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Wedding Cake Tips:

Keep a tier of your wedding cake to celebrate at your first anniversary. Refrigerate overnight to firm. Wrap the cake security in plastic wrap then place in a freezer bag (use two if you'd like). Use a straw or vacuum to remove all excess air from the bag; any excess oxygen will steal moisture from the cake. Place the cake, wrap and bags into a plastic container seal, and store in freezer.

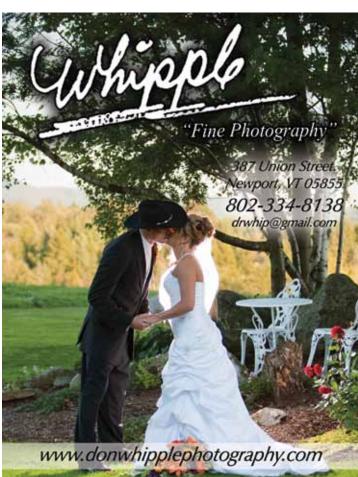
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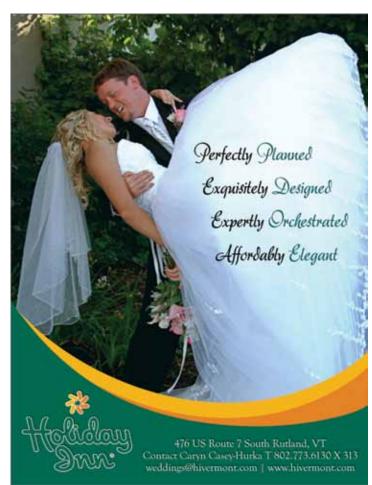
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Danielle Mead Sturgeon

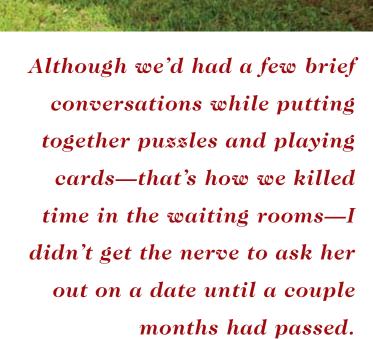
After dinner and a movie. Mead dropped me off at the dorm. Five minutes later, the phone rang. asking me out on a second date. And the rest, as they say, is history.

the ceremony, I was almost surprised to look around and realize there were so many people there; it felt like it was just the two of us.

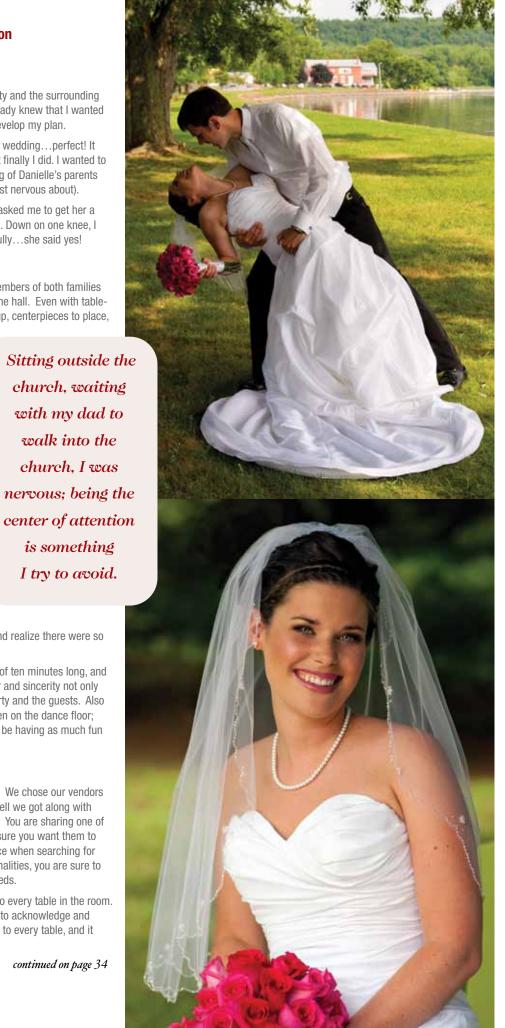

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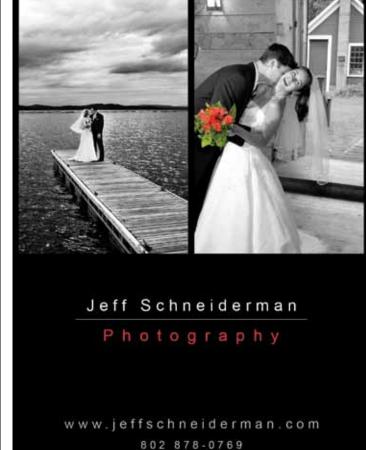

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Your Wedding Your Way

GO GREEN, and Save Green

Can a "green" wedding save you some green? Absolutely. Environmentally conscious engaged couples sometimes miss the opportunity to bring their socially responsible awareness to their wedding. But when you consider that a green mindset can also save thousands of dollars, the incentives add up.

Marjorie and Matthew wanted an elegant destination wedding in Vermont for a guest list of one hundred. But they were also determined to keep their commitment to being earth friendly as a couple and bring those values to planning their wedding. They brought up the challenge with their wedding coach and officiant.

Rings? Rings, especially. Diamonds, gold, and platinum are notoriously unethically produced. Miners of these raw substances often work in unsafe conditions and mining itself can damage local ecosystems and watersheds, according to sustainable jewelers like Leber Jeweler, GreenKarat, and Sumiche. Add to that the fact that the diamond mining industry exploits child labor and you have one place to really make a statement. Contact those jewelers and explore it for yourselves. The other thing that some couples do is recycle old gold or silver jewelry from previous generations to make their own rings.

