

INFORMATION FOR AUTHORS

IEEE Microwave and Guided Wave Letters is published monthly with the purpose of providing fast publication of original and significant contributions relevant to all aspects of microwave/millimeter-wave technology, with emphasis on devices, components, circuits, guided wave structures, systems and applications covering the frequency spectrum from microwave and beyond, including submillimeter-waves and infrared. Publication time will be two months from the end of the month in which it was received provided the author responds immediately to all communications. Galley proofs will be sent, but in the interest of fast publication, there may not be time to wait for their return. Errata will be published in the next issue if sent promptly. Lengths of the letters are expected to be no longer than two printed pages.

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Lettering should be large enough to be readily legible when the drawing is reduced to two- or one-column width - as much as 4:1 reduction from the original. In the original size, this lettering may appear too large, but the reader will benefit. Lettering on figures is preferably done by template.

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
