

STOCHASTIC PERTURBATIONS TO CONSERVATIVE DYNAMICAL SYSTEMS ON THE PLANE. II: RECURRENCE CONDITIONS

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ABSTRACT. We consider a conservative system on the plane, subjected to a perturbation. The above perturbation is composed of a deterministic part and a random (white noise) part. We discuss the conditions under which there exists a unique, finite invariant measure to the perturbed system, and the weak compactness of the above measures for small enough perturbation's parameter.

1. Introduction and main results. In Part I of this paper [5] we considered the problem of convergence, as $\varepsilon \rightarrow 0$, of the invariant measures due to the diffusion process generated by

$$(1.1) \quad L^\varepsilon = \frac{1}{\varepsilon} \overline{\nabla} H \cdot \nabla + Q \cdot \nabla + \Delta$$

on $\mathbf{R}^2$. Here H is a smooth, real function with a finite number of critical points, $\overline{\nabla} \equiv (-\partial/\partial y, \partial/\partial x)$ for $z = (x, y)$, Q is a smooth vector-valued function on $\mathbf{R}^2$ and Δ stands for the Laplacian. In [5] we assumed that the diffusion process generated by (1.1) admits a unique invariant measure, μ^ε , on $\mathbf{R}^2$, for all $\varepsilon > 0$ small enough. Moreover, the set of measures $\{\mu^\varepsilon\}$ was assumed to be weakly compact (tight). Under the above assumption we proved the strong convergence of μ^ε , as $\varepsilon \rightarrow \infty$ to a finite measure μ^0 . μ^0 was represented by a density function ρ^0 which is given explicitly as a function of the local action, J , due to the Hamiltonian H . By our condition on H , J is a smooth, single-valued function on $\{z; |z| \geq R\}$ for some $R > 0$. J is defined by

$$(1.2) \quad J(z) = \oint_{\gamma(z)} y \, dx,$$

where $\gamma(z)$ is the level curve of H intersecting z . On each such level curve we defined the averaging operator

$$(1.3) \quad \langle \sigma \rangle_{(z)} \equiv \oint_{\gamma(z)} \frac{\sigma(z')}{|\overline{\nabla} J(z')|} \, d\Gamma(z').$$

Consider

$$(1.4) \quad \psi(J) = \frac{\langle \nabla J \cdot Q \rangle}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle}, \quad J = J(z).$$

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By the above notation ρ^0 was defined outside the R disc on $\mathbf{R}^2$ as

(1.5)
$$\rho^0(J) \equiv C \exp \left(\int^J \psi(s) \, ds \right)$$

where C is a normalization constant and $\rho^0(z)$ is defined by (1.5) upon the substitution $J = J(z)$ [5].

In the present paper we study the conditions under which the assumptions of existence and weak compactness of $\{\mu^\varepsilon\}$ are satisfied. From (1.5) it seems evident that a necessary condition for the above assumptions is the integrability of $\rho^0(z)$. In particular, the integrability of ρ^0 follows from the assumption

(1.6)
$$\overline{\lim}_{s \rightarrow \infty} \psi(s) < 0.$$

The sufficiency of (1.6) is a delicate problem (see below). As for now, we assume a much stronger assumption:

ASSUMPTION A_1 .

1.
$$\overline{\lim}_{s \rightarrow \infty} \left\{ \sup_{z' \in \gamma(s)} \left[\frac{Q \cdot n_J}{|\nabla J|} + \frac{\Delta J}{|\nabla J|^2} \right] \right\} < 0$$

where $\gamma(s)$ is the level curve of $J = s$ and n_J is the outward normal to $\gamma(J)$.

2.
$$\underline{\lim}_{s \rightarrow \infty} \left\{ \inf_{z \in \gamma(s)} \|\nabla J\|^2 \right\} = \infty.$$

It is easy to see that Assumption A_1 is stronger than (1.6) provided ΔJ is uniformly bounded. In fact, by (1.3),

(1.7)
$$\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle(s) = \oint_{\gamma(s)} |\nabla J|,$$

(1.8)
$$\langle Q \cdot \nabla J \rangle(s) = \oint_{\gamma(s)} \frac{Q \cdot \nabla J}{|\nabla J|} = \oint_{\gamma(s)} Q \cdot n_J.$$

Thus, Assumption A_1 requires the strict inequality at any point on the contour $\gamma(s)$ for s large enough, while (1.6) requires only the inequality of the contour averages. Notice that both (1.6) and Assumption A_1 ignore the functional dependence of H on J (i.e. the frequency of oscillations on level curves of H due to the unperturbed system $\dot{z} = \overline{\nabla} H(z)$). It is only the behavior of $Q \cdot \nabla n_J$ and ∇J that counts.

THEOREM 1.1. *Assume A_1 holds. Then, for any $\varepsilon > 0$ the process generated by (1.1) is positively recurrent. In particular there exists a finite invariant measure μ^ε , associated with the diffusion process generated by L^ε . Moreover, the set $\{\mu^\varepsilon\}_{\varepsilon > 0}$ is compact in the weak topology of measures.*

Consider now the weaker assumption (1.6). As it stands, it is not likely that (1.6) may replace A_1 in Theorem 1.1. This is due to the fact that (1.6) contains no information about the frequency of oscillations on a given level curve of H , and we cannot expect that $|\nabla J|$ and $Q \cdot n_J$ can be replaced by its contour averages if the frequency $\omega(J)$ ($= dH(J) \backslash dJ$) is zero for some values of J . Moreover, even if $\omega(J)$ admits a positive lower bound, we may expect that the conclusions of Theorem 1.1

would fail if $Q \cdot \nabla J$ deviates wildly from its contour average. If H is a harmonic oscillator

$$(1.9) \quad H(x, y) = \frac{1}{2}x^2 + \frac{1}{2}\omega^2 y^2, \quad \omega = \text{const} \neq 0$$

then we can prove an analog of Theorem 1.1:

THEOREM 1.2. *Assume H is given by (1.9) and, in addition, $\exists C > 0$*

$$(1.10) \quad |\nabla_z Q| < C, \quad \forall z \in \mathbf{R}^2.$$

Then the conclusions of Theorem 1.1 hold provided (1.6) replaces Assumption A_1 and $\varepsilon > 0$ is small enough.