Marjorie and Matthew got inspired by the session. As they began to list the ways they actually could make a difference and save money, they got more excited about their wedding. Michelle Kozin's book encouraged them even more: *Organic Weddings: Balancing Ecology, Style, and Tradition* (New Society Publishers, 2003). Kozin's related website is www.OrganicWeddings.com.

A summary of ways this couple planned their green wedding:

They chose recycled and tree-free paper options for invitations.

Instead of a tuxedo rental, the groom bought a suit he could use for formal occasions beyond the wedding. The bride was able to wear her mother's wedding dress and fantasized about passing it on to her daughter some day. They didn't have ushers and bridesmaids in their ceremony but had friends who'd been to a wedding where the wedding party intentionally wore diverse formal clothing instead of matching suits and gowns.

Wines for the rehearsal dinner and reception were selected from local Vermont wineries.

They selected a caterer for the wedding feast who used Vermont's "Farm to Table" program so that most of the ingredients were not only local but organic where possible.

Aware that some florists use flowers flown in from South America, they intentionally chose wedding flowers from a Vermont florist whose greenhouse was instate.

Honeymooning would be a tour of New England meaderies, sampling the locally crafted beverage (mead-honey wine) from which the word "honeymoon" derives its name. Compared with their original idea of a Caribbean vacation, this honeymoon saved thousands.

Marjorie and Matthew's original dilemma had turned into a fabulous adventure. They saved enough money for a downpayment for their first home, had fun doing it, and also made a statement about their concerns for the environment with their guests and families.

& best times to go!

ith its rolling green hills, bright colors of fall and white beauty of winter, Vermont is a beautiful place to get married. Once the planning is over and your special day has come and gone, it's time to relax and head off together. In each issue of *Vermont Bride*, I'll write about special places around the world where you can go on your honeymoon.

Italy is a favorite of honeymooners. The Eternal City of Rome, Tuscany, Venice, Sicily, the Lakes Region and the Aeolian Islands are just some of the popular places to visit. From the Mediterranean resorts, amazing food and wine, history, art, music and shopping to quiet towns to relax in, wander and explore, Italy has so much to offer. If you have Italian family and friends who cannot make it to Vermont for your wedding, you might consider having a second ceremony in Italy or a post wedding party there.

Sicily is the largest island in the Mediterranean. Over the centuries, it was conquered by

many groups who made their mark on regional cuisine, architecture and history. From the Greeks, to the Romans to the Moors, all left lasting influences on the culture. Sicily has lovely beaches, quaint towns and cities, scenic beauty and wonderful wine.

Best time to go:

Year round. Sicily has sunny and mild temperatures in the high 60s and low 70s from November to April and temperatures in the 80s the rest of the year. Price wise it is best to go in January, February, September and October.

Tuscany is the land of the Renaissance, with its beautifully photographed rolling hills, vineyards, farmland, olive groves and delicious food and wine. Some of its best

known cities and towns include Florence, Lucca, Pisa, Siena and San Gimignano. Here you will find some of the most beautiful art and sculptures by Michelangelo, Da Vinci, Botticelli. Bernini and more.

Best time to go: May, September and October, when the weather is cooler and there are fewer tourists. The busiest and hottest times are June to August.

Venice is a place like no other—a city surrounded by water with canals and narrow streets and bridges. It is a city for walking or taking water taxis and gondolas. Its islands of Murano, Burano and Torcello have beautiful Venetian glass, lace, colorful houses and a historical church. Venice also has excellent seafood and risotto, not to mention pasta.

Best time to go: April through June and September to November. July and August are hot, humid and full of tourists. Carnival can be fun, but crowded and takes place in February.

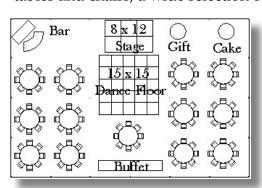

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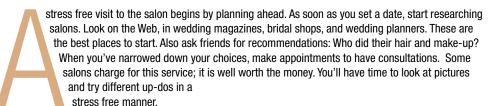


A Stress Free Visit to the Salon

sweet syrups, jams and jellies, and create pottery and pewter pieces that would make any recipient joyous and thankful.

Incorporate recycled materials and fabrics whenever possible. With the popularity of secondhand and vintage shops, finding gently used wedding gowns or bridesmaids' dresses is an option to be considered.

Vintage jewelry adds razzle and dazzle for a fraction of the price of new. Make a day of it, and scout out what the local marketplace has to offer. Bring along a girlfriend, break for lunch, and make it a girl's day.

With the bounty of nature Vermont offers, eco-friendly options are before us, if we take the time and energy to explore. Visit stores that specialize in reclaimed materials and uncover a treasure chest of practical, silly, and classic finds.

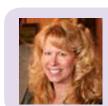

During hydration, the flower heads will be supported by a wire grid attached to the top of the bucket to keep the stems straight and strong. After a few hours of hydration, the flowers will be placed in solution of water with preservative and stored in a high humidity cooler with temperatures between 36 - 38 degrees Fahrenheit. Gerberas have a vase life of between 7 - 10 days.

The Gerbera daisy is also known as an African daisy, Barberton daisy, Transvaal daisy, and Veldt daisy.

