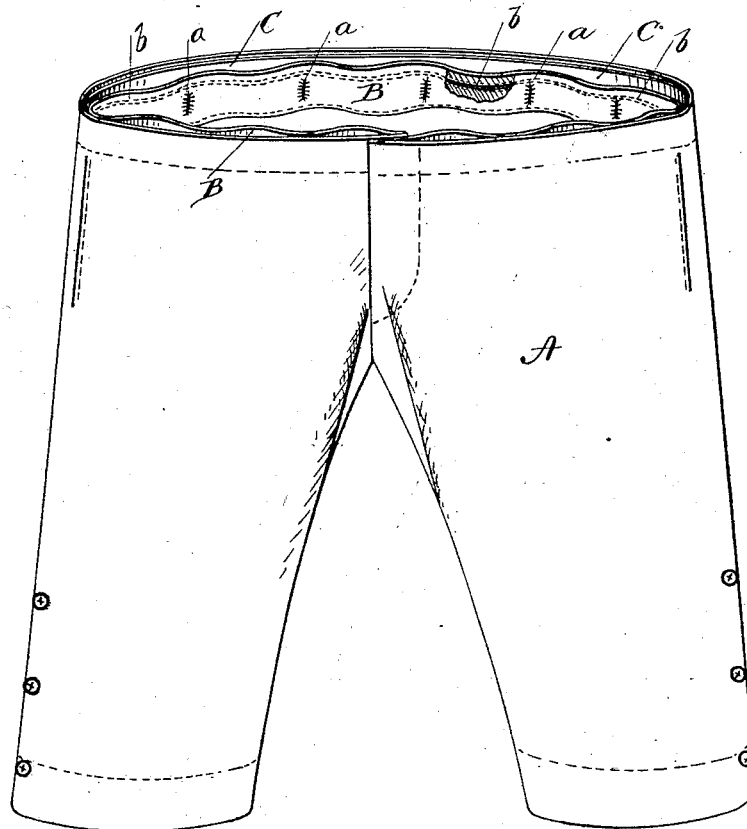
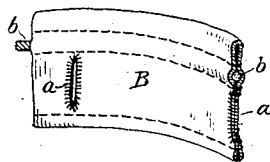

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## PANTALOONS AND TROUSERS.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 265,983, dated October 17, 1882.

Application filed December 7, 1881. (No model.)

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, CROWELL H. RYNO, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented certain new and useful improvements  
5 in waistings for trousers or pantaloons and other analogous articles of wearing-apparel, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description.

This invention, although designed with special reference to pantaloons for boys—such, for instance, as are fastened to the jacket or waist by means of buttons and button-holes—  
10 is applicable equally as well to wearing-apparel in general having a similar fastening device.

The object of this invention is to provide an improved waisting or waistband attachment for boys' pantaloons and similar articles of wear which shall possess all the characteristics of those now in use, and at the same time  
20 overcome a serious objection to them in so reinforcing and constructing the waisting as to prevent the button-holes formed therein, when subjected to severe or undue strain, from tearing out or giving way, which has heretofore  
25 been a source of great inconvenience and a drawback to the universal adoption of pantaloons of this pattern.

In the accompanying drawings, Figure 1 represents a pair of pantaloons or trousers with my improved waisting attached. Fig. 2 represents a detail view of said waisting partly  
30 in section.

In said drawings, A represents an ordinary pair of boys' trousers or pantaloons; B, my improved waisting, which is provided with button-holes *a*. On the free edge of said waisting B, and just above the button-holes *a*, are incorporated or otherwise suitably secured  
35 cords *b*, (seen in dotted lines in the drawings, and also in full lines where the material composing the waisting is broken away,) which extend the length of said waisting, and serve to re-

enforce and strengthen the button-holes formed therein to such an extent as to prevent them  
45 from tearing out or giving way when subjected to severe or undue strain. My improved waisting is sewed or otherwise suitably fastened to the inside of the waistband C of the pantaloons in the same manner as the ordinary waisting now in use. It is obvious, however, that my invention can easily and readily  
50 be substituted for the usual waisting now used on pantaloons or trousers of this pattern without altering or changing the same in any manner.

My improved waisting may be made of linen or cotton, or any fabric suitable for the purpose.

Pantaloons or trousers having my improved  
60 waisting attached do not require constant repairing, and the cord or cords so strengthen and re-enforce the waisting that it will outlast trousers or pantaloons to which it is applied, and can be used again and again until worn  
65 out.

In conclusion, I would state that I do not confine myself to the arrangement of cords above the button-holes only, inasmuch as a cord or cords may also be placed both above  
70 and below the same, according to the taste or desire of the manufacturer.

Having described my invention, what I claim, and desire to secure by Letters Patent, is—

A waisting or waistband attachment for  
75 trousers, provided with one or more cords incorporated in and extending the length of the waisting above, or both above and below, the button-holes formed therein, as and for the purposes described.
