My thanks go to the many helpers from all division units and the widows of deceased comrades, through whose support the publication of this memorial volume became possible.


My thanks also go to the publishers for their decision to add another volume to the previous publications.


The year was taken up fully with the organization of the 1st Panzer Division out of motor vehicle training commands, transfers of men from various cavalry regiments, and the inclusion of already available troop units, and (in part) their moving into new garrisons. The training had the primary goals of unifying the troop units and preparing cadres for new units of additional Panzer divisions.




1936

The year was spent with the emphasis on further training —especially unit training. The first transfers for the formation of Panzer Regiments 7 and 8 took place. The arrival of Medium Tanks III and IV began. Gaps in the ordered structure were filled.

Spring 1936: The first Panzer IV (Version A) tanks arrive.

Autumn 1936: The Artillery Regiment (mot.) 73 gains its II. Unit.

Winter 1936: The first Panzer III (Version A) tanks arrive.



1937

Further transfers to other divisions are to be made. The high point of the year, though, is the participation in the great "Wehrmacht Maneuvers of 1937" in Mecklenburg.

By the end of the year, setting up the active units is concluded.

Summer 1937: The previously lacking Panzer II tanks arrive. Summer 1937:

Formation of Artillery Regiment (mot.) 73 concludes.

10/1/1937: Generalmajor Rudolf Schmidt (formerly Commander of the War

Academy) takes command of the division.

Autumn 1937: First unit drill of the division at full strength at Königsbrück

Training Camp. On from there to the great Wehrmacht

Maneuvers of 1937.



1938


Training at all levels strengthened the division's capability and feeling of unity. But transfers to other newly formed Panzer units always disturb what has been attained.

The march into the Sudeten area is simultaneously training and reinforcement of previous results.

Spring 1938: Division supply, medical and repair troop units begin to


be established.









In the first half of the year, in addition to the usual training and the continuing transfers to newly formed units, there was a test consisting of the march of Panzer Regiment 1 to Silesia. But the acid test took place in the campaign against Poland. Commanders and troops soon became as one, and their mutual confidence grew. The division came out of this fight internally strengthened and was then refilled immediately. Its training to the end of the year made use of its experience in the campaign.

March 1939: March of strengthened Panzer Regiment 1 to Silesia as "OKH

Reserve" for the march into what remained of Czechoslovakia.

No further action, though.

Summer 1939: Time at the training camp. The 6./Rifle Regiment 1 receives its

first SPW.

August 1939: March to the Silesian-Polish border.

9/1/1939: War with Poland begins, in XVI Army Corps (mot.) under 10th

Army (Army Group South).

9/9/1939: The west bank of the Vistula was reached at Gora Kalwarya,

south of Warsaw.

9/16/1939: Beginning of combat on the Bzura.

9/19/1939: End of fighting in Poland. Late November: Transfer to the Dortmund area.






















After a quiet training time, the campaign against France began in May. In it the division proved itself especially well. The experience gained in this action inspired changes in training, structure and equipment. At the end of the year an even stronger Panzer division was in East Prussia, fully ready for service.

March 1, 1940: Generalmajor Ki	rchner takes command of the division.

To May 1940: All 3 battalions of Rifle Regiment 1 receive at least 2 companies

with armored vehicles (SPW).

5/9/1940: Move into assembly areas.

5/10/1940: 5:35 A.M., campaign against France begins. Division pushes

through Luxembourg and southern Belgium toward Sedan.

5/13/1940: With strong artillery and dive-bomber support, attack across the

Meuse, followed by hard fighting.

5/14/1940: Further advance toward Rethel and Amiens. Combat against

strong French tank forces.

5/17/1940: The Oise is crossed fighting, the area south of St. Quentin

is won.

5/20/1940: Bridgeheads near Amiens are gained with heavy losses.

5/21/1940: Turn to the northwest, toward Dunkerque.

5/24/1940: The Canal de L'Aa is reached at Gravelines. Stayed there

until 5/27.

5/27/1940: The attack on Dunkerque began.

6/2-4/1940: Division marches and transfers to area north of Rethel. Sub-

ordinated to XXXIX. AK (mot.) here.

6/10/1940: Attack from a bridgehead south of the Aisne to break through

the Weygand Line.

6/11/1940: After hard fighting, further advance to St. Dizier on the Marne.

6/13/1940: Pursuit of the retreating enemy after reaching the Marne.

6/15/1940: Through Chaumont, around Langres. Gray sur Saone reached

far behind the Maginot Line.

6/16/1940: Besancon is taken and the Swiss border is reached.

6/17/1940: Turn northeastward toward Burgundian Gate and southern

Vosges Mountains.

6/19/1940: Belfort is taken.

6/22/1940: Armistice; remained in France. Vacation, refreshment, training.