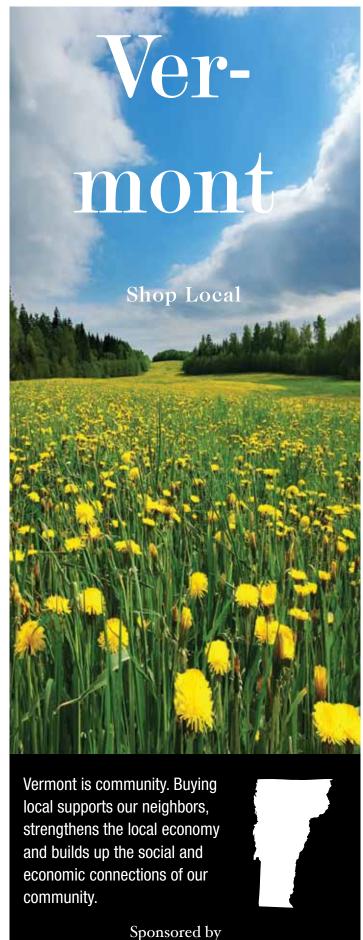

Gerbera daisies, both mini and standard, make bright, colorful bouquets. Flower girls' and toss bouquets, boutonnières, corsages, and fun cupcake toppers are best designed with the minis. Standard or mini Gerbera flower heads can be used in combination with floating candles for centerpieces. Invitations, place cards, and thank you notes with Gerberas make for a lovely themed wedding. Cakes pop with color when a few Gerberas are added.

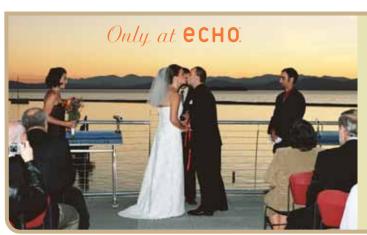

Preparing for the BIG DAY



A common statement that
I hear from the soon to be

Your wedding day is when YOU are the center of attention, so of course you want to look like a knockout for your friends, family, and of course your groom.

Here are some tips that I commonly give my clients:

 Your physique is determined by three things: 10% exercise, 10% genetics, and 80% diet.

This might shock some readers because exercise is not a very big percentage. Of course it plays a big role in how you will look, however, if your diet is not the best then you will not have the best physique. If you want to look and feel better, pay attention to what you are putting into your mouth! I recommend lean proteins, complex carbohydrates, fruits, vegetables and lots of water. You also need to keep in mind your portion sizes and calorie intake. So make sure you are choosing nutrient dense foods.

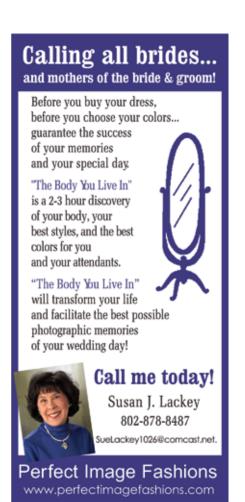
2. Combine weights and cardio and keep your workouts interesting.

It depends on your body type to determine when you will see gains in muscle definition and a reduction of overall body fat. However, a fitness routine combined with a clean diet will help you reach your wedding day body easier.

I personally like shorter workouts, because with a very hectic schedule, not to mention the wedding planning, who has time for an hour and a half workout?

I recommend doing interval training (quick bursts of energy) and circuit training (a series of exercises performed for a certain amount of time and quickly moving from one exercise to the next). These workouts can be short

(roughly 20 minutes) and they will rev up your metabolism (your fat burning ability) and keep it elevated for several hours after the workout. Since wedding gowns are typically sleeveless or thin strapped, I recommend when you are lifting weights concentrate on your shoulders, back, biceps and triceps. One move that will cover all of these body parts is the old fashion push-up.

3. Get plenty of sleep and don't stress (if possible).

According to WebMD.com, sleep affects certain hormones that will control your appetite and satiety. Studies show that people who get less than 8 hours of sleep have higher levels of body fat than people

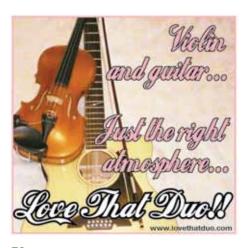






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who get 8 or more hours of sleep a night. Stress increases levels of cortisol in your blood which is a hormone that tends to cause you carry extra body fat in your waist line area. You also have to be careful if you are an emotional eater. Make sure you have healthy coping mechanisms when dealing with your stress and get plenty of sleep.

Bottom line is this: Your wedding day is YOUR day. Try to enjoy every moment of it from the proposal and the planning all the way up to the honeymoon and most importantly the many years to follow spent with your lifetime partner.

Take care of yourself by eating right, getting exercise and a proper amount of sleep. When you are taking care of yourself and feeling good, everything else will fall into place.

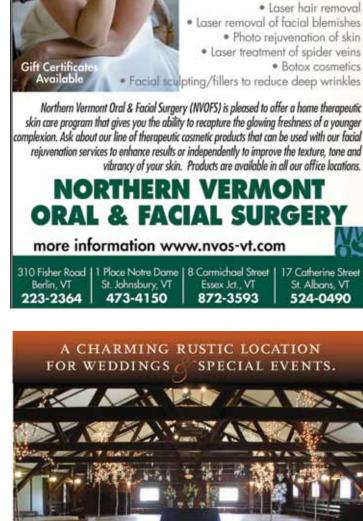
(10-15 minutes) By Toria Cornett

- 1. Book ceremony and reception locations (often it is wiser to contact these sites before you choose date)

- 3. Create guest list and decide on budget.
- 4. Decide on wedding party.
- 5. Shop for bridal gown and dresses

9 MONTHS PRIOR TO WEDDING

- 1. Purchase bride's gown and order bridesmaids' dresses
- 2. Attend bridal shows to choose and book any vendors that you have not already booked
- 3. Send out save the date invitations to family members

- 1. Buy shoes to match dresses when they come in.

3 MONTHS PRIOR TO WEDDING

- 1. Any creative do-it-yourself projects should be completed and stored in a safe place (favors, centerpieces, pew bows, welcome baskets, homemade invitations)
- 2. Send out wedding invitations.
- 3. All dress alterations should be completed and dresses
- 4. Pick up wedding bands and make sure they fit.
- 5. Purchase marriage-license.
- 6. Contact vendors and officiates to go over details.

1 MONTH PRIOR

- 1. Contact guests who have not returned RSVP and ask if they will attend (this can be a real money saver).
- 2. Do a hair and makeup run-through (with headpiece)
- 3. Make list of when final payments are do (paying ahead will reduce wedding day headaches).
- 4. Go dress shopping with mothers if they haven't purchased a dress by now.

