about his latest restaurant and his all-time favourite foods – we even snagged a recipe!

Tell us about Pepenero.

It's our latest restaurant, and it has a redefined modern concept complemented by an alfresco dining area. Our signature dishes include *polpette di Eugenio* (baked pork meatball cooked in spicy tomato sauce and topped with mozzarella), *spaghetti neri* (squid ink pasta with crab meat in a spicy tomato and basil sauce) and tiramisu.

We've tried to retain traditional essences of Tuscan cuisine while adding a more contemporary style to our customers' favourites.

As a Tuscan chef, I try to incorporate as many dishes from my region, like *cacciucco*, *trippa* and *pappardelle*, but because Italy is such a beautiful country with so many culinary flavours, we decided to incorporate some other traditional dishes from other regions. Having said that, we don't do "fusion" in my kitchen; I'm a firm

believer in traditional food, just the way my chef taught me, and I will pass on what I have learned to my staff.

I have a strong respect for ingredients and take no shortcuts in cooking or in the method – and I'll make no secret of it. I like big, hearty portions and I don't want my customers ever to leave the restaurant hungry!

What are your favourite foods from home?

I love pasta – all pasta. But, penne with tuna is probably one of my favourites, and meat *ragu*, and fresh, thick, homemade pasta. I also love pizza – in fact, I love it so much that I'm making pizza my next venture. For me, good pizza is hard to find in Singapore, so our next project is to open a great pizzeria in the city, like those you'd find on the little streets of Lucca.







Chef Gabriele's

Here, Chef Gabriele reveals how he prepares one of his favourite dishes, *cacciucco*, a traditional seafood stew specialty that dates back at least 500 years and has its origins in Livorno. The popular *cacciucco alla Burlamacco* can be ordered at both Burlamacco Ristorante and Pepenero.



Ingredients

- 100g cuttlefish
- 100g calamari
- 2 lobster tails
- 2 scallops
- 4 prawns
- 50g crab meat
- 4 clams
- 200g white fish
- 750ml red wine
- 200g peeled tomatoes
- 100ml extra virgin olive oil
- 20g herbs
- 2 garlic cloves
- 200g carrots, celery and onion
- Salt and pepper

Instructions

- 1. Cut the cuttlefish and calamari into one-centimetre cubes.
- 2. Place these seafood cubes in a hot pot until they sweat; remove from the heat once the water has evaporated.
- 3. Cut the vegetables into one-centimetre cubes.
- 4. Fry the vegetables in a little oil.
- 5. Once the carrots start to shine, add the cuttlefish and calamari cubes and cook for 10 minutes; then add the wine and the tomatoes
- 6. Cook for two hours this will be the base of the dish.
- 7. Add the fish and other ingredients to the base, and cook for another 10 minutes.
- 8. Serve with garlic toast, a sprinkle of olive oil and fresh cracked pepper.

"This was one of the very first dishes I saw prepared when I started working at 14, during my summer holiday in Viareggio," says Chef Gabriele. "I was surprised to see fish cooked in red wine - now it's one of my favourites. I find it funny when people tell me that it's wrong to cook fish in red wine. But I just let them try it and let the dish speak for itself - and I'm not surprised to hear that everyone who tries it thinks it's delicious."

LOWER-RISE LAIRS

Terra Rooftop Garden Bar

Topping the recently revamped Suntec City Sky Garden, this spacious, stylishly designed openair terrace bar offers a refreshing array of cocktails. Try the Viva Brasil (\$18), made with cachaça (distilled from sugarcane juice), pineapple, agave and house-made rosemary syrup, or a sangria (\$18); they've got a weekday happy hour, too. Accompany your cocktails with Latin American and Mexicaninspired bites like the marinated tenderloin beef cubes with sliced garlic, or the seafood chimichanga (both \$18). ▶



SKY-HIGH STARS

1-Altitude Gallery and Bar Level 63, One Raffles Place 6438 0410 | 1-altitude.com

As one of the ultimate go-to's for entertaining out-of-town guests, this outdoor favourite never seems to disappoint, offering live music, fab drinks and a stunning, 360-degree look at Singapore in fact, it's the city's highest bar, located on the 63rd level of One Raffles Place. Order one of their six pizzas (\$20 to \$22) to enjoy with a signature cocktail (\$20), or head one level down to dine at the award-winning restaurant Stellar by 1-Altitude; then, dance the night away at club Altimate on Level 61. ▼





LeVeL33

Sitting pretty in the penthouse of the Marina Bay Financial Centre, LeVeL33 has one of the best panoramic views in town. Wrapped around two sides of the building facade, a spacious outdoor terrace offers awesome, unobstructed views across Marina Bay and the CBD skyline. And it's not just the views that bring people flocking to this place. As the world's highest craft microbrewery, LeVeL33 brews craft beers on-site; made with authentic European recipes, the signatures include Blond Lager, India Pale Ale, House Porter, Stout and Wheat



Beer. And, if you're not a beer fan, not to worry - LeVeL33 offers Mouton Rothschild vintage wines and a selection of boutique wines sourced from a global selection of artisanal wine producers. Food-wise, there's an extensive and fabulous menu of contemporary European cuisine, as well as a fun, all-day "beer-dining" menu that includes suggested beer pairings and beerinfused dishes - the Celeriac Taco (\$18) for instance, consists of pork hock, India Pale Ale and hay reduction, butternut slaw, Blond Lager sweet chilli and more. Don't miss LeVeL33's weekday and Saturday Happy Hour from 11.30am to 8pm (yes, over eight hours!) - on Sundays, Happy Hour starts from noon – and definitely stop by to try their Saturday Brunch and Sunday Roast lunch.



Loof #03-07 Odeon Towers, 331 North Bridge Road 9773 9304 | loof.com.sg

At the top of Odeon Tower, this eclectic alfresco bar has an urban garden atmosphere, great skyline vistas (not to mention a front-row view of the Raffles Hotel), fun Southeast Asian-inspired cocktails (\$17 to \$24), great Happy Hour deals, and a selection of locally inspired snacks like sambal chicken wings (\$18) and chilli crab dip (\$14); it's a great place if you're looking for a rooftop setting with a bit of a twist. ▼



The Mad Men Attic Bar #03-02, 11 North Canal Road 6222 3529 | madmenatticbar.com

Hidden in a Boat Quay shophouse right near Raffles Place, this is a popular spot among the working crowd. With its modern-industrial look laced with graffiti details, the casual, outdoor hangout is beloved for its daily line-up of live music, sweet Marina Bay views, naughty nibbles like truffle fries (\$10) and chilli cheese dogs (\$14), and after-work tipples including the infamous Black Forest mojito (\$16 to \$18). ▼

Set atop Club Street's Britishinspired gastropub Oxwell & Co, this whimsical Hendrick's-exclusive bar (think Alice in Wonderland tea party-chic, but with gin) may be small, but there's a lot to take in: an organic herb garden from which the chef and bartenders collect herbs for the food and cocktails, a vintage phone booth, fairy lights and great Chinatown views. Signature botanical and tea-infused gin drinks come in teacups and small bathtubs (the Bathtime gin and tonic is for four to share, \$60), alongside nibbles like fried artichoke hearts with anchovy mayo (\$17), fish and chips (\$26) and pork scratchings (\$6). ▶



Aria Roofbar

Serving Sicilian street food and a strong menu of cocktails, this discreet spot is a sort of hidden gem, tucked atop boutique hotel The Scarlet. Signature cocktails like the Nicoletta (white rum, lime juice, pistachio and rosemary syrups, and orange bitters) go for \$16 to \$19, while house wines by the glass start at \$14. Munch on eggplant *caponata* and beef meatballs (\$12 each) or tuck into seafood linguine (\$30) while catching up with pals over some serious CBD views. *Psst − this space would make a fab party setting!* ▼





Aqua Luna Park Hotel Alexandra, 323 Alexandra Road parkhotelgroup.com/alexandra

This spot offers prime views of the Southern Ridge by day, or Queenstown's twinkling lights by night, and makes the perfect spot for an intimate date night or a lazy lunch with friends. Sip on tropical tipples like the Alexandra Sunset (\$18) - Grand Marnier infused with flamed rosemary and shaken together with cherry liqueur, white rum, fresh lime, lemon and pineapple juice, and a dash of dark rum. Munch on a selection of wood-fired flat breads (\$18 to \$24) and other comfort foods, like truffle polenta fries (\$10) or a medium-rare tenderloin "dirty" steak (\$36) with anchovy butter. Oh, and if you're a hotel guest, you can park yourself at the infinity pool's swim-up bar.

