




Weather Operational Impacts

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
Situation Update

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(U) The overall situation remains calm and continues to improve in all areas. Shelter and jobs remain top priorities for Haitians and relief agencies, and forward progress is being made in both areas. The Haitian government is beginning to shift food distribution focus out of Port-au-Prince which indicates improving conditions in the capital. Essential services continue to slowly return to areas near PaP, but still do not fulfill needs. Rubble and debris removal efforts are making significant progress throughout PaP. The threat to US forces and relief effort remains low.

(U) Security/Threat Activity

NC

- Seven DPs opened today; no reported security incidents; DP 17 and 18 did not open
- Approximately 200 Haitians participated in a peaceful demonstration with an anti-GoH theme near the National Palace

(U) Infrastructure

NC

- More than 87,000 tarps and 17,000 family-size tents have been distributed; reached 24 percent of estimated families in need
- UNICEF began distributing over 150 school tents to areas less affected by the earthquake targeting 10,000 pre-and primary school aged children

(U) Medical

NC

- All clinics endorsed by the Ministry of Public Health and Population are eligible to receive free medicinal supplies until 12 April
- A real-time process exists for determining bed availability for twenty Haitian hospitals; 96% of host nation hospital beds are filled

(U) Governance

NC

- Nearly 67,000 Haitians have been employed in the UN cash-for-work program; program expanding in Jacmel
- French President Sarkozy pledged 369 million USD of aid for Haiti; package includes 77 million USD in debt cancellation
- NGO and GoH at odds over reconstruction; NGO internal conflicts hindering shelter cluster

(U) Migration/Internal Relocation

NC

- No indications of mass migration



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


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Caribbean Weather Effects

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Discussion

Haiti will see mostly cloudy skies with isolated rainshowers Thursday. Isolated rainshowers will occur again late Saturday evening. ISR collection will be significantly impacted during these periods. Northeasterly winds will create 3-5 foot waves in the windward pass marginally impacting small boat ops. Migrant movement will be unfavorable.

24-Hour Mudslide/Flood Assessment

The mudslide risk is moderate based on forecasted precipitation and instability of post earthquake terrain. Greatest threat is in NE portion of the country in areas where mountain slopes are greater than 30%. Minor pooling of water can be expected throughout Haiti.

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







Daily SM Tasked Breakdown



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





 - In Carrefour and Martissant, local leaders and NGOs have established independent procurement processes and are taking the lead in relief efforts



Government of Haiti

- GoH participated in a settlement decompression coord meeting with IOM, GIS and JTF to identify possible decompression locations and will conduct a subsequent site suitability assessment on 18 FEB
- IOM ICW U of PaP Psychology Dept. staff has commenced a six-month program to provide mental health and psychosocial support to Haitians in spontaneous settlements. The program train approximately 550 persons to assist in the effort

United Nations

- UNICEF ICW the MoH and local NGOs are in plan development to rapidly expand the supplemental feeding program and provide training to local community workers to assist in the program.
- WFP has established new sub-offices in Saint-Marc, Léogâne, and Les Cayes, Jacmel, Gonaïves, and Cap-Haitian. This is part of the greater overall effort to increase food distribution to the areas outside of Port-au-Prince.




DART Food Assistance Assessment

Objective: Meet immediate food assistance needs of affected population

Operation UNIFIED RESPONSE

FACTS:

- Affected Population: 3, 000,000
- Total Population Reached: 2, 700,000
- WFP and NGO Food Assistance Programs will be implemented for a period of 12 months.
- Military support has been required for all aspects of the food assistance program; port, storage facility, and security.
- MINUSTAH will receive additional forces – 900 troops and 500 police NLT MAR 10.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- GOH supports proposed food assistance interventions.
- Local authorities support food assistance operations and NGO operations.
- Security environment remains stable.
- Security capacity exists to support humanitarian assistance delivery.

METHOD OF ASSESSMENT:

- The Emergency Food Security Assessment will be completed February 17.
- The Emergency Market Analysis will be completed February 17. Initial MUAC screening is being carried out in camps.

TASKS:

- Provide food assistance to affected populations with particular attention to vulnerable groups.

