We initiated 3 new book series, Aircraft in Detail and Armor in Detail, which will feature the Museum armor and aircraft not covered in the Lock On and Warmachines series. "The System"



Volume I, begins a new "How To" series starting with figure painting. These will be nice supplements to the Verlinden Way, Showcase and Modeling Specials series. And last, but certainly not least, we have finally entered the Napoleonic era in 120mm with a Grenadier Guard, followed soon by an Officer of the Grenadier Guards and then a Napoleonic 8 Pound Cannon (Gribeauval system).

For 1994, we plan many new releases in the Napoleonic and Fantasy ranges, and in the Superscale tank department, an M3A1 Stuart, Panther G and an M113. Of course, many new figures and accessories will be forthcoming in that scale as well. We will resurrect the somewhat neglected 1/4 scale small arms series with a .30 cal. Water cooled machine gun, U.S. WWII. Many new armor and aircraft updates are in the works and there will be more 35th figure releases than usual. We have targeted another neglected area, (time is our worst enemy!), 1/35th diorama accessories, Lamp posts, Street signs, Street accessories, Traffic signals, Office furniture, Pianos, and much more. Research and Development is working on the possibilities of 1/15th scale Sherman, Willys Jeep and Kettenkrad, and maybe we will surprise you with even others. On the drawing boards are a 1/35th 15cm s.F.H. 18 Schwere Feldhaubitze and a Karl Heavy Mörser. Also a Complete Easy Eight Sherman and a Sherman Crab conversion. Although items in research are never products for certain, the vast majority will be released. We adapt to the market demand for some items and for that reason we will always have some surprises. I can assure you it's going to be a "Big" year for our customers. There are so many things ready for production, the most difficult task is choosing what to release first. What other company in the model industry releases an average of 140 new items a year? Even half of that number? I'm not bragging, just explaining why we are so unbelievably busy around here.

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"Bonjour, petites!" ("Hello, little ones!") Converting to a Free French Sherman




Fig. 2 Pre-painted M4A2 hull and rear engine bulkhead togehter wih driver's and co-driver's hatches, as can be found in VP Set N° 333 and which was used for this conversion of a French Sherman Medium tank.

ere you see a typical scene during the Allied push to during the Amed A Germany. A free French Forces M4A2 Sherman is passing the ruins of a small factory which shielded a rather hastily abandoned German Flak Position. A small touch of sentiment is also provided in the form of the real "losers" in any war, orphaned children. However, the main focal point is the ruin itself, Trophy N° 20030, Small Factory Ruin. Under the 'Lend-Lease' program the Allies not only recieved clothing, food and ammo, but also tanks, vehicles and other armored equipment. The Sherman found its way into those ranks, mostly in the M4A2 and M4A4 versions. It was well-loved by its crews, regardless of nationality. The one shown here is a combination of a TAMIYA M4A3 made into an M4A2 using VP kit N° 333 (M4A2 welded hull) and a VP turret (N°334 Early M34 gun shield turret).

The second point of interest on this diorama is of course the Factory Ruin, N° 20030. It can be seen embedded within piles of debris all coming from TROPHY N°'s 20027, 20028, 20034. A good balance was obtained in this scene between the ruin, models and figures. The importance of balance in a diorama can never be over emphasized.




Fig.3 An overall frontal view of the Sherman showing VP N° 134, US Tank Crew WWII and the highly detailed .50 cal Machine Gun, VP N°372. To the right, behind the TAMIYA telephone pole with VP direction signs, are logs which were cut from a tree branch found in the backyard. All rear deck stowage from VP. The Trophy's Cobblestone Road Section looks very convincing, and saves a lot of time and effort.

Fig. 4 The hastily abandoned TAMIYA Flak was set at maximum firing position. The awning covering the logs was first built up from Basswood strips covered by TROPHY Corregated sheet cut in sections. Because of its pre-printed color, the sheets only needed to be cut, glued in position and lightly weathered with pastels.






Fig.5 More details are revealed on this low-angle rear view of the Sherman itself. Tank insignia is taken from the "French Tank Markings" sheet (VP N°289) and can be applied quite easily. Spare ammo boxes on the turret include N°88 US Small Arms Ammo Boxes, N° 305 Cal.30/.50/20mm Ammo Boxes. "Ready to paint" shell casings are from box N°94, 75mm Tank Ammo.

Amazing how a nice model and a well planned background can create a certain "one of those wartime days" atmosphere.

To the left you sense the urgency of the Sherman crew to keep pushing forward, contrasted by a feeling of solitude from the children and abandoned Flak gun. Capturing the "mood" requires careful planning and involves finding the proper products to complete the scene. This was much more difficult some ten years ago, but today, the diorama accessories are seemingly endless.