Located on the fourth level of Potato Head Folk's hip. multi-storey-concept shophouse, this charming, chequer-floored and fairylight-strewn rooftop is a sweet escape from the bustling Keong Saik scene below. With hip-hop beats in the background and stylish vibes, it's a great place to catch the breeze with a tropical-inspired cocktail in one hand and a gourmet burger in the other.



Tiger's Milk The Club Hotel, 28 Ann Siang Road theclub.com.sg Set on the fourth-floor rooftop of boutique hotel The Club, this indooroutdoor Peruvian-inspired bar is fashioned after traditional pisco bars in Lima, featuring a variety of pisco concoctions and other Latin American-influenced rum- and tequila-based beverages. Sip on your Coco Con Pisco (\$24) and snack on some sea bass ceviche (\$14), while you take in the beats of Latin American music and enjoy a nice breeze.

Hi-So Rooftop Pool Bar Sofitel So Singapore, 35 Robinson Road 6701 6800 | sofitelsosingapore.com

Perched on the roof of the financial district's Sofitel So Singapore (a beautifully refurbished heritage building), this chic alfresco bar surrounds the hotel's goldentiled infinity pool, with skyscrapers looming in the background. Grab a seat under one of the bar's black-andwhite striped cabanas for after-work drinks, or Happy Hour and truffle fries (\$18) with the girls, while you groove to music under the stars. Though cocktails range from \$18 to \$24, Hi-So has special promotions every night of the week. There are \$10 martinis on Mondays, \$10 house pour wines on Tuesdays, and a ladies' night on Wednesdays – girls get their first glass of Taittinger for free; on "Industry Thursdays", you get one-for-one house pours, beer and wine when you provide your business card; and on "Foodie Fridays", you get 25 percent off your total food bill plus one-for-one house pours. ▼



Smoke and Mirrors

At the highest point of the National Gallery Singapore, this optimally located rooftop bar features both indoor seating and an alfresco terrace that looks across the Padang to the Theatres on the Bay and beyond. Sip on beautifully presented cocktails – the Tiger Blood Daisy (\$20), made with tequila, lime, sour plum grenadine and ginger beer, is a signature – and, if you're hungry, order food from Yan, the upscale Chinese restaurant one level below. There's also Aura restaurant and Aura Sky Lounge directly next door to Smoke and Mirrors, on the same level.







SPOTLIGHT ON: Chef Sabrina

Last year, foodies and Gordon Ramsay fans rejoiced when **Bread Street Kitchen (BSK)** hit our shores with English classics like shepherd's pie and fish and chips. As the eatery celebrates its

first birthday, we check in with Swissborn Executive Chef SABRINA STILLHART to find out what it's like running BSK Singapore, her go-to food spots and what we can expect from BSK at this month's Epicurean Market 2016.



At the beginning, there was a bit of pressure, as we had to live up to and maintain the high standards of the Gordon Ramsay brand and Bread Street Kitchen. But it's been great so far and feedback has been very positive. I've also had to adapt to the environment because, unlike in the UK where we grow almost everything, we generally have to wait a few days for produce to reach us here in Singapore.

Has the menu changed much from last year?

As chefs, we're always encouraged to be creative, so the menu is always evolving as we try new things and take into account the feedback from our customers. We also see seasonal changes, as we bring in a fair amount of produce from Europe. But we will always maintain the classic English dishes that many diners specifically come to us for.

Can you tell us about the masterclass, "Bread Street Kitchen Family Dinner", that you're running at Epicurean Market this month, on 14 August?

It will feature classic dishes that are easy

to replicate at home for family and friends – scallops, black pudding and apple puree, for example, and cannon of lamb stuffed with wild garlic.

What kinds of dishes will you be offering at BSK's Epicurean Market booth?

We'll be selling dishes such as shepherd's pie, fish and chips, and pork belly sliders, alongside items that are usually available at our Sunday brunch, such as Scotch eggs, fluffy buttermilk pancakes and avocado wedges on pumpernickel toast.

SABRINA'S GO-TO'S

"I like to try as many different places as possible, and two of my favourite restaurants are **Long Chim** and **Angeleno**. For a drink, I recommend **Spago**, **Anti:dote** and, of course, **Bread Street Kitchen**." #2

When did you know you wanted to become a chef? And how did you start working with Gordon Ramsay?

Growing up in the countryside in Switzerland was great, as I had the opportunity to interact with people from many crafts including butchery, baking and farming. My parents ran a distillery and drinks store, so customer service is in my blood. Because I knew from a young age that I wanted to work in the service industry, I tried many jobs - including florist and waitress - before I discovered my passion for cooking. In 2002, I started my three-year apprenticeship at restaurant Seelust, on Lake Constance, and it was a great experience. After that, I moved to London and was introduced by a friend to work for Chef Gordon Ramsay as a commis chef at Boxwood Café.

What do you think of the restaurant scene here?

Singapore is a fantastic city with a diverse culinary scene that has really blossomed over the past few years; there's now an exceptional selection of international cuisine from top chefs and restaurants around the world. When we were making plans to open BSK Singapore, we knew it would be a natural fit here.









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





ingapore really is perfectly positioned for taking long weekend getaways. Yet, while Bali, Phuket and Bintan may be hassle-free destinations for beachside relaxation, they're not exactly hidden gems – it can be tricky finding a secluded section of beach and avoiding the tourist masses.

Now, for the seasoned traveller looking for something a little different, Vietnam's Phu Quoc is emerging as a holiday option where you won't spend a fortune, can escape the hordes, and can get back to nature without having to forgo resortstyle luxury.

Lying to the south of Cambodia in the Gulf of Thailand, Phu Quoc's economy has traditionally been based on fish sauce and pepper. Plenty of anchovy is fished for creating this distinctive sauce, while pepper is harvested in the centre of the island. You'll also find these two condiments in any restaurant you visit. Today, though, it's the island's white-sand beaches and crystal-clear waters that are enticing most of the tourists.

Getting there

There are currently no direct flights from Singapore to Phu Quoc, but don't let this put you off. Just go to Ho Chi Minh City (HCMC); from there, you're only a 40-minute flight away from the island. This gives you two choices, depending on which connection you choose: a short layover in the airport at HCMC, or an overnight stay, which gives you some time to explore before leaving for your island retreat. You're unlikely to be bored in Vietnam's largest city, and you can catch the short flight to Phu Quoc first thing in the morning.



Things to do on a Saigon layover

So you've decided to overnight in Ho Chi Min City. What to do?