9/5/1940 Transfer to Zinten-Sensburg-Allenstein-Rastenburg

End of year: Area in East Prussia, further training, changes in structure,

arrival of better weapons. Staff of 1st Panzer Brigade disbanded. Panzer Regiment 2 goes to new 16th Panzer Division. Rifle Regiment 113 is formed. Each rifle regiment has two battalions. Panzer Artillery Regiment, as III. Unit, gains previously

assigned II. (heavy) A.R.56 (mot.). Panzer Regiment 1 gives up all Panzer I, receives Panzer III. Regiment now has 155 tanks (85

Panzer III and 30 Panzer IV).

























1941

The first half of the year was filled with training and refreshment in beautiful East Prussia. The campaign against Russia, which began on June 22, brought back the fast advances of the former Blitzkrieg campaigns, but as of the autumn came the awareness that the Red Army's resistance grew stronger all the time and weather, space and scope would not allow a quick victory. The two main goals — of the division too — of Leningrad and Moscow could not be taken. At the end of the year, the division, under attack and still insufficiently supplied, was embroiled in defensive action in the "Lama position" northwest of Volokolamsk in temperatures down to 40 below zero.

To 6/21/1941: Training in the previous areas.

6/22/1941: Russian campaign begins. Under the leadership of the XXXXI.

Panzer Corps the division moves out of the Memelland east of

Tilsit and across the Baltic area toward Leningrad.

6/23-26/1941: Tank battle on the Dubyssa.

6/28/1941: The Düna is crossed.

7/5/1941: Combat along the Stalin Line near Ostrov.

To 7/12/1941: Forest combat toward Luga.

7/14/1941: The Luga is reached near Szabsk in bitter fighting, a bridgehead

held against numerous Russian counterattacks.

7/15/1941: Generalmajor Krüger takes command of the division.

8/8/1941: Attack on Leningrad begins. A tough fight to make any

progress.

8/21/1941: Krasnogvardeisk (south of Leningrad) is occupied.

8/23/1941: Breakthrough in the outer defensive belt around Leningrad;

defensive action until September 8.

9/9/1941: Attacks on the city begin.

To 9/15/1941: Hard fighting around the Duderhof Hills.

9/16/1941: Withdrawal of division and transfer (road and rail) to Army

Group Center near Byeloy (north of Smolensk) begin.

10/2/1941: Attack toward Moscow.

10/7/1941: The upper Dniepr is crossed.

10/13/1941: Kalinin, south of the Volga Basin, is taken. Hard fighting there

until the end of November.


12/1/1941: Attack toward Moscow-Volga Canal north of Moscow.

12/6/1941: Fighting broken off, withdrawal combat at Klin.

12/16/1941: Removal to Ruza sector, to stay till year's end. At this time the

units are put in order and strengthened with replacements, but



































The year saw the division in almost ceaseless attack and defensive action on the north wing of the Army Group Center in the Sychevka-Rshev-Olenin-Byeloy area. Once it had to be brought out for refreshment. The losses exceeded anything hitherto experienced. At the end of the year the survivors were transferred to France and reequipped.

As of 1/10/1942: Advance from Sychevka area north to cut off the enemy

breakthrough west of Rshev and clear the area around that city.

March 1942: Defense of the area around Olenin.

April 1942: Arrival of personnel, weapons and equipment for complete

revitalization. Men transferred to form Panzer Unit 116 in 16th

Infantry Division (mot.).

7/2/1942: Attack southward toward Byeloy to close a gap in the front there.

8/2/1942: Stopped a breakthrough east of Sychevka. Bitter fighting until

end of October.

As of Nov. 1942: Army reserve duty in Byeloy area.

As of 11/26/42: Retreat action between Byeloy and Sychevka, continuing into

mid-December.

As of 12/25/42: Transfer to France for refreshment.







This year brought a nine-month period of rest and refreshment in France and Greece. Only in the last two months was the division again fighting hard against enemy forces breaking through at the junction of Army Groups South and Center, action that continued (in the Schitomir) area) until the year ended.

To end April 1943: Division at refreshment zone in France (at Amiens, later Normandy and Brittany). Replacement personnel arrives.

As of May 1943: Transfer to northern Pelopenessus, Greece. Here reequipping, including Wespe and "Hummel", is finished.

June 1943: Reported fully ready for service.

11/15/1943: Under XXXXVIII. Panzer Corps, attacks on enemy forces that






































































AFTERWORD

This war was the experience of a generation which is often asked to this day to forget and overcome the times in which we served, their events and experiences. We neither can nor will forget them, and we have long since overcome them through our position in favor of the maintenance of peace in freedom.

It is also the purpose of this book to remember our fallen comrades, who were true of heart and convinced that they served a just cause. Pericles said, "Men and peoples are to be evaluated by how they honor their dead." Here our people have much to set right. We old comrades, now veterans of the great war, want to contribute through this documentation of those events in words and pictures.

And something else too: Those who want to gloss over the German soldiers of the Wehrmacht — and thus all the members of our division — in the traditional history of our people strike us as ignorant and foolish.

Not one of us wanted the war. We were sent by fate into the events of world history in the years of 1939 to 1945 and had our duty to do honorably. The men of the 1st Panzer Division have not let our people down but have done their duty, both in the war and after the end of the hard fight.