Fig.6 The remains of what must have been a remote corner of the factory. The furniture was made from bits and pieces of plasticard. Posters come from VP set N° 14. An interesting feature is the roof which was built-up from Basswood strips covered with TROPHY N°20021, Corregated Sheet Metal. Being made of vacuformed plastic, they can easily be bent by careful heating for more realism.




the Stackstar Rebellion

This shadow box diorama depicts the Blackstar Raiders coming to the rescue of their comrad, Section leader Jali, of the Queens lifeguards. She has been condemned to a slow death for refusing to betray the location of her Queen and the rebel outposts to Ursona, the High Priestess of Zarlon and Dragor, the Dungeon Master.

THE DIORAMA


The shadowbox itself, walls and floors of the temple were all constructed of plywood.

Beginning with the Temple floor, a hole was cut in the center and random flashing LED's were built into the sub base underneath. Clear resin was poured onto a glass plate and textured with a wooden spatula, then, just before the resin cured, a metal tube was inserted in random locations and used to blow air bubbles into the surface. This is a trial and error system and as soon as the bubbles begin to stand, you must work quickly. Styrene walls were added, textured also with the resin and when dry, given a heavy wash of Raw Umber.


Later, the entire pit was drybrushed with varying shades of Humbrol fluorescent reds and oranges. The floor was then covered with Trophy red tiles in a circular pattern radiating outward from the pit. A very fine grouting was applied and after drying, a wash of Raw Umber and a coat of polyurethane varnish completed the mosaic. The walls are a combination of plaster stone and balsa planks, beaten with a hammer to simulate a rough sawn texture. VP supplied me with the plaster columns, (these may be a future release), which were airbrushed to simulate marble and then also given a coat of varnish. The walls of the balcony were made from stones cast from plaster, painted flat black and drybrushed with a mixture of silver and Raw Umber. The stalagmites were made from tree bark. A small ultraviolate lamp was attached to the ceiling to enhance the fluorescent paint in the lava pit. Several 12 volt bayonet type lamps were attached, out of sight of the viewer to spotlight the various focal points. Each is controlled by an individual potentiameter to allow full control of the lighting. Some 15 grain of wheat bulbs were also used to highlight the columns, walls and corridors.


THE FIGURES

Two VP "Raiders of Zarlon" were used, one straight from the box and the other posed with an added shield and hair fashioned from Milliput epoxy putty, (2 heads come with the kit, one with the helmet and another without). Four Krijlian dungeon guards, each posed and the one facing the viewer was fitted with flashing LED eyes, The Prisoner, The Dungeonmaster, also posed and with LED eyes; and finally, the female figure, "The Worm has turned". She had to be posed and converted for the scene and although it doesn't really fit with the story line, I liked this figure so well I just had to include her. The green ray emanating from the Dungeonmaster's finger and striking the Raider's shield was accomplished by using a green tinted rectangle of Plexiglass, polished on both edges and coated with flat black paint. After completion, it is inserted through a slot in the wall, so only the edge is visible. The rear edge is flush with a small fluorescent bulb, and when the switch is thrown, the light from the bulb is transferred through the plexiglass to the leading edge, simulating the effect of a green ray. A grain of wheat is affixed to either end of the "ray" and covered with fiberglass insulation to diffuse the light from the bulbs. At the shield, several clusters of fiber optics were attached to the grain of wheat bulb to give the effect of sparks from the ray blast.



This diorama amounted to two "firsts" for me, my first shadowbox and my first fantasy piece. I really had fun with this one. There is a lot of suspense during construction because until it was completed, I never knew for certain how it would look. The lighting has so much to do with the final appearance, you are "working in the dark", so to speak, throughout the project.





"The Chronicles of Zarlon"

Of these, **Zarlon**, the second planet from the sun and extremely warm, is the only one that is habitable. It has four satellites or moons, each also capable of sustaining life. Zarlon is inhabited by reptilian creatures with bird like features. In the Fourth millennium, this race, led by

bird like features. In the Fourth millennium, this race, led by the **Warlord Thalo**, enslaved the inhabitants of all four moons. The first moon, **Dralo**, was populated by giant, dragon like creatures. The second moon was known as **Krijl**, whose natives were small, but very vicious amphibians. The third moon, **Kreja**, had no intelligent life until the Zarlons began mining operations there, transplanting the humanoids from the fourth moon, **Taria**, as slaves. The Tarians were of two distinct types, warriors and pacifists, although they were identical in appearance. Legends told that the difference was determined by each individual's genetic receptiveness to the black crystalline substance found in abundance on their lunar world. The


mineral, called Blackstar by the inhabitants, emanated

radiation that influenced their agressive tendancies.