- Check out the impressive French colonial architecture of the Notre Dame Cathedral and Saigon General Post Office.
- Haggle for coffee, dried fruit and other knick-knacks at the Ben Thanh Market. If shopping isn't your thing, exit at Gate 13, cross the road and drop into Pho 25 for some of the country's famed beef soup, washed down with a Beer 333.
- Watch a water puppet show at the Golden Dragon Theatre. (Yep, that's right: puppets on water.)
- Enjoy a dinner cruise on the Saigon River. (Pick the right one though, otherwise your peaceful meal will become a karaoke nightmare.)










Where to stay

The big resorts are on their way to Phu Quoc, but they haven't all arrived just yet. The island is actually one of Southeast Asia's least developed areas, meaning you can get a much better resort deal compared with equivalent accommodation at one of the more established beach destinations.

Global brand Novotel is one of the latest resorts to set up on the island. Located on Truong Beach (aka Long Beach), the Novotel Phu Quoc Resort caters for both families and couples, neither group spoiling the other's stay. As well as your standard guestrooms, it offers beachfront villas with private pools. The epic design

features several public pools and direct access to the beach, which stretches for a massive 20 kilometres. Make it to the beachfront and you'll find the Ocean Bar, the perfect spot for sunset drinks.

If you're looking for something at the opposite end of the scale, you can head further up Long Beach to the Sea Star **Resort**. At this series of small bungalows, you're within walking distance of **Duong** Dong, Phu Quoc's largest town. Head to Tran Hung Dao Street for restaurants and the local food market, and to Cao Dai **Temple** for panoramic views of the island. If you're after a good bar, Rory's is the spot to catch the sunset over a cheap beer.







Getting wet

Even though you're staying on Truong Beach, it's worth making the trek to the other side of the island to **Sao Beach**. A taxi, or a motorbike taxi for the more adventurous, will get you to what many believe to be the best beach in Vietnam: jungle backdrop, powdery white sand and turquoise water. It's relatively underdeveloped but still has plenty of local restaurants and bars—though nothing that overpowers the natural green beauty surrounding the beach; the calm waters are perfect for kids, too.

If you find greenery enticing, take a visit to the **Tranh Waterfall**. A short hike through the forest, where you'll find many locals enjoying a picnic, will get you to the spot. You'll definitely appreciate the crisp, fresh water after the walk – just make sure it's not the dry season, otherwise there'll be no way to cool off.













Seafood feasts

Seafood is the island's staple, and the place to get it at its freshest is **Ham Ninh Fishing Village**. Head to the pier to see the fishing boats unloading their catch, then pick one of the restaurants along the water to enjoy the food. Steamed crab and whole fish are on offer here, as well as a variety of traditional Vietnamese dishes. Close at hand on your table will be the island's famous fish sauce and pepper.

The **Dinh Cau Night Market** offers barbecue seafood options – the squid, fresh off the hot coals, is a particular favourite; dip it into a delicious pepper and lime mix for the best taste. At the other end of street, you'll find vendors selling souvenirs as well as bags of the famous pepper, so you can take the flavour of Phu Quoc home with you.



A flying start

If you want to fly to Phu Quoc as directly as possible, **VietJet** (vietjetair.com) currently offers the quickest option. The complete journey is a little over four hours, including a two-hour stopover at Ho Chi Minh City Airport. There are around seven daily flights to the island, so you're bound to find a connection that works for you. The airline also flies to most destinations in Vietnam, so you can easily see the whole country at a bargain price. α





'm not sure if it's to do with my age, being a parent, or my increasing reticence to flash the flesh in swimmers, but beach holidays hold little appeal for me nowadays - which brings me happily in line with James, who never really liked them in the first place. I'll admit that it was primarily my addiction to pho, rather than James's interest in history, that made me put a pin in Vietnam as the favoured destinations for our tenth wedding anniversary; and the pairing of a trip to the historic city of Hanoi with a cruise through the UNESCO World Heritage site of Halong Bay seemed an easy choice.

DAY 1

Arriving early evening, and feeling fresh after a breezy three-and-a-half-hour SilkAir flight from Singapore, we were delivered by taxi to our first hotel for the night. Having scoured TripAdvisor for a low-cost boutique hotel, I was overwhelmed by the number of two- and three-star hotels in the Old Quarter of Hanoi. Ultimately, I opted for La Beauté de Hanoi. Right in the middle of the action, it was clean, with helpful staff and some lovely hints of French architecture. We were, however, on the second floor. and with the benefit of hindsight I would have requested a much higher level. The constant noise and buzz of the city, which is all part of the appeal when you're awake, is in no way fun when you're trying to sleep!

Keen to get a taste of the city, we headed first to Avalon Café Lounge (avalon.vn), a rooftop bar within a five-minute walk. This in itself was an adventure, as traffic and pedestrians share the roads in a crazy, symbiotic way. We were given a sheet by our hotel that explained how to cross the road – make eye contact with the drivers, don't hesitate or step back – but it's easier said than done when you've come from a country where jaywalking is a serious offence.

Avalon is a fantastic place to sit and watch the mayhem below, and we enjoyed a cocktail or two before heading to New Day Restaurant (newdayrestaurant.com),

a cheap and cheerful Vietnamese eatery that comes highly recommended, and rightly so. With locals and tourists sharing tables, the place has a great vibe, and the delicious food comes quickly. We then headed off for a nearby foot massage before an early bedtime, in order to be ready for our 7am bus departure for Halong Bay.

DAY 2

The journey from Hanoi to Halong Bay is four hours, and slightly tedious. Take something to read or download a good movie onto your iPad, and make yourself comfy. Halfway through the journey, you're dropped at a café-cum-tourist spot where it seems that every coach on its way to Halong Bay stops. Prices for the tat on offer are double what you would pay in Hanoi, so beware.

Our two-day, one-night trip was with Paradise Cruises, who arranged the transfer from city to coast. While waiting to be ushered to the boat, we helped ourselves to coffee and snacks in the relatively new Paradise Hotel at the port, all part of the service. Not really knowing what to expect, and having never been on a cruise before, when we did reach the boat – *Paradise Luxury 4* – we were glad it wasn't monstrous, and that it had a sweet, rustic style.

At first glance, our cruise itinerary looked like we wouldn't have much time to relax, but this truly wasn't the case. A delicious three-course lunch and bottle of rosé was followed by a kayak trip to Luon Cave – we were the only ones to actually capsize (perhaps something to do with the wine), but at least we got to have a swim.









Cruise itinerary at a glance

1-2PM: Three-course lunch while passing sites such as Hoa Cuong fishing village and Soi Sim Beach.

2-3PM: Explore Luon Cave in bamboo boats or kayaks.

4-5PM: Visit Titop Island, hike up around 400 steps to get fantastic views of Halong Bay, or swim at the beach.

DAY 3

The second day of our cruise saw us arrive at Sung Sot Cave, where we hiked up and down around 600 steps to see the magnificent limestone formations of the biggest cave in Halong Bay. Thankfully, ours was one of the first boats to arrive – the caves can fill up fast with tourists. Although our tour guide tried to talk us through the background of the caves, with the number of other visitors and the echoing acoustics, I'd recommend doing some research of your own before visiting, so you can take in the sights while you're there.

Breakfast followed, then we checked out and said goodbye to the very accommodating cruise staff and our fellow passengers. Lunch was provided back at the Paradise Hotel in the port; from there, we set off on our four-hour journey back to Hanoi.

We arrived at our next overnight stop, the Apricot Hotel, by mid-afternoon. Positioned as a luxury property, it's situated right opposite Hoan Kiem Lake. There are great views from the rooftop, where the pool and gym are situated; however, as the former was closed for routine cleaning, we were forced to use the latter instead – but that was probably a good thing!