BEST SOLUTIONS:

- Encourage donor contributions to WFP and NGOs.
- Military security assistance to food assistance operations.

INTERVENTIONS:

- Ad-hoc distribution – prepared meals and dry rations.
- Institutional Feeding – prepared meals and dry rations (12 months)
- Fixed point distribution – General Food Distribution (Through February 20)
- Multiple point distribution –Blanket Supplementary Feeding, Targeted Food Distribution and Food/Cash for Work: dry ration (Through June 2010)
- Appropriate infant feeding through targeted infant feeding interventions.
- Early detection and treatment of malnutrition cases.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Provide security and logistics support to Port Operations through April 1.
- Provide security to select storage facilities through February 20.
- Provide security to DPs through February 20.

WRITTEN PLAN DUE DATE: Programming is based on WFP Emergency Operation and NGO Proposals. Detailed Implementation Plans will be submitted February 13.

Definition of Food Assistance Emergency Standard: Supplement the affected population's daily requirement of 2100 kilocalories.

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DART WATER Assessment

Objective: Provide Humanitarian Relief Support to the Gov't and People of Haiti



Operation UNIFIED RESPONSE

FACTS:

- More than 2.2 million liters of chlorinated water are delivered in PaP and per day, enough to meet the life sustaining needs of up to 440,000 people (life sustaining needs is considered to be approximately 5 L/p/d).
- In addition to the water delivery, many other sources of water are available, including handpump wells, piped distribution from deep wells and springs, and water vendors.
- In most places, water appears available in quantities far above the life sustaining need of 5 L/p/d and even appears higher than the minimum emergency standard of 15 L/p/d.
- CAMEP report indicates that the PaP water network sustained minimal damage- leaks being repaired
- Chlorination of the water supply is consistent and at correct levels and will significantly reduce the chance of waterborne outbreaks.
- GoH is the lead for all WASH strategy: Planning, Decisions, Design and Implementation
- USAID/OFDA has developed an assessment format and methodology in conjunction with the GoH to conduct a 10 day in-depth standardized WASH assessment beginning 16 FEB.
- **ASSUMPTIONS:**
- DINEPA will continue to strongly lead the water response support/subsidize the private sector until the affected population can return to a system of payment for water services.

TASKS:

- Continue provision of tankered water to camps at the current level of 2.2 million liters per day.
- Test water quality of all water sources. Bacteriological testing should be done at all boreholes and springs that are un-chlorinated. Chlorine testing should continue for all water that is delivered, including all piped networks.
- The WASH Cluster needs to establish a regular water quality monitoring program. Currently water quality is regularly monitored, but not consistently reported into a central system for accountability to be established.
- Ensure distribution of aquatabs or sodium hypochlorite solution to areas where water is not being chlorinated at the source, distributions need to be targeted and tracked.

CHALLENGES:

- Difficulty in quantifying the volume of water collected from the variety of water sources available external to the WASH Cluster's water tanker distribution network
- Fluctuations in camp populations

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Continue to build HN and private sector capacity and plan the slow decline in the subsidy for water provision to re-establish the pay-for-service system once it is determined that affected populations can afford to purchase water again. This approach supports economic growth and sustainability.

Definition of Water Emergency Standards: The Sphere Project recommends a goal of 15 liters per person per day (drinking, hygiene, and cooking) within camp environments. The water quality standard is that all distributed water must contain a free chlorine residual of 0.2 ppm or greater at the point of distribution.

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Sanitation Hygiene 

DART Sanitation/Hygiene Assessment

Objective: Provide Humanitarian Relief Support to the Gov't and People of Haiti

Operation UNIFIED RESPONSE

FACTS:

- WASH Cluster (WC) estimates a need of 18,000 emergency latrines at a ratio of 50 people per latrine serving 900,000 affected people.
- Approximately 50% of sanitation need is in PaP.
- To date, greater than 1,200 latrines have been constructed and NGOs have ramped up construction and will be reporting activities to the WC. Expect to see numbers increase quickly.
- Approximately 4,500 portable toilets and 40 desludging trucks are needed to serve 50% of the need in PaP due to restrictions on digging, "concrete jungle", and limited space.
 - NGOs and the UN have 20 desludging trucks and 1,500 portable toilets in the pipeline, some of which is already arriving (some rented, most purchased).
 - USAID/OFDA is procuring 20 desludging trucks and 3,000 portable toilets to fill the remaining gap.
 - Clinton Foundation is partnering to provide 1,000 portable toilets (will replace rented portables).
 - Short term rentals from Haiti, DR, and US are being investigated to fill the gap until all of the equipment arrives.
 - All purchased materials in place within 4-6 weeks.
- OFDA has provided 57,208 hygiene kits benefitting more than 280,000 people. NGOs have distributed an unknown quantity of their own and should be reporting soon to the WC.

Facts cont.:

- OFDA plans to distribute 10,000 more hygiene kits soon.
- Observed hygiene behaviors within the camps appears to already be fairly good, likely due to culture and potentially to previous development efforts. This has not yet been measured, but is based solely on observations.
- Hygiene promotion activities are scaling up and will focus on the single most effective activity to reduce the spread of communicable disease – handwashing with soap.
- GoH's water and sanitation department (DINEPA) is the lead for all WASH strategy: Planning, Decisions, Design and Implementation
- A comprehensive WASH assessment will be rolled out this week by the WASH Cluster that was developed by USAID/OFDA. 300 sites will be assessed in PaP and surrounding urban areas during a 10 day period.

BEST SOLUTIONS/RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Focus on long term development aspect for enduring solutions
- Continue to develop the private sector which will enable long term economic growth and HN sustainability
- Fully support DINEPA to increase their capacity in sanitation and hygiene, which will allow them to better respond to future emergencies and to serve the people of Haiti in the future.

SANITATION/HYGIENE Emergency Standards: The emergency standard for latrine coverage in an emergency is a minimum of 50 persons per latrine. All plans in place are calculated to meet this goal. Hygiene is generally measured with a Knowledge, Attitude, and Practice (KAP) survey to quantify results. This process is too detailed to describe on this slide.



DART SHELTER Assistance Assessment

Objective: Meet immediate emergency shelter assistance needs of affected population, and expedite transitional shelter assistance



Operation UNIFIED RESPONSE

FACTS:

- Affected Population: Emergency Shelter Cluster (ESC) 220,000 households (est.), USAID/OFDA 240,000-300,000 households (est.) (@5 persons per family).
- Population not yet receiving humanitarian community shelter materials: 120,000 families (50%).
- There are sufficient quantities of emergency shelter supplies on the ground and in the pipeline to provide every affected household with two (2) pieces of plastic sheeting and related materials by 1 May, coupled with risk reduction measures.
- The rainy season starts late May, and hurricane season officially begins 1 June, with peak storms August-October.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- Security environment will remain permissive.
- Sufficient security capacity exists to support NGO activities.
- GoH will be supportive of current shelter distribution and future programming consistent with ESC strategy.

METHOD OF ASSESSMENT:

- ESC database, reflecting humanitarian community activities.
- 24 (out of estimated 80) NGOs in ESC reporting activities.
- Discussions with non-reporting NGOs involved in shelter distribution.

RECOMMENDED TASKS COMPLETED BY 1 APRIL:

- Contribute to rubble removal planning effort with others.
- Clear rubble to create areas to open up space for shelters
 - Road to Dominican Republic good example and learning template on rubble reuse.
- Conduct Habitability Assessments as part of cluster effort.
- Knock down and clear selected large damaged structures.
- Aviation support for NGO assessments in remote areas.

USAID/OFDA SHELTER AND SETTLEMENTS SECTOR ACTIONS:

- Encourage affected families to stay with host families.
- Move families back into suitable standing structures once habitability assessment is complete.
- Begin transition from emergency shelters to Phase II full transitional shelters as part of surge.
- Planned transitional settlements in and near existing neighborhoods, as an option to camps outside cities.

ADDITIONAL TASKS:

- Leverage JTF as security enabler and bridging strategy until MINUSTAH augmentation forces are in position to provide security for shelter distribution (as needed).
- Maximize the use of contracting to tackle mid and long term tasks such as rubble clearance or specialized tasks such as building demolition.