Condition (1.9) can be relaxed as follows: If H is harmonic, then the associated action is given by $J = H/\omega$. Here ω is a positive constant so J is a definite quadratic form. Consider a general Hamiltonian $H = H(z)$, for which the associated action satisfies the following generalization of the “harmonic” action:

$$(1.11) \quad O(J) = O\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle = O(|z|)^2 \quad \text{as } z \rightarrow \infty,$$

$$(1.12) \quad |\nabla_z \nabla_z J| < C.$$

In addition, let the canonical angle θ ($\{J, \theta\}$ form a canonical pair) satisfy the obvious generalization to the harmonic oscillator case

$$(1.13) \quad |z||\nabla_z \theta| + |\Delta_z \theta| \leq C.$$

THEOREM 1.2'. *Let H be a Hamiltonian function on $\mathbf{R}^2$ and assume the associated action-angle variables satisfy (1.11)–(1.13) for z at a certain neighborhood of infinity. Assume, in addition,*

$$C_2 > dH/dJ \equiv \omega(J) > C_1 > 0$$

and $\bar{\nabla}H$ is uniformly Lipschitz (as a function of z). Then the conclusion of Theorem 1.1 holds if (1.6) replaces Assumption A_1 .

Notice the restriction “ ε small enough” in Theorem 1.2(2') compared to “any $\varepsilon > 0$ ” in Theorem 1.1. Theorem 1.2(2') may be applied to the case of degenerate diffusion as well. In this case, we replace the Laplacian in (1.1) by, say, $\partial^2/\partial x^2$. The formal expression of ρ^0 (1.5) is the same, where $\langle |\partial J/\partial x|^2 \rangle$, $\langle \partial^2 J/\partial x^2 \rangle$ replace $\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle$ and $\langle \Delta J \rangle$, respectively, in (1.4). Here the analog of Assumption A_1 fails since $(\partial^2 J/\partial x^2)/|(\partial J/\partial x)|^2$ blows up at some point on any level curve of J , while (1.6) may be satisfied since $\langle |\partial J/\partial x|^2 \rangle$ is always positive.

2. Technical background. In order to show the existence of a finite invariant measure μ^ε , one has to prove the positive recurrency of the process involved [3]. Given a simply connected bounded domain Ω_1 , let τ_1^ε be the hitting time of $\gamma_1 = \partial\Omega_1$. If $\Omega_2 \supset \supset \Omega_1$ and $\gamma_2 = \partial\Omega_2$, then it is enough to show:

$$(2.1) \quad \sup_{x \in \gamma_2} E_x(\tau_1^\varepsilon) < \infty$$

(see [1]). In the case of Theorem 1.1 we apply some adaptation of the barrier method [1] and use the special structure of L^ε . Defining γ_1, γ_2 as level contours of J , we explicitly define a function $U^0 = U^0(J)$ satisfying

$$(2.2) \quad L^\varepsilon U^0(J) < 0, \quad \lim_{J \rightarrow \infty} U^0(J) = \infty.$$

The existence of U^0 as above guarantees the recurrency of the process. To prove the positive recurrency, we construct a second barrier $F = F(J) > 0$

$$(2.3) \quad L^\varepsilon(F) \leq -1 \quad \forall z, \{J(z) \geq J_1\},$$

where $J(z) = J_i$ on γ_i , $i = 1, 2$. Then

$$E_z(\tau_1^\varepsilon) \leq F(J_2) \quad \forall z \in \gamma_2$$

and the positive recurrency follows from (2.1). Since F is independent of ε , the l.h.s. of (2.1) turns out to be independent of ε as well. This observation, however, is not sufficient for the weak compactness of the invariant distributions $\{\mu^\varepsilon\}$.

In order to prove the weak compactness, we use a representation of an invariant distribution μ to a positively recurrent diffusion process, due to Khas'minskii [4]. Consider the stopping time τ^ε :

$$(2.4) \quad \tau^\varepsilon = \{\inf t > 0; z^\varepsilon(t) \in \Omega_1, \exists (0 \leq s \leq t) z^\varepsilon(s) \in \sim \Omega_1\}.$$

Then, if A is a Borel set

$$(2.5) \quad \mu^\varepsilon(A) = \int_{\gamma_1} E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^\varepsilon} \chi_A(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) d\nu^\varepsilon(y) \bigg/ \int_{\gamma_1} E_y(\tau^\varepsilon) dy$$

where ν^ε is a probability measure on γ_1 induced by the diffusion process (χ_A —the characteristic function of A). In [5] we used (2.5) to obtain the strong convergence $\mu^\varepsilon \rightarrow \mu^0$ on Ω_1 . Here we use the same representation to estimate μ^ε on the external domain $\sim \Omega_2$. Let $\{z; |z| \geq R\} := \Omega_R^\infty \subset \sim \Omega_2$ for $R > 0$ large enough. By (2.5), $\mu^\varepsilon(\Omega_R^\infty)$ is estimated by

$$(2.6) \quad \mu^\varepsilon(\Omega_R^\infty) \leq \sup_{z \in \gamma_1} E_z \left(\int_0^{\tau^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) \bigg/ \inf_{z \in \gamma_1} E_z(\tau^\varepsilon),$$

where χ_R^∞ is the characteristic function of Ω_R^∞ . Since χ_R^∞ is supported in $\sim \Omega_2$, we obtain for $z \in \gamma_1$

$$(2.7) \quad E_z \left(\int_0^{\tau^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) = E_z \left(\int_{\tau_2^\varepsilon}^{\tau^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right)$$

where τ_2^ε is the hitting time of γ_2 . By the strong Markov property

$$(2.8) \quad \begin{aligned} E_z \left(\int_{\tau_2^\varepsilon}^{\tau^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) &= E_z \left(E_{z^\varepsilon(\tau_2^\varepsilon)} \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) \right) \\ &\leq \sup_{x \in \gamma_2} E_x \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right), \end{aligned}$$

where τ_1^ε is, as before, the hitting time of γ_1 . From (2.5) and (2.8)

$$(2.9) \quad \mu^\varepsilon(\Omega_R^\infty) \leq C^{-1} \sup_{x \in \gamma_2} E_x \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right),$$

provided C is an ε independent function satisfying

$$(2.10) \quad \inf_{z \in \gamma_1} E_z(\tau^\varepsilon) > \inf_{x \in \gamma_2} E_x(\tau_1^\varepsilon) > C > 0.$$

Thus we prove the weak compactness of $\{\mu^\varepsilon\}$ by showing

$$(2.11) \quad \lim_{R \rightarrow \infty} \left\{ \sup_{x \in \gamma_2} E_x \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) \right\} = 0$$

holds uniformly w.r. to $\varepsilon > 0$. In the beginning of §3 we fill in the details of the proof of Theorem 1.1.