After being relocated to the **Krejan mines**, the Tarians, separated from the rays of Blackstar, began to undergo a physical as well as psychological metamorphosis. Even the most aggressive were reduced to mindless, robot-like creatures. After only two or three generations they were transformed to half the physical stature of their brothers and sisters who remained on Taria. These mutants were called **Kreejans** and were easily controlled by their slavemasters. However, on Taria, the warriors hid in the vast mountain ranges, constantly under the influence of the crystals. They routinely abducted their pacifist comrades and subjected them to extreme exposure of the Blackstar rays, and they eventually became as one, in the fight for the **Rebellion**. Before their subjugation, the Tarians lived peaceful lives, ruled by a malevolent King and Queen. Their Regent, the wizard **Pyaan**, advised them and their young daughter,

Lani, and life was good. Then an evil sorceress from Zarlon seduced Pyaan and they had a girl child whom they called Ursona (who, twenty years later, would betray her people and become the High Priestess of Zarlon). Then suddenly, everything began to change. An evil spell cast by the Soceress over the entire world of Taria took its toll. Brother fought Brother, turmoil and famine spread throughout the land. Then came the Warlord Thalo and his Zarlon hoards, and the end came quickly. The King and Queen were executed along with all members of their court. Luckily, the magician Pyaan, managed to free the young Princess Lani from her captors and take her to the mountains where she was raised by the warrior tribes, always on the run from the Zarlon armies.

Twenty years later, Lani has grown into womanhood and has been declared by the Free Tarians as their Queen, and has come to lead the rebel forces against the tyrant Thalo. She is known to her enemies by the same name as the life giving force, **Blackstar**. Her boyhood playmate, **Talnn**, is now the chief of the guerrilla brigade, (an arm of the rebel forces), which constantly harrasses the Warlord's military bases and prisons on Zarlon with surprise raids. He has became known throughout the star system as "The Raider of Zarlon", and Lord Thalo has placed a heavy bounty on his head. Talnn has sworn to kill the **Dungeon Master** Dragor, whose vile cruelty is the dread of the Tarians, and who is holding his lover, Jali, Section Leader of the Queens Lifeguards as **Prisoner** for execution in the lava pit. The Dralans and the Krijllians have became followers of Thalo, leaving the Free Tarians as the only obstacle in Thalos quest for subjugation of the entire star system. The chances of the Rebels appear dismal indeed, but Pyaan, the magician, now has a plan to transport the Black crystals of Taria to the rebel bases to renew the energy and strength of Queen Lani's forces.




The Train

a diorama by Lewis PRUNEAU, USA

That can you say about a Lewis Pruneau diorama? Not much, they leave you speechless. Lewis' models are definitely unique in the world and "The Train" is no exception!

Crafted from sheet styrene and PVC pipe in 120mm scale, the mere size of it is awesome. He used eight VP 120mm figures, seven of which are converted from the Legion Wallonie, Eastern Front figure. The two concrete bunkered quad flak guns are also from scratch and the railroad station from plywood coated with scribed plaster stones. Lewis premiered his new blockbuster at Mastercon II and it was immediately acquired for the new model museum opening next summer at VLS. The diorama is about 7 feet long (210 cm) and almost 3 feet wide (91 cm).

The interior of the locomotive cab is completely detailed (of course!) with all the gauges, throttles and controls. Certainly a diorama with impact.





Left: A birdseye view of the massive model. Lewis got the inspiration for this diorama from the movie, "The Train", with Burt Lancaster. Although freight trains were used in the movie, a full freight train in 120 mm would be a little impractical. Don't mention that to Lewis, he might take it as a challenge!

Right: Rank has its priveleges! The insignia on the cab of the locomotive was cast from a 1 to 1 scale German cap piece, and then sanded paper thin. Note the gauges and controls inside the cab.

Below: A rear shot showing the concrete reinforced implacements for the twin quad flak guns. The railroad tracks were made from basswood with Plastruct T-beams for the rails. All the Wehrmacht troops were converted from the same VP figure.

With this diorama I wanted to illustrate a German artillery unit trying to cross such a tank ditch with the assistance of engineers.

Using wooden logs they constructed a temporary pier supporting two custommade side ramps. A 3 ton halftrack, towing a 10,5cm howitzer, is being guided over the ramps under the watchful eye of an officer. Four howitzer crewmen have descended from the vehicle to make it lighter and

are keeping an eye on the substitute pier to warn the driver of shifting logs. However, it is unlikely the crew on board will be able to do little more than jump when the improvised bridge collapses.

