References:

a. Your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request of March 29, 2001, for records concerning various dossiers. Your request was received in this office on April 18, 2001.

b. Our letter of April 20, 2001, informing you that additional time was needed to review the records and we were unable to comply with the 20-day statutory time limit in processing your request.

We have conducted checks of the automated Defense Clearance and Investigations Index and a search of the Investigative Records Repository to determine the existence of Army intelligence investigative records responsive to your request.

We have located the enclosed records pertaining to Panama Chinese Activities, ZF010278W. We have completed a mandatory declassification review in accordance with Executive Order 12958. As a result of this review, it has been determined that the Army-originated information no longer warrants security classification protection and is partially releasable to you. Fees for processing this request are waived.

Since the release of some of the information deleted from these records would result in an unwarranted invasion of the privacy rights of the individuals concerned, this information is exempt from the public disclosure provisions of the FOIA per Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(6) and (b)(7)(C).

The withholding of information by this office is a partial denial of your request. This denial is made on behalf of Brigadier General Keith B. Alexander, the Commanding General, U.S. Army Intelligence and Security Command, who is the Initial Denial Authority for Army intelligence investigative and security records under the FOIA. You may appeal this decision to the Secretary of the Army. If you wish to file an appeal, you should forward it to this office. Your appeal must be postmarked no later than 60 calendar days from the date of this letter. After the 60 day period, the case may be considered closed; however, such closure does not preclude you filing litigation in the courts.

During 1972, Source 22310102 (Project 2807), a usually reliable source of the 470th Military Intelligence Group, United States Army Southern Command, Fort Amador, Canal Zone, furnished the following names of Chinese residents of Panama who he identified as being pro-People's Republic of China (PRC). No attempt was made to list every Chinese in Panama whose political proclivities lean toward the PRC, rather, an effort was made to list those individuals who are actively propagandizing on behalf of the PRC and/or occupy prominent economic positions in the Chinese community in Panama which permit them influence to a greater or lesser extent, over other members of the Chinese community. Several persons listed are presently or formerly associated with publication of the pro-PRC Chinese language newspaper Tai Kong Po (Telegraphic Code(TC)): 1129/0361/1032--transliteration: Ta Kung Pao, aka: La Justicia (Justice). The list of reported PRO-PRC personalities is as follows:

a. () (Telegraphic code (TC): () transliteration: () proprietor of Almacen Once, a store in Panama City, Panama, which sells merchandise from the PRC, and head of La Justicia. Source suspects () being the leader of PRC intelligence activities in Panama, and of using Almacen Once to finance subversive PRC activities in Panama, including propaganda effected through La Justicia. () is also considered by pro-PRC residents of Panama as an unofficial PRC Consul in Panama. He reportedly has interceded with the PRC Government on behalf of Chinese residents of Panama who desire to bring relatives residing in the PRC to Panama. He accomplishes this by preparing letters to emigration authorities in the PRC, recommending approval for exit permits for relatives of pro-PRC Chinese in Panama.

b. () (TC: () proprietor of Casa Choy, a store in Panama City which sells merchandise from the PRC, and believed by Source to be the top PRC activist in Latin America. () associates closely with () and is suspected by Source of being () superior.

() organized tour groups for the Dalton Travel Agency to return to China (PRC). The first group consisted of ten people and the second, six had already departed. The names of the participants are unknown.

(U) (NOFORN) On 8 January 1973, Source 22310102 (Project 2807) a usually reliable confidential source of the 470th Military Intelligence Group, United States Army Forces Southern Command (USARSO), Fort Amador, Canal Zone (CZ), reported substantially as follows:

(U) (NOFORN) On 31 December 1972, a group of pro-People's Republic of China (PRC) Chinese from Panama City, including (TC: () his wife () proprietor of () wife; () Assistant Manager of Almacen Once; his wife, () (TC: () part owner of the store, Compania Unidos, S.A.; his wife () (TC: () owner of the steam laundry, La Paz; his wife; () his wife; () employee of the store, Casa Oro, S.A., located at Calle 24 E., his son, () employee of

the store, Bella Oro, Avenida B, traveled to the Nationalist Chinese Agricultural Mission in Santiago, Veraguas, Republic of Panama (PN). The group traveled in two automobiles, one belonging to () the other to () car is a cream colored Corvair, license number 8-24369. They took gifts with them consisting of Chinese foods and white wine from the PRC. They also took a bundle of communist newspapers from Hong Kong, Wen Hui Pao (TC: 2429/0565/1032), which they delivered to one of their communist friends who lives in Santiago. The group including the man from Santiago then went to see the members of the Nationalist Chinese Agricultural Mission. As soon as the man from Santiago was introduced to the members of the agricultural mission he commenced to speak malevolently of the Chiang Kai Shek Government and waved the communist newspapers as proof of his point of view, offering to give the newspapers to the members of the mission so that they could read them when they had time. When he finished talking, the chief of the Nationalist Chinese Mission, an educated man, began to refute his claims in a calm and courteous manner, asking the man from Santiago if he had been in Taiwan recently, and stating that the members of the mission resided in Taiwan, had their families there, received letters and knew that what the man from Santiago said did not correspond to the truth; furthermore, that what the newspaper said was pure propaganda with devious motives. The members of the mission then accepted the gifts (except the newspapers) and to reciprocate, courteously invited the communist to lunch at a restaurant; however, () group, realizing by the way in which the mission members spoke that they would not be swayed, rejected the invitation and returned to Panama City during the night of 1 January 1973.