1 WEEK PRIOR

- 1. Create time schedule sheet for rehearsal and wedding day and give it to vendors parents attendants and anyone else who is actively involved in the wedding. This should include addresses, maps and phone num-
- 2. Give Readers copies of the scripture or creative piece they will be reading at your ceremony.
- 3. Go over final guest counts with vendors (caterer, florist,

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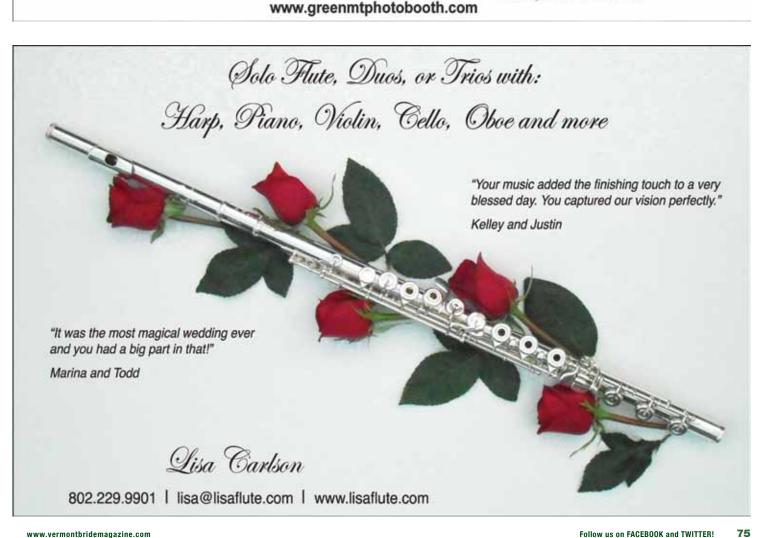
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Selecting Unique Music for Your Wedding

For Your Wedding

hether you're the tradition lover who must have the Mendelssohn Wedding March for your recessional, or whether you feel that you absolutely must make completely unique choices, your repertoire choices will color the mood of your day as much as your choice of gown, flowers, and location.

First, I'd like to state that the traditional pieces always feel fresh to me because they're reflecting the new life that each couple brings to them. If you know and love these pieces, you might know right off that they will bring the ambiance you most want. But even some traditionalists may wish to include an especially personal musical choice somewhere in the day, and some couples may want to steer clear of traditional choices completely, and make only choices that truly reflect their preferences in a personal way. Here are thoughts and examples of some choices couples have made that have colored their wedding day in a unique and memorable way.

The prelude, music played as your guests are arriving, signals the beginning of your event.

There's normally no need to worry about prelude repertoire unless you wish. However, sometimes couples or families will choose one or more special pieces, particularly for the end of the prelude. Here are some choices made by couples with whom I've worked in the past:

- "On Eagle's Wings," a hymn by Michael Joncas, played while the bride rode up the hill to the ceremony site in a horse-drawn carriage
- "How Great Thou Art" during the seating of the parents, in honor of the bride's grandmother, who had a special love of the hymn during her life
- Allegro from Vivaldi's "Spring" during the seating of the mothers and grandmother, and in honor of the bride's grandmother, a violinist, who had passed away during the bride's childhood
- The Beatles' "Imagine" shortly before the ceremony

Typically, there tend to be two processionals following the prelude. The first is normally for the wedding party, most commonly bridesmaids, flower girls and/ or ring bearer. The advantage to just one piece for the entire party is that you'll hear more of the piece, rather than just a brief snippet. On the other hand, a special piece for a special member of the bridal party can have a significant meaning, and this might be a worthwhile choice, particularly if you have a long walk. Here are a few unique choices:

- "Castle on a Cloud" from "Les Miserables" for the "junior bridesmaid" –
 the daughter of the bride. This had been a special song they had shared
 together through difficult times in the past, and served as a special song
 to represent their future as a new family.
- "You Are My Sunshine" specifically for a very special two-year-old ring bearer
- "If We Hold On Together" for a special Maid of Honor
- Largo from Vivaldi's "Winter" played on solo flute for a February wedding; this, the wedding party's processional, was played solo, with the violin half of the duo re-entering for the bride's processional, marking the distinction more clearly
- Adagio from Bach's "Triosonata in G" (originally for two flutes and harpsichord)
- Handel's "Rejouissance" from the "Water Music Suite"; I normally
 recommend this as a recessional option, but we concluded that if played
 a little on the slow side it worked beautifully as a processional.
- "Flower of Edinburgh," a traditional Scottish tune

The next, and often most important, musical choice you'll be making, is normally the bride's processional. Some examples of unique angles on the process:

- For a very small wedding with no wedding party, "Sheep May Safely Graze" was played specifically for the groom and "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring" for the bride.
- For a wedding with two brides, both entered together to "Sheep May Safely Graze"
- For a wedding with two grooms, both entered at the same time from opposite directions, to "I Dreamed a Dream" from "Les Miserables"

Some other uncommon choices for the bride have included:

- "Carol of the Bells" for a December wedding
- "Leezie Lindsay," a traditional Scottish tune
- "Lover's Waltz." a fiddle tune by Jay Unger
- "Meditation" from the opera "Thais" by Massenet
- "The Rose" by Amanda McBroom (popularized as sung by Bette Middler)
- "St. Anthony Chorale" by Brahms