The proof of Theorem 1.2(2') is more complicated. Here we cannot introduce an explicit barrier as in (2.3). However, there exists a function $U^*(J) > 0$ satisfying

$$(2.12) \quad L^\varepsilon U^* = -1 + \xi$$

where $\langle \xi \rangle_{(J)} = 0$ for $J \geq J_1$ (see (1.3) for the definition of $\langle \cdot \rangle$). In order to prove (2.1) in this case, one has to show

$$(2.13) \quad E_x \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^\varepsilon} \xi(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) \leq \delta E_x(\tau_1^\varepsilon) + C < \infty$$

for $x \in \gamma_2$, $C > 0$, $0 < \delta < 1$, where C , δ are independent of the particular choice of $z \in \gamma_2$. To prove (2.13), we take advantage of the definition of ξ :

$$(2.14) \quad \int_0^{T_z^0} \xi(z^0(s)) ds = 0$$

where $z^0(s)$ satisfies the unperturbed (deterministic) system

$$z^0 = \overline{\nabla} H(z^0), \quad z^0(0) = z$$

and $T_z^0 = 2\pi/\omega(z)$. (2.14) is just the condition $\langle \xi \rangle \equiv 0$. Splitting $\xi = \tilde{\xi} + (1 - \tilde{\xi})$ where $1 - \tilde{\xi}$ is compactly supported in $\sim \Omega_1$ and $\langle \tilde{\xi} \rangle = 0$, (2.13) is reduced to (see §3):

$$(2.13') \quad E_x \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^\varepsilon} \tilde{\xi}(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) \leq \delta E_x(\tau_1^\varepsilon) < \infty,$$

for $\delta < 1$ and $x \in \gamma_2$, fixed.

Let $x \in \gamma_2$, $\theta(x) = \theta_0$. We define the ray $l_{\theta_0}^\eta \subset \sim \Omega_1$ as

$$(2.15) \quad l_{\theta_0}^\eta = \{z \in \sim \Omega_1; J(z) \geq J_1 + \eta, \theta(z) = \theta_0\},$$

where $\eta > 0$. Define $\tilde{\tau}_1^{\varepsilon,1}$ as the stopping time according to the following rule: The process $z^\varepsilon(s)$ starting at $\omega \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$ is stopped whenever $z^\varepsilon(t)$ hits $l_{\theta_0}^\eta$ after completing at least one revolution in θ . Let $\tau_1^{\varepsilon,1} = \tilde{\tau}_1^{\varepsilon,1} \wedge \tau_1^\varepsilon$. Using the strong Markov property, we show (§3) that (2.13') is reduced to the following

$$(2.16) \quad \left. \begin{array}{ll} \text{(a)} & \forall w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta, \quad E_w(\tau_1^{\varepsilon,1}) < \infty \\ \text{(b)} & \forall w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta, \quad E_w \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^{\varepsilon,1}} \tilde{\xi}(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) \leq \delta E_w(\tau_1^{\varepsilon,1}) \end{array} \right\}.$$

(2.16a) is proved in §3 by constructing an appropriate barrier function. The proof of (2.16b) includes most of the technical details of this paper, and is given in Appendix B. The object of this proof is to estimate the deviation of the l.h.s. of (2.16b) from that of (2.14), for ε small. In order to prove those estimates, we need a uniform

lower bound on $E_w(\tau_1^{\varepsilon,1}) \forall w \in l_{\theta_0}^n$. This is the reason for the choice $J(\omega) \geq J_1 + \eta$ in the definition of $l_{\theta_0}^n$ (2.15). In Appendix A we prove certain bounds on ξ which are required for the proof of (2.16b). The proof of weak compactness follows along similar lines, using (2.11).

3. Estimates on the external domain.

PROOF OF THEOREM 1.1. Let the assumptions of Theorem 1.1 hold. For $J > 0$ large enough, define

$$(3.1) \quad \gamma_J = \{z \in \mathbf{R}^2, J(z) = J\} \subset \mathbf{R}^2.$$

Let $J_2 > J_1$, and consider $\gamma_i = \gamma_{J_i}$, $i = 1, 2$. By Assumption A₁ we may define J_1 large enough for which

$$(3.2) \quad \sup_{J \in \gamma_J} \frac{\Delta J + Q \cdot \nabla J}{|\nabla J|^2} < -\alpha < 0$$

where $J \geq J_1$ and α are a positive constant. Given $R > R' \geq J_2$ we define the domain

$$(3.3) \quad \Omega_{R'}^R = \{z; R' \leq J(z) \leq R\}.$$

Let $\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon$ be the escape time from $\Omega_{J_1}^R$. From the definition of L^ε and by $\bar{\nabla} H \cdot \nabla J \equiv 0$ we obtain

$$(3.4) \quad L^\varepsilon(e^{\alpha J}) = |\nabla J|^2 e^{\alpha J} \left[\alpha^2 + \alpha \frac{\Delta J + Q \cdot \nabla J}{|\nabla J|^2} \right].$$

Hence, by (3.2),

$$(3.5) \quad L^\varepsilon(e^{\alpha J}) \leq 0$$

for $J \geq J_1$.

Using the Ito formula and applying expectations on the process starting at γ_2 :

$$(3.6) \quad E_y \int_0^{\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon} L^\varepsilon(e^{\alpha J}) ds = E_y[\exp \alpha J(\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon)] - e^{\alpha J_2} \leq 0$$

for $y \in \gamma_2$. The definition of $\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon$ and (3.6) yield

$$P_y\{z^\varepsilon(\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon) \in \gamma_R\} \leq e^{\alpha(J_2 - R)}$$

for arbitrary $R > J_2$. Hence the process is regular and recurrent [1]; τ_ε^1 , the hitting time of γ^1 , is finite a.e. and

$$(3.7) \quad \lim_{R \rightarrow \infty} \tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon = \tau_1^\varepsilon \quad \text{in prob.}$$

In particular, for $R \uparrow \infty$ $\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon$ is monotone and (3.7) holds a.s. Let

$$\delta(J) = \inf_{z \in \gamma_J} |\nabla J|^2$$

and

$$(3.8) \quad F(J) = \int_{J_1}^J e^{\alpha s} \left[\int_s^\infty \frac{1}{\delta(u)} e^{-\alpha u} du \right] ds.$$

F is well defined by Assumption $A_1(2)$. Applying L^ε on F , using (3.2), we obtain in a similar way to (3.5)

$$(3.9) \quad L^\varepsilon(F) \leq -1 \quad \text{for } J \geq J_1.$$

Given $y \in \gamma_2$, the Ito formula yields

$$(3.10) \quad E_y \tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon \leq -E_y \int_0^{\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon} L^\varepsilon F(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds = -\{E_y F(\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon) - F(J_2)\} \leq F(J_2).$$

Using (3.7) and the remark thereafter, we obtain a bound on $E_y \tau_1^\varepsilon$ by (3.10) and the monotone convergence. Hence the process is positively recurrent for any $\varepsilon > 0$ [1]. In particular, the process (1.3) admits a finite invariant measure, μ^ε .

