MEDICATED BATH.

OPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 301,483, dated July 8, 1884.

Application filed August 23, 1883. (No specimens.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, OLIVER E. DAVIS, of the city of Cincinnati, in the county of Hamilton and State of Ohio, have invented certain 5 new and useful Improvements in Sulphurous Medicated Baths, of which the following is a

specification.

My invention relates to the employment of mud-baths artificially prepared for curative 10 purposes; and it has for its object to provide such bath's for the benefit of the general public, so that specific diseases may be treated at the home of the patient or at a public sanitarium or hospital without necessitating a jour-15 ney to the places where facilities are provided by nature; and to this end my invention consists in preparing artificial mud-baths of predetermined character to suit specific diseases or cases, and furnishing a convenient and cheap means whereby such specifically medicated mud-baths may be brought within the reach of the public generally.

The curative effects of mud-baths are well known and recognized, as is evidenced by the fact that every year hundreds of people seek to restore their broken health by resorting to the mud-baths of the celebrated hot springs of Arkansas, New Mexico, and other places. At these places the baths are administered by 30 mixing the mud, peat, bog, muck, or other moistened earth with the waters from the various natural mineral springs in the respective localities, and applying the earth to the affected part, or immersing the part or the entire

35 body in the mud, so that the remedies will be introduced into the system through the pores of the skin. The various localities are noted for their efficacy for different diseases, depending upon the constituents of the waters or 40 earths of the particular place; and in order to receive the benefits of such particular reme-

dies, it is necessary that the patient travel great distances, which is not only expensive and inconvenient, but often impossible.

It is the object of my invention to provide such a system of treatment as will permit the application of such remedies as are best adapted for the disease of the patient at the homes of the patients, or at centrally-located places 50 or sanitaria, and not only to be able to ad-

minister such remedies as nature has provided in the natural mineral waters and earths, but to be able to administer by external application such specific remedies as are best adapted for the treatment of the peculiar disease of 55

the patient.

In carrying out my invention, I preferably have tubs, tanks, or receptacles of the proper size and shape, lined with porcelain or other substances, which will resist the chemical ac- 60 tion of the remedies employed. Into these receptacles is placed the mud or earth mixed with water, so as to be of the proper consistency and properly medicated with the desired artificial compound. The character or 65 composition of the medicine will of course vary according to the disease to be treated, and the condition of the patient. If, for instance, there are indications from the diagnosis of the disease that the introduction of sulphur 70 into the system in various forms would be beneficial, one formula I have adopted is as follows: B. Sulphuret potassium, six ounces; sulphuret sodium, four ounces; water, one gallon, or q. s. This compound is incorpo- 75 rated with the desired quantity of mud or

The bath having been prepared is ready for use, though it is preferable to maintain the mixture at a temperature of from 98° to 120° 80 Fahrenheit, and the body or member to be treated is immersed in the bath and allowed to remain a sufficient length of time to produce the desired results. The mud-bath acts on the principle of a poultice, exciting the 85 excretion of the sweat-glands upon the entire surface of the body in contact with the bath and thereby opening the pores of the body and causing them to remain open and the artificial remedial agent is then more readily intro- 90 duced by absorption through the pores of the skin and into the blood, and the poison in the blood is more readily eliminated.

The temperature at which the baths are used is of much importance and must be regu- 95 lated according to the conditions of the use of

The mud-baths properly medicated are exceedingly efficacious in the treatment of cases of blood-poisoning of certain characters, in 100 modifying the effects of said poisons, or in eliminating the poisons from the system.

By my invention the benefits of medicated mud-baths may be accessible to all, as I provide a way of bringing the same home to the patient as other remedies are, or of having them in convenient places within the reach of all.

The baths may be prepared at any time, 10 either at the time wanted and to meet the diagnosis of any special case, where the particular remedies needed for the disease may be prepared and mixed with the moist earth; or certain general remedies applicable to a 15 class of diseases may be prepared and the bath mixed, and kept, and sold in proper receptacles for transportation or use.

I claim—

1. The method, substantially as herein described, of forming medicaments suitable for 20 external application, which consists in preparing a composition of earth, water, and the desired artificial remedial medicament, and placing the same within a suitable bath, lavatory, or other proper receptacle in which the 25 portions of the patient to be treated may be placed, and subjected to the same while maintained at a suitable temperature.

2. An artificial remedial medicament consisting of moist earthy matter combined with 30 an artificial medicinal agent contained in a suitable receptacle, substantially as described.