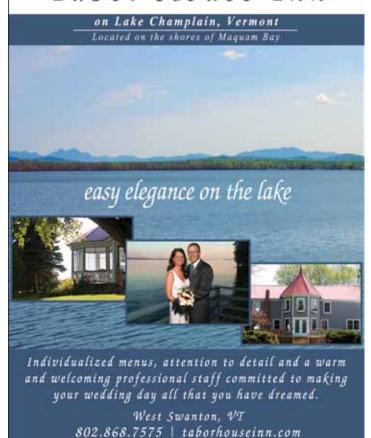
The middle of the ceremony is the most likely place you may enjoy putting a personal touch on your wedding music. Music may accompany communion, candle lighting or other ritual, or a meditative moment. Here are a few choices I've experienced:

- "Simple Gifts," "Amazing Grace," "On Eagles' Wings," "The Rose," or other folk tunes and hymns are all very popular, without feeling common
- "One Bread, One Body" for communion
- "The Prayer" by Celine Dion and Andrea Bocelli immediately following the opening prayer
- Adagio from Loeillet's "Flute Sonata No. 1" for a special ritual in which
 the bride and groom each watered a potted tree from separate watering
 cans representing the two families

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After all the vows are said, and the celebration is over, the images captured are all that is left.

nce you and your fiancé have chosen the date and the venue for the wedding and reception, one of the very next things that should be booked is your photographer.

After all the vows are said, and the celebration is over, the images captured are all that is left. These captured images will be the memories frozen in time that you will be able to share for generations to come.

When looking for your photographer, start by asking friends or family that have recently gone through the entire process to help point you in the right direction.

Vermont Bride Magazine offers a handy listing of local talent and their websites that will help you decide who will photograph your most important day.

In your search you will want to consider some of these key questions that will help you narrow your selections.

What is our budget for photography? Does this business have good references? What is their level of experience? Do they shoot film or digital? Is there an experienced second shooter? If so, how well do they work together? Are

they using professional gear such as pro camera bodies and fast lenses and have mastered their use? Do they have back-up gear in case of malfunction? If they shoot film, how many rolls do they normally shoot? If they shoot digital, as most do today, do they have a good understanding of postproduction? Are they taking advantage of the many image enhancement tools available such as Photoshop to achieve optimal results? Does this business have a solid reputation for delivering in a timely manner? Do they have a solid customer service that will provide the type of photos we are expecting to display on our

walls and in our wedding album and remain within our budget? What is their dominant shooting style?

Now, what should you be looking for to give you some insight into different styles of photography?

A good traditional wedding photographer is well organized. They must have a good understanding of what is expected of them at the venue. They are courteous at all times and are good listeners. They will have scouted the

venue in advance for well-lit areas to take advantage of natural available light with interesting backgrounds, and leading lines. They might also add fill light with strobes off-camera especially during formal shots. They communicate well with small and large groups. They effectively direct posing, in an attempt to create a desired mood. All this and within the allowed shooting schedule.

A good photojournalistic photographer should have the people skills of the traditional. Most shut off the flash to remain stealthy and shoot the majority of the wedding day in natural light. Most images will not have the

subject looking at the camera, but will rather be capturing the moments rather than creating them. The true photojournalist photographer only intervenes when necessary.

Today's modern wedding photographer who combines the traditional and photojournalistic styles are referred to as portrait journalists. They have the necessary skills to combine both styles into fine art and fashion into your wedding album to achieve the best of both worlds. It is important that they are able to show you samples of at least two complete wedding packages. Look for these different styles when you view their portfolios.

Next, you must determine your budget. A good benchmark is to consider spending between ten and fifteen percent of your budget on the photography. Years from now, the photographs and albums of your special day will be the tangible items that you have to be able to share your day (and all the planning that went into it) with family and friends. In these hard economic times, some photographers might allow you to pay in monthly installments, up to the date of the wedding, but typically expect a 25-50 % deposit.

Start with your top three choices and make appointments to meet each of them in person to see samples of their work.

Ask for a copy of their typical wedding contract that highlights in detail what their services are and what is delivered. It is important to carefully read the entire contract.

Ask to see some enlargements to help you determine their file quality is high enough if you decide to print large.

You also must determine how comfortable you are around your potential photographer. Remember that you will be spending most of your wedding day with them. If after meeting all photographers and viewing their samples in person, you are still not sure, set up another meeting to go over more details and answer questions you may have before deciding. If you are having a lot of children at the wedding, you may want to ask about their experience dealing with kids.

Still not decided? Then perhaps you might consider asking your top choice to do your engagement shoot. This will give you the opportunity to see how they work and interact with you during a shoot. The shoot is usually only an hour or so and can run from \$125 to \$750, so be sure to ask how much first.

Take the search for your professional photographer seriously. Try not to be overwhelmed by all the variables. Be sure to allow yourself plenty of time so you don't rush into your decision. Take it one step at a time. Be diligent and you will no doubt have the outcome you desire.

and Bachelorette Parties:

Making them Memorable

Pat Esden: Pat has worked in the wedding industry for over twenty-five years. As a master floral designer and owner of Esden Florist in Fairfield, VT, she sees the yearly changes in wedding styles and is familiar with the time-honored traditions and in tune with the new conventions.

Bachelor and bachelorette parties have one goal—fun.

Whether the party is a bachelor, bachelorette or a Jack and Jill, it's easy to make it an occasion to be remembered. The key is to plan the party far enough ahead of time, personalize it and take safety into account.

Usually the maid of honor or the best man plan and host the party, however sometimes parents or even the bride or groom organize it themselves. Unlike the bridal shower, the bride and groom often know when the bachelor party will take place and should be asked if they prefer separate parties or wish to have a combined one.

No matter who is hosting the party it should be planned several months ahead of time and guests should be notified of the date well in advance.

The actual date it occurs is most often within a couple of weeks of the wedding or even the night before the ceremony. The problem with having the party the night before is that it can lead to the bride or groom being hungover or exhausted on the wedding day.