Let Ω_R^∞ be defined by (3.3). The set $\{\mu^\varepsilon\}$, $\varepsilon > 0$, is weakly compact provided

$$(3.11) \quad \lim_{R \rightarrow \infty} \mu^\varepsilon(\Omega_R^\infty) = 0, \quad \text{uniformly in } \varepsilon > 0.$$

Let now

$$(3.12) \quad F^R(J) = \int_{J_1}^J e^{\alpha s} \left[\int_s^\infty \frac{\chi_R^\infty}{\delta(u)} e^{-\alpha u} du \right] ds$$

where χ_R^∞ is the characteristic function on $[R, \infty)$ and α is as in (3.2). A calculation similar to that of (3.9) yields

$$(3.13) \quad L^\varepsilon F^R \leq -\chi_R^\infty.$$

Hence, for $y \in \gamma_2$

$$(3.14) \quad \begin{aligned} E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) &\leq -E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau_1^\varepsilon} L^\varepsilon F^R(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) \\ &= F^R(J_2) - E_y(F^R(z^\varepsilon(\tau_1^\varepsilon))) = F^R(J_2), \end{aligned}$$

by the Ito formula. The last equality above follows from the definition of F^R and τ_1^ε . From (3.14) we obtain the ε -independent estimate:

$$(3.15) \quad \sup_{x \in \gamma_2} E_x \left(\int_0^{\tau^\varepsilon} \chi_R^\infty(Z^\varepsilon(s)) ds \right) \leq F^R(J_2).$$

By (3.12) and $\lim_{J \rightarrow \infty} \delta(J) = \infty$ (due to Assumption A_1): $\lim_{R \rightarrow \infty} F^R(J_2) = 0$, and (3.11) follows. To complete the proof, we need to provide a lower bound on $E_x(\tau^\varepsilon)$. In order to evaluate such a bound, consider $\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon$, the escape time from $\Omega_{J_1}^R$ for fixed $F > J_2$. Choosing $\beta > 0$ large enough, we may estimate

$$(3.16) \quad L^\varepsilon(e^{\beta J}) \geq C > 0$$

for $J_1 \leq J \leq R$ (compare (3.4) and (3.5)). C is ε independent and, for $y \in \gamma_2$, $C^{-1}e^{\beta J_2}$ is a lower bound on $E_y(\tau_{1,R}^\varepsilon)$, independently of y and ε (compare (3.10) where the opposite inequality, (3.16), replaces (3.9)). A lower estimate on $E_x(\tau^\varepsilon)$, $x \in \gamma_1$, is obtained, independently of x and ε , by the strong Markov property. This completes the proof of Theorem 1.1. $\square$

PROOF OF THEOREM 1.2. By the conditions of the theorem, the process admits a strong solution for any $\varepsilon > 0$. In fact, the drift satisfies

$$|\overline{\nabla} H(z) + \varepsilon Q(z)| \leq K(1 + |z|), \quad z \in \mathbf{R}^2,$$

which, together with the Lipschitz conditions on $\bar{\nabla}H$ and Q , satisfies the conditions of Theorem 2.1, §5 of [3]. In particular, we obtain for every $T > 0$,

$$(3.17) \quad \lim_{R \rightarrow \infty} P_y(\tau_R^\varepsilon \geq T) = 1$$

where τ_R^ε is the escape time from a domain $\Omega_R \subset \mathbf{R}^2$, $\Omega_R \uparrow \mathbf{R}^2$. Let

$$(3.18) \quad \chi(J) = \int_{J_1}^J \frac{\langle Q \cdot \nabla J \rangle_s}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle_s} ds,$$

and define

$$(3.19) \quad U^*(J) = \int_{J_1}^J \frac{1}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle_s} e^{-\chi(s)} \int_s^\infty e^{\chi(u)} du.$$

Notice that U^* is well defined by (1.6).

Considering U^* as a function on the phase space via $U(J(z))$, a direct substitution yields

$$(3.20) \quad \begin{aligned} L^\varepsilon U^* &= |\nabla J|^2 \frac{d^2}{dJ^2} U^* + (\Delta J + Q \cdot \nabla J) \frac{d}{dJ} U^* \\ &= -\frac{|\nabla J|^2}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle} + \left\{ -\frac{\langle \Delta J + Q \cdot \nabla J \rangle}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle} + \frac{\Delta J + Q \cdot \nabla J}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle} \right\} e^{-\chi(J)} \int_J^\infty e^{\chi(s)} ds. \end{aligned}$$

In deriving (3.20) we used the identity

$$(3.21) \quad \langle \nabla J \cdot V \rangle = \frac{d}{dJ} \langle \operatorname{div} V \rangle,$$

for any smooth vector-valued V . The above identity follows from the divergence theorem (see also [5]). Hence

$$(3.22) \quad \langle L^\varepsilon U^* \rangle = -1.$$

LEMMA 3.1. *Under the assumptions of Theorem 1.2, there exists a constant C , independent of ε , where*

$$|L^\varepsilon U^*| + |z| |\nabla_z L^\varepsilon U^*| \leq C, \quad \forall z \in \Omega_{J_1}^\infty.$$

We defer the proof of Lemma 3.1 to Appendix A.

Let $\tau_1^\varepsilon = \tau$. (We suppress the ε dependence from now on.) In $\Omega_{J_1}^\infty$, consider the segment $l_{\theta_0}^\eta$ given by

$$l_{\theta_0}^\eta = \{J_1 + \eta \leq J \leq \infty, \theta = \theta_0\}$$

where $\eta > 0$ is a constant, and $J_1 + \eta < J_2$. Let

$$\begin{aligned} \tilde{\tau}^n &= \{\inf t, z(t) \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta, \exists 0 = t_0 < t_1 < t_2 < \cdots < t_n = t, \\ &\quad z(t_i) \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta \text{ and } |\arg z(t_i) - \arg z(t_{i-1})| \geq 2\pi\}, \quad 1 \leq i \leq n. \end{aligned}$$

Define $\tau^n = \tilde{\tau}^n \wedge \tau$. The stopping rule of $\tilde{\tau}^n$ is as follows: The process is stopped whenever $z(s)$ hits $l_{\theta_0}^\eta$ at the n th time, and each two successive hittings are separated by *at least* one revolution of $\pm 2\pi$.