2. (U) (NOFORN) In 1962 () obtained a position at El Exito, a Chinese div goods store located on Avenue B, Panama City. The owner () and () (TC: () -- transliteration: ()) was also a member of the Sam Yap Society. During this time, () was receiving a fairly large sum of money every two or three months from CH. The checks were forwarded to () through MEXICO. On one occasion, he made the mistake of cashing one of the checks in the El Exito store. Upon noting the origin of the check, () dismissed () Shortly afterward, () got a job in the Casa Jose, also located on Avenue B, Panama City. The proprietor () (TC: () -- transliteration: ()) also dismissed () upon discovering his political proclivities. () continued to receive financial support from CH. In October 1969, he opened a dry goods store in Panama City, the Almacen Once, which deals in goods from CH.

3. (U) (NOFORN) () and () the latter the owner of Casa Choy, a store on 4th of July Avenue in Panama City selling merchandise from CH and believed also to be a front for CHICOM activities, are the two most important CHICOM agents in PN. () is apparently not a PN citizen, although he claims to be. He is believed to possess false PN documentation. () on the other hand, () by birth and is the leader of the CHICOM element within the Chinese community. () is superior and, as the apparent direct link with CH, is therefore the real head of CHICOM activities in PN.

4. (U) (NOFORN) In March 1972 () set about organizing a group of PN-born Chinese to travel to CH to study the profession of their choice at the expense of the CH Government. In organizing this trip () was acting on behalf of the Director of the Civil Affairs Office for Overseas Chinese, Canton, CH. () also offered to aid Chinese-Panamanians in arranging for relatives to leave CH and emigrate to PN.

a. (U) Portions of the above IR information were disseminated upon receipt to the local US Intelligence community (reference MIGP 343-72).

b. (U) (NOFORN) According to files of the 470th Military Group, () is a CHICOM agent in PN. His store, Almacen Once, in Panama City, is a front organization for him and other CHICOM agents in PN. (B-2) The files indicate that () is married to a Venezuelan of Chinese descent. He is strongly suspected of being the top CHICOM agent in PN. The name () is believed to be a pseudonym, and he is also believed to have used the names () and () on past occasions. He allegedly speaks French, Spanish, English, Cantonese and Mandarin, and has studied in FRANCE and SPAIN. He is also said to be a personal friend of () (TC unknown), CH Ambassador to POLAND. (B-3)

Arrived in Panama in September 1959 from Bolivia, departed for Ecuador in August or September 1960. Reportedly arrived in Cuba from Guatemala on 13 January 1961. Has traveled extensively in Europe and Latin America.

During () stay in Panama, he worked as an overseas sales representative for the Ching May Company, 14 Johnston Road, Hong Kong. He established a successful business, catering mostly to U.S. citizens residing on military reservations in the Canal Zone. He displayed samples of fabrics, took measurements, and placed orders for clothes to Hong Kong.

() is reported to be a trained chemist and claims to have graduated from Hong Kong University in 1943 with a major in chemistry, specializing in analine dyes. He has reportedly also claimed that he graduated from Berlin University in Germany.

(b)(1) (b)(7)(C) born () arrived in Panama during September 1959 and departed for Ecuador in August or September 1960. During stay in Panama he established a Hong Kong tailor-made-clothes mail order business among citizens residing on Canal Zone military reservations. Because of his apparent intelligence and the many inconsistencies of the stories he gave to local anti- and pro-Communist Chinese, members of the Chinese colony in Panama believe () may be a Chinese Communist intelligence agent and possibly a leader of Chinese Communists in Central and South America. () reportedly arrived in Cuba on 13 January 1961.

1. (b)(1) (b)(7)(C) born () in () arrived in Panama, presumably from Europe, on 6 September 1959, aboard the Italian Line SS Americo Vespucci. He was documented with passport Nr () dated 16 June 1959, issued by the Consulate of Portugal in Paris, which was valid for travel in all countries, and a visa, issued 3 July 1959, in La Paz, Bolivia. He claimed his previous address was "Bolivia". On 4 August 1960, he obtained an exit permit for travel to Ecuador; he returned from Ecuador 24 August 1960, and on 31 August 1960 was issued an exit permit to again travel to Ecuador. () is 5'6" tall and weighs approximately 128 pounds. (Documentary) On 13 January 1961, () reportedly arrived in Cuba by air from an unidentified South American country. (C-6). He speaks English, both the Cantonese and Mandarin dialects, and has a limited knowledge of French, German and possibly Spanish or Portuguese. His distinguishing characteristic is irregular dentures. He wears glasses when reading.