Once a date is chosen, some thought should be put into how the party can be personalized. Instead of having a lackluster bachelor party in someone's basement with stag movies and beer or sitting in a living room playing the same old bachelorette games, focus the party on something that the bride and groom es-

pecially enjoy. What is the bride's favorite sport? The groom's favorite food? An afternoon playing golf followed by drinks and dinner at the clubhouse is easy to organize. A girls' only weekend of skiing and partying in a resort pub wouldn't be expensive if a friend or family member has a ski area condo they'd lend for the weekend. A champagne breakfast at a favorite restaurant, overnight shopping trips, white water rafting, a day at the spa, paintball, fly fishing lessons, a concert or dinner theater—what would be fun for the bride and/or groom and the rest of the guests?

There is no tradition about who should be invited to the party. Sometimes parents are included, but more often only the attendants and closest friends. Keeping the guest list small—most likely under a couple dozen people—will help maintain a personal feeling. However, more people may be invited to a Jack and Jill party, which are as common as the traditional bachelor and bachelorette parties.

If there is going to be drinking at the party and the guests aren't staying overnight, then it is a good idea to rent a limo or designate a driver ahead of time. The designated driver can be a spouse or friend who is willing to be "on call," or a local taxi could be hired instead.

With just a little preplanning and thought as to the bride and/or groom's taste, the bachelor party will be safe, fun and something everyone will remember and talk about for years to come.

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How they met:

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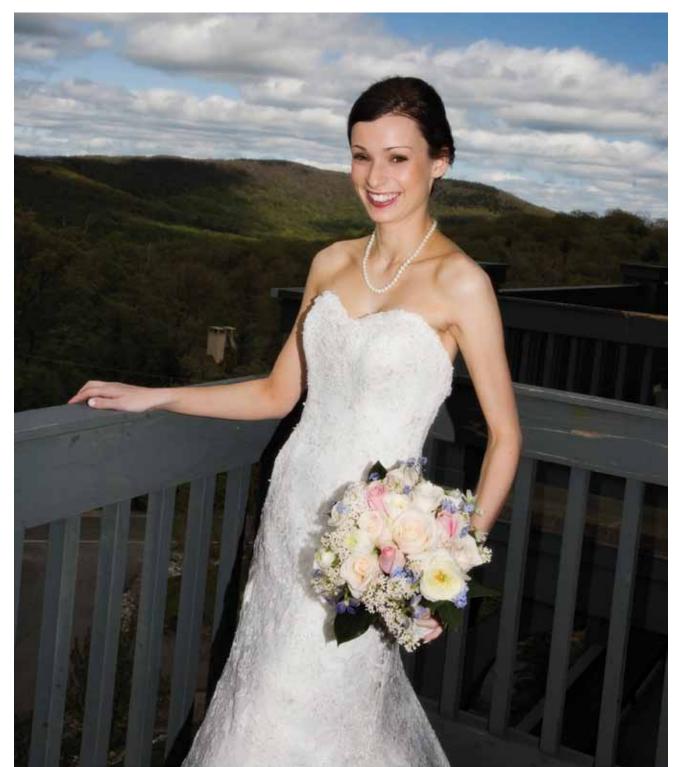

On your wedding day, take a couple minutes to step away from the guests and look at your wedding with your husband.



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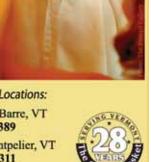
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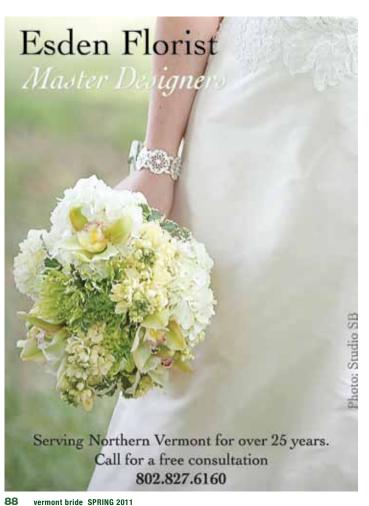
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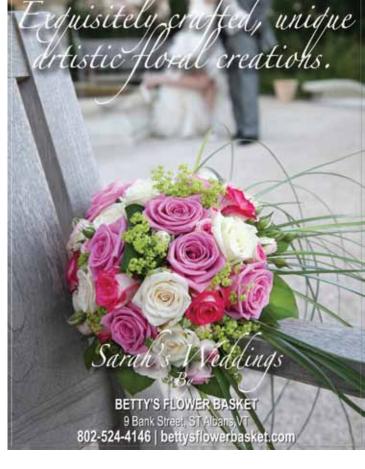

- "Somewhere Over the Rainbow"
- "Do You Hear the People Sing?" from "Les Miserables"
- "Get Happy" by Judy Garland
- A medley of show tunes
- · Allegro from Bach's "Brandenburg Concerto in F"
- The Beatles: "All You Need is Love"
- Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus"

And finally, there are many possibilities for special music during your reception. Probably the most unusual and memorable for me were the combination of "Jockey to the Fair" to honor British neighbors who had shared their land and barn for the occasion, and "I'm Gonna Wash That Man Right Out of My Hair" and "My Way" for a lesbian couple. The possibilities here are endless!



I hope the above allows your imagination to find the breadth of options for making your day unique. These are not intended so much as lists to choose from, but as examples of couples who chose to put a personal musical stamp on their most special day.

And please note that some instrument combinations work better than others for some of the selections – so please consult with your musicians in exploring your options!

I wish you laughter and tears of joy and sentiment as you explore, together with your partner and perhaps your family, the music that marks a special place in your heart, brings to mind a special person, or helps you and your guests to feel the range of moods you would most like for your wedding day.

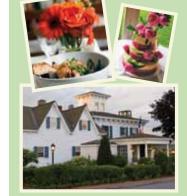

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Cleaning Your Financial House

Planning, consolidating, and getting ready for the best future...