By regularity of the process (see (3.17)):

$$(3.23) \quad \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \tau^n = \tau \quad \text{a.s.}$$

Notice that, at this point, τ may admit an infinite value. In fact, $\tau = \infty$ if the sample path never hits γ_1 . Let

$$(3.24) \quad \xi = L^\varepsilon U^* + 1.$$

Using the Ito formula with τ^n as a stopping time, we obtain $\forall x \in \gamma_2$:

$$(3.25) \quad E_x \tau^n = U^*(J_2) - E_x U^*(z(\tau^n)) + E_x \int_0^{\tau^n} \xi(z(s)) ds.$$

Since $U^* \geq 0$ on Ω_1^∞ , (3.25) yields

$$(3.26) \quad E_x(\tau^n) \leq U^*(J_2) + \left| E_x \int_0^{\tau^n} \xi(z(s)) ds \right|, \quad \forall x \in \gamma_2.$$

LEMMA 3.2. *Under the assumptions of Theorem 1.2,*

$$E_y \tau^n < \infty \quad \forall n, y \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta.$$

Moreover, there exist positive $\delta_1(\eta)$, $\delta_2(\varepsilon, \eta)$

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow 0} \delta_1(\eta) = 0, \quad \lim_{\varepsilon \rightarrow 0} \delta_2(\varepsilon, n) = 0 \quad \forall \eta > 0,$$

$$\left| E_x \int_0^{\tau^n} \xi(z(s)) ds \right| \leq \delta_1(\eta) + \delta_2(\varepsilon, \eta) E_x(\tau^n),$$

where $\underline{x}$ is the intersection of γ_2 with $l_{\theta_0}^\eta$. In addition, δ_1 and δ_2 are independent of θ_0 . (See the definition of $l_{\theta_0}^\eta$.)

From Lemma 3.2 we obtain a global bound on $E_y \tau^n$, independent of n and $y \in \gamma_2$, provided ε is small enough. In fact, by (3.26) and Lemma 3.2

$$(3.27) \quad E_x \tau^n \leq [\delta_1(\eta) + U^*(J_2)](1 - \delta_2(\varepsilon, \eta))^{-1},$$

provided ε is small enough. This leads to the boundedness of $E_x(\tau^n)$, $x = l_{\theta_0}^\eta \cap \gamma_2$, independent of n , and hence to a bound on $E_x(\tau)$ via (3.23). Since the conclusions of Lemma 3.2 are independent of θ_0 , we obtain a bound on $E_y(\tau)$, uniform on $y \in \gamma_2$, and the positive recurrence follows via [1]. The weak compactness of the associated invariant measures follows along a similar line. We define U_R^* , equivalently to (3.19), as

$$(3.19') \quad U_R^*(J) = \int_{J_1}^J \frac{1}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle_s} e^{-\chi(s)} \int_s^\infty 1[u \geq R] e^{\chi(u)} du.$$

We then obtain, equivalently to (3.22),

$$(3.22') \quad \langle L^\varepsilon U_R^* \rangle = -1_{[R, \infty)}.$$

Let

$$(3.24') \quad \xi^R = L^\varepsilon U_R^* + 1_{[R, \infty)}.$$

Then ξ^R satisfies the same estimate as ξ in Lemma 3.1. Following the argument of (3.23) $\rightarrow$ (3.27), we obtain

$$(3.28) \quad \sup_{x \in \gamma_2} E_x \tau_R \leq \left(\delta_1(\eta) + U_R^*(J_2) + \delta_2(\varepsilon, \eta) \sup_{y \in \gamma_2} E_y \tau \right) (1 - \delta_2(\varepsilon, \eta))^{-1},$$

where τ_R is the occupation time of Ω_R^∞ :

$$\tau_R = \int_0^\tau \chi_R^\infty(z^\varepsilon(s)) ds.$$

The right-hand side of (3.28) is arbitrarily small by choosing η , ε sufficiently small and R sufficiently large, using the already known bound on $\sup_{y \in \gamma_2} E_x(\tau)$ and

$$\lim_{R \rightarrow \infty} U_R^*(J_2) = 0.$$

Thus, the weak compactness of the invariant measures follows by the same argument as in Theorem 1.1. (See (3.10) and the remark thereafter.)

PROOF OF LEMMA 3.2. Let $0 \leq \alpha^\eta(J) \leq 1$ be a C^∞ function on $\Omega_{J_1}^\infty$ satisfying

$$\begin{aligned} \alpha^\eta(J) &= 1, & J &\geq J_1 + 5\eta, \\ 0 \leq \alpha^\eta(J) &\leq \delta/4M & \text{on } J_1 \leq J \leq J_1 + 4\eta, \\ \alpha^\eta(J_1) &= 0, \end{aligned}$$

where $M = \sup_{\Omega_{J_1}^\infty} |\xi|$, $M < \infty$, by Lemma 3.1. Let

$$(3.29) \quad \tilde{\xi} = \alpha^\eta \xi.$$

Then, for $y \in \gamma_2$

$$(3.30) \quad E_x \int_0^{\tau^n} \xi(z(s)) ds = E_x \int_0^{\tau^n} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds + E_x \int_0^{\tau^n} (1 - \alpha^\eta) \xi(z(s)) ds.$$

The second term on the right of (3.30) is estimated by

$$ME_x \int_0^{\tau^n} [1 - \alpha^\eta(z(s))] ds.$$

Define

$$U^\eta(J) = -M \int_{J_1}^J e^{-Ds} \int_s^\infty \frac{e^{Du}}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle(u)} (1 - \alpha^\eta(u)) du$$

where

$$D > \sup_{z \in \Omega_{J_1}^\infty} \left| \frac{\Delta J + Q \cdot \nabla J}{|\nabla J|^2} \right|$$

and $D < \infty$ by (1.10)–(1.12). U^η is well defined by definition of α^η . Moreover,

$$L^\varepsilon U^\eta = M(1 - \alpha^\eta) + (Q \cdot \nabla J + \Delta J - D|\nabla J|^2) \frac{d}{dJ} U^\eta \geq M(1 - \alpha^\eta),$$

by definition of D and the negativity of dU^η/dJ . Hence

$$ME_y \int_0^{\tau^n} (1 - \alpha^\eta(z(s))) ds \leq E_y \int_0^{\tau^n} L^\varepsilon U^\eta = E_y U^\eta(z(\tau^n)) - U^\eta(J_2) \leq -U^\eta(J_2).$$

Define now

$$\delta_1(\eta) = -U^\eta(J_2)/M.$$

By definition of α^η

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \delta_1(\eta) = 0$$

and from (3.31) we obtain the estimate

$$\left| E_y \int_0^{\tau^n} (1 - \alpha^\eta) \xi(z(s)) ds \right| \leq \delta_1(\eta).$$

In order to complete the proof we have to show the existence of $\delta_2(\varepsilon, \eta)$ for which

$$(3.32) \quad \left| E_x \int_0^{\tau^k} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds \right| \leq \delta_2(\varepsilon, \eta) E_x(\tau^k), \quad \forall k, x = l_{\theta_0}^\eta \cap \gamma_2,$$

and the boundedness of the right-hand side of (3.32). We proceed by induction on k as follows:

Assume $E_x(\tau^n) < \infty$ and (3.32) holds for $\delta_2(\varepsilon, \eta) = \delta$, $k = n$. Then

$$(3.33) \quad E_x \left| \int_0^{\tau^{n+1}} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds \right| \leq E_x \left| \int_0^{\tau^n} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds \right| + E_x \left(E_{z(\tau^n)} \left| \int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds \right| \right)$$

by the strong Markov property. Similarly

$$(3.34) \quad E_x(\tau^{n+1}) = E_x(\tau^n) + E_x(E_{z(\tau^n)} \tau^1).$$

By the induction hypothesis for $k = n$, we obtain (3.32) for $k = n + 1$, using (3.33), (3.34), provided

$$(3.35) \quad E_y \left| \int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds \right| \leq \delta E_y(\tau^1)$$

holds for each $y \in \text{Range}(z(\tau^1))$, where the r.h.s. of (3.35) is bounded. By definition of τ^n , $z(\tau^n) \subset \gamma_1 \cup l_{\theta_0}^\eta$. Since $x = \gamma_2 \cap l_{\theta_0}^\eta$, the proof of (3.35) yields also the first step of the induction. Thus, we conclude Lemma 3.2 by proving (3.35) and the boundedness of $E_y(\tau^1)$, $Ty \in \gamma_1 \cup l_{\theta_0}^\eta$. By definition of τ^1 , both sides of (3.35) are equal to zero if $y \in \gamma_1$. Therefore, (3.35) is nontrivial only if $y \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$.

In order to obtain a bound on $E_y(\tau^1)$, we consider the diffusion process in the covering domain

$$\hat{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty = \{J_1 \leq J < \infty, \infty < \theta < \infty\}.$$

The diffusion on $\Omega_{J_1}^\infty$ can be extended to $\hat{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty$ in a natural way. Define $\bar{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty \subset \hat{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty$ as

$$\bar{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty = \hat{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty - \left\{ \bigcup_{k \neq 0} l_{\theta_0 + 2\pi k}^\eta \right\}$$

where k runs over the nonzero integers.

Let $\hat{\tau}_1$ be the escape time to $\bar{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty$, due to the diffusion process in the covering space. By definition of τ^1 we obtain $\tau^1 = \hat{\tau}_1$ for any sample path of the diffusion starting at $l_{\theta_0}^\eta$ in both $\Omega_{J_1}^\infty$ and $\hat{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty$, respectively.

We proceed by defining a barrier function, V , on $\bar{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty$. If

$$(3.36) \quad L^\varepsilon V \geq 1,$$

and V is twice differentiable on $\bar{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty$, then by the Ito formula, for $y \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$,

$$(3.37) \quad E_y(\tau^1) = E_y(\hat{\tau}^1) \leq E_y(V(z(\tau^2))) - V(y) \leq 2 \sup_{w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta} V(w).$$

In (3.37) we identified the diffusions on the original and covering domains. On $\Omega_{J_1}^\infty$, V is not necessarily a single-valued function. We turn now to the definition of V .

Define $\Theta(J) \geq 0$ by

$$\begin{aligned} \Theta(J) &= 0, & J_1 \leq J \leq J_1 + \eta, \\ \Theta(J) &= 1, & J_1 + 2\eta \leq J < \infty, \\ \Theta &\text{ smooth and positive on } \eta + J_1 \leq J < \infty. \end{aligned}$$

Let $u = u(J)$:

$$L^\varepsilon u > 1 \quad \text{on } J_1 < J < J_1 + 2\eta.$$

For given $C > 0$ and $\varepsilon > 0$, define

$$V = \varepsilon C \Theta(J) \hat{\theta} + (1 - \Theta(J))u(J)$$

where $\hat{\theta}$ is given by

$$\begin{aligned} \hat{\theta} &= \theta \quad \text{on } -2\pi \leq \theta \leq 2\pi, \\ \hat{\theta} &= \theta \bmod 2\pi \quad \text{on } (\theta \geq 2\pi) \cup (\theta < -2\pi). \end{aligned}$$

Evidently, V is smooth on $\bar{\Omega}_{J_1}^\infty$, and globally bounded.

Consider $L^\varepsilon V$. Since $\bar{\nabla} H \cdot \nabla \equiv \omega(J)(\partial/\partial\theta)$ by definition, a simple computation yields

$$(3.38) \quad L^\varepsilon V = C \bar{\nabla} \omega + \varepsilon C (\Delta + Q \cdot \nabla) \Theta \hat{\theta} + L^\varepsilon \{(1 - \Theta)u\}.$$

By the lower bound on ω and the definition of Θ , the first term above is bounded from below on $J \geq J_1 + \eta + \delta$, for any $\delta > 0$. The last term of (3.38) exceeds 1 on an interval $(J_1, J_1 + \eta + \delta)$ for $\delta > 0$ small enough, by the definition of u . The middle term is uniformly bounded on $\Omega_{J_1}^\infty$ by (1.10), (1.11) and (1.13). Thus we may choose $\delta > 0$ small enough, then $\varepsilon > 0$ small enough to obtain (3.36).

In addition to the above bound, we need a lower bound

$$(3.39) \quad \inf_{w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta} E_w(\tau^1) \geq D\varepsilon$$

for some $D > 0$, independent of ε .

Consider the deterministic system obtained by removing the white noise component from the diffusion process

$$(3.40) \quad \dot{\bar{z}}^0 = \varepsilon^{-1} \bar{\nabla} H(\bar{z}^0) + Q(\bar{z}^0), \quad \bar{z}^0(0) = w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta.$$

Since Q increases at most linearly in $|z|$ by (1.10) we obtain by (1.13) the uniform bound on $Q \cdot \nabla_z \theta$. From (3.40), in terms of (J, θ)

$$\frac{d}{dt} \theta(\bar{z}^0(t)) = \frac{1}{\varepsilon} \omega(\bar{z}^0(t)) + Q \cdot \nabla_z \theta.$$

Since ω is bounded from below and $Q \cdot \nabla_z \theta$ is uniformly bounded, we observe that for ε small enough, the first hitting time of $l_{\theta_0}^\eta$ due to the deterministic process (3.40) is bounded from below uniformly on $w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$ provided ε is small enough. On

the other hand, comparing (3.40) to the original diffusion process with given $\varepsilon > 0$ we obtain

$$(3.41) \quad P_w \left(\sup_{0 \leq s \leq \varepsilon T} |z^\varepsilon(s) - \bar{z}^0(s)| \geq \nu \right) \leq C(\nu, T) \varepsilon^2.$$

(See [2, Chapter 2].) Since Q and $\bar{\nabla}H$ are both uniformly Lipschitz, the constant $C(\nu, t)$ above is independent of the choice of $w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$. From the above remark, we may define a constant $T > 0$ for which

$$\sup_{0 \leq t \leq \varepsilon T} |\theta(\bar{z}^0(t))| < 2\pi - \nu, \quad \forall \bar{z}^0(0) = w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta.$$

Using (3.41) we conclude

$$P_w(\tau^1 \geq \varepsilon T) \geq 1 - C(\nu/2, T) \varepsilon^2, \quad \forall w \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$$

and (3.39) follows. We complete the proof of Lemma 3.2 by proving (3.35) in Appendix B.