2. During () stay in () he worked as an overseas sales representative for the Ching May Company, 14 Johnston Road, Hong Kong. He established a successful business through catering especially to U.S. citizens residing on military reservations in the Canal Zone, for whom he displayed sample fabrics, took measurements, and placed orders for clothes to Hong Kong. (F-6)

3. Because of () intelligence and inconsistency in stories he told, the Chinese colony in Panama suspects that he is a trained Communist agent and that he may be a leader of Chinese Communists in Central and South America. () reportedly has traveled extensively in Europe and South America and, at the time of his departure (August 1960), he claimed he would soon return to Panama. While in Panama, () resided in a second floor apartment in a modern building adjacent to Inversiones Chipas, S.A., in Panama City. (F-6)

4. () Among the reasons why the Chinese suspect () for being a Chinese Communist agent is the fact that he quickly became associated with the young leaders of the pro-Communist Sociedad Ta Ken China de Beneficiencia - STKCB (Ta Ken Chinese Beneficent Society) and attended secret meetings of the STKCB. Some STKCB members stated that () had attended a university and a secret intelligence school in Peking, China. () reportedly wished to make the impression that he was a good Chinese citizen. He also told members of STKCB that he graduated from a Chinese university, not further identified, after the Communists had taken over the mainland. His father, () taught at the Chun San University in Canton, but recently retired. (F-6)

5. () always carried large sums of money which he spent lavishly. He always paid restaurant and recreational expenses whenever he was with a group. During his stay in Panama he bought a stereophonic set which cost approximately \$500 and a 1955 Ford sedan which cost approximately \$1,000. (F-6)

6. () is a trained chemist. The Chinese believe, in view of the demand for chemists, that a Chinese normally would not take a position as a clothes salesman; however, they believed that the position as an overseas sales representative might be a good cover for intelligence activities. () boasted to STKCB members that he could get passports to travel anywhere from any country in the world, including the United States, and also that he could secure passports for any one to travel to any Western country. (F-6)

7. () During () early stay in Panama, he encountered difficulties in obtaining residence and work permits from the Panamanian Government. However, by giving a \$200 bribe to the First Secretary of the Panamanian Ministry of Labor, Welfare and Public Health, he obtained a work permit allowing him to operate a business in Panama. Because he had a Portuguese passport, the Portuguese Consul in Panama assisted him in obtaining his residence permit by paying \$20 to a clerk, not further identified, in the Panamanian Department of Immigration. Through a Chinese (not further identified other than that he works in a store in Colon named "Casa Mike") () obtained Panamanian citizenship the latter part of 1959 or early 1960. (F-6)

8. () told North Americans that he was born in () that his nationality was Portuguese, and that while very young he was taken to Hong Kong. Shortly before World War II, () graduated from a Catholic high school in Hong Kong and entered Hong Kong University, from which he graduated in 1943 with a major in organic chemistry, specializing in aniline dyes. During this time, Hong Kong was occupied by the Japanese and due to the lack of industry he was unable to secure employment as a chemist. He claimed that he refused an offer by the Japanese to work as a chemist in Japan. Following the end of World War II, () worked at various selling jobs in Hong Kong, and in 1949 became a small stockholder and employee in the Ching May Company. In 1953, () was sent overseas as a special sales representative to take orders for tailor-made clothes. () first traveled to Okinawa, where he placed orders for clothes from United States military and civilian personnel stationed on the island. He then went to Japan, where he once again dealt with United States servicemen and civilians. Sometime in 1957, () went to Europe, where

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for approximately two years he traveled in Spain, Portugal, France and Germany placing orders for the Ching May Company. () gave the impression that he was in the United States sometime between 1953 and 1959. The company then sent () to Panama to explore the potential market in the Canal Zone among U.S. military and civilian residents.

9. () implied to the Chinese colony (the majority of whom are anti-Communists) that he was a British subject because he was born in (). He informed the Chinese that he graduated from Berlin University in Germany. In commenting on Communist China and Chinese communism, () expressed his opinion that 1949 was a catastrophic year in Chinese history and that from that date on, the way of life for the Chinese on the mainland had changed: the Chinese are working longer hours, receive less pay, and are eating less. He claimed that starvation and famines are as common today in China under the Communists as when China was ruled by the Nationalists under Chiang Kai-shek. According to () the only part of China benefitting from the new regime is the Communist Government and its leaders. () opined that the true news of China does not leave the mainland due to Communist censorship.