Insurance: Review your beneficiaries on your life insurance. You may want to increase your life insurance, especially if you are going to have children. Be sure you have enough disability insurance to support you if you become ill or disabled. As well, update your home or renters insurance and auto insurance to include the two of you together - you could end up with substantial savings by consolidating these policies.

resolved and all necessary deposits are paid. Now let's take a few moments and explore one of the most widely recognized rituals of a Jewish wedding, the breaking of a glass at the end of the ceremony.

The origin of this tradition dates back over two thousand years.

It is first mentioned in the Talmud in two places. In one version Mar, the son of Ravina, thought that the rabbis were getting

too merry at his son's wedding. For reasons not stated he felt this was inappropriate so to sober them up he took a valuable glass object and smashed it. The other version describes the same situation only the name of the father of the groom was Rav Ashi. These two stories differ from how the tradition has come down to us in two ways. First, it is the father who breaks the glass, not the groom. Second, the purpose is intended to subdue the revelers, not initiate the celebration of the wedding.

It is not clear why these two fathers felt it was important to sober up their guests. However, the most enduring explanation provided by later rabbis linked Mar's and Rav Ashi's actions with the sadness associated with the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem in 70 CE. Thus, the purpose of smashing the glass is to remind us that even in times of great joy, like a wedding, we should not forget that there is much sadness in the world. Of course this explanation does not provide insight into how the ritual evolved into it being the groom, and often the bride as well, that breaks the glass. This will have to remain a mystery for now.

Today many people continue to embrace the ritual as a way of remembering that there are still people, Jewish and non-Jewish, that lack the freedom to freely celebrate their religion. Others like to understand it homiletically: Just as the glass, when it is broken, enters a state from which it will never emerge, so too may it be that this couple will never emerge from their married state. Alternatively, some prefer explaining it allegorically by pointing out that although glass is made from sand, a very common and cheap material. it can be turned into something of beauty and value. But if one is not careful the glass can be broken. So too, a marriage is something common yet beautiful, but if one is not careful it can be broken like glass. Lastly, those with a penchant for the arcane might prefer seeing it is an action intended to chase away demons that might threaten the couple as they pass through the liminal period between being unmarried and married.

The ritual of breaking a glass has evolved in many ways over the years. Regardless of what interpretation with which we invest the ritual, it nevertheless calls upon us to reflect on the holiness of the moment and consider that life and marriage are fragile, holy and beautiful.

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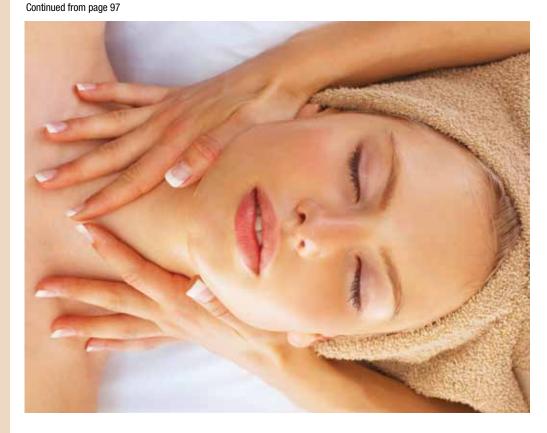

Ceremony Sound By Grant Allendorf Tips for Brides

How to make sure everyone at the ceremony can hear what is happening

Have you ever been to a wedding ceremony and nobody could hear the officiant or the bride and groom when they said their vows?

ne of the most important elements of a wedding ceremony is hearing the officiant and the bride and groom's vows. Many times the officiant is soft spoken and only the first few rows hear what he or she has to say. Wind and road noise can sometimes make it difficult to hear the all important words of the officiant. The way to ensure that everyone will hear the ceremony would be to hire a sound, entertainment, or DJ company to provide the correct equipment for this all important segment of the day

We at Supersounds provide two mics at each ceremony: one on a stand for singers and readers and one wireless over the ear (lemo -broadway) for the officiant (Shure and Audio-Technica sell this product). This mic is important because it is unobtrusive (flesh colored) and has a small wire that goes half way down the side of the officiant's face.

You don't want a mic on a stand for the officiant because it would be in every photo.

The officiant also has to have their hands free

to hold their script or binder so holding a mic isn't an option. With the ear worn mic the entire crowd will hear every word of the ceremony, and if the bride and groom are within a foot of

the officiant their vows will also be picked up through the ear worn mic of the officiant. These mics are coupled with a mixer and two powered speakers (JBL, QSC or similar brand) on tall speaker stands. They are set up on the side so they don't interfere with photos. The sound technician or DJ will run the sound so everything is mixed perfectly. This type of sound system should be used whether the ceremony music is live or recorded.

Many times when duos or trios are hired there is no amplification but the music is only one part of the ceremony. We have done many ceremonies where fantastic trios and duos have performed, and we provide the sound system for the officiant and readers or singers because quality sound

is a priority for those particular brides and grooms.

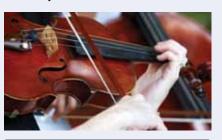
Lastly, make sure that all guests turn off (not just put on vibrate) cell phones and pagers. It is even more important that all bridesmaids and ushers (bride and groom too) have their cell phones and pagers turned off as they are close to the officiant who is wearing the wireless ear worn mic. Cell phones and pagers can cause interference with wireless mics and it is appropriate for the officiant to make an announcement before the start

of the ceremony about turning them off. Take some time to plan out the sound aspects of your ceremony and your ceremony will win a Grammy on your big day!

