













Good view of camouflaged smocks and equipment. First three smocks front to back: Burred edge summer side, Oak leaf autumn side and Plane tree autumn side.






Searching the skies. From 1944 the Western Allies ruled the skies, so the Flak gun was a very important means of defence.



It's of great importance to know where you should be going, whether you're one man or a whole division.







If communications break down a runner is always at hand.










Diggin a fox hole - tedious but life-saving.









A good view of equipment being worn. Note how the entrenching tool gets in the way when kneeling, the use of one of the many types of back packs and the essential items in the Infantry cart.




The way to a man's heart is through food and shelter. - Food container arriving at the front.






A rare original camouflaged tent, first manufactured for the Africa Korps.

The officer makes sure hot food is ready for his men









The hot food is most welcome, but while some eat, others must keep watch.






Also showing the Zf41 telescopic sight in use with the M1943 stick grenade at the ready.




Fallschirmjager officer giving his orders. MP44 and MG34 weapons shown.









A young grenadier adjusts the 'rain hood' on his Zf41 scope.



A Fallschirmjager MG34 team cover the advance of the rest of their patrol.








A good photograph of a ZB30 gunner. The ZB30 was of Czechoslovakian design, the holster is for the Polish Radom.