The concierge recommended Porte D'Annam restaurant close to Hanoi's St Joseph's Cathedral; it was opened by Didier Corlou, a chef who previously worked at the Hotel Metropole, and who is behind as many as four restaurants in Hanoi. After enjoying a cocktail in the glitzy hotel lobby bar, we walked to the restaurant just around the corner. The tempting menu of Vietnamese cuisine, including fresh rolls of prawn and mango, and green papaya with crab, was reasonably priced, and we were seriously impressed with the food.

Back at the hotel, we propped up the beautiful bar for a while before sloping off to bed. We'd made the decision earlier to go to Ho Chi Minh's mausoleum the next morning, and to avoid the prospective crowds we wanted to get there nice and early.



DAY 4

Our taxi got us to the mausoleum at 8am, and there were already a number of people queuing up. Be prepared to hand in any cameras or phones, as well as your handbag, and dress modestly (don't wear shorts, tank tops or hats). The queue moved quickly enough and we were soon at the entrance to the mausoleum – be prepared to walk at a slow and steady pace when inside; don't stop moving, and don't put your hands in your pockets or talk.

While the viewing is fast and efficient, there's plenty more to see in the palace grounds, including house number 54 where Ho Chi Minh lived and worked from 1954, plus his house on stilts and the presidential palace. There's also a museum, where we learnt that Ho Chi Minh had actually requested to be cremated, and his ashes scattered in South, North and Central Vietnam to signify harmony. Instead, his body was embalmed and housed in the mausoleum, a monumental marble edifice built for the purpose; and as our tour guide said with a shrug, he can't complain now.

Back at the hotel we devoured some delicious breakfast buffet food, before checking out and heading to our next and final stop, the Hotel Metropole Hanoi (part of the Sofitel hotel group). Today was also the day of our wedding anniversary, and after a busy few days we were looking forward to relaxing and doing very little. Unbeknownst to me, James had upgraded us to a suite – a very welcome touch. Our luxurious room came with access to the Club Lounge on the seventh floor, where afternoon tea and evening cocktails are all part of the deal.

After lunching buffet-style in the Spice Garden restaurant, we then retired to the pool, and at 5pm joined the complimentary Path of History tour of the hotel. This includes a visit to the hotel's bomb shelter, which had been sealed and remained so until its chance rediscovery by the engineering department during the renovation of the poolside Bamboo Bar in 2011. The shelter had served to protect guests, including singer Joan Baez and actress Jane Fonda, from the air raids during the American War (1964 to 1973).

That evening, and continuing our pledge to not step foot outside the hotel, we enjoyed a cocktail before dining at Le Beaulieu. The French restaurant's large windows overlook the streets outside, and with its opulent lighting and décor adding to the ambience, you could easily think you're in a restaurant in Paris.











DAY 5

Knowing it was our last day in Hanoi, we woke with a sense of sadness, and so relied heavily on our masseuses at the hotel spa to help relieve our increasing tension. Another lie by the pool, a session at the gym and a final relaxation in our luxurious room, and then we were whisked off back through the crazy streets of Hanoi and to our return flight home.

VISA: At the time of travel, and as British passport holders, we did not need a visa; however, entry requirements were scheduled to change on 30 June, so check with your embassy.

> o trip to the island of Mauritius synonymous with powdery white sand that gives way to the azure blue waters of the Indian Ocean would be complete without time spent at the beach. But if you're looking for something more, Mauritius offers a range of activities that are sure to keep you happy, whether you're on a romantic getaway, on vacation with the family or on an adventure trip for one. Here's our list of five great things to do on the island.

Explore the seabed in a submarine

If you're keen to explore the sea but don't want to get into a diving suit or breathe through apparatus, enjoy the underwater wonders in a Blue Safari Submarine instead. Interact with the big cats Don't miss out on an opportunity to get up close and personal with the big cats at Casela World of Adventures. During this one-of-a-kind activity, you're allowed to get near enough to touch and take pictures with majestic big cats including lions,



tigers, caracals and cheetah. Once you're done with the safety briefing, the handlers accompany you into the enclosure where you interact with your choice of cat. None of the animals are forced to interact with visitors, and in the extremely rare case that the cats don't like you, you're asked to leave. The more adventurous can also choose to walk with the younger lions and enjoy their playful nature as they climb trees and roll about on the ground.

If you're travelling with kids who don't meet the height or age requirement for this activity, you can still enjoy watching the cats as you drive through their 12-acre habitat or while seated atop the viewing platform. These are popular activities, so it's best to book in advance.

A brief history of Mauritius

First discovered by the Arabs, and then visited by the Portuguese, the island of Mauritius wasn't inhabited until a Dutch expedition settled there in 1638. however, as the colony was constantly ravaged by droughts, cyclones and pests. The French occupied the island next, bringing in slaves from around cultivation. The island, then called Isle de France, thrived under French governor Mahé de Labourdonnais. and trade flourished as Mauritius became a major exporter of sugar and rum. The British captured the island in 1810 and only gave up sovereignty in 1968, when Mauritius became independent. During this time, they maintained the island's laws, customs, religion and trade, and the French language. They abolished slavery, but allowed for indentured workers from India to work on sugarcane and political rise of this large population of Indians that has shaped the history of the country.



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

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Wedges Vison

After deciding to break away from a fast-paced career in the fashion industry and start her own business a year ago, STEPHANIE DICKSON has learnt more about herself than she could ever have anticipated. The founder of **The Wedge Asia**, a company that organises talks, events and workshops to inspire and motivate, tells us about her journey.

ith her grounded and rather philosophical attitude towards life and business, her calm voice and approachable demeanour, Stephanie seems wiser than her twenty-something years. Her accent is not easy to place – a product of her third-culture kid upbringing, perhaps.

I later discover that her mum is a holistic energy healer; is that perhaps where Stephanie gets her "zen" aura from? "I definitely owe a lot to her outlook and advice, especially since I began running a start-up!" she laughs.

Currently running The Wedge Asia with her small team out of a buzzing co-working space in the centre of town, she says her entrepreneurial journey hasn't just been about finding and following a successful business model; she did a lot of honest soul-searching, too, in order to discover a cause that she felt truly passionate about. In the end, that calling turned out to be to provide a platform to promote other inspirational individuals and businesses to the public through events, talks and workshops.

Tell us more about your life before cofounding The Wedge Asia.

I was born in Australia and am the eldest of four. My parents have lived in various places; I went to high school here, and to university at Monash in Melbourne. My dad – who works in hydroponics and agriculture – has since moved back here to Singapore. Before founding The Wedge Asia, I worked in marketing and events for Fidé Fashion Weeks.

That sounds very exciting!

Yes, it was, but it was also very demanding and fast-paced. After starting off as a volunteer for Men's Fashion Week, which was run by business mogul Frank Cintamani, I quickly progressed to a full-time position, and managing a team of volunteers. After four years of organising the company's events around the world, I felt it was time to move on to the next chapter. I'd learnt a lot, really quickly – especially about setting

my own standards high – and gained a ton of valuable experience. I'm glad I went through it all in my early twenties; I don't think I'd have the energy to do it now, even though it's just a few years later! Jerald, my co-founder, was one of my colleagues from that time. When I made the decision to quit, he was enthusiastic to come along on the journey!

Where did the concept for The Wedge Asia spring from?

When I started to consider what my business would be, I felt quite overwhelmed. I loved organising events, of course, but what type of business was I going to create with that passion? During my research, I realised that there were lots of inspirational articles and videos online, where you could gain a lot of knowledge; but there seemed to be something missing – they didn't quite engage me like I wanted them to.

As a newbie entrepreneur, I was seeking lessons. I wanted to learn from people who had been through the process, but I wanted more than just to watch people on a computer screen.