The event is drawing a lot of attention because even the crew of the SdKfz 221 in the background have halted to witness a safe crossing.

Quite some time and effort went into constructing the vehicles because of

fitting and cleaning problems. Finishing them took less time following the explanations in various VP references which were also used to paint the figures (converted from various parts), involving some personal experimenting in shadowing.

Applying the groundwork over the styrofoam base (cut to shape and glued in place with white glue) was done with some consideration, constantly referring to real life photographs.




This time we focus on one of the most famous museums on the globe and one of the world's largest military vehicle collections. Today the small town of Saumur (located some 60 kilometers from Angers, Le Mans and Tours) houses the elite of the French armored cavalry, but it was once the home of the King's musketeers, the Emperor's cavaliers and cavalry cadets in WWII.

In 1965 the High Command itself entrusted Colonel Michel AUBRY the task of collecting these tanks and armored fighting vehicles, witnesses of a recent past, saving them from the scrapyard or the artillery target area. Although established as early as1968, it took until 1987 before the museum was inaugurated and opened to the public, presenting the cream of tank warfare.

The models currently on display are part of the immense C.D.E.B. collection of over 800 military vehicles (some 500 tanks), 300 combat vehicles and some 30 artillery pieces.






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


In comparison with other museums, the most important Allied vehicles have been gathered here and, what is quite unique, it's the only place in the world to have Germany's PANTHER and KING TIGER (two of an impressive collection of German tanks) in running condition.

The museum is open seven days a week, throughout the year from 09.00 a.m. until 12.00 p.m. and from 14.00 p.m. to 18.00 p.m.. A modeling / book shop is also at hand.







In focus: U.S. AIR FORCE Cabin Leakage Tester


In this third article of the series we concentrate on auxiliary equipment rarely seen outside the cross-servicing hangars, but everpresent with a unit on deployment to a foreign airbase.

These three photos show a Cabin Leakage Tester which is used, as the name indicates, to check cockpit pressurization.

The last thing you want to happen as a pilot flying at high altitude is to experience an instant decompression of the cockpit.







Each jet aircraft canopy has a seal surrounding the cabin and an onboard environmental control system maintaining ground pressure inside the cockpit. Visual check-up of the seal prior to power-on and take-off may not reveal small cracks in the seal which will blow at higher altitudes with devastating effect.

When malfunction of the system or damage of the seal is suspected the aircraft will be subjected to tests in the cross-servicing facilities unless, as shown here, you operate a different aircraft and different testing units.

No kit manufacturer has yet released this unit in small scale but building it from scratch should be no problem knowing the wheels on this cart are equal in size to those of the Low Pressure Air Compressor in the previous issue.




Some on-board systems are presumatically operated and ground testing of these components can only be achieved using a sufficient supply of air pressure. This cart features a small air container and an engine to fill it. When scratchbuilding this one several small items should be added, like the muffler with protective guard on top, the tow pintle at the rear and the parking brake on the side. Also important are the pressure relief valves and the drain valve on the air container. The hardest part will be the application of the stenciling which is not readily available.














market (the so-called popular series), kit releases in ✓ larger scales like 1/32nd and 1/24th are few. Only the big manufacturers like REVELL, TAMIYA (with their splendid new F-15E STRIKE EAGLE release) and HASEGAWA have ventured into this area of the modeling business.

The reason why these scales are not so popular, despite the ability to achieve a higher level of detail, must be their size. Let's face it, unless you have a hobby room the size of a poolroom, you will have problems storing them properly. With some effort you can fit them on your shelf like they park aircraft on a carrier, but three full-size dioramas take an awful lot of space.

The small vignettes being used for 1/35th armor models on previous occasions may be part of the solution.

Hasegawa's 1/32nd Messerschmitt Bf109E is a good basic kit but detail is not very accurate, especially in the cockpit. This can be solved by using the VP Update Set (N°741) which has a complete new cockpit floor, a combination of



ompared to 1/48th and 1/72nd scale aircraft on the photoetched and resin components to detail the sidewalls. A complete and more accurate seat is provided with photoetched straps and belts which can easily be shaped in any desired position (even hanging out of the cockpit).

> A brass etched main instrument panel is included together with a clear film featuring pre-printed instruments to glue behind the panel, enhancing authenticity (purists may want to include some lighting behind).

> Two different types of canopy framing (interior and exterior) is given to build either the E3 or E4 type. The armor plate behind the pilot is not forgotten.

