

IMPROVEMENT IN OIL-CAN HOLDERS.

The Schedule referred to in these Letters Patent and making part of the same.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM STODDARD BRICK, of Fitchburg, State of Massachusetts, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Oil-Can Holders, of which the following is a specification.

The nature of my invention consists in an adjustable oil-can holder, which can be attached to the frames of sewing and stitching-machines of all kinds, looms, and all other machinery where an oil-can is needed, as will be hereafter more particularly set forth.

Figure 1 represents a side elevation of my invention attached to the frame of a table or sewing-machine.

Figure 2 is a section of the same.

A represents the frame of a table, sewing or stitching-machine, to which my holder B is attached.

This holder consists of a cup-shaped attachment, having two downwardly-projecting standards or legs, c, which pass over or straddle a part of the frame, and which is held firmly in place by means of the set-screw e.

The cup-like part is sufficiently large to receive an

oil-can, D, and, to prevent the can from being accidentally upset, is provided with a small spring, a, which extends partly over the can, so as to hold it down upon its seat.

Without some such holder for the can, it has got to be either left upon the table, where it is in constant danger of being upset and soiling the goods, or it is placed at such a distance from the machine that it requires the operator to walk after it each time it is to be used. My holder, being so made that it can be attached to almost any part of the frame within reach, overcomes these inconveniences.

Having thus described my invention,

What I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

In combination with the cup-shaped holder B, legs c, and set-screw e, the spring a, when all are combined to operate as set forth.