Something I'd come to really believe in was the value of human-to-human interaction, and the way you connect with others' stories when you hear them speak in person. You'll remember how it made you think, how it made you feel; and, hopefully, you actually decide to take action on it, so that you grow from that experience.

There's just something about the empathy and the power of connection at group events – just think of TED talks – which is highly underestimated. That's the reason why we started creating and running these workshops, talks and events for The Wedge, and it's something we're continually refining and working on.

Define what "living consciously" means to you.

To me, living consciously means being more present in the moment, and making a conscious effort to be kinder to yourself and those around you. If that cab driver wants to have a conversation with you on your morning commute, just put your phone down and talk! Living more consciously is not only something I preach, but something I try to live by in everything I do.

I used to look too much at the past and the future, rather than focusing on the present. Today, I make a concerted effort to be more conscious, and that's where the idea of building a like-minded community of people through The Wedge came into play.





It's quite a new concept in Asia, isn't it?

Yes. Funnily enough, people in Asia seem to be shy to ask questions after hearing a presentation, but that's exactly what we encourage! Sometimes, the questions can be even more powerful than the speaker's presentation. There are times when we'll plant the first question, so as to break the ice and make the atmosphere more comfortable.

We have also run several more technically based events, on tech or content marketing, for example; but I find both myself and other people really gravitating more towards real people's stories: their pains, their triumphs, their experiences and the adversities they have overcome.

Is it right to say that Green Is The New Black festival, which you've been organising annually, is an extension of that?

Yes. The whole basis of The Wedge is to organise events which make people more aware, more responsive, and more conscious of the way they're living their lives. Green Is The New Black festival really stemmed from this desire. It's a platform to promote some great emerging businesses and change makers who are doing great things out there: for example, a retail company that supports the livelihoods of artisans, or an independent technology or health company that's doing something innovative.

Which are your favourite "conscious" labels?

This necklace I'm wearing today is from Twin Within, produced by an Icelandic lady whose products help to support women in the Philippines. I'm also a big fan of beauty brand Ayelli's 100 percent pure Argan oil, hand-produced by a tribe of women in Morocco. I admire both of these labels and their passionate founders because they're very aware about the impact their businesses are having on others, are in the know about their supply chains, and live and breathe their brands.

It's a very authentic and honest way of doing business, and there's a big feel-good factor for the consumer. It's not just about buying a product. You can connect with the founder, their story and what they've built, and you know you're supporting a good cause.

These are the sorts of incredible stories we want to share, and I think it's a concept people are really catching on to. A trend of consciousness is permeating into different aspects of people's lives right now: handmade products, sustainable fashion, responsibly sourced raw materials and so on. More than ever before, there's a thirst for knowledge about products that do good, both socially and for the environment.

Do you think people can grow into entrepreneurship?

I'd always had a gut feeling that there was something more I should be doing. At the time I didn't know what, but I knew the idea would come to me one day. When I quit my last job, all I knew was that I wanted to do something more meaningful than working in fashion, which was too materialistic for me. Also, I was tired of dealing with the personalities that came along with the job, and felt I needed to break away from all that. I love being around and getting to know real people.

So, to answer your question, I definitely grew into entrepreneurship. When we started, I couldn't predict everything we would create, not even in my mind: I just kept putting one foot in front of the other. I'm so excited to see what our team can build in the next 12 months.

Do you have a mantra you live by?

I don't have a specific mantra, but I do make a conscious effort to be more present and to be kind to myself. Practising gratitude daily is really important. When I'm doing my teeth, that's when I tell my reflection that I love and accept myself – it's actually called "mirror work"; you can read more about it in *You Can Heal Your Life* by Louise Hay. It starts your day off on a nice note. Selfemployment is not easy – I've had to feed those thoughts to myself every day, until I came to believe them. *α*

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
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



Formulated with sustainably sourced quinoa husk extract and gentle enough for daily use, this lightweight serum (\$99) claims to exfoliate the skin, accelerating cell turnover and smoothing out any rough texture to make your complexion more even and radiant.

I have a dry to normal skin type, and I look for anti-ageing products that are light in texture, contain organic

ingredients and focus predominantly on evening out skin tone, reducing dullness and fine lines. So I was keen to try this overnight serum, which promises to do all of the above!

On first impressions, I liked that the packaging labelled clearly the serum's ingredients and directions for use – there's nothing pretentious about it. Opening the product for the first time, I noticed a faint scent, pleasant and not imposing.

Although I was sceptical at first, the serum did in fact deliver on its promises. I had quite a smooth skin texture to start off with, but even so was impressed with the change in my complexion after just a few days' use. My skin tone evened out and any dullness was replaced with a nice healthy glow, which usually happens only after a facial for me.

Overall, I think this is a wonderful serum that I'll keep using regularly. I did notice that it seems to make my skin more susceptible to sunburn, though, which is the only thing I didn't like. For that reason, I will continue using it, but just two to three times a week, and I'd definitely recommend a stronger sunscreen with it. Also, a few drops go a long way, so I predict the bottle will last a while!

MAIDA DE VEGA-PIERRET, FILIPINO-AUSTRALIAN

I have dry, sensitive skin that is prone to redness and irritation, so I tend to look for products that are hydrating and calming – and with anti-ageing properties, as I'm in my mid-thirties and noticing the signs!

I've always liked Kiehl's packaging, and in particular I thought the glass bottle and dropper of the serum were a good touch. On first sniff, I found the serum's fragrance earthy and natural and not heavy, which was a plus. I also appreciate that the ingredients are mostly non-toxic – a quality that is becoming more and more essential to me in skincare these days.

Having sensitive skin, I usually steer clear of anything with the word "peel" in the title – they're usually too strong for me. Surprisingly though, this felt like

it had a good effect on my skin without being very strong, or like it was stripping off layers. On application, it caused a slightly tingling sensation on my skin, but just enough to be doing something, and not like my skin was reacting (as it has done before when I used similar products).

I used it nightly after cleansing, followed by a moisturiser. It felt light and comfortable to wear. It promised to smooth out skin texture, refresh and even out the skin tone, and while it wasn't a magical overnight cure, I have definitely seen a positive effect in these areas. After two weeks, my skin feels noticeably firmer and smoother, redness has been reduced and it looks more even!

MICHAELA ANCHAN, NEW ZEALANDER

Throughout my teens and adult life, my skin condition has generally been quite good, and I've not had problems with acne or any other major skin issues. However, I was experiencing some skin problems just before I started using Kiehl's overnight peel, due to an allergic reaction to some medication.

My skin was peeling and was extremely dry, and I was avoiding makeup because I was worried it would aggravate its condition. I was a little hesitant about introducing a new product to my skin at that time, but I read that it was suitable even for sensitive skin so I had a go anyway!

I was happy that I did not experience any adverse reaction to the product. It didn't feel oily; it was very lightweight. There was no burning, itch, irritation or stinging sensation at all. It didn't feel thick or heavy under my overnight moisturiser.

After a week and a half, my face felt slightly softer and the peeling problem I'd been experiencing before had started to abate a little; my skin did look slightly brighter as well.

However, I thought that it was a little pricy. The difference or improvements that I had experienced in the first week didn't feel significant, though I wasn't sure how soon I should expect to see improvements. Also, the product packaging was not clear on how many drops of the product I needed to use. On the flip side, I thought the pipette was useful because I could be quite exact about the amount of product I wanted to use. I also loved that it didn't require me to touch any of the remaining contents in the bottle, reducing the chances of bacterial contamination. ϵ

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Varicose veins are common during pregnancy, particularly in women with a family history of developing the not-so-lovely enlarged veins caused by faulty valves. We asked DR IMRAN NAWAZ of **The Vein Centre** for some explanation.