Appendix A. The uniform bound on (3.20) is an immediate consequence from the assumptions on J and Q (1.10, 11) and (1.6). Taking the z -derivative of the first term on the r.h.s. of (3.20) and using (3.21), we obtain

$$(A.1) \quad \nabla_z \frac{|\nabla J|^2}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle} = \frac{\nabla_z |\nabla J|^2}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle} - \frac{1}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle^2} |\nabla J|^2 \langle \Delta J \rangle \nabla J.$$

The r.h.s. of (A.1) is estimated by $O(|z|^{-1})$, using (1.11) and (1.12).

Next, consider

$$(A.2) \quad e^{-\chi(J)} \int_J^\infty e^{\chi(s)} ds = - \left[\frac{d}{dJ} \chi \right]^{-1} + \beta(J)$$

where

$$(A.3) \quad \beta(J) \equiv e^{-\chi(J)} \int_J^\infty e^{\chi(s)} \frac{d}{dJ} \left(\left[\frac{d}{dJ} \chi \right]^{-1} \right) (s) ds.$$

By definition and our assumptions

$$(A.4) \quad \frac{d\chi}{dJ} = \frac{\langle Q \cdot \nabla J \rangle}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle} = O(1).$$

Using Green's equality (3.21), we obtain

$$\frac{d^2 \chi}{dJ^2} = \frac{\langle \operatorname{div} \cdot Q \rangle}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle} + \frac{\langle Q \cdot \nabla J \rangle \langle \Delta J \rangle}{\langle |\nabla J|^2 \rangle^2}$$

and, by the assumptions of the theorem

$$(A.5) \quad \frac{d^2 \chi}{dJ^2}(z) = O(|z|^{-2}).$$

Hence

$$(A.6) \quad \left| \nabla_z \frac{d}{dJ} \chi \right| = \left| \nabla J \frac{d^2}{dJ^2} \chi \right| = O(|z|^{-1}).$$

Since $|d\chi/dJ|$ is bounded from below for $|z|$ large enough (see 1.6), we obtain a uniform bound on the first term on the r.h.s. of (A.2). By (A.5) and (1.6), $\beta(J) = O(|z|^{-2})$. By (A.6) and the lower bound on $|d\chi/dJ|$ we also obtain

$$(A.7) \quad \nabla_z [d\chi/dJ]^{-1} = O(|z|^{-1}).$$

As for $\beta(J)$

$$(A.8) \quad \nabla_z \beta = \left\{ \beta \frac{d\chi}{dJ} - \frac{d}{dJ} \left[\frac{d}{dJ} \chi \right]^{-1} \right\} \nabla_z J.$$

Using the $O(|z|^{-1})$ estimate on β , (A.5) and (1.11), we get

$$(A.9) \quad |\nabla_z \beta| = O(|z|^{-1}).$$

Hence

$$(A.10) \quad \nabla_z \left[e^{-\chi(s)} \int_J^\infty e^{\chi(s)} ds \right] = O(|z|^{-1}).$$

Finally, we have to estimate the term in curly brackets of (3.20):

$$(A.11) \quad |\nabla_z \{\cdot\}| = O(|z|^{-1}).$$

(A.11) is easily verified by using (3.21) together with (1.11), (1.12) and (1.10).

Appendix B. We split $y \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$ into two cases.

Case (a). $y \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$, $J(y) \leq J_1 + 2\eta$. Then

$$(B1) \quad \begin{aligned} E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds \right) &= E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds; \sup_{0 < t \leq \tau^1} J(z(t)) < J_1 + 4\eta \right) \\ &+ E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds; \exists 0 < t \leq \tau^1, J(z(t)) = J_1 + 4\eta \right). \end{aligned}$$

By definition of $\tilde{\xi}$ (see (3.29)), we estimate the first term in (B.1) by $\delta E_y(\tau^1)/2$. As for the second term, consider

$$\begin{aligned} &P_y(\exists 0 < t \leq \tau^1, J(z(t)) = J_1 + 4\eta) \\ &\leq \sup_{\{\omega; J(w) = J_1 + 3\eta\}} P_w(\exists 0 < t \leq \tau^1, J(z(t)) = J_1 + 4\eta) \\ &\leq \sup_{\{\omega; J(w) = J_1 + 3\eta\}} P_w \left(\sup_{0 \leq s \leq \varepsilon T} |z(s) - \bar{z}^0(s)| \geq \frac{\eta}{2} \right) \leq C(\eta, T) \varepsilon^2 \end{aligned}$$

by (3.41), provided εT is chosen so that the orbit of (3.40) completes at least one revolution at this time. By (B.2) and the Cauchy-Schwarz inequality, we estimate the second term of (B.1) by

$$(B.3) \quad \begin{aligned} M[E_y(\tau^1)^2]^{1/2} [C(\eta, T) \varepsilon^2]^{1/2} &\leq CM \sup_{z \in \Omega_{J_1}^\infty} [E_z(\tau^1)]^{1/2} [E_y(\tau^1)]^{1/2} \varepsilon \\ &\leq C(\eta) [E_y(\tau^1)]^{1/2} \varepsilon. \end{aligned}$$

In (B.3) we used the inequality

$$E_y(|\tau|^2) \leq \sup_{z \in \Omega} E_z(\tau) \cdot E_y(\tau),$$

where τ is the escape time from an arbitrary domain Ω . The r.h.s. of (B.3) is now estimated by

$$(B.4) \quad C(\eta)[E_y(\tau^1)]^{1/2}\varepsilon \leq C(\eta)D^{-1/2}\varepsilon^{1/2}E_y(\tau^1) \leq \delta E_y(\tau^1)/2$$

using (3.39), provided ε is small enough. This completes the proof of Case (a).