> Most interesting for diorama builders is the inclusion of a complete DB601 Daimler engine (some 15 parts) which can be shown in or outside its compartment. A new tropical filter (etched screens) with cap is another addition.

> Finally, new main landing gear legs with etched covers will take care of the poorly shaped and oversized kit parts.

> The diorama has been kept simple. After determining the size and shape, the base was cut from a piece of Marine styrofoam using a jigsaw. The edges sanded smooth with fine grain sandpaper and painted flat black with waterbased paint (other paints could melt the styrofoam).

> Strips of wood used for model ships were cut to length and glued to the base to serve as a kind of parking/working platform. The Luftwaffe used this system frequently for their makeshift airbases. The wood then received a wash of Humbrol matt 29 + Black 33. Remove excess wash with a clean cloth while still wet. The remainder of the base was then painted with a water based earth color (very dark brown). After drying, the surface was given a thin coat of white glue, a small section at a time, alternately applying the glue, then pressing a mixture of VP green and winter static grass gently into the still wet surface. When the entire base is completely covered, (except for the boards, of course), allow to dry overnight and then blow away any excess.

Fig.1 The partly painted/drybrushed grass with color pallet.





Fig.2 A birdseye view of the general scene and the Messerschmitt in particular. Note the accessories on and next to the "workbench" in the background, the VP figures at the trailing edge of the aircraft's wing and the bike parked against the oil drums.



To achieve a realistic look and scale effect, static grass must be painted and drybrushed. You must practice to get the right technique. The following colors were used: Humbrol French Artillery Green, matt 29 and flat yellow.

First execute an overall drybrushing using a wide, flat brush with matt 29. Let dry, then, another pass with French Artillery Green, again allow to dry and the third pass with the same color adding yellow. There are many varieties of grass tones all the way from very dark brown/green to almost pure yellow, depending on climate and season. To finish the base use very thin flat black for oil and fuel stains.

The Kubelwagen is from Italeri, figures are from VP No. 780 German Pilot and Crew Chief. Oil drums of 1/35th and 1/48th are also VP as is the welding unit. Platform and workbench are made from plastic sheet. Various tools, bits and pieces from the scrapbox and VP's photoetched 1/35th scale Tool Set (N°790) were first painted and affixed to the base with white glue.

Fig.3 A closer view on the cockpit and nose area. Note the realistic canopy framing which is glued in place using only drops of glue at the outer tips, rather than having the Superglue flow all along the edges (some glue may flow on the clear part which means disaster).




Gerald Paddack's US B-17 Crewman took a Silver and his TA-4J Skyhawk captured a Gold. His boss is seated beside him.





Daybreak Defense

little knowledge of (and interest in?) the military equipment of the early 40's, seem to be more attracted to the conflict they witnessed on CNN, 24 hours a day, for weeks in a row.

Jan GOOS, fascinated by the size and performance of the M1A1 ABRAMS tank was looking for an opportunity to use it in combination with the M998. Somehow, a flat sand base with two vehicles on top of it did not seem interesting enough, until the idea of an M1 defending a remote entrance of a large US air base in Saudi Arabia crossed his mind while working on a 1/48th aircraft model. After confering with fellow modelers he added a flagpole and two railway scenery lampposts which, when lit, create a lifelike early morning atmosphere.

He did not hesitate to combine Tamiya's M1A1 w/ mine plow and VP's M1 Update Set, almost simultaneously released. Using WARMACHINES N°6 (VP 581) and the detail photos of both the mine plow and M1A1 interior in the previous VP magazine, he updated the tank model. Instead of painting them in a desert livery, both vehicles were finished as they were used over here in Germany before they were rushed to

Saudi. It is common knowledge that in the early days of the conflict vehicles and men were operating in their regular camouflage outfits. Heavy dusting with pastels and previous drybrushing made the vehicles blend with the surroundings. All accessories on the tank and jeep were taken from the VP range (as listed), finished separately, stowed and blended. It was easy to convert the figures from a large collection of Desert Shield and Desert Storm figures (used in combination) and finishing them in different outfits. Building the fence from strip, rod and mesh wire took less time than the "command post" which was built using a lot of putty.

The "STOP" signs on the pavement were spraypainted using a thin cardboard template. When executing the groundwork special attention was devoted to the area behind the tank were the tracks ruptured the ground. Real desert sand, some rubble and water-diluted white glue did the job.

A finishing touch was added by the razor wire (be very careful when shaping it, it's extremely sharp, just like the real thing!) and the US flag hanging from the pole.

Quite a lot of work was involved but the result was satisfactory.

On to another one!

First of the **February 1994** releases is a mounted **Hun Warrior in 120mm**, dated four centuries AD.