Why are pregnant women susceptible to developing varicose veins?

It's likely to be a combination of hormonal changes in pregnancy, coupled with increased intra-pelvic pressure - due to the growing foetus - that puts more strain on the veins of the lower limbs.

Should women wait until they're done having kids to remove varicose veins?

Although each pregnancy makes varicose veins worse, to delay treatment is not a good idea, as the veins may get significantly worse. Also, it's easier to treat them when they are less extensive. Additionally, the larger, more significant varicose veins should not recur with subsequent pregnancies once treated properly.

What are the most effective treatment options?

It depends on the location and the severity of the varicose veins. Some of the most effective treatments today are endovenous ablation (using either laser or radiofrequency), injection sclerotherapy and surgical removal of the veins. Each method is effective, and each one has different side effects and limitations. Your doctor will be able to explain each in detail, and help you choose the method best suited for you.

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Passionate student of healthy eating - whatever that may be - VERNE MAREE ponders a new and very first-world condition: orthorexia nervosa.

hat constitutes a good diet? I've been able to answer that question with complete confidence at any time over the past 30 years and more. Nowadays, though, I'm sometimes less sure of the answer ... and for someone who really likes to be right, that can be a worry.

"Eating healthily" has meant different things to different people at different times and in different places. A "healthy appetite" has never meant a preference for muesli and acai berries; instead, it implies that you pack away rather too many of the groceries. And when friends or colleagues from the Indian community in Durban (where I grew up) remarked that you were looking "healthy", they were simply saying you looked fat.

So much for semantics. The problem is that we're so deluged with nutritional surveys, guidelines and opinions – many of them mutually conflicting – that it's difficult to keep your head above water. Which path to choose? Say you're already preparing your own wholefood organic meals from scratch; should you righteously cut out gluten, dairy, carbs, meat, fat, salt? Is vegan the purer way to go? Raw vegan? Fruitarian? How about a 30-day water-only fast? Enter the new problem child of nutrition: orthorexia nervosa.

Ortho-what?

Orthorexia nervosa is a full-blown eating disorder that can result from an extreme obsession with healthy eating. Based on two Greek words, *orthos* (correct) and *orexis* (appetite), the term was coined in the late seventies by American physician

Dr Steven Bratman and entered mainstream media only in the past year or so.

It can be difficult, they say, to distinguish between orthorexia and a normal preoccupation with healthy eating. I'm a case in point: looking back on some of my own experiments with water-fasting, for example, many would say I've crossed that particular line on occasion.

What's the benchmark, then? If your healthy or "clean" diet causes you anxiety or interferes with your daily life, including your social life, says Kris Gunnar from the website Authority Nutrition, the chances are that you're orthorexic.

For example

Here's an example from a recent aticle on the subject from *The Sunday Times Magazine* in the UK. Laura Wilson (28) embarked on a high-protein diet to lose weight. Encouraged by the praise and compliments and inspired by the new blogs on the subject, she entered the world of "clean eating".

Refined sugar and gluten were the first to go – so far, so good. Then Laura became vegetarian, then vegan, then excluded even fruit from her diet – "too much sugar". Niche superfoods became her staples: maca root powder, cacao nibs, spirulina and chia seeds. She exercised six times a week; she avoided social gettogethers that might tempt her off the path of righteousness.

No wonder she shed every scrap of fat from her frame, her periods stopped and she was cold all the time.

Though its roots may be similar to those of the most famous two eating disorders, anorexia nervosa and bulimia – being based on a desire for control – sufferers from orthorexia nervosa

may be harder to pin down and treat. For one, the behaviour of anorexics and bulimics is obviously self-destructive: they're either refusing to eat, or they're binging and purging. The orthorexic, however, will deny that it's really about losing weight. And her insistence that it's all about living healthily makes it difficult to challenge her behaviour.

A pinch of salt

(Himalayan and pink, preferably.) After scrolling through dozens of expert opinions on the dangers of orthorexia, the borderline hypochondriac in me was close to diagnosing a new branch of the condition: serial intermittent orthorexia, punctuated by Cedele chocolate cake and free-flow champagne brunches at The Ritz-Carlton.

So I breathed a sigh of relief when I found social traumologist Anngwyn St Just's entertaining and intelligent blog. In an article titled "Orthorexia: Really?" she dismisses the message that eating right is now wrong, calling it part of "a rising tide of Orwellian dis-info" in a dystopic trend.

It's just the latest in the American Psychiatric Association's "growing lexicon of dubious diagnoses", she says. Here's her amusing list of a few others that are already eligible for medication and other pricy treatment:

- Disruptive Mood Disorder (temper tantrums)
- Oppositional Defiant Disorder (two-year-olds, adolescence, social activism, political dissidents, alternative media, most cats)
- Major Depressive Disorder (normal grief, Basset hounds)
- Adult Attention Deficit Disorder (boredom)
- Minor Neurocognitive Disorder (senior moments), and
- General Anxiety Disorder (everyday worries).

"Fortunes will soon be made," she writes, "with the advent of state-mandated compulsory vaccinations for these hypothetical, and other real or projected conditions."

So get back to your maca powder, goji berries, juice-fasting, meat-free Mondays, homemade almond milk or whatever floats your nutritional boat - and continue to feel good about your efforts. You're not sick! &



8 Factors that Can Affect Your Fertility

It's no secret that a woman's fertility decreases with age; as women get older, the number of functioning follicles or eggs in her ovaries decreases. Yet even during the most fertile years, lifestyle choices, health issues and external factors can make conception more difficult. Here, DR KELLY LOI of the **Health & Fertility Centre for Women** shares some of the main issues affecting the ability of couples to conceive.

#1 Smoking

Smoking has an adverse impact on the fertility of both men and women. For women, smoking is harmful to the ovaries, accelerates egg loss and may reduce the age of menopause by several years. Studies indicate that smoking can predispose eggs to genetic abnormalities and increase the risk of miscarriage, and possibly of ectopic pregnancy. For men, smoking is associated with abnormalities in the quality and quality of sperm production. Smoking can also lead to impotence by causing damage to blood vessels, resulting in weak and ineffective erections.

#2 Medications

For women, some medications can affect ovulation and cause periods to be irregular. For men, some medications may affect sperm quality.

#3 High cholesterol

High cholesterol levels may impair fertility in couples trying to achieve a pregnancy, according to a study by researchers at the National Institutes of Health, the University at Buffalo and Emory University in the US. In the study, couples in which each partner had high cholesterol took the longest time to conceive; couples in which the woman had high cholesterol and the man didn't also took longer to conceive when compared to couples in which both partners had cholesterol levels in the acceptable range.



#4 Stress

Stress is difficult to quantify, but we do know that too much stress is bad, as it can have an adverse effect on libido, menstrual cycles and ovulation.

#5 Alcohol intake

Heavy drinking can definitely affect fertility, increasing the length of time it takes to get pregnant and reducing the chances of having a healthy baby. In females, the likelihood of heavy or irregular menstrual periods, miscarriage and infertility is greater when alcohol is consumed above the guideline levels (no more than two standard drinks a day: Bradley et al, 1998). In fact, the Australian National Health and Medical Research Council's alcohol guidelines suggest that, for women who are pregnant or planning a pregnancy, not drinking is the safest option.

#6 Weight

A study from the Netherlands found that, for every BMI unit over 29, the chance of pregnancy was reduced by four percent when compared with women whose BMIs were between 21 to 29. Women who were severely obese, with BMIs between 35 and 40, had up to 43 percent less chance of achieving pregnancy compared with women whose BMI was below 29.