Health Assessment

Objective: Provide Humanitarian Relief Support to the Gov't and People of Haiti

Operation UNIFIED RESPONSE

FACTS:

- Clinical needs have transitioned from EQ-related trauma to standard baseline medical and surgical needs
- Disease surveillance trends indicate standard distribution of diarrheal, respiratory, injuries, skin diseases; decrease in injuries
- Number of outbreaks under investigation: 1 (confirmed typhoid)
- Estimated persons with moderate-severe injuries: 3000-4000
- Vaccination campaign (MR, DTP): 26 540 in PaP (35% coverage)
- Acute malnutrition – treatment sites: 11 outpatient, 3 inpatient
- Number of functional facilities: 91 hospitals (59 in PaP) (PAHO)
- Comfort:
 - Census 86/487 (20% ICU), cumulative surgeries 1037
 - Admits: 7; Surgeries: 7;
 - MEDEVAC to US: 99 AMCIT, 162 HCIT

ASSUMPTIONS:

- Full participation and support of MoH/MSPP
- Operation and support through currently existing cluster system
- Close interaction with other sectors: shelter, WASH, nutrition
- Pending rainy season and current crowded, spontaneous living conditions to stress public health infrastructure

METHODS OF ASSESSMENT:

- Currently pending multi-sector rapid assessment
- Disease surveillance system established in 51 previously existing facilities (linked with PEPFAR program)
- Passive reporting for health facility capacities

Key indicator: Crude Mortality Rate for Latin America and Caribbean:
0.3 deaths /10 000 persons / day (SPHERE)
* Likely higher threshold for Haiti

CHALLENGES:

- Query sustainability and impact of higher level of clinical and public health services provided during the response (eg Comfort, national lab, etc)
- Very fragmented system of reporting for diseases, facilities
- Mobility of population, unknown denominator/census data for public health analyses
- Low level baseline capacity in many sub-sectors
- Inter-sectoral challenges: shelter, sanitation, food security

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Identify major causes of mortality and morbidity
- Improve health information tracking and surveillance
- Ensure equitable access to care (especially for vulnerable groups)
- Prepare for high level of rehabilitative needs
- Aggressively follow MoH strategy for mobile clinics in spontaneous settlement areas
- Support re-establishment of treatment of chronic illnesses, HIV/TB
- Develop environmental health strategies (dengue, malaria)
- Ensure logistical and supply chain support for supplies

IMPLICATIONS FOR JTF HEALTH OPERATIONS

- Despite overall challenges, JTF has minimal footprint in health
- Operations are small in scale (medical, surgical, vaccine) and exit would not be disruptive to health care system
- Comfort has created falsely elevated level of care, acting as de facto referral center – but no longer treating significant EQ related trauma
- Therefore, exit largely based on political factors more than impact on health
- May be implications for commodity transport (as for all sectors)

Key Points (USAID Sitrep 59; USAID Fact Sheet 36)

Assessments: On 15 Feb., DART and USAID/Haiti staff assessed humanitarian conditions among displaced populations in Gonaïves, Jérémie, and Les Cayes, plus a rapid health assessment in Jacmel.

Shelter: In Gonaïves, lessons learned from the 2004 and 2008 hurricanes in Haiti indicate that the Department of Civil Protection (DPC) prefers host family placement over camp construction, as camps are more expensive and difficult to service, less socially acceptable and sustainable, and can lead to protection and environmental issues.

Livelihoods: On 16 Feb., USAID partners launched two debris clearing projects in Tabarre and Baillergeau (PaP), employing nearly 500 people, including nearly 180 women. In Gonaïves, IOM reported that 30 % of cash-for-work beneficiaries are IDPs recently arrived from PaP.

Food Aid: Food assistance reached 3.6 M people as of 16 Feb., including 2.5 M via the 16-site distribution system.

Agriculture: As of 16 Feb., the Agriculture Cluster prioritized distribution of seeds before the rainy season, and FAO and the GoH MoA were compiling a list of authorized seeds for procurement and distribution.

Humanitarian Coordination: U.N. revised appeal (strategic action plan) expected on 18 Feb.