Case (b). $y \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta$, $J(y) > J_1 + 2\eta$. Let T_y^ε be the hitting time of $l_{\theta_0+2\pi}^\eta$ due to the deterministic system (3.40), $\bar{z}_0(0) = y$. By the assumptions of the theorem, we obtain a uniform bound

$$(B.5) \quad \sup_{y \in l_{\theta_0}^\eta} T_y^\varepsilon < \varepsilon \bar{T}.$$

In fact, the frequency $\omega(J)$ is bounded from below and $Q \cdot \nabla_z \theta$ is uniformly bounded by (1.10), (1.13). Hence

$$\frac{d}{dt}\theta(\bar{z}^0(t)) \geq \varepsilon^{-1} \inf_z \omega - \sup_z |Q \cdot \nabla_z \theta| \geq \varepsilon^{-1}C$$

and (B.5) follows upon inserting $\bar{T} = 2\pi/C$.

On the space of orbits starting at y we define the event

$$\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon = \left\{ z; \sup_{0 \leq s \leq 2\varepsilon \bar{T}} |z(s) - \bar{z}^0(s)| \leq \frac{\delta}{4 \sup_z |\nabla \tilde{\xi}| + N} \right\}$$

where $N > 4$ will be determined later on.

By (3.39) with $\nu = \delta/N$ we obtain

$$P_y(\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon) \geq 1 - C(\delta/N)\varepsilon^2.$$

An analysis similar to (B.2)–(B.4) yields

$$(B.6) \quad E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds, \mathcal{M}^\varepsilon \right) \leq M \left[C \left(\frac{\delta}{N} \right) \right]^{1/2} [E_y(\tau^1)]^{1/2} \varepsilon \leq \frac{\delta}{3} E_y(\tau^1),$$

provided ε is small enough. We estimate now

$$(B.7) \quad E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} \xi(z(s)) ds, \mathcal{M}^\varepsilon \right) = E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} (\tilde{\xi}(z(s)) - \tilde{\xi}(\bar{z}_0(s))) ds, \mathcal{M}^\varepsilon \right) \\ + E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(\bar{z}^0(s)) ds, \mathcal{M}^\varepsilon \right).$$

The first term on the right of (B.7) is estimated by

$$(B.8) \quad \sup |\nabla \tilde{\xi}| E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} |z(s) - \bar{z}^0(0)| ds, \mathcal{M}^\varepsilon \right) \leq \frac{\delta}{4} E_y(\tau^1).$$

In fact, the definitions of $\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon$ and τ^1 together with the special choice of y due to Case (b), yield for ε small enough:

$$(B.9) \quad \sup_{\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon} \tau^1 \leq 2\varepsilon \bar{T},$$

so the integral in (B.8) is bounded by $\delta/(4\sup|\nabla\tilde{\xi}|)$, by definition. The second term in (B.7) is written as

$$(B.10) \quad E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} (\tilde{\xi}(\bar{z}^0(s)) - \tilde{\xi}(z^0(s))) ds, \mathcal{M}_\varepsilon \right) + E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(z^0(s)) ds, \mathcal{M}_\varepsilon \right).$$

where $z^0(s)$ is the orbit of the unperturbed system

$$(B.11) \quad \dot{z}^0 = \frac{1}{\varepsilon} \bar{\nabla} H(z^0), \quad z^0(0) = y.$$

To estimate the first term in (B.10) we have to compare the deviation of $z^0(s)$ from $\bar{z}^0(s)$ on a $2\varepsilon\bar{T}$ time interval. Using the assumptions of the theorem (in particular, the uniform Lipschitz conditions on Q and $\bar{\nabla}H$), we obtain

$$\sup_{0 \leq s \leq 2\varepsilon\bar{T}} |z^0(s) - \bar{z}^0(s)| \leq \varepsilon C|y|, \quad z^0(0) = y,$$

for ε and $|y|$ independent of C . Taking into account the estimate on $|\nabla\tilde{\xi}|$ due to Lemma 3.1, we obtain

$$(B.12) \quad \begin{aligned} & E_y \left(\int_0^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(\bar{z}^0(s)) - \tilde{\xi}(z(s)) ds, \mathcal{M}_\varepsilon \right) \\ & \leq \sup_{|z| \geq |y|/2} |\nabla\tilde{\xi}(z)| \sup_{0 \leq s \leq 2\varepsilon\bar{T}} |z^0(s) - \bar{z}^0(s)| E_y \tau^1 \\ & \leq \varepsilon C' E_y \tau^1 \leq \frac{\delta}{4} E_y \tau^1, \quad \forall y \in I_{\theta_0}^\eta. \end{aligned}$$

The second term in (B.10) is written as

$$(B.13) \quad \int_0^{T_y^0} \tilde{\xi}(z^0(s)) ds + E_y \left(\int_{T_y^0}^{\tau^1} \tilde{\xi}(z^0(s)) ds, \mathcal{M}^\varepsilon \right),$$

where T_y^0 is the period of (B.11). The first term in (B.13) is identically zero by the definition of $\tilde{\xi}$. The second term in is estimated by

$$(B.14) \quad \sup_{\Omega_1^\infty} |\tilde{\xi}| \sup_{\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon} |\tau^1 - T_y^0| \leq \sup_{\Omega_1^\infty} |\tilde{\xi}| \left(\sup_{\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon} |\tau^1 - T_y^\varepsilon| + |T_y^\varepsilon - T_y^0| \right)$$

where T_y^ε is, as before, the hitting time of $I_{\theta_0}^\eta$ due to (3.40). By the definition of τ^1 and $\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon$, $\sup_{\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon} |\tau^1 - T_y^\varepsilon|$ is estimated by the time in which the orbits of (3.40) cross a δ/N neighborhood of $I_{\theta_0}^\eta$. This time is estimated by $\varepsilon O(\delta/N)$ uniformly in $y \in I_{\theta_0}^\eta$. Taking N large, we bound this time by

$$\varepsilon O \left(\frac{\delta}{N} \right) < \frac{1}{4} \frac{D}{\sup|\tilde{\xi}|} \delta$$

where D is defined in (3.39). Hence:

$$(B.15) \quad \sup_{\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon} |\tilde{\xi}| \sup_{\mathcal{M}^\varepsilon} |\tau^1 - T_y^\varepsilon| \leq \frac{\delta}{4} E_y(\tau^1).$$

To obtain a bound on $|T_y^\varepsilon - T_y^0|$, we use the assumption on H and Q . It is easy to see that $|T_y^\varepsilon - T_y^0|$ is estimated by $O(\varepsilon^2)$, uniformly in $y \in I_{\theta_0}^\eta$. Hence for ε small enough

$$(B.16) \quad \sup |\tilde{\xi}| |T_y^\varepsilon - T_y^0| \leq \frac{\delta}{4} D\varepsilon \leq \frac{\delta}{4} E_y(\tau^1), \quad \forall y \in I_{\theta_0}^\eta.$$

Combining (B.6) with (B.8), (B.12) and (B.16) we complete the desired estimate on $E_y(\int_0^{\tau_1} \tilde{\xi}(z^\varepsilon(s)))$.

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