#7 Fibroids

Depending on the size and location of a uterine fibroid, it could affect fertility.

#8 Unhealthy gums

In one study, women with healthy gums conceived sooner than those with gum disease. The women with healthy gums became pregnant within five months, compared with just over seven months for women with gum disease. However, more research is needed in this area. ϵ


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about your health. Here, we shine the light on five different ways you can get checked for critical health issues - with advice from the experts.

#1 BREAST INSPECTIONS

While a breast examination itself can't prevent breast cancer, early detection can mean earlier treatment, which also means a better chance of survival. Breast and general surgeon DR GEORGETTE CHAN fills us in on the importance of regular breast examinations, and the different types.

Self-checks

"A monthly self-check is very important because it allows us to detect even subtle changes — things like lumps, or nipple discharge," says Dr Chan. "Young women should ideally start doing this in their twenties to become familiar with how their own breasts feel. Seven to ten days after the start of your menses is the best time to do it, because that's when the breasts are least sensitive."

What to do if you find a lump

"Firstly, don't panic, because about 90 percent of lumps detected are benign," says Dr Chan. "If you find one while you're close to your menstrual period, it could be due to temporary hormonal changes. So, I suggest waiting until after your period to see if it's still there. If it is, go to see your GP."

Medical examinations

Dr Chan recommends that women should start going for medical breast examinations from the age of 40; however, she adds that if someone in your family has had breast cancer it's wise to come five to 10 years earlier than your relative was when her cancer was diagnosed. "Depending on the age of a patient and the density of the breast, I may recommend both a mammogram and an ultrasound," she says.

Mammography

According to Dr Chan, mammography has an accuracy rate as high as 90 to 95 percent, and has proven effective in detecting cancers early. Early detection is associated with a 20 percent drop in breast cancer mortality.

As for patients' concerns over radiation from the mammography machine, Dr Chan says there's nothing to be worried about. "Though mammography can be uncomfortable, it's limited to 15 seconds and is not harmful. As for the amount of radiation, it's a very low dose, akin to that of a couple of chest x-rays and much lower than a PET scan or a CT scan. So, the risk of harm is low, especially if done only yearly (from 40 to 50), and then every two years (from 50 onwards), as we recommend."

Ultrasound

Dr Chan says that, although ultrasound is not effective on its own as a screening tool, it's a good supplementary tool because it's better at detecting little, delineating nodules.

#2 MELANOMA SCREENING

General surgeon DR DENNIS LIM, whose subspecialties include head and back surgery, and surgical oncology, chats with us about melanoma, one of the most feared cancers, and the importance of screening for it.

What exactly is melanoma?

Melanomas are cancers that develop from pigment cells in our skin called melanocytes. There are quite a few different types of melanomas, but the most common type is called superficial spreading melanoma.

What causes it?

Excessive sun exposure is the biggest risk factor.

Who should be screened for melanoma, and how often?

Clearly, someone with a family history or their own history of melanoma should be screened, but any light-skinned individuals living in the tropics for the long term, and anyone who works outdoors, should also consider consulting a dermatologist.

What types of screening procedures are available?

A dermatologist usually does a visual inspection, or an inspection with the aid of a lighted magnifier called a dermatoscope.

Say a melanoma lesion is found; at what stage is it potentially fatal?

All cancers progress through stages. Unless it's treated, a Stage I melanoma will almost always progress to Stage II and so on.

What are the main treatment options, and how effective are they?

The treatment of melanoma is based on the stage it's at. Early stage melanomas are very effectively treated by surgery, while late stage melanomas are treated with increasingly effective immunotherapy. Stage III melanomas are treated with a combination of surgery and systemic therapy, and Stage IV with chemotherapy or immunotherapy, or both.

The earlier melanoma is detected, the better the outcome of treatment. That's survival greatly depends on the stage at which melanoma is identified. There's a 95 percent five-year survival rate for someone whose melanoma is picked up at Stage I; if identified at Stage II this drops to about 75 percent; the figure at Stage III is about 50 percent; and by Stage IV it's about 20 percent.

Are there any recent advances that have helped increase the accuracy of screenings and the effectiveness of treatments?

A diagnosis of melanoma is not as pessimistic as it was 10 years ago. That's because of the rapid progress we've made in accurately identifying the stage of the cancer. What's more, recent advances in the fields of sentinel lymph node localisation and immunotherapy for advanced disease have improved the outcome for patients.

#3 PROSTATE EXAMS

Apart from skin cancers, prostate cancer is the most common cancer among males. In fact, according to the American Cancer Society, about one in seven men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer during his lifetime; the older a man is, the higher his risk, as prostate cancer is much more common after the age of 50, and is found in about six out of 10 men aged 65 or older. Luckily, this type of cancer can grow slowly, and most men diagnosed with prostate cancer do not die from it.

discomfort - the "better safe than sorry" attitude.

"Advocates of screening for prostate cancer would do a digital rectal examination (DRE) and a prostate-specific antigen (PSA) blood test. They believe that early detection is crucial to finding cancer confined within the gland, and reducing complications and mortality. When symptoms develop, or when DRE results become positive, such cases might have already advanced beyond the prostate," says Dr Koh.



Others, however, feel that screening for prostate cancer does more harm than good, since this type of cancer is usually not life-threatening. For example, men may go through unnecessary followup tests, biopsies and other treatments, and experience anxiety over a false-positive

After all, raised PSA levels do not confirm prostate cancer. A prostate infection can raise PSA, for instance, and, in that case, your doctor would prescribe a course of antibiotics before rechecking the prostate. Dr Koh notes that further testing may include a prostate ultrasound to detect

any prostate enlargement or suspicious growths within the gland. He says specialised blood tests like the Prostate Health Index (PHI) may also be ordered to determine the likelihood of cancer before doing a biopsy, which can confirm whether or not cancer exists.

According to Dr Koh, if cancer is confirmed, treatment options are divided into early stage and advanced stage. If the cancer is small and contained within the prostate gland, it's usually managed either by "watchful waiting" (regular monitoring of PSA blood levels), radiation therapy (implanting radioactive seeds into the prostate, or radiotherapy involving radiation beams aimed close to the cancer) or surgery in which the prostate is removed. If the cancer is more aggressive or advanced, Dr Koh says the patient may require a combination of radiotherapy and hormone therapy.

Every case is unique and needs to be discussed with a doctor, notes Dr Koh. "All these treatment options have their advantages

and disadvantages, and must be customised."

WHAT EXACTLY IS A PROSTATE?

The prostate, a walnut-sized gland located directly below the bladder and in front of the rectum, is part of the male reproductive system that produces secretions to protect sperm.

When it comes to screening for prostate cancer, DR COLIN KOH of Complete Healthcare International (CHI) says it's a very personal choice based on individual risks and concerns, especially for those who know a cancer sufferer or have a family history of the disease.

"There is much controversy regarding prostate cancer screening. The main issue is that prostate cancer is generally slow-growing and is often without symptoms. Hence it's possible for a man to die from other illnesses like a heart attack, a stroke or another cancer before he even develops symptoms of prostate cancer," says Dr Koh.

Many feel that screening for signs of cancer at an early stage, before any symptoms appear, prevents any possible risks or

#4 CARDIOPULMONARY EXERCISE TEST

A Cardiopulmonary Exercise Test (CPET) is an advanced, non-invasive clinical test that allows a doctor to see how a patient's lungs, heart and muscles react together during exercise. The test, which is done while walking on a treadmill, measures the amount of air being breathed in during exercise, how much oxygen is needed, and how fast and efficiently the heart beats during exercise.