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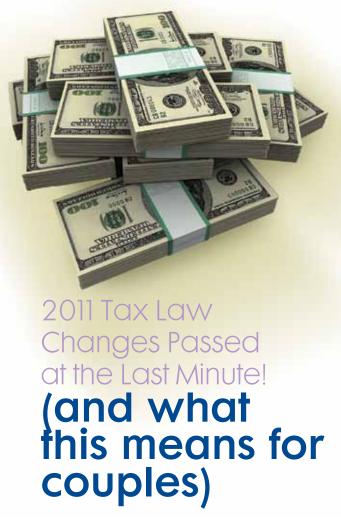

The Facts

With the signing of the Tax Relief, Unemployment Insurance Reauthorization and Job Creation Act on December 17, 2010, the tax rates and rules that were in effect in 2010 were extended for another two years. The new law (short title: 2010 Tax Relief Act) also extended unemployment benefits for an additional 13 months.

Here's an overview of the tax provisions included in the law.

Individual Income Tax Rates. A tax law passed in 2001 created what has become known as the "Bush-era tax cuts." Those tax cuts, including the tax rates in effect for 2010, were set to expire December 31, 2010, and, had that occurred, everyone's taxes would have gone up in 2011. The 2010 Tax Relief Act extends the Bush tax rates for all taxpayers for another two years. Therefore, the federal income tax rates for 2011 and 2012 will be 10%, 15%, 25%, 28%, 33%, and 35%.

Tax Rates on Capital Gains and Dividends. The new law continues the 2010 tax rates on capital gains and dividends through 2011 and 2012. The maximum rate remains at 15% for taxpayers in the top four regular tax brackets and at 0% for those in the 10% and 15% tax brackets. Without this extension, the maximum capital gains rate would have risen in 2011 to 20%, and dividends would have been taxed at ordinary income rates as high as

Itemized Deductions and Personal Exemptions. Higher-income taxpayers are entitled to full deduction of their personal exemptions and itemized deductions for 2010. The new law continues this full deduction for 2011 and 2012. Without this extension, those whose incomes exceeded certain threshold amounts would have had their itemized deductions limited and their personal exemptions phased out.

Marriage Penalty Relief. The new law extends the current marriage penalty relief for two years. The standard deduction for married couples filing a joint return will be twice the amount for a single taxpayer, and the size of the 10% and 15% tax rate brackets for couples will be twice that of single taxpayers.

Child Tax Credit and Earned Income Credit. The \$1,000 tax credit for each child under age 17 was set to revert to \$500 in 2011. The new law extends the credit at \$1,000 for two years and continues the increase in the refundable portion of the credit. The law also extends the enhanced earned income tax credit through

December 31, 2012.

American Opportunity

American Opportunity

credit through 2012,
providing a \$2,500

maximum credit for qualified higher education expenses. The law also extends the higher income limitations through 2012. Phase out of the credit will begin at \$80,000 of income for individuals and at \$160,000 for married couples.

Other Education Breaks. The new law keeps the income exclusion for up to \$5,250 of employer-provided education assistance for an additional two years. The student loan interest deduction as structured for 2010 will be extended through 2012.

Coverdell Education Savings Accounts (ESAs) were enhanced by the 2001 tax law, and those enhancements will continue for another two years. The maximum ESA contribution will remain at \$2,000, and qualified expenses will continue to include elementary and secondary education costs as well as higher education expenses.

Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT). Without Congressional action, the AMT would have applied to more than 20 million taxpayers in 2010. The AMT is a separate tax calculation originally designed to keep the wealthy from escaping all income tax through the use of various tax breaks. Because the exemption from the tax did not include inflation adjustments, the tax has begun to hit more and more middle-income taxpayers each year.

The new law provides a two-year "patch" to the AMT by raising the exemption amounts. For 2010, the exemption is \$47,450 for individuals and \$72,450 for married couples filing jointly. For 2011, the exemption is \$48,450 for singles and \$74,450 for couples. Without this patch, the exemption amounts for 2010 and 2011 would have been \$33,750 for singles and \$45,000 for couples.

Payroll Tax Cut. The law creates a new tax break for working taxpayers who pay social security taxes. For 2011, the social security portion of

payroll tax paid by employees will be reduced from 6.2% to 4.2% on wages up to \$106,800. This new tax break replaces the Making Work Pay credit which expires after 2010. Self-employed individuals will pay 10.4% on self-employment income up to \$106,800.

The employer share of social security tax paid on employee wages up to \$106,800 will continue to be 6.2%. The payroll tax rate cut does not affect the Medicare portion of the tax.

"Extenders" for Individuals. Certain tax breaks known

collectively as "extenders" are typically allowed to expire and then extended retroactively for a year or two. The new law extends a number of these breaks that had expired at the end of 2009, making them effective for 2010 and 2011 tax returns.

The items extended include the following:

- the option for deducting state and local sales taxes in lieu of deducting state and local income taxes
- the above-the-line deduction for up to \$4,000 for higher education expenses.
- the above-the-line deduction of up to \$250 for classroom supplies purchased by teachers.
- allowing taxpayers 70½ or older to make taxfree contributions of up to \$100,000 from an IRA to a charity

The 2010 Tax Relief Act gives taxpayers some certainty, if only for the next two years. Had the law not passed, all taxpayers would have seen their taxes increase in 2011. The new law will have a significant impact on individuals: cutting payroll taxes for workers, preventing the AMT from hitting millions more taxpayers, continuing tax breaks for education expenses, and cutting estate taxes.

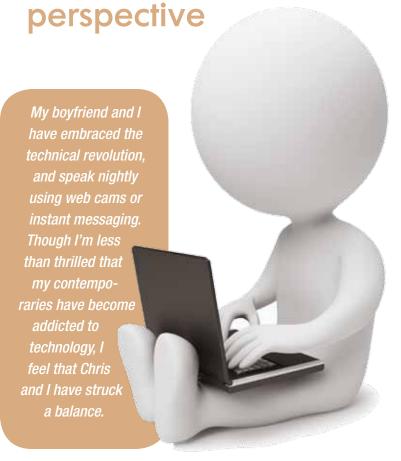
A blog is more of a passive way of keeping in touch. The posts are long, take some sorting through, and require a fair amount of time to enjoy.