"Measuring the gases in breath during exercise allows us to estimate very accurately the health and fitness of an individual's entire heart, lung and circulatory system," says DR PETER TING, from **The Harley Street Heart & Cancer Centre**. "The VO2 (cardiorespiratory fitness) measurement gives us the oxygen consumption of the body, and is a very accurate measure of the intensity of the physical exercise being done; it's a very strong predictor of the longevity of a person, as well as the prognosticator of any underlying disease condition that he or she might have."

The CPET, which Dr Ting believes is the most precise gauge of cardiorespiratory fitness, is used for a variety of purposes, such as helping to determine the cause of unexplained exercise limitations or breathlessness. For instance, he says, breathlessness can result from being overweight, or from physical deconditioning through being sedentary, but it may also be a sign of serious underlying heart, lung or circulatory problems.

"Any deficiency in one of more of these systems may result in a sensation of shortness of breath on exertion. The CPET test helps us identify if there is a serious underlying medical problem, as well as pinpoint which system may be responsible," he explains.

Dr Ting also says the CPET can help assess a patient's maximum exercise capacity, and the degree to which he or she is limited by the disease. It can help in following disease progression over time, and in monitoring the effects of therapy in order to make decisions about treatment plans.

Another key way the CPET is used is measuring a patient's fitness to undergo surgery. "Gauging the performance of the person during the CPET is an extremely good way to evaluate their overall health and cardiorespiratory function. Hence a normal or better VO2 performance is indicative of a very low risk

of heart or lung complications, both during and after surgery," says Dr Ting. "In certain countries, if the surgery isn't urgent, some patients are even sent for 'pre-habilitation' to improve their VO2 before going for surgery."

In addition, Dr Ting says the test can be done to monitor the effects of training in highly conditioned athletes, and to guide decisions regarding training programmes.

As for any potential risks and complications, he says that the CPET is "generally safe and well tolerated". He explains: "Most complications are minor and include injuries sustained from falling from the treadmill machine. Some patients may develop chest discomfort or an abnormal heart rhythm as a result of their underlying condition, and may require urgent treatment as a result."


However, he says, patients are closely supervised by trained medical professionals throughout the testing process, which can be stopped at any time a patient feels unwell or experiences any chest pain or discomfort.

WHAT TO EXPECT WHEN YOU GO FOR A CPET:

- You'll be asked about any symptoms you've had while exercising in the past. It's important to describe any chest discomfort, breathing problems, light-headedness, dizziness, fluttering in the chest, weakness, tiredness, or anything else you think may be relevant.
- An ECG (electrocardiogram) will monitor the rhythm and rate of your heart, using sticky patches called electrodes that are placed on your chest.
- An inflatable cuff on your upper arm will measure your blood pressure throughout the test, and a small peg on your finger will measure how much oxygen is in your blood.
- A soft facemask over your mouth and nose will help monitor your lungs.
- Once the treadmill begins, it will increase at a predetermined speed and incline. You'll need to keep walking until you're told to stop, or until you're unable to carry on.
- Your breathing, heart rate, blood pressure and oxygen level will continue to be monitored during the recovery period.

#5 ENDOSCOPY



The gastrointestinal system is, of course, crucial to how our bodies function; and, if this system fails, there can be all sorts of unfavourable reactions. We asked DR GANESH RAMALINGAM, a gastroenterologist and general surgeon specialising in gastrointestinal, trauma, bariatric and laparoscopic surgery, about common gastrointestinal problems to be aware of, and how endoscopies can help diagnose these issues.

First, it's important to understand what exactly makes up the gastrointestinal (GI) system. The hollow organs that make up the GI tract are the mouth, the oesophagus, the stomach, the small intestine, the large intestine – which includes the rectum – and the anus. Food enters the mouth and passes to the anus through the hollow organs of the GI tract. The liver, the pancreas and the gallbladder are the solid organs of the digestive system.

So, what are some of the common symptoms or signs that the GI tract is malfunctioning? Dr Ganesh says to look out for a change in stool (loose stools, for example), abdominal pain and bloating, regurgitation and vomiting, or loss of appetite and weight. Abdominal pain and bloating, he says, are two of the most common gastrointestinal problems faced, along with rectal bleeding. Other gastrointestinal conditions include irritable bowel syndrome, constipation, chronic diarrhoea, gallstone pancreatitis, acid reflux, gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD) and haemorrhoids, to name a few.

In order to diagnose GI conditions, Dr Ganesh performs either a biopsy, depending on symptoms, or a nonsurgical procedure called an endoscopy, used to get direct visualisation of the digestive tract. Using an endoscope, a flexible tube with a light and camera attached to it, your doctor can view photos of your digestive tract on a monitor.

Gastroscopy and colonoscopy are two different types of endoscopy. During a gastroscopy, an endoscope is passed through the mouth and into the oesophagus, allowing the doctor to view the oesophagus, stomach and upper portion of the large intestine. For a colonoscopy, an endoscope

is passed into the large intestine through the rectum to examine the lower part of the GI tract.

Once the problem is found, treatment options can be decided upon. According to Dr Ganesh, these options include diet and lifestyle modification, medication and surgical intervention.

In a case of irritable bowel syndrome, for instance, he would help the patient identify any food and lifestyle triggers (like stress or irregular meals, for example) causing the bowel irritation, so that the patient can work to avoid those triggers on a daily basis. Dr Ganesh would also prescribe supplementation such as probiotics that can help ease digestion. At the same time, he would suggest investigating the bowel with an endoscopy to check for organic causes like inflammation or a growth.

"It's my belief that almost all GI issues are directly related to current diet and lifestyle. It's important that patients understand and identify these causes, and modify as many of them as possible," he says. "It's also very important to ensure that the GI tract is free of any disease before embarking on dietary and lifestyle modification." ϵ

Do a test run – at a time you would normally work out



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

10,000 steps a day

That's the new mantra. I'm not sure about who picked this particular number or why, but I think it sounds sufficiently impressive. I purchased a step-counting gadget and now I walk five kilometres to and from work each way. (I also jump around, somewhat conspicuously, while my lunch is heating up in the microwave.)



Singapore is hot, of course, so there aren't walk-to-work options for everyone. If you do need transport, you could at least try to walk more during the course of your journey – park further away, for example, or get off at a station earlier. Then, when you're in the office, take the stairs, walk to the copier, walk over to chat to a colleague, walk while you're waiting.

Sit on a ball

This is a great conversation-starter – no one will pass by without making a comment. Bouncing up and down also definitely helps with those difficult work moments when you're thinking to

yourself, "Is this an Excel sheet or a death sentence?" or "Why did I send that email?"

Roll back, twist, turn - whatever you do, you won't ever sit still ever again; a chair will be a thing of the past. And, if you bounce really intently, you will accrue more steps. Just don't fall off the ball.

Mini-dumbbells

Use these in your office space once every hour: bicep curls, side raises, overhead extensions, lunges... do anything that's possible within the space and time. It takes around two minutes a set, and if you can get six sets into an eight-hour workday, you've only taken up 16 minutes.

Packed lunch

Bring your meals from home. Sure, it's less exciting than ordering takeaway or hopping out with colleagues for a quick bite; but the problem with the quick bite is that you end up biting off more than you can chew, and it all goes from lips to hips. On the other hand, you always know what's in your lunch box; if it's not exciting enough, wait till you're really hungry to eat it.

You can't get a long way with your physical health without attending to your mental health too. Enough happens in an average workday to frustrate, agitate, delight and drive you nuts. So, take a step back, breathe, feel your fingers, light a scented



candle, crack a joke. Work is ultimately related to productivity, not time; you'll get more done, if there's a better you to do it.
